ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have a season-high eight-game losing streak and are 3-12 since May 15...are a season-low seven games under .500 at 22-29...remain a season-high tying nine games behind Texas in the American League West for the fourth consecutive day...have been swept in back-to-back series and have now lost each of the last four series after going 2-0-4 over the previous six series...dropped into a tie for last place in the West with the loss on Wednesday, the first time the A's have held at least a share of last place since April 16 when they were all alone in fourth...have spent one day tied for first this year, 30 days in second, eight days tied for second, 10 days in third, two days tied for third and seven days in fourth.

EIGHT-GAME LOSING STREAK: The A's have lost each of their last eight games, which is their fifth losing streak of eight or more games over the last six years...it is the longest since they lost 10 consecutive games last year from May 30 to June 9...have been outscored 37-12 during the current losing streak...those are the fewest runs scored by the A's over an eight-game span since June 23-July 1, 1980 when they also had 12...are batting .172 (43 for 250), including .143 (6 for 39) with runners in scoring position...have committed six errors...the pitching staff has a 4.40 ERA (35 er in 71.2 ip).

SHUTOUT: The A's were shutout on Wednesday for the fifth time in the last 15 games...the five shutouts in the month of May were the A's most in one month since September, 1991 when they were also blanked five times...have been shutout a Major League leading nine times for the season...were shutout 15 times last year and those were the most times the A's were shutout in a season since 1979 (17)...the pitching staff has five shutouts, which is tied for second most in the majors to the Angels (7).

OFFENSE: The A's are batting .185 (99 for 535) with 38 runs scored over the last 17 games (2.24 runs per game)...have scored two runs or fewer 11 times over that stretch...rank last in the majors in batting (.210) and slugging (.332) and second to last in on-base percentage (.288), runs scored (164) and batting with runners in scoring position (.212)...the runs scored are the A's fewest over the first 51 games of the season since 1968 (157)...have grounded into six double plays in the last two games, including a season-high four on Monday, but have just 32 for the season, which is the fewest in the American League...have just five doubles in the last 11 games and 69 for the season, which is the fewest in the majors...lead the majors in pitches per plate appearance (4.00)...have hit 42 home runs in the first 51 games...last year, the A's did not hit their 42nd home run until game 82 on June 30 (also hit number 43 in that game)...22 of the 42 home runs have come with two out...had just 35 two-out home runs all last year.

A's IN MAY: The A's went 11-16 (.407) in the month of May, which was the worst record in the American League...it marked the second consecutive season and sixth time in the last eight years the A's finished May with a losing record...went 10-12 in April and have finished the first two months of the season with a losing record for the second consecutive year and third time in the last four years...hit .210 in May, which was the second lowest mark in the majors...it was also the second lowest single-month batting average in Oakland history (.2099 in April, 1979)...hit a Major League low .211 in April and that is the third lowest single-month average in Oakland history...struck out 230 times in May, which was the second highest single-month total in Oakland history (233 in August, 2008).

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 4.40 ERA (130 er in 266.0 ip) over the last 30 games after posting a 2.68 ERA over the first 21 contests...have allowed at least one home run in each of the last six games (10 total) after surrendering just five home runs over the previous 13 contests...have allowed 45 home runs for the season, which is tied for third fewest in the American League...have the second fewest strikeouts (304)...A's starting pitchers have a 5.24 ERA (97 er in 166.1 ip) and .297 (199 for 669) opponents batting average over the last 30 games after posting a 2.86 ERA and .242 average over the first 21 contests.

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: A's outfielders are tied for the Major League lead with 11 assists (Texas)...last year, A's outfielders had 21 assists for the entire season...the A's have made 12 errors in the last 25 games after tallying 19 in the first 26 contests.

