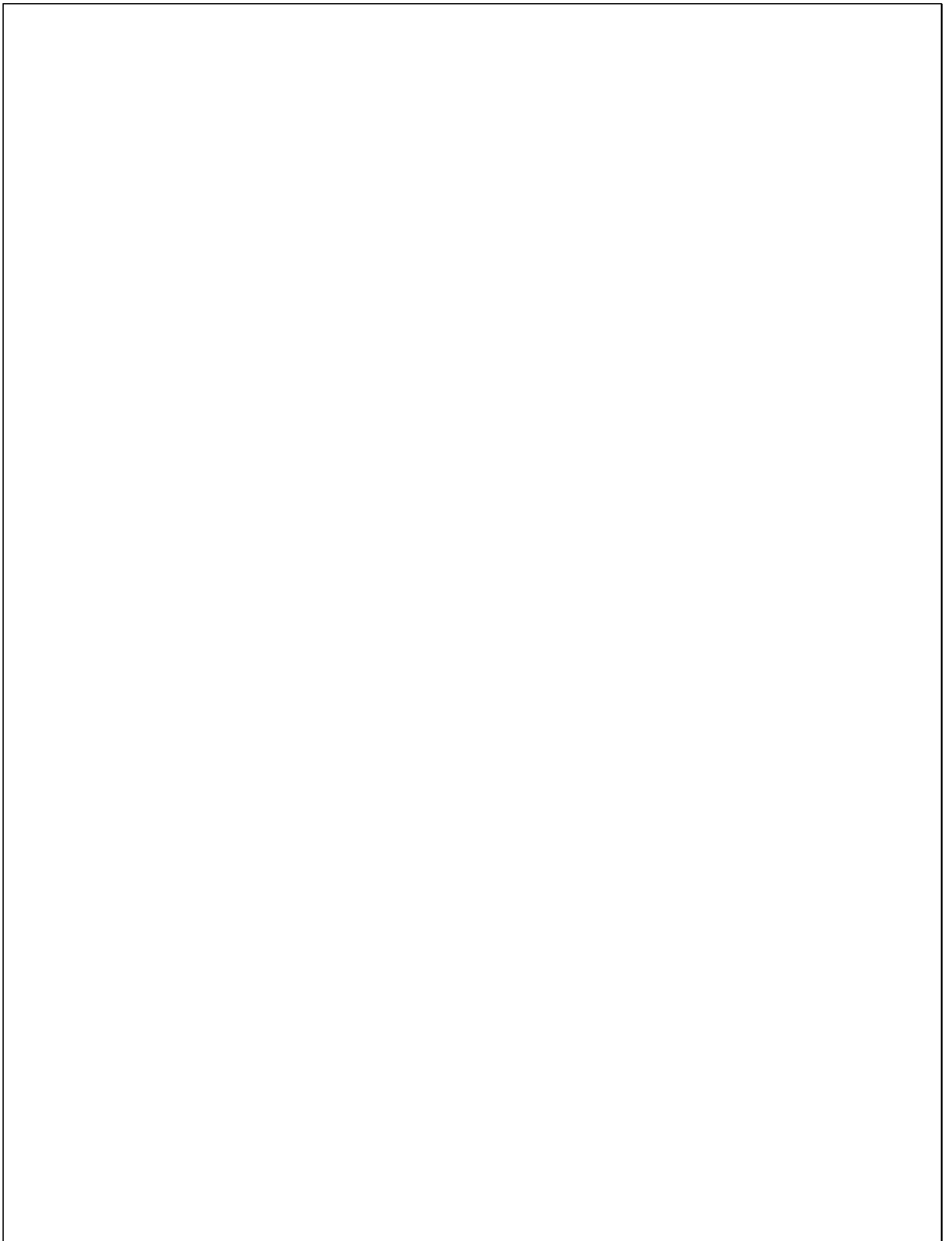

■ **2009:** Made 33 starts for Detroit, going 13-9 with a 3.62 ERA (86 ER/214.0 IP) ... was selected to his first American League All-Star Team (0 ER/1.0 IP) ... set career bests in ERA, starts, IP, strikeouts (161), quality starts (21) and opponents average (.247) ... ranked among AL leaders in numerous categories including road ERA (4th, 3.05), ERA (7th) and IP (7th) ... surrendered three earned runs or less in 16 consecutive starts from 5/9-8/5, just the third pitcher over the last 60 years to accomplish the feat (also Jack Morris in 1983 and Mickey Lolich in 1969) ... was 7-3 with a 2.46 ERA (30 ER/109.2 IP) during that span ... went 7-3 with a 4.27 ERA (47 ER/99.0 IP) in 15 starts at Comerica Park and 6-6 with a 3.05 mark (39 ER/115.0 IP) over 18 road starts ... was 7-4 with a 2.52 ERA (34 ER/121.2 IP) prior to the All-Star break, the lowest ERA by a Tigers pitcher in the first half since Mark Fydrich's 1.78 mark in 1976 ... posted a 2.25 ERA (8 ER/32.0 IP) over five April starts, fifth-lowest in the AL ... matched a career high with five wins in May (also August 2008) ... recorded a career-best seven consecutive quality starts from 6/17-7/25 ... threw his second career complete game on 6/6 vs. Los Angeles-AL, striking out the side in the ninth inning ... became the second pitcher since 1998 to finish a one-run complete victory game by striking out the side (Milwaukee's C.C. Sabathia in 2008) ... matched a career high with nine strikeouts on 7/4 at Minnesota (third time).

MAJOR LEAGUE HIGHLIGHTS

■ **2008:** Went 14-11 with a 4.42 ERA (90 ER/183.1 IP) in 32 games (31 starts) with Tampa Bay ... set a career high with 14 wins ... won back-to-back starts to open the season on 4/5 at New York-AL (1 ER/6.0 IP) and 4/10 vs. Seattle (0 ER/8.0 IP), becoming the fifth pitcher since 1920 to win his first two starts of a season by allowing one earned run or less in both outings following a season of 10 losses or more ... tossed a career-high 20.0 consecutive scoreless IP from 5/8-18 (also a Tampa Bay franchise record for a starting pitcher).

