ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have lost two straight, four of the last five and seven of the last 11 games to fall under .500 for the first time since May 4 (13-14)...have dropped the first two games of this series and have lost a series for the first time since losing two of three at Baltimore April 27-29...had gone 2-0-4 over the previous six series...have not been swept in a series of three or more games since August 12-14 of last year against Texas...are 16-14 over the last 30 games after starting the season 4-7...are 20-21 after 41 games, marking the third consecutive season they have been within one game of .500 after 41 games (21-20 last year, 20-21 in 2010)...remain in second place in the American League West for the 19th consecutive day and trail first place Texas by five games...have spent one day tied for first this year, 24 days in second, eight days tied for second, six days in third and seven days in fourth...are 8-5 in games started by a left-handed pitcher, which is the second best record in the AL (Baltimore, 6-3)...are 12-16 against right-handers.

SHUTOUT: The A's were shutout for the second time in the last five games yesterday...have now been blanked six times for the season, which is second most in the majors to the Angels (8)...have scored just 144 runs for the season, which is the fewest in the American League and third fewest in the majors...the pitching staff has tossed five shutouts, which is tied with the Angels for the **most in the majors**.

OFFENSE: The A's were held to one hit yesterday for the second time this year (April 10 vs. Kansas City) and are now batting .184 (41 for 223) with 18 runs scored over the last seven games...rank last in the majors in batting (.215) and second to last in slugging (.343) and on-base percentage (.290)...are last in the American League in batting with runners in scoring position (.220)...have struck out exactly 11 times in five of the last eight games and have fanned 108 times over the last 11 games...rank second in the AL with 333 strikeouts for the season...have grounded into the fewest double plays in the AL (21).

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: The A's have lost the first two interleague game of 2012...resume play against the National League with a six-game road trip to Arizona (June 8-10) and Colorado (June 12-14) before returning home to face San Diego (June 15-17), Los Angeles (June 19-21) and San Francisco (June 22-24)...went 8-10 in interleague play last year, their third consecutive season with a losing record against the NL...it was just the fifth time in 15 interleague seasons the A's finished with a losing interleague record...are 21-35 (.375) over the last four years (since 2009), which is the second worst mark in the majors (Houston, 14-33), but are 144-124 (.537) all-time, which is the seventh best record.

PITCHERS HITTING: A's pitchers are 0 for 3 with two strikeouts this year are now 0 for their last 24 dating back to a Ben Sheets single June 19, 2010 at St. Louis...have a .085 (23 for 270) average with four doubles, seven RBI, eight walks and 119 strikeouts since interleague play began in 1997...the batting average is the lowest by an AL team over that span (Toronto, .093)...the last triple by an A's pitcher was by John Odom on August 22, 1971 against Boston...Odom also hit the last home run on September 4, 1972 against California.

ON THE BASES: The A's have gone a season-high four consecutive games without a stolen base...however, **lead the American League** and rank second in the majors with 38 stolen bases (Miami, 45)...have five double steals, which is two more than the season total from last year...10 of the A's steals have been of third base, which is the most in the majors...have a stolen base percentage of 82.6% (8 cs), which is second best in the majors (Philadelphia, 85.0%)...Jemile Weeks was caught stealing in the first inning Thursday at Texas, ending the A's streak of 20 consecutive successful stolen base attempts...that was the third longest streak in Oakland history and was two short of the record of 22 (Oct. 2, 1991-April 10, 1992 and July 19-Aug. 1, 1983)...A's opponents have been caught stealing 12 times, which is tied for second most in the AL (Kansas City, 18).

PITCHING: The A's have a 3.64 ERA, which ranks fourth in the American League...are tied for the second fewest home runs allowed (34) and have the second fewest strikeouts (238)...A's starting pitchers have a 5.66 ERA (70 er in 111.1 ip) and .297 (135 for 455) opponents batting average over the last 20 games after posting a 2.86 ERA and .242 average over the first 21 contests.

