THIS DATE IN YANKEES HISTORY

August 18, 1983: The "Pine Tar Game" is concluded, as the Royals complete a 5-4 win at Yankee Stadium. The game was suspended with two outs in the top of the ninth on 7/24/83 following George Brett's controversial home run. The resumption featured Don Mattingly at 2B and Ron Guidry in CF.

HOMER HAPPY: The Yankees have homered in 94 of their 119 games this season (79.0%), including 55 of their 59 games at home...the Yankees' 182HR this season are most in the Majors...are on pace for a franchise-record 248HR...went homerless in Monday's loss at Oakland, snapping their season-high streak of 14 straight games with at least one homer...marked their longest such stretch since homering in 14 consecutive games from 9/18-10/1/05.

LEADING OFF: Over his last eight games, **SS Derek Jeter** is batting .548 (17-for-31) with 7R, 3HR, 6RBI and six multi-hit contests, including four three-hit games...his .328 average (149-for-454) and .396 on-base percentage as the No. 1 batter in the lineup each rank second among Major League leadoff men this season.

TANDEM PITCHING: **LHP CC Sabathia** and **RHP A.J. Burnett** have started back-to-back games (in either order) 11 times this season with the Yankees going 17-5 combined in those contests, prior to last night's loss...of those 11 instances, the Yankees have won both of their starts seven times, including five of the last seven such occurrences...lost both starts just once - 6/20-21 at Florida.

TANDEM BATTING: **1B Mark Teixeira** (30HR) and **OF/INF Nick Swisher** (20) are the fourth set of Yankees teammates over the last 50 years to each hit at least 20HR in their first full season in pinstripes...join Alex Rodriguez/Gary Sheffield (2004), Jason Giambi/Robin Ventura (2002) and Kevin Maas/Jesse Barfield (1990).

AT A GLANCE: The Yankees will play the second game a three-game series vs. the Oakland Athletics tonight at Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum...are 3-2 on this season-long 11-day, 10-game road trip, winning three of four games at Seattle (Thursday-Sunday) and dropping the opener of this series...trip concludes with three games in Boston this weekend...this series concludes a stretch in which the Yankees are scheduled to play 33 games in 34 days from 7/17-8/19 (are 23-8 thus far)...are 16-10 against the AL West this season and 46-26 (.639) vs. all non-AL East competition...following this series, the Yankees will play 23 of their final 41 games against teams currently leading their division, within 5.0 games of the division lead or within 5.0 games of the wild card lead.

OF LATE: The Yankees have won 12 of their last 15, 23 of their last 31 and 36 of their last 49G...are 59-28 in their last 87G, starting with a season-high nine-game winning streak from 5/13-21...have compiled four winning streaks of at least seven games this season and own two winning streaks of at least eight games in the same season for the first time since 2003...are a Major League-best 23-8 since the All-Star break.

TO THE TOP: The Yankees own the best record in the Majors...are 29 games over .500 (two shy of their season high) and 7.0G ahead of Boston for first place in the AL East (0.5G behind their season-high division lead)...is the largest division lead in Baseball...have been in first place (shared or sole possession) for 42 days this season, including each of the last 29...surpassed the Red Sox for sole possession of first place in the division with 7/21 win vs. Baltimore...reached 60 wins in under 100 games for the first time since 2004...did not reach more than 17 games above .500 during 2008.

According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, the Yankees have never blown a lead of *more than* 6.0 games...the largest division lead - at any point in the season - ever blown by the Yankees was a 6.0G lead in 1933 after 44 games...finished that campaign 91-59, in second place and 7.0G behind Washington.

YESTERDAY'S RECAP: The Yankees dropped their second straight game, losing the series opener, 3-0, at Oakland...marked the fourth time this season that the Yankees have been shutout - third on the road...was their first shutout loss since 6/23 at Atlanta (4-0) and first in Oakland since a 12-0 blanking on 9/2/05...**RHP A.J. Burnett** recorded a complete-game loss (fifth of his career), allowing 3ER on 6H in 8.0IP with 2BB and 5K...all three runs scored in the fourth inning...**DH Derek Jeter** (3-for-4) had three of the Yankees' 7H, recording his second straight three-hit game and fourth in his last eight contests.

