ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have won back-to-back games for the second time this year...improved to 5-0 when scoring first with the win last night...the Yankees are the only other Major League team that has not lost a game when scoring first (4-0)...are now 6-7 for the season, which matches the A's record after 13 games last year (lost game 14)...are in third place in the American League West, 4½ games behind Texas...have spent six of the last eight days in third place...have also spent one day tied for first, one day in second and seven days in fourth...this is the A's 45th season in Oakland where they have won 14 AL West titles, one AL Wild Card, six AL pennants and four World Championships...only the New York Yankees (17) and Atlanta Braves (16) have more division titles than the A's...since the A's moved to Oakland in 1968, only the Yankees (11) and Cardinals (7) have more league championships and only the Yankees have more world championships (7)...finished the 2011 season with a 74-88 record, which marked the A's fifth consecutive season without a winning record...this is the Athletics franchise 112th season in the American League...since 1901, the A's have 14 AL West titles plus 15 AL pennants and nine World Championships...only the Yankees (27) and Cardinals (11) have won more World Championships.

SHUTOUT: The A's pitching staff tossed its third shutout of the season last night, which is tied with San Francisco for the Major League lead...the offense has also been shut out three times, which is the most in the majors...there have been 13 shutouts in the American League this year and the A's have been involved in six of them (46.2%).

THE LONG BALL: The A's hit two home runs last night and now have 12 in the first 13 games...those are the A's most home runs over the first 12 games of the season since 2006 when they had 17...last year, the A's did not hit their 12th home run until game 27...number 13 also came in game 27...hit a season-high three home runs against Seattle March 29...hit three home runs in a game just three times last year and have gone 282 consecutive games with three home runs or fewer, which is the longest active streak in the majors and second longest streak in Oakland history (440, Aug. 10, 1976-June 18, 1979)...the last time the A's hit more than three home runs in a game was June 3, 2010 at Boston (4).

OFFENSE: The A's stole two bases last night and have an American League leading 11 for the season...are tied for the AL lead in hit by pitches (7)...collected 10 hits last night, snapping their season-opening streak of 12 consecutive games with fewer than 10 hits...it was the longest such streak to start a season in Oakland history (previous: 10 games, 1978)...since 1918, the only Athletics team with a longer season-opening streak was the 1966 Kansas City A's, which had an 18-game streak...have scored just 39 runs, which is second fewest in Oakland history after 13 games (35 in 1968)...rank last in the American League in batting (.207), batting with runners in scoring position (.174), on-base percentage (.276), slugging percentage (.331) and runs scored (39)...are one of three Major League teams without a triple (NYM, PHI) and one of two without a sacrifice hit (MIN).

PITCHING: The A's rank second in the American League with a 2.98 ERA (Texas, 2.33)...have issued just 25 walks, which is tied with Texas for the fewest in the AL, and have a .266 opponents on-base percentage, which is the lowest in the AL...also rank second in opponents batting (.224) and slugging (.356)...have the second fewest strikeouts (67)...A's starting pitchers are 4-6 with a 3.13 ERA (29 er in 83.1 ip)...the ERA is third lowest in the AL...A's starters have not issued a walk in each of the last three games...the longest such streak in Oakland history is four games (six times, last: June 4-7, 2009).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 3-3 on their first road trip of the season, a seven-game trek to Seattle (1-2) and Los Angeles (2-1)...return home following the game tonight for a six-game homestand against Cleveland (three games) and Chicago (three games)...went 2-3 on the last homestand against Seattle (0-2) and Kansas City (2-1)...last year, the A's went 43-38 (.531) in Oakland compared to 31-50 (.383) on the road...posted a winning record at home for the second consecutive season but finished with a losing mark on the road for the fifth consecutive season.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list five times this year and currently have four players on the DL (Anderson, Braden, Devine, Sizemore)...Devine ("Tommy John" surgery) and Sizemore (Torn ACL) will miss the entire season...the A's used the DL 15 times last year, which was the fewest since 2006 when they also used it 15 times...used the DL a total of 87 times from 2007-10...have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had just one.

ROOKIES: The A's currently have seven rookies on the roster (Céspedes, Cook, Donaldson, Godfrey, Milone, Recker, Wagner)...eight rookies have appeared in at least one game this year and Neil Wagner, who was called up yesterday, would become the ninth...had seven rookies on the Opening Day roster, which were the A's **most rookies on an Opening Day roster** since they are first available in 1992 (previous: 5, 2009).

CLOSE CALLS: The A's are 2-1 in one-run games...last year, went 20-25 in one-run games, which was the third worst record in the American League...are 1-1 in extra inning games...were 8-11 in extra inning games last year, which was fourth worst in the AL...are now 16-29 (.356) in extra inning games over the last four years...already have one "walk-off" win after tallying just three "walk-off" wins last year.

CHANGING THE CHANNEL: Due to San Jose Sharks playoffs coverage, tonight's game against the Angeles and Saturday's contest against Cleveland will air on Comcast SportsNet Plus...channels are: Comcast (410 Standard, 780 High Definition), Dish (442 SD, 9580 HD), Direct (699 SD, 699-1 HD), ATT (768 SD, 1768 HD).