■ **2007:** Spent his first full season in the majors, going 5-15 with a 5.76 ERA (103 ER/161.0 IP) and one complete game in 32 games (31 starts) with the Rays ... was 4-6 with a 4.48 ERA (43 ER/86.1 IP) in 15 starts after the All-Star Break (1-9 with a 7.23 ERA in the first half) ... struck out a career-high nine on 5/12 at Toronto and matched it on 5/28 vs. Detroit ... tossed his first career complete game and shutout on 8/11 at Texas.

■ **2006:** Pitched in 23 games (one start) during three stints with Tampa Bay, compiling a 5.45 ERA (22 ER/36.1 IP) without figuring in a decision ... was recalled from Class AAA Durham on 4/22 and made his season debut that night at Texas ... posted a no decision, allowing five runs over 7.0 IP with seven strikeouts ... was optioned to Durham on 4/25 and recalled on 6/21 ... was optioned again to Durham on 8/8 and recalled on 9/3, where he finished the season ... was 3-2 with a 1.60 ERA (8 ER/45.0 IP) in nine games for Magallanes in the Venezuelan Winter League.

■ **2005:** Was 2-2 with a 6.28 ERA (20 ER/28.2 IP) in seven games (six starts) with the Dodgers ... was recalled from Class AAA Las Vegas on 8/22 ... was rated by *Baseball America* as the No. 3 prospect in the Dodgers organization.

■ **2004:** Made eight appearances (five starts) with Los Angeles-NL, going 2-1 with a 7.30 ERA (20 ER/24.2 IP) ... was recalled from Las Vegas on 6/2 ... earned the win in his season debut that night vs. Milwaukee before being optioned back on 6/4 ... recalled on 7/3 and made two starts before being going on the 15-day disabled list with a strained right forearm from 7/9-9/7 ... made four rehab starts with Las Vegas before finishing the year with the Dodgers.

■ **2003:** His contract was purchased by Los Angeles-NL on 9/9 (his 20th birthday) and made his major-league debut the same night at Arizona ... earned the win after allowing just one run over 6.0 IP ... became the youngest pitcher to win his first start with the Dodgers and third-youngest to start a game following Joe Moeller (19 years, two months in 1962) and Dick Calmus (19 years, seven months in 1963) ... became the fifth pitcher in baseball history to make his major-league debut as a starting pitcher on his birthday, but the first to earn the win.