SWISH! **OF/INF Nick Swisher** has recorded base safely in each of his last 26 games...marks the second-longest such stretch of his career behind a span of 36 games from 4/7-5/19/06 (w/ Oakland) and is the longest stretch by a Yankee this season...is tied with the Dodgers' Rafael Furcal for the second-longest current stretch in the Majors behind Baltimore's Nick Markakis (37).

Hit his 20th home run of the season in Sunday's loss at Seattle, marking the fifth straight season he has reached the plateau...was his 17th home run on the road this season, making him the first player in franchise history to hit at least 17 of his first 20 home runs on the road (credit: *Elias*)...has homered six times in his last 12 games away from Yankee Stadium.

JETER LEADER: With 3H in Sunday's loss at Seattle, **SS Derek Jeter** became the all-time leader in hits as a shortstop (2,675), surpassing Luis Aparicio (2,673) - credit: *Elias*...all but 16 of Jeter's career hits have come while playing shortstop, collecting the others as a DH...surpassed Aparicio in his 2,085th career game at shortstop...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, only two others have played more games at shortstop while never playing any other fielding position - Aparicio (2,583) and Ozzie Smith (2,511).

YANKEES INK PICKS: Prior to Monday's midnight deadline, the Yankees signed their first-round pick of the 2009 First-Year Player Draft, **OF Slade Heathcott**...in addition, the club announced the signings of **C J.R. Murphy** (2nd rd.), **RHP Caleb Cotham** (5th rd.), **LHP Samuel Elam** (8th rd.), **RHP Graham Stoneburner** (14th rd.), **RHP Bryan Mitchell** (16th rd.), **OF Joseph Taleric** (21st rd.), **OF Judd Golson** (31st rd.), **RHP Mariel Checo** (41st rd.) and **LHP Evan DeLuca** (44th rd.)...the club signed each of their top eight picks, 14 of their top 15 and 27 of 49 overall selections...Heathcott and Murphy will report to the GCL, Cotham will go to Staten Island.

TEAM DIVERSITY: The Yankees have a Major League-most nine players with at 10HR this season (Teixeira-30, Damon-22, Rodriguez-21, Swisher-20, Matsui-19, Cano-18, Posada-15, Jeter-15 and Cabrera-11)...marks their most players with double-digits in homers since 2005 (also nine)...have eight players with 15-or-more home runs, making them the first team to accomplish the feat since Cleveland and Texas both did so in 2005 (both had nine such players)...is the first Yankees club to do so since 2004 (eight - Clark, Jeter, Matsui, Posada, Rodriguez, Sheffield, Sierra, Williams)...have a Major League-most four players with at least 20HR, marking their most since 2006 (Giambi, Rodriguez, Damon and Posada).

☞ The Yankees are the only club in the Majors that has eight players with at least 50RBI (Cano, Damon, Jeter, Matsui, Posada, Rodriguez, Swisher, Teixeira)...Philadelphia has seven but no other team has more than five...Cabrera (46) is just shy of reaching the plateau...the Yankees have not had nine players, each with at least 50RBI, since 1998.

GO, GO CANO: **2B Robinson Cano** had his 14-game hitting streak snapped in Monday's loss at Oakland...over the 14-game span, hit .431 (25-for-58) with 7 doubles, 2HR, 4RBI and 10 multi-hit contests...ranks second in the Majors with 51 multi-hit games this season...Cano ranks first in the Majors in batting average (.317) and hits (150), second in slugging (.510), fourth in runs scored (79) and seventh in RBI (60) among second basemen while playing the position...he also ranks fifth in the Majors with a .991 fielding percentage at 2B (5E, 551TC).

COMEBACK KIDS: The Yankees lead the Majors with 39 come-from-behind victories this season...own 20 wins in their last at-bat, ranking second in the Majors behind Los Angeles-NL (21)...the Yankees' 11 "walk-off" wins are tied for most in the Majors with the Dodgers (11) and are their most since 1988 (also 11)...have come back to win four games this season when trailing in the eighth inning (4-26 overall) after going 4-122 in such games from 2007-08 combined...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, opposing relievers are 15-30 with a 5.54 ERA (380.OIP, 234ER) against the Yankees this season.

☞ The Yankees are 61-1 this season when leading after eight innings and 138-1 over the last two years (2008-09)...the only loss occurred on 4/24/09 at Fenway Park (led 4-2 in eighth, lost 5-4).

