A's vs. TIGERS

The A's have won two of the first three games of this series after splitting the season series last year, 5-5...went 4-4 in Oakland and 1-1 in Detroit...have won two season series over the last six years, lost two and split two...are 30-26 (.536) against Detroit since 2006...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 238-229 against the Tigers...that includes 134-102 in Oakland, 102-125 in Detroit and 2-2 in Las Vegas...all-time, the A's are 906-982 against the Tigers.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

The A's have a 25-20 record on Mother's Day since moving to Oakland in 1968...have won two straight and five of the last six Mother's Day games, including Dallas Braden's perfect game on May 9, 2010 against Tampa Bay...are 16-8 in Oakland...have faced Detroit twice on Mother's Day and lost both times (15-0 on May 14, 1978 and 7-6 on May 10, 1987...both times at Detroit).

Ryan Cook has not allowed a run and his 16.2 innings pitched are the most among American League relievers that have not allowed a run...has a 17.2-inning scoreless streak dating back to last year.

Jonny Gomes has a seven-game hitting streak (9 for 23, .391), which matches the A's season high.

Brandon Inge leads the American League with 17 RBI in May.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In 1981 Matt Keough improves to 6-0 as the A's defeat the Yankees at New York, 5-4...in 1986 Dave Kingman hits a three-run homer in the bottom of the 10th after the A's score single runs in the seventh, eighth and ninth innings, in the A's 6-3 win over Toronto...in 2007 the A's score five times in the bottom of the ninth to defeat Cleveland, 10-7...Milton Bradley hits a tworun home run to tie the game and Jack Cust hits a three-run homer for the win as he homers in his fourth consecutive game.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have won two straight, five of the last seven and seven of the last 10 games...are a season-high tying two games over .500 at 18-16 (also 16-14 on May 8)...have not been three games over .500 since June 3, 2010 (29-26)...are 14-9 over the last 23 games after starting the season 4-7...remain in second place in the American League West for the 12th consecutive day and trail first place Texas by four games...have spent one day tied for first this year, 17 days in second, eight days tied for second, six days in third and seven days in fourth...split the two-game series with Toronto to start the homestand after winning back-to-back series at Boston and Tampa Bay last week for the first time this year.

DAY GAMES: The A's will play just their eight day game of the season today, which is the fewest in the majors (Houston is scheduled to play their ninth today)...however, are scheduled to play a day game every other day between now and next Saturday...are 4-3 in day games compared to 14-13 at night...last year, the A's were 32-31 during the day and 42-57 at night...had the second worst record under the lights in the American League.

MONTH-BY-MONTH: The A's are 7-3 in the month of May, which is the second best record in the American League (Baltimore, 7-3) and third best in the majors (Miami, 9-2)...went 10-12 in April, marking the fourth consecutive season and eighth time in the last nine years the A's did not post a winning record in April...are averaging 5.30 runs per game in May (53 r in 10 g), which is third best in the AL...averaged 3.09 runs per game in April, which was second lowest in the majors...are batting .248 (88 for 355) in May after hitting a Major League low .211 in April...the April average was the second lowest single-month batting average in Oakland history (.210, April of 1979).

ON THE BASES: The A's had their streak of consecutive games with a stolen base snapped at a season-high five last night...still **lead the American League** and rank second in the majors with 34 for the season (Miami, 37)...have five double steals, which is two more than the season total from last year...10 of the A's steals have been of third base, which is the most in the majors...have a stolen base percentage of 82.9% (7 cs), which ranks second in the AL...A's opponents have been caught stealing 12 times, which is second most in the AL (Kansas City, 13)...the opponents stolen base percentage of 55.6% (15 for 27) is second lowest (Chicago, 41.2%).

OFFENSE: The A's rank last in the majors in batting (.221), have the third lowest on-base percentage (.296) and fourth lowest slugging percentage (.352)...are last in the American League in batting with runners in scoring position (.221)...have the fewest grounded into double plays in the AL (15), the second most strikeouts (270) and are tied for second in hit by pitches (14)...have been shutout four times, which is tied for second most

THE LONG BALL: The A's hit their 31st home run of the season Friday night in game 33...last year, the A's did not hit their 31st home run until game 56...17 of the A's 31 home runs have come with runners on base (eight two-run, seven three-run, two grand slams)...17 have come with two outs, which is second most in the American League (Baltimore, 18)...had just 35 two-out home runs all last year.

