A's vs. RED SOX

This is the first of nine meetings between the A's and Boston in 2012...the A's lost the season series last year, 2-6...split a twogame series in Oakland and went 1-5 in Boston...are 27-28 against the Red Sox since 2006...that includes 18-10 in Oakland and 9-18 at Fenway...are 219-274 since moving to Oakland in 1968...that includes 129-114 in Oakland, 89-159 in Boston and 1-1 in Tokyo...all-time, the A's are 861-1055 against the Red Sox.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour has 16 career saves and is one save away from tying Graeme Lloyd for the most in Major League history by an Australian-born pitcher.

Ryan Cook became the third pitcher in Athletics franchise history to record four strikeouts in an inning Friday night.

Coco Crisp has been successful in each of his last 27 stolen base attempts, which is the longest streak of his career and is one short of the Oakland record of 28 set by Stan Javier in 1995.

Josh Reddick leads American League outfielders with four assists.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In 1937 Duke All-American football star Ace Parker hits a pinch hit home run in his first major league at bat...he would later be elected to the Football Hall of Fame...in 1969 Rick Monday's third inning grand slam at California gives him at least one RBI in a club record 10 consecutive games...he finishes with five RBI on the day and drives in 18 runs during the streak...in 2000 Adam Piatt ties an Oakland record with two triples in the A's 8-2 win at Minnesota...he also connects for his first major league home run...in 2005 Mark Kotsay ties an Oakland record with five hits, including the game winning RBI single in the bottom of the 10th inning of the A's 6-5 win over Seattle.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have lost two straight after winning seven of the previous 10 games...had a 2-0 lead entering the bottom of the ninth inning yesterday but lost 5-2...it marked the first time this year the A's lost a game when scoring first (8-1)...it was also the first time the A's surrendered a lead in a game they lost...are in a tie for second place in the American League West for the fourth consecutive day...are a season-high tying 5½ games behind first place Texas...this will be the A's largest deficit in the West at the end of April since 2001 when they trailed Seattle by 12 games...have spent one day tied for first this year, five days in second, seven days tied for second, six days in third and seven days in fourth.

IN APRIL: The A's are 10-11 in the month of April with one game remaining...this marks the fourth consecutive season and eighth time in the last nine years the A's have not posted a winning record in April...are 106-108 (.495) over that span and have finished more than one game under .500 in April just once (8-11 in 2009)...the offense is batting .206 (145 for 703) this month... the lowest batting average in any month in Oakland history is .210 in April of 1979...since 1921, the only Athletics team to hit under .210 in a month is the 1966 Kansas City A's, who hit .176 in April, 1966 (12 games)...also have a .275 on-base percentage and .320 slugging percentage...the lowest on-base percentage in one month in Oakland history is .274 in April, 1968 and August, 1972...have not slugged under .322 in a month of 15 or more games since September, 1979 (.318)...have scored 62 runs in 21 games (2.95 per game)...the A's have averaged under three runs a game in one month three times in Oakland history, but just once since 1979 (2.73 in August, 2008)...have hit 16 home runs in April, which is their most since 2007 when they had 18.

PLAYERS USED: The A's have used 33 players this year, which is the most in the majors ahead of Boston and Detroit (32 each)...11 of those 33 are rookies, which is also the most in the majors...used a total of 14 rookies all last year...currently have seven rookies on the roster (Céspedes, Cook, Figueroa, Miller, Milone, Parker, Recker)...had seven rookies on the Opening Day roster, which were the A's most rookies on an Opening Day roster since they are first available in 1992 (previous: 5, 2009).

PITCHING: The A's rank third in the American League with a 3.11 ERA...also rank third in opponents slugging (.372) and on-base percentage (.302) and have the third fewest strikeouts (129)...have surrendered just 16 home runs, which is second fewest in the AL to Texas (15)...A's starting pitchers have a 3.29 ERA (54 er in 147.2 ip), which is second lowest in the AL to Texas (3.23)...starters have allowed just two home runs over the last 12 games, both by Colón on April 23 against Chicago...have yielded just nine for the season, which is second fewest to Kansas City (8).

SHUTOUT: The A's pitching staff tossed its **Major League leading** fourth shutout of the season last Tuesday night against Chicago...it came one day after the offense was shutout for the fourth time, which is tied for the most in the majors...it marks the third time this year the A's have played back-to-back games where they have shutout an opponent in one game and been shutout in the other...there have been 22 shutouts in the American League this year and the A's have been involved in eight of them (36.4%).