ON THE BASES: The A's rank second in the American League in stolen bases (43)...11 of the steals have been of third base, which is the most in the majors...have five double steals, which is two more than the season total from last year...have been successful in 5 of the last 10 stolen base attempts after a streak of 20 consecutive stolen bases without a caught stealing...A's opponents have been caught stealing 15 times, which is tied with Detroit for second in the AL (Kansas City, 19).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 0-3 on this six-game road trip to Minnesota (0-3) and Kansas City (three games) and have lost seven of the last nine road games...return home following the game Sunday for a four-game homestand against Texas, the A's only home games over a 16-game stretch that began Monday...are 10-15 at home compared to 12-14 on the road...have the third worst home record in the American League...the A's pitching staff has a 3.25 ERA (85 er in 235.2 ip) at home compared to 4.12 (103 er in 225.0 ip) on the road...the offense is batting .202 (166 for 821) at home compared to .217 (190 for 876) on the road...went 1-5 on their last homestand against Los Angeles (1-2) and New York (0-3), their worst homestand since July 25-30, 2008 when they also went 1-5 against Texas and Kansas City.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's are 6-4 in one-run games, which is the fourth best record in the American League...the 10 one-run games are tied for the fewest in the majors...are 12-10 in games decided by two runs or fewer and 10-19 in all other games...are 7-6 in games decided in the seventh inning or later, including 6-5 in the last at bat...are 4-2 in extra inning games...rank second in the AL in extra inning wins and tied for second in games...have three "walk-off" wins, matching their season total from last year...all three of those wins came after the visiting team scored at least one run in the top of the final inning.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list nine times and currently have five players on the DL (Anderson, Braden, Devine, McCarthy, Sizemore)...Devine ("Tommy John" surgery) and Sizemore (torn ACL) will miss the entire season...the A's used the DL 15 times last year, which was the fewest since 2006 when they also used it 15 times...used the DL a total of 87 times from 2007-10...have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had just one.

A's vs. ROYALS

The A's lead the season series 2-1 after winning two of three in Oakland in April...have won each of the previous three season series against Kansas City and are 19-10 (.655) against the Royals since 2009...all-time, the A's are 298-244 against the Royals...that breaks down to 165-109 in Oakland and 133-135 in Kansas City.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Major League Baseball has made a scoring change in the A's vs. Yankees game a week ago today...in third inning, credit Robinson Cano with a RBI double instead of reaching base on an error by Coco Crisp...this adds three earned runs to Tyson Ross.

Ryan Cook has the lowest opponents batting average among relievers in the majors (.080) and ranks second among American League relievers in ERA (0.75).

Coco Crisp is 7 for 7 in stolen bases and has been successful in each of his last 30 stolen bases attempts...that is the longest streak of consecutive stolen bases without a caught stealing in Athletics history (since CS became an official stat in 1920).

Josh Reddick hit 10 home in May, which tied for third in the American League...is the first Athletic to hit 10 home runs in a month since Frank Thomas had 10 in September, 2006...has 14 home runs for the season and is the 10th player in Oakland history to hit at least 14 home runs before the end of May.

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In 1971 Reggie Jackson homers in the third inning of the A's 5-2 win at New York to give the A's a home run in 13 consecutive games, what was then a club record...the A's hit 25 round trippers during the streak, including six by Jackson...in 2006 Barry Zito strikes out Lew Ford in the sixth inning to become the fourth pitcher in Oakland history and the eighth in Athletics history with 1000 career strikeouts.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 12th start of the season...the A's are 5-6 (.455) in his starting assignments and his teams are 202-160 (.558) in his career...has tossed seven or more innings in five of his 11 starts and allowed two runs or fewer six times.

IN MAY: Went 1-3 with a 7.92 ERA and .386 opponents batting average in five starts in the month of May after going 3-2 with a 2.53 ERA and .214 opponents batting average over his first six starts...tied for the American League lead in hits allowed in May (44), tied for fourth in home runs (7) and tied for seventh in runs (23)...based on a minimum of 25.0 innings pitched, he had the highest opponents batting average in the majors in May and the third highest ERA...the opponents average was the highest single-month mark of his career and the ERA was third highest (7.99 in June, 2004; 7.94 in September, 1998).

HOME AND AWAY: Is 3-1 with a 2.48 ERA (11 er in 40.0 ip) and .258 (40 for 155) opponents batting average in six starts on the road compared to 1-4 with a 7.48 ERA (23 er in 27.2 ip) and .322 (38 for 118) opponents average in five starts at home...his road ERA is seventh lowest in the American League and his home ERA is second highest...over the last two years, he is 7-6 with a 3.15 ERA (46 er in 131.1 ip) in 22 games on the road compared to 5-9 with a 5.45 ERA (61 er in 100.2 ip) in 18 games in his home ballparks.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Ranks second in the American League in most hits allowed (78), tied for second in starts (11), tied for sixth in losses (4) and tied for ninth in home runs (10)...is averaging 14.1 pitches per inning, which is the lowest mark in the AL...has the seventh lowest run support average (3.59).

