A's AT A GLANCE

A's vs. BLUE JAYS

The A's lost the season series 3-4 last year and have now lost the season series for three of seasons...lost three of four games in Toronto last year...have lost 17 of the last 23 games to the Blue Jays, including seven of the last 11 in Oakland...all-time, the A's are 193-168 against the Blue Jays...that includes 94-86 in Oakland, 99-80 in Toronto and 0-2 in Las Vegas.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

David DeJesus has a 245-game errorless streak, which is the longest active streak among all Major League outfielders...his last error came on Sept. 15, 2008.

Mark Ellis has hit safely in each of his first four games after finishing the 2010 season with a 13-game hitting streak...now has a careerhigh 17-game hitting streak (25 for 67, .373) dating back to last season, which is the longest steak spanning two seasons in Oakland history...has 998 career games played and needs two more to become the 13th player in Oakland history to reach 1,000.

Hideki Matsui recorded the 2,500th hit of his professional career Sunday (combined MLB and Japan)...has also combined for 1,492 runs and 493 home runs...batted .480 (12 for 25) against the Blue Jays last season and is a career .316 (137 for 434) hitter against the club, his second highest mark against any team...also has 19 home runs and 85 RBI against Toronto, his second best totals against any team.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In **1982**, an Opening Day crowd of 48,348 watches the A's defeat the California Angels 3-2 in 11 innings. The A's score the winning run when Davey Lopes walks with the bases loaded to force in Dwayne Murphy with the goahead run.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have lost three of their first four games of the season, marking the first time the team has opened 1-3 since 2008...the last time Oakland started a season 1-4 was 1998...this is the A's 44th season in Oakland where they have won 14 American League West titles, one AL Wild Card, six AL pennants and four World Championships...only Atlanta (16) and the Yankees (16) have more division titles than the A's...since the A's moved to Oakland in 1968, only the Yankees have more league (11) and world (7) championships...the A's compiled a 3555-3280 (.520) record over the previous 43 seasons in Oakland...only five teams have won more games over that span (New York, Boston, Los Angeles Dodgers, St. Louis, Cincinnati)...the A's went 81-81 last year, snapping a streak of three consecutive seasons with a losing record...this is the Athletics franchise's 111th season in the American League...since 1901, the A's have 14 AL West titles plus 15 AL pennants and nine World Championships...only the Yankees (27) and Cardinals (10) have won more World Championships...the A's were 8270-8752 (.486) in their previous 110 seasons...that includes a 3886-4248 record from 1901-54 in Philadelphia and 829-1224 from 1955-67 in Kansas City.

NINE-GAME ROAD TRIP: The A's embark on their first road trip of the 2011 campaign, a nine-game, threecity trip through Toronto (0-1), Minnesota (three games) and Chicago (AL) (three games)...the nine games are one shy of the longest this season, as the A's play 10 games on two road trips later this year (BOS-BAL-CWS, June 3-12; NYY-BOS-CLE, Aug. 23-Sept. 1)...Oakland posted its fourth straight losing record (34-47) on the road last year.

EARLY DEFENSIVE WOES: Oakland was charged with two errors in last night's 7-6, 10-inning loss and have now committed at least one error in each of its first four contests...the Athletics' nine errors overall are the most in the majors this season, and the most in the first four games of a season in Oakland history (the 1970 club had eight)...the 1966 Kansas City A's are the last to have nine miscues in the first four games (they had 12 in the first five games)...last season, the A's defense ranked fifth in the AL in fielding percentage (.984) and were charged with less than 100 errors (99) for the sixth time in the last seven years.

DURING THE SPRING: The A's finished the spring with a 12-21-1 (.368) record, which was the fifth worst mark in the majors...set an Oakland record for Spring Training losses, topping the previous mark of 18 (1993, 2005, 2009)...the winning percentage was fourth lowest since the A's moved to Arizona in 1969...it was the lowest since the 1982 club went 8-14 (.364)...it was the A's third consecutive spring with a losing record.

LOCKED UP: The A's have four players under contract beyond the 2011 season...Brett Anderson is signed through 2013 with club options for 2014 and 2015...Kurt Suzuki is also signed through 2013 with a club option for 2014...Grant Balfour and Brian Fuentes are both signed through 2012 with club options for 2013...Michael Wuertz has a club option for 2012.

ROSTER NOTES: The A's opened the season with 12 pitchers and 13 position players for the fifth time in the last six years...12 players returned from last year's Opening Day roster (Anderson, Barton, Blevins, Braden, Breslow, Ellis, Gonzalez, Kouzmanoff, Pennington, Suzuki, Sweeney, Ziegler)...Mark Ellis is on his eighth Opening Day Roster in the last nine years...six other players on the roster played for the A's at some point last year (Cahill, Cramer, Crisp, Jackson, Powell, Wuertz)...five signed with the A's as free agents (Balfour, Fuentes, LaRoche, Matsui, McCarthy), which are the most free agents to make the A's Opening Day roster since the 1999 club also had five...the other two players were acquired in a trade (DeJesus, Willingham).

