ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have started the season 2-3 for the fourth time in the last six years (went 1-4 last year and 4-1 in 2010)...this is the A's 45th season in Oakland where they have won 14 American League West titles, one AL Wild Card, six AL pennants and four World Championships...only the New York Yankees (17) and Atlanta Braves (16) have more division titles than the A's...since the A's moved to Oakland in 1968, only the Yankees (11) and Cardinals (7) have more league championships and only the Yankees have more world championships (7)...have a 3629-3368 (.519) record over the previous 44 seasons in Oakland...only five teams have won more games over that span (New York Yankees, Boston, Los Angeles Dodgers, St. Louis, Cincinnati)...finished the 2011 season with a 74-88 record, which marked the A's fifth consecutive season without a winning record...this is the Athletics franchise 112th season in the American League...since 1901, the A's have 14 AL West titles plus 15 AL pennants and nine World Championships...only the Yankees (27) and Cardinals (11) have won more World Championships...the A's are 8344-8840 (.486) in their previous 111 seasons...that includes a 3886-4248 record from 1901-54 in Philadelphia and 829-1224 from 1955-67 in Kansas City.

SHUTOUT: The A's shutout the Royals 1-0 last night, their first 1-0 win over Kansas City since April 16, 1992...blanked the Royals 7-0 in their final meeting of 2011 on September 7 and have a 22-inning scoreless streak against Kansas City...Oakland's longest scoreless streak ever against Kansas City is 25 innings from July 3-24, 1976.

UNDER THE LIGHTS: The A's have started the season with five consecutive night games, a streak that is scheduled to reach six before the first day game tomorrow...the only time in Oakland history the A's have started the season with more than four consecutive night games is 2006 when they had six...last year, the A's were 42-57 at night compared to 32-31 during the day...had the second worst record under the lights in the American League.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 1-2 on this five-game homestand against Seattle (0-2) and Kansas City (1-2)...begin their first road trip of the season on Friday, a seven-game trek to Seattle (three games) and Los Angeles (four games)...last year, the A's compiled a 43-38 (.531) record in Oakland compared to 31-50 (.383) on the road.

THE LONG BALL: The A's have hit six home runs, which is their best total over the first five games of the season since 2005 when they had seven...last year, the A's did not hit their sixth home run until game 11 (homered just seven times over the first 17 games)...hit three home runs against Seattle March 29...hit three home runs in a game just three times last year and have gone 274 consecutive games with three home runs or fewer, which is the longest active streak in the majors and second longest streak in Oakland history (440, Aug. 10, 1976-June 18, 1979)...the last time the A's hit more than three home runs in a game was June 3, 2010 at Boston (4)

DURING THE SPRING: The A's went 15-7-2 (.667) during the spring, which was the best record among Cactus League teams and third best in the majors behind Toronto (24-7-1) and Detroit (20-8-5)...finished with a winning record for the first time since 2008 when they finished 18-8...the 15 wins were three more than the A's total from each of the previous two springs (12-21-1 in 2011, 12-17-3 in 2010), despite playing just 24 games...the 24 games were the A's fewest since 1990 when they played 16...after concluding the Arizona portion of their schedule on Wednesday, March 21, the A's led the majors in runs (133), hits (218) and walks (80) and topped the CL in doubles (52) and home runs (24)...finished the spring ranked third in the majors in on-base percentage (.356) and sixth in batting (.284) and slugging (.468).