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POSTSEASON HIGHLIGHTS

■ **2008:** Threw 2.1 scoreless IP and struck out four as a reliever in two games of the ALCS vs. Boston ... surrendered one run on two hits over 2.0 IP in his lone appearance during the World Series vs. Philadelphia.

MINOR LEAGUE HIGHLIGHTS

- **2006:** Made 22 appearances (13 starts) with Class AAA Durham, going 3-7 with a 5.55 ERA (45 ER/73.0 IP).
- **2005:** Combined to go 9-11 with a 5.91 ERA (77 ER/117.1 IP) in 23 games (22 starts) between Class AAA Las Vegas and Class AA Jacksonville ... named Southern League Pitcher of the Week for 8/8-14 ... entered the season rated by *Baseball America* as the No. 3 Prospect in the Dodgers system and the Pacific Coast League.
- **2004:** Went 6-4 with a 5.86 ERA (59 ER/90.2 IP) in 19 starts with Las Vegas ... rated by *Baseball America* as the Best Pitching Prospect and possessing the Best Fastball in the PCL.
- **2003:** Spent the entire season with Jacksonville, going 7-7 with a 3.70 ERA (61 ER/148.1 IP) in 27 starts ... ranked second in the Southern League in strikeouts (157), strikeouts per 9.0 IP among starters (9.53) and opponents average among starters (.220) ... named Southern League Pitcher of the Week for the period of 5/16-22 ... played for Team USA at the All-Star Futures Game at U.S. Cellular Field (did not pitch) ... entered the season ranked by *Baseball America* as the SL's Best Pitching Prospect and having the Best Fastball.
- **2002:** Was 5-2 with a 1.98 ERA (23 ER/104.2 IP) in 19 starts with Class A South Georgia ... named the Dodgers Minor League Pitcher of the Year ... ranked among the South Atlantic League leaders in opponents average (2nd, .206) and baserunners per 9.0 IP (3rd, 10.15) ... named the Dodgers No. 3 Prospect by *Baseball America*.
- **2001:** Made his professional debut with the GCL Dodgers.

CAREER SUMMARY

The 12-time All-Star and nine-time Louisville Silver Slugger Award winner returns in 2010 for his second full season in Los Angeles...last year, batted .290 with 19 homers, 63 RBI, and a .418 on-base percentage in just 104 games... was suspended 50 (May 7-July 3) games last season for violating Major League Baseball's Joint Drug Prevention and Treatment Program...fell one homer shy of hitting 20 home runs for his 15th consecutive season...only seven other players have done it for at least 14 straight seasons...signed a two-year deal with the Dodgers in March 2009 after enjoying one of the most productive final two months of a season in baseball history in 2008, carrying the club to its first National League West Division Championship since 2004 and its first National League Championship Series appearance since 1988...was acquired by the Dodgers from the Boston Red Sox moments before the July 31, 2008 trade deadline as part of a three-team deal with Pittsburgh...with the Dodgers in 2008, batted .396 with 14 doubles, 17 homers, 53 RBI, a .469 on-base percentage, and a .743 slugging percentage in 53 regular-season games...from August 1 through season's end, led the Majors in that time in batting average, RBI, on-base percentage, and slugging percentage...also ranked third in homers behind only Miguel Cabrera (18) and Ryan Howard (18)...including four post-season home runs, his 21 homers overall as a Dodger in 2008 led the team for the entire season, one more than Andre Ethier's 20...ranks 15th on Major League Baseball's all-time home run list with 546...is one of only six players in baseball history with at least 12 seasons with 30 or more homers (1995-96, 1998-2006, 2008)...his 437 home runs beginning in 1998 rank second in that span, behind only Alex Rodriguez (519)...is tied with Frank Robinson for ninth in baseball history with 54 multi-homer games...ranks second on the all-time grand slams list with 21, two behind Lou Gehrig...on July 22, 2009 vs. the Reds, belted his 21st career grand slam and first-ever home run as a pinch-hitter on "Manny Ramirez" bobblehead night...ranks 19th on baseball's all-time RBI list with 1,788...is one of only six players in Major League history with 12 seasons of at least 100 RBI...had nine straight campaigns of 100-plus RBI from 1998-2006...has 1,416 RBI since the start of the 1998 season, trailing only Alex Rodriguez (1,478) among all Major Leaguers in that time...among active players, Ramirez ranks second in RBI, fourth in home runs, fourth in on-base percentage (.411), and is tied for seventh in batting average (.313)...also ranks second among active players with a .591 slugging percentage...of his 12 All-Star Games, was a starting outfielder in six of them, including 2008 in left field...was the American League batting champ in 2002 with a .349 average...made his Major League debut on September 2, 1993 with Cleveland at Minnesota, going 0-for-4 as the designated hitter...collected his first big league hit September 3, 1993 at the New York Yankees, a double off Melido Perez...hit his first home run later that game in the sixth inning off Perez...was originally selected by Cleveland in the first round (13th overall) of the 1991 First-Year Player Draft...is batting .285 (117-for-410) with 29 homers and 78 RBI in 111 playoff games with Cleveland, Boston, and the Dodgers...has participated in 11 out of the last 15 post-seasons beginning in 1995...is baseball's all-time leader in post-season homers, seven more than Bernie Williams...is second in RBI to Williams' 80 and third with 48 extra-base hits, behind Williams' 51 and Derek Jeter's 50...also ranks among the leaders with 117 hits (third), 223 total bases (T-second), 72 walks (T-first), 67 runs (third), 410 at-bats (third), and 111 games (T-fourth)...has hit safely in 49 of his last 56 post-season games, batting .352 (74-for-210) with 16 homers and 52 RBI...in Division Series play, is hitting .252 (39-for-155) in 41 games...is the all-time Division Series leader with 12 homers, while ranking second with 32 RBI behind only Williams (33)...has a .331 average (59-for-178) in 49 LCS contests...ranks

