A's vs. TWINS

The season series is even at two games each...lost the first game in Oakland last night after winning two of three in Minnesota in April...lost the season series last year 3-6 and have won just one season series over the previous five seasons...are 22-28 against Minnesota since 2006...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 271-283 against Minnesota...that includes 150-123 in Oakland and 121-160 in Minnesota...are 328-352 all-time against the Twins and have a 975-988 record against the Twins/Senators.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour has not allowed a run in his last 13 games and 13.1 innings...the longest scoreless streak of his career is 14.2 innings from June 8 to July 9, 2008...now has a 1.37 ERA for the season, which is tied for eighth among American League relievers.

David DeJesus had his 25-game hitting streak against the Twins last night...that fell one short of the record for longest hitting streak against Minnesota (26, Ron LeFlore)...has not committed an error this year and now owns a 277-game errorless streak, the longest active streak among Major League outfielders.

Mark Ellis has 998 career hits and needs two more to become the 12th player in Oakland history to reach the 1,000 plateau.

Brian Fuentes is tied for fifth in the American League with nine saves...he has 196 career saves, which are the most among active left-handers.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In 1971 Vida Blue tosses a threehit shutout and Rick Monday and Reggie Jackson homer in the A's 3-0 win over Milwaukee...in 2004 Bobby Kielty homers twice and drives in four runs as the A's defeat Detroit, 6-2...in 2006 Dan Haren and Huston Street combine on a two-hit shutout as the A's defeat San Francisco, 1-0.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Are 13-10 (.565) over the last 23 games (since April 23), which is the fourth best record in the American League...have not won or lost more than two games in a row over that span...are one game over .500 for the season at 22-21...have been between two games over and two games under .500 every day since April 9...have been exactly .500 a total of 12 times...last season, were exactly .500 an Athletics-record 33 times...are in second place in the AL West, one game behind Texas...were in a tie for first on May 17, marking the first time the A's were in first since June 3 of last year...have spent one day tied for first, two days in second, eight days tied for second, 32 days in third, two days tied for third and four days in fourth...swept a two-game series from Los Angeles to start the week, snapping a season-opening streak of 13 consecutive series with out a sweep or being swept...that is the longest such streak in Oakland history...are 9-4 (.692) in games started by a left-handed pitcher, which is the third best record in the AL...are 13-17 (.433) against right-handed starters...are 6-9 in the first game of a series, 10-4 in the last game and 6-8 in all other games

CLOSE CALLS: The A's lost last night in 10 innings, 4-3...it was the A's 10th extra inning game of the season, which ties the Angels for the most in the majors...are 5-5 in extra innings...last year, the A's played just 11 extra inning games the entire season and were 4-7...are now 5-8 in games decided in the last at bat...fell to 7-9 in one-run decisions with the loss last night...are tied for the most one-run losses in the American League and are tied for the second most one-run decisions...the A's blew a three-run lead Monday night but came back to win 5-4 in 10 innings...it was the A's fifth win this year when trailing after seven innings, which is tied with Kansas City for the AL lead...last year, the A's had just two wins when trailing after seven innings the entire season.

NIGHT AND DAY: The A's are 11-5 (.688) in day games and 11-16 (.407) at night...have the second best day record in the American League (New York 9-3, .750) and are tied for the second worst mark at night...have a 2.17 ERA (36 er in 149.0 ip) during the day compared to 2.99 (80 er in 241.0 ip) at night...the day ERA is the lowest in the majors (Philadelphia, 2.21)...are batting .263 (147 for 558) with 12 home runs in 16 day games and .226 (204 for 903) with 12 home runs in 27 contests at night...the night batting average is third lowest in the AL.

