ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Are 10-8 (.556) since the All-Star Break, which is tied for the fourth best record in the American League...went 39-53 (.424) before the break, which was the third worst record in the AL and fifth worst in the majors...prior to this series, won two of three from Minnesota after taking three of four from Tampa Bay...that marked just the third time this year the A's have won back-to-back series...went 13-13 in July, marking the first time the A's did not have a losing record in a month since last July when they went 14-10...were in a tie for first place in the AL West at the conclusion of play May 17 with a 22-20 record...however, have gone 27-41 (.397) since then...have spent each of the last 11 days in third place in the AL West, the first time the A's have been alone in third since May 21...it follows a streak of 59 consecutive days with at least a share of last place...for the season, have spent one day tied for first, three days in second, eight days tied for second, 45 days in third, five days tied for third and 60 days in fourth...made a managerial change June 9, replacing Bob Geren with new interim manager Bob Melvin.

OFFENSE: The A's recorded the 60,000th hit in Oakland history Monday night when Hideki Matsui singled in the first inning...with seven hits last night, their streak of collecting at least eight hits in each of their first 17 games since the All-Star Break was snapped...the 17 games is an Oakland record for consecutive games with eight or more hits (previous 15, Sept. 12-27, 1980)...it is the longest streak by an Athletics team since the 1944 Philadelphia A's had a 21-game streak from Aug. 14-Sept. 3...are batting a **Major League-leading** .309 (193 for 625) since the break...also lead the majors in on-base percentage (.378), rank second in doubles (48) and third in slugging percentage (.470) since the break, rank third in runs scored (106), fourth in walks (70) and are tied for fifth in triples (4) and fewest strikeouts (107)...are now batting .246 for the season, which is the highest the A's average has been outside the first five games of the season...have the third fewest runs scored (421) in the American League and third lowest slugging percentage (.359)...own the third lowest batting average and on-base percentage (.313)...have been shut out 11 times this season, which is tied with Cleveland and LA for the most in the AL.

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 6.10 ERA (82 er in 121.0 ip) and .286 (141 for 493) opponents batting average over the last 14 games but are 7-7 over that span...had a 2.55 ERA and .210 opponents batting average over the previous 22 games but were 8-14 over that stretch...have a 3.46 ERA for the season, which is third lowest in the American League...have the lowest slugging percentage in the AL (.363) and have issued the second most walks (371)...had 14 strikeouts Sunday, their fourth game of 14 or more strikeouts this year...those are the most games of 14 or more strikeouts in one season in Oakland history...now have 779 strikeouts for the season, which ranks third in the AL...A's starting pitchers are 7-10 with a 5.65 ERA (78 er in 124.1 ip) over the last 22 games after posting a 1.86 ERA over the previous 20 contests...starters have a 3.55 ERA (265 er in 672.0 ip) for the season, which is third lowest in the AL.

THE LONG BALL: The A's have hit two home runs or fewer in each of the last 81 games, which is the third longest such streak in Oakland history...it is the longest since an 86-game streak from July 5, 1978-April 10, 1979...the record is 91 from July 31, 1974-May 16, 1975...the A's last three-homer game was May 2 vs. Texas...have 65 home runs for the season, which is the **fewest in the American League** and third fewest in the majors...are on pace to hit 96 home runs...the Oakland record for fewest home runs in a season is 94 in 1968...the pitching staff has surrendered just 81 home runs, which is tied for second fewest in the AL.

ON THE BASES: The A's are 75 for 109 (68.8%) in stolen base attempts for the season, which is the third lowest percentage in the American League...stole a season-high four bases Sunday...three of the steals were of third base, their most in a game since April 17, 1993 at Milwaukee when they also had three steals of third...the pitching staff has 16 pickoffs, which is second most in the majors to the White Sox (18).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have committed 16 errors in 18 games since the All-Star Break...have 88 errors for the season, which is second most in the American League...the errors have led to 59 unearned runs, which is tied with Houston for the most in the majors...last year, had just 60 unearned runs for the entire season...are third in the American League in double plays (110).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 0-2 on this nine-game, 11-day road trip to Seattle (0-2), Tampa Bay (three games) and Toronto (three games)...went 2-3 on the last road trip to Detroit (1-1) and New York (1-2) and are now 7-28 (.200) over their last 35 road games...are 0-9-3 over the last 12 road series (including this series) and the 12 consecutive road series without winning a series is the A's longest such stretch since April 21-Aug. 3, 1986 when they went 0-13-2 over a 15-series stretch...went 5-2 on the last homestand against Tampa Bay (3-1) and Minnesota (2-1) and have won nine of the last 12 home games...for the season, the A's are 31-24 (.564) at home compared to 18-37 (.327) on the road...have fifth best home record in the American League but have the second worst road record...the A's are batting .260 (470 for 1810) with 237 runs scored in 55 home games (4.31 per game) and .232 (439 for 1890) with 184 runs scored in 55 games on the road (3.35 per game)...have the lowest road batting average in the AL and third lowest in the majors.

