A's vs. RANGERS

This is the first of 19 meetings between the A's and Texas this year...the A's lost the season series last year 6-13...the 13 losses equaled the A's most ever against the Texas Rangers (1977)...went 4-6 in Oakland and 2-7 in Texas...have lost 12 of the last 14 games to the Rangers, including seven of the last eight in Arlington...have dropped five of the last six season series and are 51-63 (.447) against Texas over that span...are 292-307 all-time against the Texas Rangers...that breaks down to 156-144 in Oakland and 136-163 in Texas...including 69-75 at Rangers Ballpark...have an all-time record of 389-389 against the Rangers/Senators.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Ryan Cook has not allowed a run and his 17.2 innings pitched are the **most among AL relievers** that have not allowed a run...the Oakland record for consecutive scoreless innings to start a season by a player on the Opening Day roster is 18.1 by Jim Corsi in 1995...Cook has an 18.2-inning scoreless streak dating back to last year.

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1939** the first American League night game is played at Shibe Park but the A's lose to Cleveland 8-3 in 10 innings...in **1975** Vida Blue becomes the second Oakland Athletic to win 100 games as he fires a seven hitter at Yankee Stadium in the A's 4-2 win...in **1986** Tony Phillips hits for the cycle in the A's 8-4 win at Baltimore...it is the first cycle in Oakland history.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Split a two-game series at Los Angeles to start the road trip after splitting each of the two series on the last homestand...are now 2-0-3 over the last five series...are 15-11 over the last 26 games after starting the season 4-7...are 19-18 after 37 games for the second consecutive season...remain in second place in the American League West for the 15th consecutive day and trail first place Texas by four games...have spent one day tied for first this year, 20 days in second, eight days tied for second, six days in third and seven days in fourth.

SHUTOUT: The A's were shutout by Los Angeles yesterday 4-0 after blanking the Angels 5-0 on Monday...it marks the fourth time this year the A's have played back-to-back games where they shutout the opponent in one game and were shutout in the other...are **tied for the Major League lead** with five shutouts (Los Angeles-AL)...have been shutout five times, which is tied for second most in the American League.

ON THE BASES: The A's have back-to-back two-steal games and have been successful in each of their last 20 stolen base attempts...that is the third longest streak in Oakland history and is two short of the record (see chart on left)...**lead the American League** and rank second in the majors with 38 stolen bases (Miami, 40)...have five double steals, which is two more than the season total from last year...10 of the A's steals have been of third base, which is the most in the majors...have a stolen base percentage of 84.4% (7 cs), which ranks second in the AL (Los Angeles, 86.4%)...A's opponents have been caught stealing 12 times, which is second most in the AL (Kansas City, 14)...the opponents stolen base percentage of 63.6% (21 for 33) is second lowest (Chicago, 42.1%).

MONTH-BY-MONTH: The A's are 8-5 in the month of May, which is the third best record in the American League behind Baltimore (9-5) and Kansas City (9-5)...went 10-12 in April, marking the fourth consecutive season and eighth time in the last nine years the A's did not post a winning record in April...are averaging 4.54 runs per game in May (59 r in 13 g), which is fourth best in the AL...averaged 3.09 runs per game in April, which was second lowest in the majors...are batting .230 (103 for 448) in May after hitting a Major League low .211 in April...the April average was the second lowest single-month batting average in Oakland history (.210, April of 1979).

PITCHING: The A's have a 2.25 ERA (11 er in 44.0 ip) over the last five games after posting a 5.58 ERA over the previous 11 contests...now have a 3.47 ERA for the season, which ranks second in the American League to Texas (3.24)...have allowed just one home run in the last five games and have surrendered just 31 for the season, which is tied for second fewest in the AL...have the second lowest slugging percentage (.385) and the second fewest strikeouts (217)...A's starting pitchers have a 5.34 ERA (54 er in 91.0 ip) and .288 (107 for 371) opponents batting average over the last 16 games after posting a 2.86 ERA and .242 opponents average over the first 21 contests.