PITCHING: The A's pitching staff has compiled a 2.49 ERA (41 er in 148.1 ip) in the month of May after posting a 2.79 ERA in April...the May ERA is the lowest in the majors (Arizona, 2.61)...now have a **Major League-leading** 2.68 ERA for the season, a mark that is more than a half-run lower than the next closest American League team (Cleveland, 3.36)...lead the AL in opponents slugging percentage (.330) and on-base percentage (.303) and have the fourth lowest batting average (.240)...have yielded 22 home runs, which is the fewest in the majors (San Francisco, 23)...shutout the Angels 14-0 Tuesday, the A's third shutout of the season...that is tied for fifth in the AL.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 17-12 with a **Major League-leading** 2.71 ERA (85 er in 282.2 ip)...have allowed just 16 home runs, which is the fewest in the majors (Philadelphia, 17)...have the lowest opponents slugging percentage in the American League (.340), are tied for the lead in complete games (3), rank second in innings pitched (282.2) and third in strikeouts (211) and on-base percentage (.302).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's committed their 33rd error of the season last night, which is second most in the American League...the errors have led to 28 unearned runs, which is the **most in the majors**...have turned 47 double plays, which is fourth most in the AL...10 of the A's 33 errors have be made by pitchers, which is the **most in the majors**.

OFFENSE: The A's are batting .282 (59 for 209) with 34 runs scored over the first six games of the homestand...however, have just 163 runs scored for the season, which is third fewest in the American League...also have the third lowest batting average (.240), on-base percentage (.308) and slugging percentage (.355)...have just one home run on the homestand and 24 for the season, which is third fewest in the AL...have the second fewest strikeouts (253)...are 15-3 when scoring four runs or more and 7-18 when scoring fewer than four.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 3-3 on this seven-game homestand against Chicago (1-2), Los Angeles (2-0) and Minnesota (0-1)...went 4-3 on the last homestand and are 11-11 at home for the season...begin a seven-game road trip to San Francisco (three games) and Los Angeles (four games) tomorrow...went 3-2 on the last road trip through Kansas City (2-1) and Texas (1-1)...are 11-10 on the road and are tied for the third best road record in the American League.

ON THE BASES: The A's **lead the majors** with 11 pickoffs...opponents have been successful in only 19 of 38 (50.0%) stolen base attempts, which is the lowest percentage in the majors...the 19 caught stealings also lead the majors...offensively, the A's have been caught stealing 14 times, which is tied for fourth most in the American League...have the third lowest stolen percentage (28 for 42, 66.7%).

20 GAMES IN 20 DAYS: The A's are 3-3 in this stretch of 20 consecutive days without a day off that began last Friday night...all 20 games will be played in California...following this seven game homestand with Chicago, Los Angeles and Minnesota the A's have a seven-game road trip to San Francisco and Los Angeles (AL)...conclude the 20-game stretch with a six-game homestand against Baltimore and New York from May 27 to June 1.

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: The A's begin the 15th season of interleague play tomorrow...went 8-10 against the National League last year, just the fourth time the A's finished with a losing record in interleague games...are 136-112 (.548) all-time, which is tied for the sixth best interleague record.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list five times this year and 92 times since the start of the 2007 season, which is second most in the majors to Texas (109)...currently have four players on the DL (Braden, Bailey, Harden, Rosales) and have not had fewer than three players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had one...used the DL 23 times last year, which was the second highest total in Oakland history to the record of 25 in 2008.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his ninth appearance and sixth start of the season...the A's are 3-2 (.600) in his starting assignments this year and 3-4 (.429) in his career...has tossed at least six innings in four of his five starts, allowed two runs or fewer four times and walked two batters or fewer three times.

CONSECUTIVE WINS: Has picked up the win in each of his last two starts, marking the first time in his career he has won back-to-back decisions...is now 2-0 with a

1.69 ERA (5 er in 26.2 ip) over his last four starts after going 1-2 with a 4.82 ERA over his first four games, including one start.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 2-0 with a 1.69 ERA (4 er in 21.1 ip) and .227 (17 for 75) opponents batting average in four games during the day and 1-2 with a 3.68 ERA (6 er in 14.2 ip) and .273 (15 for 55) opponents batting average in four games at night...has the sixth lowest day ERA in the American League.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed his first home run of the season in his last start and has yielded just four extra base hits (three doubles) this year for a .292 opponents slugging percentage...has allowed a .306 (22 for 72) batting average with the bases empty but that mark drops to .172 (10 for 58) with runners on base...opponents are 12 for 34 (.353) with five walks (.436 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning.