OFFENSE: The A's have scored just 67 runs, which is the fewest in Oakland history over the first 23 games of the season...the previous low was 73 in 1968...the fewest after 24 games is 74 in 1968...the last A's team to score fewer than 67 runs over the first 23 games is the 1966 Kansas City A's (53)...have the second fewest runs scored in the majors ahead of Pittsburgh (49)...rank last in the majors in batting (.205), slugging (.325), onbase percentage (.272) and batting with runners in scoring position (.176).

ON THE BASES: The A's have stolen a **Major League leading** 21 bases...have a stolen base percentage of 75.0% (7 cs), which ranks third in the American League...A's opponents have been caught stealing 11 times, which is second most in the majors to San Diego (12)...the opponents stolen base percentage of 42.1% (8 for 19) is second lowest to the White Sox (27.3%).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have committed eight errors in the last seven games after making just eight over the first 16 contests...now have 16 errors for the season, which is fourth most in the American League...A's outfielders have seven assists, which is tied with Arizona for the **most in the majors**...last year, the A's had 21 outfield assists the entire season.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 1-2 on this nine-game, 10-day trip to Baltimore (1-2), Boston (three games) and Tampa Bay (three games)...went 4-3 on the first road trip and are 5-5 on the road for the season...went 3-3 on the last homestand against Cleveland (1-2) and Chicago (2-1) and are 6-7 at home...last year, the A's went 43-38 (.531) in Oakland compared to 31-50 (.383) on the road...posted a winning record at home for the second consecutive season but finished with a losing mark on the road for the fifth consecutive season.

NIGHT AND DAY: The A's have played just five day games, which is the fewest in the majors...are 3-2 in day games compared to 8-10 at night...last year, the A's were 32-31 during the day and 42-57 at night...had the second worst record under the lights in the American League.

WALK-OFF WEDNESDAYS: The A's had their second "walk-off" win of the season last Wednesday against Chicago...both of the wins have come in extra innings on Wednesday on the last day of a homestand after the other team scored at least one run in the top of the inning...are now 2-1 in extra inning games...the three extra inning games are tied for second most in the American League...were 8-11 in extra inning games last year and are 17-29 (.370) over the last four years...are 3-2 in one-run games this year.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list five times and currently have four players on the DL (Anderson, Braden, Devine, Sizemore)...Devine ("Tommy John" surgery) and Sizemore (Torn ACL) will miss the entire season...the A's used the DL 15 times last year, which was the fewest since 2006 when they also used it 15 times...used the DL a total of 87 times from 2007-10...have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had just one.

FILLING IN: Johnny Doskow, long-time voice of the A's Triple-A affiliate in Sacramento, will join the club's radio broadcast on an interim basis while Ken Korach recovers from knee replacement surgery...Vince Cotroneo will assume Korach's primary broadcast duties.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Leads American League rookies in innings (27.0), is tied for the lead in games started (4) and is tied for second in wins (3)...his ERA (2.00) is second lowest among rookies with 20 or more innings (Smyly, DET 1.23)...is attempting to become the first rookie in Oakland history to win four games in the month of April...ranks fifth among all AL pitchers in ERA (2.00) and opponents batting (.185)

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has not allowed a hit to a left-handed batter this year (0 for 12) and they are 3 for 22 (.136) off him in his career...has surrendered just one home run in 27.0 innings.

HOME AND AWAY: Has tossed 8.0 shutout innings in each of his two starts in the Coliseum...is the first A's pitcher with back-to-back starts of at least 8.0 shutout innings at home since Joe Blanton in 2006 (May 31 and June 13)...is 2-0 with a 0.00 ERA (16.0 ip) at home compared to 1-1 with a 4.91 ERA 96 er in 11.0

FIRST START: He combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed a career-high 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...matched his career high with three walks...all three hits were doubles but no one advanced past second base...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit).

SECOND START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-0 loss at Seattle April 14...struck out a career-high five batters in 6.0 innings but matched his career-high by yielding four runs...faced just one batter over the minimum over the first five innings but that was a solo home run by Montero in the second inning...then allowed three runs in the sixth on a bases loaded walk by Smoak and a two-run double by Montero...Noesi and League combined to shutout the A's on five hits.

THIRD START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 4-2 win at Los Angeles April 19...blanked the Angels on two hits over the first three innings before allowing his only two runs in the fourth...Pujols doubled and scored on a Wells double...Wells scored on a Trumbo single...left after five innings with a 4-2 lead.

LAST START: He combined with Grant Balfour on a four-hit, 2-0 shutout of Chicago last Tuesday in Oakland...tossed a career-high tying 8.0 innings and allowed three of the hits...matched his career-high with five strikeouts...did not allow a hit until Ramirez singled to lead off the fifth...did not allow a runner past first base and faced just two batters over the minimum as he was aided by two double plays and a caught stealing...according to the Elias Sports Bureau he is just the second Oakland rookie over the last 75 years to have two wins while pitching at least eight scoreless innings and allowing three or fewer hits in a season (Vida Blue, 1970).

