A's vs. BLUE JAYS

This is the first of nine meetings between the A's and Blue Jays this year...the two clubs split the season series last year, 5-5...split four games in Oakland and six in Toronto...the A's have not won a season series since 2007 and are 15-21 against the Blue Jays since 2008...all-time, the A's are 198-172 against the Blue Jays...that includes 96-88 in Oakland, 102-82 in Toronto and 0-2 in Las Vegas.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour recorded the 17th save of his career Saturday night, tying Graeme Lloyd for the most in Major League history by an Australian-born pitcher.

Ryan Cook has not allowed a run and his 14.2 innings pitched are tied for the most among Major League relievers that have not allowed a run...has a 15.2-inning scoreless streak dating back to last year.

Brian Fuentes recorded the 200th save of his career last Wednesday in Boston to become the sixth left-handed reliever in Major League history to record 200 saves.

Josh Reddick ranks second among AL outfielders with four assists.

Kurt Suzuki has hit safely in nine of his last 10 games (11 for 35, .314) after batting .186 over his first 16 contests...is tied for the AL lead with six caught stealings and an opponents stolen base percentage of 40.0.

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In 1906 pitcher Chief Bender is inserted into the game in left field in the sixth inning and hits two inside the park home runs in a game against the Boston Pilgrims...in 1968, the A's first year in Oakland, Catfish Hunter tosses a perfect game and almost single handedly defeats Minnesota 4-0...he strikes out 11 and also collects three hits while driving in three of the A's four runs...in 1992 Dennis Eckersley records his 200th career save in the A's 8-6 win over

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Won two of three at Tampa Bay after taking two of three at Boston...that marks the first time this year the A's have won back-to-back series...are 4-1 in May to move to a season-high tying one game over .500 for the second time this year (11-10, April 27)...have not been more than one game over .500 since May 17 of last year when they were 22-20...are now 11-7 over the last 18 games after starting the season 4-7...are 15-14 overall, marking the third consecutive season the A's have been one game over .500 after 29 games...remain in second place in the American League West for the seventh consecutive day and trail first place Texas by four games...have spent one day tied for first this year, 12 days in second, eight days tied for second, six days in third and seven days in fourth.

OFFENSE: The A's scored a season-high nine runs Sunday at Tampa Bay, snapping an Oakland record streak of 45 consecutive games with seven runs or fewer dating back to last year...the last time the A's scored at least nine runs in a game was September 2 of last year in a 9-6 win over Seattle...have scored 97 runs for the season (3.34 per game), which is second fewest in the American League (MIN, 95)...it is also second fewest in Oakland history over the first 29 games of the season (87 in 1968)...rank last in the majors in batting (.213) and second to last in on-base percentage (.285), slugging percentage (.334) and batting with runners in scoring position (.202)...have been shutout four times, which is tied for second most in the AL...have been hit by a pitch in each of the last four games and are tied for the AL lead with 14 for the season.

ON THE BASES: The A's **lead the American League** with 26 stolen bases...eight of those steals have been of third base, which is the most in the majors...have a stolen base percentage of 78.8% (7 cs), which ranks second in the AL...A's opponents have been caught stealing 11 times, which is tied for the AL lead...the opponents stolen base percentage of 52.2% (12 for 23) is second lowest in the AL.

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's did not commit an error in the three-game series at Tampa Bay, marking the first time this year they have gone errorless in three consecutive games...however, have 19 errors for the season, which is fourth most in the American League...A's outfielders have seven assists, which is **tied for the most in the AL** (Kansas City)...last year, the A's had 21 outfield assists the entire season.