FILLING IN: Johnny Doskow, long-time voice of the A's Triple-A affiliate in Sacramento, will join the club's radio broadcast on an interim basis while Ken Korach recovers from knee replacement surgery...Vince Cotroneo will assume Korach's primary broadcast duties.

A's vs. ANGELS

The A's have won two of the first three games of 2012 after winning the season series last year, 11-8...went 6-3 in Oakland and 5-5 in Anaheim...it was just their second season series win over the previous eight years (went 10-9 in 2007)...are now 73-82 (.471) against the Angels over the past nine seasons (since 2004)...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 378-305 against the Angels...that includes 196-143 in Oakland and 182-162 in Anaheim...all-time, the A's are 427-382 against the Angels.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Yoenis Cespedes hit his fourth home run last night in the 12th game of his career...since 1918, that is the fastest an Athletic has reached four career home runs...all four of his home runs have come with runners on base.

Ryan Cook has not allowed a hit in five appearances this season...is one of two qualifying relievers in the majors not to allow a hit (Rodney, TB).

Coco Crisp has been successful in each of his last 25 stolen base attempts, which is the longest streak of his career and tied for fourth longest in Oakland history.

Josh Reddick leads Major League outfielders with four assists.

Seth Smith has played 499 career games...his next game will be the 500th of his career.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In **1981** the A's defeat the Seattle Mariners 6-1 in the first game of a double header at the Coliseum to run their record to 11-0, a Major League record at the time...the Mariners won the second game of the twinbill to end the A's streak but Oakland won the next six to improve to 17-1...in **1986** Jose Rijo strikes out an Oakland record 16 batters in the A's 7-2 win at Seattle...Bill Mooneyham adds two in an inning of relief for a club record 18 for a nine inning game.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his third start of the season, the eighth of his career...the A's are 1-1 in his starting assignments this year and his teams are 6-1 (.857) in his career...last year, he tossed at least six innings in one of his five starts, allowed two runs or fewer twice and walked one batter or fewer four times.

FIRST START: He combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed a career-high 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...matched his career high with three walks...all three hits were doubles but no one advanced past second base...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit).

LAST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-0 loss at Seattle last Saturday...struck out a career-high five batters in 6.0 innings but matched his career-high by yielding four runs...faced just one batter over the minimum over the first five innings but that was a solo home run by Montero in the second inning...then allowed three runs in the sixth on a bases loaded walk by Smoak and a two-run double by Montero...Noesi and League combined to shutout the A's on five hits.

MILONE vs. LOS ANGELES: Is making his first career appearance.

THIS SPRING: Was 2-1 with a 4.91 ERA in five appearances, four starts...that does not include two starts and wins in exhibition games...faced Yomiuri in Japan March 25 (5.0 ip, 2 h, 7 so) and tossed 6.0 perfect innings at Sacramento March 31 (6 so)...issued just one walk in 14.2 innings and none in 11.0 innings in the two exhibition games...his only relief appearance came in his first outing March 2 against Seattle.

2011 RECAP: Spent the entire season at Triple-A Syracuse before being called up by Washington in September to make his Major League debut...went 1-0 with a 3.81 ERA in five starts for the Nationals...walked just four batters in 26.0 innings (1.38 per nine innings)...allowed a .283 opponents batting average, which included a .281 (25 for 89) mark against right-handed hitters compared to .300 (3 for 10) against lefthanders...held the opposition to a .208 average with runners in scoring position...yielded a .385 batting average and .429 on-base percentage to batters leading off an inning...opponents hit .175 the first time through the lineup, .293 the second time through and .500 after that...was rated as the A's third-best prospect by *Baseball America* following the trade

WITH WASHINGTON: Was selected from Syracuse Sept. 3 and made his Major League debut with a start that day against New York (NL)...allowed four runs on six hits in 4.1 innings (0 bb, 2 so) and had a no decision in the Nationals 8-7 win...fanned Angel Pagan with one out in the second inning for his first strikeout...hit a three-run home run off Dillon Gee on the first pitch of his first big league at bat in the second inning...earned his first ML win in his third start Sept. 15 at New York (NL), a 10-1 victory (5.2 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 3 bb, 4 so)...tossed a season-high 6.0 shutout innings in his fourth start, a no decision in a 4-3, 10-inning win at Philadelphia Sept. 20.

SYRACUSE: Was 12-6 with a 3.22 ERA in 24 starts in his Triple-A debut with Syracuse...was named to the *Baseball America* Triple-A All-Star team...ranked second in the International League in strikeouts (155), tied for third in wins and was sixth in ERA...averaged 0.97 walks per nine innings, which was the lowest among IL starters...also ranked second in strikeouts per nine innings (9.40) and fourth in opponents batting average (.241)...walked just 16 for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 9.69...led the Chiefs in wins, innings pitched (148.1) and strikeouts and tied for the team lead in games started...matched his minor league bests in wins and strikeouts...was 4-5 with a 3.81 ERA over his first 12 starts through June 17...then went 8-1 with a 2.60 ERA over his final 12 starts...his opponents batting average included a .230 (28 for 122) mark against left-handed hitters compared to .244 (109 for 446) against right-handers...allowed a .216 average to batters leading off an inning...opponents hit .209 with runners in scoring position and two outs...allowed just three first inning runs for a 0.75 ERA...was 9 for 26 (.346) with a double and three RBI as a hitter...that included 0 for 2 with two sacrifices in four pinch hitting appearances...Syracuse was 16-8 (.667) in his starting assignments...tossed six or more innings in 17 of his 24 starts, allowed two runs or fewer 14 times and walked one batter or fewer 20 times.

