ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have lost two straight after winning three of the previous four games...are now 19-19 for the season, marking the 11th time this year the A's have been exactly .500...last season, were exactly .500 an Athletics-record 33 times...are now 144-144 since June 29, 2009...are 10-8 (.556) over the last 18 games (since April 23) and have not won or lost more than two in a row over that span...the A's .556 winning percentage over that stretch is fourth best in the American League...are in third place in the AL West...have spent one day in second, seven days tied for second, 30 days in third, two days tied for third and four days in fourth...are 5-8 in the first game of a series, 9-3 in the last game and 5-8 in all other games...are 9-3 (.750) in games started by a left-handed pitcher, which is the best record in the AL...are 10-16 (.385) against right-handed starters.

DAY AND NIGHT: The A's are 10-4 (.714) in day games and 9-15 (.375) at night...have the second best day record in the American League (New York 9-3, .750) and are tied for the second worst mark at night...have a 2.20 ERA (32 er in 131.0 ip) during the day compared to 3.10 (73 er in 212.0 ip) at night...the day ERA is second lowest in the majors (Philadelphia, 1.80)...are batting .258 (127 for 492) with 11 home runs during the day and .217 (171 for 789) with 12 home runs at night...the night batting average is second lowest in the AL.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 15-11 with a **Major League-leading** 2.73 ERA (75 er in 247.2 ip)...have allowed just three home runs in 75.0 innings in May and 14 for the season, which is tied with Philadelphia and San Francisco for the fewest in the majors...have the lowest opponents slugging percentage in the American League (.341), are tied for the lead in complete games (3), rank third in opponents on-base percentage (.304) and innings pitched (247.2) and tied for third in strikeouts (187).

PITCHING: The A's **lead the majors** with a 2.76 ERA, a mark that is nearly a half-run lower than the next closest American League team (Tampa Bay, 3.16)...lead the AL in opponents slugging percentage (.334) and rank third in batting (.242) and on-base percentage (.307)...have yielded the fewest home runs in the AL and second fewest in the majors (20).

OFFENSE: The A's are batting .201 (60 for 298) with 30 runs scored over the last nine games (3.3 per game) but have seven home runs over that span...for the season, have the second fewest runs scored in the American League (132), the third lowest batting average (.233) and the third fewest home runs (23)...are 12-3 when scoring four runs or more and 7-16 when scoring fewer than four...also have the second lowest on-base percentage in the AL (.299) and third lowest slugging percentage (.352)...have been shut out four times, which is tied for the most in the AL...are hitting .215 (70 for 325) with runners in scoring position, which is the lowest mark in the majors.

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have committed four errors in the last four games and now have 31 for the season, which is second most in the American League and tied for second in the majors...the errors have led to 25 unearned runs, which is the most in the majors...have turned 38 double plays, which is fourth most in the AL.

20 GAMES IN 20 DAYS: The A's are 0-1 in this stretch of 20 consecutive days without a day off that began last night...all 20 games will be played in California...following this seven game homestand with Chicago, Los Angeles and Minnesota the A's have a seven-game road trip to San Francisco and Los Angeles (AL)...conclude the 20-game stretch with a six-game homestand against Baltimore and New York from May 27 to June 1.

ON THE BASES: A's pitchers **lead the majors** with 10 pickoffs (Anderson 5, Breslow 3, McCarthy 1, Fuentes 1)...last year, the A's led the majors with 27 pickoffs...opponents have been successful in only 19 of 38 (50.0%) stolen base attempts, which is the lowest percentage in the majors...the 19 caught stealings also lead the majors...offensively, the A's have been caught stealing 14 times, which is third most in the American League...have the third lowest stolen percentage (25 for 39, 64.1%).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 0-1 on this seven-game homestand against Chicago (0-1), Los Angeles (two games) and Minnesota (two games)...went 4-3 on the last homestand against Texas (3-1) and Cleveland (1-2) and are 8-9 at home for the season...went 3-2 on the last road trip through Kansas City (2-1) and Texas (1-1)...are 11-10 on the road...have the fourth worst home record in the American League and the third best road record.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's fell to 6-7 in one-run games with the loss last night...the seven one-run losses are tied for fourth in the American League...are 4-4 in extra inning games and the eight extra inning contests are second most in the AL behind Los Angeles (9)... are 4-7 in games decided in the last at bat.

