ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Are 10-7 (.588) since the All-Star Break, which is tied for the fourth best record in the American League...went 39-53 (.424) before the break, which was the third worst record in the AL and fifth worst in the majors...won two of three from Minnesota after taking three of four from Tampa Bay...that marks just the third time this year the A's have won back-to-back series...have not won three straight series since September 3-12 of last year...went 13-13 in July, marking the first time the A's did not have a losing record in a month since last July when they went 14-10...were in a tie for first place in the AL West at the conclusion of play May 17 with a 22-20 record...however, have gone 27-40 (.403) since then...have spent each of the last 10 days in third place in the AL West, the first time the A's have been alone in third since May 21...it follows a streak of 59 consecutive days with at least a share of last place...for the season, have spent one day tied for first, three days in second, eight days tied for second, 44 days in third, five days tied for third and 60 days in fourth...made a managerial change June 9, replacing Bob Geren with new interim manager Bob Melvin.

OFFENSE: The A's recorded the 60,000th hit in Oakland history last night when Hideki Matsui singled in the first inning...have now collected at least eight hits in each of the 17 games since the All-Star Break to set an Oakland record for consecutive games with eight or more hits (previous 15, September 12-27, 1980)...it is the longest streak by an Athletics team since the 1944 Philadelphia A's had a 21-game streak from August 14-September 3...are batting a **Major League leading** .315 (186 for 590) since the break...also lead the majors in doubles (47), slugging percentage (.480) and on-base percentage (.385) since the break, are tied for second in fewest strikeouts (95), rank third in runs scored (104), fourth in walks (67) and tied for fourth in triples (4)...are now batting .246 for the season, which is the highest the A's average has been outside the first five games of the season...are tied for the second fewest runs scored (419) in the American League and tied for the second lowest slugging percentage (.360)...have the third lowest batting average and on-base percentage (.313)...have been shutout 11 times this season, which is tied with Cleveland and Los Angeles for the most in the AL.

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 6.21 ERA (78 er in 113.0 ip) and .305 (141 for 462) opponents batting average over the last 13 games but are 7-6 over that span...had a 2.55 ERA and .210 opponents batting average over the previous 22 games but were 8-14 over that stretch...have a 3.41 ERA for the season, which is tied for second lowest in the American League...have the lowest slugging percentage in the AL (.363) and have issued the second most walks (368)...had 14 strikeouts Sunday, their fourth game of 14 or more strikeouts this year...those are the most games of 14 or more strikeouts in one season in Oakland history...now have 769 strikeouts for the season, which ranks third in the AL...A's starting pitchers are 7-9 with a 5.61 ERA (74 er in 118.2 ip) over the last 21 games after posting a 1.86 ERA over the previous 20 contests...have a 3.53 ERA (261 er in 666.1 ip) for the season, which is third lowest in the AL.

THE LONG BALL: The A's have hit two home runs or fewer in each of the last 80 games, which is tied for the third longest such streak in Oakland history...it is the longest since an 86-game streak from July 5, 1978-April 10, 1979...the record is 91 from July 31, 1974-May 16, 1975...the A's last three-homer game was May 2 vs. Texas...have 64 home runs for the season, which is the **fewest in the American League** and third fewest in the majors...are on pace to hit 95 home runs and the Oakland record for fewest home runs in a season is 94 in 1968...the pitching staff has surrendered just 80 home runs, which is tied for second fewest in the AL.

ON THE BASES: The A's are 75 for 109 (68.8%) in stolen base attempts for the season, which is the third lowest percentage in the American League...stole a season-high four bases Sunday...three of the steals were of third base, their most in a game since April 17, 1993 at Milwaukee when they also had three steals of third...the pitching staff has 16 pickoffs, which is second most in the majors to the White Sox (18).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have committed 15 errors in 17 games since the All-Star Break...have 87 errors for the season, which is second most in the American League...the errors have led to 59 unearned runs, which is tied with Houston for the most in the majors...last year, had just 60 unearned runs for the entire season...are third in the American League in double plays (110).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 0-1 on this nine-game, 11-day road trip to Seattle (0-1), Tampa Bay (three games) and Toronto (three games)...went 2-3 on the last road trip to Detroit (1-1) and New York (1-2) and are now 7-27 (.206) over their last 34 road games...are 0-8-3 over the last 11 road series and the 11 consecutive road series without winning a series is the A's longest such stretch since April 21-August 3, 1986 when they went 0-13-2 over a 15-series stretch...went 5-2 on the last homestand against Tampa Bay (3-1) and Minnesota (2-1) and have won nine of the last 12 home games...for the season, the A's are 31-24 (.564) at home compared to 18-36 (.333) on the road...are tied for the fourth best home record in the American League but have the second worst road record...the A's are batting .260 (470 for 1810) with 237 runs scored in 55 home games (4.31 per game) and .233 (432 for 1855) with 182 runs scored in 54 games on the road (3.37 per game)...have the lowest road batting average in the AL and third lowest in the majors.