THE LONG BALL: The A's hit their 33rd home run of the season Monday night in game 36...last year, the A's did not hit their 33rd home run until game 60 (number 34 came in game 61)...17 of the A's 33 home runs have come with runners on base (eight two-run, seven three-run, two grand slams)...18 have come with two outs, which is second most in the American League (Baltimore, 19)...had just 35 two-out home runs all last year.

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: Josh Reddick had the eighth assist by an A's outfielder yesterday, which is the most in the American League...the A's have committed four errors in the last 11 games...however, have 23 errors for the season, which is fourth most in the AL.

OFFENSE: The A's rank last in the majors in batting (.217) and have the third lowest on-base percentage (.293) and slugging percentage (.347)...are last in the American League in batting with runners in scoring position (.211)...have struck out 73 times in the last seven games and are ranks second in the AL in strikeouts (298)...have the fewest grounded into double plays in the AL (16) and are tied for second in hit by pitches (15).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 1-1 on this seven-game road trip to Los Angeles (1-1), Texas (two games) and San Francisco (three games)...went 5-4 on the last road trip to Baltimore (1-2), Boston (2-1) and Tampa Bay (2-1) and are 10-8 on the road for the season...went 3-3 on the last homestand against Toronto (1-1) and Detroit (2-2) and are 9-10 at home for the season...have a 3.06 ERA (61 er in 179.2 ip) at home compared to 3.95 (69 er in 157.1 ip) on the road.

DAY GAMES: The A's have played just nine day games this year, which is tied with Texas for the fewest in the majors...have played two day games in the last three days and will play three more in the next five days...are 4-5 in day games compared to 15-13 at night...last year, the A's were 32-31 during the day and 42-57 at night...had the second worst record under the lights in the American League.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's are 10-5 in games decided by two runs or fewer and 9-13 in all other games...are 4-2 in one-run games, which is the third best record in the American League...are 3-1 in extra inning games...rank second in the AL in extra inning wins and third in games...are 6-2 in games decided in the seventh inning or later, including 5-2 in the last at bat...the five last at bat wins are tied for second most in the AL (Baltimore, 7)...have three "walk-off" wins this year, matching their season total from last year...all three of those wins came after the visiting team scored at least one run in the top of the final inning.

PLAYERS USED: The A's have employed 35 different players, which is tied with San Diego for second most in the majors to Boston (38)...12 of those 35 are rookies, which is the most in the majors...used a total of 14 rookies all last year...currently have seven rookies on the roster (Cook, Cowgill, Donaldson, Figueroa, Milone, Parker, Recker).

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list seven times and currently have six players on the DL (Anderson, Braden, Céspedes, Crisp, Devine, Sizemore)...Devine ("Tommy John" surgery) and Sizemore (torn ACL) will miss the entire season...the A's used the DL 15 times last year, which was the fewest since 2006 when they also used it 15 times...used the DL a total of 87 times from 2007-10...have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had just one.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his eight start of the season, the 13th of his career...the A's are 5-2 (.714) in his starting assignments this year and his teams are 10-2 (.833) in his career...has tossed at least six innings in four of his seven starts, allowed two runs or fewer four times and walked two batters or fewer five times.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Is tied for the lead among American League rookies in wins (5) and games started (7) and ranks third in innings pitched (43.2)...the wins are tied for fourth among all AL pitchers.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 3-0 with a 0.39 ERA (1 er in 23.0 ip) and .147 (11 for 75) opponents batting average at home compared to 2-2 with a 7.84 ERA (18 er in 20.2 ip) and .286 (24 for 84) opponents average in four starts on the road...has the lowest home ERA in the Major Leagues and the second highest road ERA in the American League (Masterson, CLE 9.00).

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .175 (7 for 40) batting average to batters leading off an inning, which ranks fifth lowest in the American League...the opponents three and four hitters are batting a combined .142 (5 for 35) off him...has surrendered four home runs in his last three starts after yielding just one over his first four...all five of his home runs have come on the road and four have been solo shots.

FIRST START: He combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed a career-high 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...all three hits were doubles but no one advanced past second base...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit).

SECOND START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-0 loss at Seattle April 14...faced just one batter over the minimum over the first five innings but that was a solo home run by Montero in the second inning...then allowed three runs in the sixth on a bases loaded walk by Smoak and a two-run double by Montero...Noesi and League combined to shutout the A's on five hits.

