TODAY IN YANKEES HISTORY

May 30, 1956: Batting against Pedro Ramos in Game 2 of a doubleheader vs. Washington, Mickey Mantle nearly hits a home run out of Yankee Stadium, as the ball strikes the upper deck frieze in right field.

TOMORROW IN YANKEES HISTORY

May 31, 1948: A Memorial Day crowd of 62,626 at Yankee Stadium watches starter Spec Shea allow just two singles to Washington. Four Yankees have three hits apiece (Yogi Berra, Charlie Keller, Bobby Brown and George McQuinn) as the Yankees win 10-0.

AT A GLANCE: The Yankees will begin a three-game series at Oakland today...is the second stop of a nine-game, 10-day road trip also including series in Seattle (1-2 from Friday-Sunday) and Los Angeles-AL (Friday-Sunday)...is their first of two West Coast trips this season, and matches their longest road trip of the season (also nine games in 10 days from 9/9-18 (at Los Angeles-AL, Seattle and Toronto).

- ✦ At 28-23 (.549), rank second in the AL East behind Boston (-1.0G)...have been in first, or had at least a share of first place, 38 of the first 60 days this season...own the AL's third-best winning pct. (also trailing Cleveland, 31-19).
- ✦ Have won eight of their last 12 games...comes on the heels of their season-high six-game losing streak.
- ✦ The Yankees' 21 road games played are the fewest in the Majors this season...are tied with Kansas City and Texas for the most home games played in the Majors in 2011 (30).
- ✦ Thursday's off day ended a stretch of 16 games in 16 days for the Yankees (went 8-8), and a longer stretch of 32 games in 33 days (went 17-15).

YESTERDAY'S RECAP: The Yankees snapped their two-game losing streak and avoided a sweep with a 7-1 win at Seattle...**LHP CC Sabathia** held the Mariners to 1ER in 8.0IP (5H, 3BB, 5K, 1HR), winning his third straight start...each Yankees starter had at least one hit...**RF Nick Swisher** (1-for-2) homered in the second, his first as a right-handed batter this season...**LF Andruw Jones** (1-for-3) had a bases-clearing double in the third...**SS Eduardo Nunez** (1-for-4) followed with his first career triple...**CF Curtis Granderson** (3-for-5) doubled twice and scored 2R.

1961 REVISITED: **1B Mark Teixeira** (15HR) and **CF Curtis Granderson** (16HR) became the first Yankees teammates to each hit at least 15 homers in the team's first 50 games of a season since Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris did it in 1961, according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*...overall, they are the fourth set of Yankees teammates to accomplish the feat: also Lou Gehrig and Babe Ruth (twice, 1928 and '30) and Yogi Berra and Mickey Mantle (1956).

HOMER HAPPY: The Yankees lead the Majors in home runs (79) and multi-home run games (24) this season...have homered in 40 of the team's 51 games in 2011...have scored a Major League-high 49.6 percent of their runs via HR (264 total runs, 131 via HR).

- ✦ According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, the Yankees' total of 78HR through their first 50 games was their second-highest total in franchise history through their first 50 games of a season behind 2009 (80HR).
- ✦ The Yankees have three players with double-digit home runs in 2011 (Granderson-16, Teixeira-15 and Cano-10), the most on any team this season.

OPENING ACT: The Yankees have lost five of their last six series openers, and are 8-10 overall this season in the first game of a series.

UNDER THE SUN: The Yankees are 12-3 (.800) in day games this season, marking the best record in the Majors in day games in 2011...are batting .282 in day contests, the fourth-highest average in the Majors, and have scored a Major League-high 6.73 runs/game (101R / 15G).

ANNIVERSARY DAY, PART 2: Sixteen years ago today (5/30/95), **SS Derek Jeter** recorded his first career hit with a fifth-inning single off Tim Belcher...Jeter's 2,980 hits since his first hit are more than any other Major League player over the stretch...teammate Alex Rodriguez (2,701H) has the second-most hits over the span.

