A's vs. ANGELS

The A's lead the season series, 5-3...have been shutout in each of the three losses and have shutout the Angels in two of the five wins...have split the first two games in Oakland and are 4-2 in Anaheim...have won 11 of the last 16 games in the Coliseum ...won the season series last year, 11-8...it was just their second season series win over the previous eight years (went 10-9 in 2007)...are now 76-84 (.475) against the Angels over the past nine seasons (since 2004)...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 381-307 against the Angels...that includes 197-144 in Oakland and 184-163 in Anaheim...all-time, the A's are 430-384 against the Angels.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Ryan Cook has not allowed a run and his 21.2 innings pitched are the most consecutive scoreless innings to start a season by an Athletics pitcher on the Opening Day roster since at least 1918...his 21.2 innings pitched are the most among ML relievers that have not allowed a run.

Coco Crisp has been successful in each of his last 27 stolen base attempts dating back to last year...that is one short of the Oakland record of 28 set by Stan Javier in 1995.

Josh Reddick is tied for sixth in the American League in home runs (11)...had 10 home runs in 143 games entering the season.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In 1901 Nap Lajoie receives the American League's first ever intentional walk with the bases loaded in a game against Chicago...in 1983 it takes 17 innings and 5 hours and 17 minutes, but the A's defeat the Milwaukee Brewers 5-4 on Rickey Henderson's two out single in the 17th...Oakland leads 3-0 entering the ninth before the Brewers score four times...Davey Lopes hits his second home run of the game in the bottom of the ninth to send the game into extra innings.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have lost five of the last eight games and are 6-8 over the last 14 contests...are 22-22 overall, marking the fourth time in the last seven days and the 12th time this year the A's have been exactly .500...are exactly .500 after 44 games for the third consecutive season and fifth time in the last seven years...remain in second place in the American League West for the 22nd consecutive day and trail first place Texas by five games...have spent one day tied for first this year, 27 days in second, eight days tied for second, six days in third and seven days in fourth...lost two of three at San Francisco over the weekend, the A's first series loss since dropping two of three at Baltimore April 27-29...had gone 2-0-4 over the previous six series...are 8-6 in games started by a left-handed pitcher compared to 14-16 against right-handers.

SHUTOUT: The A's were shutout last night for the third time in the last eight games and have scored just 20 runs over that span (2.5 per game)...have been blanked seven times for the season, which is second most in the majors to the Angels (8)...the pitching staff has tossed five shutouts, which is second most in the majors to the Angels (6).

OFFENSE: The A's were held to one hit last night for the second time in the last four games and the third time this year...Cliff Pennington had the A's only hit in two of those three games...this marks the third time in Oakland history the A's have been held to one hit or fewer three times in one season (1979 and 2006)...are now batting .182 (57 for 313) with 26 runs scored over the last 10 games...rank last in the majors in batting (.213), second to last in slugging (.337) and on-base percentage (.289) and have the third fewest runs scored (152)...are last in the American League in batting with runners in scoring position (.219)...have struck out 129 times in the last 14 games (9.2 per game) and have fanned 354 times for the season, which is second most in the AL...have grounded into 24 double plays, which is tied for second fewest in the majors...are averaging 4.01 pitches per plate appearances, which is the most in the majors.

ON THE BASES: The A's **lead the American League** and rank second in the majors with 40 stolen bases...10 of the A's steals have been of third base, which is the most in the majors...have a stolen base percentage of 81.6% (9 cs), which is the best in the AL and third best in the majors...have five double steals, which is two more than the season total from last year...stole two bases Monday, snapping their season-high streak of five consecutive games without a steal...Jemile Weeks was caught stealing in the first inning last Thursday at Texas, ending the A's streak of 20 consecutive successful stolen base attempts...that was the third longest streak in Oakland history and was two short of the record of 22 (Oct. 2, 1991-April 10, 1992 and July 19-Aug. 1, 1983)...A's opponents have been caught stealing 13 times, which is tied for second most in the AL (Kansas City, 18).

PITCHING: The A's have a 3.55 ERA, which ranks third in the American League...have allowed just five home runs in the last 12 games and have surrendered 35 for the season, which is tied for second fewest in the AL...struck out a season-high-tying 12 batters Sunday but have just 261 strikeouts for the season, which is second fewest in the AL...A's starting pitchers have a 5.48 ERA (77 er in 126.1 ip) and .297 (152 for 511) opponents batting average over the last 23 games after posting a 2.86 ERA and .242 average over the first 21 contests.

