TODAY IN YANKEES HISTORY

April 22, 1903: The Highlanders play their first ever game, a 3-1 loss at Washington. The team will go on to finish with a 72-62 record, good for fourth place in the eight-team AL.

April 22, 1959: Whitey Ford pitches a 1-0, 14-inning shutout at Griffith Stadium in Washington, allowing just seven hits and seven walks while striking out 15. Moose Skowron wins it with a solo homer off Chuck Stobbs. It is the longest 1-0 game decided on a HR in AL history.

TOMORROW IN YANKEES HISTORY

April 23, 1903: The Highlanders record the first win in franchise history, a 7-2 victory at Washington. Harry Howell is the winning pitcher.

April 23, 2000: In a 10-7 Yankees win at Toronto, Jorge Posada and Bernie Williams become the first pair of teammates in Major League history to each hit home runs from both sides of the plate in the same game.

AT A GLANCE: Today the Yankees play the final game of a three-game series at Oakland at 3:35 p.m ET...the Yankees are 2-0 their 10-day road trip to Oakland (Tuesday-Thursday), Los Angeles-AL (Friday-Sunday) and Baltimore (4/27-29)...is their longest pre-All-Star-break road trip and tied for their longest of the season (9/10-19, nine games at Texas, Tampa Bay and Baltimore)...won their most recent game, 3-1, on Wednesday at Oakland to extend their winning streak to a season-high six games...have the best record in baseball and lead the AL East by +0.5 games over Tampa Bay...have won nine of their last 10 overall games and are 11-3 this season, marking their best 14-game start since 2003, when they began 11-3...is one of the club's five-best 13-game starts in the last 25 years (also were 11-3 in 2000, 1988 and 1987)...won two-of-three from the Angels from 4/13-15 and swept Texas from 4/16-18 to finish with a 5-1 record on their first homestand of the season prior to the current road trip...after the current road trip, will return home for a six-game homestand with three games vs. the White Sox (4/30-5/2) and three vs. Baltimore (5/3-5)...of the Yankees' 22 April games, seven are at home (5-1 thus far) and 15 are on the road (6-2 thus far)...matches the Yankees' April home/road splits from 2009...are scheduled for an off day each Monday in April (4/5, 12, 19, 26)...will visit the White House on their 4/26 off day to commemorate their 2009 World Championship.

YESTERDAY'S NEWS: The Yankees defeated Oakland, 3-1, on Wednesday at Oakland-Alameda Coliseum to win the second game of their three-game series...have won 14 of the last 17 games between the clubs...held to the A's to just three hits...**RHP Phil Hughes** took a no-hitter through 7.0IP before allowing a leadoff infield single in the eighth to Eric Chavez on a hard-hit ball which deflected off the heel of Hughes' glove...Hughes struck out a career-high 10 batters...allowed just 1ER on 1H and 2BB in 7.1IP...improved to 2-0 in two starts this season...**3B Alex Rodriguez** (2-for-4) and **2B Robinson Cano** (2-for-4) tripled in consecutive at-bats in the fourth, marking the first such instance for the Yankees since Melky Cabrera and Johnny Damon on 8/25/07 at Detroit...**LF Brett Gardner** (2-for-3) singled in a run in the ninth...**RHP Mariano Rivera** recorded his sixth save in six chances in this season (1.0IP, 1H, 1HP).

SERIOUSLY SPEAKING: Having clinched a series win in their current three-game set at Oakland, the 2010 Yankees have matched the 1926 Yankees' all-time franchise record by winning each of the club's first five series of the season...only one other club in franchise history started with as many as four series wins in a row (1922 Yankees)...are one of three teams in the Majors this season (also Minnesota and St. Louis) who have won their first five series of the year...Toronto was the last team to win five-or-more series from the start of a season, winning their first six series in 2009.

✧ According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, the Yankees are the third defending World Series champion, and first in the last 88 years, to win its first five series of a season...the 1904 Red Sox and 1922 Giants each began the season with five straight series wins.