THIRD START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 4-2 win at Los Angeles April 19...blanked the Angels on two hits over the first three innings before allowing his only two runs in the fourth...Pujols doubled and scored on a Wells double...Wells scored on a Trumbo single...left after five innings with a 4-2 lead.

FOURTH START: He combined with Grant Balfour on a four-hit, 2-0 shutout of Chicago April 24 in Oakland...tossed a career-high tying 8.0 innings and allowed three of the hits...did not allow a hit until Ramirez singled to lead off the fifth...did not allow a runner past first base and faced just two batters over the minimum as he was aided by two double plays and a caught stealing...according to the Elias Sports Bureau he is just the second Oakland rookie over the last 75 years to have two wins while pitching at least eight scoreless innings and allowing three or fewer hits in a season (Vida Blue, 1970).

FIFTH START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 11-6 loss at Boston April 30...allowed a career-high eight runs on a career-high tying eight hits, including a career-high three home runs...allowed four runs in the second inning, including a lead-off home run to Ortiz and RBI singles by Byrd and Aviles...McDonald hit a two-run home run in the third and Ortiz added a solo shot in the fifth.

SIXTH START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 9-5 win at Tampa Bay May 6...allowed five runs in five innings and walked a career-high four batters...allowed four runs in the first inning...walked the first three batters he faced...Keppinger followed with a sacrifice fly and after hitting Scott to reload the bases, he allowed a RBI single to Rodriguez and a two-run single to Joyce...the A's then scored five times in the third and three more times in the fifth to take an 8-4 lead...also allowed an Upton solo home run in the fifth.

LAST START: He won his second consecutive start in the A's 11-4 win over Detroit last Friday in Oakland...struck out a career-high six batters in 7.0 innings...allowed a run to score in the first inning when Jackson led off with a double and later scored on a double play...the A's came back with two in the bottom of the inning before he allowed an unearned run in the third on a Cabrera RBI double...retired each of the final 10 batters he faced.

MILONE vs. TEXAS: Is making his first career appearance and start.

THIS SPRING: Was 2-1 with a 4.91 ERA in five appearances, four starts (14.2 ip, 13 h, 9 r, 8 er, 1 bb, 12 so)...that does not include two starts and wins in exhibition games...faced Yomiuri in Japan March 25 (5.0 ip, 2 h, 7 so) and tossed 6.0 perfect innings at Sacramento March 31 (6 so)...including the exhibition games, he walked just one batter in 25.2 innings...his only relief appearance came in his first outing March 2 against Seattle.

2011 RECAP: Spent the entire season at Triple-A Syracuse before being called up by Washington in September to make his Major League debut...went 1-0 with a 3.81 ERA in five starts for the Nationals...walked just four batters in 26.0 innings (1.38 per nine innings)...allowed a .283 opponents batting average, which included a .281 mark against right-handed hitters compared to .300 against lefthanders...held the opposition to a .208 average with runners in scoring position...yielded a .385 batting average and .429 on-base percentage to batters leading off an inning...opponents hit .175 the first time through the lineup, .293 the second time through and .500 after that...was 12-6 with a 3.22 ERA in 24 starts in his Triple-A debut with Syracuse...was named to the *Baseball America* Triple-A All-Star team...ranked second in the International League in strikeouts (155), tied for third in wins and was sixth in ERA...averaged 0.97 walks per nine innings, which was the lowest among IL starters...also ranked second in strikeouts per nine innings (9.40) and fourth in opponents batting average (.241)...walked just 16 for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 9.69...his opponents batting average included a .230 mark against left-handed hitters compared to .244 against right-handers...allowed a .216 average to batters leading off an inning...was traded to the A's December 23, 2011 with A.J. Cole, Derek Norris and Brad Peacock for Gio Gonzalez and Rob Gilliam