MILONE vs. BOSTON: Is making his first career appearance and start.

THIS SPRING: Was 2-1 with a 4.91 ERA in five appearances, four starts...that does not include two starts and wins in exhibition games...faced Yomiuri in Japan March 25 (5.0 ip, 2 h, 7 so) and tossed 6.0 perfect innings at Sacramento March 31 (6 so)...issued just one walk in 14.2 innings and none in 11.0 innings in the two exhibition games...his only relief appearance came in his first outing March 2 against Seattle.

TRADE: Was acquired from the Washington Nationals with A.J. Cole, Derek Norris and Brad Peacock for Gio Gonzalez and Rob Gilliam, December 23, 2011.

2011 RECAP: Spent the entire season at Triple-A Syracuse before being called up by Washington in September to make his Major League debut...went 1-0 with a 3.81 ERA in five starts for the Nationals...walked just four batters in 26.0 innings (1.38 per nine innings)...allowed a .283 opponents batting average, which included a .281 (25 for 89) mark against right-handed hitters compared to .300 (3 for 10) against lefthanders...held the opposition to a .208 average with runners in scoring position...yielded a .385 batting average and .429 on-base percentage to batters leading off an inning...opponents hit .175 the first time through the lineup, .293 the second time through and .500 after that...was rated as the A's thirdbest prospect by Baseball America following the trade

WITH WASHINGTON: Was selected from Syracuse Sept. 3 and made his Major League debut with a start that day against New York (NL)...allowed four runs on six hits in 4.1 innings (0 bb, 2 so) and had a no decision in the Nationals 8-7 win...fanned Angel Pagan with one out in the second inning for his first strikeout...hit a three-run home run off Dillon Gee on the first pitch of his first big league at bat in the second inning...earned his first ML win in his third start Sept. 15 at New York (NL), a 10-1 victory (5.2 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 3 bb, 4 so)...tossed a season-high 6.0 shutout innings in his fourth start, a no decision in a 4-3, 10-inning win at Philadelphia Sept. 20.

SYRACUSE: Was 12-6 with a 3.22 ERA in 24 starts in his Triple-A debut with Syracuse...was named to the Baseball America Triple-A All-Star team...ranked second in the International League in strikeouts (155), tied for third in wins and was sixth in ERA...averaged 0.97 walks per nine innings, which was the lowest among IL starters...also ranked second in strikeouts per nine innings (9.40) and fourth in opponents batting average (.241)...walked just 16 for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 9.69...his opponents batting average included a .230 (28 for 122) mark against left-handed hitters compared to .244 (109 for 446) against right-handers...allowed a .216 average to batters leading off an inning...opponents hit .209 with runners in scoring position and two outs...allowed just three first inning runs for a 0.75 ERA.

MINOR LEAGUE CAREER: Went 37-22 with a 3.05 ERA in 91 games, 86 starts, over four seasons in the minors in the Washington Nationals farm system...struck out 465 batters and walked just 84 for a strikeoutto-walk ratio of 5.54...was named the Nationals' Minor League Pitcher of the Year after going 12-5 with a 2.85 ERA in 27 starts with Double-A Harrisburg in 2010.

RHP Jarrod Parker (0-0, 1.42 ERA): Is scheduled to make his second start of the season...was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento last Wednesday and started that day against Chicago...had a no decision in the A's 5-4, 14-inning win (6.1 ip, 7 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 5 so)...allowed his only run on a Fukudome RBI double in the seventh inning, snapping a career-opening 11.2-inning scoreless streak...has never faced Boston in his career...was 1-0 with a 2.18 ERA in four starts with Sacramento...was 11-8 with a 3.79 ERA in 26 starts for Double-A Mobile last year...was promoted to Arizona Sept. 19 and had a no decision in one start with the Diamondbacks in his Major League debut, tossing 5.2 scoreless innings...also made one postseason appearance.

- Has not allowed a run in nine games and his 10.0 innings pitched are tied for second most among American League relievers that have not allowed a run...now has a career-best 11.0 inning scoreless streak dating back to last year, which is an on-going career-high.
- Has allowed just one hit and his .034 (29 ab) opponents batting average is the lowest among AL relievers and second lowest in the majors (Choate, Miami, .000)...left-handed hitters are 0 for 16 and right-handers are 1 for 13.
- Has never faced the Red Sox in his career.

Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 3 after tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in his left
knee in the team's first full-squad workout Feb. 27 in Phoenix...underwent successful reconstructive surgery March 21...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg of the Arizona Sports