first in LCS play with 13 homers and 59 hits...ranks second with 32 RBI behind only Williams (33)...is batting .247 (19-for-77) with four homers and 14 RBI in 21 World Series games...earned World Series Most Valuable Player honors in 2004, when he hit .412 (7-for-17) with a homer and four RBI in four games...batted .348 (16-for-46) with four homers and 16 RBI while starting all 14 games during Boston's World Championship run in 2007...won Game 2 of the 2007 ALDS against the Angels at Fenway Park with a ninth-inning, three-run walk-off homer off Francisco Rodriguez, his first career post-season game-ending homer and the 11th in Division Series history.

- Batted .290 with 24 doubles, 19 homers, 63 RBI, a .418 on-base percentage, and a .531 slugging percentage in 104 games in a season cut short by his 50-game suspension for a violation of Major League Baseball's Joint Drug Prevention and Treatment Program
- Batted .348 (32-for-92) with six homers, 20 RBI, 26 walks, and a .492 on-base percentage in 27 games before the suspension on May 7...hit .269 (70-for-260) with 13 homers and 43 RBI in 77 games after the suspension, which ended prior to the Dodgers' July 3 game at San Diego
- At the time of his suspension, led the National League in on-base percentage (second in the Majors to Kevin Youkilis's .505 mark) and ranked fifth in the NL in hitting (13th in Majors)
- With 19 home runs, fell one homer shy of his 15th consecutive season with at least 20 homers...is still one of only seven players with 20 or more homers in 14 consecutive seasons (1995-2008)
- July 22 vs. Cincinnati, on his bobblehead night, belted a pinch-hit grand slam off reliever Nick Masset in the sixth inning to snap a 2-2 tie and give the Dodgers a 6-2 victory...Ramirez did not start after being hit in the hand by a Homer Bailey pitch the night before
- Ranked tied for third in the Majors with Prince Fielder with 21 intentional walks, trailing Albert Pujols (44) and Adrian Gonzalez (22)
- Finished the season with 546 career home runs to rank 15th on baseball's all-time list, two behind Mike Schmidt...began the season with 527 career homers, and went on to surpass Jimmie Foxx (534) and Mickey Mantle (536)
- Finished the season with 1,788 RBI to rank 19th on the all-time list...began the season ranked 20th with 1,725, and passed Honus Wagner (1,732)
- Hit .347 (17-for-49) with five homers and 17 RBI in his first 16 games back from the suspended list through July 22
- Hit safely in a season-high seven straight games on two occasions: April 17-24 (.464, 13-for-28) and August 25-31 (.391, 9-for-23)
- Went 1-for-4 (.250) with a walk in five pinch-hitting appearances
- Batted .357 (40-for-112) with no outs and .258 (62-for-240) with one or two outs
- The Dodgers went 62-42 in games in which he appeared