MORE WITH SYRACUSE: Combined on a six-hit shutout in his Triple-A debut, a 2-0 win at Lehigh Valley April 10...tossed seven innings and allowed five of the hits without walking a batter...lost each of his next three starts, including April 28 against Toledo when he allowed a season-high seven runs on a season-high 10 hits in 3.2 innings...struck out a season-high 11 May 5 at Durham...allowed just one run in 7.0 innings but had a no decision in a 4-3 loss as the bullpen allowed two runs in the eighth and one in the ninth...walked just two batters over a 10-start stretch from May 10 to July 2 (67.1 ip)...went 2-0 with a 2.54 ERA in four starts in May...tossed a season-high 8.0 shutout innings in an 11-2 win at Rochester June 27...allowed just one run in 6.1 innings in his next start at Buffalo July 2...earned IL Pitcher of the Week honors for the week of June 27 to July 3 (1-0, 0.63 ERA, 14.1 ip, 8 h, 1 r, 1 er, 0 bb, 12 so)...was named to the IL Midseason All-Star team...pitched a scoreless sixth inning against the Pacific Coast League All-Stars in the Triple-A All-Star Game July 13 at Salt Lake (1 h, 1 so)...allowed one run in 7.1 innings and went 3 for 3 at the plate in an 8-4 win over Lehigh Valley July 17...yielded five runs in a season-low 2.1 innings July 28 against Colorado Springs...was placed on the disabled list the next day with a strained left quadriceps...was reinstated from the DL Aug. 8 and went 4-0 with a 1.72 ERA in August...struck out 10 batters in 6.2 innings against Gwinnett Aug. 19...was rated as having the Best Control and Best Changeup among Nationals prospects in *Baseball America's* Best Tools survey following the season.

MINOR LEAGUE CAREER: Went 37-22 with a 3.05 ERA (175 er in 516.2 ip) in 91 games, 86 starts, over four seasons in the minors in the Washington Nationals farm system...struck out 465 batters and walked just 84 for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 5.54...won 12 games in each of the last three seasons...was named the Nationals' Minor League Pitcher of the Year after going 12-5 with a 2.85 ERA in 27 starts with Double-A Harrisburg in 2010...led the Eastern League in strikeouts (155) that year...led the Carolina League with 12 wins in 2009.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Graham Godfrey (0-2, 4.09 ERA): Is scheduled to make his third start of the season...was the losing pitcher in his last start, a 5-3 A's loss at Seattle last Sunday (5.0 ip, 6 h, 5 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 3 so)...now has a four-game losing streak dating back to last year and has a 3.65 ERA over that five-game stretch (four starts)...has never faced the Indians in his career...was 1-2 with a 5.09 ERA in six appearances, four starts, this spring...made his Major League debut in 2011 and was 1-2 with a 3.96 ERA in five games, four starts, over three stints with the A's...also went 14-3 with a 2.68 ERA in 19 games, 18 starts, with Triple-A Sacramento...led the Pacific Coast League and tied for fifth in all of minor league baseball in wins...combined for a 2.59 ERA with Sacramento and Midland, which was the lowest ERA in the A's farm system...also led the A's farm system in wins (14)...was named the A's Organizational Pitcher of the Year and was also named to the *Baseball America* Triple-A All-Star Team.

ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

2-1, 2.62 ERA (34.1 ip, 21 h, 10 r, 10 er, 12 bb, 22 so, 4 hr)

Save/Save Opportunities: 3/4 (75.0%)

The A's bullpen has allowed one run or fewer in each of the past six games (2 er in 12.0 ip, 1.50 ERA)...now has a 2.62 ERA for the season, which ranks fourth in the American League...has the lowest opponents batting average (.179) and ranks second in opponents on-base percentage (.254) and opponents slugging percentage (.308)...first batters faced are hitting .194, which is fourth lowest in the AL, but have recorded just five first batter strikeouts, which is tied for the fewest...have the fewest strikeouts overall with 22...has allowed 3 of 6 inherited runners to score, which is the highest percentage in the AL...has three saves (all by Balfour), which is tied for fifth.

