TODAY IN YANKEES HISTORY

April 21, 2009: Starter Andy Pettitte does not strike out or walk a batter in 7.0IP as the Yankees win the first night game in Yankee Stadium history, 5-3. He is the first Yankee to pitch at least 7.0IP without recording a walk or strikeout since pitching coach Dave Eiland in a 7-4 Yankees victory on 10/6/91 vs. Cleveland.

TOMORROW IN YANKEES HISTORY

April 22, 1903: The Highlanders play their first ever game, a 3-1 loss at Washington. The team will go on to finish with a 72-62 record, good for fourth place in the eight-team AL.

April 22, 1959: Whitey Ford pitches a 1-0, 14-inning shutout at Griffith Stadium in Washington, allowing just seven hits and seven walks while striking out 15. Moose Skowron wins it with a solo homer off Chuck Stobbs. It is the longest 1-0 game decided on a HR in AL history.

AT A GLANCE: Tonight the Yankees play the second game of a three-game series at Oakland at 10:05 p.m...is the second game of a nine-game, 10-day road trip to Oakland (Tuesday-Thursday), Los Angeles-AL (Friday-Sunday) and Baltimore (4/27-29)...won their most recent game, 7-3, on Tuesday at Oakland to extend their winning streak to a season-high five games...with a win tonight, would match the 1926 Yankees' all-time franchise record by winning each of the club's first five series of the season...the 1922 Yankees, which won four straight series to start the season, is the only other club in franchise history to start a season with a four-or-more series winning streak...tonight both Minnesota and St. Louis can extend their four-series winning streaks from the start of this season...the Blue Jays were the last team to win five-or-more series from the start of a season, winning their first six series in 2009...have won eight of their last nine overall games and are 10-3 this season, marking their best 13-game start since 2003, when they began 11-2...is one of the club's five-best 13-game starts in the last 25 years (also were 10-3 in 2000, 1988 and 1987)...won two-of-three from the Angels from 4/13-15 and swept Texas from 4/16-18 to finish with a 5-1 record on their first homestand of the season prior to the current road trip...after the current road trip, will return home for a six-game homestand with three games vs. the White Sox (4/30-5/2) and three vs. Baltimore (5/3-5)...of the Yankees' 22 April games, seven are at home (5-1 thus far) and 15 are on the road (5-2 thus far)...matches the Yankees' April home/road splits from 2009...are scheduled for an off day each Monday in April (4/5, 12, 19, 26)...will visit the White House on their 4/26 off day to commemorate their 2009 World Championship.

YESTERDAY'S NEWS: The Yankees defeated Oakland, 7-3, at Oakland Alameda Coliseum to win the opening game of their three-game series...have won 13 of the last 16 games between the clubs...had just 5H but drew 10BB...marked their most runs scored on five-or-fewer hits since a 7-4 win on 7/25/06 at Texas (4H)...was just the second time the Yankees scored seven-or-more runs on five-or-fewer hits since 1996...RHP Javier Vazquez won his first game of the season and first as a Yankee since 9/15/04 at Kansas City, allowing 3ER in 5.1IP (6H, 3BB, 6K, 2HR)...3B Alex Rodriguez (1-for-2) reached base four times with 3BB and a three-run fifth-inning HR...2B Robinson Cano (0-for-2) had a career-high tying 3BB (now done four times) for the first time since 8/5/08 at Texas...SS Derek Jeter (0-for-5) was held hitless for the first time in 2010, snapping his 11-game 2010 hitting streak dating from the start of the season...LHP Boone Logan made his first appearance as a Yankee (1.1IP, 2H, 1BB, 1K)...RHP Mariano Rivera recorded his sixth save in six chances in 2010 (1.0IP, 1K).

PREVENTATIVE MEDICINE: Over the club's current five-game winning streak, Yankees pitchers have held opponents to three-or-fewer runs in each game, outscoring the opposition 30-11...have held the opposition to five-or-fewer runs in each of the last nine games...had three streaks such streaks of exactly nine games in 2009...the last longer such streak was a 16-game run from 7/5-26/08.

✧ Yankees pitchers have allowed just 42 walks this season, the second-lowest mark in the AL (Minnesota-31) and tied with Milwaukee for the fourth-lowest mark in the Majors (Philadelphia-37; Houston-38).

IT'S A VIRTUE: Yankees batters leads the Majors with 71BB this season (5.46BB/game)...are also tops in the Majors, recording 1BB for every 7.25PA...have seen 2,070 pitches in 2010 (159.23 per game) and are fifth in the Majors with 4.02 pitches/PA...have struck out just 86 times this season and have a 5.99PA/K ratio, which is the seventh-best rate in the Majors.

EXHIBIT A: Since 3B Alex Rodriguez returned from the disabled list on 5/8/09, the Yankees are 111-51 in all games (90-44 in 2009 regular season; 11-4 in 2009 postseason; and 10-3 in 2010)...have scored 913R since then, averaging 5.64 R/game.

✧ Has reached base in 14 of his last 20 plate appearances since 4/15 vs. Los Angeles-AL with 2 singles, 1 double, 2HR, 8BB and 1HP...is 5-for-11 (.455) over the stretch.