ROOKIE AND VETERANS: The A's have one rookie on the Opening Day Roster for the second consecutive season (Cramer)...six players have six or more years of service: Mark Ellis (8 years, 136 days), Brian Fuentes (8 years, 125 days), Hideki Matsui (8 years) Coco Crisp (7 years, 158 days), David DeJesus (6 years, 146 days) and Grant Balfour (6 years, 99 days).

THE YOUNG AND THE OLD: The average age on the A's Opening Day roster is 28.96 years, which is nearly two years older than last year (27.16)...the A's roster features just three players under the age of 25...Trevor Cahill is the youngest at 23 years, 31 days...Brett Anderson is second youngest (23 years, 59 days), followed by Tyson Ross (23 years, 349 days)...there are 11 players that are at least 30 years old...Hideki Matsui is the oldest at 36 years, 293 days...he is followed by Brian Fuentes (35 years, 235 days), Mark Ellis (33 years, 299 days) and Grant Balfour (33 years, 92 days).

OPENING DAY STARTING LINEUPS: Five players returned from last year's Opening Day starting lineup (Barton, Ellis, Kouzmanoff, Pennington, Suzuki)...Mark Ellis started at second base for the seventh consecutive season and eighth time in the last nine years...the eight starts are an on-going Oakland record for second basemen and are tied for ninth most by any player...in Athletics history, only Dick Green (10) and Max Bishop (9) have more Opening Day starts as a second baseman...Josh Willingham became the A's 12th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 12 years, Hideki Matsui became the seventh different designated hitter in the last seven years and Trevor Cahill was the A's sixth different starting pitcher in the last six years.

FOR OPENERS: The A's have now lost their last seven openers, which is the **longest Opening Day losing** streak in Athletics history (since 1901)...the previous mark was five from 1994-98...it is the longest active Opening Day losing streak in the majors and the longest since Philadelphia lost eight straight from 1985-92.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's began the season with three players on the disabled list (Bailey, Harden, Rosales) and now have four with the addition Wuertz (left hamstring strain) today retroactive to April 2...Rosales was placed on the 60-day DL retroactive to March 22 with a fractured right foot...Bailey (strained right forearm) and Harden (strained right shoulder) were placed on the 15-day DL retroactive to March 22...the A's used the DL 23 times last year, which was the second highest total in Oakland history to the record of 25 in 2008...have now used the DL 91 times since the start of the 2007 season, which is second most in the majors to Texas (102)...have not had fewer than three players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had just one.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his first start of the season...the A's were 13-17 (.433) in his starting assignments last year and are 33-43 (.434) in his 76 career starts...tossed six or more innings in 22 of his 30 starts in 2010, allowed two runs or fewer 14 times and walked two batters or fewer 27 times.

THIS SPRING: Was 0-3 with a 5.24 ERA (22.1 ip, 34 h, 18 r, 13 er, 6 bb, 14 so, 1 hr) in six games, all starts...also started in a minor league game March 25...allowed a .337 (34 for 101) opponents batting average...yielded just one home run in 22.1 innings...went 0-3 with a 10.13 ERA over his first four starts but then had no decisions and a 0.77 ERA over his final two starts.

BRADEN vs. TORONTO: Is 2-2 with a 3.94 ERA (29.2 ip, 30 h, 14 r, 13 er, 10 bb, 14 so, 2 hr) in five career appearances, four starts...is 2-1 with a 4.84 ERA (12 er in 22.1 ip) in four games, three starts, in Oakland and 1-0 with a 1.23 ERA (1 er in 7.1 ip) in one start in Toronto...is 2-2 with a 3.33 ERA (10 er in 27.0 ip) in his four starts...was the winning pitcher in his only start last year, a 6-2 A's win in Oakland August 17...allowed an unearned run in the first inning when Escobar walked, went to third on a wild pickoff attempt and scored on a ground out...allowed just one hit over the first six innings, a leadoff single by Encarnacion in the third...had a 2-1 lead when he allowed back-to-back doubles to Hill and Overbay in the seventh, tying the game at two...the A's then scored three times in the bottom of the seventh for the win.