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: Collin Cowgill had the ninth assist by an A's outfielder last night, which is the most in the American League and tied for second most in the majors (Arizona, 10)...the A's committed two errors last night after going errorless over the previous four games...have made eight errors in the last 18 games after tallying 19 in the first 26 contests.

THE LONG BALL: The A's hit their 36th home run of the season Sunday in game 42...last year, the A's did not hit their 36th home run until game 67 (number 37 came in game 68)...18 of the A's 36 home runs have come with runners on base (nine two-run, seven three-run, two grand slams)...19 have come with two outs, which is tied for fourth in the American League...had just 35 two-out home runs all last year.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's are 6-2 in one-run games, which is the third best record in the American League...the eight one-run games are tied with Boston for the fewest in the AL...went 20-25 in one-run games last year, which was the third worst record...are 12-6 in games decided by two runs or fewer and 10-16 in all other games...are 7-3 in games decided in the seventh inning or later, including 6-2 in the last at bat...the six last at bat wins are tied for second most in the AL (Baltimore, 9)...are 4-1 in extra inning games...rank second in the AL in extra inning wins and third in games and winning percentage (.800)...had a 15-28 record in extra innings over the previous three years...have three "walk-off" wins, matching their season total from last year...all three of those wins came after the visiting team scored at least one run in the top of the final inning.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 1-1 on this six-game homestand against Los Angeles (1-1) and New York (three games)...went 3-3 on the last homestand against Toronto (1-1) and Detroit (2-2) and are 10-11 at home...went 3-4 on the last road trip to Los Angeles (1-1), Texas (1-1) and San Francisco (1-2) and are 12-11 on the road...the A's pitching staff has a 3.01 ERA (66 er in 197.2 ip) at home compared to 4.09 (91 er in 200.1 ip) on the road.

PLAYERS USED: Friday night, Travis Blackley became the 36th different player to appear in a game for the A's this year, which is second most in the American League to Boston (39)...he is the fourth Australian (Grant Balfour, Luke Hughes, Rich Thompson)...the A's were already the first team in Major League history with three Australian born players...12 of the 36 are rookies, which is the most in the majors...used a total of 14 rookies all last year...currently have eight rookies on the roster (Cook, Cowgill, Donaldson, Godfrey, Miller, Milone, Parker, Recker).

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list nine times and currently have seven players on the DL (Anderson, Braden, Céspedes, Devine, Inge, McCarthy, Sizemore)...Devine ("Tommy John" surgery) and Sizemore (torn ACL) will miss the entire season...the A's used the DL 15 times last year, which was the fewest since 2006 when they also used it 15 times...used the DL a total of 87 times from 2007-10...have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had just one.

RUNS ALLOWED: Allowed six runs in 2.0

innings in his last start after allowing six runs total over the first five starts of his career (31.1 ip, 1.72 ERA)...allowed one run or fewer in each of the first three starts of his career from September 27, 2011 to May 1, 2012...tossed at least 5.0 innings in each of those outings to become just the second pitcher since 1990 to begin his career with three consecutive outings of five or more innings and one run or fewer...the other is Rich Harden, who did it for the A's from July 21 to 31, 2003.

BASES ON BALLS: Has walked at least four batters in each of his last three starts (13 bb in 14.2 ip)...has now issued 17 walks while striking out 18 in 33.1 innings for the season (4.59 walks per nine innings).

OPPONENTS BATTING: Opponents are 5 for 28 (.179) with two walks (.233 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...has allowed a .190 (4 for 21) batting average with runners in scoring position, including .125 (1 for 8) with RISP and two outs.

BRIEFLY: Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 25 after going 1-0 with a 2.18 ERA in four starts with the River Cats...replaced Graham Godfrey in the starting rotation.

FIRST START: He had a no decision in his A's debut, a 5-4, 14-inning win over Chicago April 25 in Oakland...shutout the White Sox on five hits and a walks over the first six innings to extend his career-opening scoreless streak to 11.2 innings...had a 2-0 lead when he allowed a RBI double to Fukudome in the seventh inning...Balfour allowed a run in the ninth inning for the blown save.