SCHEDULE NOTES: The total air mileage on this road trip to Seattle, Tampa Bay and Toronto is 6,544 (source: travelmath.com)...it marks the first time in Oakland history the A's have played in all domes on a three-city road trip...the A's have a 3-5 record in domes this year...this trip also begins a stretch where the A's will play 19 of 29 games from August 1 to September 1 on the road...after that, the A's play 16 of their next 19 games in Oakland from September 2-22.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's are 14-20 (.412) in one-run games, which is the worst record in the American League and third worst in the majors...are 6-10 (.375) in extra inning games, which is tied for the second worst record in the AL...the 16 extra inning games are tied with Los Angeles and Kansas City for the most in the AL...are 13-27 (.325) in extra inning games over the last three years...are 12-22 in games decided in the seventh inning or later, including 8-17 in games decided in the last at bat.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's placed Michael Wuertz on the disabled list Saturday, the 12th time they have used the DL this year...have not used the DL fewer than 15 times in a season since 2005 when they used it eight times...currently have three players on the DL (Anderson, Braden and Wuertz)...had two players on the DL from July 25-29, marking the first time since the end of the 2006 season they have fewer than three players on the DL...finished the 2006 season with one player on the DL (Crosby).

A's vs. MARINERS

The A's trail in the season series, 4-7...have lost four of six in Oakland and three of five in Seattle...each team has two season series wins over the previous four years and the A's are 37-50 (.425) against Seattle since 2007...that is the **lowest winning percentage** by any American League team against the Mariners over that span...all-time, the A's are 287-214 (.573) against Seattle, which is the second best mark by an AL team against the Mariners (Boston, .578)...are 160-92 in Oakland and 127-122 in Seattle...including 51-58 at Safeco Field.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In **1924** Joe Hauser becomes the second American Leaguer to hit three home runs in a game...he also adds a double for a then-record 14 total bases...in **1933** Mickey Cochrane hits for the cycle for the second time in his career but the A's lose to New York, 16-3...in **1972** Cattfish Hunter pitches a five-hit shutout as the A's defeat Kansas City 5-0...it follows a three-hit shutout by Ken Holtzman, which followed a two-hit shutout by Vida Blue.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his sixth start of the season...it is the 151st start of his career, his 95th as an Athletic...the A's are 3-2 (.600) in his starting assignment this year...his teams are 94-56 (.627) in his starting assignments in his career, including 61-33 (.649) with the A's...has tossed six or more innings in three of his five starts, allowed two runs or fewer four times and walked two batters or fewer three times.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Opponents are 4 for 27 (.148) with three walks (.233 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...has allowed a .171 (7 for 41) opponents batting average the first time through the lineup, .231 (9 for 39) the second time and .296 (8 for 27) after that...his career numbers are .196 (244 for 1246) the first time, .223 (254 for 1139) the second time and .267 (220 for 824) after that...has allowed at least one home run in all five of his starts (six total)...five of his six home runs have been hit by right-handed hitters and four have been solo shots

THE DISABLED LIST: Was reinstated from the 60-day disabled list July 1...did not appear in a game this spring and was placed on the 15-day DL March 30 retroactive to March 22 with a strained right shoulder...it was his 10th career stint on the DL, his seventh as an Athletic...was transferred to the 60-day DL April 18 when the A's acquired David Purcey from Toronto.