MONTH-BY-MONTH: The A's are 6-5 (.556) in the month of May...have a 2.66 ERA (30 er in 101.1 ip), which is second lowest in the majors (Tampa Bay, 2.56)...have surrendered a Major League-low three home runs in 101.1 innings this month...A's starting pitchers are 5-3 with a 2.64 ERA (22 er in 75.0 ip)...the offense is batting .223 (82 for 368), which is third lowest in the AL...finished April with a record of 13-14, the seventh time in the last eight seasons they have not posted a winning record in the month...had a Major League-leading 2.79 ERA, which was the fourth lowest April ERA in Oakland history...it was the lowest since 1981 (1.89)...it was the A's lowest ERA in any month since posting a 2.48 ERA in August, 2005...committed 25 errors, their most in April since making 29 in 1983...had 21 stolen bases, their most in the first month of the season since they had 25 in 1990...had a .305 on-base percentage, which was their lowest in April since posting a .282 mark in 1979 (minimum 10 games).

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list five times this year and 92 times since the start of the 2007 season, which is second most in the majors to Texas (108)...currently have four players on the DL (Braden, Bailey, Harden, Rosales) and have not had fewer than three players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had one...used the DL 23 times last year, which was the second highest total in Oakland history to the record of 25 in 2008.

A's vs. WHITE SOX

The season series is even at two games each...the A's lost the first game in Oakland last night after winning two of three in Chicago, April 11-13...went 5-4 against the White Sox last year and have won the season series in eight of the previous 10 seasons...are now 58-33 (.637) against the White Sox since the start of the 2001 season, which is the **best record by any American League team** over that span...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 285-263 against the White Sox...that breaks down to 150-128 in Oakland and 135-135 in Chicago...all-time, the A's are 962-1018 against Chicago.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Wednesday's rain out in Texas will be made up on Thursday, July 7 at 7:05 pm CDT, a scheduled off day for both clubs.

Grant Balfour has not allowed a run in his last 10 games and 9.2 innings.

David DeJesus had two hits last night and now has 999 for his career...has not committed an error this year and now owns a 273-game errorless streak, which is the longest active streak among all Major League outfielders.

Brian Fuentes is tied for third in the American League with nine saves, while his 196 saves are the most by an active left-hander.

Ryan Sweeney extended his hitting streak to seven games last night (12 for 24, .500), which is an A's season high...has a career-long 140-game errorless streak...that is fourth longest by an outfielder in Oakland history.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In **1941** the A's walk 19 times against St. Louis but lose 10-5...in **1988** Bob Welch tosses a five hit shutout as the A's win at Baltimore, 8-0...in **1995** Geronimo Berroa and Terry Steinbach have four RBI each in the A's 12-3 win at Minnesota...the A's hit five home runs, including two by Berroa.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his eighth appearance and fifth start of the season, his third start...the A's are 2-2 (.500) in his starting assignments this year and 2-4 (.333) in his career...has tossed at least six innings in three of his four starts, allowed two runs or fewer three times and walked two batters or fewer twice.

STARTING AND RELIEVING: Moved into the starting rotation April 22 after Dallas Braden went on the disabled list and is 1-1 with a 2.28 ERA (6 er in 23.2 ip) in his four starting assignments after going 1-1 with a 3.60 ERA in three relief appearances...is now 1-3 with a 3.45 ERA (12 er in 31.1 ip) in six career starts and 2-3 with a 4.91 ERA in 27 career relief appearances.

