CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- ★ Has appeared in parts of seven Major League seasons with Toronto (2002-04), Tampa Bay (2005), Boston (2007-08) and the New York Yankees (2009)...in his career, owns a .186 (98x527) average with 10 home runs and 53 RBI.
- ★ In 193 games behind the plate has thrown out 41 of 136 attempted base stealers (30%)...has appeared in four MLB games at third base, all coming with Boston in 2008.
- ★ Spent his entire 2008 season on Boston's Major League roster when Astros Manager Brad Mills was serving as the Red Sox bench coach...served as Tim Wakefield's personal catcher and caught all 30 of his starts...also caught Wakefield's start in the 2008 ALCS and homered in one of his three at-bats.
- ★ Was Toronto's Opening Day catcher in 2004, but was limited to 60 games because of injury...marked his first full season in the Majors.
- ★ Named a minor league All-Star twice in his career, in 2003 with Syracuse (AAA) and in 2001 with Dunedin (A)...played in the 2002 MLB Futures game held in Milwaukee.

2009: Signed by the Yankees to a minor league deal on Jan. 14...spent Spring Training with the Major League club and hit .286 (8x28) in 15 spring games with New York...assigned to Scranton Wilkes-Barre (AAA) to begin the season...placed on the minor league DL from April 15-May 5...reinstated from the DL three days before his selection to the Yankees MLB roster on May 8...at the time of his selection, was hitting .500 (9x18) with one home and six RBI in seven games...appeared in 10 games for the Yankees from May 12-27, while Jorge Posada was on the Disabled List...hit .231 (6x26) in his time with New York, which included a three-hit game on May 25 at TEX...optioned back to Scranton on May 29...from that point through the end of his season, hit just .120 (6x50) before being placed on the DL on June 29...finished the season on the DL and given his unconditional release on Sept. 10.

2008: Played in a career-high 61 games with Boston, batting .225 with seven doubles, three homers and 15 RBI...appeared on his second career Opening Day roster and made 42 starts behind the plate, including all 30 of Tim Wakefield's starts...threw out 14-of-52 (26.9%) potential basestealers, catching just one of his first 14 (7.1%) and 13 of his final 38 (34.2%)...hit at a .375 (15x40) clip through May 11, but carried just a .179 average (19x106) over the remainder of the season...hit .361 (13x36) against left-handed pitchers...recorded his first career pinch-hit home run on July 9 vs. MIN...entered as a defensive replacement at third base on Sept. 13 vs. Toronto, his first career appearance there...appeared in four postseason games, making one start in Game 4 loss of ALCS vs. Tampa Bay and going 1x3 with a solo homer.

2007: In his first season in the Boston organization, had his contract purchased by the Red Sox on Aug. 17 from Triple-A Pawtucket when Doug Mirabelli went on the disabled list...appeared in 12 games down the stretch, making eight starts and going 3x27 (.111) at the plate...caught 2-of-11 attempted basestealers...was on Boston's ALDS roster vs. Los Angeles (AL), but did not appear in the three-game series...hit .176 with seven doubles, seven homers and 25 RBI in 59 games at Pawtucket...threw out 46.0% (23-of-50) of Triple-A baserunners attempting to steal.

2006: Spent the entire season with Triple A Durham (Tampa Bay), appearing in 78 games and hitting .183 with 10 doubles, two homers and 21 RBI...played 50 games at catcher, but also saw action at third base (five games), first base (two games) and left field (two games)...also made one emergency relief appearance, earning the win after tossing a perfect inning in Durham's 6-5, 14-inning victory on July 9 vs. Norfolk.

2005: Began the season on the disabled list with right shoulder tendinitis before being reinstated on May 7 and assigned to

2010 HOUSTON ASTROS

Triple A Durham...was recalled by Tampa Bay on June 13 and homered in his first Rays at-bat on June 15 vs. MIL off Victor Santos, becoming the fifth Ray to accomplish the feat...appeared in 13 Major League games (10 starts) at catcher, going 5x31 (.161), with three of the hits going for extra bases (1 double, 2HR)...was optioned back to Durham on July 22...overall, hit .293 with 10 doubles, nine homers and 47 RBI for the Bulls.