CALIFORNIA DREAMIN': In his 30th career start on Wednesday at Oakland, **RHP Phil Hughes**, held the A's hitless over his first 7.0IP...he also held the Rangers hitless for 6.1IP in his second Major League start on 5/1/07 at Texas before leaving the game with a strained left hamstring...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, only three other active pitchers have had a no-hitter through six innings twice in their first 30 career starts: Jamie Moyer, Derek Lowe and Hiroki Kuroda.

PREVENTATIVE MEDICINE: Over the club's current six-game winning streak, Yankees pitchers have held opponents to three-or-fewer runs each game, outscoring opposition, 33-12...have held opposition to five-or-fewer runs in each of the last 10 games, the club's longest such streak since a 16-game run from 7/5-26/08.

✧ Yankees pitchers have allowed just 44 walks this season, the second-lowest mark in the AL (Minnesota-33) and the fourth-lowest mark in the Majors (Philadelphia-38; Houston-40).

IT'S A VIRTUE: Yankees batters are second in the Majors with 76BB this season (5.43BB/game)...are also tops in the Majors, recording 1BB for every 7.37PA...have seen 2,214 pitches in 2010 (158.14/game) and are fifth in the Majors with 4.00 pitches/PA...have the third-highest rate of pitches taken in the Majors (59.4%), trailing Atlanta (59.6) and Boston (59.6)...have struck out just 93 times this season and have a 5.95PA/K ratio, which is the seventh-best rate in the Majors.

EXHIBIT A: Since **3B Alex Rodriguez** returned from the disabled list on 5/8/09, *the Yankees are 112-51 in all games* (90-44 in 2009 regular season; 11-4 in 2009 postseason; and 11-3 in 2010)...have scored 916R since his return, averaging 5.62R/game.

✧ Has reached base in 16 of his last 24 plate appearances since 4/15 vs. Los Angeles-AL with 3 singles, 1 double, 1 triple, 2HR, 8BB and 1HP...is 7-for-15 (.467) over the stretch.

✧ Has 585 career HR and needs 1HR to tie Frank Robinson (586HR) for seventh place on Baseball's all-time home run list...hit his 585th career HR in Tuesday's win at Oakland...hit his 584th career HR in Saturday's win vs. Texas, breaking a tie with Mark McGwire for sole possession of eighth place.

GETTING AHEAD OF THE GAME: The Yankees are 9-0 this season when leading after six innings...were 71-2 in such games in 2009...*the club's 80-2 record in such games over the past two seasons is the best such mark in the Majors...*the team with the next fewest such defeats has three times as many losses (St. Louis, six losses when leading after six innings).

BRONX BURNERS: The Yankees are fifth in the Majors with 16SB (Gardner-7, Granderson-4, Cano-2, Jeter-2, Rodriguez-1), trailing only Tampa Bay (18), Texas (18), Kansas City (17) and S.D. (17)...last led the AL in team stolen bases in 1985 (155SB) and last led the Majors in 1938 (91SB).

OPENING CHAPTER: Yankees starters are allowing just 7.06 hits per 9.0IP (86.2IP, 68H), the best mark in the American League and third-best in the Majors (San Francisco-6.87 and St. Louis-6.91)...are 9-2 with a 3.32 ERA as a group in 2010 (32ER in 14 games => 2.29ER/G)...went 5-1 on the club's recent six-game homestand from 4/13-18 (2.17 ERA, 37.1IP, 27H, 9ER, 15BB, 36K, .205 opp. BA).

FROM THE TOP: SS Derek Jeter is batting .339 (20-for-59) in 2010...is tied with Milwaukee's Rickie Weeks for tops among Major League *leadoff hitters* with three home runs...is second behind Weeks with 9RBI.

N_YORK YANK_S: Yankees fielders have not committed an error in their last 12G, after making four in their first 2G...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, it is the longest single-season April errorless streak in American League history and tied with the 2009 Phillies for the longest such April streak in Major League history...set an all-time Major League record with 18-straight errorless games from 5/14-6/1/09.

BATTER UP: The Yankees have scored three-or-more runs in each of their first 14 games in 2010...is the longest such stretch by a Yankees team since the 2000 club scored three-or-more in each of its first 15G...are the last remaining team this season to have such a streak.