SECOND START: He earned his first Major League win in the A's 5-3 victory at Boston May 1...had a 5-0 lead when he allowed his only run in the fourth inning...Pedroia led off with single, went to second on wild pitch, third on a ground out and then scored on an Ortiz ground out...Norberto recorded the save, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.

THIRD START: He had a no decision in the A's 7-3 win over Toronto May 8 in Oakland...tossed a career-high seven innings but issued a career-high five walks...allowed his only runs on a two-run home run by Johnson in the third inning, the first home run he allowed in his career.

FOURTH START: He was charged with the first loss of his career in the A's 3-1 loss to Detroit May 13 in Oakland...shutout the Tigers on three hits and two walks over the first four innings before allowing a RBI single to Cabrera in the fifth...the A's tied the game with a run in the bottom of the fifth but he allowed a two-out double Boesch and then walked the bases loaded in the sixth...was relieved by Balfour, who walked in the go-ahead run.

LAST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 8-6 loss at San Francisco last Friday...allowed a career-high six runs in a career-low 2.0 innings...retired the side in order in the first inning but then allowed two runs in the second on a Belt RBI single and an Arias sacrifice fly...did not retire a batter in the third inning, allowing each of the first five batters to reached base...yielded a RBI double to Crawford and was relieved by Blevins after walking Belt with the bases loaded...Blevins allowed two inherited runners to score.

PARKER vs. LOS ANGELES: Is making his first career appearance.

WITH SACRAMENTO: Was 1-0 with a 2.18 ERA in four starts...struck out 21 batters in 20.2 innings...allowed a .275 opponents batting average, including .271 (13 for 48) against right-handed hitter and .281 (9 for 32) against left-handers...surrendered both of his home runs to lefties...opponents were 4 for 29

THIS SPRING: Was 2-1 with a 3.27 ERA in four appearances, three starts, before he was optioned to Sacramento March 19...held the opposition to a .162 batting average (6 for 37) but walked 13 batters and hit one in 11.0 innings...his only relief appearance came in his first outing March 3 against Seattle.

TRADE: Was acquired from the Arizona Diamondbacks with Ryan Cook and Collin Cowgill for Trevor Cahill, Craig Breslow and cash considerations, December 9, 2011.

2011 RECAP: Spent the entire season at Double-A Mobile, earning a promotion to Arizona after the BayBears won the Southern League Championship...was 11-8 with a 3.79 ERA in 26 starts for Mobile...tied for second in the Southern League in wins, ranked third in opponents batting average (.236) and fifth in ERA...was third in the Diamondbacks farm system in wins, fifth in strikeouts (112) and 10th in ERA...had career highs in starts and innings pitched (130.2)...was 1-0 with a 1.50 ERA (12.0 ip, 9 h, 2 r, 2 er, 3 bb, 12 so, 1 hr) in two postseason starts...was selected by the Diamondbacks Sept. 19 and made one regular season start in his Major League debut...faced Los Angeles (NL) Sept. 27 and had a no decision in Arizona's 7-6, 10-inning win...tossed 5.2 shutout innings, yielded just four hits, walked a batter and struck out one...retired the first seven batters he faced, including a strikeout of Jerry Sands with one out in the first inning, his first big league strikeout...left the game with no score...the Dodgers scored five times in the 10th but Arizona came back with six in the bottom of the inning for the win...also made one postseason appearance in the NLDS against Milwaukee, a relief outing in Game 4...entered the game in the sixth inning with the Diamondbacks leading 7-3 and allowed a run on two hits and a walk in 0.1 innings.

MINOR LEAGUE CAREER: Is 29-19 with a 3.41 ERA (139 er in 366.1 ip) in 74 starts over four seasons in the minors...has yielded just 19 home runs, an average of 0.47 per nine innings...was rated as the Diamondbacks' top prospect by *Baseball America* in three consecutive seasons from 2009-11 prior to being listed as number four entering the 2012 season...is listed as the A's top prospect by the magazine for 2012...missed the entire 2010 season following Tommy John surgery Oct. 28, 2009...pitched in the All-Star Futures Game in 2009.

