### ABOUT THE A's

**ABOUT THE A'S:** Have won two of the past three games and three of the last five after opening the season 1-3...are now 4-5 for the season, which matches their record after nine games last year (won game 10)...this is the A's 45<sup>th</sup> season in Oakland where they have won 14 American League West titles, one AL Wild Card, six AL pennants and four World Championships...only the New York Yankees (17) and Atlanta Braves (16) have more division titles than the A's...since the A's moved to Oakland in 1968, only the Yankees (11) and Cardinals (7) have more league championships and only the Yankees have more world championships (7)...have a 3629-3368 (.519) record over the previous 44 seasons in Oakland...only five teams have won more games over that span (New York Yankees, Boston, Los Angeles Dodgers, St. Louis, Cincinnati)...finished the 2011 season with a 74-88 record, which marked the A's fifth consecutive season without a winning record...this is the Athletics franchise 112<sup>th</sup> season in the American League...since 1901, the A's have 14 AL West titles plus 15 AL pennants and nine World Championships...only the Yankees (27) and Cardinals (11) have won more World Championships...the A's are 8344-8840 (.486) in their previous 111 seasons...that includes a 3886-4248 record from 1901-54 in Philadelphia and 829-1224 from 1955-67 in Kansas City.

**THIS AND THAT:** The A's collected five hits last night and have now tallied fewer than 10 hits in each of the first nine games...that is the second longest such streak in Oakland history to start a season...the record is 10 straight games to start the 1978 campaign...are batting .200, which is the lowest average in the American League...have scored 25 runs, which is tied for the fewest in the AL (Minnesota)...have been hit by a pitch six times, which is tied for second most in the majors...A's pitchers have not hit a batter, the only pitching staff in the majors without a hit batsmen.

**THE LONG BALL:** The A's have hit eight home runs, which is tied for seventh in the American League...it is their best total over the first nine games of the season since 2006 when they had 11...last year, the A's did not hit their eighth home run until the 18<sup>th</sup> game...numbers 9 and 10 came in game 21 and number 11 came in game 26...hit three home runs against Seattle March 29...hit three home runs in a game just three times last year and have gone 278 consecutive games with three home runs or fewer, which is the longest active streak in the majors and second longest streak in Oakland history (440, Aug. 10, 1976-June 18, 1979)...the last time the A's hit more than three home runs in a game was June 3, 2010 at Boston (4).

**ONE-RUN GAMES AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS:** The A's improved to 2-1 in one-run games with a 5-4, 12-inning win Wednesday against Kansas City...won the game when Jonny Gomes was hit by a pitch with the bases loaded...it was the third "walk-off" hit by pitch in Oakland history (Mike Bordick, August 4, 1993 vs. Seattle and Olmedo Saenz, July 20, 2002 vs. Texas)...Yoenis Céspedes was hit by a pitch prior to Gomes...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, it marked the first time a game ended with back-to-back hit by pitches since September 2, 1966 when Stu Miller of the Baltimore Orioles hit Al Weis and Tommie Agee of the Chicago White Sox...it marked the A's second extra inning game of the season (lost the opener 3-1 to Seattle in 11 innings)...last year, the A's went 20-25 in one-run games, which was the third worst record in the American League...were 8-11 in extra inning games, which was fourth worst...are now 16-29 (.356) in extra inning games over the last four years...had just three "walk-off" wins last year.

**HOME AND AWAY:** Are 1-1 on their first road trip of the season, a seven-game trek to Seattle (1-1) and Los Angeles (four games)...went 2-3 on the last homestand against Seattle (0-2) and Kansas City (2-1)...last year, the A's compiled a 43-38 (.531) record in Oakland compared to 31-50 (.383) on the road...posted a winning record at home for the second consecutive season but finished with a losing mark on the road for the fifth consecutive season.

**THE DISABLED LIST:** The A's have used the disabled list five times this year and currently have four players on the DL (Anderson, Braden, Devine, Sizemore)...Devine ("Tommy John" surgery) and Sizemore (Torn ACL) will miss the entire season...the A's used the DL 15 times last year, which was the fewest since 2006 when they also used it 15 times...used the DL a total of 87 times from 2007-10...have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had just one.