2004: Was Toronto's Opening Day catcher, but was limited to 60 games (50 starts) after going on the disabled list from May 24-June 9 with a rib cage injury (missed 15 games)...served as Gregg Zaun's backup after returning from the setback...had 13 RBI in 19 April games, tied with Carlos Delgado for the club lead...had just eight RBI in his final 41 games...hit .266 (17x64) in April and just .154 (18x177) the rest of the way...threw out 14-of-30 (42.2%) potential basestealers...following the season, was traded to Tampa Bay in exchange for RHP Chad Gaudin on Dec. 12.

2003: Spent the majority of the season with Triple A Syracuse, earning International League All-Star honors after batting .270 with 28 doubles, eight homers and 37 RBI in 93 games...was recalled by Toronto on Aug. 11 and remained with the Jays for the rest of the season, starting 32 of Toronto's final 44 games...threw out 5-of-19 (26.3%) attempted basestealers with the Jays...collected his first career RBI on Aug. 13 at SEA...hit his first Major League home run on Sept. 27 vs. CLE (off Terry Mulholland).

2002: Saw his first Major League action as a September callup with Toronto...appeared in seven games (four starts), going 2x14 (.143)...made his first big league start and collected his first hit on Sept. 11 at CLE...threw out the first runner attempting to steal on him on Sept. 27 vs. DET...began season at Double A Tennessee before being promoted to Triple A Syracuse on June 4...was selected to replace Josh Phelps at the All-Star Futures Game in Milwaukee.

Made his Major League debut with Chicago (NL) in 2007 and hit .239 in 20 games over two seasons before he was dealt to Oakland in the Rich Harden trade in the middle of the 2008 season...has a .231 average in 69 games with the A's over the last two seasons...was originally drafted by the Cubs in the eighth round of the 2004 draft and is a .303 (687 for 2264) career hitter with a .368 on-base percentage and .478 slugging percentage in 572 games over five minor league seasons...also has 132 doubles, 43 triples, 59 home runs, 301 RBI and 175 stolen bases...set a Sacramento club record with 43 stolen bases in 2009...was named to the Pacific Coast League postseason All-Star team in 2007 and 2008...won the Midwest League batting title in his first professional campaign after hitting .333 for Peoria in 2005... named to the Midwest League postseason All-Star team, was awarded the team's Most Valuable Player award and was named the Cubs Minor League Player of the Year.

2009 HIGHLIGHTS

Spent most of the season at Triple-A Sacramento and batted .307 with 91 runs scored, 29 doubles, 11 triples, 12 home runs, 56 RBI, 52 walks and 43 stolen bases in 110 games...ranked second in the Pacific Coast League in triples and stolen bases and fourth in runs...the steals and triples were the most in the A's farm system and he ranked third in runs and fifth in batting...also hit .287 with a home run and 11 RBI in 39 games over three stints with Oakland...added 14 walks for a .373 on-base percentage...stole six bases and was caught stealing just once...is now 14 for 15 (93.3%) in stolen base attempts in two seasons with the A's...is 16 for 18 (88.9%) in his career...went 5 for 30 (.167) with no walks and one stolen base in 12 games over his first two stints and then batted .344 with 14 walks (.456 on-base percentage) and five stolen bases in 27 games during his final stint that ran from Aug. 28 through the end of the season...started games at four different positions, including 20 in left field, four in center field, three at second base and one in right field...hit .375 (6 for 16) against left-handed pitching and .269 (21 for 78) against right-handers...now has a .282 (11 for 39) career average against lefties and .223 (43 for 193) against righties...batted .315 with the bases empty and .217 with runners in scoring position...now has a .197 (12 for 61) career average with RISP...was 10 for 23 (.435) with three walks (.500 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...hit .344 in 13 day games and .258 in 26 games at night...made all 28 of his starts in the bottom three spots in the order and had his best success with a .375 average in 10 games batting eighth...pinch ran six times and scored four runs and stole a base in those games.

OAKLAND: Was recalled from Sacramento for the first time April 29 and went 1 for 8 (.125) in two starts at second base before he was optioned May 4...recalled for a second time July 24 and hit .182 (4 for 22) with four RBI and 10 strikeouts in 10 games, all in the outfield, before he was sent back to Sacramento Aug. 5...returned for good Aug. 28 and started 19 of the A's final 35 games, including each of the last 12 (11 in left field, one at second base)...went 6 for 26 (.231) over the first 15 games during his third stint and 16 for 38 (.421) over his final 12...matched his career-high with three hits Sept. 11 at Minnesota and Sept. 29 at Seattle...had a career-high three RBI Sept. 24 against Texas.