COUNT TO 10: **2B Robinson Cano** hit his 10th HR of the season in Saturday's at Seattle, marking seven straight seasons with at least 10HR to begin his Major League career...according to ESPN Stats, joins the Yankees Joe Gordon (11 straight, 1938-50) as the only second basemen (played 50% of games at 2B) all time to accomplish the feat.

ON THE MARK: **1B Mark Teixeira** has homered in six of his last 10 contests (6HR), with 14RBI over the stretch...has scored 9R in his last 11 games...his 9HR in May are tied with three others including teammate Curtis Granderson for third-most in the Majors this month...10 of his 15HR have come with men on base, and 10 of his 15HR have come over the first three innings.

ACE IN THE HOLE: **LHP CC Sabathia** has won his last three starts and is 6-2 with a 3.17ERA (59.2IP, 21ER) over his last eight starts...has tossed at least 8.0IP in each of his last three starts, matching his longest such stretch as a Yankee - also 6/20-7/1/10.

- ✦ According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, with yesterday's win at Seattle has won each of his four starts in which the Yankees were in danger of being swept in a series: also 8/2/09 at Chicago-AL, 9/13/09 vs. Baltimore and 7/1/10 vs. Seattle.

- ✦ **HOMETOWN HERO:** Will throw out the ceremonial first pitch as part of the North Vallejo Little League Spring Classic on Wednesday, 6/1...Sabathia underwrote the rebuilding of North Vallejo Little League's Thurmon Field - the field he played on as a youth - through his PitCCh In Foundation.

SPEED DEMON: **SS Derek Jeter** established a franchise record with his 327th career stolen base in Saturday's loss at Seattle, surpassing Rickey Henderson (326SB in four-and-a-half seasons with the Yankees) for the most steals in franchise history...according

to Elias, is one of three players who are the franchise leaders in SB for their current team: Ichiro Suzuki (395SB w/Seattle) and Jose Reyes (350SB w/the Mets)

SKIPPING AHEAD: Manager **Joe Girardi** recorded his 314th career win as Yankees manager on Wednesday vs. Toronto, surpassing Buck Showalter (313) for sole possession of eighth place on the franchise's all-time managerial wins list...next up is Clark Griffith with 419 career wins as Yankees manager.



YANKEES ON MEMORIAL DAY: The Yankees are 21-17 on Memorial Day since 1971 (when the holiday first began to be celebrated on the last Monday in May following the National Holiday Act of 1971)...did not play on Memorial Day in 1973, 2004 or 2005.

THIS DAY IN JOLTIN' JOE'S STREAK: This year marks the 70th anniversary of Joe DiMaggio's all-time Major League-best 56-game hitting streak...on this day in 1941 *in the 15th game of his streak*, DiMaggio went 1-for-2 with 1R in the Yankees' 4-3 win in Game 1 of a doubleheader at Fenway Park...scored one of three ninth-inning runs for the Yankees...*in the 16th game of his streak*, went 1-for-3 with a double in the second game of a 5/30 doubleheader at Fenway Park, a 13-0 loss...hit .408 (91-for-223) with 56R, 56 singles, 16 doubles, 4 triples, 15HR, 55RBI and 21BB as the Yankees went 41-13 with 2 ties over the record-setting stretch from 5/15-7/16/41...the team was off the next day (5/31/41).

FIRST THINGS FIRST: Yankees pitchers have allowed opposing No. 1 hitters to hit a Major League-low .185 (41-for-222) with a .245 OBP (second-lowest in Majors) in 2011.

ALEXCELLENT: **3B Alex Rodriguez** has hit safely in his last nine games, a season-high streak...is batting .377 (20-for-53) with 8R, 1 double, 3HR, 5RBI, 2BB and five multi-hit contests in his last 12 games.