THE LONG BALL: Has not allowed a home run in 28.2 innings this year, which are the most innings pitched in the majors among pitchers with no home runs...his last home run allowed was June 30 of last year at Baltimore (Tejada)...has allowed just two extra base hits in 2011, both doubles, for a .272 opponents slugging percentage.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .321 (18 for 56) batting average with the bases empty but that mark drops to .170 (8 for 47) with runners on base...opponents are 10 for 27 (.370) with four walks (.452 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning.

THE FIRST FOUR INNINGS: Has allowed just one run in the first four innings of a game (16.0 ip, 0.56 ERA) and has held the opposition to a .218 (12 for 55) batting average over that span...has a 4.97 ERA (7 er in 12.2 ip) and .292 (14 for 48) from the fifth inning on.

IN RELIEF: Did not allow a run in two of his three relief appearances...did not inherit any runners and first batters faced were 2 for 3 (.667)...picked up the win in his first outing April 11 at Chicago when he tossed 3.0 shutout innings for the win in the A's 2-1, 10-inning victory...matched his career high with four strikeouts...took the loss in his second outing April 14 against Detroit when he allowed three runs in the seventh inning of the A's 3-0 loss.

FIRST START: Was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-0 defeat in Seattle April 22...pitched a then-career-high 4.1 innings, but also allowed a career-high four walks and a career-high tying three runs...allowed one run in the second when Wilson delivered an RBI single and then was charged with two more runs in the fifth...allowed a single to Wilson and walked Figgins in the inning before being relieved by Blevins, who allowed both runners to score.

SECOND START: Had a no decision in the A's 2-1, 10-inning win at Los Angeles April 27...needed only 76 pitches to throw a career-high 7.0 innings with the defense turning three double plays behind him...allowed four hits, walked one and recorded three strikeouts...left the game with the A's holding a 1-0 lead...Fuentes then had a blown save in the ninth before the A's came back to win in the 10th inning when a ground out by Jackson allowed Pennington to score.

THIRD START: He had his second consecutive no decision in the A's 4-1 loss to Cleveland last Tuesday in Oakland...shutout the Indians on five hits over the first six innings to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high 13.0 innings...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a LaPorta RBI single in the seventh inning...was relieved by Breslow with one out in the seventh after surrendering a career-high eight hits...Fuentes allowed three runs in the ninth inning for the loss.

LAST START: He picked up his first career win as a starter in the A's 5-2 victory at Kansas City last Sunday...matched his career high with four strikeouts...Oakland scored twice in the top of the first inning and he shutout the Royals on three hits and two walks over the first five innings...the A's added a run in the sixth before he allowed two runs in the bottom of the sixth on a Hosmer RBI double and a Maier RBI single...was relieved by Wuertz to start the seventh with a 3-2 lead.

ROSS vs. CHICAGO: Has faced the White Sox once in his career and it came in relief earlier this year on April 11 at Chicago...relieved Dallas Braden to start the seventh inning with the A's trailing 1-0 and tossed 3.0 scoreless innings (1 h, 1 bb, 4 so)...Oakland tied the game with a run in the ninth and he picked up the win when the A's added another run in the 10th.

2010 RECAP: Made the Opening Day roster as a non-roster invitee and spent half of the season with Oakland...went 1-4 with a save and a 5.49 ERA in 26 games, including two starts, before he was optioned to Sacramento July 7...was 2-1 with a 3.55 ERA in six games, all starts, with the River Cats before he was shut down Aug. 10 with a strained right elbow...with the A's, he struck out 32 in 39.1 innings but also issued 20 walks (4.6 per nine innings)...had a 3.32 ERA over his first 11 appearances, a 7.52 ERA over his final 15 contests...allowed 4-of-10 (40.0%) inherited runners to score...first batters faced were 8-for-21 (.381) with three walks (.458 on-base percentage)...tossed two or more innings in nine of his 24 relief appearances...was named the A's fourth best prospect by *Baseball America* following the season...was also tabbed as having the Best Slider in the magazines' Best Tools survey for prospects.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .271 opponents batting average, including .258 (17-for-66) against left-handed hitters and .282 (22-for-78) against right-handers...surrendered three of his four home runs and issued 14 of his 20 walks to right-handers...opponents batted .323 with runners in scoring position...yielded a .368 batting average to the first four hitters in the batting order, a .207 mark against the bottom five

HOME AND AWAY: Compiled a 2.49 ERA and .221 opponents batting average in 13 appearances in Oakland compared to a 9.17 ERA and .328 opponents average in 13 games on the road...yielded three of his four home runs on the road.

