A's vs. METS

The A's trail in the all-time series, 3-5...won two of three in Oakland in 2005 and are now 1-4 in New York...snapped a four-game losing streak against the Mets with Tuesday night's win...the two clubs also met in the 1973 World Series, which the A's won in seven games.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

David DeJesus has not committed an error in 56 games in the outfield and now has a 297-game errorless streak, which is the longest active streak among all Major League outfielders.

Joey Devine has not allowed a home run this season and now has a 77-game, 75.2-inning, 307-batter homerless streak.

Brian Fuentes saved the 199th game of his career Sunday, which is the most among active left-handers...needs one more to become the sixth left-hander in Major League history to reach the 200 plateau (Franco, Wagner, Myers, Righetti, Lyle).

Hideki Matsui has 499 career home runs between Japan and the United States...25 Major Leaguers and eight players in the Japanese Leagues have hit 500... is 10 for 36 (.278) with 12 walks, three home runs and 10 RBI over his past 12 games.

Ryan Sweeney has not committed an error this year and now has a 154-game errorless streak, which is fourth longest in Oakland history by an outfielder.

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In 1978, Tim Conroy becomes the youngest Oakland pitcher to start a game at the age of 18 years, 81 days...he pitches 3 1/3 innings, allowing two runs, one earned, on two hits and five walks while striking out one in a no decision... in 1997, Jason Giambi extends his hitting streak to an Oakland record 25 games in a 6-5 loss at Seattle...the streak breaks Carney Lansford's record of 24 set in 1984 and ends in his next game

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Last night's 3-2, 13-inning loss halted a season-high six-game winning streak...the winning streak followed a stretch where the A's lost 13 of 14, including 10 straight from May 30-June 9, which matched the fifth longest losing streak in Oakland history...are 35-40 (.467) overall, which is the third worst record in the American League, but are just 5½ games out of first place in the AL West...were in a tie for first place in the West at the conclusion of play May 17 with a 22-20 record...however, have gone 12-21 (.364) since then, which is the second worst record in the AL (Kansas City, 11-22)...have spent each of the last 24 days and 31 of the last 32 in sole possession of last place in the AL West...for the season, have spent one day tied for first, three days in second, eight days tied for second, 34 days in third, three days tied for third and 35 days in fourth.

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: The A's are 4-4 in interleague play this season...went 3-3 against San Francisco and are 1-1 against New York ...after this series, continue the road trip by traveling to Philadelphia before returning home to face Florida and Arizona...went 8-10 (.444) in interleague play last year, their second consecutive season with a losing record...it was just the fourth time in 14 seasons the A's finished with a losing record...are 17-27 (.386) over the last two-plus years, which is tied for the fifth worst mark in the majors...however, are 140-116 (.547) all-time, which is the seventh best record.

PITCHERS HITTING: A's pitchers are 0 for 9 with two strikeouts and two sacrifice hits this year and now have a .089 (23 for 258) average with four doubles, seven RBI, eight walks and 113 strikeouts since interleague play began in 1997...the batting average is the lowest by an American League team over that span (Toronto, .092)...the last triple by an A's pitcher was by John Odum on Aug. 22, 1971 against Boston and Odum also hit the last home run on Sept. 4, 1972 against California.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 1-1 on this six-game road trip through New York (1-1) and Philadelphia (three games)...went 5-1 on the last homestand against Kansas City (2-1) and San Francisco (3-0), which was their best homestand since 2006 when they went 8-1 against Texas, Tampa Bay and Seattle from Aug. 7-16...the homestand followed a 1-9 road trip to Boston (0-3), Baltimore (0-3) and Chicago (1-3), matching the worst record on a road trip of 10 or more games in Oakland history...also went 1-9 Aug. 1-10, 2008 and May 12-21, 1981...have won five straight home games but have lost 16 of the last 20 on the road...are 19-16 at home and 15-25 on the road...have the second worst road record in the American League (Kansas City, 10-21)...are batting .250 (289 for 1156) with 139 runs scored in 35 home games (3.97 per game) and .228 (315 for 1380) with 135 runs scored in 40 games on the road (3.47 per game).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 5-0 with a 1.18 ERA (6 er in 45.2 ip), .188 (31 for 165) ERA over the previous 13 contests...lead the American League and rank third in the majors with a 7.30 ERA, .312 opponents batting average, 41 walks and 37 strikeouts over the previous 14 contests...the 11-game losing streak was second longest in Oakland history to a 13-game streak from July 29-Aug. 12, 1977...the 14-game streak without a win matched the fifth longest in Oakland history...starters are now 26-26 with a 3.23 ERA (166 er in 463.0 ip) for the season...the ERA is second behind Seattle (3.22) for the lowest in the American League and is third lowest in the majors (Philadelphia, 3.05)...have allowed 16 home runs in the last 21 games after yielding 18 over the first 54 contests...have allowed 34 for the season, which is the fewest in the AL and tied for third fewest in the majors...also have the lowest opponents slugging percentage in the AL (.357) but have issued the third most walks (162).