THE LONG BALL: The A's hit their 35th home run of the season Friday in game 40...last year, the A's did not hit their 35th home run until game 64 (number 36 came in game 67)...17 of the A's 35 home runs have come with runners on base (eight two-run, seven three-run, two grand slams)...18 have come with two outs...had just 35 two-out home runs all last year.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 2-4 on this seven-game road trip to Los Angeles (1-1), Texas (1-1) and San Francisco (0-2)...went 5-4 on the last road trip to Baltimore (1-2), Boston (2-1) and Tampa Bay (2-1) and are 11-11 on the road for the season...went 3-3 on the last homestand against Toronto (1-1) and Detroit (2-2) and are 9-10 at home for the season...begin a six-game homestand with Los Angeles (three games) and New York (three games) tomorrow.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's improved to 4-1 in extra inning games with the win Thursday...rank second in the American League in extra inning wins and third in extra inning games...had a 15-28 record in extra innings over the previous three years...are 5-2 in one-run games, which is the fourth best record in the AL...are 11-6 in games decided by two runs or fewer and 9-15 in all other games...are 7-3 in games decided in the seventh inning or later, including 6-2 in the last at bat...the six last at bat wins are tied for second most in the AL (Baltimore, 9)...have three "walk-off" wins this year, matching their season total from last year...all three of those wins came after the visiting team scored at least one run in the top of the final inning.

PLAYERS USED: Friday night, Travis Blackley became the 36th different player to appear in a game for the A's this year, which is second most in the AL to Boston (38)...he is the fourth Australian (Balfour, Hughes, Thompson)...the A's were already the first team in Major League history with three Australian born players...12 of the 36 are rookies, which is the most in the majors...used a total of 14 rookies all last year...currently have eight rookies on the roster (Cook, Cowgill, Donaldson, Figueroa, Miller, Milone, Parker, Recker).

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list nine times and currently have eight players on the DL (Anderson, Braden, Céspedes, Crisp, Devine, Inge, McCarthy, Sizemore)...Devine ("Tommy John" surgery) and Sizemore (torn ACL) will miss the entire season...the A's used the DL 15 times last year, which was the fewest since 2006 when they also used it 15 times...used the DL a total of 87 times from 2007-10...have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had just one.

A's vs. GIANTS

The A's have lost the first two meetings of 2012 after splitting the season series last year, 3-3...each team won all three games in its home ballpark for the second consecutive season...the A's now have an 11-game losing streak at AT&T Park, which is tied for the second longest losing streak at a road ballpark in Oakland history (see chart below)...it is one short of the record...have a six-game winning streak in the Coliseum...in the previous 15 season series, the A's have won four, the Giants two and the clubs have split the season series nine times...the A's are 45-43 all-time against the Giants during interleague play...that breaks down to 26-17 in Oakland and 19-26 in San Francisco...including 15-23 at AT&T Park.

In 1977 Wayne Gross has five RBI and Earl Williams drives in four as the A's defeat Seattle 14-5...in 2005 Keith Ginter has one hit in one official at bat but drives in five runs on a three-run home run and two sacrifice flies in an 8-4 win at San Francisco...in 2011 Mark Ellis singles in the second inning off San Francisco's Ryan Vogelsong for his 1000th career hit to become the 12th player in Oakland history to collect 1000 hits.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 10th start of the season...the A's are 4-5 (.444) in his starting assignments and his teams are 201-159 (.558) in his career...has tossed seven or more innings in five of his nine starts and allowed two runs or fewer five times.

THREE-GAME LOSING STREAK: Is 0-3 with a 5.52 ERA (18 er in 29.1 ip) and .341 (43 for 126) opponents batting average over his last five starts...went 3-1 with a 2.63 ERA and .194 opponents average over his first four starts.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Ranks second in the American League in most hits allowed (63), tied for second in starts (9) and tied for seventh in losses (4)...is averaging 13.9 pitches per inning, which is second fewest (Alvarez, TOR 13.8)...has the fifth lowest run support average (3.34).

BASES ON BALLS: Has walked one batter or fewer in seven of his nine starts and has issued just eight free passes for the season...is averaging 1.27 walks per nine innings, which is second lowest in the American League...has issued all eight of his walks to left-handed hitters.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 2-1 with a 2.31 ERA (9 er in 35.0 ip) in five starts on the road compared to 1-3 with a 7.06 ERA (17 er in 21.2 ip) in four starts at home...his road ERA is seventh lowest in the American League and his home ERA is fourth highest...over the last two years, he is 6-6 with a 3.13 ERA (44 er in 126.1 ip) in 21 games on the road compared to 5-8 with a 5.23 ERA (55 er in 94.2 ip) in 17 games in his home ballparks.