**ROSTER NOTES:** Seven players returned from last year's Opening Day roster (Balfour, Blevins, Crisp, Fuentes, McCarthy, Pennington, Suzuki)...those are the **fewest returning players from a previous Opening Day roster** since Opening Day rosters are first available in 1992 (previous: 8, 2008 and 2009)...had seven rookies on the Opening Day roster (Carrigan, Céspedes, Cook, Cowgill, Donaldson, Godfrey, Recker), which were the A's **most rookies on an Opening Day roster** since they are first available in 1992 (previous: 5, 2009)...currently have eight rookies on the roster (Milone)...the average age on the A's Opening Day roster was 27.96 years.

**DURING THE SPRING:** The A's went 15-7-2 (.667) during the spring, which was the best record among Cactus League teams and third best in the majors...finished with a winning record for the first time since 2008 when they finished 18-8...after concluding the Arizona portion of their schedule on Wednesday, March 21, the A's led the majors in runs (133), hits (218) and walks (80) and topped the CL in doubles (52) and home runs (24)...finished the spring ranked third in the majors in on-base percentage (.356) and sixth in batting (.284) and slugging (.468).

**CHANGING THE CHANNEL:** Due to the San Jose Sharks playoffs coverage, Monday night's game will air on Comcast Sports Net Plus 2...channels are: Comcast (104 Standard, 785 High Definition), Dish (451 SD, 9539 HD), Direct (699 SD, 699-1 HD), ATT (768 SD, 1768 HD).

**FILLING IN:** Johnny Daskow, long-time voice of the A's Triple-A affiliate in Sacramento, will join the club's radio broadcast on an interim basis while Ken Korach recovers from knee replacement surgery...Vince Cotroneo will assume Korach's primary broadcast duties.

### A's vs. MARINERS

The A's trail in the season series, 2-4...have split the first two games of this series, were swept in a two-game series in Oakland last weekend and split a two-game series in Japan to open the season...the A's lost the season series last year, 9-10...went 5-4 in Oakland but were 4-6 in Seattle...have now lost three of the previous five season series and are 44-57 (.436) against Seattle since 2007...that is the **lowest winning percentage** by any American League team against the Mariners over that span...all-time, the A's are 294-221 (.571) against Seattle, which is the second best mark by an AL team against the Mariners (Boston, .576)...are 163-94 in Oakland, 130-126 in Seattle and 1-1 in Tokyo...are 54-62 at Safeco Field.

### TODAY'S TIDBITS

**Coco Crisp** has been successful in each of his last 24 stolen base attempts.

**Kurt Suzuki** has tossed out 4 of 9 (44.4%) attempted base stealers this year after throwing out just 23 of 121 (19.0%) last year...has seven home runs and 40 RBI in his career against Seattle, both his best figures against any team.

**Jemile Weeks** hit his second home run of the season Friday night...went homerless over the first 90 games of his career but now has four home runs in his last 16 games.

### THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In **1990** Dennis Eckersley records his 100th career save in the A's 3-0 win at Seattle...with 100 saves, he becomes just the sixth pitcher in major league history with 100 saves and 100 victories...in **2006** Eric Chavez, Frank Thomas and Milton Bradley hit back-to-back-to-back home runs on three consecutive pitches off Vicente Padilla in the sixth inning of the A's 5-4 win over Texas.

**FOR STARTERS:** Is scheduled to make his second start of the season, the sixth of his career...the A's are 2-3 (.400) in his starting assignments in his career...last year, he tossed six or more innings in one of his starts, allowed two runs or fewer once and walked two batters or fewer all four times.

**LAST START:** He was the losing pitcher in the A's 3-0 loss to Kansas City last Tuesday in Oakland...tossed six innings and allowed two runs, both in the fourth inning...Moustakas had a RBI double and Quintero delivered a sacrifice fly...the A's were shutout on one hit by Duffy and Crow, in a game that was called because of rain in the top of the eighth inning with two outs.

**GODFREY vs. SEATTLE:** Is making his first career appearance.

**THIS SPRING:** Was 1-2 with a 5.09 ERA in six appearances, including four starts...led the A's in innings pitched (17.2) and strikeouts (13)...went 1-2 with a 3.95 ERA (6 er in 13.2 ip) in his four starts and 0-0 with a 9.00 ERA (4 er in 4.0 ip) in two relief appearances...posted a 9.00 ERA over his first three games and a 3.09 ERA over his final three outings.