RHP Tyson Ross (2-4, 5.73 ERA): Is scheduled to make his eight start of the season...is 1-2 despite a 2.55 ERA and .258 opponents batting average over his last three starts...went 1-2 with an 8.55 ERA and .365 opponents average over his first four starts...is 1-1 with a 2.92 ERA and .205 opponents batting average in two starts at home compared to 1-3 with a 7.11 ERA and .364 opponents average in five starts on the road...is 1-2 with a 2.95 ERA and .242 opponents batting average in three starts during the day compared to 1-2 with an 8.38 ERA and .376 opponents average in four starts at night...was the losing pitcher in his last start, a 4-0 loss at San Francisco last Saturday (6.0 ip, 7 h, 2 r, 2 er, 4 bb, 4 so)...is 0-0 with a 2.45 ERA (3.2 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 4 bb, 3 so) in two career relief appearances against New York, both in Oakland in 2010.

The A's bullpen has a 1.20 ERA (4 er in 30.0 ip) and .170 (18 for 106) opponents batting average over the last nine games...now has a 2.44 for the season, which ranks third in the American League...ranks second in opponents batting average (.204) and opponents slugging percentage (.327) and third in opponents on-base percentage (.291)...has allowed just two home runs in the last 20 games (both May 9 vs. Toronto) and has surrendered 10 for the season, which is tied for second fewest in the AL...ranks first among AL bullpens in opponents grounded into double plays (16) and tied for fourth in saves (12)...has allowed the third most walks (59) and recorded the fourth fewest strikeouts (106)

- Faced the Angels for the second time in his career last night (8.0 ip, 10 h, 6 r, 4 er, 2 bb, 7 so, 1 hr, 4.50 ERA).
- Posted a 9.00 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in four relief appearances with San Francisco before he was designated for assignment May 13...began the season at Triple-A Fresno and was selected by the Giants May 1.
- Pitched in relief in his first appearance with Fresno but then started and won in each of his next three outings...allowed a .163 opponents batting average, including .153 against right-handers...opponents were 0 for 11 with runners in scoring position...his complete 2012 statistics

AMONG THE LEADERS: Ranks second in the American League in most hits allowed (69), tied for second in starts (10) and tied for seventh in losses (4)...is averaging 14.3 pitches per inning, which is third fewest...has the fifth lowest run support average (3.65).

BASES ON BALLS: Has walked one batter or fewer in seven of his 10 starts and has issued just 10 free passes for the season...is averaging 1.46 walks per nine innings, which is second lowest in the American League...has issued all 10 of his walks to left-handed hitters.

39 YEARS OLD: Celebrated his 39th birthday on Thursday...will become just the fifth pitcher in Oakland history to start a game at age 39 or older...the other five are Tommy John (42 in 1985), Tom Candiotti (41 in 1999), Don Sutton (40 in 1985) and Jim Perry (39 in 1975)...his first start on March 29 against Seattle came at the age of 38 years, 310 days, making him the oldest pitcher to start a game for the A's since Tom Candiotti, who was 41 years, 275 days when he made his last start for Oakland on June 2, 1999...over the previous four seasons, the only Oakland pitcher 33 years or older to start a game was Brett Tomko, who made six starts in 2009 at the age of 36.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 3-1 with a 2.48 ERA (11 er in 40.0 ip) in six starts on the road compared to 1-3 with a 7.06 ERA (17 er in 21.2 ip) in four starts at home...his road ERA is seventh lowest in the American League and his home ERA is fourth highest...over the last two years, he is 7-6 with a 3.15 ERA (46 er in 131.1 ip) in 22 games on the road compared to 5-8 with a 5.23 ERA (55 er in 94.2 ip) in 17 games in his home ballparks.

IN MAY: Is 1-2 with a 7.58 ERA (16 er in 19.0 ip) in four starts in the month of May...the ERA is third highest among American League pitchers with 15.0 or more innings in the month...the highest single month ERA of his career (min. 10.0 ip) in 7.99 in June of 2004.

THE LONG BALL: Has allowed eight home runs...however, all of his home runs have been solo shots as have 35 of his 42 over his last three seasons...six have been hit by left-handed hitters as have 31 of his 42 over his last three years...six have been hit by a batter leading off a inning.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has held the opposition to a .209 (18 for 86) batting average the first time through the lineup...however, they are batting .349 (29 for 83) the second time through the lineup and .278 (22 for 79) after that...has allowed a .306 (11 for 36) average with runners in scoring position...has yielded a combined .182 (10 for 55) batting average to the opponents four and five hitters but the number three hitter is batting .552 (16 for 29), which is tied for the highest in the American League.