2010 RECAP: Had one of the most memorable performances in Oakland history with his Mother's Day Perfect Game yet finished the season with an 11-14 record despite a 3.50 ERA...the ERA was sixth lowest in Oakland history among pitchers with a losing record and was the lowest since 1978 when Matt Keough went 8-15 with a 3.24 ERA and Rick Langford posted a 7-13 mark and a 3.43 ERA...the last Major Leaguer with an ERA of 3.50 or lower and a winning percentage of .440 or worse was Omar Daal, who was 8-12 with a 2.88 ERA for Arizona in 1998...had career bests in nearly every category, including ERA, opponents batting (.249), opponents on-base percentage and opponents slugging (.373)...is now 19-23 with a 3.66 ERA over the last two seasons, with his ERA ninth lowest among AL pitchers with 300 or more innings over that span.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Ranked fifth in the American League in fewest walks per nine innings (2.01) and had the eighth lowest opponents on-base percentage (.294)...also tied for the league lead in shutouts (2) and ranked fourth in complete games (5)...tied for fifth in the AL in losses (14), becoming just the second A's pitcher over the last 12 years to lose at least 14 games (Greg Smith, 16 in 2008)...averaged 14.8 pitches per inning, which was third fewest in the AL.

ON THE BASES: Tied for second in the American League in pickoffs (8)...now has 19 career pickoffs...since 2007, only Mark Buehrle (31) and Andy Pettitte (23) have more pickoffs...opponents were successful in just 1 of 3 (33.3%) stolen base attempts, which tied for the lowest percentage in the AL...has yielded just one stolen base over the last two years, while opponents are 4 for 11 (36.4%) off him in his career.

RUN SUPPORT: Had the fourth-lowest run support in the American League in 2010 (3.60).....received run support of two runs or fewer in 17 of his 30 starts...had 17 runs of support in his 14 losses (83.1 ip, 1.84 RSA) and now has 36 runs of support in his 35 career losses (192.0 ip, 1.69 RSA)...is 2-32 in 45 career starts with support of two runs or fewer, compared to 22-3 in 31 starts with run support of three or more...has career run support of 3.62 (181 rs in 450.0 ip) as a starter.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Opponents hit .249, including .242 by right-handed hitters and .271 by left-handers...entered the season with a .295 mark against righties and .236 against lefties...yielded a .239 mark with runners in scoring position after entering the season with a .315 career mark with RISP.

DAYS REST: Was 6-11 with a 4.15 ERA in 18 starts on four days rest and 5-3 with a 2.55 ERA in 12 starts on five days rest or more.

INNING BY INNING: Yielded 48 of his 83 runs in the fifth through seventh innings...had a 2.18 ERA over the first four innings of a game and 5.70 from the fifth inning on

BRADEN AND POWELL: Made 10 starts with Landon Powell as his catcher, a pairing that produced a 4-6 record with four complete games, two shutouts and a 2.75 ERA (22 er in 72.0 ip) in those starts, including the perfect game...was 7-8 with a 3.95 ERA (53 er in 120.2 ip) in his other 20 starts.

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: Was part of four double plays on defense, which tied for second among AL pitchers.

PERFECT: Pitched the 19th of the 20 perfect games in Major League history May 9, 2010 against Tampa Bay...it was the second by an Athletic and came 42 years and one day after Catfish Hunter did it against Minnesota May 8, 1968...it was the sixth no-hitter by an Oakland Athletic, the first since Dave Stewart on June 29, 1990 against Toronto...it was the 11th nine-inning no-hitter in Athletics history...it was the first complete game of his career, snapping a career-opening streak of 52 consecutive starts without going the distance...that is an Oakland record...in his first start following the perfect game, May 14 at Los Angeles, he retired the first two batters he faced to extend his consecutive batters retired streak to an Oakland record-tying 29 (also Hunter, May 3-8, 1968)...blanked the Angels on three hits over the first five innings to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high 16.0 innings...finished with a complete game seven-hitter, but was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-0 loss...of the 16 perfect games since 1922, only Len Barker followed with another complete game and he also lost...the loss to the Angels began a five-game losing streak as he went nine starts following his complete game without a win...would not win again until July 25 against Chicago...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, the nine consecutive starts without a win following a no-hitter or perfect game is the longest streak in major league history...posted a 4.10 ERA and allowed a .319 opponents batting average over the nine starts but received just 12 runs of support (2.05 RSA).