THE LONG BALL: Has allowed eight home runs...however, all of his home runs have been solo shots as have 35 of his 42 over his last three seasons...six have been hit by left-handed hitters as have 31 of his 42 over his last three years...six have been hit by a batter leading off an inning.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has held the opposition to a .192 (15 for 78) batting average the first time through the lineup...however, they are batting .364 (28 for 77) the second time through the lineup and .278 (20 for 72) after that...has allowed a .344 (11 for 32) average with runners in scoring position...has yielded a combined .176 (9 for 51) batting average to the opponents four and five hitters but the number three hitter is batting .500 (13 for 26), which is tied for the highest in the American League.

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: Is 16-12 with a 3.94 ERA (102 er in 233.0 ip) in 36 career interleague appearances, all starts...made one start against the National League last year with the Yankees, a win in a 5-2 victory at the Mets July 2 (6.0 ip, 5 h, 6 so).

WITH THE BAT: Is a .116 (10 for 86) career hitter with five RBI, no walks, 50 strikeouts and six sacrifice hits...struck out in his only at bat last year and is 0 for his last 7...his last hit was on June 10, 2005 at New York (NL) while pitching for the Angels.

ACTIVE LEADERS: Ranks sixth among active pitchers in complete games (32), tied for seventh in shutouts (9), tied for ninth in wins (164) and 10th in strikeouts (1773).

DOMINICAN LEADERS: His 164 wins are third most among Dominican-born pitchers behind Juan Marichal (243) and Pedro Martinez (219)...also ranks third among Dominicans in games started (360), innings pitched (2297.2) and strikeouts (1773).

38 YEARS OLD: His first start on March 29 against Seattle came at the age of 38 years, 310 days, making him the oldest pitcher to start a game for the A's since Tom Candiotti, who was 41 years, 275 days when he made his last start for Oakland on June 2, 1999...over the previous four seasons, the only Oakland pitcher 33 years or older to start a game was Brett Tomko, who made six starts in 2009 at the age of 36...Colón will turn 39 on May 24...only four pitchers in Oakland history have started a game at age 39 or older (Tommy John 42, Candiotti 41, Don Sutton 40, Jim Perry 39).

2012 START-BY-START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 4-1 victory over Seattle in Tokyo **March 29**...retired each of the first 13 batters before Montero singled with one out in the fifth inning...shutout the Mariners on two hits and a walk over the first six innings before Smoak homered to lead off the seventh inning...was the losing pitcher in the A's 8-7 loss to Seattle **April 7** in Oakland...yielded seven earned runs, which were his most since July 6, 2007 at New York (AL)...combined with Cook and Balfour on a three-hit shutout in the A's 4-0 win at Seattle **April 13**...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed all three hits while walking one...the start was his third consecutive start against Seattle...is the first pitcher in Oakland history to make three consecutive starts against one team in the same season without missing a turn in the rotation...combined with De Los Santos on a four-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win at Los Angeles **April 18**...tossed eight innings and allowed all four of the hits...threw 38 consecutive strikes at one point, the longest such streak since pitch count data is first available in 1988...the previous best was 30 by Tim Wakefield in 1998...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-0 loss to Chicago **April 23** in Oakland...blanked the White Sox on three walks over the first three innings to extend his scoreless streak to 18.1 innings...had a no decision in the A's 5-2 loss to Baltimore **April 29**...shutout the Orioles on five hits and a walk over the first eight innings and took a 2-0 lead into the ninth...left with runners on second and third and one out but Balfour blew the save and took the loss...had his second consecutive no decision in the A's 4-3, 12-inning win at Tampa Bay **May 5**...had a 3-1 lead but allowed a leadoff home run to Zobrist in the fourth and a leadoff home run to Pena in the fifth...was the losing pitcher in the A's 10-6 loss to Detroit **May 10** in Oakland...allowed eight runs in 2.1 innings...did not strikeout a batter for just the seventh time in his 359 career starts.

LAST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-0 loss at Los Angeles last Tuesday...allowed two runs in the third inning on a Callaspo RBI double and a Pujols RBI single...Pujols added a RBI single in the fifth and Trout homered to lead off the seventh inning...Santana, Downs and Frieri combined to shutout the A's on five hits and three walks.