SINCE 2003: Has 888 strikeouts in 875.0 innings since making his Major League debut in 2003...his average of 9.13 strikeouts per nine innings is second best among all pitchers with 800 or more innings pitched since 2003 (Lincecum, 10.00)...has a .224 (718 for 3209) opponents batting average over that span, which is fourth best using the 800 innings pitched minimum (Johan Santana, .221; Jason Schmidt, .223; Lincecum .223).

WITH THE A'S: His start July 1 against Arizona was his first as an Athletic since July 6, 2008, a loss in the A's 4-3 decision at Chicago (5.0 ip, 5 h, 3 r, 2 er, 4 bb, 4 so)...picked up the win against the Diamondbacks for his first victory in an Oakland uniform since June 26, 2008 against Philadelphia (8.0 ip, 2 h, 1 bb, 11 so)...began his career with the A's in 2003 and has compiled a 38-20 record and a 3.47 ERA (220 er in 571.0 ip) in 102 games, 94 starts...was traded to the Chicago Cubs July 8, 2008 and went 19-15 with a 4.00 ERA in 58 games, 56 starts, in 2½ seasons with the Cubs (2008-09) and Rangers (2010)...signed with the A's as a free agent December 21, 2010.

FIRST START: Was the winning pitcher in the A's 5-4 win over Arizona July 1 in Oakland...it was his first start since September 29, 2010 against Seattle and his first win since August 23, 2010 against Minnesota...retired 11 of the first 12 batters he faced with the one exception a Pena two-out home run in the second...the A's scored a run in the fourth and four more in the fifth to give him a 5-1 lead...allowed a Drew RBI single in the sixth and was relieved by Ziegler to start the seventh.

SECOND START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 6-0 loss at Texas July 7...allowed runs in four of his five innings...Kinsler scored on a ground out in the first and Hamilton had a RBI single in the third...Kinsler added a RBI single in the fourth followed by a Hamilton sacrifice fly and Young hit a leadoff home run in the fifth inning...Holland shutout the A's on four hits.

THIRD START: He had a no decision in the A's 4-3, 10-inning win in the second game of the doubleheader against Los Angeles July 16 in Oakland...allowed a two-run home run to Trumbo in the second inning but then retired 12 of the next 14 batters he faced...the A's scored twice in the fourth and once in the fifth to take a 3-2 lead but he allowed a solo home run to Wells in the sixth inning...left after seven innings with the score tied 3-3.

FOURTH START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 4-3 win at New York July 23...allowed a RBI single to Martin in the second inning but the A's came back with two runs in the third and another in the sixth...blanked the Yankees on two hits and three walks from the third through fifth innings but then allowed a solo home run to Swisher in the sixth...was relieved by Ziegler following the home run and left with a 3-2 lead.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 10-8 loss to Tampa Bay last Thursday in Oakland...retired each of the first nine batters he faced before walking Jennings to start the fourth inning...did not allow a hit until Zobrist singled to lead off the fifth...had a 5-0 lead when he allowed a two-run home run to Jennings in the sixth inning...left after six innings with a 5-2 lead but the bullpen allowed seven runs in the seventh inning...Ziegler was charged with the blown save and loss.

HARDEN vs. SEATTLE: Is 5-2 with a 2.41 ERA (56.0 ip, 40 h, 15 r, 15 er, 22 bb, 57 so, 3 hr) in 12 career appearances, nine starts...is 5-0 with a 0.86 ERA (4 er in 42.0 ip) in nine career appearances, six starts, at Safeco Field, 0-2 with a 6.30 ERA (7 er in 10.0 ip) in two starts in Oakland and 0-0 with a 9.00 ERA (4 er in 4.0 ip) in one start in Texas...his ERA at Safeco Field is the lowest among all pitchers with 25.0 or more innings pitched...is 5-2 with a 2.42 ERA (14 er in 52.0 ip) in his nine starting assignments...has faced the Mariners just once over the last four years and it came last year on September 29 in Texas...started and had a no decision in the Rangers 6-5 win...allowed a two-run home run to Smoak in the first inning and a two-run double to Gutierrez in the fifth...left trailing 4-1 but the Rangers scored once in the seventh, three times in the eighth and once in the ninth for the win.