BASES ON BALLS: Has walked one batter or fewer in eight of his 11 starts and has issued just 11 free passes for the season...is averaging 1.33 walks per nine innings, which is third lowest in the American League...has issued all 10 of his walks to left-handed hitters...ranks sixth in the AL in strikeout to walk ratio (4.10).

THE LONG BALL: Has allowed 10 home runs...however, all of his home runs have been solo shots as have 37 of his 44 over his last three seasons...eight have been hit by left-handed hitters as have 33 of his 44 over his last three years...seven have been hit by a batter leading off an inning.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has held the opposition to a .213 (20 for 94) batting average the first time through the lineup...however, they are batting .359 (33 for 92) the second time through the lineup and .287 (25 for 87) after that...has allowed a .325 (13 for 40) average with runners in scoring position...has yielded a .516 (16 for 31) batting average to the opponents number three hitter, which is the second highest mark in the majors (Happ, HOU .577).

ACTIVE LEADERS: Ranks sixth among active pitchers in complete games (32), tied for seventh in shutouts (9) and 10th in wins (165) and strikeouts (1783).

DOMINICAN LEADERS: His 165 wins are third most among Dominican-born pitchers behind Juan Marichal (243) and Pedro Martinez (219)...also ranks third among Dominicans in games started (362), innings pitched (2308.2) and strikeouts (1783).

39 YEARS OLD: Celebrated his 39th birthday on May 24...is just the fifth pitcher in Oakland history to start a game at age 39 or older...the other four are Tommy John (42 in 1985), Tom Candiotti (41 in 1999), Don Sutton (40 in 1985) and Jim Perry (39 in 1975)...his first start on March 29 against Seattle came at the age of 38 years, 310 days, making him the oldest pitcher to start a game for the A's since Tom Candiotti, who was 41 years, 275 days when he made his last start for Oakland on June 2, 1999...over the previous four seasons, the only Oakland pitcher 33 years or older to start a game was Brett Tomko, who made six starts in 2009 at the age of 36.

2012 START-BY-START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 4-1 victory over Seattle in Tokyo **March 29**...shutout the Mariners on two hits and a walk over the first six innings before Smoak homered to lead off the seventh inning...was the losing pitcher in the A's 8-7 loss to Seattle **April 7** in Oakland...yielded seven earned runs, which were his most since July 6, 2007 at New York (AL)...combined with Cook and Balfour on a three-hit shutout in the A's 4-0 win at Seattle **April 13**...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed all three hits while walking one...the start was his third consecutive start against Seattle...is the first pitcher in Oakland history to make three consecutive starts against one team in the same season without missing a turn in the rotation...combined with De Los Santos on a four-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win at Los Angeles **April 18**...tossed eight innings and allowed all four of the hits...threw 38 consecutive strikes at one point, the longest such streak since pitch count data is first available in 1988...the previous best was 30 by Tim Wakefield in 1998...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-0 loss to Chicago **April 23** in Oakland...blanked the White Sox on three walks over the first three innings to extend his scoreless streak to 18.1 innings...had a no decision in the A's 5-2 loss at Baltimore **April 29**...shutout the Orioles on five hits and a walk over the first eight innings and took a 2-0 lead into the ninth...left with runners on second and third and one out but Balfour blew the save and took the loss...had his second consecutive no decision in the A's 4-3, 12-inning win at Tampa Bay **May 5**...had a 3-1 lead but allowed a leadoff home run to Zobrist in the fourth and a leadoff home run to Pena in the fifth...was the losing pitcher in the A's 10-6 loss to Detroit **May 10** in Oakland...allowed eight runs in 2.1 innings...lost his second consecutive start in the A's 4-0 loss at Los Angeles **May 15**...Santana, Downs and Frieri combined to shutout the A's on five hits and three walks...was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-2 win at San Francisco **May 20**...struck out a season-high seven batters.

LAST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-2 loss to New York last Saturday in Oakland...allowed a solo home run to Cano in the second, a RBI single to Jeter in the third and a solo home run to Teixeira in the fourth...then allowed three runs in the fifth inning on a Rodriguez sacrifice fly and a two-run single by Teixeira.