COLÓN vs. SAN FRANCISCO: Is 1-1 with a 5.65 ERA (14.1 ip, 12 h, 9 r, 9 er, 5 bb, 11 so, 2 hr) in two career starts...the last came on June 12, 3003 at Chicago while pitching for the White Sox...was the losing pitcher in an 8-4 decision...allowed single runs in the third and fifth innings and took a 4-2 lead into the ninth...the Giants scored six runs, including a two-run home run by Bonds to tie the game...was relieved by Marte with the bases load and he yielded a pinch hit grand slam to Aurilia...the win came on August 24, 2002 in a 7-2 Montreal win at San Francisco...blanked the Giants on three walks and three hits over the first five innings...had a 4-0 lead when he allowed two runs in the sixth, including a RBI triple by Sanders.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

LHP Tommy Milone (5-3, 4.09 ERA): Is scheduled to make his ninth start of the season...is tied for the lead among American League rookies in games started (8), ranks second in innings pitched (50.2), tied for second in wins (5) and fifth in strikeouts (29)...the wins are tied for sixth among all AL pitchers ...went 3-1 with a 2.00 ERA and .185 opponents batting average over his first four starts and yielded just one home run in 27.0 innings...is 2-2 with a 6.46 ERA and .284 opponents average over his last four starts and has allowed five home runs in 23.2 innings...was the losing pitcher in his last start, a 4-1 loss at Texas last Wednesday (7.0 ip, 9 h, 4 r, 4 er, 1 bb, 4 so)...was the winning pitcher in his only career start against the Angels, a 4-2 A's win at Los Angeles earlier this year on April 19 (5.0 ip, 7 h, 2 r, 2 er, 1 bb, 3 so).

ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

The A's bullpen has a 2.04 ERA (12 er in 53.0 ip) and .190 (34 for 179) opponents batting average over the last 15 games...ranks second in the American League in opponents batting average (.211) and fourth in ERA (2.68) and opponents slugging percentage (.346)...has allowed just two home runs in the last 17 games (both May 9 vs. Toronto) and has surrendered 10 for the season, which is third fewest in the AL...ranks first among AL bullpens in opponents grounded into double plays (16) and tied for fourth in saves (11)...has issued the third most walks (58) and is tied for the second fewest strikeouts (95).

- Is 1-1 with two saves, two blown saves and a 9.00 ERA (9 er in 9.0 ip) over his last 11 games after yielding just one run over his first 10 contests (0.82 ERA).
- Is tied for second in the American League in games pitched (21)...is also tied for ninth in saves (7) and tied for fourth in blown saves (2).
- Is 4-0 with a save and a 1.40 ERA (6 er in 38.2 ip) in 33 career interleague appearances...has 50 strikeouts in 38.2 innings (11.6 per nine innings).
- Has allowed a .233 opponents batting average...that includes .190 (8 for 42) against left-handers and .290 (9 for 31) against right-handers.
- First batters faced are 7 for 18 (.389) with three walks (.476 on-base percentage).
- Has a 1.54 ERA (2 er in 11.2 ip) in 11 appearances at home and an 8.64 ERA (8 er in 8.1 ip) in 10 outings on the road.
- Has a 10.13 ERA (5.1 ip, 7 h, 6 r, 6 er, 2 bb, 7 so, 1 hr) in six career appearances against the Giants.
- Recorded the 17th save of his career May 5, tying Graeme Lloyd for the most in Major League history by an Australian-born pitcher.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his ninth start of the season...the A's are 5-3 (.625) in his starting assignments this year and his teams are 10-3 (.769) in his career...has tossed at least six innings in five of his eight starts, allowed two runs or fewer four times and walked two batters or fewer six times.

FIRST FOUR, LAST FOUR: Went 3-1 with a 2.00 ERA and .185 opponents batting average over his first four starts and yielded just one home run in 27.0 innings...is 2-2 with a 6.46 ERA (17 er in 23.2 ip) and .284 (27 for 95) opponents average over his last four starts and has allowed five home runs in 23.2 innings.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 3-0 with a 0.39 ERA (1 er in 23.0 ip) and .147 (11 for 75) opponents batting average at home compared to 2-3 with a 7.16 ERA (22 er in 27.2 ip) and .295 (33 for 112) opponents average in five starts on the road...has allowed all six of his home runs on the road...has the lowest home ERA in the Major Leagues and the second highest road ERA in the American League (**Masterson, CLE 9.00**).