**2011 HIGHLIGHTS:** Made his Major League

debut in 2011 and was 1-2 with a 3.96 ERA in five games, four starts, over three stints with the A's...walked just five batters in 25.0 innings (1.80 walks per nine innings)...allowed a .305 batting average, which included a .267 (16 for 60) mark against left-handed hitters and .356 (16 for 45) against right-handers...allowed seven of his 10 extra-base hits to righties for a .600 slugging percentage...yielded a .457 slugging percentage overall...opponents hit .353 with the bases empty, .259 with runners on...allowed a .222 average with runners in scoring position...had a .381 opponents average and all three of his home runs the first time through the lineup, .254 after that...held the first three hitters in the batting order to a .176 batting average but allowed a .474 average to the opponents four, five and six hitters...opponents were 13-for-25 (.520) with a walk when leading off an inning...was 1-2 with a 4.71 ERA in his four starting assignments...tossed 4.0 scoreless innings in his only relief appearance...made four starts for Escogido in the Dominican Winter League following the season and was 1-0 with a 3.31 ERA.

**WITH OAKLAND:** Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 10 and made his Major League debut with a start that day at Chicago (AL)...allowed five runs on nine hits in 4.1 innings but had a no decision in the A's 7-5 win...the hits were the most by an A's pitcher in his debut since April 10, 1983 when Bill Krueger yielded nine at California...was the 42nd pitcher in Oakland history to start in his debut...struck out Gordon Beckham in the first inning for his first big league strikeout...was credited with his first ML win in his second start June 17 against San Francisco, outdueling two-time Cy Young Award winner Tim Lincecum...allowed two runs on six hits in a career-high 7.0 innings...then took the loss June 23 at New York (NL)...was moved to the bullpen after going 1-1 with a 4.24 ERA in three starts but did not pitch again before he was optioned to Sacramento July 7...returned to start the second game of the doubleheader Aug. 27 at Boston and allowed three runs on six hits in 4.0 innings for the loss...was sent back to Sacramento Aug. 29, then returned to Oakland Sept. 17 when the River Cats season ended...made just one more appearance with the A's and it came in relief of Rich Harden Sept. 20 against Texas...tossed 4.0 scoreless innings, matching the longest outing by an A's reliever in 2011.

**MINORS:** Began the season at Double-A Midland and made one start, a no decision in a 10-2 win over Arkansas April 7...allowed two unearned runs in 4.0 innings and struck out six...was promoted to Sacramento April 12 and went 14-3 with a 2.68 ERA in 19 games, 18 starts with the River Cats...led the Pacific Coast League and tied for fifth in all of minor league baseball in wins...did not have enough innings pitched to qualify for the league leaders, but his ERA would have been second best in the PCL...combined for a 2.59 ERA with Sacramento and Midland, which was the lowest ERA in the A's farm system...also led the A's farm system in wins (14)...his wins were a career-high and his ERA was the lowest of his career...was named the A's Organizational Pitcher of the Year and was also named to the *Baseball America* Triple-A All-Star Team...led Sacramento in wins and ranked second in strikeouts (89)...allowed just six home runs in 107.1 innings, an average of 0.50 per nine innings...allowed a .227 opponents batting average, which included a .223 (43 for 193) mark against left-handed hitters and .230 (49 for 213) against right-handers...held the opposition to a .198 batting average when leading off an inning and .146 with runners in scoring position and two outs...four of the six home runs he allowed were solo shots...the River Cats were 13-5 (.722) in his starting assignments...tossed six or more innings in 11 of his 18 starts, allowed two runs or fewer 13 times and walked two batters or fewer 15 times.