2008

- After being acquired from Boston moments before the July 31 trade deadline, batted .396 with 14 doubles, 17 homers, 53 RBI, a .469 on-base percentage, and a .743 slugging percentage in 53 regular-season games...from August 1 through season's end, led the Majors in that time in batting average, RBI, on-base percentage, and slugging percentage...also ranked third in homers behind only Miguel Cabrera (18) and Ryan Howard (18)
- His 21 homers as a Dodger from August 1 through the postseason (17 in regular season and four in postseason) were the most by any player on the team for the entire season, one more than Andre Ethier's 20
- His .396 average with the Dodgers is the second-highest ever for an in-season acquisition behind only Cesar Cedeño, who hit .434 in 28 games in 1985 after his trade to the Cardinals from the Reds
- Hit .332 in a combined 153 games with Boston and Los Angeles to rank third in all of baseball behind only Chipper Jones (.364) and Albert Pujols (.357)...also tied for fourth in the Majors with 37 home runs and tied for sixth with 121 RBI...ranked second in the big leagues with a .601 slugging percentage, behind Albert Pujols (.651)...ranked fourth in the Majors with a .430 on-base percentage
- His .332 average was his highest since 2002, when he won the American League batting title with a .349 average...has hit .300 or above in eight of the last 10 seasons beginning in 1999...did not have an average lower than .292 in that time
- Finished with 527 career home runs to rank 17th on baseball's all-time list...hit homer No. 500 on May 31 at Baltimore, accomplishing the feat in his 7,263rd at-bat, eighth fewest all-time...began the season with 490 career homers, and went on to surpass on the all-time list Fred McGriff (493), Lou Gehrig (493), Gary Sheffield (499), Eddie Murray (504), Mel Ott (511), Eddie Mathews (512), Ernie Banks (512), Willie McCovey (521), Frank Thomas (521), and Ted Williams (521)
- With 53 RBI with the Dodgers and 68 RBI with the Red Sox, joins Carlos Beltrán as the only players in Major League history to record at least 50 RBI in both leagues in the same season...Beltrán turned the trick in 2004, collecting 51 RBI with Kansas City and 53 with Houston
- Became the fifth player to hit at least 15 homers with two different teams in the same season, joining Fred McGriff (San Diego and Atlanta in 1993), Mark McGwire (Oakland and St. Louis in 1997), David Justice (Cleveland and New York Yankees in 2000), and Carlos Beltrán (Kansas City and Houston in 2004)
- Was named the Sharp Presents the National League Player of the Month for August...batted .415 (44-for-106), with seven doubles, nine home runs, 25 RBI and 21 runs scored in 29 games...led the NL in batting average, ranked second in hits, was tied for second in home runs, and ranked third in RBI
- Logged his 51st multi-homer game August 30 at Arizona, going deep twice in the Dodgers' 6-2 win, the start of an eight-game winning streak
- His nine homers in August were the most in a calendar month for a Dodger since James Loney's nine in September/October 2007
- Went 2-for-4 in his Dodger debut on August 1 vs. Arizona...hit his first home run on August 2 off Arizona's Yusmeiro Petit...belted four homers in his first six games from August 1-7
- In his first 16 games with the club, collected 25 hits, six home runs, and 21 RBI...since RBI became an official stat in 1920, only one other player reached Ramirez's totals in each of those categories over his first 16 games with a team (Mandy Brooks had 25 hits, six homers, and 24 RBI in his first 16 games with the Chicago Cubs in 1925)
- Hit safely in each of the club's eight post-season games, batting .520 (13-for-25) with four homers, 10 RBI, 11 walks, and a .667 on-base percentage

- Ranked third on the Red Sox with 20 homers and 88 RBI...also ranked fourth on the club with a .296 batting average
- Tied Vladimir Guerrero for the American League lead with 17 game-winning RBI...also tied for third in the AL with 13 intentional walks...ranked 13th in the league with a .388 on-base percentage
- Started 120 games in left field and 11 as the designated hitter.