- Has not allowed a run in six of seven games this year (1 er in 8.0 ip, 1.13 ERA)...the seven appearances are tied for second most in the American League.
- Is tied for fourth among AL relievers in saves (3) and ranks sixth in innings pitched (8.0)
- Has held opponents to a .111 batting average, which ranks seventh lowest among AL relievers...that breaks down to 1 for 19 against left-handers and 2 for 7 (.286) against right-handers.
- Is on his fourth consecutive Opening Day roster (last year with Oakland, 2009-10 with Tampa Bay) but this is his ninth season in the majors.
- Had a win and a 5.40 ERA in seven appearances against Los Angeles last year (6.2 ip, 4 h, 4 r, 4 er, 2 bb, 12 so, 2 hr)...is 2-3 with a 6.26 ERA, save and blown save in 23 games in his career (23.0 ip, 20 h, 16 r, 16 er, 13 bb, 28 so, 5 hr).
- Compiled a 6.75 ERA in seven spring training appearances...did not allow a run over his final five outings (5.0 ip, 3 h, 1 bb, 4 so).
- Was used mostly as a setup man with Oakland last year, posting a 5-2 record with two saves, a 2.47 ERA and .199 opponents average in 62 appearances...tied for eighth among AL relievers in grounded into double plays (8) and ranked 10th in opponents on-base percentage (.266).

- Has allowed two home runs in four appearances...last year, allowed two home runs in 26 games for the season.
- Has allowed 9 of 17 (52.9%) inherited runners to score over the last two years.
- His opponents have a .286 batting average this season...right-handed hitters are 0 for 5 while left-handers are 4 for 9 (.444).
- Is in his sixth Major League season, all with Oakland, and is on his fourth consecutive Opening Day roster.
- Had a 1.69 ERA in five games against Los Angeles last season (5.1 ip, 4 h, 2 r, 1 er, 4 bb, 2 so)...has a 3.71 ERA in 18 career appearances (17.0 ip, 16 h, 8 r, 7 er, 6 bb, 14 so, 1 hr).
- Posted a 3.86 ERA in eight spring training appearances...opponents went 4 for 24 (.167) with one walk.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his third start of the season, the seventh of his career...the A's have lost each of his two starting assignments this year and are 2-4 (.333) in his career...last year, he tossed six or more innings in one of his four starts, allowed two runs or fewer once and walked two batters or fewer all four times.

FOUR-GAME LOSING STREAK: Won the first decision of his career in his second start June 17, 2011...is 0-4 with a 3.65 ERA (24.2 ip, 29 h, 14 r, 10 er, 5 bb, 12 so) in five games, four starts, since then...has received no run support in three of those four starts.

FIRST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 3-0 loss to Kansas City April 10 in Oakland...tossed six innings and allowed two runs, both in the fourth inning...Moustakas had a RBI double and Quintero delivered a sacrifice fly...the A's were shutout on one hit by Duffy and Crow, in a game that was called because of rain in the top of the eighth inning with two outs.

LAST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 5-3 loss at Seattle last Sunday...allowed a career-high tying five runs in 5.0 innings...allowed a two-run home runs to Ryan in the second and a solo home run to Smoak in the third...the A's tied the game with a three-run fifth inning but he allowed two runs in the bottom of the fifth for the loss...Suzuki had a RBI double and Smoak an RBI ground out.

GODFREY vs. CLEVELAND: Is making his first career appearance.

WITH OAKLAND: Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 10 and made his Major League debut with a start that day at Chicago (AL)...allowed five runs on nine hits in 4.1 innings but had a no decision in the A's 7-5 win...the hits were the most by an A's pitcher in his debut since April 10, 1983 when Bill Krueger yielded nine at California...was the 42nd pitcher in Oakland history to start in his debut...struck out Gordon Beckham in the first inning for his first big league strikeout...was credited with his first ML win in his second start June 17 against San Francisco, outdueling two-time Cy Young Award winner Tim Lincecum...allowed two runs on six hits in a career-high 7.0 innings...then took the loss June 23 at New York (NL)...was moved to the bullpen after going 1-1 with a 4.24 ERA in three starts but did not pitch again before he was optioned to Sacramento July 7...returned to start the second game of the doubleheader Aug. 27 at Boston and allowed three runs on six hits in 4.0 innings for the loss...was sent back to Sacramento Aug. 29, then returned to Oakland Sept. 17 when the River Cats season ended...made just one more appearance with the A's and it came in relief of Rich Harden Sept. 20 against Texas...tossed 4.0 scoreless innings, matching the longest outing by an A's reliever in 2011.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his **Major League leading** fifth start of the season...the A's are 1-3 (.250) in his starting assignments this year and are 12-17 (.414) in his two seasons with the A's...his teams are 39-46 (.459) in his career...has tossed six or more innings in three of his four starts, allowed two runs or fewer twice and walked two batters or fewer all four times.

WALKS AND STRIKEOUTS: Has 14 strikeouts and four walks over his first four starts this year for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 3.50...last year, he struck out 123 and walked just 25 to set an Athletics record (since 1901) for strikeout-to-walk ratio with a mark of 4.92...broke the previous record of 3.91 set by Dan Haren in 2006...averaged 1.32 walks per nine innings, which was the second-lowest mark in Athletics history...the record is 1.30 by Jim "Catfish" Hunter in 1974...ranked second in the AL in strikeout-to-walk ratio and was third in walks per nine innings.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .300 opponents batting average, which includes .238 against right-handed hitters compared to .345 against left-handers...has issued all four of his walks to lefties...opponents are batting .393 (22 for 56) with the bases empty compared to .182 (8 for 44) with runners on base...both of the home runs he has allowed have been solo shots.