COLÓN vs. KANSAS CITY: Is 15-9 with a 4.92 ERA (166.1 ip, 163 h, 96 r, 91 er, 52 bb, 129 so, 26 hr) in 27 career appearances, all starts...the 15 wins are third most among active pitchers against the Royals (Buehrle 22, Sabathia 18)...is 6-6 with a 5.34 ERA (51 er in 86.0 ip) in 15 starts at Kauffman Stadium and 9-3 with a 4.48 ERA (40 er in 80.1 ip) in 12 starts in his home ballparks...made one start against Kansas City last year and he was the losing pitcher in the Yankees 5-4 loss at Kansas City August 17...had a 2-0 lead when he allowed four runs in the third on a three-run home run by Gordon and a solo home run by Butler...allowed another run in the fifth inning on a RBI fielders choice...his last win against the Royals was May 21, 2008 and he has not won in Kauffman Stadium since May 1, 2007.

Save/Save Opportunities: 12/18 (66.7%)

The A's bullpen is 0-3 with no saves, three blown saves and a 4.37 ERA (11 er in 22.2 ip) over the past seven games after going 1-0 with two saves, no blown saves and a 1.20 ERA in its previous nine games...now has a 2.72 ERA for the season, which ranks third in the American League...ranks first in opponents batting average (.200) and opponents slugging percentage (.322) and third in opponents on-base percentage (.294)...has allowed just 12 home runs, which ranks third fewest among AL bullpens, and is fourth in opponents grounded into double plays (16)...has allowed the most walks (74) and is tied for the second fewest strikeouts (120).

First Hitters: 7-22 (4 bb)

- Has not allowed a run in nine of his past 10 games (2 er in 10.0 ip, 1.80 ERA)...allowed seven runs in his previous six games (14.54 ERA) after yielding just one run over his first 10 contests (0.82 ERA).
- Has allowed a .200 opponents batting average...that includes .173 (9 for 52) against left-handers and .237 (9 for 38) against right-handers...first batters faced are 7 for 22 (.318) with three walks (.423 on-base percentage).
- Has allowed 5 of 10 (50.0%) inherited runners to score, which is the third highest percentage in the American League.
- Has a 1.32 ERA (2 er in 13.2 ip) in 13 appearances at home and a 6.17 ERA (8 er in 11.2 ip) in 13 outings on the road.
- Is tied second in the AL in games pitched (26) and tied for sixth in blown saves (2).
- Has a save in two games against Kansas City this year (3.0 ip, 1 h, 2 bb, 3 so)...is 1-1 with two saves, no blown saves and a 1.50 ERA in 20 career appearances against the Royals (24.0 ip, 12 h, 5 r, 4 er, 12 bb, 26 so).
- Recorded the 17th save of his career May 5, tying Graeme Lloyd for the most in Major League history by an Australian-born pitcher.
- Was used mostly as a setup man with Oakland last year, posting a 5-2 record with two saves, a 2.47 ERA and .199 opponents average in 62 appearances...tied for eighth among AL relievers in grounded into double plays (8) and ranked 10th in opponents on-base percentage (.266).

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 11th start of the season...the A's are 6-4 (.600) in his starting assignments and his teams are 11-4 (.733) in his career...has tossed at least six innings in seven of his 10 starts, allowed two runs or fewer six times and walked two batters or fewer eight times.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Leads American League rookies in innings pitched (64.1), is tied for the lead in games started (10), tied for second in wins (6) and ranks fifth in strikeouts (35)...is the first rookie pitcher in Oakland history to have six wins before the end of May...his six wins are tied for third among all AL pitchers...his 10 starts are tied for the most among Major League pitchers without a no decision (Kuroda, NYY).

FIRST FOUR, LAST SIX: Went 3-1 with a 2.00 ERA and .185 opponents batting average over his first four starts and yielded just one home run in 27.0 innings...is 3-3 with a 4.82 ERA (20 er in 37.1 ip) and .268 (40 for 149) opponents average over his last six starts and has allowed six home runs in 37.1 innings.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 2-3 with a 7.16 ERA (22 er in 27.2 ip) and .295 (33 for 112) opponents batting average in five starts on the road compared to 4-1 with a 0.98 ERA (4 er in 36.2 ip) and .186 (24 for 129) opponents average in five starts at home...has allowed six of his seven home runs on the road...has the third highest road ERA in the American League and the second lowest home ERA...won each of his first four career starts at the Coliseum before taking the loss in his last start...is the first pitcher in Oakland history to win each of his first four starts at the Coliseum...the previous best was three by Tim Hudson in 1999.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to start on six days rest today...is 4-2 with a 2.70 ERA (12 er in 40.0 ip) in six starts on four days rest and 2-2 with a 5.18 ERA (14 er in 24.1 ip) in four starts on five days rest or more.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Five of the seven home runs he has allowed have been solo shots...has issued seven walks in 46 plate appearances against left-handed hitters compared to nine walks in 214 plate appearances against right-handers.