ROSTER NOTES: The A's opened the season in Japan with 10 pitchers and 15 position players but now have 11 pitchers and 14 position players...seven players returned from last years Opening Day roster (Balfour, Blevins, Crisp, Fuentes, McCarthy, Pennington, Suzuki)...those are the **fewest returning players from a previous Opening Day roster** since Opening Day rosters are first available in 1992 (previous: 8, 2008 and 2009)...with the addition of Tommy Milone, the A's now have eight rookies on their roster...had seven rookies on the Opening Day Roster (Carignan, Céspedes, Cook, Cowgill, Donaldson, Godfrey, Recker), which were the A's **most rookies on an Opening Day roster** since they are first available in 1992...the previous high was five in 2009...five players have six or more years of service: Bartolo Colón (13 years, 61 days), Brian Fuentes (9 years, 125 days), Coco Crisp (8 years, 158 days), Grant Balfour (7 years, 99 days) and Jonny Gomes (6 years, 97 days)...the average age on the A's Opening Day roster was 27.96 years...the A's roster features just one player under the age of 25: Ryan Cook (24 years, 272 days)...he is the "oldest youngest" player on an A's Opening Day roster since Barry Zito in 2003 (24 years, 323 days)...Josh Reddick is second youngest at 25 years, 38 days...there are five players that are at least 30 years old...Bartolo Colón is the oldest at 38 years, 309 days...he is followed by Brian Fuentes (36 years, 232 days) and Grant Balfour (34 years, 89 days).

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list five times this year and currently have four players on the DL (Anderson, Braden, Devine, Sizemore)...Sizemore is on the 60-day DL and will miss the entire season...the A's used the DL 15 times last year, which was the fewest since 2006 when they also used it 15 times...have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had just one.

CONTRACT STATUS: The A's have four players under contract beyond the 2012 season...Brett Anderson is signed through 2013 with club options for 2014 and 2015...Coco Crisp is signed through 2013 with a club option for 2014...Kurt Suzuki is signed through 2013 with a club option for 2014...Yoenis Céspedes is signed through 2015...Grant Balfour and Brian Fuentes both have club options for 2013.

FILLING IN: Johnny Doskow, long-time voice of the A's Triple-A affiliate in Sacramento, will join the club's radio broadcast on an interim basis while Ken Korach recovers from knee replacement surgery...Vince Cotroneo will assume Korach's primary broadcast duties.

A's vs. ROYALS

The A's won the first meeting of 2012 last night after winning the season series last year, 5-4...have won three straight season series against Kansas City and are 18-9 (.667) against the Royals since 2009...won two of three in Kansas City last year and split six games in Oakland...all-time, the A's are 297-243 against the Royals...that breaks down to 164-108 in Oakland and 133-135 in Kansas City.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Yoenis Céspedes is one of two Athletics (Weeks) to reach base safely via hit or walk in all five games this year...is the third player since 1918 to homer in three of his first four Major League games...is the ninth player with at least three home runs in his first four games...is the only Athletic this year to hit safely in each of the first four games (4 for 13, .308).

Coco Crisp stole his first base of the season last night and has been successful in each of his last 24 stolen base attempts.

Jonny Gomes is a .342 (25 for 73) career hitter against Kansas City with 12 home runs and 22 RBI in 26 career games...his .904 slugging percentage is the best ever against the Royals among players with 75 or more plate appearances.

Jemile Weeks has hit safely in all seven of his career games against Kansas City, going 13 for 30 (.433) with four doubles, a triple and six RBI.

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1968** the Oakland A's play their first game, a 3-1 loss at Baltimore...John Donaldson collected the A's first hit, a second inning single, and Reggie Jackson hit the first home run, an eighth inning solo shot...in **1975** Mike Norris tossed a complete-game three-hit shutout in his Major League debut in the A's 9-0 win over Chicago...in **1990** Rickey Henderson draws his 1000th career walk in the fourth inning off Minnesota pitcher Roy Smith.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his first start of the season, the fifth of his career...the A's were 2-2 in his starting assignments last year...tossed six or more innings in one of his starts, allowed two runs or fewer once and walked two batters or fewer all four times

GODFREY vs. KANSAS CITY: Is making his first career appearance.

THIS SPRING: Was 1-2 with a 5.09 ERA in six appearances, including four starts...led the A's in innings pitched (17.2) and strikeouts (13)...went 1-2 with a 3.95 ERA (6 er in 13.2 ip) in his four starts and 0-0 with a 9.00 ERA (4 er in 4.0 ip) in two relief appearances...posted a 9.00 ERA over his first three games and a 3.09 ERA over his final three outings.