PITCHING: The A's have allowed 46 runs in the last eight games (45 er in 71.1 ip, 5.68 ERA) after yielding just 25 runs over the previous 10 contests (2.08 ERA)...now have a 3.48 ERA for the season, which ranks third in the American League...are **tied for the Major League lead** in shutouts (4)...have the second fewest home runs (25) and strikeouts (168) in the AL and are tied for the third fewest hit basemen (8)

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers have allowed 36 runs in the last eight games (35 er in 43.2 ip, 7.21 ERA) after yielding just 16 runs over the previous 10 contests (2.18 ERA)...that has lifted the over ERA to 3.92, which is the highest it has been outside the first four games of the season...have allowed eight home runs over the past six games...however, have surrendered just 17 for the season, which is third fewest in the AL.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's begin a six-game homestand tonight against Toronto (two games) and Detroit (four games)...went 3-3 on the last homestand against Cleveland (1-2) and Chicago (2-1) and are 6-7 at home for the season...went 5-4 on the last road trip to Baltimore (1-2), Boston (2-1) and Tampa Bay (2-1) and are 9-7 on the road...last year, the A's went 43-38 (.531) in Oakland compared to 31-50 (.383) on the road...posted a winning record at home for the second consecutive season but finished with a losing mark on the road for the fifth consecutive season.

ONE-RUN GAMES AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS: The A's improved to 4-2 in one-run games with a 4-3, 12-inning win at Tampa Bay Saturday night...have the third best record in one-run games in the American League after posting the third worst record last year (20-25)...are 3-1 in extra inning games and the four extra inning games are tied for second most in the AL...were 8-11 in extra inning games last year and are 18-29 (.383) over the last four years...have two "walk-off" wins this season...both of the wins have come in extra innings on Wednesday on the last day of a homestand after the other team scored at least one run in the top of the inning.

PLAYERS USED: Friday night, Michael Taylor became the 35th player to appear in a game for the A's this year...that is second most in the majors to Boston (36)...12 of those 35 are rookies, which is also the most in the majors...used a total of 14 rookies all last year...currently have eight rookies on the roster (Céspedes, Cook, Figueroa, Miller, Milone, Parker, Recker, Taylor).

DAY GAMES: The A's have played just six day games, which is two fewer than any other team (Houston and Texas, 8)...are 4-2 in day games compared to 11-12 at night...last year, the A's were 32-31 during the day and 42-57 at night...had the second worst record under the lights in the American League.

IN APRIL: The A's finished April with a 10-12 record, marking the fourth consecutive season and eighth time in the last nine years the A's have not posted a winning record in April...however, it was just the second time they were more than one game under .500 (8-11 in 2009) as they are 106-109 (.493) in April since 2004...batted a Major League low .211 in April, which was the second lowest single-month batting average in Oakland history (.210, April of 1979)...had the second lowest on-base percentage in the majors (.284), which was the A's lowest in a month since June of 1982 (.284)...scored 68 runs in 22 games, an average of 3.09 per game, which was second lowest in the majors.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list six times and currently have five players on the DL (Anderson, Braden, Crisp, Devine, Sizemore)...Devine ("Tommy John" surgery) and Sizemore (torn ACL) will miss the entire season...the A's used the DL 15 times last year, which was the fewest since 2006 when they also used it 15 times...used the DL a total of 87 times from 2007-10...have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had just one.

ONE RUN OR FEWER: Has allowed one run or fewer in each of the first three starts of his career and has tossed at least 5.0 innings in each of his three outings...is just the second pitcher since 1990 to begin his career with three consecutive outings of five or more innings and one run or fewer...the other is Rich Harden, who did it for the A's from July 21 to 31, 2003...since 1918, no pitcher has began his career with four consecutive outings of five innings or more and one run or fewer.

FIRST START: He had a no decision in his A's debut, a 5-4, 14-inning win over Chicago April 25 in Oakland...shutout the White Sox on five hits and a walks over the first six innings to extend his career-opening scoreless streak to 11.2 innings...had a 2-0 lead when he allowed a RBI double to Fukudome in the seventh inning...Balfour allowed a run in the ninth inning for the blown save.

LAST START: He earned his first Major League win in the A's 5-3 victory at Boston a week ago today...had a 5-0 lead when he allowed his only run in the fourth inning...Pedroia led off with single, went to second on wild pitch, third on a ground out and then scored on an Ortiz ground out...Norberto recorded the save, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.

PARKER vs. TORONTO: Is making his first career appearance.