THE FIRST FOUR INNINGS: Has allowed just one run in the first four innings of a game (20.0 ip, 0.45 ERA) and has held the opposition to a .206 (14 for 68) batting average over that span...has a 5.06 ERA (9 er in 16.0 ip) and .290 (18 for 62) from the fifth inning on.

STARTING AND RELIEVING: Moved into the starting rotation April 22 after Dallas Braden went on the disabled list and is 2-1 with a 2.32 ERA (8 er in 31.0 ip) in his five starting assignments after going 1-1 with a 3.60 ERA in three relief appearances...is now 2-3 with a 3.26 ERA (14 er in 38.2 ip) in seven career starts and 2-3 with a 4.91 ERA in 27 career relief appearances.

IN RELIEF: Did not allow a run in two of his three relief appearances...did not inherit any runners and first batters faced were 2 for 3 (.667)...picked up the win in his first outing April 11 at Chicago when he tossed 3.0 shutout innings for the win in the A's 2-1, 10-inning victory...took the loss in his second outing April 14 against Detroit when he allowed three runs in the seventh inning of the A's 3-0 loss.

FIRST START: Was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-0 defeat in Seattle April 22...pitched 4.1 innings, but allowed a career-high four walks and a career-high tying three runs...allowed one run in the second when Wilson delivered an RBI single and then was charged with two more runs in the fifth...allowed a single to Wilson and walked Figgins in the inning before being relieved by Blevins, who allowed both runners to

SECOND START: Had a no decision in the A's 2-1, 10-inning win at Los Angeles April 27...needed only 76 pitches to throw a then career-high 7.0 innings with the defense turning three double plays behind him...allowed four hits, walked one and recorded three strikeouts...left the game with the A's holding a 1-0 lead...Fuentes then had a blown save in the ninth before the A's came back to win in the 10th inning when a ground out by Jackson allowed Pennington to score.

THIRD START: He had his second consecutive no decision in the A's 4-1 loss to Cleveland last Tuesday in Oakland...shutout the Indians on five hits over the first six innings to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high 13.0 innings...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a LaPorta RBI single in the seventh inning...was relieved by Breslow with one out in the seventh after surrendering a career-high eight hits...Fuentes allowed three runs in the ninth inning for the loss.

FOURTH START: He picked up his first career win as a starter in the A's 5-2 victory at Kansas City May 8...Oakland scored twice in the top of the first inning and he shutout the Royals on three hits and two walks over the first five innings...the A's added a run in the sixth before he allowed two runs in the bottom of the sixth on a Hosmer RBI double and a Maier RBI single...was relieved by Wuertz to start the seventh with a 3-2 lead.

LAST START: He won his second consecutive decision in the A's 6-2 win over Chicago last Saturday in Oakland...struck out a career-high eight batters, doubling his previous high of four...also tossed a careerbest 7.1 innings...blanked the White Sox on three hits and a walk over the first five innings...had a 5-0 lead when he allowed his first home run of the season, a two-run shot by Konerko with two outs in the sixth.

ROSS vs. MINNESOTA: Is 0-0 with a 13.50 ERA (0.2 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 so, 1 hr) in two career appearances, both in relief last year...retired the only two batters he faced June 4 in Oakland (0.2 ip, 1 so) and then allowed a home run to the only batter he faced (Young) two days later.