SACRAMENTO: Set a Sacramento record with 43 stolen bases and became just the second player in River Cats history to reach double figures in doubles (29), triples (11), home runs (12) and stolen bases...led the River Cats in batting (.307), runs (91), hits (143), triples and steals, tied for the lead in doubles and ranked second in walks (52)...had minor league career-highs in doubles and matched his best in triples and extra base hits (52)...batted .336 (108 for 321) with 10 of his 12 home runs against right-handed pitching, compared to .241 (35 for 145) against left-handers...slugged .555 against right-

ies and .359 against lefties...appeared in 48 games at second base, 29 in center field, 19 in left field, 10 at third base and one at first base...committed just three errors as a second baseman for a .988 fielding percentage...hit .317 with runners in scoring position and .301 when leading off an inning...was 6 for 12 (.500) with a double, a walk and 10 RBI with the bases loaded...batted leadoff a team-leading 106 times and hit .310 with a .378 on-base percentage in those games...also batted third twice and ninth twice...hit six of his 12 home runs and five of his 11 triples in the first inning...was the only player in the PCL with two five-hit games...went 5 for 5 May 15 against Albuquerque and 5 for 6 with his lone two-homer game of the season June 17 at Fresno...batted .329 in 19 games in April before his first promotion to Oakland April 29...then hit .326 in 71 games during his second stint from May 4 through July 23...fell a single short of the cycle May 8 at Las Vegas when he went 3 for 5 with a season-high five RBI...stole a season-high three bases May 19 against Round Rock and had nine stolen bases over a six-game stretch from May 15 to 21...had 10 multi-steal games in 2009...tripled in three consecutive games, June 14 to 16...reached base safely via hit or walk in 30 consecutive games from June 30 to Aug. 16...hit .346 (46 for 133) with 13 walks (.404 on-base percentage) during the streak...was named to the midseason Pacific Coast League All-Star team as an infielder and went 0 for 2 in the game against the International League All-Stars, July 15 at Portland...sandwiched a season best 13-game hitting streak around his second stint with the A's, going 27 for 59 (.458) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, three home runs, 12 RBI, eight stolen bases and 10 multiple hit games from July 12 to Aug. 10...hit .388 in 19 games in July to boost his season batting average to .326 before his promotion to Oakland July 24...then batted .225 with 17 RBI in 20 games following his return.

CAREER

2008—Has acquired by the A's from the Chicago Cubs in the Rich Harden trade in July and had two stints with Oakland...went 0 for 10 in three games during his first stint from July 27 to 29 and hit just .195 in 27 games during his second stint that began Aug. 13...batted .174 with eight RBI and eight stolen bases in 30 games overall with Oakland after hitting .237 with a home run and seven RBI in 13 games with the Cubs...combined for a .192 batting average, one home run and 15 RBI in 43 games in the majors...was successful in 10 of 11 (90.9%) stolen base attempts...hit .217 against left-handed pitchers and .187 against right-handers...was 3 for 7 (.429) with six RBI with the bases loaded...hit .320 with his lone home run and six of his 15 RBI in seven interleague games, all with the Cubs...had a .162 average in his other 36 games...hit .139 against a pitcher the first time he saw him in a game and .275 after that...started 20 games at second base and 15 in left field...also made one appearance in center field with the Cubs June 26...committed four errors in 104 chances as a second baseman for a .962 fielding percentage...was at Triple-A Iowa when he was traded to Oakland July 8 with Sean Gallagher, Matt Murton and Josh Donaldson for Rich Harden and Chad Gaudin...was assigned to Triple-A Sacramento and hit .349 with three home runs and 12 RBI in 14 games before he was promoted to Oakland July 27...started three consecutive games in left field and went 0 for 10 with three walks and five strikeouts before he was optioned back to Sacramento July 30...hit .304 over his next 11 games with the River Cats and returned to Oakland for good Aug. 13...snapped a career long 0 for 16 streak in his first game back Aug. 13 against Tampa Bay...had his first career two steal game Aug. 21 at Seattle and stole seven bases over a 14-game span from Aug. 15 to 30...overall with Oakland, he had appeared in eight games in left field and one at second base before Mark Ellis was injured Aug. 22 at Seattle...replaced Ellis in that game and went on to start each of the next 15 games and 17 of the next 18 games at second base...went 12 for 60 (.200) over that stretch from Aug. 23 to Sept. 11 before Cliff Pennington took over as the A's starting second baseman...made his final start at second base Sept. 17 against Los Angeles and left the game in the fifth inning with a strained left hamstring...missed the remainder of the season...began the season at Triple-A Iowa but had three stints with the Cubs...went 0 for 6 with a RBI in three games during his first stint from April 16 to 18...appeared in just two games during his second stint from June 12 to 16 and was 2 for 8 (.250) with another RBI...was recalled for a third time June 21 and had a career high three hits that day against the Chicago White Sox...hit his first Major League home run the next day, a two-run shot off Javier Vazquez in the fifth inning of the Cubs' 7-1 win...went 7 for 24 (.292) with the home run, five RBI and five walks in eight games during his third stint before he was optioned to Iowa again July 3...in the minors, he batted .320 with six home runs, 28 RBI and 11 stolen bases in 52 games with Iowa and .330 with four home runs, 19 RBI and eight stolen bases in 25 games with Sacramento...combined for a .324 batting average, 10 home runs and 47 RBI in 77 games and was named to the Pacific Coast League Postseason All-Star Team...was successful in 19 of 21 (90.5%) stolen base attempts...hit .331 against right-handed pitching and .301 against left-handers...batted .389 with runners in scoring position...hit .327 with a .367 on-base percentage in 63 games batting in the leadoff spot...appeared