AMONG THE LEADERS: Is tied for the lead among American League rookies in games started (8), ranks second in wins (5), third in innings pitched (50.2) and fifth in strikeouts (29)...the wins are tied for fifth among all AL pitchers.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .195 (24 for 123) batting average with the bases empty but opponents are hitting .313 (20 for 64) with runners on base, including .333 (12 for 36) with runners in scoring position...four of the six home runs he has allowed have been solo shots.

FIRST START: He combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed a career-high 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...all three hits were doubles but no one advanced past second base...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit).

SECOND START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-0 loss at Seattle April 14...faced just one batter over the minimum over the first five innings but that was a solo home run by Montero in the second inning...then allowed three runs in the sixth on a bases loaded walk by Smoak and a two-run double by Montero...Noesi and League combined to shutout the A's on five hits.

THIRD START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 4-2 win at Los Angeles April 19...blanked the Angels on two hits over the first three innings before allowing his only two runs in the fourth...Pujols doubled and scored on a Wells double...Wells scored on a Trumbo single...left after five innings with a 4-2 lead.

FOURTH START: He combined with Grant Balfour on a four-hit, 2-0 shutout of Chicago April 24 in Oakland...tossed a career-high tying 8.0 innings and allowed three of the hits...did not allow a hit until Ramirez singled to lead off the fifth...did not allow a runner past first base and faced just two batters over the minimum as he was aided by two double plays and a caught stealing...according to the Elias Sports Bureau he is just the second Oakland rookie over the last 75 years to have two wins while pitching at least eight scoreless innings and allowing three or fewer hits in a season (Vida Blue, 1970).

FIFTH START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 11-6 loss at Boston April 30...allowed a career-high eight runs on eight hits, including a career-high three home runs...allowed four runs in the second inning, including a lead-off home run to Ortiz and RBI singles by Byrd and Aviles...McDonald hit a two-run home run in the third and Ortiz added a solo shot in the fifth.

SIXTH START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 9-5 win at Tampa Bay May 6...allowed five runs in five innings and walked a career-high four batters...allowed four runs in the first inning...walked the first three batters he faced...Keppinger followed with a sacrifice fly and after hitting Scott to reload the bases, he allowed a RBI single to Rodriguez and a two-run single to Joyce...the A's then scored five times in the third and three more times in the fifth to take an 8-4 lead...also allowed an Upton solo home run in the fifth.

SEVENTH START: He won his second consecutive start in the A's 11-4 win over Detroit May 11 in Oakland...struck out a career-high six batters in 7.0 innings...allowed a run to score in the first inning when Jackson led off with a double and later scored on a double play...the A's came back with two in the bottom of the inning before he allowed an unearned run in the third on a Cabrera RBI double...retired each of the final 10 batters he faced.

BRANDON ALLEN

- Was the A's Opening Day starter at first base March 28 but went for 7 with five strikeouts in three games before he was designated for assignment April 9...was claimed off waivers by the Tampa Bay Rays April 19.

BRETT ANDERSON

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 13 as he continues his recovery from July 14, 2011 "Tommy John" surgery.

DARIC BARTON

- Homered in the fifth inning April 17 at Los Angeles to snap a career-high 76-game homerless streak...it was his first home run since Oct. 1, 2010 against Seattle...the home run also snapped a 72-game homerless streak as a first baseman, which was second longest in Oakland history...the record is 75 by Mike Hegan from July 6, 1971 to Aug. 16, 1973.

JERRY BLEVINS

- Had his career-high 10.1-inning scoreless streak dating back to last season snapped April 7 against Seattle when Saunders homered in the sixth inning.

DALLAS BRADEN

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 as he continues his recovery from left shoulder surgery.
- Was transferred to the 60-day disabled list April 22.

YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Made his Major League debut March 28 against Seattle in Tokyo with a start in center field...doubled off Felix Hernandez to lead off the bottom of the seventh inning for his first ML hit.
- Hit his first ML home run in the seventh inning March 29 against Seattle in Tokyo, a two-run shot off Shawn Kelley.
- Homered in three consecutive games from March 29 to April 7...became the third player since 1918 to homer in three of his first four Major League games (Trent Oeltjen, ARI 2009 and Mike Jacobs, NYM 2005)...is the ninth player with at least three home runs in his first four games (Jacobs had 4)...the previous fastest an Oakland Athletic reached three career home runs was seven games by Kurt Abbott in 1993 and Mitchell Page in 1977.
- Had multiple RBI games in each of those contests...since 1918, he is the first Athletic and ninth Major Leaguer with three multiple RBI games over his first four career games (last: Wladimir Balentien, 2006-07).
- Struck out at least once in each of his first eight games, which is an Oakland record to start a career...the previous mark was six (Chris Carter, 2010; Brooks Conrad, 2008; Travis Buck, 2007)...matched the longest streak by an Athletic since 1918 (Troy Herriage, 1956; Norm Bass, 1961).
- Hit his fourth home run April 18 at Los Angeles in his 12th game...since 1918, that is the fastest a player has reached four career home runs in Athletics history...the previous best was by Brian Leshner, who did it in 14 games in 1996.
- Did not have a putout a April 25 against Chicago, becoming the first A's outfielder without a putout in a game of 14 or more innings since Stan Javier on May 30, 1988 against New York.

BARTOLO COLÓN

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and is in his 15th season in the majors.
- Made each of his first three starts against Seattle to become the first pitcher in Oakland history to make three consecutive starts against one team in the same season without missing a turn in the rotation.

RYAN COOK

- Became the third pitcher in Athletics franchise history to record four strikeouts in an inning April 27 at Baltimore (Blake Stein, 1998; Erik Hiljus, 2001).

COCO CRISP

- Was the A's 13th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 13 years...had 203 career starts in left entering the season, but none since October 2, 2005.
- Committed his first error since April 25, 2011 on April 7 against Seattle, snapping a 116-game error-less streak...that streak was seventh longest by an outfielder in Oakland history.

FAUTINO DE LOS SANTOS

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and compiled a 3.00 ERA in six relief appearances before he was optioned to Sacramento, April 25.
- Did not retire a batter over his final three outings before his option (5 h, 2 r, 1 er, 2 bb).

JOEY DEVINE

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 retroactive to March 24...underwent "Tommy John" surgery on his right elbow April 10... Dr. James Andrews performed the surgery in Pensacola, Fla., which included an ulnar collateral ligament reconstruction, an ulnar nerve transposition and a debridement of the flexor tendon...also had "Tommy John" surgery on the same elbow April 21, 2009.

JOSH DONALDSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster but hit just .094 in nine games before he was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento April 23.
- Made nine starts, all at third base...his Major League experience prior to this season included seven games at catcher and two at first base.

BRIAN FUENTES

- Recorded his 200th career save May 2 at Boston to become the sixth left-handed reliever in Major League history to reach the 200 plateau (Franco, Wagner, Myers, Righetti, Lyle).

GRAHAM GODFREY

- Godfrey was on the A's Opening Day roster and went 0-3 with a 5.06 ERA in three starts before he was optioned to Sacramento April 21.

JONNY GOMES

- Was hit by a Jonathan Braxton pitch with the bases loaded in the bottom of the 12th inning April 11 against Kansas City to force in the winning run in the A's 5-4 victory...it was his second career walk-off hit by pitch (August 21, 2011 vs. Philadelphia)...it was his fifth career walk-off RBI (two home runs, one walk)...it was the third walk-off hit by pitch in Oakland history (Mike Bordick, August 4, 1993 vs. Seattle and Olmedo Saenz, July 20, 2002 vs. Texas).
- Singled in the eighth inning April 19 at Los Angeles after homering for each of his first three hits for the season...is the first player in Oakland history whose first three hits in a season were all home runs.

LUKE HUGHES

- Was claimed off waivers from Minnesota April 22 and went 1 for 13 (.077) in four games with the A's before he was designated for assignment April 30...cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento May 2.

BRANDON INGE

- Agreed to terms with the A's on a one-year contract April 30 after he was released by Detroit April 26.