WITH SACRAMENTO: Walked 13 and struck out 30 in 25.1 innings in his Triple-A debut...allowed just one home run...opponents batted .253, including .241 (13 for 54) by right-handed hitters and .273 (9 for 33) by left-handers...allowed a .350 batting average to hitters leading off an inning...yielded five of his 10 runs in the fifth inning, as he posted a 2.08 ERA over the first four innings and a 12.27 ERA in the fifth...had made just two professional relief appearances before being used mostly as a reliever during his stay with Oakland...returned to the starters role with Sacramento, but never pitched more than 5.0 innings as he built up his pitch count...held the opposition to one run or less in four of his first five starts...allowed five runs on eight hits in 5.0 innings Aug. 6 at Albuquerque...notched the win in that game, but it would be his final start of the season...was placed on the disabled list Aug. 10 with a strained right elbow.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Trevor Cahill (6-0, 1.72 ERA): Is scheduled to make his ninth start of the season...is the first A's starting pitcher to begin the season 6-0 since Dave Stewart in 1990...won his final decision of 2010 and now has a career-high-tying seven-game winning streak dating back to October 1, 2010...has a 1.52 ERA and .210 opponents batting average during his current winning streak...is 24-7 with a 2.55 ERA and .215 opponents batting average in 37 starts since May 1, 2010...the wins are the most in the majors over that span...has 34 career wins, which are second most in Oakland history by a pitcher before his 24th birthday (42, Vida Blue)...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 7-2 A's win at Texas last Monday (7.0 ip, 5 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 7 so)...is 1-1 with a 3.93 ERA in six career starts against Chicago...had a no decision in his only start this year, a 6-5 A's loss in 10 innings at Chicago on April 12 (4.2 ip, 6 h, 4 r, 4 er, 3 bb, 3 so)...that is the only start this year in which he allowed more than one run.

ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

4-8, 2.83 ERA (95.1 ip, 77 h, 45 r, 30 er, 48 bb, 84 so, 6 hr)

Save/Save Opportunities: 11/15 (73.3%)

The A's bullpen has allowed one earned run or fewer in 19 of its past 22 games (14 er in 58.2 ip, 2.15 ERA) and now has a 2.83 ERA for the season, which is the best in the American League...however, has been charged with eight of the team's 17 losses, which is tied for the most by a bullpen in the AL and tied for third most in the majors...has 11 saves, which is second most in the AL...has four blown saves for the second best save percentage (73.3%) in the AL...has not allowed a home run in its last 18 games and 51.2 innings...the last home run allowed by an A's reliever was on April 20 against Boston by J.D. Drew (off Blevins)...have the second lowest opponents slugging percentage in the AL (.315) and the third lowest batting average (.223).

40 RHP ANDREW BAILEY

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 30 retroactive to March 22 with a strained right forearm...this is his second career stint on the DL.
- Appeared in just two games this spring, tossing a scoreless inning March 10 against Kansas City and allowing two unearned runs in 0.1 innings March 14 at Cleveland before leaving with his injury.
- Led the A's in saves (25) and was named to the American League All-Star team for the second consecutive season last year...was 1-3 with a 1.47 ERA in 47 relief appearances...ranked seventh among AL relievers in opponents on-base percentage (.251) and eighth in slugging (.292).