REHAB ASSIGNMENT: Began a rehab assignment with Triple-A Sacramento June 20 and went 0-0 with a 3.52 ERA in two starts...struck out 12 batters in 7.2 innings...allowed a .115 (3 for 26) opponents batting average, including .083 (1 for 12) against left-handed hitters and .143 (2 for 14) against right-handers.

2010 RECAP: Was 5-5 with a 5.58 ERA in 20 games, 18 starts, with Texas in a season where he was bothered by injuries and control problems much of the season, which resulted in two stints on the disabled list...the ERA was the highest of his major league career...issued 62 walks in 92.0 innings, an average of 6.07 per nine innings...that was the highest ratio in the majors among pitchers with 90 or more innings pitched...it was also sixth highest in team history and the highest since 1987 (Bobby Witt, 8.81; Mitch Williams, 7.79)...walked five or more batters in six of his 18 starts, including a season high six April 18 at New York and May 14 at Toronto...tied for 10th in the AL in hit batters (9)...went 2-0 in four starts with run support of four or more and is 42-0 in 57 such starts in his career.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

LHP Gio Gonzalez (9-8, 2.84 ERA): Is scheduled to make his 22nd start of the season...is 1-3 with a 5.57 ERA (13 er in 21.0 ip) and four home runs allowed in his last four starts after going 3-0 with a 1.29 ERA and no home runs over his previous four starts...ranks sixth in the American League in ERA (2.84) and eighth in opponents slugging percentage (.332)...is also third in walks (60) and tied for seventh in hit batters (7)...ranks third in the AL in strikeouts per nine innings (8.93) and is 11th in strikeouts (129)...his 129 strikeouts are sixth most in Oakland history through the end of July and are the most since Barry Zito had 131 in 2001...is 7-3 with a 2.21 ERA (19 er in 77.1 ip) in 12 starts at home and 2-5 with a 3.76 ERA (22 er in 52.2 ip) in nine starts on the road...is 4-2 with a 2.45 ERA (10 er in 36.2 ip) in six starts against American League West competition this season...is 5-1 with a 3.14 ERA (57.1 ip, 51 h, 22 r, 20 er, 32 bb, 52 so, 5 hr) in 10 career appearances, eight starts, against Seattle.

ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

Save/Save Opportunities: 27/38 (71.1%)

The A's bullpen has a 6.00 ERA (36.0 ip, 40 h, 27 r, 24 er, 23 bb, 41 so, 5 hr) over its past 11 games after compiling a 1.80 ERA over its previous 28 contests...now has a 3.29 ERA for the season, which ranks second lowest in the American League...also has the second lowest opponents slugging percentage (.344) and is tied for the second fewest home runs (21)...has the fewest wins (11) and is tied for the most losses (19)...has allowed just two home runs to first batters faced, which is the fewest in the AL, and has struck out 76, which is tied for the most.

- Has a 1.29 ERA (1 er in 7.0 ip) in seven outings since the All-Star Break and has converted all four of his save opportunities...is now a perfect 27 for 27 in save opportunities after the All-Star Break in his career.
- Has held opponents to a .167 batting average, including .114 (4 for 35) against right-handers and .209 (9 for 43) against lefties...opponents are batting .167 (3 for 18) with runners in scoring position.
- Has a loss and a save in two appearances against Seattle this year (2.0 ip, 2 h, 2 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 2 so)...has a 1.96 ERA (4 er in 18.1 ip) in 17 career appearances against the Mariners...Safeco Field is one of two American League ballparks in which he has not recorded a save (Rangers Ballpark), although he has no save opportunities in three career appearances here.
- Has a 0.64 ERA (1 er in 15.0 ip) in 15 appearances at home compared to a 5.14 ERA (4 er in 7.0 ip) in his seven road outings.
- Has recorded 63 saves in his career, which ranks sixth in Oakland history...is 12 saves away from tying Jason Isringhausen for fifth most.
- Began the season on the 15-day disabled list with a strained right forearm...it was his second career stint on the DL...was reinstated May 29.
- Led the A's in saves (25) and was named to the American League All-Star team for the second consecutive season last year...was 1-3 with a 1.47 ERA in 47 relief appearances...ranked seventh among AL relievers in opponents on-base percentage (.251) and eighth in slugging (.292).