MILESTONE WATCH: **SS Derek Jeter** has 2,980 career hits and needs 5H to tie Sam Rice (2,985) for 28th place on Baseball's all-time list...needs 20H to become the 28th player in Baseball history to reach 3,000H...has 1,714R and needs 6R to tie Willie Keeler for 22nd place on Baseball's all-time...**3B Alex Rodriguez** has 1,858 career RBI and needs 6RBI to tie Mel Ott (1,864) for ninth on Baseball's all-time list...has 622 career HR and needs 8HR to tie Ken Griffey Jr. (630) for fifth all-time...has 1,786 career runs and needs 13R to tie Ted Williams (1,799) for 16th place all time.

GRAND PLANS: **CF Curtis Granderson** is second in the Majors with 16HR (Jose Bautista-20)...has 30HR since 8/14/10, marking the second-most HR in the Majors over the span (Bautista-38)...did not hit his 16th HR in 2010 until 9/2/10 vs. Oakland in his 109th game (when he also hit No. 17)...is averaging 1HR per 12.19AB in 2011, the second-best ratio in the Majors (Bautista-1HR/8.00AB).

✳ Hit his Major League-leading eighth HR off LHP this season in 5/21 win vs. the Mets...no other LH batter has more than 4HR off LHP in 2011...has hit the 8HR in just 54AB off LHP in 2011, surpassing his previous career best of 5HR vs. LHP in 2008 (in 147AB)...had 4HR in 158AB off lefties in 2010.

✳ Has 29RBI and scored 32 runs in 33 games while batting in the No. 2 spot in the lineup this season...since moving permanently into the No. 2 spot in the lineup on 5/6, has hit .304 (28-for-92) with 24R, 8HR, 19RBI, 12BB and a .390 on-base percentage...leads the majors in runs scored over the stretch, is tied third in home runs and is tied for fourth in RBI.

✳ Has scored a run in eight consecutive games since 5/21, matching his career high streak (also 8/27-9/4/08 w/Detroit).

GAME RESET: Please note the Yankees-Twins game postponed on 4/6, will be made up on Monday, 9/19 at 1:05 p.m. at Yankee Stadium.

PEN-MANSHIP: **RHP Lance Pendleton** has not allowed a run in his first 8.1 career IP (6 games), holding opponents to a .167 batting average (5-for30)...is the fourth-longest scoreless stretch by a Yankee to begin his Major League career over the last 15 years (since 1996) behind Joba Chamberlain (15.1IP, 8/7-9/12/07), Matt Smith (12.0IP, 4/14-7/3/08) and Phil Coke (11.2IP, 9/1-23/08).

TRIPLING THEIR PLEASURE: The Yankees have hit 12 triples this season, tied for third-most among AL teams...six different Yankees have recorded at least one triple (Cano-1, Chavez-1, Gardner-3, Granderson-5, Jeter-1 and Nunez-1)...**CF Curtis Granderson's** 56 triples are the most in the Majors over the last five years (since 2007).

KEEPING UP WITH THE JONES: **LF Andruw Jones** has 11 hits off left-handed pitching this season, six of which have gone for extra bases (2 doubles, 4HR)...recorded his 41st career multi-homer games in Wednesday's win vs. Toronto...also had a two-homer game at Yankee Stadium on 5/1/10 w/Chicago-AL...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the third player with two-homer games in the Bronx both for and against the Yankees in a span of two-or-fewer seasons: also Ruben Sierra (1995-1996) and Cecil Fielder (in 1996).

TOUGH STRETCH: Beginning today, the Yankees will play their next 16 games against teams currently at or above .500 with a combined winning percentage of .543 (144-121)...will play each of the current AL division leaders over the stretch - all over their next homestand (6/7-16).

FRONTRUNNERS: The Yankees have outscored their opposition 77-44 over the first two innings this season (39-16 in the first inning and 38-28 in the second)...have scored the game's first run in 31 of their 51 contests this season (60.8%).