- Had four four-RBI game over a five-game span from May 6 to 11...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the second player in Major League history with four games of four or more RBI over a five-game stretch...the other is Lou Gehrig in 1931...now has 14 career games with four or more RBI...drove in 16 runs over that five-game stretch...since 1970, the only other Athletic to drive in 16 runs over a five-game span is Damian Miller (June 6-11, 2004).
- Had the game-ending grand slam in the bottom of the ninth inning May 8 against Toronto...it was his seventh career "walk-off" home run and his 10th "walk-off plate appearance (two singles, one sacrifice fly)...it was the sixth "walk-off" grand slam in Oakland history (Tenace, 1973; Armas, 1980; McGwire, 1990 and 1995; Ellis, 2008).
- Added another grand slam May 10 against Detroit...is just the second player in Athletics history to hit two grand slams over a three-game span...the other is Jimmie Foxx (September 22 and 24, 1932)...now has seven career grand slams.
- Had 17 RBI in his first 10 games with the A's...those are the most in Oakland history by a player in his first 10 games with the A's...the previous best was 15 by Mitchell Page (1977) and Jack Cust (2007).

KILA KA'AIHUE

- Matched his career high with three hits April 15 at Seattle (third time, last: Sept. 28, 2010 vs. Minnesota).
- Had the game-winning RBI single in the 14th inning April 25 against Chicago, his second career walk-off hit (home run, April 1, 2011 vs. Los Angeles-AL).

BRANDON MCCARTHY

- Made his first career Opening Day start March 28 against Seattle and had a no decision in the A's 3-1, 11-inning loss...allowed just one run on six hits and no walks in 7.0 innings.
- Also started the third game of the season, April 6 against Seattle, to become the second pitcher in Oakland history to start two of the A's first three games...the other is Joe Blanton who did it in 2008, the other time the A's opened the season in Japan...also started three of the first seven games, joining Blanton as the only Oakland pitchers to do that since 1977.

JIM MILLER

- Picked up his first Major League win April 25 against Chicago...allowed two inherited runners to score in the top of the 14th inning but the A's came back with three in the bottom of the inning.

TOMMY MILONE

- Combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit).

JORDAN NORBERTO

- Retired the final two batters May 1 at Boston for his first Major League save...he saved Jarrod Parker's first ML win, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.

JOSH REDDICK

- Was the A's fifth different Opening Day starter in right field in the last five years.
- Had career highs May 11 against Detroit with four runs, four hits (tied), two home runs and five RBI...is the eighth player in Oakland history with at least four runs, four hits, two home runs and five RBI in a game...the last was Matt Holliday (July 20, 2009 vs. Minnesota).

ADAM ROSALES

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and appeared in one game against Seattle in Japan before he was optioned to Sacramento April 2.

SCOTT SIZEMORE

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 3 after tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee in the team's first full-squad workout Feb. 27 in Phoenix...underwent successful reconstructive surgery March 21...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg of the Arizona Sports Medicine Center of Scottsdale...will miss the entire 2012 season.

SETH SMITH

- Was the A's eight different Opening Day starter at designated hitter in the last eight years.
- Hit his first home run of the season April 22 against Cleveland, a two-run shot off Masterson in the fourth inning, to snap a career-high 45-game homerless streak...his previous high was 35 (June 22-July 31, 2011)...it was his first home run since Aug. 23, 2011 against Houston.
- Went 0 for 4 with four strikeouts April 30 at Boston, the first four-strikeout game of his career.

ERIC SOGARD

- Had a career-high three RBI, April 15 at Seattle.

KURT SUZUKI

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at catcher...the five starts are second most by a catcher in Oakland history...only Terry Steinbach, with nine, has more.
- Made his 598th career appearance at catcher April 7 against Seattle, which moves him past Ossee Schreckengost for fifth most in Athletics history.
- Had five assists April 25 against Chicago, the third time in Oakland history a catcher had five or more assists in a game (6, Jim Essian vs. Texas on Sept. 19, 1979; 5, Jeff Newman vs. Toronto on Aug. 13, 1979).

RICH THOMPSON

- Was claimed off waivers from the Los Angeles Angels April 20 and appeared in one game for the A's before he was designated for assignment April 25...faced Chicago on April 23 (0.2 ip, 1 h).
- Cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento April 27.

NEIL WAGNER

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 17 but did not appear in a game before he was optioned back to Sacramento April 20.

JEMILE WEEKS

- Played in the 100th game of his career April 6 against Seattle and collected 126 hits over that span...since 1918, the only player in Athletics history with more hits over the first 100 games of his career is Wally Moses, who had 134 hits in his first 100 games with the Philadelphia A's in 1935-36...the previous Oakland record was 122 by Ben Grieve.