2011 HIGHLIGHTS: Made his Major League

debut in 2011 and was 1-2 with a 3.96 ERA in five games, four starts, over three stints with the A's...walked just five batters in 25.0 innings (1.80 walks per nine innings)...allowed a .305 batting average, which included a .267 (16 for 60) mark against left-handed hitters and .356 (16 for 45) against right-handers...allowed seven of his 10 extra-base hits to righties for a .600 slugging percentage...yielded a .457 slugging percentage overall...opponents hit .353 with the bases empty, .259 with runners on...allowed a .222 average with runners in scoring position...had a .381 opponents average and all three of his home runs the first time through the lineup, .254 after that...held the first three hitters in the batting order to a .176 batting average but allowed a .474 average to the opponents four, five and six hitters...opponents were 13-for-25 (.520) with a walk when leading off an inning...was 1-2 with a 4.71 ERA in his four starting assignments...tossed 4.0 scoreless innings in his only relief appearance...made four starts for Escogido in the Dominican Winter League following the season and was 1-0 with a 3.31 ERA.

WITH OAKLAND: Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 10 and made his Major League debut with a start that day at Chicago (AL)...allowed five runs on nine hits in 4.1 innings but had a no decision in the A's 7-5 win...the hits were the most by an A's pitcher in his debut since April 10, 1983 when Bill Krueger yielded nine at California...was the 42nd pitcher in Oakland history to start in his debut...struck out Gordon Beckham in the first inning for his first big league strikeout...was credited with his first ML win in his second start June 17 against San Francisco, outdueling two-time Cy Young Award winner Tim Lincecum...allowed two runs on six hits in a career-high 7.0 innings...then took the loss June 23 at New York (NL)...was moved to the bullpen after going 1-1 with a 4.24 ERA in three starts but did not pitch again before he was optioned to Sacramento July 7...returned to start the second game of the doubleheader Aug. 27 at Boston and allowed three runs on six hits in 4.0 innings for the loss...was sent back to Sacramento Aug. 29, then returned to Oakland Sept. 17 when the River Cats season ended...made just one more appearance with the A's and it came in relief of Rich Harden Sept. 20 against Texas...tossed 4.0 scoreless innings, matching the longest outing by an A's reliever in 2011.

MINORS: Began the season at Double-A Midland and made one start, a no decision in a 10-2 win over Arkansas April 7...allowed two unearned runs in 4.0 innings and struck out six...was promoted to Sacramento April 12 and went 14-3 with a 2.68 ERA in 19 games, 18 starts with the River Cats...led the Pacific Coast League and tied for fifth in all of minor league baseball in wins...did not have enough innings pitched to qualify for the league leaders, but his ERA would have been second best in the PCL...combined for a 2.59 ERA with Sacramento and Midland, which was the lowest ERA in the A's farm system...also led the A's farm system in wins (14)...his wins were a career-high and his ERA was the lowest of his career...was named the A's Organizational Pitcher of the Year and was also named to the *Baseball/America* Triple-A All-Star Team...led Sacramento in wins and ranked second in strikeouts (89)...allowed just six home runs in 107.1 innings, an average of 0.50 per nine innings...allowed a .227 opponents batting average, which included a .223 (43 for 193) mark against left-handed hitters and .230 (49 for 213) against right-handers...held the opposition to a .198 batting average when leading off an inning and .146 with runners in scoring position and two outs...four of the six home runs he allowed were solo shots...the River Cats were 13-5 (.722) in his starting assignments...tossed six or more innings in 11 of his 18 starts, allowed two runs or fewer 13 times and walked two batters or fewer 15 times.