PITCHING: The A's have a 5.03 ERA (65 er in 116.1 ip) and .262 (118 for 450) opponents batting average over the last 13 games after logging a 2.68 ERA and .233 opponents average over the first 21 contests...now have a 3.56 ERA for the season, which ranks fourth in the American League...are **tied for the Major League lead** in shutouts (4)...have allowed the third fewest home runs in the AL (30)...have the second fewest strikeouts (201)...A's starting pitchers have a 5.94 ERA (48 er in 72.2 ip) and .284 (84 for 296) opponents batting average over the last 13 games after posting a 2.86 ERA and .242 opponents average over the first 21 contests.

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have committed three errors in the last three games after going errorless in a season-high five consecutive games...now have 22 errors for the season, which is fourth most in the American League...the errors have led to 12 unearned runs, which is tied for third most in the AL...A's outfielders have seven assists, which is tied for the most in the AL (Boston, Kansas City and Minnesota).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 3-2 on this six-game homestand against Toronto (1-1) and Detroit (2-1)...went 3-3 on the last homestand against Cleveland (1-2) and Chicago (2-1) and are 9-9 at home for the season...leave for a seven-game road trip to Los Angeles (two games), Texas (two games) and San Francisco (three games) following the game today...went 5-4 on the last road trip to Baltimore (1-2), Boston (2-1) and Tampa Bay (2-1) and are 9-7 on the road...have a 3.06 ERA (58 er in 170.2 ip) at home compared to 4.17 (65 er in 140.1 ip) on the road.

WALK-OFF WINS AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS: The A's had their third "walk-off" win of the season Tuesday night against Toronto, matching their season total from last year...all three of those wins came after the visiting team scored at least one run in the top of the final inning...Brandon Inge won the game with a grand slam, the sixth "walk-off" grand slam in Oakland history (Tenace, 1973; Armas, 1980; McGwire, 1990 and 1995; Ellis, 2008)...the A's are now 6-2 in games decided in the seventh inning or later, including 5-2 in the last at bat...the five last at bat wins are tied second most in the American League (Baltimore, 7)...are 3-1 in extra inning games...rank second in the AL in extra inning wins and third in games...were 8-11 in extra inning games last year and are 18-29 (.383) over the last four years...are 4-2 in one-run games, which is the fourth best record in the AL...had the third worst one-run record last year (20-25)...are 10-4 in games decided by two runs or fewer and 8-12 in all other games.

PLAYERS USED: The A's have employed 35 different players, which is second most in the majors to Boston (37)...12 of those 35 are rookies, which is the most in the majors...used a total of 14 rookies all last year...currently have eight rookies on the roster (Carignan, Cook, Cowgill, Donaldson, Figueroa, Milone, Parker, Recker).

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list seven times and currently have six players on the DL (Anderson, Braden, Céspedes, Crisp, Devine, Sizemore)...Devine ("Tommy John" surgery) and Sizemore (torn ACL) will miss the entire season...the A's used the DL 15 times last year, which was the fewest since 2006 when they also used it 15 times...used the DL a total of 87 times from 2007-10...have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had just one.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his fourth start of the season, the fifth of his career...the A's have won all three of his starting assignments and his teams are 4-0 in his career...has tossed at least six innings in each of his three starts this year, allowed two runs or fewer all three times and walked two batters or fewer twice.

BRIEFLY: Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 25 after going 1-0 with a 2.18 ERA in four starts with the River Cats...replaced Graham Godfrey in the starting rotation.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has a .211 opponents batting average, which includes a .135 (5 for 37) mark against left-handed hitters...has yielded a .115 (3 for 26) average with runners on base, including .077 (1 for 13) with runners in scoring position.