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 1.62 ERA (12 er in 66.2 ip) over the last seven games after posting 5.70 ERA over the previous 13 contests...lead the American League and rank third in the majors with a 3.23 ERA for the season...have allowed two home runs over the last eight games and 48 for the season, which is the fewest in the AL and tied for fourth fewest in the majors...have the lowest opponents slugging percentage in the AL and fourth lowest in the majors (.353)...have a Major League leading 15 pickoffs...opponents have been successful in 54 of 82 (65.9%) stolen base attempts, which is the second lowest percentage in the AL...the 28 caught stealings are the most in the majors.

OFFENSE: The A's have hit one home run or fewer in each of the last 26 games, which matches the second longest such streak in Oakland history...have 40 home runs for the season, which is the fewest in the Major Leagues...are on pace to hit 86 home runs and the Oakland record for fewest home runs in a season is 94 in 1968...have scored 274 runs, which is the third fewest in the American League...also have the second lowest batting average (.238) and slugging percentage (.345) in the AL and the third lowest on-base percentage (.307).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have committed one or more errors in 11 of their past 12 games (14 errors total) and have 59 errors for the season, which is second most in the American League (Texas, 60)...the errors have led to 40 unearned runs, which is second most in the majors to Houston (42)...13 of the errors have been committed by pitchers, which is the most in the majors...rank second in the AL in double plays (82).

CLOSE CALLS: The A's are 10-16 (.385) in one-run games this season, which is the worst mark in the American League...are 5-9 (.357) in extra inning games...are tied for the American League lead in extra inning games and most losses (Los Angeles is also 5-9)...the 14 extra-inning games are already three more than the A's total for the entire 2010 season and the losses are their most since going 3-10 in 2009...10 of the extra-inning games have gone 10 innings, one lasted 11, one lasted 12, one went 13 and the season-high is 14...are 9-17 in games decided in the seventh inning or later, including 7-14 in games decided in the last at bat...have six wins when trailing after seven innings, which is second most in the AL to Kansas City (7)...last year, the A's had just two wins when trailing after seven innings the entire season.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list 10 times this year...currently have six players on the DL (Anderson, Braden, Harden, McCarthy, Ross, Willingham) and have not had fewer than three players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had one...have used the DL 97 times since the start of the 2007 season...used the DL 23 times last year, which was the second highest total in Oakland history.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make the third appearance and start of his Major League career...was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 10 and made his Major League debut that night at Chicago...was the 42nd pitcher in Oakland history to make a start in his debut.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .313 opponents batting average, which breaks down to .182 (4 for 22) against left-handed hitters and .423 (11 for 26) against right-handers...has allowed seven extra base hits (five doubles, two home runs), but just one of those was by a left-hander...lefties are slugging .227 compared to .088 by righties...opponents are 10 for 26 (.385) with the bases empty but are 1 for 12 (.083) with runners in scoring position.

FIRST START: Had a no decision in his Major League debut, a 7-5 A's win at Chicago June 10...allowed nine hits, which are the most by an A's pitcher in his debut since April 10, 1983 when Bill Krueger yielded nine at California...allowed a two-out two-run home run to Konerko in the first and then loaded the bases before striking out Beckham for his first strikeout...blanked the White Sox on three hits over the next three innings but was charged with three runs in the fifth...was relieved by Wuertz with one out in the fifth and the A's trailing 4-2 and Wuertz allowed an inherited runner to score...the A's then scored four times in the ninth for the win.

LAST START: He was credited with the first win of his Major League career in the A's 5-2 win over San Francisco last Friday in Oakland...allowed a leadoff home run to Ross in the second inning but that was the only run he would allow over his first five innings...took a 3-1 lead into the sixth and was charged with an unearned run when Hall doubled and scored when Huff reached base on a Pennington error...was relieved by Balfour after seven innings.

GODFREY vs. NEW YORK: Is making his first career appearance and start.

2011 MINOR LEAGUE RECAP:

Combined for a 7-1 record, a 2.32 ERA and a .221 opponents batting average in 10 games, all starts, with Double-A Midland and Triple-A Sacramento...began the year with the Rockhounds and had a no decision April 7 against Arkansas (4.0 ip, 3 h, 2 r, 0 er, 1 bb, 6 so) before he was promoted to Sacramento...went 7-1 with a 2.50 ERA in nine starts with the River Cats...combined to allow just two home runs in 54.1 innings...struck out 51 and walked 15...his teams were 8-2 (.800) in his starting assignment...tossed six or more innings in five of his 10 starts, allowed three runs or fewer in all 10 starts and walked two batters or fewer nine times.