MORE WITH SACRAMENTO: Had a no decision in his first start with Sacramento April 12 but then won each of his next four starts from April 17 to May 5...had a 1.82 ERA and .186 opponents batting average over that stretch...was placed on the disabled list May 6 with a sprained right wrist...was reinstated May 19 and lost that day against Oklahoma City...won each of his next three starts and was 7-1 with a 2.50 ERA in nine starts when he was promoted to Oakland June 10...optioned back to Sacramento July 7 and made his only relief appearance with the River Cats July 8 at Las Vegas...tossed 4.0 scoreless and hitless innings for the win...allowed a season-high nine hits in 5.0 innings in a 4-3 loss to Salt Lake July 20...tossed a season-high tying 7.0 innings and struck out a season-high eight in back-to-back wins July 25 against Reno and July 31 against Colorado Springs...allowed a season-high six runs on a season-high tying three walks in a 7-6 loss at Iowa Aug. 10...promoted to Oakland again Aug. 27 but was back at Sacramento for a final regular season start Sept. 1 against Las Vegas...allowed one run in 6.0 innings for his 14th win...then went 0-1 with a 5.73 ERA and .340 opponents batting average in two postseason starts (11.0 ip, 16 h, 7 r, 7 er, 5 bb, 4 so, 2 hr).

MINOR LEAGUE CAREER: Is 40-34 with a 4.12 ERA (296 er in 647.0 ip) in 129 games, 112 starts, in five minor league seasons...was a Texas League Midseason and Postseason All-Star at Midland in 2009...was a member of league champions at Midland in 2009 and Stockton (California League) in 2008...was originally drafted by Toronto in the 34th round of the 2006 draft...was traded to the Oakland organization in the Marco Scutaro deal following the 2007 season.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Brandon McCarthy (0-1, 2.25 ERA): Is scheduled to make his third start of the season...Wednesday's start will be his third in the A's first seven games...since 1977, the only pitcher in Oakland history to start three of the A's first seven games is Joe Blanton, who did it in 2008, the last time the A's went to Japan...was the losing pitcher in his last start, a 7-3 loss to Seattle last Friday (5.0 ip, 7 h, 5 r, 2 er, 2 bb, 3 so)...is 1-1 with a 5.48 ERA (21.1 ip, 18 h, 13 r, 13 er, 9 bb, 10 so, 1 hr) in 10 career appearances, including two starts, against Kansas City...was the losing pitcher in his only outing last year, a start in the A's 4-3 loss at Kansas City May 7 (8.1 ip, 7 h, 4 r, 4 er, 2 bb, 3 so)...was 0-0 with a 4.63 ERA (11.2 ip, 13 h, 9 r, 6 er, 4 bb, 6 so) in three starts this spring...had the best season of his six-year Major League career last year as he was 9-9 with a 3.32 ERA in 25 starts...had career highs in wins, starts, complete games (5), innings pitched (170.2) and strikeouts (123)...his ERA was the lowest of his career as was his .281 opponents on-base percentage and .377 opponents slugging percentage.

ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

0-1, 3.07 ERA (14.2 ip, 12 h, 5 r, 5 er, 4 bb, 8 so, 1 hr) Save/Save Opportunities: 2/2 (100.0%)

The A's bullpen compiled a 3.74 ERA last year, which ranked eighth in the American League...had 39 saves, which tied for fourth, but had 18 blown saves for a save percentage of 68.4...that ranked seventh in the AL...also ranked sixth in opponents slugging percentage (.371), eighth in opponents on-base percentage (.323) and 10th in opponents batting average (.247)...allowed 70 of 208 (33.7%) inherited runners to score, which was the fourth highest percentage in the AL...first batters faced hit .250, which was fifth highest in the AL...had the third most first batter strikeouts (101)...had the fewest wins (15) and the lowest winning percentage (.375) in the AL...was charged with the most unearned runs in the AL (34), tied for second in fewest hit batters (13) and tied for third in fewest home runs (40).

