<u>CAREER:</u> Is in his 10th professional season...acquired by Texas in a March 27, 2010 trade with Chicago-NL in exchange for a player to be named later or cash considerations...was a non-roster invitee to Cubs camp for a second straight year in 2010...suffered a right knee sprain in March, but returned to the field shortly before the trade...has played primarily shortstop throughout his professional career, and saw significant time at second base for the Cubs in 2009...the Venezuela native has also seen limited action at both third base and first base...originally signed by Kansas City as a non-drafted free agent in 2000, he was signed by the Cubs as a minor league free agent in November 2007...the switch-hitter entered the year with a career .252 average in 131 major league games with Kansas City (2004-06) and Chicago-NL (2009).

2009: Began the year at Triple-A, but saw big-league action in 53 games with Chicago...it marked his first major league action since spending parts of 3 seasons with the Royals (2004-06)...batted .252 (31-123) with 15 runs, 8 doubles, a homer and 12 RBI in 53 games with the Cubs...set career marks in all categories...was selected from Iowa (AAA) May 27...made 40 appearances (21 starts) at second base and 15 (9 starts) at shortstop...batted .346 (9-for-26) with 4 doubles and 5 RBI in situations deemed "close and late"...had a pair of season-high 5-game hitting streaks: June 19-23 (7-21/.333) and July 29-September 6 (5-11/.455)...fell a game short of matching his career high...hit .500 (3-6) with a double and six RBI with the bases loaded...posted a .310 batting average after the All-Star break compared to a .222 mark prior to the break...went 6-for-23 (.261) as a right-handed batter, 25-for-100 (.250) as a lefty...notched his first career pinch hit July 20 at Philadelphia, doubling in 5th fifth inning before coming around to score...hit his first career homer July 29 vs. Houston, going deep off Doug Brocail in the 8th after entering as a defensive replacement at short-stop... collected a career-high-matching 3 hits Sept. 13 vs. Cincinnati...he set the mark Sept. 11, 2005 at Detroit, while with K.C.

MINORS: Was batting .314 (48-for-153) with 18 runs, nine doubles, four homers and 25 RBI in 43 games for the I-Cubs at the time of his promotion...hit .352 (25-71) in May as the team's regular shortstop...was shelved Aug. 4-Sept. 1 with a left calf strain...hit .280 (21- for-75) with 12 runs, 8 doubles, 2 triples, 2 homers and 4 RBI in 20 rehab games with lowa...overall, batted .304 (70-230) with 30 runs. 17 walks. 17 doubles. 2 triples, 6 homers and 29 RBI in 64 games with the I-Cubs.

2008: Bounced back from an injury-riddled 2007 to appear in 102 games with Triple-A lowa...hit .285 (85-298) with a career-high 36 RBI...waw time at shortstop (94 games), second base (2) and third base (1)...hit .292 or better in 3 months: .292 in April, .317 in May and .350 in August...batted .293 (66-225) off right-handed pitchers compared to .260 (19-73) off southpaws...posted a .286 average (61-213) before the All-Star break while hitting .282 (24-85) following the break...collected 2 season-high 7-game hitting streaks: April 16-22 and May 24-June 2...in 46 games with Aguilas del Zulia of the Venezuelan Winter League, hit .272 (46-for-169) with 12 doubles, a homer, 22 runs and 18 RBI...2007: Played just 28 games with Triple-A Omaha before landing on the disabled list May 31 with a right hamstring strain...hit .196 (19-97) before his injury, seeing time at shortstop (21 games) and second base (7 games)...2006: Appeared in a 33 games for the Royals, hitting .241 (21-87) with one triple and 9 RBI in 3 stints with Kansas City...saw time at shortstop (25 games) and second base (7 games) for the big league club...recorded a career-high 3 RBI on a bases-clearing double during a 6-run 12th inning Sept. 9 at Boston...underwent surgery Sept. 29 to repair a posterior labrum tear in his left shoulder, performed by Dr. Lewis Yocum...hit .237 (67-283) with 9 doubles and 20 RBI in 88 games with Omaha...was named to the Pacific Coast League All-Star Team...2005: Andres began the season with Triple-A Omaha before suffering a knee injury ... returned and ended the year with Kansas City...spent time at Single-A High Desert (3 games), Rookie League Arizona (7 games) and Double-A Wichita (9 games) on rehab assignments before returning to Omaha Aug. 15...hit .254 (29-114) in 35 games with 14 runs scored and 9 RBI at Omaha including his first professional home run April 9...recalled from Omaha Sept. 5 and played in 26 games for the Royals, batting .215 (17-79)... spent 24 games at second base (22 starts) and 7 games at shortstop (2 starts)...2004: Made his major league debut April 17 at Minnesota as the starting shortstop after his contract was purchased that day from Double-A Wichita...became the 2ndyoungest Royal in club history (behind Bret Saberhagen) when he made his debut at 20 years and 6 days...became the youngest position player ever to play for Kansas City...collected his first major league hit April 18 at Minnesota, a bunt single in the 3rd inning...appeared in 19 games during 2 stints in Kansas City, hitting .317 (19-60) with 9 runs scored, 2 doubles, 2 triples and 5 RBI...in 93 games with Wichita, he hit .247 (80-324) with 34 runs scored, 10 doubles and 21 RBI...named best defensive shortstop in the Texas League by Baseball America...selected as a member of the World Team for the 2004 Futures Game in Houston...selected as the club's 9th-best prospect by Baseball America prior to the 2004 season...2003: Spent the season with Single-A Wilmington, hitting .244 (96-394) in 113 games...named the best defensive shortstop in the Carolina League by Baseball America following the 2003 season... 2002: Spent the majority of the season with the Gulf Coast League Royals in his 2nd year in the Royals organization...hit .249 with 27 runs and 14 RBI in 52 games with the club...2001: Spent his first season in the Royals organization with their Dominican Summer League club, hitting .298 (56-for-188) in 54 contests with 39 runs scored, three triples, 16 RBI and 28 walks.

