### CAREER:

- Holds the highest slugging percentage (.451) among qualifying centerfielders who had fewer than 1,000 at-bats over the past two seasons.
- His 37 HR as a centerfielder over the past two seasons ranks 6th in MLB among those playing the position.
- His 11 intentional walks as a centerfielder ranks 3rd in the last two seasons.
- Ranks 1st among MLB centerfielders in defensive zone rating (.906) over the last two seasons.

### 2010 SEASON:

- Set a career high in almost every offensive category in his second full season in the Majors.
- Hit first career grand slam on his 24th birthday (8/11 at CIN) becoming the fifth player (3rd Cardinal) in MLB history to hit his first grand slam on his birthday.
- Hit a 483-foot home run at KC (6/27), the longest by any N.L. player in 2010.
- Recorded his second career multi-HR game 9/9 at ATL tying his career high in hits (4) and RBI (4).
- His 12 stolen bases ranked 2nd on the team (Pujols, 14) and his 23 home runs ranked 3rd on the Cardinals.
- Walked 63 times, ranking 3rd on the team, after drawing 36 walks his rookie year.
- Named National League Player of the Week (5/31-6/6), batting .500 w/3 HR & 9 RBI.
- Tied for the team lead with three triples.
- Sat out 13 games with a strained right calf (8/15-8/30).
- Walked a career high four times 8/13 vs. CHI and scored a career high four runs on 9/17 vs. SD.
- Hit nine home runs in the month of June, tying for second best in the NL.
- Ranked 9th in the NL with a .306 road batting average.
- Batted .323 in September, setting a monthly high with 32 hits (T5th in NL).
- Was 6-for-13 (.462) as a pinch-hitter with a home run and 4 RBI. His pinch-hit homer on 6/22 at TOR was first of his career.
- Had a solid .321 BA (10-31) in 0-2 counts, ranking 2nd in N.L. (4th, MLB).
- Led Cardinals outfielders with seven fielding gems.
- His .358 BA off balls in play in 2010 was 7th-best single-season mark for a Cardinal since 1985 and best since Jim Edmonds' .382 BABIP in 2002.

**CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:**

**2009** – Completed his first season in the Majors by finishing among rookie leaders in most offensive categories...led all rookies in games played (147), finished 2nd in homers (16), 4th in RBI (52), runs (72), hits (119), doubles (22) and multi-hit games (32) and his 40 extra-base hits ranked 5th...had a team-high 104 starts in CF...led the team with five bunt singles...was just the sixth Cardinals rookie since 1954 to start 100 or more games in CF, joining Ray Lankford ('91), Bake McBride ('74), Curt Flood ('58), Bill Virdon ('55) and Wally Moon ('54)...the last rookie to serve as primary CF for the Cardinals during a playoff season was Willie McGee in 1982...was the youngest Opening Day player (22 yrs) for the Cardinals since Albert Pujols (21 yrs) in 2001...hit a pair of walk-off HR's...had key 2-out game-tying single in 9th vs. LAD on 7/29 to send game to extra innings (15 inn. win).

**2009 POSTSEASON** – Started all three games in centerfield for St. Louis during the D.S. vs. LA...led the team with a .444 batting average (4-9) and had three doubles...walked, scored and doubled in Game 1 loss...doubled and singled in Game 2, driving in the then go-ahead run in the 7th with his double...walked and doubled in Game 3.

**2008** – The Cards top prospect began his season at Triple-A Memphis, but suffered through an injury-plagued season...got off to a slow start, hitting just .210 in April and .218 in May before getting hot in June, producing a .337 month with four homers and 15 RBI...played in just one July game before he was placed on the DL on 7/8 with a strained right groin...briefly came off the DL on 7/18 but was returned back to the DL 7/23 with a sprained right knee...was reinstated from the disabled list on 8/28 and played in three games for Palm Beach (A)...was selected to both Futures Game and Team USA Olympic rosters, but did not play due to injury...named by *Baseball America* as the top prospect in Cardinals system and among all Triple-A players in the PCL.