SAVINGS PLAN: RHP Mariano Rivera Has converted 62 of his last 66 save chances *on the road* after blowing his first two road SVOs in 2007...has a 0.99 road ERA (63.1IP, 7ER) over the last three seasons (2008-10), while holding opponents to a .158 batting average (35-for-221).

✪ Has converted 119-of-124 (96.0%) total save opportunities after blowing his first two chances in 2007, marking the best ratio in the Majors over that span since 4/21/07...has converted his last 50 save opportunities at home (last blown save at home on 8/13/07 vs. Baltimore), marking the second-longest such streak all time (Eric Gagne-51).

ALL ABOUT THE BENJAMINS: The 11-3 start for **Manager Joe Girardi** in 2010 is the best of his managerial career (8-6 in 2009 and 7-7 in 2008 with NYY; and 4-10 in 2006 w/ Florida)...won his 200th regular season game as Yankees Manager on Saturday vs. Texas.

SEVEN-UP: The Yankees have won 17 straight regular season games after the score was tied at the end of the seventh inning, including two such games this season...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, the Yankees' winning streak in such games is the longest in the Modern Era (since 1900), eclipsing the 1906 Giants' 16-game winning streak in such games.

ONE-TWO PUNCH: LHP CC Sabathia and **RHP A.J. Burnett** have pitched back-to-back games 22 times since joining the Yankees in 2009...of those 22 instances, the Yankees lost both games once - 6/20-21/09 at Florida...the two have combined for 36 wins and 414K with the Yankees.

FRONT-LOADED: The Yankees will play 32 of their first 51 games (62.7%) against teams that finished 2009 with a winning record (are 9-3 in those games so far)...of those 32, there are 20 contests against the other three 2009 American League playoff teams (8G vs. BOS, 6G vs. LAA and 6G vs. MIN)...from 5/28 through the end of the season (111 games), will play just 18 games against 2009 playoff teams (10G vs. BOS, 2G vs. LAA, 3G vs. PHI, 3G vs. LAD).

OVERALL TRENDS/FACTS: The Yankees play the final game of a three-game series at Oakland today, after winning on Tuesday, 7-3 and on Wednesday, 3-1...is the third of 10 games between the clubs in 2010, marking their most contests since 1999 (Yankees were 8-4)...went 7-2 vs. the A's in 2009, marking their sixth season series win in the 2000s and second straight...have won 14 of their last 17 games vs. Oakland, including an eight-game win streak from 6/12/08-7/24/09, their most consecutive wins vs. the A's since 1993-94.

AT OAKLAND-ALAMEDA COUNTY COLISEUM: The Yankees play the third game of a three-game series at Oakland today, winning 7-3 on Tuesday and 3-1 on Wednesday...is their third of six games at Oakland this season (also 7/5-7)...went 2-1 at Oakland in 2009, winning the road season series for the eighth time in the last 12 years since 1998...the Yankees are 15-8 (.652) at Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum since the start of the 2004 season, the highest winning pct. by any AL team in Oakland over the span...had lost 11 of the previous 15 games there from 2001-03.

AT YANKEE STADIUM: The Yankees will welcome the A's to the Bronx for a four-game series from 8/30-9/2...went 5-1 at home against the A's in 2009 including a win in the first-ever night game at Yankee Stadium on 4/21...have won the home season series in consecutive seasons for the first time since 2004-05...have won eight of their last nine home games vs. the A's and are 18-9 vs. Oakland in the Bronx since 2004.

OVERALL TRENDS/FACTS: On Friday the Yankees play the first game of a three-game series at the Angels...are 2-1 against the Angels in 2010 after taking two of three games in the home opener at Yankee Stadium from 4/13-15...will be the fourth of six games vs. the Angels over a 12-game stretch from 4/13-25...went 5-5 vs. LAA in 2009, snapping a streak of five straight losing season series vs. the Angels and marking their most wins vs. Los Angeles-AL since 2003 (6-3)...also defeated the Angels in the 2009 ALCS, 4-games-to-2...are 13-19 vs. the Angels since the start of the 2007 season...their 43-51 record vs. the Angels since 2000 is their only losing mark vs. any AL team over the span.