CAREER: The 28-year-old infielder was acquired by Texas in a July 29 trade with Florida...the right-handed batter has already posted his 5th career season with at least 10 home runs in 2010...has a pair of 20-homer seasons and also two seasons of at least 100 RBI...he has registered 40 doubles in three different seasons, including each of the past two years (2008-09) with Florida...has played primarily first and third base the past several years after seeing action at second base and third base over his first three big league seasons from 2004-06...at the time of the trade, had a career .350 (14-40) average with 6 doubles and 9 RBI in 9 games at Rangers Ballpark...has played for Tampa Bay (2004-07), Cincinnati (2007), and Florida (2008-10) in his big league career...originally signed by Tampa Bay as a non-drafted free agent in 1998, Cantu has dual citizenship in the United States and Mexico, having been born in Texas before moving to Mexico when he was a week old...represented Mexico in the 2006 and 2009 World Baseball Classic tournaments.

2010 WITH FLORIDA: Batted .262 (98-374) with 10 home runs, 25 doubles, and 54 RBI in 97 games with Florida this season...he hit safely in his final 4 games with the Marlins, including going 2-for-4 with 2 runs scored in a start at third base on July 29 at San Francisco, the day of the trade...at the time of the trade, Cantu led the Marlins in doubles and ranked T2nd on the club in RBI with Hanley Ramirez, trailing only Dan Uggla (64)...he batted primarily cleanup for Florida this season...saw declines in average, on-base, and slugging in each of his 4 months with Florida: .311/.354/.567 in April, .252/.308/.393 in May, .245/.303/.378 in June, and .227/.256/.536 in July...had 8 RBI last 34 games with the Fish...matched career high with 5 RBI in Marlins' 6-5 win on April 11 vs. Los Angeles...had a career-high 17-game hit streak to open the season, 3rd-longest in the National League in 2010 at the time of the trade

<u>RECORD STREAK:</u> Had at least one hit and one RBI in each of his first 10 games this season to establish a major league record at the start of a campaign, surpassing the previous mark of 8 straight games by Hall of Famer George "High Pockets" Kelly for the Giants in 1921...only 2 other players had posted RBI in each of first 8 games of a season (went hitless in at least one of those games): Willie McCovey for the 1969 Giants and Tony Oliva for the 1970 Twins.

2009: Posted career-high 42 doubles while 100 RBI was 2nd-highest total of his career...the 42 doubles ranked as 10th-highest single-season total in Florida history...ranked 3rd on team with 49 multi-hit games (Ramirez-56; Coghlan-51)...named N.L. Player of the Week on May 3 after batting .346 (9-26) with four home runs and 14 RBI in 7 games...led the N.L. in RBI and total bases (22) for the week while tying for HR lead...homered in the first 2 games of the season, 5th Florida player to accomplish that feat: Derek Lee – 2002, Cliff Floyd – 2001, Eric Owens – 2001 and Jeff Conine -1994 & 95...season-best 11-game hit streak Aug. 9-22...was final batter in 4 of 10 Marlins walk-off wins, 3 game-winning hits (4/10 vs. NYM, 6/23 vs. BAL, 8/11 vs. HOU) and a fielder's choice (5/4 vs. CIN)...had 3 different games of 5 RBI, all tying career high...homered twice April 28 at Citi Field, 7th career multi-homer game...hit .336 in September, as his 39 hits in that month were a career high...led majors with 36 first-inning RBI and ranked T8th in N.L. with 78 RBI in innings 1-6...batted .310 (93-300) at home.