First Hitters: 2-16 (1 bb)

- Has not allowed a run over his last 10 games (9.2 ip, 4 h, 8 bb, 13 so) and has not yielded a run in 15 of his 17 outings for the season (1.69 ERA, 3 er in 16.0 ip).
- Has held opponents to a .175 batting average...that includes .115 (3 for 26) against left-handed hitters and .226 (7 for 31) against right-handers...opponents are 0 for 8 with runners in scoring position.
- Is tied for second among American League relievers in wins (2), tied for fourth in walks (11) and tied for eighth in strikeouts (19).
- Has not allowed a run in his seven appearances during day games (6.0 ip, 1 h, 6 bb, 6 so).
- Has not allowed a run in two appearances against the White Sox this season (2.0 ip) and is 2-0 with a 5.04 ERA in 22 career appearances against the team (19.2 ip, 17 h, 12 r, 11 er, 11 bb, 20 so, 3 hr).
- Made 57 relief appearances for Tampa Bay last year, despite spending the month of August on the disabled list...compiled a 2.28 ERA, which ranked eighth among American League relievers...allowed a .216 batting average, including .174 against right-handed hitters.

First Hitters: 7-16 (1 bb)

- Has not allowed a run in 13 of his last 14 outings (2 er in 10.2 ip, 1.69 ERA) and has stranded all five of his inherited runners over that span.
- Has allowed just 1 of 8 (12.5%) inherited runners to score for the season, which is the 10th lowest percentage in the American League...however, first batters faced are 7 for 16 (.438)...the batting average is the fourth highest in the AL and the on-base percentage (.471) is seventh highest.
- Opponents are batting .373, which ranks fourth highest among AL relievers...the batting average includes a .455 (10 for 22) mark against left-handed hitters and .310 (9 for 29) against righties.
- Ranks third among all Major League pitchers with three pickoffs.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his ninth start of the season...the A's are 6-2 (.750) in his starting assignments this year and are 43-27 (.614) in his career...has tossed at least seven innings in five of his eight starts, allowed one run or fewer seven times and has walked two batters or fewer four times.

SEVEN-GAME WINNING STREAK: Won his final decision of 2010 and now has a seven-game winning streak dating back to October 1, 2010...that matches his career high from May 21 to July 1, 2010...has a 1.52 ERA (10 er in 59.1 ip) and .210 (46 for 219) opponents batting average during his current winning streak which spans nine starts...his last loss was on September 26, 2010 against Texas...the last A's pitcher with a winning streak longer than seven games is Dan Haren, who had a 10-game winning streak from April 18 to July 1, 2007.

6-0: Has started the season 6-0 and is the first A's pitcher to win each of his first six decisions since 1996 when Jim Corsi compiled a 6-0 record in relief for the entire season...the last A's starting pitcher to begin the season 6-0 was Dave Stewart in 1990...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the first Athletics pitcher to go 6-0 or better coupled with a sub-2.00 ERA in his first eight starts of a season since Sam Gray went 8-0 with a 1.43 ERA in his first eight starts in 1925...the last time an A's pitcher started the season 7-0 was in 1992 when Jeff Parrett went 7-0 in relief...Cahill is one of two Major Leaguers with a perfect 6-0 record this year (Scherzer, DET).

ONE RUN OR LESS: Has allowed one run or fewer in each of his last five starts and is 5-0 with a 1.03 ERA (4 er in 35.0 ip) over that span...the Oakland record for consecutive starts with one run or fewer is six set by Jim Nash in 1968 (April 30-May 28) and matched by Cory Lidle in 2002 (Aug. 4-31)...has allowed one run or fewer in seven of his eight starts this year.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Leads the American League and ranks second in the majors with a 1.72 ERA...also ranks second in the AL in opponents slugging percentage (.281), tied for second in wins (6) and 10th in opponents batting average (.209) and on-base percentage (.269)...also has a Major League-leading seven wild pitches...that ties Henry Rodriguez' team-leading total from last year.