2010 RECAP: Made the Opening Day roster as a non-roster invitee and spent half of the season with Oakland...went 1-4 with a save and a 5.49 ERA in 26 games, including two starts, before he was optioned to Sacramento July 7...was 2-1 with a 3.55 ERA in six games, all starts, with the River Cats before he was shut down Aug. 10 with a strained right elbow...with the A's, he struck out 32 in 39.1 innings but also issued 20 walks (4.6 per nine innings)...had a 3.32 ERA over his first 11 appearances, a 7.52 ERA over his final 15 contests...allowed 4-of-10 (40.0%) inherited runners to score...first batters faced were 8-for-21 (.381) with three walks (.458 on-base percentage)...tossed two or more innings in nine of his 24 relief appearances...was named the A's fourth best prospect by Baseball America following the season...was also tabbed as having the Best Slider in the magazines' Best Tools survey for prospects.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .271 opponents batting average, including .258 (17-for-66) against lefthanded hitters and .282 (22-for-78) against right-handers...surrendered three of his four home runs and issued 14 of his 20 walks to right-handers...opponents batted .323 with runners in scoring position...yielded a .368 batting average to the first four hitters in the batting order, a .207 mark against the bottom five

HOME AND AWAY: Compiled a 2.49 ERA and .221 opponents batting average in 13 appearances in Oakland compared to a 9.17 ERA and .328 opponents average in 13 games on the road...yielded three of his four home runs on the road.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Trevor Cahill (6-1, 1.82 ERA): Is scheduled to make his 10th start of the season...is tied for the American League lead in wins (6) and ranks second in ERA (1.82)...was the losing pitcher in his last start, a 4-3 loss to Chicago last Sunday (7.0 ip, 10 h, 4 r, 2 er, 2 bb, 1 so)...the loss snapped his season-opening winning streak at six games...is the first A's pitcher to start the season 6-0 since Jim Corsi went 6-0 in 1996 and is the first A's starting pitcher to begin the season 6-0 since Dave Stewart in 1990...it ended his overall winning streak at a career-high tying seven games...is 24-8 with a 2.55 ERA in 38 starts since May 1, 2010 and the wins are the most in the majors over that span...has allowed a .122 batting average with runners in scoring position, which is tied for the second lowest mark in the AL...went 3-0 with a 2.42 ERA in four interleague starts last year and is 5-2 with a 3.10 ERA in eight career interleague starts...is 2-0 with a 1.32 ERA in two career starts against San Francisco, both in Oakland

The A's bullpen has allowed one earned run or fewer in 24 of its past 27 games (15 er in 70.2 ip, 1.91 ERA) and now has a 2.60 ERA for the season, which is the best in the American League...however, has been charged with nine of the team's 21 losses, which is tied for the most by a bullpen in the AL...has pitched 107.1 innings this season, which are the second fewest by a bullpen in the AL...has 11 saves, which ranks third in the AL...has five blown saves for the third best save percentage (68.8%) in the AL...has not allowed a home run in its last 23 games and 63.2 innings...the last home run allowed by an A's reliever was on April 20 against Boston (J.D. Drew off Blevins)...have the lowest opponents slugging ercentage in the AL (.302), second lowest batting average (.217) and third lowest on-base percentage (.303)

- Is scheduled to make a rehab appearance with Triple-A Sacramento on Friday...pitched one scoreless inning and threw 19 pitches Tuesday in a rehab appearance at extended spring training and has a 4.50 ERA in two rehab appearances (2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 1 so).
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 30 retroactive to March 22 with a strained right forearm...this is his second career stint on the DL.
- Appeared in just two games this spring, tossing a scoreless inning March 10 against Kansas City and allowing two unearned runs in 0.1 innings March 14 at Cleveland before leaving with his injury.
- Led the A's in saves (25) and was named to the American League All-Star team for the second consecutive season last year...was 1-3 with a 1.47 ERA in 47 relief appearances...ranked seventh among AL relievers in opponents on-base percentage (.251) and eighth in slugging (.292).