- Has pitched in four of five games this season and has not allowed a run (4.0 ip, 1 h, 1 bb, 2 so).
- Is on his fourth consecutive Opening Day roster (last year with Oakland, 2009-10 with Tampa Bay) but this is his ninth season in the majors.
- Posted a 2.25 ERA in four appearances against Kansas City last year (4.0 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 3 so).
- Compiled a 6.75 ERA in seven spring training appearances...did not allow a run over his final five outings (5.0 ip, 3 h, 1 bb, 4 so).
- Was used mostly as a set-up man with Oakland last year, posting a 5-2 record with two saves, a 2.47 ERA and .199 opponents average in 62 appearances...tied for eighth among AL relievers in grounded into double plays (8) and ranked 10th in opponents on-base percentage (.266).

- Had his career-high 10.1-inning scoreless streak dating back to last season snapped when Saunders homered in the sixth inning Saturday.
- Has allowed 1 of 3 (33.3%) inherited runners to score this year and 9 of 17 (52.9%) over the last two years.
- Begins his sixth Major League season, all with Oakland, and is on his fourth consecutive Opening Day roster.
- Has not allowed a run in 12 career appearances against the Royals (11.0 ip, 9 h, 11 so).
- Posted a 3.86 ERA in eight spring training appearances...opponents went 4 for 24 (.167) with one walk.
- Was on the A's Opening Day roster last year but had six stints with Oakland...had a 2.86 ERA and .235 opponents average in 26 games...the ERA was the lowest of his career but he allowed 8 of 14 (57.1%) inherited runners to score, which was the highest percentage of his career.

- Was charged with the loss March 28 against Seattle (0.1 ip, 2 h, 2 r, 2 er) after allowing two runs in 0.1 innings.
- Faced the Royals for the only time in his career last season on Sept. 6 (2.0 ip, 1 h, 3 so).
- Did not allow a run in six of his seven spring training appearances for a 2.16 ERA...did not walk a batter and struck out nine in 8.1 innings.
- Pitched at three different levels in the A's farm system last year, combining for a 1-0 record with eight saves and a 1.85 ERA in 33 relief appearances...earned a September promotion to Oakland and posted a 4.26 ERA in six relief appearances in his Major League debut.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his third start of the season...the A's are 0-2 in his starting assignments this year and are 11-16 (.407) in his two seasons with the A's...his teams are 38-45 (.458) in his career...tossed six or more innings in 21 of his 25 starts last year, allowed two runs or fewer 11 times and walked two batters or fewer 24 times.

THREE OUT OF SEVEN: Today's start will be his third in the A's first seven games...since 1977, the only pitcher in Oakland history to start three of the A's first seven games is Joe Blanton, who did it in 2008, the last time the A's went to Japan...McCarthy also started two of the A's first three games, joining Blanton as the only pitchers in Oakland history to start two of the A's first three games.

WALKS AND STRIKEOUTS: Has six strikeouts and two walks over his first two starts this year...last year, he struck out 123 and walked just 25 to set an Athletics record (since 1901) for strikeout-to-walk ratio with a mark of 4.92...broke the previous record of 3.91 set by Dan Haren in 2006...averaged 1.32 walks per nine innings, which was the second-lowest mark in Athletics history...the record is 1.30 by Jim "Catfish" Hunter in 1974...ranked second in the AL in strikeout-to-walk ratio and was third in walks per nine innings.

FIRST START: Had a no decision in the A's 3-1, 11-inning loss to Seattle in Tokyo on March 28...it was his first career Opening Day start and he became the seventh different Opening Day starter for the A's in the last seven years (Cahill, Sheets, Braden, Blanton, Haren, Zito)...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed just one run on a Dustin Ackley home run in the fourth inning...Hernandez and the Mariners bullpen combined to limit the A's to a run on six hits.

LAST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 7-3 loss to Seattle last Friday in Oakland...blanked the Mariners on two hits over the first two innings before allowing four runs in the third...an error by Donaldson made three of the runs unearned...Seager had a two-run single to highlight the scoring and McCarthy allowed another run in the fourth on a Figgins RBI single.