ACTIVE LEADERS: Ranks sixth among active pitchers in complete games (32), tied for seventh in shutouts (9), tied for ninth in wins (165) and 10th in strikeouts (1780).

DOMINICAN LEADERS: His 165 wins are third most among Dominican-born pitchers behind Juan Marichal (243) and Pedro Martinez (219)...also ranks third among Dominicans in games started (361), innings pitched (2302.2) and strikeouts (1780).

2012 START-BY-START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 4-1 victory over Seattle in Tokyo March 29...retired each of the first 13 batters before Montero singled with one out in the fifth inning...shutout the Mariners on two hits and a walk over the first six innings before Smoak homered to lead off the seventh inning...was the losing pitcher in the A's 8-7 loss to Seattle *April 7* in Oakland...yielded seven earned runs, which were his most since July 6, 2007 at New York (AL)...combined with Cook and Balfour on a three-hit shutout in the A's 4-0 win at Seattle April 13...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed all three hits while walking one...the start was his third consecutive start against Seattle...is the first pitcher in Oakland history to make three consecutive starts against one team in the same season without missing a turn in the rotation...combined with De Los Santos on a four-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win at Los Angeles April 18...tossed eight innings and allowed all four of the hits...threw 38 consecutive strikes at one point, the longest such streak since pitch count data is first available in 1988...the previous best was 30 by Tim Wakefield in 1998...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-0 loss to Chicago *April* 23 in Oakland...blanked the White Sox on three walks over the first three innings to extend his scoreless streak to 18.1 innings...had a no decision in the A's 5-2 loss at Baltimore April 29...shutout the Orioles on five hits and a walk over the first eight innings and took a 2-0 lead into the ninth...left with runners on second and third and one out but Balfour blew the save and took the loss...had his second consecutive no decision in the A's 4-3, 12-inning win at Tampa Bay May 5...had a 3-1 lead but allowed a leadoff home run to Zobrist in the fourth and a leadoff home run to Pena in the fifth...was the losing pitcher in the A's 10-6 loss to Detroit May 10 in Oakland...allowed eight runs in 2.1 innings...lost his second consecutive start in the A's 4-0 loss at Los Angeles May 15... Santana. Downs and Frieri combined to shutout the A's on five hits and three walks.

LAST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-2 win at San Francisco last Sunday...struck out a season-high seven batters...allowed sacrifice flies to Arias in the second inning and Posey in the third...the A's then scored four times in the fourth inning to take the lead for good.

COLÓN vs. NEW YORK: Is 4-5 with a 6.07 ERA (69.2 ip, 73 h, 53 r, 47 er, 34 bb, 64 so, 18 hr) in 13 career appearances, 12 starts...the ERA is his highest against any American League team...is 2-3 with a 6.75 ERA (27 er in 36.0 ip) in seven games, six starts, in his home ballparks and was 2-2 with a 5.35 ERA (20 er in 33.2 ip) in six starts in Old Yankee Stadium...pitched for New York last year and went 4-5 with a 4.68 ERA (38 er in 73.0 ip) in 13 games, 11 starts, at Yankee Stadium...has not faced the Yankees since July 6, 2007, a no decision in a 14-9 Angels loss at New York...allowed seven runs in 2.0 innings...allowed a Posada RBI single and an Abreu sacrifice fly in the second...the Angels scored three times in the third but he allowed five of the Yankees six runs in the third inning...after three straight singles to start the inning, he walked Matsui and allowed a two-run double to Posada...was relieved by Oliver who allowed both runs to score plus one of his own.

JERRY BLEVINS

 Had his career-high 10.1-inning scoreless streak dating back to last season snapped April 7 against Seattle when Saunders homered in the sixth inning.

DALLAS BRADEN

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 as he continues his recovery from left shoulder surgery.
- Was transferred to the 60-day disabled list April 22.

ANDREW CARIGNAN

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and posted a 6.23 ERA in five relief appearances before he was
 optioned to Sacramento April 17.
- Recalled for a second time May 11 and allowed two runs in 2.0 innings over two outings before he
 was sent back to Sacramento May 16.

YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Made his Major League debut March 28 against Seattle in Tokyo with a start in center field...
 doubled off Felix Hernandez to lead off the bottom of the seventh inning for his first ML hit.
- Hit his first ML home run in the seventh inning March 29 against Seattle in Tokyo, a two-run shot off Shawn Kelley.
- Homered in three consecutive games from March 29 to April 7...became the third player since 1918 to homer in three of his first four Major League games (Trent Oeltjen, ARI 2009 and Mike Jacobs, NYM 2005)...is the ninth player with at least three home runs in his first four games (Jacobs had 4)...the previous fastest an Oakland Athletic reached three career home runs was seven games by Kurt Abbott in 1993 and Mitchell Page in 1977.
- Had multiple RBI games in each of those contests...since 1918, he is the first Athletic and ninth Major Leaguer with three multiple RBI games over his first four career games (last: Wladimir Balentien, 2006-07).
- Struck out at least once in each of his first eight games, which is an Oakland record to start a career...
 the previous mark was six (Chris Carter, 2010; Brooks Conrad, 2008; Travis Buck, 2007)...matched
 the longest streak by an Athletic since 1918 (Troy Herriage, 1956; Norm Bass, 1961).
- Hit his fourth home run April 18 at Los Angeles in his 12th game...since 1918, that is the fastest
 a player has reached four career home runs in Athletics history...the previous best was by Brian
 Lesher, who did it in 14 games in 1996.
- Did not have a putout a April 25 against Chicago, becoming the first A's outfielder without a putout in a game of 14 or more innings since Stan Javier on May 30, 1988 against New York.

BARTOLO COLÓN

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and is in his 15th season in the majors.
- Made each of his first three starts against Seattle to become the first pitcher in Oakland history to
 make three consecutive starts against one team in the same season without missing a turn in the

RYAN COOK

 Became the third pitcher in Athletics franchise history to record four strikeouts in an inning April 27 at Baltimore (Blake Stein, 1998; Erik Hiljus, 2001).

COCO CRISP

- Was the A's 13th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 13 years...had 203 career starts in left entering the season, but none since October 2, 2005.
- Committed his first error since April 25, 2011 on April 7 against Seattle, snapping a 116-game errorless streak...that streak was seventh longest by an outfielder in Oakland history.

FAUTINO DE LOS SANTOS

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and compiled a 3.00 ERA in six relief appearances before he was
 optioned to Sacramento, April 25.
- Did not retire a batter over his final three outings before his option (5 h, 2 r, 1 er, 2 bb).

JOEY DEVINE

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 retroactive to March 24...underwent "Tommy John" surgery on his right elbow April 10... Dr. James Andrews performed the surgery in Pensacola, Fla., which included an ulnar collateral ligament reconstruction, an ulnar nerve transposition and a debridement of the flexor tendon...also had "Tommy John" surgery on the same elbow April 21, 2009.
- Was transferred to the 60-day DL May 15.

JOSH DONALDSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster but hit just .094 in nine games before he was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento April 23.

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and went 0-3 with a 5.06 ERA in three starts before he was
 optioned to Sacramento April 21.
- Recalled May 22.

JONNY GOMES

- Was hit by a Jonathan Braxton pitch with the bases loaded in the bottom of the 12th inning April 11 against Kansas City to force in the winning run in the A's 5-4 victory...it was his second career walk-off hit by pitch (August 21, 2011 vs. Philadelphia)...it was his fifth career walk-off RBI (two home runs, one walk)...it was the third walk-off hit by pitch in Oakland history (Mike Bordick, August 4, 1993 vs. Seattle and Olmedo Saenz, July 20, 2002 vs. Texas).
- Singled in the eighth inning April 19 at Los Angeles after homering for each of his first three hits
 for the season...is the first player in Oakland history whose first three hits in a season were all home
 runs.

LUKE HUGHES

 Was claimed off waivers from Minnesota April 22 and went 1 for 13 (.077) in four games with the A's before he was designated for assignment April 30...cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento May 2.