- Earned his third win of the season Monday, which is tied for first among AL relievers...is also tied for third in strikeouts (24), tied for fifth in appearances (20) and tied for eighth in walks (11).
- Has held opponents to a .174 batting average...opponents are 0 for 11 with runners in scoring position.

Has allowed just 1 of 8 (12.5%) inherited runners to score for the season, which is tied for the 10th lowest percentage in the American League...however, first batters faced are 7 for 17 (.412), which is tied for fifth highest in the AL.
- Opponents are batting .352, which ranks ninth highest among AL relievers...the batting average includes a .435 (10 for 23) mark against lefthanded hitters and .290 (9 for 31) against righties.
- Is tied for third among Major League pitchers in pickoffs (3) and is tied for seventh in the AL in losses (2).

SECOND START: Earned his second win of the season after pitching six shutout innings in a 1-0 victory in Minnesota April 9...held the Twins to four hits, all singles, while walking two and recording four strikeouts...allowed two hits over the game's first four innings before giving up a pair of singles to start the fifth inning...then got a groundout, pop out and another groundout to get out of the inning...pitched a scoreless sixth before giving way to Balfour and Fuentes, who kept the shutout intact.

THIRD START: Had a no decision in the A's 3-0 loss to the Tigers April 14...did not allow a run for his second consecutive start as he gave up only two hits while striking out six...however, did walk six batters, which matched his career high (also Aug. 15, 2009 vs. CWS)...was replaced by Ross to start the seventh inning after throwing 103 pitches...Ross allowed one run in the seventh and two in the eighth as he went on to take the loss.

FOURTH START: Took the loss in the A's 5-3 defeat to Boston April 20...recorded a season-high nine strikeouts and only walked one...however, allowed four runs on eight hits over six innings...gave up an RBI single to Crawford in the second, snapping a career high 18.0 inning scoreless streak...Youkilis homered to lead off the fourth...allowed two more runs in the sixth in the form of a Lowrie home run...gave way to Blevins to start the seventh inning.

FIFTH START: Was charged with his second loss in a row in the A's 5-0 defeat in Los Angeles April 25...allowed a season-high five runs, four earned, over five innings, his shortest start of the year...surrendered two runs in the second on a Wells single, one in the third on an Abreu double and two more in the fourth when Kendrick came in on a Crisp error and Aybar scored as Mathis hit into a double play...then threw a scoreless fifth before he was replaced by Purcey after throwing 95 pitches.

RAINED OUT: Had his last scheduled start rained out May 11 at Texas...allowed seven runs on six hits and five walks while striking out one in 2.2 innings, including a grand slam by Moreland...however, the game was halted due to rain with the Rangers leading 7-0 after the top of the fourth inning and was cancelled after a 2 hour and 14 minute delay.

LAST START: He combined with Breslow and Magnuson on a two-hit shutout in the A's 14-0 win over Los Angeles last Tuesday in Oakland...tossed seven of the innings and allowed just one hit and one walk...retired each of the first 11 batters before walking Izturis with two outs in the fourth...surrendered his only hit when Kendrick singled to leadoff the fifth...neither base runner advanced past first base.

GONZALEZ vs. SAN FRANCISCO: Is 1-2 with a 4.24 ERA (17.0 ip, 18 h, 10 r, 8 er, 7 bb, 15 so, 3 hr) in three career starts...went 1-1 with a 2.70 ERA (4 er in 13.1 ip) in two starts last year...the win came on May 22 in Oakland when he combined with Bailey on a three-hit shutout in the A's 1-0 win...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed two hits while walking one...allowed a two-out single to Sanchez in the first and a one-out walk to Huff followed by a Torres single in the second...then retired each of the final 20 batters he faced before he was relieved by Bailey to start the ninth...the loss came in a 6-2 decision in San Francisco on June 11...the A's scored a run in the first, but he allowed a two-run home run to Burrell in the third and a two-run home run to Molina in the sixth...was relieved by Ziegler following the Molina home run with the A's trailing 4-1