✧ Has 585 career HR and needs 1HR to tie Frank Robinson (586HR) for seventh place on Baseball's all-time home run list...hit his 585th career HR in Tuesday's win at Oakland...hit his 584th career HR in Saturday's win vs. Texas, breaking a tie with Mark McGwire for sole possession of eighth place all-time.

GETTING AHEAD OF THE GAME: The Yankees are 8-0 this season when leading after six innings...were 71-2 in such games in 2009...the club's 79-2 record in such games over the past two seasons is the best such mark in the Majors...the team with the next fewest such defeats has three times as many losses (St. Louis, six losses when leading after six innings).

MILESTONE WATCH: SS Derek Jeter has 440 career doubles and needs 2 doubles to tie Don Mattingly for third place on the franchise's all-time list...RHP Mariano Rivera has 1,012 career strikeouts and needs 2K to tie Roger Clemens (1,014) for 10th place in franchise history.

BRONX BURNERS: The Yankees are tied for third in the Majors with 15SB (Gardner-7, Granderson-4, Jeter-2, Cano-1, Rodriguez-1), trailing only Tampa Bay (18) and Kansas City (17)...last led the AL in team stolen bases in 1985 (155SB) and last led the Majors in 1938 (91SB).

OPENING CHAPTER: Yankees starters are allowing just 7.60 hits per 9.0IP (79.1IP, 67H), the third-best mark in the American League and fifth-best in the Majors (St. Louis-6.85; San Francisco-6.88; Toronto-7.17; and Seattle-7.43)...are 8-2 with a 3.52 ERA as a group in 2010 (31ER in 13 games => 2.38ER/G)...went 5-1 on the club's recent six-game homestand from 4/13-18 (2.17 ERA, 37.1IP, 27H, 9ER, 15BB, 36K, .205 opp. BA).

FROM THE TOP: SS Derek Jeter is batting .345 (19-for-55) in 2010...leads all Major League *leadoff hitters* in with three home runs and is tied with Milwaukee's Rickie Weeks for tops in RBI (9).

N_W YORK YANK _S: Yankees fielders have not committed an error in their last 11G, after making four in their first 2G...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, it is *the longest single-season April errorless streak in American League history*...set an all-time Major League record with 18-straight errorless games from 5/14-6/1/09.

BATTER UP: The Yankees have scored three-or-more runs in each of their first 13 games in 2010...is the longest such stretch by a Yankees team since the 2000 club scored three-or-more in each of its first 15G...are the last remaining team this season to have such a streak.

SAVINGS PLAN: RHP Mariano Rivera Has converted 61 of his last 65 save chances *on the road* after blowing his first two road SVOs in 2007...has a 1.01 road ERA (62.1IP, 7ER) over the last three seasons (2008-10), while holding opponents to a .157 batting average (34-for-217).

✪ Has converted 118-of-123 (95.0%) total save opportunities after blowing his first two chances in 2007, marking the best ratio in the Majors over that span since 4/21/07...has converted his last 50 save opportunities at home (last blown save at home on 8/13/07 vs. Baltimore), marking the second-longest such streak all time (Eric Gagne-51).

GO-GO CANO!: Robinson Cano owns a .352 (50-for-142) combined batting average over the last two Aprils with 29R, 9 doubles, 9HR and 26RBI, hitting safely in 31-of-35 contests...is currently batting .327 (16-for-49) with 11R, 4 doubles, 4HR, 10RBI, and 5BB in 13 starts at 2B.

✪ The *Elias Sports Bureau* notes that his 27-game April hitting streak which was snapped on Saturday vs. Texas was the longest in American League history, surpassing Goose Goslin's 25-game mark from April 1926-27...*Elias* also notes it was the longest April streak by any MLB player since the Giants' Dan McGann hit in 28 straight April games from 1903-06.

ALL ABOUT THE BENJAMINS: The 10-3 start for **Manager Joe Girardi** in 2010 is the best of his managerial career (7-6 in 2009 and 6-7 in 2008 with NYY; and 4-9 in 2006 w/ Florida)...won his 200th regular season game as Yankees Manager on Saturday vs. Texas.

SEVEN-UP: The Yankees have won 17 straight regular season games after the score was tied at the end of the seventh inning, including two such games this season...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, the Yankees' winning streak in such games is the longest in the Modern Era (since 1900), eclipsing the 1906 Giants' 16-game winning streak in such games.

ONE-TWO PUNCH: LHP CC Sabathia and **RHP A.J. Burnett** have pitched back-to-back games 22 times since joining the Yankees in 2009...of those 22 instances, the Yankees lost both games once – 6/20-21/09 at Florida...the two have combined for 36 wins and 414K with the Yankees.

FRONT-LOADED: The Yankees will play 32 of their first 51 games (62.7%) against teams that finished 2009 with a winning record (are 9-3 in those games so far)...of those 32, there are 20 contests against the other three 2009 American League playoff teams (8G vs. BOS, 6G vs. LAA and 6G vs. MIN)...from 5/28 through the end of the season (111 games), will play just 18 games against 2009 playoff teams (10G vs. BOS, 2G vs. LAA, 3G vs. PHI, 3G vs. LAD).