AT ANGEL STADIUM OF ANAHEIM: On Friday the Yankees will play the first game of a three-game series vs. the Angels at Angel Stadium...are making their only 2010 visit to Los Angeles-AL...were 2-4 at LAA in 2009, taking two of three 9/21-23 and suffering a three-game sweep from 7/10-12 to close out the first half...won their last two games at LAA (9/22-23), marking their first back-to-back victories at Angel Stadium since May 2004...have won just three of their last 12 games at the Angels over the last two years and have lost 18 of their last 25 games at Angel Stadium since the start of the 2005 season.

TODAY'S STARTER: LHP CC SABATHIA (2-0, 2.84 ERA)

LHP CC Sabathia, 29, will make his fourth start of the season today vs. the Oakland Athletics at Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum...will also be his 19th career start vs. Oakland (fourth with the Yankees)...**last started** on 4/16 vs. Texas, recording the win in a 5-1 Yankees victory in a rain-shortened game (6.0IP, 3H, 1ER, 0BB, 9K, 1HP)...was credited with his 29th career complete game, and first of the season...struck out a season-high nine batters, including six straight strikeouts beginning with Nelson Cruz to end the first inning through Julio Borbon in the third inning...retired 17 of his final 19 batters faced...is looking to start a season 3-0 for just the second time (also 2007, started 5-0)...is in the second year of a seven-year contract signed with the Yankees on 12/18/08.

JOE SIX PACK: Set a career high when he struck out six straight batters in his last start on 4/16 vs. Texas...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, it marked the most consecutive strikeouts in one game by a Yankees pitcher since 8/8/99 when David Cone fanned six in-a-row at Seattle.

BAY AREA TIES: Is a native of Vallejo, Calif., growing up approximately one half-hour outside of Oakland...*threw out the ceremonial first pitch at North Vallejo Little League on Monday at the first game at Thurman Field, which he underwrote the rebuilding of over the offseason through his PitCCh In Foundation*...efforts included revitalizing the field with new irrigation; new infield dirt; new bases, pitching rubber and home plate; new dugouts; a black vinyl-coated chain-link fence and 37,000 square feet of new sod.

➤ Recorded his sixth career complete-game shutout on 5/14/08 vs. Oakland (w/ Cleveland)...held A's batters to only 5H and 2BB while striking out 11...was his first of five shutouts during the 2008 season.

CREATURE OF COMFORT: Is undefeated in his last eight starts at Yankee Stadium since the 2009 All-Star break, going 6-0 with a 1.62 ERA (55.2IP, 10ER).

ONE FOR THE AGES: In his start on 4/10 at Tampa Bay, recorded the win in a 10-0 Yankees victory...carried a no-hitter through two outs in the eighth inning until Kelly Shoppach singled to left field (7.2IP, 1H, 2BB, 5K)...was the furthest he had ever gone in a game without allowing a hit...was the deepest a Yankee had taken a no-hitter since Mike Mussina took a perfect game 8.2IP on 9/2/01 at Boston (Carl Everett single)...according to *Elias*, became the first pitcher to lose a no-hitter in the eighth inning or later on a base hit by a former battery-mate since Texas' Nolan Ryan on 9/30/89 at Anaheim Stadium, when California's Brian Downing singled with one out in the eighth inning.

OPENING DAY NOTABLES: Made his seventh career Opening Day start, second with the Yankees, on 4/4 at Boston...owns a 1-1 record with a 5.79 ERA in Opening Day starts (37.1IP, 24ER)...became the 22nd pitcher in franchise history to make multiple Opening Day starts for the Yankees, first since Randy Johnson in 2005 and 2006...also became the 10th lefthander to make multiple Opening Day starts for the Yankees.

2009 RECAP: Was 19-8 with a 3.37 ERA in 34 starts with the Yankees...tied for the ML lead in wins with Felix Hernandez, Justin Verlander and Adam Wainwright...matched his personal single-season high in wins (19-7 w/ Cleveland in 2007)...finished third in the AL with a .232 opponents average (197-for-849, 18HR), and fourth in IP (230.0) and ERA (3.37).