**MORE WITH SACRAMENTO:** Had a no decision in his first start with Sacramento April 12 but then won each of his next four starts from April 17 to May 5...had a 1.82 ERA and .186 opponents batting average over that stretch...was placed on the disabled list May 6 with a sprained right wrist...was reinstated May 19 and lost that day against Oklahoma City...won each of his next three starts and was 7-1 with a 2.50 ERA in nine starts when he was promoted to Oakland June 10...optioned back to Sacramento July 7 and made his only relief appearance with the River Cats July 8 at Las Vegas...tossed 4.0 scoreless and hitless innings for the win...allowed a season-high nine hits in 5.0 innings in a 4-3 loss to Salt Lake July 20...tossed a season-high tying 7.0 innings and struck out a season-high eight in back-to-back wins July 25 against Reno and July 31 against Colorado Springs...allowed a season-high six runs on a season-high tying three walks in a 7-6 loss at Iowa Aug. 10...promoted to Oakland again Aug. 27 but was back at Sacramento for a final regular season start Sept. 1 against Las Vegas...allowed one run in 6.0 innings for his 14th win...then went 0-1 with a 5.73 ERA and .340 opponents batting average in two postseason starts (11.0 ip, 16 h, 7 r, 7 er, 5 bb, 4 so, 2 hr).

**MINOR LEAGUE CAREER:** Is 40-34 with a 4.12 ERA (296 er in 647.0 ip) in 129 games, 112 starts, in five minor league seasons...was a Texas League Midseason and Postseason All-Star at Midland in 2009...was a member of league champions at Midland in 2009 and Stockton (California League) in 2008...was originally drafted by Toronto in the 34th round of the 2006 draft...was traded to the Oakland organization in the Marco Scutaro deal following the 2007 season.

## TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

**RHP Brandon McCarthy (0-1, 2.50 ERA):** Is scheduled to make his Major League leading fourth start of the season...has 10 strikeouts and four walks over his first three starts this year for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 2.50...last year, he struck out 123 and walked just 25 to set an Athletics record (since 1901) for strikeout-to-walk ratio with a mark of 4.92...started three of the A's first seven games...since 1977, the only other Oakland pitcher to start three of the A's first seven games is Joe Blanton, who did it in 2008, the last time the A's went to Japan... had a no decision in his last start, the A's 5-4, 12-inning win over Kansas City last Wednesday in Oakland (6.0 ip, 6 h, 2 r, 2 er, 2 bb, 4 so, 1 hr)...is 1-2 with a 4.79 ERA (41.1 ip, 53 h, 26 r, 22 er, 10 bb, 28 so, 2 hr) in nine career appearances, five starts, against the Angels.

## ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

**1-1, 2.73 ERA (26.1 ip, 19 h, 8 r, 8 er, 8 bb, 17 so, 3 hr)**

**Save/Save Opportunities: 2/3 (66.7%)**

The A's bullpen has a 2.73 ERA, which ranks fifth in the American League, and has tossed 26.1 innings, which ranks seventh...also ranks second in opponents slugging percentage (.341) and third in opponents batting average (.209) and on-base percentage (.270)...compiled a 3.74 ERA last year, which ranked eighth in the AL...had 39 saves, which tied for fourth, but had 18 blown saves for a save percentage of 68.4...that ranked seventh in the AL...also ranked sixth in opponents slugging percentage (.371), eighth in opponents on-base percentage (.323) and 10th in opponents batting average (.247)...allowed 70 of 208 (33.7%) inherited runners to score, which was the fourth highest percentage in the AL...first batters faced hit .250, which was fifth highest in the AL...had the third most first batter strikeouts (101).

**First Hitters: 1-6 (0 bb)**

- Has pitched in six of nine games this season and has not allowed a run (7.0 ip, 2 h, 2 bb, 5 so)...the six appearances are tied for second most in the majors.
- Has held opponents to a .091 (2 for 22) batting average, which is tied for sixth among American League relievers.
- Is on his fourth consecutive Opening Day roster (last year with Oakland, 2009-10 with Tampa Bay) but this is his ninth season in the majors.
- Has a save in four appearances against Seattle this year (4.0 ip, 1 h, 2 so)...has a 4.34 ERA in 19 career outings (18.1 ip, 17 h, 10 r, 9 er, 9 bb, 15 so, 2 hr).
- Compiled a 6.75 ERA in seven spring training appearances...did not allow a run over his final five outings (5.0 ip, 3 h, 1 bb, 4 so).
- Was used mostly as a set-up man with Oakland last year, posting a 5-2 record with two saves, a 2.47 ERA and .199 opponents average in 62 appearances...tied for eighth among AL relievers in grounded into double plays (8) and ranked 10th in opponents on-base percentage (.266).

- Is on his first career Opening Day roster.
- Has made two appearances against Seattle this season (2.1 ip, 3 h, 2 r, 2 er, 2 bb, 2 so, 7.71 ERA).