in 68 games at second base, six in center field and two in right field...had a season high four hits May 21 at Omaha...had a 12-game minor league hitting streak from June 19 to July 20...hit .389 over that stretch with 17 runs scored, eight doubles, four home runs and 11 RBI...homered in three consecutive games from July 11-13.

2007—Spent a majority of the season with Triple-A Iowa and batted .297 with 14 homers and 65 RBI in 128 games...was a unanimous selection to the Pacific Coast League’s All-Star team and was named the second baseman on the All-PCL team at season’s end...had two stints with the Cubs, Aug. 6-14 and Sept. 1-3...appeared in seven games for the big league club...made his Major League debut Aug. 6 in Houston...picked up his first career hit Aug. 7 at Houston off Woody Williams...named to the Topps Triple-A All-Star team following the season...recognized as a *Baseball America* Triple-A All-Star...recorded a season-high 11-game hit streak May 7-18, batting .447 with three homers and nine RBI...homered in three straight games May 11-13...led the Iowa Cubs in games (128), runs (94), hits (153), triples (6), walks (54), stolen bases (24) and multi-hit games (44)...had a 5 for 6 performance July 24 at Colorado Springs, falling a home run shy of the cycle.

2006—Batted .276 with 10 triples and 46 stolen bases in 138 combined games for Double-A West Tenn and Triple-A Iowa...was named to the Southern League All-Star Game and the United States team in the Futures Game at PNC Park...appeared in 121 games for the Diamond Jaxx before being promoted to Iowa in Aug. where he hit .358 in 17 games for the I-Cubs...hit in 14 of 17 games for the I-Cubs, including his first nine games (15 for 36, .417)...ranked third with nine triples in the Southern League while his 38 stolen bases were second-best in the league behind fellow Diamond Jaxx Chris Walker (50)...named the league’s “best hustler” following the season...stole a season-high three bases on three occasions: April 9 at Birmingham, April 21 at Chattanooga and July 2 at Huntsville...played for the Mesa Solar Sox in the Arizona Fall League after the season, batting .345 in 28 games.

2005—Earned the Midwest League batting title in his first professional campaign with a .333 batting average...added 13 homers, 71 RBI and 40 stolen bases in 110 games for Single-A Peoria...was second in the league in slugging percentage (.535), third in both triples (11) and on-base percentage (.405) and fifth in stolen bases...led ML second basemen in fielding (.982)...named to both the Midwest League All-Star team and postseason All-Star team...was awarded the team’s Most Valuable Player award as well as the Cubs Minor League Player of the Year...was promoted to Double-A West Tenn and appeared in nine games for the Diamond Jaxx.

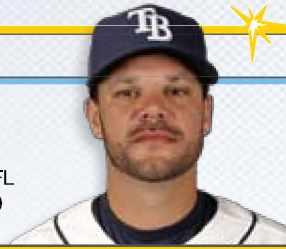