WINS: Is 24-7 with a 2.55 ERA (69 er in 244.0 ip) and .215 (189 for 878) opponents batting average in 37 starts since May 1, 2010...the wins are the most in the majors over that span...the A's are 27-10 (.730) in games started by Trevor Cahill since May 1 of last year and 61-77 (.442) with all other pitchers...is 34-21 (.618) in his career and the wins are second most in Oakland history by a pitcher before his 24th birthday (42, Vida Blue).

OPPONENTS BATTING: His .209 opponents batting average includes a .179 (17 for 95) mark against right-handed hitters and .114 (4 for 35) with runners in scoring position...the mark with RISP is third lowest in the American League and his average against righties is seventh best...has held the opponents three through five hitters to a .114 (7 for 61) average...has yielded all three of his home runs to the bottom three hitters in the order.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 3-0 with a 1.01 ERA (3 er in 26.2 ip) in four starts at home this year and 3-0 with a 2.45 ERA (7 er in 25.2 ip) in four starts on the road...has the third lowest home ERA in the AL...is now 21-10 with a 3.01 ERA (79 er in 236.1 ip) in 37 career starts in Oakland and 13-11 with a 4.14 ERA (88 er in 191.1 ip) in 33 starts on the road.

THE FIRST INNING: Has not allowed a run in the first inning and opponents are 4 for 27 (.148)...now has a 1.18 ERA (5 er in 38.0 ip) and .175 (22 for 126) opponents batting average in the first inning over the last two years.

2011 START-BY-START: He had a no decision in the A's 6-2 loss to Seattle on Opening Day April 1 in Oakland...became the A's sixth different Opening Day starter in the last six years...at the age of 23 years, 31 days, he was the seventh youngest pitcher to start an opener in Athletics history...only two pitchers in Oakland history have been younger - Vida Blue at the age of 21 years, 251 days in 1971 and Catfish Hunter at the age of 22 years, 2 days in 1968...struck out eight batters in 4.2 innings to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to fan eight or more in fewer than five innings (Ted Lilly, 9 so in 4.2 ip on July 2, 2003 vs. Seattle and Tim Conroy, 9 so in 4.2 ip on June 17, 1984 vs. Chicago)...earned his first win of the season in a 2-1 victory at Toronto April 7...gave up a leadoff single to Hill in the second inning and then retired the next 12 batters he faced before Arencibia doubled to start the sixth...Arencibia later scored on a Nix single...was replaced by Fuentes to start the ninth...had a no decision in the A's 6-5, 10-inning loss at Chicago April 12...surrendered all four of his runs in the second inning...Ramirez hit a three-run home run, then Konerko later drove in Pierre by grounding into a force out...earned the win in a 5-1 decision over Detroit April 17 in Oakland...allowed his only run when Wells led off the sixth inning with a home run...earned the win in the A's 9-1 victory at Seattle April 23...allowed a run in the second inning when Wilson had an RBI single and then held the Mariners scoreless over the next four innings...extended his season winning streak to four games in the A's 3-1 victory over Texas April 29...walked three batters in the first inning, the fifth time in his career he walked three batters in an inning (last: July 17, 2009 vs. LAA)...improved to 5-0 with a 3-1 victory over Cleveland May 4 in Oakland...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a RBI single to Hafner in the third inning...that was the only run he would allow in his seven innings pitched.

LAST START: Was the winning pitcher in the A's 7-2 victory at Texas last Monday...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed one run, his third consecutive start of seven or more innings and one run or fewer...the Rangers cored their only run on a lead-off home run by Moreland in the fifth.

CAHILL vs. CHICAGO: Is 1-1 with a 3.93 ERA (34.1 ip, 30 h, 16 r, 15 er, 12 bb, 17 so, 2 hr) in six career starts...is 0-0 with a 6.08 ERA (9 er in 13.1 ip) in three starts in Chicago and 1-1 with a 2.57 ERA (6 er in 21.0 ip) in three starts in Oakland...had a no decision in his only start this year, a 6-5 A's loss in 10 innings at Chicago on April 12...the A's scored a run in the second inning but he allowed four runs in the bottom of the second on a three-run home run by Ramirez and a Konerko fielders choice...was relieved by Breslow with two outs in the fifth inning after throwing 97 pitches...left trailing 4-3 but the A's scored twice in the sixth to get him off the hook.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his ninth start of the season...the A's are 3-5 (.375) in his starting assignments this year and are 25-32 (.439) in his career...has tossed seven or more innings in four of his eight starts, allowed two runs or fewer five times and walked two batters or fewer six times.