TEX MARKS THE SPOT: **1B Mark Teixeira** hit his 30th home run of the season in Friday's win at Seattle (in the Yankees' 116th team game)...has hit at least 30HR in each of the last six seasons, joining Albert Pujols and Adam Dunn as the only players in the Majors to accomplish the feat.

☞ The *Elias Sports Bureau* notes that Teixeira is the eighth player to hit at least 30 HR in his first season with the Yankees, joining Babe Ruth (1920), Roger Maris (1960), Bobby Bonds (1975), Reggie Jackson (1977), Jason Giambi (2002), Alex Rodriguez (2004) and Gary Sheffield (2004)...only Maris (needed 82 games to reach the milestone and finished the season with 39HR) and Babe Ruth (needed 88 games, finished with 54HR) hit their 30th homer fewer games into the season than Teixeira.

A-CLUTCH: **3B Alex Rodriguez** hit his 574th home run in 8/9 win vs. Boston, breaking a tie with Harmon Killebrew for sole possession of ninth place on Baseball's all-time list...the solo homer in the seventh broke a scoreless tie.

☞ Five of his home runs this season have given the Yankees the lead in the seventh inning or later, most in the Majors this season (credit: *Elias*)...was the 32nd such homer of his career, second only to Ken Griffey, Jr. (37) among active players in the category.

☞ Owns two "walk-off" home runs this season and six as a Yankee, marking the most "walk-off" HR by a Yankee since Graig Nettles had six from 1973-81.

☞ According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, 12 of his 21HR this season have either tied the game or given the Yankees the lead...of his 63RBI this season, 34 have either tied the game or given the Yankees the lead.

MO'ED DOWN: **RHP Mariano Rivera** leads the Majors lead with 35 saves (in 36 chances) in 2009, pitching to a 0.96 ERA (37.1IP, 24H, 4ER) in save opportunities with 40K and 5BB...his current streak of 31 straight converted save chances is the longest such streak in the Majors since Brad Lidge converted 47 consecutive saves with Houston and Philadelphia from 9/25/07-4/13/09...also ties his personal best consecutive-save streak achieved in 2005...recorded a Major League-high 10 saves in July, tossing 11.2 scoreless IP in 12 relief appearances, allowing only 3H and 2BB with 9K...according to *Elias*, it marked just the second time in his career he earned at least 10 saves in a month without allowing a run (also August 1999).

☞ Has reached 35-save plateau for the 10th time in his career...only Trevor Hoffman (11) has more 35-save seasons all time.

☞ Has converted 104-of-108 save chances (96.3%) since blowing his first two chances in 2007, marking the best ratio in the Majors over the span (since 4/21/07) and the best mark since Eric Gagne saved 104-of-108 from 6/10/03-8/12/07 (credit: *Elias*).

ROAD WARRIORS: The Yankees rank second in the AL with a .550 (33-27) road winning percentage in 2009, behind the Angels (35-23, .603)...are the only two AL teams with a road record above .500 in 2009...collected a season-high eight-game road winning streak from 6/24-7/9, marking their longest winning streak away from the Bronx since a nine-gamer from 4/20-5/8/98.

ARMS RACE: Since the All-Star break, Yankees pitchers have gone 23-8 (.742) with a 3.61 ERA, a .248 opp. average and 260K...lead the Majors in winning percentage and strikeouts, and rank fifth in ERA and opponents average...posted a 4.54 ERA in the first half, ranking 11th out of 14 AL teams.

DYNAMIC DUO: Since **3B Alex Rodriguez** returned from the disabled list on 5/8, both he and **1B Mark Teixeira** have combined to hit 46HR and drive in 134 runs as the Yankees have gone a Major League-best 61-30...no two teammates have combined to hit more homers than the pair over the same stretch...next closest combo is Minnesota's Justin Morneau/Joe Mauer (44HR).

OVERALL TRENDS/FACTS: The Yankees will play the second game a three-game series at the Athletics tonight...are 5-2 vs. the A's this season, winning five of six at Yankee Stadium and dropping the first of this set...were 5-1 vs. Oakland in 2008, winning the season series for the first time since 2005...have won 10 of the last 13 games vs. Oakland, including a eight-game winning streak from 6/12/08-7/24/09, their longest winning stretch since 1993-94...have secured the series win for the second straight year and sixth time this decade.