SCHEDULE NOTES: The total air mileage on this road trip to Seattle, Tampa Bay and Toronto is 6,544 (source: travelmath.com)...it marks the first time in Oakland history the A's have played in all domes on a three-city road trip...the A's have a 3-6 record in domes this year...this trip also begins a stretch where the A's will play 19 of 29 games on the road (Aug. 1-Sept. 1)...after that, the A's play 16 of their next 19 games in Oakland.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's are 14-20 (.412) in one-run games, which is the worst record in the American League and third worst in the majors...are 6-10 (.375) in extra inning games, which is tied for the second worst record in the AL...the 16 extra inning games are tied with Los Angeles and Kansas City for the most in the AL...are 13-27 (.325) in extra inning games over the last three years...are 12-22 in games decided in the seventh inning or later, including 8-17 in games decided in the last at bat.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's placed Michael Wuertz on the disabled list Saturday, the 12th time they have used the DL this year...have not used the DL fewer than 15 times in a season since 2005 when they used it eight times...currently have three players on the DL (Anderson, Braden and Wuertz)...had two players on the DL from July 25-29, marking the first time since the end of the 2006 season they had fewer than three.

A's vs. MARINERS

The A's trail in the season series, 4-8...have lost four of six in Oakland and three of five in Seattle...each team has two season series wins over the previous four years and the A's are 37-51 (.420) against Seattle since 2007...that is the **lowest winning percentage** by any American League team against the Mariners over that span...all-time, the A's are 287-215 (.572) against Seattle, which is the second best mark by an AL team against the Mariners (Boston, .578)...are 160-92 in Oakland and 127-123 in Seattle, including 51-59 at Safeco Field.

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1991**, Dave Henderson hits three home runs and the A's blast a total of six, but all are solo shots as the A's lose 8-6 to Minnesota...the Twins score seven runs in the eighth and add an insurance run in the ninth...in **1998**, Matt Stairs homers in his fifth consecutive game to tie what was then the Athletics franchise record for consecutive games with a home run...Kansas City's George Alusik set the record in 1962 and Dave Kingman matched it in 1986.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 22nd start of the season...the A's are 10-11 (.476) in his starting assignments this year and are 40-38 (.513) in his career...has tossed six innings or more in 15 of his 21 starts, allowed two runs or fewer 13 times and walked two batters or fewer 10 times.

LAST FOUR STARTS: Is 1-3 with a 5.57 ERA (13 er in 21.0 ip) and four home runs allowed in his last four starts after going 3-0 with a 1.29 ERA and no home runs over his previous four starts...has allowed 18 runs over his last four starts after yielding 19 over his previous 10 starts (2.07 ERA).

AMONG THE LEADERS: Ranks sixth in the American League in ERA (2.84) and eighth in opponents slugging percentage (.332)...is also third in walks (60) and tied for ninth in hit batters (7).

STRIKEOUTS: Ranks third in the American League in strikeouts per nine innings (8.93) and is 10th in strikeouts (129)...his 129 strikeouts are sixth most in Oakland history through the end of July and are the most since Barry Zito had 131 in 2001...had 111 strikeouts at the All-Star Break, which tied for the fourth best pre-Break total in Oakland history...it was the most at the break since Jose Rijo also had 111 in 1986.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .188 (22 for 117) average with runners in scoring position, which is fourth lowest in the American League...has held the first four spots in the batting order to a .213 (51 for 240) average...six of the 10 home runs he has allowed have been solo shots.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 7-3 with a 2.21 ERA (19 er in 77.1 ip) and .201 (56 for 278) opponents batting average in 12 starts at home and 2-5 with a 3.76 ERA (22 er in 52.2 ip) and .267 (56 for 210) opponents average in nine starts on the road...is tied for second in the American League in home wins and ranks third in ERA and opponents batting average...over the last two years, he is 15-6 with a 2.41 ERA (48 in 179.1 ip) and .200 (129 for 644) opponents average in 28 starts at home and 9-11 with a 3.87 ERA (65 er in 151.1 ip) and .260 (154 for 592) average in 26 starts on the road.