ONE RUN OR FEWER: Allowed one run or fewer in each of the first three starts of his career from September 27, 2011 to May 1, 2012...tossed at least 5.0 innings in each of those outings to become just the second pitcher since 1990 to begin his career with three consecutive outings of five or more innings and one run or fewer...the other is Rich Harden, who did it for the A's from July 21 to 31, 2003.

FIRST START: He had a no decision in his A's debut, a 5-4, 14-inning win over Chicago April 25 in Oakland...shutout the White Sox on five hits and a walks over the first six innings to extend his career-opening scoreless streak to 11.2 innings...had a 2-0 lead when he allowed a RBI double to Fukudome in the seventh inning...Balfour allowed a run in the ninth inning for the blown save.

SECOND START: He earned his first Major League win in the A's 5-3 victory at Boston May 1...had a 5-0 lead when he allowed his only run in the fourth inning...Pedroia led off with single, went to second on wild pitch, third on a ground out and then scored on an Ortiz ground out...Norberto recorded the save, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 7-3 win over Toronto on Tuesday in Oakland...tossed a career-high seven innings but issued a career-high five walks...allowed his only runs on a two-run home run by Johnson in the third inning, the first home run he allowed in his career.

PARKER vs. DETROIT: Is making his first career appearance.

WITH SACRAMENTO: Was 1-0 with a 2.18 ERA in four starts...struck out 21 batters in 20.2 innings...allowed a .275 opponents batting average, including .271 (13 for 48) against right-handed hitter and .281 (9 for 32) against left-handers...surrendered both of his home runs to lefties...opponents were 4 for 29

(.138) with runners in scoring position...tossed 6.0 innings in each of his first three starts before leaving his last start April 21 at Reno after just 2.2 innings in preparation for starting in Oakland April 25 on three days rest.

THIS SPRING: Was 2-1 with a 3.27 ERA in four appearances, three starts, before he was optioned to Sacramento March 19...held the opposition to a .162 batting average (6 for 37) but walked 13 batters and hit one in 11.0 innings...his only relief appearance came in his first outing March 3 against Seattle.

TRADE: Was acquired from the Arizona Diamondbacks with Ryan Cook and Collin Cowgill for Trevor Cahill, Craig Breslow and cash considerations, December 9, 2011.

2011 RECAP: Spent the entire season at Double-A Mobile, earning a promotion to Arizona after the BayBears won the Southern League Championship...was selected by the Diamondbacks Sept. 19 and made one regular season start in his Major League debut...faced Los Angeles (NL) Sept. 27 and had a no decision in Arizona's 7-6, 10-inning win...tossed 5.2 shutout innings, yielded just four hits, walked a batter and struck out one...retired the first seven batters he faced, including a strikeout of Jerry Sands with one out in the first inning, his first big league strikeout...left the game with no score...the Dodgers scored five times in the 10th but Arizona came back with six in the bottom of the inning for the win...also made one postseason appearance in the NLDS against Milwaukee, a relief outing in Game 4...entered the game in the sixth inning with the Diamondbacks leading 7-3 and allowed a run on two hits and a walk in 0.1 innings...was rated as Arizona's fourth-best prospect by Baseball America following the season... was also rated as having the best slider in the organization...was later tabbed by as the A's number one prospect following the trade.

MOBILE: Was 11-8 with a 3.79 ERA in 26 starts for Mobile...tied for second in the Southern League in wins, ranked third in opponents batting average (.236) and fifth in ERA...tied for the league lead in balks (3)...was third in the Diamondbacks farm system in wins, fifth in strikeouts (112) and 10th in ERA...had career highs in starts, innings pitched (130.2), losses (8), runs (61), earned runs (55) and walks (55)...his opponents batting average included a .209 (58-for-277) mark against right-handed hitters, compared to .274 (54-for-197) and five of his seven home runs against left-handers...allowed a .188 average to hitters leading off an inning...went 5-6 with a 4.87 ERA before the All-Star Break but was 6-2 with a 2.84 ERA after the break...as a hitter, he went 9-for-32 (.281) with a walk and three strikeouts...the BayBears were 15-11 (.577) in his starting assignments...allowed one run or fewer in 13 of his 26 starts...however, tossed more than 6.0 innings just once...walked two batters or fewer 15 times...went 1-0 with a 1.50 ERA (12.0 ip, 9 h, 2 r, 2 er, 3 bb, 12 so, 1 hr) in two postseason starts.