FIRST START: He combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed a career-high 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...all three hits were doubles but no one advanced past second base...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit).

SECOND START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-0 loss at Seattle April 14...faced just one batter over the minimum over the first five innings but that was a solo home run by Montero in the second inning...then allowed three runs in the sixth on a bases loaded walk by Smoak and a two-run double by Montero...Noesi and League combined to shutout the A's on five hits.

THIRD START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 4-2 win at Los Angeles April 19...blanked the Angels on two hits over the first three innings before allowing his only two runs in the fourth...Pujols doubled and scored on a Wells double...Wells scored on a Trumbo single...left after five innings with a 4-2 lead.

2012 PLAYER HIGHLIGHTS

BRANDON ALLEN

- Was the A's Opening Day starter at first base March 28 but went for 7 with five strikeouts in three games before he was designated for assignment April 9...was claimed off waivers by the Tampa Bay Rays April 19.

BRETT ANDERSON

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 13 as he continues his recovery from July 14, 2011 "Tommy John" surgery.

DARIC BARTON

- Homered in the fifth inning April 17 at Los Angeles to snap a career-high 76-game homerless streak...it was his first home run since Oct. 1, 2010 against Seattle...the home run also snapped a 72-game homerless streak as a first baseman, which was second longest in Oakland history...the record is 75 by Mike Hegan from July 6, 1971 to Aug. 16, 1973.

JERRY BLEVINS

- Had his career-high 10.1-inning scoreless streak dating back to last season snapped April 7 against Seattle when Saunders homered in the sixth inning.

DALLAS BRADEN

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 as he continues his recovery from left shoulder surgery.
- Was transferred to the 60-day disabled list April 22.

ANDREW CARIGAN

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and posted a 6.23 ERA in five relief appearances before he was optioned to Sacramento April 17.
- Recalled for a second time May 11 and allowed two runs in 2.0 innings over two outings before he was sent back to Sacramento May 16.
- Joined the A's for a third time May 27.

YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Made his Major League debut March 28 against Seattle in Tokyo with a start in center field...doubled off Felix Hernandez to lead off the bottom of the seventh inning for his first ML hit.
- Hit his first ML home run in the seventh inning March 29 against Seattle in Tokyo, a two-run shot off Shawn Kelley.
- Homered in three consecutive games from March 29 to April 7...became the third player since 1918 to homer in three of his first four Major League games (Trent Oeltjen, ARI 2009 and Mike Jacobs, NYM 2005)...is the ninth player with at least three home runs in his first four games (Jacobs had 4)...the previous fastest an Oakland Athletic reached three career home runs was seven games by Kurt Abbott in 1993 and Mitchell Page in 1977.
- Had multiple RBI games in each of those contests...since 1918, he is the first Athletic and ninth Major Leaguer with three multiple RBI games over his first four career games (last: Wladimir Balentien, 2006-07).
- Struck out at least once in each of his first eight games, which is an Oakland record to start a career...the previous mark was six (Chris Carter, 2010; Brooks Conrad, 2008; Travis Buck, 2007)...matched the longest streak by an Athletic since 1918 (Troy Herriage, 1956; Norm Bass, 1961).
- Hit his fourth home run April 18 at Los Angeles in his 12th game...since 1918, that is the fastest a player has reached four career home runs in Athletics history...the previous best was by Brian Leshner, who did it in 14 games in 1996.
- Did not have a putout a April 25 against Chicago, becoming the first A's outfielder without a putout in a game of 14 or more innings since Stan Javier on May 30, 1988 against New York.

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 12 retroactive to May 7 with a muscle strain in his left hand...began a rehab assignment with Triple-A Sacramento May 28.