MO-LLENIUM: **RHP Mariano Rivera** pitched in his 1,000th career game in Wednesday's win vs. Toronto, becoming the 15th pitcher all time to reach the 1,000-appearance plateau and the first to reach the total with one team (credit: *Elias*)...no pitcher has appeared in more games for a single team in Baseball history...is one game shy of tying Goose Gossage (1,002) for 14th place on Baseball's all-time games pitched list.

HOUDINI: **RHP David Robertson** has allowed an earned run in just two of his 24 appearances this season...has struck out a batter in all but three outings...opponents are just 5-for-41 (.122) with runners in scoring position against Robertson...has held opponents to 1H in 8AB with 7K with the bases loaded this season...has stranded 17 of his 23 inherited runners in 2011.

✳ Visited his hometown of Tuscaloosa, Ala., on Thursday's off day, touring the tornado-ravaged area...he and his wife, Erin, have established the David and Erin Robertson Foundation to raise funds to donate to the relief efforts in his hometown (www.highsocksforhope.com)...David will donate \$100 for every strikeout he records this season.

"THIS DAY IN 1961" - 50th ANNIVERSARY (also see p. 285 of the 2011 Yankees Media Guide)

May 30, 1961: The Yankees defeated the Red Sox, 12-3, at Fenway Park...CF Mickey Mantle (#12, #13) and RF Roger Maris (#10, #11) each hit a pair of home runs and drove in four runs apiece...went back-to-back in the eighth, the first of four such occurrences that season...3B Clete Boyer went 4-for-6 with 2R...**May 31, 1961:** The Yankees won their second straight, defeating Boston, 7-6, at Fenway Park...both RF Roger Maris (solo) and CF Mickey Mantle (two run) homered in the contest, combining to drive in five of the Yankees' seven runs...RHP Rollie Sheldon earned the win, while LHP Danny McDevitt recorded the final two outs for his only save as a Yankee...**June 1, 1961:** The Yankees lost, 5-7, at Fenway Park...1B Moose Skowron homered twice, including a two-run HR in the ninth...PH Elston Howard - representing the tying run - flew out to end the game.

OVERALL TRENDS/FACTS: The Yankees will play the first of nine games against Oakland this season beginning today with a Memorial Day day game...were 9-1 against the A's in 2010, winning the season series for the third straight year...have won the last seven games between the clubs and 20 of the last 23...are 21-4 against the A's since the start of the 2008 season and are 40-18 against the A's since 2004.

AT OVERSTOCK.COM C: Today the Yankees and A's will meet for the first of three games in the clubs' only West Coast meeting this season...went 5-1 at Oakland in 2010... have had three straight non-losing road season series at the A's and nine in the last 13 years (since 1998)...are 18-9 (.667) at the A's since the start of the 2004 season, marking the highest winning percentage by any AL team in Oakland over the span.

AT YANKEE STADIUM: The Yankees and A's meet six times in the Bronx this season, playing two series...were 4-0 vs. the A's at home in 2010, winning the home season series for the third straight year...have won 12 of their last 13 home games vs. the A's and are 22-9 vs. Oakland in the Bronx since 2004.

TODAY'S STARTER: RHP BARTOLO COLON (2-3, 3.77 ERA)

RHP Bartolo Colon, 37, will make his eighth start of the season and 17th career appearance (16th start) today vs. the Oakland Athletics at Overstock.com Stadium...will be his 11th appearance of the season...**last started** on 5/23 vs. Toronto and lost his second straight decision in the 7-3 Yankees defeat, allowing a season-high 6ER on 7H in 6.0IP (4BB/2IBB, 8K, 1HR, 102 pitches)...the Yankees have lost both of his starts in which he tossed at least 100 pitches (also 5/13 vs. Boston – 103 pitches)...**was signed by the Yankees** as a minor league free agent on 2/10/11 and added to the 40-man roster on 3/30/11...bio can be found on pgs 412-413 of the 2011 Media Guide.