MINOR LEAGUE CAREER: Went 37-22 with a 3.05 ERA in 91 games, 86 starts, over four seasons in the minors in the Washington Nationals farm system...struck out 465 batters and walked just 84 for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 5.54...was named the Nationals' Minor League Pitcher of the Year after going 12-5 with a 2.85 ERA in 27 starts with Double-A Harrisburg in 2010.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Brandon McCarthy (3-3, 2.56 ERA): Is scheduled to make his ninth start of the season...has won each of his last three starts and is 3-0 with a 1.31 ERA over that span...that has lowered his season ERA to 2.56, which ranks eighth in the American League...the winning streak is one short of his career high of four...has not allowed a home run in his last four starts and his average of 0.51 home runs per nine innings is ninth lowest in the AL...opponents are batting .173 with runners in scoring position, which is fifth lowest in the AL...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 3-1 win over Detroit last Saturday in Oakland (7.0 ip, 4 h, 10 so)...is 1-4 with a 4.06 ERA in nine career appearances, seven starts, against Texas...was 0-2 with a 4.13 ERA in five starts last year.

The A's bullpen has compiled a 1.83 ERA (8 er in 39.1 ip) and held the opposition to a .188 (25 for 133) batting average over the last 11 games...ranks second in the American League in opponents batting (.213) and fourth in ERA (2.68)...has allowed just two home runs in the last 13 games and has surrendered 10 for the season, which is third fewest in the AL...is tied for second among AL bullpens in opponents grounded into double plays (14) and ranks fourth in saves (10)...is third in most walks (49).

- First batters faced are 7 for 17 (.412) with two walks (.474 on-base percentage).

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his ninth start of the season, which will tie him for the Major League lead...the A's are 4-4 (.500) in his starting assignments and are 15-18 (.455) in his two seasons with the A's...his teams are 42-47 (.472) in his career...has tossed seven or more innings in five of his eight starts, allowed two runs or fewer six times and walked two batters or fewer five times.

THREE-GAME WINNING STREAK: Has won each of his last three starts and is 3-0 with a 1.31 ERA (3 er in 20.2 ip) and .189 (14 for 74) opponents batting average over that span...that has lowered his season ERA to 2.56, which ranks ninth in the American League...the winning streak is one short of his career high of four (twice, last: July 15 to August 6, 2011).

FIRST START: Had a no decision in the A's 3-1, 11-inning loss to Seattle in Tokyo on March 28...it was his first career Opening Day start and he became the seventh different Opening Day starter for the A's in the last seven years (Cahill, Sheets, Braden, Blanton, Haren, Zito)...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed just one run on a Dustin Ackley home run in the fourth inning...Hernandez and the Mariners bullpen combined to limit the A's to a run on six hits.

SECOND START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 7-3 loss to Seattle April 6 in Oakland...blanked the Mariners on two hits over the first two innings before allowing four runs in the third...an error by Donaldson made three of the runs unearned...Seager had a two-run single to highlight the scoring and McCarthy allowed another run in the fourth on a Figgins RBI single.

THIRD START: He had a no decision in the A's 5-4, 12-inning win over Kansas City April 11 in Oakland...retired the first seven batters before Pena double and scored on a Gordon single in the third inning...also allowed a solo home run to Butler in the fourth...left after six innings with a 3-2 lead but Fuentes allowed a Gordon home run in the seventh inning for the blown save.

BRANDON ALLEN

- Was the A's Opening Day starter at first base March 28 but went for 7 with five strikeouts in three games before he was designated for assignment April 9...was claimed off waivers by the Tampa Bay Rays April 19.

BRETT ANDERSON

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 13 as he continues his recovery from July 14, 2011 "Tommy John" surgery.

DARIC BARTON

- Homered in the fifth inning April 17 at Los Angeles to snap a career-high 76-game homerless streak...it was his first home run since Oct. 1, 2010 against Seattle...the home run also snapped a 72-game homerless streak as a first baseman, which was second longest in Oakland history...the record is 75 by Mike Hegan from July 6, 1971 to Aug. 16, 1973.

JERRY BLEVINS

- Had his career-high 10.1-inning scoreless streak dating back to last season snapped April 7 against Seattle when Saunders homered in the sixth inning.

DALLAS BRADEN

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 as he continues his recovery from left shoulder surgery.
- Was transferred to the 60-day disabled list April 22.

YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Made his Major League debut March 28 against Seattle in Tokyo with a start in center field...doubled off Felix Hernandez to lead off the bottom of the seventh inning for his first ML hit.
- Hit his first ML home run in the seventh inning March 29 against Seattle in Tokyo, a two-run shot off Shawn Kelley.
- Homered in three consecutive games from March 29 to April 7...became the third player since 1918 to homer in three of his first four Major League games (Trent Oeltjen, ARI 2009 and Mike Jacobs, NYM 2005)...is the ninth player with at least three home runs in his first four games (Jacobs had 4)...the previous fastest an Oakland Athletic reached three career home runs was seven games by Kurt Abbott in 1993 and Mitchell Page in 1977.
- Had multiple RBI games in each of those contests...since 1918, he is the first Athletic and ninth Major Leaguer with three multiple RBI games over his first four career games (last: Wladimir Balentien, 2006-07).
- Struck out at least once in each of his first eight games, which is an Oakland record to start a career...the previous mark was six (Chris Carter, 2010; Brooks Conrad, 2008; Travis Buck, 2007)...matched the longest streak by an Athletic since 1918 (Troy Herriage, 1956; Norm Bass, 1961).
- Hit his fourth home run April 18 at Los Angeles in his 12th game...since 1918, that is the fastest a player has reached four career home runs in Athletics history...the previous best was by Brian Leshner, who did it in 14 games in 1996.
- Did not have a putout a April 25 against Chicago, becoming the first A's outfielder without a putout in a game of 14 or more innings since Stan Javier on May 30, 1988 against New York.

BARTOLO COLÓN

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and is in his 15th season in the majors.
- Made each of his first three starts against Seattle to become the first pitcher in Oakland history to make three consecutive starts against one team in the same season without missing a turn in the rotation.

RYAN COOK

- Became the third pitcher in Athletics franchise history to record four strikeouts in an inning April 27 at Baltimore (Blake Stein, 1998; Erik Hiljus, 2001).

COCO CRISP

- Was the A's 13th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 13 years...had 203 career starts in left entering the season, but none since October 2, 2005.
- Committed his first error since April 25, 2011 on April 7 against Seattle, snapping a 116-game errorless streak...that streak was seventh longest by an outfielder in Oakland history.

FAUTINO DE LOS SANTOS

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and compiled a 3.00 ERA in six relief appearances before he was optioned to Sacramento, April 25.
- Did not retire a batter over his final three outings before his option (5 h, 2 r, 1 er, 2 bb).

JOEY DEVINE

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 retroactive to March 24...underwent "Tommy John" surgery on his right elbow April 10... Dr. James Andrews performed the surgery in Pensacola, Fla., which included an ulnar collateral ligament reconstruction, an ulnar nerve transposition and a debridement of the flexor tendon...also had "Tommy John" surgery on the same elbow April 21, 2009.

JOSH DONALDSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster but hit just .094 in nine games before he was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento April 23.
- Made nine starts, all at third base...his Major League experience prior to this season included seven games at catcher and two at first base.

BRIAN FUENTES

- Recorded his 200th career save May 2 at Boston to become the sixth left-handed reliever in Major League history to reach the 200 plateau (Franco, Wagner, Myers, Righetti, Lyle).

GRAHAM GODFREY

- Godfrey was on the A's Opening Day roster and went 0-3 with a 5.06 ERA in three starts before he was optioned to Sacramento April 21.

JONNY GOMES

- Was hit by a Jonathan Braxton pitch with the bases loaded in the bottom of the 12th inning April 11 against Kansas City to force in the winning run in the A's 5-4 victory...it was his second career walk-off hit by pitch (August 21, 2011 vs. Philadelphia)...it was his fifth career walk-off RBI (two home runs, one walk)...it was the third walk-off hit by pitch in Oakland history (Mike Bordick, August 4, 1993 vs. Seattle and Olmedo Saenz, July 20, 2002 vs. Texas).
- Singled in the eighth inning April 19 at Los Angeles after homering for each of his first three hits for the season...is the first player in Oakland history whose first three hits in a season were all home runs.

LUKE HUGHES

- Was claimed off waivers from Minnesota April 22 and went 1 for 13 (.077) in four games with the A's before he was designated for assignment April 30...cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento May 2.