BARTOLO COLÓN

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and is in his 15th season in the majors.
- Made each of his first three starts against Seattle to become the first pitcher in Oakland history to make three consecutive starts against one team in the same season without missing a turn in the rotation.

RYAN COOK

- Became the third pitcher in Athletics franchise history to record four strikeouts in an inning April 27 at Baltimore (Blake Stein, 1998; Erik Hiljus, 2001).

COCO CRISP

- Was the A's 13th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 13 years...had 203 career starts in left entering the season, but none since October 2, 2005.
- Committed his first error since April 25, 2011 on April 7 against Seattle, snapping a 116-game errorless streak...that streak was seventh longest by an outfielder in Oakland history.

FAUTINO DE LOS SANTOS

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and compiled a 3.00 ERA in six relief appearances before he was optioned to Sacramento, April 25.
- Did not retire a batter over his final three outings before his option (5 h, 2 r, 1 er, 2 bb).

JOEY DEVINE

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 retroactive to March 24...underwent "Tommy John" surgery on his right elbow April 10... Dr. James Andrews performed the surgery in Pensacola, Fla., which included an ulnar collateral ligament reconstruction, an ulnar nerve transposition and a debridement of the flexor tendon...also had "Tommy John" surgery on the same elbow April 21, 2009.
- Was transferred to the 60-day DL May 15.

JOSH DONALDSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster but hit just .094 in nine games before he was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento April 23.
- Made nine starts, all at third base, during his first stint...his Major League experience prior to this season included seven games at catcher and two at first base.
- Was recalled May 12 and snapped a career-high tying 0 for 17 streak with his eighth inning double May 14 at Los Angeles (also May 1-13, 2010).
- Went 3 for 4 with two doubles, a home run and five RBI May 18 at San Francisco...the hits, doubles and RBI were all career highs.

PEDRO FIGUEROA

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 21 and made his Major League debut that night against Cleveland...tossed a scoreless ninth and his only base runner (Cunningham walk) was erased on a double play.
- Was optioned to Sacramento May 22 after posting a 2.00 ERA with nine walks in 9.0 innings in eight games.

BRIAN FUENTES

- Recorded his 200th career save May 2 at Boston to become the sixth left-handed reliever in Major League history to reach the 200 plateau (Franco, Wagner, Myers, Righetti, Lyle).

GRAHAM GODFREY

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and went 0-3 with a 5.06 ERA in three starts before he was optioned to Sacramento April 21.

- Recalled May 22 and went 0-1 with a 10.80 ERA in two games, one start, before he was sent back to Sacramento May 27.

JONNY GOMES

- Was hit by a Jonathan Braxton pitch with the bases loaded in the bottom of the 12th inning April 11 against Kansas City to force in the winning run in the A's 5-4 victory...it was his second career walk-off hit by pitch (August 21, 2011 vs. Philadelphia)...it was his fifth career walk-off RBI (two home runs, one walk)...it was the third walk-off hit by pitch in Oakland history (Mike Bordick, August 4, 1993 vs. Seattle and Olmedo Saenz, July 20, 2002 vs. Texas).
- Singled in the eighth inning April 19 at Los Angeles after homering for each of his first three hits for the season...is the first player in Oakland history whose first three hits in a season were all home runs.

LUKE HUGHES

- Was claimed off waivers from Minnesota April 22 and went 1 for 13 (.077) in four games with the A's before he was designated for assignment April 30...cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento May 2.

BRANDON INGE

- Agreed to terms with the A's on a one-year contract April 30 after he was released by Detroit April 26.
- Had four four-RBI game over a five-game span from May 6 to 11...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the second player in Major League history with four games of four or more RBI over a five-game stretch...the other is Lou Gehrig in 1931...now has 14 career games with four or more RBI...drove in 16 runs over that five-game stretch...since 1970, the only other Athletic to drive in 16 runs over a five-game span is Damian Miller (June 6-11, 2004).
- Had the game-ending grand slam in the bottom of the ninth inning May 8 against Toronto...it was his seventh career "walk-off" home run and his 10th "walk-off plate appearance (two singles, one sacrifice fly)...it was the sixth "walk-off" grand slam in Oakland history (Tenace, 1973; Armas, 1980; McGwire, 1990 and 1995; Ellis, 2008).
- Added another grand slam May 10 against Detroit...is just the second player in Athletics history to hit two grand slams over a three-game span...the other is Jimmie Foxx (September 22 and 24, 1932)...now has seven career grand slams.
- Had 17 RBI in his first 10 games with the A's...those are the most in Oakland history by a player in his first 10 games with the A's...the previous best was 15 by Mitchell Page (1977) and Jack Cust (2007).
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 17 retroactive to May 13 with a strained right groin...it is his second stint on the disabled list this year as he began the season on Detroit's DL with a strained left groin.
- Went 5 for 5 with three runs, two doubles, two home runs (including a grand slam) and seven RBI in a start at third base for Triple-A Sacramento May 26 against Reno in the second game of his two-game rehab assignment.
- Was reinstated from the DL May 29.