RUN SUPPORT: Has received run support of three runs or fewer in all four of his starts this year and his season average of 2.16 is **seventh** lowest in the American League...in two seasons with the A's, he is 1-11 with run support of three runs or fewer and 8-0 in 10 starts with run support of four runs or more

THREE OUT OF SEVEN: Started three of the A's first seven games...since 1977, the only Oakland pitcher to start three of the A's first seven games is Joe Blanton, who did it in 2008, the last time the A's went to Japan...McCarthy also started two of the A's first three games, joining Blanton as the only pitchers in Oakland history to start two of the A's first three games.

FIRST START: Had a no decision in the A's 3-1, 11-inning loss to Seattle in Tokyo on March 28...it was his first career Opening Day start and he became the seventh different Opening Day starter for the A's in the last seven years (Cahill, Sheets, Braden, Blanton, Haren, Zito)...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed just one run on a Dustin Ackley home run in the fourth inning...Hernandez and the Mariners bullpen combined to limit the A's to a run on six hits.

SECOND START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 7-3 loss to Seattle April 6 in Oakland...blanked the Mariners on two hits over the first two innings before allowing four runs in the third...an error by Donaldson made three of the runs unearned...Seager had a two-run single to highlight the scoring and McCarthy allowed another run in the fourth on a Figgins RBI single.

THIRD START: He had a no decision in the A's 5-4, 12-inning win over Kansas City April 11 in Oakland...retired the first seven batters before Pena double and scored on a Gordon single in the third inning...also allowed a solo home run to Butler in the fourth...left after six innings with a 3-2 lead but Fuentes allowed a Gordon home run in the seventh inning for the blown save.

LAST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 6-0 loss at Los Angeles last Monday...allowed 11 hits...has surrendered 10 or more hits in a game three times in his career, all three in Anaheim and all three in April...allowed a three-run home run to Morales in the first inning but then blanked the Angels on five hits and a hit batter over the next six innings...also yielded a RBI double to Morales in the eighth and was relieved by Carignan who allowed an inherited runner to score.

McCARTHY vs. CLEVELAND: Is 6-3 with a 4.61 ERA (54.2 ip, 49 h, 28 r, 28 er, 22 bb, 50 so, 11 hr) in 16 games, including eight starts...is 4-1 with a 4.15 ERA (16 er in 34.2 ip) in eight games, five starts, at Progressive Field and 2-2 with a 5.40 ERA (12 er in 20.0 ip) in eight games, three starts, in his home ballparks...is 5-2 with a 3.33 ERA (17 er in 46.0 ip) in his eight starting assignments...was the losing pitcher in his only start last year, a 2-1 A's loss at Cleveland August 29...tossed a complete-game five-hitter and struck out a career-high 10 batters...allowed a RBI double to Fukudome in the sixth and a solo home run to Santana in the seventh.

THIS SPRING: Was 0-0 with a 4.63 ERA (11.2 ip, 13 h, 9 r, 6 er, 4 bb, 6 so) in three starts this spring...did not allow a home run in 11.2 innings...opponents were 13 for 46 (.283)...also started a Triple-A game March 15, allowing two runs on five hits and no walks while striking out six in 5.0 innings.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .258 opponents batting average, including .256 (89 for 348) against left-handed hitters and .260 (79 for 304) against right-handers...surrendered eight of his 11 home runs to left-handers...nine were solo shots...all 11 came after his 45th pitch in a game...opponents hit .217 with runners in scoring position and two outs...has allowed a .213 (47 for 221) average in that situation in his career...yielded a .351 batting average and four of his 11 home runs to the opponents number three hitter.

BIRTHDAY STARTER: Is celebrating his 25th birthday today as he was born on April 22, 1987 in Berkeley...it marks the 18th time in Oakland history a pitcher has started on his birthday...he was the last to do it last year against Seattle (L, 4.1 ip, 4 h, 3 r, 3 er, 4 bb, 0 so)...Dan Haren and Blue Moon Odom are the only other pitchers in Oakland history to start twice on their birthdays...the last Oakland pitcher to start and win on his birthday is Todd Stottlemyre on May 20, 1995 against Kansas City (8.1 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 bb, 10 so).

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 5-3 win at Los Angeles on Tuesday...blanked the Angels on three hits over the first four innings and the A's scored once in the fifth to take a 1-0 lead...allowed a run to score in the bottom of the fifth on a Bourjos ground out and also allowed a Hunter RBI single in the sixth...left after six innings trailing 2-1 but the A's scored four times in the eighth for the win.

off Jeff Francis to pass Mike Schmidt for sole possession of 14th place on the all-time list...was ejected by home plate umpire Gary Cederstrom one pitch into his final at-bat with the Dodgers Aug. 29 at Colorado (arguing balls and strikes)...made his White Sox debut Sept. 1 at Cleveland, going 1-for-3...ended an 84 at-bat homerless streak Sept. 18 with a solo homer off Detroit's Max Scherzer...it was the second-longest drought of his career behind an 89 at-bat stretch from July 6 to Aug. 1, 1997.