McCARTHY vs. KANSAS CITY: Is 1-1 with a 5.48 ERA (21.1 ip, 18 h, 13 r, 13 er, 9 bb, 10 so, 1 hr) in 10 career appearances, including two starts...is 0-1 with a 4.63 ERA (6 er in 11.2 ip) in four appearances, one start, in Kansas City and 1-0 with a 6.52 ERA (7 er in 9.2 ip) in six games in his home ballparks...is 0-1 with a 6.92 ERA (10 er in 13.0 ip) in his two starting assignments...was the losing pitcher in his only outing last year, a start in the A's 4-3 loss at Kansas City May 7...tossed a complete-game seven hitter and walked two...retired each of the first 14 batters before Hosmer singled with two outs in the fifth...then allowed three runs in the sixth inning on RBI singles by Cabrera and Gordon and a Butler sacrifice fly...the A's tied the game with three in the eighth but he allowed an Aviles sacrifice fly in the bottom of the ninth for the loss.

THIS SPRING: Was 0-0 with a 4.63 ERA (11.2 ip, 13 h, 9 r, 6 er, 4 bb, 6 so) in three starts this spring...did not allow a home run in 11.2 innings...opponents were 13 for 46 (.283)...also started a Triple-A game March 15, allowing two runs on five hits and no walks while striking out six in 5.0 innings.

2011 RECAP: Had the best season of his six-year Major League career as he was 9-9 with a 3.32 ERA in 25 starts...had career highs in wins, starts, complete games (5), innings pitched (170.2) and strikeouts (123)...his ERA was the lowest of his career as was his .281 opponents on-base percentage and .377 opponents slugging percentage...also had career highs in hits (168), runs (73) and earned runs (63)...tied for second in the American League in complete games, tied for eighth in shutouts (1) and ranked ninth in on-base percentage...also ranked third in home runs per nine innings (0.58) and fewest pitches per inning (14.6).

BEFORE AND AFTER THE BREAK: A stint on the disabled list and a lack of run support limited him to a 1-5 record despite a 3.54 ERA in 11 starts before the All-Star Break...then went 8-4 with a 3.15 ERA in 14 starts after the break...tied for third in the AL in post-break wins and was eighth in ERA.

GO THE DISTANCE: His five complete games were the most by an A's right-handed pitcher since Bobby Witt also had five in 1994...however, he was 1-4 in those games...the last pitcher with four complete game losses in a season was Livan Hernandez for Montreal in 2004...the last Athletic to do it was Ron Darling in 1994.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .258 opponents batting average, including .256 (89 for 348) against left-handed hitters and .260 (79 for 304) against right-handers...surrendered eight of his 11 home runs to left-handers...nine were solo shots...all 11 came after his 45th pitch in a game...opponents hit .217 with runners in scoring position and two outs...has allowed a .212 (46 for 217) average in that situation in his career...yielded a .351 batting average and four of his 11 home runs to the opponents number three hitter.

THIS AND THAT: Was 6-3 with a 2.65 ERA in 13 starts at home and 3-6 with a 3.99 ERA in 12 starts on the road...had the seventh-lowest home ERA in the AL...went 4-1 with a 2.41 ERA in six starts during the day and was 5-8 with a 3.61 ERA in 19 starts at night...had a 2.77 ERA over the first five innings of a game, a 4.75 ERA from the sixth inning on...went 4-0 with a 2.87 ERA in five starts against AL East teams and is 6-0 with a 3.59 ERA (29 er in 72.2 ip) in 11 starts against the East over the last three years...went 4-3 with a 4.22 ERA in 11 starts on four days rest and 5-6 with a 2.63 ERA in 14 starts on five days rest or more...committed four errors, which tied for fourth most among AL pitchers...had just three errors in 110 career games entering the season.