**2007** – Spent the entire season at Double-A Springfield and was named the Cardinals Minor League Player of the Year for a second-straight season...became just the second Cardinal farmhand to win back-to-back Minor League Player of the Year awards since the award's inception in 1995 (John Gall, 2002-03)... was named to the First Team Minor League All-Star team as an outfielder and to the Double-A All Star team by *Baseball America* and was also named to Topps' Double-A All-Star team...his 29 homers and 93 runs scored led the Texas League, as did his .551 slugging pct...collected 37 doubles, 3rd among all Texas Leaguers while his 69 extra-base hits ranked first...selected to play in the Texas League All-Star Game where he was the starting centerfielder and singled, walked and scored a run in the game.... was also named to the Texas League Post-Season All-Star Team...joined teammate C Bryan Anderson at the Futures

Game during Major League All-Star break in San Francisco...selected to the Team USA roster that won the gold medal in the 2007 Baseball Federation World Cup in Chinese Taipei...was one of three players named as the tournament's Best Three Outfielders...during the World Cup games, led the USA team with 13 hits, batting .382 (13-34) overall and played in all 10 games, also a team high, and also played the most innings of any team member (78.0)...named to the TOPPS /Minor League Baseball Double-A All-Star Team...named the Texas League Payer of the Month for May (.340, 8HR, 24RBI) and August (.365, 12 HR, 17RBI)...was a three-time Player of the Week for the Texas League, including back-to-back weeks in August (8/13-19 & 8/20-26)...was named Texas League Player of the Week from 5/28-6/3 when he hit .450 (9-20)...*Baseball America* named Colby as the Best Defensive Outfielder in the Texas League, the Most Exciting Player and possessing the Best Outfield arm in the League.

**2006** – The Cardinals top prospect climbed to High-A ball in his second professional season en route to being named Cardinals Minor League Player of the Year...led all Cardinals farmhands with 85 RBI and his 28 stolen bases ranked third among STL minor leaguers...selected to play in the Midwest League All-Star Game held in Quad Cities on 6/20 where he doubled and had a pair of hits in his start in RF and was the only player on the West side to have two hits...posted a .330 (33-for-100) batting average in May, earning Cardinals Minor League Player of the Month honors...was promoted to Palm Beach on 7/3.

**2005** – Appeared in 62 games at Johnson City (R)...his .514 slugging percentage ranked 2nd-best among the Cardinals 2005 draft class...47 runs scored ranked 4th-most in the Appalachian League...collected five triples, tied for 3rd in both the Appy League and STL minor league system.

**MISC:** Graduated from Russell County High School...helped lead his high school to the National Championship his senior year (2005)...also pitched in high school and was clocked at 91 mph off the mound...broke Bo Jackson's Alabama state single-season record with 24 home runs...his Little League team won the U.S. championship at the 1999 Little League World Series -- lost the overall championship 5-0 to Hirakata, Osaka, Japan...brother Cory (RHP) was the 38th overall pick in the supplemental round of the 2006 draft by the Atlanta Braves...father Tony was a 10th-round draft pick of the Angels in January 1986 and is the coach of Russell County HS...Colby was named the Cardinals top prospect in 2007, 2008 and 2009 by *Baseball America*...resides in Phenix City, Alabama with his fiancé Megan, and daughter Rylee.

PITCHER

**2010 SEASON:**

- Appeared in 34 games with Toronto, starting five. Began the season in the Blue Jays rotation making all five starts before moving to the bullpen 6/11 for the remaining 29 appearances.
- For the first time since 2006, was tougher against LH batters holding them to a .176 BA (18-102).
- Worked 2.0 or more innings in 14 of his 29 relief appearances, and had five relief appearances of 3.0 innings or more with a season-high of 3.1 at NYY (7/3).
- Started the Blue Jays home opener on 4/12 vs. CWS throwing 6.0 innings in a no decision (Lost 8-7 in 11 inn.).
- Matched his career high allowing 20 home runs, with 13 coming in relief, ranking T-3rd among MLB relievers.
- His 2.33 HR allowed per nine innings pitched was the highest total of any Major Leaguer with at least 70 innings in 2010.

**CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:**

**2009** – Made 37 appearances, including a career high 25 starts... in his 25 starts posted a 7-8 record with a 5.41 ERA with 11 quality starts and held the opposition to three or less runs in 15 starts...LH hitters batted .290, while RH hitters batted .259...4/10 at CLE allowed two home runs, the first time he'd allowed more than one HR in a game in his career...on 4/18 vs. OAK made his 1st start since 8/7/06...on 4/24 at CWS, picked up his 1st win as a starter since his Major League debut on 9/16/02 when pitching for CLE...between 5/4-30, tossed six consecutive quality starts, going 2-2 with a 3.00 ERA and holding opponents to a .173 average.

**2008** – Began the season retiring the first 13 batters he faced...had a string of 12 outings covering 13.0 IP without allowing an earned run between 4/21-5/31...in 11 May games, allowed only one earned run for a 0.82 ERA...when pitching with runners in scoring position, held opponents to a .182 mark (10-55), and with runners in scoring position and two out, held opponents to a .185 avg. (5-27)...picked up his first win since 2007 on 9/7 vs. TB...was placed on the 15-day DL from July 28 – Aug. 15 with a fractured right toe.

**2007** – Had his contract purchased by Toronto from Syracuse (AAA) on 4/22...his .215 opponents average ranked 2nd on the club...the 62.1 IP was the third most from a Blue Jays reliever...allowed only one home run (Luis Hernandez, BAL) all season coming in his 47th appearance (of 51)...went 60.1 IP without allowing a home run...from 5/23-6/13 did not allow an earned run over 16.2 IP...had two separate streaks of six and eight games without giving up an earned run...recorded a strikeout in 14 straight games from 5/18-6/22.

**2006** – Was on the Opening Day roster...was optioned to Syracuse (AAA) on 5/2, before returning on 6/10...after his return from the minors, posted an ERA of 3.09 over his final 37 outings...retired 22 of 43 first batters faced (51%) and stranded 31 of 43 inherited runners (72%)...finished September/October with an ERA of 1.23 in seven appearances...made his only start of the season 8/7 vs. BAL...did not allow an earned run in 2.1 IP, despite walking four...worked 2.0 IP or more in nine games, holding the opposition to 6 ER in 22.1 IP (2.70 ERA) of those contests...had a span of 32 games without allowing a home run...held opposing hitters to a .238 batting average...LH hitters were limited to a .220 avg., while RH hitters batted .246.

**2005** – Spent most of the season at Buffalo (AAA) and made two appearances over four stints in Cleveland...did not allow a run over his 4.1 relief IP in the International League postseason (4.1 IP, 1 H, 0 R)...was a combined 3-1 with a 2.53 ERA in nine April/May starts (46.1 IP, 36 H, 13 ER) and 3-4 with a 6.69 ERA in eight combined June/July starts (40.1 IP, 53 H, 30 ER).

**2004** – Began the season on the DL after rehabbing from reconstructive left elbow surgery the previous August...started the season on the 60-day DL, rehabbing in extended spring training...began a rehab assignment at Mahoning Valley on 6/30 before being sent to Lake County on 7/3...rehab was transferred to Akron on 7/8, where he remained with the Aeros from 7/8-8/21...activated from the 60-day DL on 7/27 and optioned to Akron...was promoted to Buffalo on 8/22 and spent remainder of season with the Bisons...did not allow a run over his three International League playoff outings for the IL Champion Bisons.