2009—Helped lead the Dodgers to their second consecutive National League West Division championship...his season was limited to 104 games due to his 50-game suspension for a violation of Major League Baseball's Joint Drug Prevention and Treatment Program...the Dodgers went 62-42 (.596) in games which he appeared and 33-25 (.569) in all others...fell one homer shy of his 15th consecutive season with at least 20 homers...is still one of only seven players with 20 or more homers in 14 consecutive seasons...batted .348 with six homers, 20 RBI, 26 walks, and a .492 on-base percentage in 27 games before the suspension May 7...hit .269 (70-for-260) with 13 homers and 43 RBI in 77 games after the suspension...at the time of his suspension, he led the NL in on-base percentage (second in the majors to Boston's Kevin Youkilis' .505) and ranked fifth in hitting...tied for third in the majors with Milwaukee's Prince Fielder with 21 intentional walks, trailing St. Louis' Albert Pujols (44) and San Diego's Adrian Gonzalez (22)...belted a pinch hit grand slam July 22 off Cincinnati's Nick Masset...the sixth inning blast snapped a 2-2 tie and gave the Dodgers a 6-2 victory on Manny bobblehead night...was 2-for-2 with three walks in the Dodgers postseason-clinching win Sept. 26 at Pittsburgh.

2008—Enjoyed one of the most productive final two months of a season in baseball history, carrying the Dodgers to their first NLCS appearance since 1988...after being acquired from Boston moments before the July 31 trade deadline, batted .396 for the Dodgers with 17 homers, 53 RBI, 14 doubles, a .469 on-base percentage and .743 slugging percentage in 53 regular-season games...finished fourth in the National League MVP voting despite playing in only 53 games after the trade...hit safely in each of the club's eight postseason games, batting .520 (13-for-25) with four home runs, 10 RBI, 11 walks and a .667 on-base percentage...the average was the best postseason mark in Dodgers history (min. 20 PA)...from Aug. 1 through season's end, he led the majors in batting average, RBI, on-base percentage and slugging percentage...also ranked third in homers behind only Detroit's Miguel Cabrera (18) and Philadelphia's Ryan Howard (18)...his 21 homers as a Dodger – including postseason – led the team...his .396 average with the Dodgers is the second highest ever for an in-season acquisition behind only Cesar Cedeño, who hit .434 in 28 games in 1985 after his trade to the Cardinals from the Reds...hit .332 in a combined 153 games with Boston and Los Angeles to rank third in all of baseball behind Atlanta's

Chipper Jones (.364) and St. Louis' Albert Pujols (.357)... also tied for fourth in the majors with 37 home runs and tied for sixth with 121 RBI...ranked second in the big leagues with a .601 slugging percentage, behind Pujols (.651)...ranked fourth in the majors with a .430 on-base percentage...hit homer No. 500 off Chad Bradford May 31 at Baltimore, accomplishing the feat in his 7,263rd at-bat, eighth-fewest all-time...began the season with 490 career homers, and went on to surpass seven Hall of Famers on the all-time home run list: Lou Gehrig (493), Eddie Murray (504), Mel Ott (511), Eddie Mathews (512), Ernie Banks (512), Willie McCovey (521) and Ted Williams (521)...recorded 53 RBI with the Dodgers and 68 with Boston...joined Carlos Beltran as the only players in ML history to record at least 50 RBI in both leagues in the same season...Beltran did it in 2004, collecting 51 RBI with Kansas City and 53 with Houston...in his first month in the NL was named the league's Player of the Month for August...batted .415 (44-for-106), with nine home runs, 25 RBI and 21 runs scored in 29 games...in his first 16 games with the club, collected 25 hits, six home runs and 21 RBI...since RBI became an official stat in 1920, only one other player reached Ramirez's totals in each of those categories over his first 16 games with a team – in 1925, Mandy Brooks had 25 hits, six home runs and 24 RBI in his first 16 games with the Chicago Cubs.

2007—Ranked third on the World Champion Red Sox with 20 homers and 88 RBI, his lowest totals in a season since the strike-shortened 1994 campaign...tied Los Angeles' Vladimir Guerrero for the American League lead with 17 game-winning RBI...started 120 games in left field and 11 as designated hitter...endured the slowest start of career, hitting .188 (16-for-85) in his first 23 games through April 28...appeared in 127 of Boston's first 132 games through Aug. 28...left that game at Yankee Stadium with a strained left oblique muscle and missed the next 24 contests before returning to action for the team's final six games from Sept. 25-30...drove in a team-high 16 runs in Boston's 14 postseason games.

2006—Was among several offensive category leaders in the American League, ranking first with a .439 on-base percentage and 2nd with a 1.058 OPS...was also eighth in batting average (.321) and home runs (35)...finished second in the AL in home batting average with a .355 mark (78-for-220) at Fenway Park...started 124 games in left field and five as the designated hitter...played in 122 of season's first 126 games but just eight (seven starts) of the final 36 contests beginning Aug. 24 due to right knee tendinitis...was hitting .330 Aug. 21, but with right knee problems was just 4-for-25 (.160) with a homer and two RBI in 10 games the rest of the year...produced a career-best 27-game hitting streak from July 15 to Aug. 12, batting .400 (40-for-100) with eight homers and 28 RBI...it was the longest streak in the AL in 2006...homered off Brian Moehler July 1 at Florida, becoming the 13th player to earn his 2,000th hit in a Boston uniform, the first since Wade Boggs in 1992.