2008: Established career highs in games (155), at-bats (628), runs (92), hits (174), home runs (29), walks (40) and strikeouts (111)...led Marlins in at-bats, doubles, RBI, sacrifice flies (7), go-ahead RBI (24), game-winning RBI (12) and RBI with runners in scoring position (64)...his doubles total ranked 10th in the N.L. while his 24 go-ahead RBI ranked 13th...tied Dan Uggla for 2nd on club with 70 extra-base hits (Ramirez, 71) and was 3rd in runs...along with Mike Jacobs (32), Hanley Ramirez (33) and Dan Uggla (32), became the first infield in major league history to record 25-or-more home runs in the same season...marked a then-career best and tied then-franchise record by driving in at least one run in 8 straight games (9/8-19/08)...also marked the second longest streak in club history by recording an extra-base hit in 8 consecutive games (9/8-19/08), sitting behind a 10-game streak by Cliff Floyd in July 2001...hit 2nd career grand slam Sept. 17 vs. Houston...had a pair of 2-HR games: June 6 vs. CIN and June 11 vs. PHI...13-game hit streak, July 23-Aug. 5...established a career high with 4 runs scored, July 4 at Colorado...homered in both ends of doubleheader May 25 vs. SF...became 2nd Marlin ever to homer in both ends of a doubleheader (Willingham, 2006)...2007: Combined to hit .252 with one home run and 13 RBI in 52 games between Rays and Reds...began season at Durham (AAA) and was with Tampa from April 24 to July 19...made 7 starts at first base, appearing at the position for the first time in his career...traded to Reds on July 28...began stint with Reds at Triple-A Louisville, then was recalled Aug. 20...made 27 appearances (14 starts) with Reds, including 13 starts at first base and one at second base... 2006: Tampa Bay's Opening Day starting second baseman for a 2nd straight year...from April 24 to June 5 missed 39 games while on the disabled list with a fractured left foot...on July 21 vs. Baltimore hit his first career grand slam (off Adam Loewen) and tied his career high with 5 RBI...represented Mexico in the inaugural World Baseball Classic...batted .333 in six games (2 HR, 8 RBI)...2005: Produced a then-club-record and career-high 117 RBI and was named the Rays' Most Valuable Player by the Tampa Bay chapter of the Baseball Writers' Association of America...the 117 RBI remains 2nd-



highest single-season total in Rays history (Carlos Pena-121 in 2007)...led the majors by driving in 21.1 percent of the baserunners he inherited...at 23 years old, his RBI total was the highest by an American League player prior to the age of 24 since 22-year-old Alex Rodriguez had 124 RBI in 1998...also led the club in HR (28), extra-base hits (69), doubles (40), sacrifice flies (7) and average with RISP (.325)...his 19 homers as a second baseman remains a franchise record ...also established club record with 37 RBI that tied games or gave Tampa the lead...only 5 players in history reached Cantu's numbers in doubles (40), home runs (28) and RBI (117) before the age of 24, including Hal Trosky (CLE, 1934 and 1936), Ted Williams (BOS, 1939), Albert Pujols (STL, 2001-03), Joe DiMaggio (NYY, 1936) and Rodriguez (SEA, 1996)...2004: Was named the Rays' Most Outstanding Rookie by the local chapter of the BBWAA...among American League rookies, ranked 3rd in both average (.301) and doubles (20)...started 38 of Tampa's final 46 games of the season...in the season finale vs. Detroit, tied the club record for hits in a game by a rookie (4)...produced his first major league hit on July 18 at Baltimore (single off Dave Borkowski)...hit his first career home run on Sept. 6 at New York-AL off Orlando Hernandez...earned International League All-Star honors while with Triple-A Durham...led the IL in slugging (.576)...2003: Split season between Orlando (AA) and Durham (AAA), setting then-career highs with 7 homers and 47 RBI...played for Mexican national team in the regional qualifiers for the Olympics, where they defeated the U.S. team, eliminating them from the 2004 Summer Games...Mexico later lost to Team Canada...2002: Ranked 3rd in Southern League with 31 doubles...ranked T3rd in all of minor league baseball with 41 errors...2001: Was the youngest player at Double-A (19) and was named to Southern League All-Star team...2000: Split first full pro season between Charleston (High-A) and St. Petersburg (Low-A)...1999: Played all 72 games for short-season Hudson Valley at shortstop in his pro debut.

PERSONAL: Jorge Luis Guzman Cantu...is a citizen of both the United States and Mexico...was born in Texas but moved to Mexico when he was one week old...remained in Mexico until he signed his first professional contract at age 16...finished high school in Texas following the summer baseball season...spends the off-season working on his family's 8.645-acre cattle ranch in Revnosa. Mexico, just across the border from his home in McAllen, Texas...on Nov. 20, 2005, had breakfast with Mexican President Vicente Fox and was later presented the Premio Nacional de Deportes (Mexico's national sports award) as the country's baseball player of the year...also that day, had an open car ride through the streets of Mexico City in a parade that marked the Mexican Revolution...phoned Mexico Little League team just prior to their 11-0 win over Latin America in August 2006 that sent them to the Little League World Series International finals against Asia...Mexico lost 3-0 in the finals...was the first of any of his family or friends to play baseball and favorite player growing up was Cal Ripken Jr.