2003 – Split the season between Buffalo, Cleveland and the disabled list with August elbow surgery...opened the season in Buffalo...was recalled to Cleveland the first time on 5/28...made his 2003 debut and first career relief appearance with a perfect 1.0 inning at COL on 6/3...was optioned to Buffalo on 6/22...made four more starts with Buffalo from 6/26-7/13 before making a spot start at CWS on 7/21 (4.2 IP, 5 H, 4 R/ 1 ER)...was removed from what turned out to be his final appearance of 2003 on 7/26 at Pawtucket after 3.0 IP with discomfort in his left pitching elbow ...underwent ligament reconstruction ('Tommy John' Surgery) and ulnar nerve transposition in Birmingham, Ala. by Dr. James Andrews on 8/26...spent entire 2003-04 off-season rehabbing the injury in Cleveland.

2002 – Spent most of the season between Buffalo (AAA) and Akron (AA), going a combined 12-4, before spending the last three weeks at the big league level where he made his major league debut and picked up his first win...spent the first half of the season with the Akron Aeros...did not make his first start at Akron until 4/13 as he overcame offseason/spring training shoulder tendonitis...won his last six decisions with Akron from 6/9-7/4 before being promoted to Buffalo on 7/14...at time of promotion his 10 wins were tied for 2nd in the Eastern League and his 3.08 ERA was 7th...after the season he was named second runner-up for Pitcher of the Year honors in the Eastern League...was promoted to the big leagues on 9/13 when his contract was purchased from Buffalo after the Bisons were eliminated from the IL playoffs...made and won his Major League debut on 9/16

at BOS in the night game of a day/night doubleheader...tossed 6.0 shutout innings in a 7-1 win over the Sox (6.0 IP, 4 H, 0 R, 3 BB, 1 SO), becoming the first Indian to win big league debut in starting role since Paul Rigdon on 5/21/00 vs. NYY.

2001 – Spent the entire season at Kinston (A) of the Carolina League, leading the circuit in strikeouts with 164...led the Indians organization in strikeouts and innings pitched (160.0) and his 27 starts were tied for first in the system...his 3.04 ERA was the 5th lowest mark in the Carolina League and his two complete games were tied for 4th...had three starts of 10 strikeouts.

2000 – Was the 55th player selected in the 2000 draft by the Tribe and signed his first pro contract on August 1...named 14th best prospect in the organization by Baseball America after the season.

MISC: Graduated from Putnam City West High School in 1996 in Oklahoma City, Okla...played his collegiate ball at Hill Junior College (TX), where he went 11-2 in 1997 and led his team to the Western Regional Texas state crown...and then went on to Louisiana State University under legendary coach Skip Bertman...was a teammate of current Cardinal Ryan Theriot on the 2000 LSU team...started the title game against Stanford for the 2000 NCAA Championship...was drafted three times without signing (Florida, 14th round, 1996), New York Yankees (13th round, 1997) and Pittsburgh (19th round, 1999)...married with one child...resides in Baton Rouge, La.

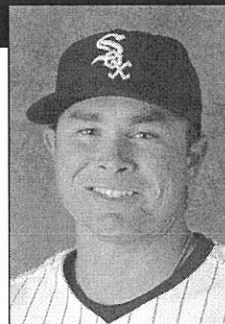

the ninth inning ... homered in three consecutive games for the third time in his career on 6/3-5 at White Sox ... recorded his second multihomer game on 9/13-2 at Cleveland.

■ **2007:** Totaled career bests in triples (8), stolen bases (13), runs scored (78) and hits (155) in his third season with the Royals ... his 17 outfield assists tied a club record (also Jermaine Dye in 1999) and ranked second in the AL ... also tied for the major-league lead with seven double plays ... finished sixth in the AL in triples ... grounded into 23 double plays, tied for the league lead and the most by a Royals player since 1992 ... equaled a franchise record with three outfield assists on 5/5 vs. Detroit ... tied a career high with five RBI on 6/14 vs. St. Louis ... struck out at least once in 22 straight games from 6/22-7/14, establishing a club record ... was on the disabled list with a strained left forearm from 8/24-9/3.