MINOR LEAGUE CAREER: Is 29-19 with a 3.41 ERA (139 er in 366.1 ip) in 74 starts over four seasons in the minors...has yielded just 19 home runs, an average of 0.47 per nine innings...was rated as the Diamondbacks' top prospect by *Baseball America* in three consecutive seasons from 2009-11 prior to being listed as number four entering the 2012 season...is listed as the A's top prospect by the magazine for 2012...missed the entire 2010 season following Tommy John surgery Oct. 28, 2009...pitched in the All-Star Futures Game in 2009...was named to Midseason All-Star Teams with Mobile (Southern League, 2009) and South Bend (Midwest, 2008).

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Tyson Ross (1-3, 7.71 ERA): Is scheduled to make his sixth start of the season...is 0-3 with a 13.15 ERA and .410 opponents batting average over his last three starts after going 1-0 with a 2.13 ERA and .239 opponents average over his first two starts...the three-game losing streak is one short of his career-high of four (April 15 to June 1, 2010)...was the losing pitcher in his last start, a 5-2 A's loss to Toronto on Wednesday (5.2 ip, 5 h, 3 r, 3 er, 3 bb, 3 so)...is 0-1 with a save and a 2.61 ERA in five career appearances, three starts, against Los Angeles...had a no decision in his only start this year, a 5-3 A's win at Anaheim April 17 (6.0 ip, 7 h, 2 r, 2 er, 0 bb, 3 so)...was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 17 after going 0-1 with a 4.00 ERA in two starts with the River Cats.

- Is 1-1 with two saves, two blown saves and an 11.81 ERA (7 er in 5.1 ip) over his last seven games after yielding just one run over his first 10 contests (0.82 ERA).
- His seven saves are tied for fifth most among American League relievers but his two blown saves are tied for second most...is also tied for third in games pitched (17) and tied for ninth in home runs allowed (3).
- Has allowed a .233 opponents batting average...that includes .167 (6 for 36) against left-handers and .333 (8 for 24) against right-handers.
- His first batters faced are 7 for 16 (.438), which is the fifth highest average in the AL.
- Is 3-2 with no saves, three blown saves and a 2.70 ERA in 26 career games against Detroit (26.2 ip, 19 h, 8 r, 8 er, 13 bb, 34 so, 3 hr)...the strikeouts are tied for his most against any team (Cleveland).
- Recorded the 17th save of his career May 5, tying Graeme Lloyd for the most in Major League history by an Australian-born pitcher.
- Was used mostly as a setup man with Oakland last year, posting a 5-2 record with two saves, a 2.47 ERA and .199 opponents average in 62 appearances...tied for eighth among AL relievers in grounded into double plays (8) and ranked 10th in opponents on-base percentage (.266).

- Has not allowed an earned run in nine of his past 10 games (1 er in 12.1 ip, 0.73 ERA) after allowing two earned runs in his first three games (5.40 ERA).
- Allowed his third home run of the season Wednesday and it came in his 11th game (now has 13 appearances)...last year, allowed two home runs in 26 games for the season...the three home runs allowed are tied for ninth most among American League relievers.
- His opponents have a .212 batting average...right-handed hitters are 4 for 23 (.174) while left-handers are 7 for 29 (.241)...however, his first batters faced are 5 for 13 (.381), which is the ninth highest average in the AL.
- Has allowed 3 of 8 (37.5%) inherited runners to score and has now allowed 11 of 22 (50.0%) to score over the past two years.
- Has faced the Tigers six times in his career (5.1 ip, 7 h, 4 r, 3 er, 4 bb, 6 so, 5.06 ERA).
- Was on the A's Opening Day roster last year but had six stints with Oakland...had a 2.86 ERA and .235 opponents average in 26 games...the ERA was the lowest of his career but he allowed 8 of 14 (57.1%) inherited runners to score, which was the highest percentage of his career.

· Was the A's fifth different Opening Day starter in right field in the last five years.