AMONG THE LEADERS:

Was leading the Pacific Coast League in ERA (2.50) and winning percentage (.875) and was tied for the league lead in wins (7) at the time of his promotion...also had the lowest opponents batting average (.222).

OPPONENTS BATTING: His .221 opponents batting average included a .188 (18 for 96) mark against left-handed hitters and .250 (27 for 108) against right-handers...surrendered both of his home runs to righties...opponents were 10 for 50 (.200) with four walks and a hit by pitch (.273 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...allowed a .189 (21 for 111) average with the bases empty and .286 (14 for 49) with runners in scoring position...both of his home runs were solo shots.

INNING BY INNING: Allowed seven of his 18 runs in the first inning for a 5.40 ERA (6 er in 10.0 ip)...compiled a 1.62 ERA (8 er in 44.1 ip) from the second inning on...opponents hit .273 (33 for 121) over the first three innings and .146 (12 for 82) after that.

DISABLED LIST: Was placed on Sacramento's disabled list effective May 6 with a sprained right wrist...was reinstated May 19.

2011 HIGHLIGHTS: Began the season with two no decisions: one with Midland and one with Sacramento...allowed a season-high three runs on a season-high seven hits in his first start with the River Cats, April 12 against Las Vegas...then tossed a season-high 7.0 innings April 17 at Tacoma for his first win...that began a four-game winning streak that ran from April 17 to May 5...posted a 1.82 ERA and allowed a .186 opponents average during the streak...had his first of three seven-strikeout games April 23 against Tucson...matched the strikeout total May 5 against Salt Lake...surrendered his only two home runs and tossed a season-low 3.2 innings in his only loss in his first start after returning from the DL, May 19 against Oklahoma City...allowed a season-high tying three runs in that start...then went 3-0 with a 2.12 ERA and .222 opponents batting average over his final three starts...walked three batters in a 3-2 win over New Orleans May 24, his only outing of the season with more than two walks...matched his season high with seven strikeouts in the second game of a doubleheader at Reno May 29.

MINOR LEAGUE CAREER: Was 33-32 with a 4.20 ERA (278 er in 590.0 ip) in 119 career minor league appearances, including 103 starts, over five seasons...allowed just 42 home runs in 590.2 innings, an average of 0.64 per nine innings...was originally drafted by the Toronto Blue Jays in the 34th round of the 2006 First-Year Player Draft...was traded to the A's with pitcher Kristian Bell for infielder Marco Scutaro, Nov. 18, 2007.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Guillermo Moscoso (2-3, 3.30 ERA): Is scheduled to make his eighth appearance and sixth start of the season...the A's are 3-2 (.600) in his starting assignments, which are the only starting assignments of his career...is 2-2 with a 3.33 ERA (10 er in 27.0 ip) in five starts and 0-1 with a 3.00 ERA (1 er in 3.0 ip) in two relief appearances...was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento May 24 and won each of his first two starts...made his first interleague start of the season last Saturday against San Francisco, a no decision (4.2 ip, 3 h, 2 r, 3 bb, 1 so)...is 0-0 with a 0.00 ERA (0 er in 5.2 ip) in two career interleague appearances, including one start...has allowed just one run over the first three innings of a game for a 0.59 ERA (1 er in 15.1 ip) and .148 (8 for 54) opponents batting average...has a 6.14 ERA (10 er in 14.2 ip) and .300 (18 for 60) opponents average from the fourth inning on... is the first Venezuelan-born pitcher to start a game for the A's since Pablo Torrealba on Sept. 30, 1977...is making his first career appearance against the Phillies.

The A's bullpen has allowed one run or fewer in eight of its past 11 games (9 er in 34.2 ip, 1.82 ERA) and now has a 3.24 ERA for the season, which ranks third in the American League...also has the second lowest opponents on-base percentage (.310), third lowest slugging percentage (.346) and the fifth lowest batting average (.236)...has the second most losses (15) and tied for second fewest in wins (8)...has allowed 14 home runs, which is fourth fewest, and issued 83 walks, which is fifth fewest...have a league-leading 52 first batter strikeouts.

- Pitched a scoreless ninth inning Saturday night for his fourth save of the season...has converted his past four save chances after being charged with a blown save in his first opportunity this season.
- Has not allowed a run in seven of eight appearances (1 er in 8.0 ip, 1.13 ERA) since being reinstated from the disabled list May 29...was placed on the 15-day DL March 30 retroactive to March 22 with a strained right forearm...it was his second career stint on the DL.
- Has never faced the Mets in his career.
- Has not allowed a run in two interleague appearances (2.0 ip, 1 h, 1 so) and has a 0.90 ERA (2 er in 20.0 ip) in 18 career outings against the National League.
- Made four rehab appearances with Triple-A Sacramento and did not allow a run (4.0 ip, 3 h, 1 bb, 3 so).