WITH SACRAMENTO: Was 1-0 with a 2.18 ERA in four starts...struck out 21 batters in 20.2 innings...allowed a .275 opponents batting average, including .271 (13 for 48) against right-handed hitter and .281 (9 for 32) against left-handers...surrendered both of his home runs to lefties...opponents were 4 for 29

THIS SPRING: Was 2-1 with a 3.27 ERA in four appearances, three starts, before he was optioned to Sacramento March 19...held the opposition to a .162 batting average (6 for 37) but walked 13 batters and hit one in 11.0 innings...his only relief appearance came in his first outing March 3 against Seattle.

TRADE: Was acquired from the Arizona Diamondbacks with Ryan Cook and Collin Cowgill for Trevor Cahill, Craig Breslow and cash considerations, December 9, 2011.

2011 RECAP: Spent the entire season at Double-A Mobile, earning a promotion to Arizona after the BayBears won the Southern League Championship...was selected by the Diamondbacks Sept. 19 and made one regular season start in his Major League debut...faced Los Angeles (NL) Sept. 27 and had a no decision in Arizona's 7-6, 10-inning win...tossed 5.2 shutout innings, yielded just four hits, walked a batter and struck out one...retired the first seven batters he faced, including a strikeout of Jerry Sands with one out in the first inning, his first big league strikeout...left the game with no score...the Dodgers scored five times in the 10th but Arizona came back with six in the bottom of the inning for the win...also made one postseason appearance in the NLDS against Milwaukee, a relief outing in Game 4...entered the game in the sixth inning with the Diamondbacks leading 7-3 and allowed a run on two hits and a walk in 0.1 innings...was rated as Arizona's fourth-best prospect by Baseball America following the season... was also rated as having the best slider in the organization...was later tabbed by as the A's number one prospect following the trade.

MOBILE: Was 11-8 with a 3.79 ERA in 26 starts for Mobile...tied for second in the Southern League in wins, ranked third in opponents batting average (.236) and fifth in ERA...tied for the league lead in balks (3)...was third in the Diamondbacks farm system in wins, fifth in strikeouts (112) and 10th in ERA...had career highs in starts, innings pitched (130.2), losses (8), runs (61), earned runs (55) and walks (55)...his opponents batting average included a .209 (58-for-277) mark against right-handed hitters, compared to .274 (54-for-197) and five of his seven home runs against left-handers...allowed a .188 average to hitters leading off an inning...went 5-6 with a 4.87 ERA before the All-Star Break but was 6-2 with a 2.84 ERA after the break...as a hitter, he went 9-for-32 (.281) with a walk and three strikeouts...the BayBears were 15-11 (.577) in his starting assignments...allowed one run or fewer in 13 of his 26 starts...however, tossed more than 6.0 innings just once...walked two batters or fewer 15 times.

MORE WITH MOBILE: His start April 11 at Carolina was his first since July 30, 2009...allowed a season-high eight runs in 3.2 innings for the loss...allowed seven runs in 3.1 innings in his second start April 17 against Mississippi...then went 3-0 with a 2.14 ERA over his next four starts from April 22 to May 10...surrendered a season-high three home runs May 20 at Tennessee...that gave him seven home runs over his first eight starts...did not yield another home run the rest of the way, a span of 18 starts, 94.2 innings pitched and 384 batters faced...did not allow a run or walk a batter in back-to-back starts May 31 at Mississippi (5.0 ip, 3 h) and June 5 against Huntsville (5.0 ip, 2 h)...issued a season-high six walks in 4.2 innings, June 16 against Montgomery...went 4-0 with a 1.93 ERA in six starts in July...the four-game winning streak was his longest of the season...struck out a season-high eight batters July 18 at Chattanooga and July 30 at Mississippi...tossed a season-high 6.2 innings in the latter contest...allowed one run or fewer in four of his last five regular season starts (2-1, 3.00 ERA)...then went 1-0 with a 1.50 ERA (12.0 ip, 9 h, 2 r, 2 er, 3 bb, 12 so, 1 hr) in two postseason starts.