MORE FROM 2011: Was 1-4 with a 3.39 ERA in nine starts when he was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 20, retroactive to May 19, with a stress reaction in his right scapula...made two starts on a rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton, was reinstated July 3 and went 8-5 with a 3.28 ERA following his return...had a career-high-tying four-game winning streak from July 15 to Aug. 2 (2.78 ERA)...tossed back-to-back complete games Aug. 29 at Cleveland and Sept. 3 against Seattle...lost to the Indians 2-1 but picked up his first complete-game win of the season against the Mariners as he tossed a three-hit, 3-0 shutout...it was the low-hit game of his career and his second career shutout...is just the second Oakland pitcher with back-to-back complete games over the last seven years (Braden, May 9-14, 2010)...struck out 10 batters in each start, the first two 10-strikeout games of his career...is the first A's pitcher with back-to-back 10-strikeout games since Mark Mulder (July 24-29, 2003)...did not walk a batter in the game against Seattle and is just the third Athletics pitcher over the last 98 years with a complete-game shutout, three or fewer hits, no walks and 10 or more strikeouts.

Chipper Jones (.364) and St. Louis' Albert Pujols (.357)... also tied for fourth in the majors with 37 home runs and tied for sixth with 121 RBI... ranked second in the big leagues with a .601 slugging percentage, behind Pujols (.651)... ranked fourth in the majors with a .430 on-base percentage... hit homer No. 500 off Chad Bradford May 31 at Baltimore, accomplishing the feat in his 7,263rd at-bat, eighth-fewest all-time... began the season with 490 career homers, and went on to surpass seven Hall of Famers on the all-time home run list: Lou Gehrig (493), Eddie Murray (504), Mel Ott (511), Eddie Mathews (512), Ernie Banks (512), Willie McCovey (521) and Ted Williams (521)... recorded 53 RBI with the Dodgers and 68 with Boston... joined Carlos Beltran as the only players in ML history to record at least 50 RBI in both leagues in the same season... Beltran did it in 2004, collecting 51 RBI with Kansas City and 53 with Houston... in his first month in the NL was named the league's Player of the Month for August... batted .415 (44-for-106), with nine home runs, 25 RBI and 21 runs scored in 29 games... in his first 16 games with the club, collected 25 hits, six home runs and 21 RBI... since RBI became an official stat in 1920, only one other player reached Ramirez's totals in each of those categories over his first 16 games with a team – in 1925, Mandy Brooks had 25 hits, six home runs and 24 RBI in his first 16 games with the Chicago Cubs.

2007—Ranked third on the World Champion Red Sox with 20 homers and 88 RBI, his lowest totals in a season since the strike-shortened 1994 campaign... tied Los Angeles' Vladimir Guerrero for the American League lead with 17 game-winning RBI... started 120 games in left field and 11 as designated hitter... endured the slowest start of career, hitting .188 (16-for-85) in his first 23 games through April 28... appeared in 127 of Boston's first 132 games through Aug. 28... left that game at Yankee Stadium with a strained left oblique muscle and missed the next 24 contests before returning to action for the team's final six games from Sept. 25-30... drove in a team-high 16 runs in Boston's 14 postseason games.

2006—Was among several offensive category leaders in the American League, ranking first with a .439 on-base percentage and 2nd with a 1.058 OPS... was also eighth in batting average (.321) and home runs (35)... finished second in the AL in home batting average with a .355 mark (78-for-220) at Fenway Park... started 124 games in left field and five as the designated hitter... played in 122 of season's first 126 games but just eight (seven starts) of the final 36 contests beginning Aug. 24 due to right knee tendinitis... was hitting .330 Aug. 21, but with right knee problems was just 4-for-25 (.160) with a homer and two RBI in 10 games the rest of the year... produced a career-best 27-game hitting streak from July 15 to Aug. 12, batting .400 (40-for-100) with eight homers and 28 RBI... it was the longest streak in the AL in 2006... homered off Brian Moehler July 1 at Florida, becoming the 13th player to earn his 2,000th hit in a Boston uniform, the first since Wade Boggs in 1992.