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Trevor Cahill (0-0, 1.93 ERA): Is scheduled to make his second start of the season...made his first career Opening Day start last Friday against Seattle, gaining a no decision after allowing one run on four hits in 4.2 innings in an eventual A's 6-2 loss...struck out eight and walked four Mariners in throwing 105 pitches...at the age of 23 years, 31 days, he was the seventh youngest pitcher to start an opener in Athletics franchise history...only two pitchers in Oakland history have been younger – Vida Blue at the age of 21 years, 251 days in 1971 and Catfish Hunter at the age of 22 years, 2 days in 1968...began the 2010 season on the disabled list and was optioned to Sacramento before returning to Oakland April 30 to lead the A's with 18 wins...posted an 18-8 mark and team-leading 2.97 ERA in earning All-Star recognition... wins were the most by an Athletic over the last eight years, with all of his victories coming after May 1... ranked third in the AL in opponents batting average (.220), fourth in ERA (2.97) and opponents on-base percentage (.287), tied for fourth in wins (18), tied for fifth in winning percentage (.692) and sixth in opponents slugging (.332)...is 0-2 with an 8.04 ERA (15.2 ip, 20 h, 16 r, 14 er, 10 bb, 6 so, 5 hr) in three career starts vs. Toronto, including a loss in his only start last year—a 10-2 verdict at Toronto April 30...allowed a career-high tying eight runs in that start, including three home runs: a three-run bomb to Gonzalez in the second, a two-run home run to Wells in the fifth and a leadoff homer to Gonzalez in the sixth... was 0-1 with a 6.75 ERA in two starts vs. the Jays in 2009...was 2-1 with a 4.50 ERA (24.0 ip, 27 h, 13 r, 12 er, 5 bb, 17 so, 1 hr) in six spring games, all starts.

0-3, 6.97 ERA (10.1 ip, 12 h, 11 r, 8 er, 5 bb, 11 so, 2 hr) The A's bullpen compiled a 3.75 ERA last year, which ranked sixth in the American League...converted 38 of 51 (74.5%) save opportunities, which was third best in the AL...the 13 blown saves tied for the fewest in the AL, but the save opportunities were third fewest and the saves tied for fourth fewest...also ranked fourth in the AL in opponents batting average (.248), fifth in on-base percentage (.325) and eighth in slugging percentage (.394)...held first batters faced to a .214 batting average, which was the third lowest mark in the AL...it was the lowest average by an A's team since 1989 (.199)...allowed 27.1% of inherited runners to score, which was fourth lowest in the AL...compiled a 17-23 (.425) record, which was the ond lowest winning percentage in the AL and fourth lowest in Oakland history. .it was the lowest by an A's team since 1986 (15-29, Last Outing: 3/14 at Cleveland (ND, 0.1 ip, 1 h, 2 r, 0 er, 0 bb, 0 so) **40 RHP ANDREW BAILEY** Save/Opportunities: 0-0 Inherited Runners/Scored: 0/0 First Hitters: 0-0 (0 bb) Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 30 retroactive to March 22 with a strained right forearm...this is his second career stint on the DL. Appeared in just two games this spring, tossing a scoreless inning March 10 against Kansas City and allowing two unearned runs in 0.1 innings March 14 at Cleveland before leaving with his injury. Led the A's in saves (25) and was named to the American League All-Star team for the second consecutive season last year...was 1-3 with a 1.47 ERA in 47 relief appearances...ranked seventh among AL relievers in opponents on-base percentage (.251) and eighth in slugging (.292). **50 RHP GRANT BALFOUR** Save/Opportunities: 0-1 Last Outing: 4/5 at TOR (L, 0.0 ip, 2 h, 2 r, 2 er, 0 bb, 0 so) First Hitters: 1-2 (0 bb) Inherited Runners/Scored: 0/1 Begins his eighth season in the majors but is on an Opening Day roster for just the third time (2009, 2010). Was charged with the loss last night after allowing a walk-off home run to Escobar in the 10th inning and now has a 4.36 ERA (10 er in 20.2 ip) in 23 career outings against Toronto. Was 1-0 with a 6.97 ERA in 11 spring training appearances...tied for seventh in the Cactus League in games pitched...did not allow an earned run over his last five outings (4.1 ip) after posting a 12.00 ERA over his first six contests. Signed with the A's as a free agent, January 18, 2011. Made 57 relief appearances for Tampa Bay last year, despite spending the month of August on the disabled list...compiled a 2.28 ERA, which

ranked eighth among American League relievers...allowed a .216 batting average, including .174 against right-handed hitters.

Begins his fifth Major League season, all with Oakland, and is on his third consecutive Opening Day roster.

Pitched a scoreless inning last night and now has a 9.00 ERA (6 er in 6.0 ip) in six career appearances against the Blue Jays.

- Had no decisions and a 7.30 ERA in a team-leading 12 appearances this spring...tied for fourth in the Cactus League in games pitched...did not allow a run over his last five outings (4.1 ip) after posting an 11.25 ERA over his first seven contests.
- The 2010 season was his fourth in the majors but the first where he spent the entire year at the big league level...was 2-1 with a save and a 3.70 ERA in a career-high 63 appearances...allowed seven home runs in 48.2 innings after yielding five in 64.2 innings over his first three years.