VS. OAKLAND: Is 6-5 with a 3.68 ERA in 16 career appearances (15 starts) vs. the Athletics, winning four of his last six decisions since 6/22/04...among Yankees starters, owns the lowest career ERA and is tied with Freddy Garcia for the second-most wins vs. Oakland, behind CC Sabathia's seven victories.

RIGHTING THE SHIP: Is 2-0 with a 2.18 ERA in three starts following a Yankees loss this season...has pitched into at least the seventh inning and allowed 2ER or less in each of those outings, combining to strike out 17 batters in 20.2IP.

SOLO CUP: Seven of his eight home runs allowed this year have been hit with no one on base.

LIKE RIDING A BICYCLE: Has recorded 56K in 57.1IP this season...over half of his strikeouts this season (55.4%, 31-of-56) have been on called third strikes (credit – *Elias*).

- ✪ Has not walked any of the 60 batters that he has faced to lead off an inning this year...no other American League pitcher has started more than 30.0 innings without walking a leadoff hitter.
- ✪ Ranks sixth in the AL in strikeouts/walks ratio (3.73).

I GIVE, BUT I TAKE: Over his last two seasons of play (2009, '11), has allowed 19 solo-home runs as compared to just two home runs with runners on base (credit: *Elias*).

COPS & ROBBERS: Allowed a stolen base to the Orioles' Mark Reynolds in the eighth inning of his start on 5/18 at Baltimore, snapping a streak of 167.1IP without allowing a stolen base...was previously the longest, active streak in the Majors.

DON'T CALL IT A COMEBACK: According to *Elias*, is one of only 36 pitchers to start at least 300 games in the Majors before missing one full season and then returning to the Major Leagues.

- ✪ Prior to this season, had not made a Major League start since 7/24/09, when he faced Detroit with Chicago-AL in game two of a doubleheader (ND, 7.0IP, 6H, 3ER, 1BB, 2K, 1HR)...was returned from rehab and reinstated from the 15-day disabled list prior to the outing after recovering from left knee inflammation...following the outing, returned to the D.L. and missed the remainder of the season with right elbow inflammation.

- ✪ Became the first pitcher since Kevin Brown in 2004 to win his first two starts *as a Yankee* with an ERA of 1.84 or better.
- ✪ Among active Major League pitchers currently on a team's roster, is tied for seventh in wins (155).
- ✪ Is one of nine pitchers currently active in the Majors with at least 2,000.0IP and 1,500K, and less than 1,000BB.

MAN OF HIS PEOPLE: Among Dominican-born pitchers, Colon currently ranks third in wins (155), trailing Juan Marichal (243) and Pedro Martinez (219)...ranks fourth in starts (332) and strikeouts (1663) and fifth in innings pitched (2134.0).

EARLY SEASON ACTION: Made his 12th career Opening Day roster, first with the Yankees...made three appearances out of the bullpen in relief of Phil Hughes each time, tossing at least 3.0 innings in each outing...became the first Yankee pitcher since Neil Allen in 1988 to throw 3.0 or more innings as a reliever in each of his first three games of a season (credit: *Elias*).

SPRING RECAP: Attended spring training with the Yankees as a non-roster invitee, going 1-0 with one save and a 2.25 ERA in five appearances (four starts), allowing 4ER in 16.0IP with a team-high 17K (10H, 1BB, 1HP)...did not walk a batter in 14.0IP over his final four official outings.

- In 2010, guided the Yankees to a 95-67 record, their second consecutive postseason appearance and 15th playoff berth in the last 16 years...was the second-best record in the AL behind Tampa Bay (96-66) and third-best in the Majors, also trailing Philadelphia (97-65).
- Recorded a 365-283 (.563) managerial record over his first four seasons as a manager (2006, '08-10)...only Ken Macha (368-280, .568 with Oakland from 2003-06) recorded a higher winning percentage in the first four years of his managerial career over the past 20 years (since 1991).