AGAINST THE WEST: Is 4-2 with a 2.45 ERA (10 er in 36.2 ip) in six starts against American League West competition...his career numbers are 14-5 with a 2.82 ERA (48 er in 153.0 ip) against divisional foes and 17-23 with a 4.55 ERA (157 er in 310.1 ip) against all other teams.

THE LAST TWO YEARS: Is 24-17 with a 3.08 ERA (113 er in 330.2 ip) over the last two years...the ERA is eighth lowest in the American League over that span (min. 200 ip) and the wins are tied for eighth.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 5-3 with a 3.30 ERA (21 er in 57.1 ip) in nine starts during the day and 4-5 with a 2.48 ERA (20 er in 72.2 ip) in 12 starts at night...has the fifth lowest night ERA in the American League...is now 15-7 with a 3.56 ERA (70 er in 177.0 ip) in 29 games during the day compared to 16-21 with a 4.24 ERA (135 er in 286.1 ip) in 55 contests at night.

RUN SUPPORT: Has received run support of two runs or fewer 13 of his 22 starts...has just 13 runs of support in his eight losses this year (43.2 ip, 2.68 RSA) and 31 runs of support in his 28 career losses (137.2 ip, 2.03 RSA)...is 26-1 in 35 career starts with run support of three or more and 5-27 in 43 starts with support of two or fewer.

ALL-STAR: Was named to his first American League All-Star team and was the A's lone selection...entered the game in the bottom of the eighth inning with two outs and the bases empty and struck out the only batter he faced, Jay Bruce.

MONTH-BY-MONTH: Went 2-3 with a 4.50 ERA in five starts in July...that was his highest single month ERA in September, 2009 when he also had a 4.50 ERA...went 2-3 with a 2.72 ERA in six starts in June and tied for seventh in the American League in strikeouts (36)...was 3-0 with a 1.67 ERA and .202 opponents batting average in five starts in May...that was the lowest single-month ERA of his career (1.98 in August, 2010) and was fourth best in the AL...also tied for fifth in wins and tied for 10th in strikeouts (35)...went 2-2 with a 2.70 ERA and .248 opponents batting average in five starts in April.

PLAYER OF THE WEEK: Was named American League Co-Player of the Week for the week ending July 3 after going 2-0 with a 0.60 ERA and a Major League leading 16 strikeouts in two starts...shared the honors with Toronto's Jose Bautista...it marked his first Player of the Week award.

LAST START: He lost his second consecutive start in the A's 9-5 loss to Minnesota last Friday in Oakland...allowed a two-run double to Kubel in the first inning but the A's came back to tie the game in the bottom of the first...was charged with an unearned run in the second when Plouffe reached on a Sizemore error, went to third on his own error on a double play attempt and then scored on a double play...also allowed a RBI single to Plouffe in the fifth and walked Revere with the bases loaded in the sixth.

GONZALEZ vs. SEATTLE: Is 5-1 with a 3.14 ERA (57.1 ip, 51 h, 22 r, 20 er, 32 bb, 52 so, 5 hr) in 10 career appearances, eight starts...is 1-1 with a 3.34 ERA (11 er in 29.2 ip) in six games at Safeco Field and 4-0 with a 2.93 ERA (9 er in 27.2 ip) in four starts in Oakland...is 5-1 with a 3.10 ERA (17 er in 49.1 ip) in his eight starting assignments...currently has a five-game winning streak (11 er in 39.1 ip, 2.52 ERA)...was the winning pitcher in his only start this year, a 7-1 A's win in Oakland April 3...allowed a solo home run to Langerhans in the second inning but that was the only run he would allow in 7.0 innings...allowed at least one base runner in each inning but was aided by two double plays...went 3-0 with a 2.84 ERA (25.1 ip, 20 h, 8 r, 8 er, 15 bb, 26 so) in four starts last year.