27th HEAVEN: The Yankees won their unprecedented 27th World Championship in 2009 after going 103-59 and finishing with Baseball's best regular season record...collected their 16th AL East title since Divisional play began in 1969, tying the Braves (16) for most division titles all time...recorded their most wins since 2002 (103-58) and reached 100 wins in a season for the 19th time in franchise history, first since 2004 (101-61)...the Phila./KC/Oakland Athletics (10 seasons of 100-or-more wins) are the only other club in Major League history with 10-or-more such seasons ...the 2009 Yankees' 114 combined regular- and postseason wins tied the 1927 Yankees for the second-most in a single year in franchise history behind the 1998 squad's 125 wins.

ALL IN THE FAMILY: This season **RHP Mariano Rivera**, **SS Derek Jeter** and **C Jorge Posada** became *the first trio of teammates in MLB, NBA, NFL and NHL history* to play together in each of 16 straight seasons (1995-2010) -- credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*...among MLB players, they passed the 15-season Milwaukee Brewers trio (1978-92) of Jim Gantner, Paul Molitor and Robin Yount...the second-longest trios in Yankees franchise history played 13 years together (Bill Dickey, Lefty Gomez and Red Ruffing from 1930-42; and Whitey Ford, Elston Howard and Mickey Mantle from 1955-67).

AT OAKLAND-ALAMEDA COUNTY COLISEUM: The Yankees play the second game of a three-game series at Oakland tonight, after winning Tuesday's game, 7-3...is their second of six games at Oakland this season (also 7/5-7)...went 2-1 at Oakland in 2009, winning the road season series for the eighth time in the last 12 years since 1998...the Yankees are 14-8 (.636) at Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum since the start of the 2004 season, the highest winning pct. by any AL team in Oakland over the span...had lost 11 of the previous 15 games there from 2001-03.

AT YANKEE STADIUM: The Yankees will welcome the A's to the Bronx for a four-game series from 8/30-9/2...went 5-1 at home against the A's in 2009 including a win in the first-ever night game at Yankee Stadium on 4/21...have won the home season series in consecutive seasons for the first time since 2004-05...have won eight of their last nine home games vs. the A's and are 18-9 vs. Oakland in the Bronx since 2004.

RHP Phil Hughes, 23, will make his second start of the season tonight vs. the Oakland Athletics at Oakland-Alameda County Stadium...will be his first career start vs. the Athletics (fourth appearance)...**last started** on 4/15 vs. Los Angeles-AL, recording the win in the 6-2 Yankees victory...limited the Angels to 3H and 2ER in 5.0IP (5BB, 6K, 1HR, 1BK) and tossed a career-high 108 pitches in his first start since 5/31/09...struck out four of his first seven batters faced...was selected by the Yankees in the first round (23rd overall) of the 2004 First-Year Player Draft out of Foothill High School (Santa Ana, Calif.)...was born six-and-a-half hours south of Oakland in Mission Viejo, Calif.

EXCUSED ABSENCE: Following spring training, joined the Yankees' in extended spring training – while remaining on the Yankees' 25-man active roster...pitched in two intrasquad extended spring training games at the Yankees' minor league complex in Tampa...on 4/5, threw the equivalent of 8.1 innings, tossing 100 pitches (70 strikes) and striking out 12 batters vs. Yankees minor leaguers...rejoined the team in Boston following the outing and threw one side session...made his second start on 4/10, throwing 84 pitches over 6.0IP and allowing one run with 6K.

START ME UP: Is 9-9 with a 5.17 ERA in 29 career starts...has held his opponents to 3ER or less in eight of his last 10 starts...in seven starts in 2009, went 3-2 with a 5.45 ERA, allowing 37H and 21ER in 34.2IP (15BB, 31K, 6HR)...went undefeated over his final four starts from 5/15-31 (2-0, 3.91 ERA, 23.0IP, 10ER).

NO RUNS FOR YOU: Did not allow a run over 16 consecutive outings – all in relief – from 6/14-7/26, tossing 21.0 shutout innings over the stretch (11H, 4BB/1IBB, 25K)... compiled a 23.1-inning scoreless stretch dating back to 6/10 at Boston, marking the longest single-season scoreless stretch for a Yankees reliever since Mariano Rivera's 30.2-inning scoreless stretch to finish the 1999 regular season (credit: *Elias*)... was also the fifth-longest by a Yankees pitcher, starter or reliever, in the last 25 seasons (1985-2009), behind Rivera, Lee Gutterman (30.2 in 1989), Steve Farr (27.0 in 1991) and Rivera (26.0 in 1996)... had his scoreless streak broken on 7/30 at Chicago-AL.

- Made seventh appearance of the season in Tuesday's win at Oakland, closing out the game with 1.0 scoreless inning (1K)...in Sunday's win vs. Texas, tossed a perfect ninth inning for his fifth save (1.0IP, 2K)...in Thursday's win vs. Los Angeles-AL, retired his only batter faced for his fourth save (0.1IP)...in 4/13 win vs. Los Angeles-AL, retired both batters faced in the ninth for his third save of the season.