BRANDON INGE

- Agreed to terms with the A's on a one-year contract April 30 after he was released by Detroit April 26.
- Had four four-RBI game over a five-game span from May 6 to 11...according to the Elias Sports
 Bureau, he is the second player in Major League history with four games of four or more RBI over
 a five-game stretch...the other is Lou Gehrig in 1931...now has 14 career games with four or more
 RBI...drove in 16 runs over that five-game stretch...since 1970, the only other Athletic to drive in 16
 runs over a five-game span is Damian Miller (June 6-11, 2004).
- Had the game-ending grand slam in the bottom of the ninth inning May 8 against Toronto...it was
 his seventh career "walk-off" home run and his 10th "walk-off plate appearance (two singles, one
 sacrifice fly)...it was the sixth "walk-off" grand slam in Oakland history (Tenace, 1973; Armas,
 1980; McGwire, 1990 and 1995; Ellis, 2008).
- Added another grand slam May 10 against Detroit...is just the second player in Athletics history
 to hit two grand slams over a three-game span...the other is Jimmie Foxx (September 22 and 24,
 1932)...now has seven career grand slams.
- Had 17 RBI in his first 10 games with the A's...those are the most in Oakland history by a player
 in his first 10 games with the A's...the previous best was 15 by Mitchell Page (1977) and Jack Cust
 (2007).

KILA KA'AIHUE

- Matched his career high with three hits April 15 at Seattle (third time, last: Sept. 28, 2010 vs. Minnesota).
- Had the game-winning RBI single in the 14th inning April 25 against Chicago, his second career walk-off hit (home run, April 1, 2011 vs. Los Angeles-AL).

BRANDON MCCARTHY

- Made his first career Opening Day start March 28 against Seattle and had a no decision in the A's 3-1, 11-inning loss...allowed just one run on six hits and no walks in 7.0 innings.
- Also started the third game of the season, April 6 against Seattle, to become the second pitcher in
 Oakland history to start two of the A's first three games...the other is Joe Blanton who did it in 2008,
 the other time the A's opened the season in Japan...also started three of the first seven games, joining
 Blaton as the only Oakland pitchers to do that since 1977.

JIM MILLER

- Picked up his first Major League win April 25 against Chicago...allowed two inherited runners to score in the top of the 14th inning but the A's came back with three in the bottom of the inning.
- Was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento May 11 after posting a 1.93 ERA in six relief appearances with the A's.
- Returned to Oakland May 20.

TOMMY MILONE

• Combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit).

JORDAN NORBERTO

Retired the final two batters May 1 at Boston for his first Major League save...he saved Jarrod
Parker's first ML win, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same
game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.

JOSH REDDICK

- Was the A's fifth different Opening Day starter in right field in the last five years.
- Had career highs May 11 against Detroit with four runs, four hits (tied), two home runs and five RBI...is the eighth player in Oakland history with at least four runs, four hits, two home runs and five RBI in a game...the last was Matt Holliday (July 20, 2009 vs. Minnesota).

ADAM ROSALES

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and appeared in one game against Seattle in Japan before he was
 optioned to Sacramento April 2.
- Returned to Oakland May 17.

SCOTT SIZEMORE

Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 3 after tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in his left
knee in the team's first full-squad workout Feb. 27 in Phoenix...underwent successful reconstructive surgery March 21...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg of the Arizona Sports
Medicine Center of Scottsdale...will miss the entire 2012 season.

SETH SMITH

- Was the A's eight different Opening Day starter at designated hitter in the last eight years.
- Hit his first home run of the season April 22 against Cleveland, a two-run shot off Masterson in the fourth inning, to snap a career-high 45-game homerless streak...his previous high was 35 (June 22-July 31, 2011)...it was his first home run since Aug. 23, 2011 against Houston.
- Went 0 for 4 with four strikeouts April 30 at Boston, the first four-strikeout game of his career.

ERIC SOGARD

- Had a career-high three RBI, April 15 at Seattle.
- Was optioned to Sacramento May 21.

KURT SUZUKI

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at catcher...the five starts are second most by a catcher in Oakland history...only Terry Steinbach, with nine, has more.
- Made his 598th career appearance at catcher April 7 against Seattle, which moves him past Ossee Schreckengost for fifth most in Athletics history.
- Had five assists April 25 against Chicago, the third time in Oakland history a catcher had five or more assists in a game (6, Jim Essian vs. Texas on Sept. 19, 1979; 5, Jeff Newman vs. Toronto on Aug. 13, 1979).

RICH THOMPSON

- Cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento April 27.

NEIL WAGNER

Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 17 but did not appear in a game before he was optioned back to Sacramento April 20.

JEMILE WEEKS

Played in the 100th game of his career April 6 against Seattle and collected 126 hits over that span...
since 1918, the only player in Athletics history with more hits over the first 100 games of his career
is Wally Moses, who had 134 hits in his first 100 games with the Philadelphia A's in 1935-36...the