- Began the season 1-3 with a 4.85 ERA (39.0IP, 21ER) in his first six starts, then posted an 18-5 record and a 3.06 ERA (191.0IP, 65ER) over his remaining 28 starts from 5/8 through the end of the season.
- Finished fourth in AL Cy Young Award voting and received one eighth-place vote for AL MVP.
- Made five postseason starts, going 3-1 with a 1.98 ERA (36.1IP, 28H, 9R, 8ER, 9BB, 32K, 4HR, 1HP)...started Game 1 in all three rounds, making his two other starts on three-days' rest...earned ALCS MVP after winning both starts that round with a 1.13 ERA (16.0IP, 2ER)...became the eighth Yankee to earn the honor.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS: In 2009, became the first pitcher to win at least 19 games in his first season with the Yankees since Tommy John went 21-9 in 1979...were the most wins by a Yankees lefty since Andy Pettitte in 2003 (21-8)...also surpassed Dock Ellis (17) for the most single-season wins by an African-American pitcher in Yankees franchise history...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the second Yankee to lead or tie for the MLB lead in wins in his first season as a Yankee, joining Catfish Hunter (1975).

FIVE ALIVE: Went 82-46 (.641) over the last five seasons (2005-09), leading the Majors in IP (1,118.2) and tied with Roy Halladay for the most in wins...was also tied with Halladay for the most shutouts (9) and ranks third in strikeouts (994) over the stretch.

- Since his debut in 2001, has a 138-81 (.630) record, tied with Roy Oswalt for the second-most wins in the Majors behind Roy Halladay (139)...is second in shutouts (11) to only Halladay (15), ranks third in complete games (28), fourth in strikeouts (1,608), fifth in IP (1,908.1), and tied for fifth in games started (291, with Jamie Moyer).

CC SWEETNESS: According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, Sabathia is the only pitcher in the Majors to start at least 34 games in each of the last three years (2007-09)...is looking to become the first pitcher to accomplish the feat in at least four straight seasons was Barry Zito (six years, 2001-06).

YOUNG GUN: Leads all active Major League pitchers under the age of 30 in career wins (138), strikeouts (1,608) and innings pitched (1908.1)...the last Major Leaguer to compile as many wins prior to his 30th birthday was Greg Maddux who won 151 games before turning 30.

KEEP ON KEEPIN' ON: Has recorded at least 11 wins in each of his first nine seasons to begin his Major League career, marking the longest current such streak among active pitchers...with 19 wins in 2007, 17 wins in 2008 and 19 wins in 2009, became the first pitcher since Mike Mussina (2001-03) to win at least 17 games in three straight seasons (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*)...has accomplished the feat while pitching for three different clubs over the stretch (19-7 w/ Cleveland, 2007; 17-10 w/ Cleveland and Milwaukee, 2008; and 19-8 w/ the Yankees, 2009), joining Randy Johnson (over two overlapping spans of three seasons from 1997-99 and 1998-2000 with Seattle, Houston and Arizona) as the only pitchers to accomplish the feat in the last 100 years (Credit: *Elias*).

AMONG THE BEST: Owns a .630 career winning percentage (138-81), eighth-highest among lefthanders with at least 250 starts since 1900 and the sixth-highest among left-handers who began their careers since 1950.

- Among active Major League lefthanders, ranks second in ERA (3.61), third in wins (138), fourth in strikeouts (1,608), opponents batting average (.245) and winning percentage (.630), and fifth in innings pitched (1908.1).

LEAN LEFT: Has allowed just two hits to a left-handed batter this season in 17 AB's...allowed a first-inning double to Josh Hamilton in his last start on 4/16 vs. Texas, marking the only extra-base hit he has permitted to a left-handed batter this season and first *at home* since 7/2/09 vs. Seattle...held left-handed batters to a .198 batting average in 2009 (39-for-197) with only 3HR...has allowed just 1HR to a lefthander over his last 24 starts (139AB) from 6/16/09 (Jim Thome on 8/2/09 at Chicago-AL)...has not allowed a HR to a left-handed batter in any of his 15 starts at the current Yankee Stadium and has held lefthanders homerless in his last 34 starts at home, since giving up a pair of homers to Jim Thome on Opening Day in 2008 (3/31/08 w/Cleveland vs. Chicago-AL).