.647 slugging percentage and a 1.097 OPS... was on the disabled list from May 14 to June 25 with a fractured left index finger, which he sustained sliding into home May 11 at Seattle... played in 10 games at Triple-A Pawtucket on a rehab assignment before returning to the Red Sox June 25 against Cleveland... batted .414 (67-for-162) with 15 homers and 47 RBI in his final 44 games beginning Aug. 13, raising his average from .310.

2001—In his first season with Boston, he ranked fourth in the American League with 41 homers, 125 RBI, a .609 slugging percentage and a 1.014 OPS... also ranked sixth with 76 extra-base hits, 322 total bases and a .405 on-base percentage... led the AL with 25 intentional walks including an AL-record four in an extra-inning game, June 5 against Detroit... missed seven games with a right hamstring strain August 20-26, and sat out the season's last six contests with a sore left wrist.

2000—Was the American League leader with a career-best .697 slugging percentage, which was second highest in Indians history... also led the AL with a 1.154 OPS... ranked third in the AL with a career-high .351 batting average and a career-best .457 on-base percentage... tied an Indians club record with an RBI in nine straight games from May 5-13... reached base safely via a hit or walk in 49 straight games from July 29–Sep 23... was on the disabled list from May 30 to July 12 with a strained left hamstring... in his final three seasons with Cleveland (1998–2000) averaged more than one RBI per game (432 RBI in 415 games)... also had 127 HR and a .649 slugging percentage... signed an eight-year, \$160 million free agent contract with the Red Sox, Dec. 13.

1999—Led the majors with an Indians single season club-record 165 RBI... that remains the highest total in the majors in the last 73 years... averaged an RBI every 3.164 at bats, which currently is the third-best ratio in a season in baseball history behind Hack Wilson (1930) and Babe Ruth (1921)... topped the American League in slugging (.663) and OPS (1.105) and was among the league leaders in on-base percentage (2nd, .442), homers (3rd, 44), extra-base hits (3rd, 81), runs (4th, career-best 131), total bases (4th, 346) and average (5th, .333)... led the Indians to their fifth consecutive AL Central Division title, but went 1-for-18 in the ALDS loss to the Red Sox... was elected to his second All-Star Game, his first as a starter... hit cleanup and played right field in a starting lineup that included four Indians: also first baseman Jim Thome, second baseman Roberto Alomar and left fielder Kenny Lofton.

1997—Ranked fourth in the American League with a .328 average... hit two home runs in the ALCS and two more in the World Series, but batted only .191 in the postseason as the Indians fell to the Marlins in the World Series in seven games.

1996—Ranked fifth in the American League with 81 extra base hits and sixth with a career-high 45 doubles... led the AL with a career-high 19 outfield assists... added two doubles and two home runs in the ALDS, but the Indians lost to Baltimore in four games.

1995—Became the 25th player in Major League history to produce 30 homers and 100 RBI in a season at the age of 23 or younger... was just the second Indian to do it joining Hal Trosky (1934 and 1936)... helped lead the Indians to their first World Series since 1954 with a lineup that also included Albert Belle (50 home runs), Eddie Murray (21) and Jim Thome (25)... was named to his first All-Star Game... entered as pinch-hitter and walked twice.

1994—Placed second in the BBWAA American League Rookie of the Year voting behind Kansas City's Bob Hamelin... ranked second among AL rookies with 78 hits, 22 doubles, 17 homers and 60 RBI.

1993—Selected as *Baseball America's* Minor League Player of the Year after hitting a combined .333 with 31 home runs and 115 RBI in 129 games with Double-A Canton-Akron and Triple-A Charlotte... had his contract purchased by Cleveland from Charlotte on Sept. 1... went 0-for-4 in his Major League debut the following day at Minnesota... but the next day, Sept. 3 at New York (AL), he went 3-for-4 with a double, two homers and three RBI... his first hit (double) and homer both came off Melido Perez.

1992—Appeared in 81 games at Single-A Kinston before being sidelined for the season in early July with a severely bruised hamate bone in his left hand.