MINOR LEAGUE CAREER: Is 29-19 with a 3.41 ERA (139 er in 366.1 ip) in 74 starts over four seasons in the minors...has yielded just 19 home runs, an average of 0.47 per nine innings...was rated as the Diamondbacks' top prospect by *Baseball America* in three consecutive seasons from 2009-11 prior to being listed as number four entering the 2012 season...is listed as the A's top prospect by the magazine for 2012...missed the entire 2010 season following Tommy John surgery Oct. 28, 2009...pitched in the All-Star Futures Game in 2009...was named to Midseason All-Star Teams with Mobile (Southern League, 2009) and South Bend (Midwest, 2008).

RHP Brandon McCarthy (2-3, 2.96 ERA): Is scheduled to make his eighth start of the season...is 2-1 with a 2.18 ERA over his last three starts after going 0-2 with a 3.60 ERA over his first four starts...leads the majors in hits allowed (50) and is tied for the lead in games started (7)...ranks fourth in the American League in innings pitched (45.2) and has the seventh lowest run support (3.15)...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 4-2 A's win at Boston last Wednesday (6.2 ip, 5 h, 1 r, 1 er, 3 bb, 4 so)...is 3-2 with a 3.79 ERA in nine career appearances, including six starts, against Toronto...had a no decision in his only start last year, a 7-6 A's loss in 10 innings at Toronto (8.0 ip, 8 h, 5 r, 4 er, 1 bb, 2 so).

- Had multiple RBI games in each of those contests...since 1918, he is the first Athletic and ninth Major Leaguer with three multiple RBI games over his first four career games (last: Wladimir Balentien, 2006-07).
- Struck out at least once in each of his first eight games, which is an Oakland record to start a career...
 the previous mark was six (Chris Carter, 2010; Brooks Conrad, 2008; Travis Buck, 2007)...matched
 the longest streak by an Athletic since 1918 (Troy Herriage, 1956; Norm Bass, 1961).
- Hit his fourth home run April 18 at Los Angeles in his 12th game...since 1918, that is the fastest
 a player has reached four career home runs in Athletics history...the previous best was by Brian
 Lesher, who did it in 14 games in 1996.
- Did not have a putout a April 25 against Chicago, becoming the first A's outfielder without a putout in a game of 14 or more innings since Stan Javier on May 30, 1988 against New York.

BARTOLO COLÓN

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and is in his 15th season in the majors.
- Made each of his first three starts against Seattle to become the first pitcher in Oakland history to
 make three consecutive starts against one team in the same season without missing a turn in the
 rotation.

RYAN COOK

 Became the third pitcher in Athletics franchise history to record four strikeouts in an inning April 27 at Baltimore (Blake Stein, 1998; Erik Hiljus, 2001).

COCO CRISP

- Was the A's 13th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 13 years...had 203 career starts in left entering the season, but none since October 2, 2005.
- Committed his first error since April 25, 2011 on April 7 against Seattle, snapping a 116-game errorless streak...that streak was seventh longest by an outfielder in Oakland history.

FAUTINO DE LOS SANTOS

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and compiled a 3.00 ERA in six relief appearances before he was
 optioned to Sacramento, April 25.
- Did not retire a batter over his final three outings before he option (5 h, 2 r, 1 er, 2 bb).

JOEY DEVINE

Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 retroactive to March 24...underwent "Tommy John" surgery on his right elbow April 10... Dr. James Andrews performed the surgery in Pensacola, Fla., which included an ulnar collateral ligament reconstruction, an ulnar nerve transposition and a debridement of the flexor tendon...also had "Tommy John" surgery on the same elbow April 21, 2009.

JOSH DONALDSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster but hit just .094 in nine games before he was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento April 23.
- Made nine starts, all at third base...his Major League experience prior to this season included seven
 games at catcher and two at first base.

BRIAN FUENTES

 Recorded his 200th career save May 2 at Boston to become the sixth left-handed reliever in Major League history to reach the 200 plateau (Franco, Wagner, Myers, Righetti, Lyle).

GRAHAM GODFREY

Godfrey was on the A's Opening Day roster and went 0-3 with a 5.06 ERA in three starts before he
was optioned to Sacramento April 21.