2005—Ranked third in the American League with 45 homers and 144 RBI...combined with David Ortiz (47 home runs, 148 RBI) to join Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig (1930-31) as the only teammates in baseball history with consecutive 40-homer, 140-RBI seasons...led AL hitters and ranked second in the majors to Atlanta's Andruw Jones with one homer every 12.3 at-bats...led the majors with one RBI every 3.8 at-bats...had a .353 average (112-for-317) in Boston's 95 wins and a .211 mark (50-for-237) in the team's 67 losses.

2004—Led the American League with 43 homers, a .613 slugging percentage and a 1.010 OPS...also ranked second in the AL with 87 extra-base hits and third with 130 RBI...homered once every 13.2 at-bats, the best ratio in the AL...matched a career high with 26 homers before the All-Star break...hit safely in all 14 games during Boston's World Series run, batting .350 (21-for-60) with two homers and 11 RBI...was named World Series MVP while batting .417 (7-for-17) with a home run and four RBI in Boston's four-game sweep of St. Louis...was a member of the MLB All-Star Team that went to Japan after the season.

2003—Banged out a career-high 185 hits and led the American League with a .427 on-base percentage and 28 intentional walks...finished second in the league with a 1.014 OPS and a .325 batting average, one point behind teammate Bill Mueller...led the AL with a .385 average (55-for-143) against left-handed pitchers.

2002—Won the American League batting title with a .349 batting average...appeared in just 120 total games, which was the fewest for an AL batting champ since Kansas City's George Brett hit .390 in 117 games in 1980...also led the circuit with a .450 on-base percentage...finished second in the AL with a

.647 slugging percentage and a 1.097 OPS...was on the disabled list from May 14 to June 25 with a fractured left index finger, which he sustained sliding into home May 11 at Seattle...played in 10 games at Triple-A Pawtucket on a rehab assignment before returning to the Red Sox June 25 against Cleveland...batted .414 (67-for-162) with 15 homers and 47 RBI in his final 44 games beginning Aug. 13, raising his average from .310.

2001—In his first season with Boston, he ranked fourth in the American League with 41 homers, 125 RBI, a .609 slugging percentage and a 1.014 OPS...also ranked sixth with 76 extra-base hits, 322 total bases and a .405 on-base percentage...led the AL with 25 intentional walks including an AL-record four in an extra-inning game, June 5 against Detroit...missed seven games with a right hamstring strain August 20-26, and sat out the season's last six contests with a sore left wrist.

2000—Was the American League leader with a career-best .697 slugging percentage, which was second highest in Indians history...also led the AL with a 1.154 OPS...ranked third in the AL with a career-high .351 batting average and a career-best .457 on-base percentage...tied an Indians club record with an RBI in nine straight games from May 5-13...reached base safely via a hit or walk in 49 straight games from July 29–Sep 23...was on the disabled list from May 30 to July 12 with a strained left hamstring...in his final three seasons with Cleveland (1998–2000) averaged more than one RBI per game (432 RBI in 415 games)...also had 127 HR and a .649 slugging percentage...signed an eight-year, \$160 million free agent contract with the Red Sox, Dec. 13.

1999—Led the majors with an Indians single season club-record 165 RBI...that remains the highest total in the majors in the last 73 years...averaged an RBI every 3.164 at bats, which currently is the third-best ratio in a season in baseball history behind Hack Wilson (1930) and Babe Ruth (1921)...topped the American League in slugging (.663) and OPS (1.105) and was among the league leaders in on-base percentage (2nd, .442), homers (3rd, 44), extra-base hits (3rd, 81), runs (4th, career-best 131), total bases (4th, 346) and average (5th, .333)...led the Indians to their fifth consecutive AL Central Division title, but went 1-for-18 in the ALDS loss to the Red Sox...was elected to his second All-Star Game, his first as a starter...hit cleanup and played right field in a starting lineup that included four Indians: also first baseman Jim Thome, second baseman Roberto Alomar and left fielder Kenny Lofton.

1998—Ranked third in the American League with 45 homers and fourth in the circuit with 145 RBI...also ranked fourth in the AL with 82 extra-base hits and a .599 slugging percentage...added four homers and seven RBI in the postseason...the Tribe got past the Red Sox in the ALDS, but fell to the Yankees in the ALCS...was a member of MLB All-Star Team that went to Japan after the season.

1997—Ranked fourth in the American League with a .328 average...hit two home runs in the ALCS and two more in the World Series, but batted only .191 in the postseason as the Indians fell to the Marlins in the World Series in seven games.

1996—Ranked fifth in the American League with 81 extra base hits and sixth with a career-high 45 doubles...led the AL with a career-high 19 outfield assists...added two doubles and two home runs in the ALDS, but the Indians lost to Baltimore in four games.