AT OAKLAND-ALEMEDA COUNTY COLISEUM: The Yankees are making their only visit to Oakland this season, playing the 10-12...was their seventh road season series win vs. Oakland since 1998...the Yankees are 11-8 (.579) at Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum since the start of the 2004 season, the second-highest winning pct. by any AL team in Oakland over the span, behind the Angels...had lost 11 of the previous 15 games there from 2001-03.

AT YANKEE STADIUM: The Yankees went 5-1 at home against the A's this season, including a win in the first-ever night game at Yankee Stadium on 4/21...won the home season series in consecutive seasons for the first time since 2004-05...have won eight of their last nine home games vs. the A's and are 18-9 vs. Oakland in the Bronx since the start of the 2004 season...had a seven-game home winning streak against Oakland from 7/18/08-7/24/09...the Yankees have gone 39-21 in 60 home games vs. the A's since the start of the 1997 season.

TONIGHT'S STARTER: LHP CC SABATHIA (13-7, 3.64 ERA)

LHP CC Sabathia, 29, will make his 26th start of the season on Tuesday against the Oakland Athletics at Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum...will be his 18th career start vs. the Athletics and third this season...last started on 8/13 at Seattle and earned the win, allowing 1ER in 8.0IP in the 11-1 Yankees victory (3H, 2BB, 10K, 1HR)...marked the 21st time in his career and first time this season he recorded 10-or-more strikeouts...has won nine consecutive August starts (including a 3-0 record this season and a 5-0 mark in 2008), marking the longest August winning streak in the Majors...has pitched into the seventh inning or beyond 20 times in 25 starts this season...turned 29 on 7/21...was signed by the Yankees to a seven-year contract on 12/18/08.

PitCChing IN: On Wednesday at 10:00 a.m. in Vallejo, Calif., Sabathia returns to Loma Vista Elementary School, which he attended... he will personally hand out fully-loaded backpacks to students in Kindergarten through 5th Grade for their first day of school...all backpacks were paid for and filled by his 'PitCCh In Foundation,' which is dedicated to enriching the lives of inner city youth by raising self-esteem through education and athletic activities.

HE'S NOT A DOCTOR, HE JUST PLAYS ONE ON TV: Earned wins in his last two starts on 8/8 vs. Boston (7.2IP, 2H) and on 8/13 at Seattle (8.0IP, 3H)...marks the first time since Dwight Gooden on 5/8/96 vs. Detroit (8.0IP, 2H) and 5/14/96 vs. Seattle (9.0IP, 0H) that a Yankees starter earned the win in back-to-back starts while tossing at least 7.2 IP and allowing three-or-fewer hits in each start.

AUGUST AND EVERYTHING AFTER: Owns a 52-20 career record with a 2.98 ERA (631.1IP, 209ER) in 91 starts in games from August 1 until the end of the regular season...in August alone, has a 31-9 career record with a 3.16 ERA (339.0IP, 119ER), which includes a 18-2 combined mark with a Major League-best 2.13 ERA (194.0IP, 46ER) over the last five Augusts (2005-09)...his August-only win total since 2005 is tops in the Majors and his winning percentage (.900) is tied with San Francisco's Noah Lowry (.900), who went 9-1 from 2005-07...is the only pitcher in the Majors with more than one five-win August over the stretch (5-0 in 2005 and 5-0 in 2008).

ON A ROLL: Is tied for the Major League lead in wins since 5/8 with a 12-4 record and 3.28 ERA in 19 starts (131.2IP, 109H, 48ER, 32BB, 109K)...his 7.45H/9.0IP over the stretch is third in the AL...began the season 1-3 with a 4.85 ERA (39.0IP, 21ER) in his first six starts of 2009.

HOMESTANDING: Is 3-0 with a 1.25 ERA (21.2IP, 3ER) in his last three home starts since 7/18, allowing just 16H and 5BB with 17K...prior to the stretch, was 2-2 with a 4.55 ERA (55.1IP, 28ER) in his first eight home starts this season.

GOING THE DISTANCE: Has thrown at least 7.0IP in 17 of his 25 starts, including 15 of his last 19 outings...strung together eight straight starts with at least 7.0IP from 5/8-6/16, marking the longest such single-season streak by a Yankee since David Cone (eight straight from 6/24-8/2/98)...has recorded at least 8.0IP six times in 2009.

OVER THE LONG HAUL: Since 2001 when he debuted, is tied with Roy Halladay for tops in the Majors in shutouts (11), ranks third in complete games (28), is tied for third in wins (130), is fourth in strikeouts (1,526), and ranks fifth in innings pitched (1,830.0).