TWO-GAME LOSING STREAK: Is 0-2 with a 6.27 ERA (13 er in 18.2 ip), eight walks and four home runs allowed over his last three starts after going 2-1 with a 1.56 ERA, four walks and no home runs over his first five starts (34.2 ip).

ON THE BASES: Has picked off five base runners over his first eight starts this year, which is **tied for the Major League lead** ...that is already a career-high as he had four in each of his previous two seasons...now has 13 pickoffs in his career, which is **tied for fifth** most in the majors over that span (since 2009)...opponents have been caught stealing a **ML-leading** six times this year and have a stolen base percentage of 33.3% (3 sb), which is **seventh** lowest in the American League.

DON'T WALK: Has issued just 12 walks in 53.1 innings for an average of 2.03 walks per nine innings...that is the **ninth** lowest mark in the American League...with 40 strikeouts, he also ranks **10th** in the AL in strikeout to walk ratio (3.33)...has walked one batter or fewer in six of his eight starts...issued a career-high-tying four walks in each of his other two starts...has now walked one batter or fewer in 35 of his 57 career starts (61.4%), including 12 starts without a walk.

FIRST START: He had a no decision in the A's 5-2 loss to Seattle April 2 in Oakland...blanked the Mariners on three hits and a walk over the first five innings and took a 1-0 lead into the sixth...allowed a two out single to Bradley, who stole second and scored on a Cust single...was relieved by Breslow to start the seventh inning with the scored tied at 1-1.

SECOND START: Took the loss despite pitching a complete game in a 2-1 defeat at Minnesota April 8...it was his second career complete game, his first since a two-hit shutout in Boston on July 6, 2009...allowed a base hit to Morneau in the first inning and then retired 14 consecutive batters...pitched seven shutout innings before allowing two runs in the eighth when Span and Mauer had back-to-back RBI singles.

THIRD START: Had a no decision in the A's 7-4, 10-inning win in Chicago April 13...allowed three runs, two earned, on nine hits in 5.2 innings...held the White Sox scoreless over the first four innings...made a fielding error in the fifth to allow Pierre to reach base, who then scored on a double by Beckham...then allowed two more runs in the sixth...Castro drove in the first run after reaching on a fielder's choice and then a Morel sacrifice bunt brought in the second run...was replaced by Breslow following a Pierre single, who then stranded both runners by getting Beckham to pop out to short.

ANDERSON vs. LOS ANGELES: Is 0-2 with a 4.68 ERA (25.0 ip, 25 h, 13 r, 13 er, 4 bb, 11 so, 1 hr) in four career starts...is 0-1 with a 5.84 ERA (8 er in 12.1 ip) in two starts in Los Angeles and 0-1 with a 3.55 ERA (5 er in 12.2 ip) in two starts in Oakland...made just one start against the Angels last year and had a no decision in a 6-5 loss at Los Angeles September 27...the A's scored once in the first and twice in the second to give him a 3-0 lead but he allowed three runs in the bottom of the second on an Izturis RBI single, an Aybar fielders choice and a Kendrick RBI single...the A's scored a run in the fourth to take a 4-3 lead and he was relieved by Ziegler after allowing a one-out single in the seventh...the bullpen allowed that run to score plus two more for the blown save and loss...went 0-2 with a 4.34 ERA in three starts in 2009...including a no decision in the A's 1-0, 10 inning loss in Oakland on July 19...retired each of the first 20 batters he faced before Abreu singled with two outs in the seventh inning to break up the perfect game.