1995—Became the 25th player in Major League history to produce 30 homers and 100 RBI in a season at the age of 23 or younger...was just the second Indian to do it joining Hal Trosky (1934 and 1936)...helped lead the Indians to their first World Series since 1954 with a lineup that also included Albert Belle (50 home runs), Eddie Murray (21) and Jim Thome (25)...was named to his first All-Star Game...entered as pinch-hitter and walked twice.

1994—Placed second in the BBWAA American League Rookie of the Year voting behind Kansas City's Bob Hamelin...ranked second among AL rookies with 78 hits, 22 doubles, 17 homers and 60 RBI.

1993—Selected as *Baseball America's* Minor League Player of the Year after hitting a combined .333 with 31 home runs and 115 RBI in 129 games with Double-A Canton-Akron and Triple-A Charlotte...had his contract purchased by Cleveland from Charlotte on Sept. 1...went 0-for-4 in his Major League debut the following day at Minnesota...but the next day, Sept. 3 at New York (AL), he went 3-for-4 with a double, two homers and three RBI...his first hit (double) and homer both came off Melido Perez.

- Made his Major League debut March 28 against Seattle in Tokyo with a start in center field...doubled off Felix Hernandez to lead off the bottom of the seventh inning for his first ML hit.
- Hit his first ML home run in the seventh inning March 29 against Seattle in Tokyo, a two-run shot off Shawn Kelley.
- Homered in three consecutive games from March 29 to April 7...became the third player since 1918 to homer in three of his first four Major League games (Trent Oeltjen, ARI 2009 and Mike Jacobs, NYM 2005)...is the ninth player with at least three home runs in his first four games (Jacobs had 4)...the previous fastest an Oakland Athletic reached three career home runs was seven games by Kurt Abbott in 1993 and Mitchell Page in 1977.
- Had multiple RBI games in each of those contests...since 1918, he is the first Athletic and ninth Major Leaguer with three multiple RBI games over his first four career games (last: Wladimir Balentien, 2006-07).
- Struck out at least once in each of his first eight games, which is an Oakland record to start a career...the previous mark was six (Chris Carter, 2010; Brooks Conrad, 2008; Travis Buck, 2007)...matched the longest streak by an Athletic since 1918 (Troy Herriage, 1956; Norm Bass, 1961).

BARTOLO COLÓN

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and is in his 15th season in the majors.
- Made each of his first three starts against Seattle to become the first pitcher in Oakland history to make three consecutive starts against one team in the same season without missing a turn in the rotation.

COCO CRISP

- Was the A's 13th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 13 years...had 203 career starts in left entering the season, but none since October 2, 2005.
- Committed his first error since April 25, 2011 on April 7 against Seattle, snapping a 116-game errorless streak...that streak was seventh longest by an outfielder in Oakland history.

JOEY DEVINE

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 retroactive to March 24...underwent "Tommy John" surgery on his right elbow April 10... Dr. James Andrews performed the surgery in Pensacola, Fla., which included an ulnar collateral ligament reconstruction, an ulnar nerve transposition and a debridement of the flexor tendon...also had "Tommy John" surgery on the same elbow April 21, 2009.

JONNY GOMES

- Was hit by a Jonathan Braxton pitch with the bases loaded in the bottom of the 12th inning April 11 against Kansas City to force in the winning run in the A's 5-4 victory...it was his second career walk-off hit by pitch (August 21, 2011 vs. Philadelphia)...it was his fifth career walk-off RBI (two home runs, one walk)...it was the third walk-off hit by pitch in Oakland history (Mike Bordick, August 4, 1993 vs. Seattle and Olmedo Saenz, July 20, 2002 vs. Texas).

BRANDON MCCARTHY

- Made his first career Opening Day start March 28 against Seattle and had a no decision in the A's 3-1, 11-inning loss...allowed just one run on six hits and no walks in 7.0 innings.
- Also started the third game of the season, April 6 against Seattle, to become the second pitcher in Oakland history to start two of the A's first three games...the other is Joe Blanton who did it in 2008, the other time the A's opened the season in Japan...also started three of the first seven games, joining Blanton as the only Oakland pitchers to do that since 1977.

TOMMY MILONE

- Combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit).

JOSH REDDICK

- Was the A's fifth different Opening Day starter in right field in the last five years.

ADAM ROSALES

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and appeared in one game against Seattle in Japan before he was optioned to Sacramento April 2.

SCOTT SIZEMORE

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 3 after tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee in the team's first full-squad workout Feb. 27 in Phoenix...underwent successful reconstructive surgery March 21...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg of the Arizona Sports Medicine Center of Scottsdale...will miss the entire 2012 season.

SETH SMITH

- Was the A's eight different Opening Day starter at designated hitter in the last eight years.

KURT SUZUKI

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at catcher...the five starts are second most by a catcher in Oakland history...only Terry Steinbach, with nine, has more.
- Made his 598th career appearance at catcher April 7 against Seattle, which moves him past Ossee Schreckengost for fifth most in Athletics history.

JEMILE WEEKS

- Played in the 100th game of his career April 6 against Seattle and collected 126 hits over that span...since 1918, the only player in Athletics history with more hits over the first 100 games of his career is Wally Moses, who had 134 hits in his first 100 games with the Philadelphia A's in 1935-36...the previous Oakland record was 122 by Ben Grieve.