YOUNG GUN: Turned 29 on 7/21...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, his 126 wins were the most for any active (or disabled) pitcher before the age of 29...became the youngest pitcher to reach 100 career wins since Greg Maddux with the Braves in 1993 and the youngest AL hurler to reach the plateau since Kansas City's Bret Saberhagen in 1991...became the youngest pitcher to reach 1,000K since Kerry Wood with the Cubs in 2003 and the youngest American Leaguer since Roger Clemens with Boston in 1989.

AMONG THE BEST: Owns a .619 career winning percentage (130-80), which is tied for ninth-best among lefthanders who began their careers in 1950 or later (min: 140 decisions)...among active lefthanders on Major League rosters, ranks fourth in ERA (3.65 - min: 1500.0IP), opponents batting average (.246) and winning percentage, sixth in strikeouts (1,526), eighth in wins (130) and ninth in IP (1830.0).

LEFTY TO LEFTY: Has not allowed a homer to a left-handed batter in any of his last 26 starts *at home*, since giving up a pair of homers to Jim Thome on Opening Day in 2008 (3/31/08 w/Cleveland vs. Chicago-AL)...allowed an extra-base hit to a left-handed batter in each of four straight starts from 5/24-6/11...prior to his 5/24 start vs. Philadelphia, had gone 26 consecutive starts without allowing an extra-base hit to a left-handed batter dating back to 7/2/08 when the White Sox's A.J. Pierzynski hit a solo home run in the first inning...had been the longest such stretch for a Major League lefty since Randy Johnson accomplished the feat over 28 starts spanning the 1998 and 1999 seasons (credit: *Elias*).

STRETCHING IT OUT: Sabathia's five shutouts in 2008 were second-most in a single season over the last 15 years (1994-2008), behind Randy Johnson's six in 1998...only Johnson (12CG in 1999) recorded more complete games in a single season than Sabathia's 10 in 2008 over the last 10 years (1999-2008).

➤ Owns both Yankees complete games this season and is second behind Roy Halladay (14) in the Majors with 12 CGs over the last two seasons (2008-09).

2008 RECAP: Went 17-10 with a 2.70 ERA in 35 combined starts with Cleveland and Milwaukee in 2008, leading the Majors in IP (253.0), complete games (10) and shutouts (five)...ranked second in the Majors in strikeouts (251) and fourth in ERA...despite a midseason trade to the Brewers, finished fifth in NL Cy Young Award voting and sixth in NL MVP voting.

2009 NOTES:

- Made his sixth career Opening Day start and first start with the Yankees on 4/6 at Baltimore, recording the loss in a 10-5 Orioles victory (4.1IP, 8H, 6ER, 5BB, 0K)...became the Yankees' first African-American Opening Day starter...was the team's first free-agent signing to make an OD start immediately after signing with the club during the previous offseason since Roger Clemens in 2003.
- Earned a 4-0 complete-game shutout on 5/8 at Baltimore...marked the first CG-shutout by a Yankee since Chien Ming Wang on 7/28/06 vs. Tampa Bay (2H, 2BB, 1K), snapping a franchise-record 414-game stretch without a Yankees pitcher recording a shutout...became the first Yankees lefthander to throw a shutout at Baltimore since Ron Guidry in 1985 at Memorial Stadium.
- Collected his first win at Yankee Stadium on 5/19 vs. Baltimore (7.0IP, 3H, 1ER, 1BB, 7K)...allowed back-to-back singles to lead off the game, then retired 21 of his final 23 batters faced (1H, 1BB).
- Exited his 6/21 start at Florida with a sore left biceps muscle with one out in the second inning...(1.1IP, 3H, 1ER, 1BB, 1K)...was his shortest start since 6/26/04 vs. Colorado, leaving that game after 1.0IP with irritation in his left shoulder.
- Reached 1,500 career strikeouts in his start on 7/28 at Tampa Bay, catching Carl Crawford looking in the fifth inning.
- Tossed 7.2 shutout innings on 8/8 vs. Boston, notching the win (2H, 2BB, 9K)...retired his first 13 batters faced before walking David Ortiz in the fifth...carried a no-hitter into the sixth before allowing a two-out single by Jacoby Ellsbury...marked the fourth time in his career he threw at least 7.0IP and limited his opponent to 2H or fewer.