BRANDON INGE

- Agreed to terms with the A's on a one-year contract April 30 after he was released by Detroit April 26.

- Had the game-ending grand slam in the bottom of the ninth inning May 8 against Toronto...it was his seventh career “walk-off” home run and his 10th “walk-off plate appearance (two singles, one sacrifice fly)...it was the sixth “walk-off” grand slam in Oakland history (Tenace, 1973; Armas, 1980; McGwire, 1990 and 1995; Ellis, 2008).
- Had 17 RBI in his first 10 games with the A’s...those are the most in Oakland history by a player in his first 10 games with the A’s...the previous best was 15 by Mitchell Page (1977) and Jack Cust (2007).

KILA KA’AIHUE

- Matched his career high with three hits April 15 at Seattle (third time, last: Sept. 28, 2010 vs. Minnesota).
- Had the game-winning RBI single in the 14th inning April 25 against Chicago, his second career walk-off hit (home run, April 1, 2011 vs. Los Angeles-AL).

BRANDON MCCARTHY

- Made his first career Opening Day start March 28 against Seattle and had a no decision in the A’s 3-1, 11-inning loss...allowed just one run on six hits and no walks in 7.0 innings.
- Also started the third game of the season, April 6 against Seattle, to become the second pitcher in Oakland history to start two of the A’s first three games...the other is Joe Blanton who did it in 2008, the other time the A’s opened the season in Japan...also started three of the first seven games, joining Blanton as the only Oakland pitchers to do that since 1977.

JIM MILLER

- Picked up his first Major League win April 25 against Chicago...allowed two inherited runners to score in the top of the 14th inning but the A’s came back with three in the bottom of the inning.

TOMMY MILONE

- Combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A’s debut...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit).

JORDAN NORBERTO

- Retired the final two batters May 1 at Boston for his first Major League save...he saved Jarrod Parker’s first ML win, marking the first time A’s pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren’s victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.

JOSH REDDICK

- Was the A’s fifth different Opening Day starter in right field in the last five years.

ADAM ROSALES

- Was on the A’s Opening Day roster and appeared in one game against Seattle in Japan before he was optioned to Sacramento April 2.

SCOTT SIZEMORE

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 3 after tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee in the team’s first full-squad workout Feb. 27 in Phoenix...underwent successful reconstructive surgery March 21...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg of the Arizona Sports Medicine Center of Scottsdale...will miss the entire 2012 season.

SETH SMITH

- Was the A’s eight different Opening Day starter at designated hitter in the last eight years.

- Hit his first home run of the season April 22 against Cleveland, a two-run shot off Masterson in the fourth inning, to snap a career-high 45-game homerless streak...his previous high was 35 (June 22-July 31, 2011)...it was his first home run since Aug. 23, 2011 against Houston.
- Went 0 for 4 with four strikeouts April 30 at Boston, the first four-strikeout game of his career.

ERIC SOGARD

- Had a career-high three RBI, April 15 at Seattle.

KURT SUZUKI

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at catcher...the five starts are second most by a catcher in Oakland history...only Terry Steinbach, with nine, has more.
- Made his 598th career appearance at catcher April 7 against Seattle, which moves him past Ossee Schreckengost for fifth most in Athletics history.
- Had five assists April 25 against Chicago, the third time in Oakland history a catcher had five or more assists in a game (6, Jim Essian vs. Texas on Sept. 19, 1979; 5, Jeff Newman vs. Toronto on Aug. 13, 1979).

RICH THOMPSON

- Was claimed off waivers from the Los Angeles Angels April 20 and appeared in one game for the A's before he was designated for assignment April 25...faced Chicago on April 23 (0.2 ip, 1 h).
- Cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento April 27.

NEIL WAGNER

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 17 but did not appear in a game before he was optioned back to Sacramento April 20.

JEMILE WEEKS

- Played in the 100th game of his career April 6 against Seattle and collected 126 hits over that span...since 1918, the only player in Athletics history with more hits over the first 100 games of his career is Wally Moses, who had 134 hits in his first 100 games with the Philadelphia A's in 1935-36...the previous Oakland record was 122 by Ben Grieve.