JONNY GOMES

- Was hit by a Jonathan Braxton pitch with the bases loaded in the bottom of the 12th inning April 11 against Kansas City to force in the winning run in the A's 5-4 victory...it was his second career walk-off hit by pitch (August 21, 2011 vs. Philadelphia)...it was his fifth career walk-off RBI (two home runs, one walk)...it was the third walk-off hit by pitch in Oakland history (Mike Bordick, August 4, 1993 vs. Seattle and Olmedo Saenz, July 20, 2002 vs. Texas).
- Singled in the eighth inning April 19 at Los Angeles after homering for each of his first three hits
 for the season...is the first player in Oakland history whose first three hits in a season were all home
 runs.

LUKE HUGHES

 Was claimed off waivers from Minnesota April 22 and went 1 for 13 (.077) in four games with the A's before he was designated for assignment April 30.

BRANDON INGE

 Agreed to terms with the A's on a one-year contract April 30 after he was released by Detroit April 26.

KILA KA'AIHUE

- Matched his career high with three hits April 15 at Seattle (third time, last: Sept. 28, 2010 vs. Minnesota).
- Had the game-winning RBI single in the 14th inning April 25 against Chicago, his second career walk-off hit (home run, April 1, 2011 vs. Los Angeles-AL).

BRANDON MCCARTHY

- Made his first career Opening Day start March 28 against Seattle and had a no decision in the A's 3-1, 11-inning loss...allowed just one run on six hits and no walks in 7.0 innings.
- Also started the third game of the season, April 6 against Seattle, to become the second pitcher in
 Oakland history to start two of the A's first three games...the other is Joe Blanton who did it in 2008,
 the other time the A's opened the season in Japan...also started three of the first seven games, joining
 Blaton as the only Oakland pitchers to do that since 1977.

JIM MILLER

 Picked up his first Major League win April 25 against Chicago...allowed two inherited runners to score in the top of the 14th inning but the A's came back with three in the bottom of the inning.

TOMMY MILONE

• Combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit).

JORDAN NORBERTO

Retired the final two batters May 1 at Boston for his first Major League save...he saved Jarrod
Parker's first ML win, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same
game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.

JOSH REDDICK

· Was the A's fifth different Opening Day starter in right field in the last five years.

ADAM ROSALES

Was on the A's Opening Day roster and appeared in one game against Seattle in Japan before he was
optioned to Sacramento April 2.

SCOTT SIZEMORE

 Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 3 after tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee in the team's first full-squad workout Feb. 27 in Phoenix...underwent successful reconstructive surgery March 21...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg of the Arizona Sports Medicine Center of Scottsdale...will miss the entire 2012 season.

SETH SMITH

- Was the A's eight different Opening Day starter at designated hitter in the last eight years.
- Hit his first home run of the season April 22 against Cleveland, a two-run shot off Masterson in the fourth inning, to snap a career-high 45-game homerless streak...his previous high was 35 (June 22-July 31, 2011)...it was his first home run since Aug. 23, 2011 against Houston.
- Went 0 for 4 with four strikeouts April 30 at Boston, the first four-strikeout game of his career.

ERIC SOGARD

Had a career-high three RBI, April 15 at Seattle.

KURT SUZUKI

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at catcher...the five starts are second most by a catcher in Oakland history...only Terry Steinbach, with nine, has more.
- Made his 598th career appearance at catcher April 7 against Seattle, which moves him past Ossee Schreckengost for fifth most in Athletics history.
- Had five assists April 25 against Chicago, the third time in Oakland history a catcher had five or more assists in a game (6, Jim Essian vs. Texas on Sept. 19, 1979; 5, Jeff Newman vs. Toronto on Aug. 13, 1979).

RICH THOMPSON

- Was claimed off waivers from the Los Angeles Angels April 20 and appeared in one game for the A's before he was designated for assignment April 25...faced Chicago on April 23 (0.2 ip, 1 h).
- Cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento April 27.

NEIL WAGNER

Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 17 but did not appear in a game before he was optioned back to Sacramento April 20.

JEMILE WEEKS

Played in the 100th game of his career April 6 against Seattle and collected 126 hits over that span...
since 1918, the only player in Athletics history with more hits over the first 100 games of his career
is Wally Moses, who had 134 hits in his first 100 games with the Philadelphia A's in 1935-36...the
previous Oakland record was 122 by Ben Grieve.