KILA KA'AIHUE

- Matched his career high with three hits April 15 at Seattle (third time, last: Sept. 28, 2010 vs. Minnesota).
- Had the game-winning RBI single in the 14th inning April 25 against Chicago, his second career walk-off hit (home run, April 1, 2011 vs. Los Angeles-AL).

BRANDON MCCARTHY

- Made his first career Opening Day start March 28 against Seattle and had a no decision in the A's 3-1, 11-inning loss...allowed just one run on six hits and no walks in 7.0 innings.
- Also started the third game of the season, April 6 against Seattle, to become the second pitcher in Oakland history to start two of the A's first three games...the other is Joe Blanton who did it in 2008, the other time the A's opened the season in Japan...also started three of the first seven games, joining Blanton as the only Oakland pitchers to do that since 1977.

JIM MILLER

- Picked up his first Major League win April 25 against Chicago...allowed two inherited runners to score in the top of the 14th inning but the A's came back with three in the bottom of the inning.
- Was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento May 11 after posting a 1.93 ERA in six relief appearances with the A's.
- Returned to Oakland May 20.

TOMMY MILONE

- Combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit).

JORDAN NORBERTO

- Retired the final two batters May 1 at Boston for his first Major League save...he saved Jarrod Parker's first ML win, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.

ANTHONY RECKER

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and hit .129 in 13 games as the back-up to Kurt Suzuki before he was optioned to Sacramento May 28..

JOSH REDDICK

- Was the A's fifth different Opening Day starter in right field in the last five years.
- Had career highs May 11 against Detroit with four runs, four hits (tied), two home runs and five RBI...is the eighth player in Oakland history with at least four runs, four hits, two home runs and five RBI in a game...the last was Matt Holliday (July 20, 2009 vs. Minnesota).

ADAM ROSALES

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and appeared in one game against Seattle in Japan before he was optioned to Sacramento April 2.
- Returned to Oakland May 17.

SCOTT SIZEMORE

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 3 after tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee in the team's first full-squad workout Feb. 27 in Phoenix...underwent successful reconstructive surgery March 21...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg of the Arizona Sports Medicine Center of Scottsdale...will miss the entire 2012 season.

SETH SMITH

- Was the A's eight different Opening Day starter at designated hitter in the last eight years.
- Hit his first home run of the season April 22 against Cleveland, a two-run shot off Masterson in the fourth inning, to snap a career-high 45-game homerless streak...his previous high was 35 (June 22-July 31, 2011)...it was his first home run since Aug. 23, 2011 against Houston.
- Went 0 for 4 with four strikeouts April 30 at Boston, the first four-strikeout game of his career.

ERIC SOGARD

- Had a career-high three RBI, April 15 at Seattle.
- Was optioned to Sacramento May 21.

KURT SUZUKI

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at catcher...the five starts are second most by a catcher in Oakland history...only Terry Steinbach, with nine, has more.

- Made his 598th career appearance at catcher April 7 against Seattle, which moves him past Ossee Schreckengost for fifth most in Athletics history.
- Had five assists April 25 against Chicago, the third time in Oakland history a catcher had five or more assists in a game (6, Jim Essian vs. Texas on Sept. 19, 1979; 5, Jeff Newman vs. Toronto on Aug. 13, 1979).

RICH THOMPSON

- Was claimed off waivers from the Los Angeles Angels April 20 and appeared in one game for the A's before he was designated for assignment April 25...faced Chicago on April 23 (0.2 ip, 1 h).
- Cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento April 27.

NEIL WAGNER

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 17 but did not appear in a game before he was optioned back to Sacramento April 20.
- Was claimed off waivers by San Diego May 28.

JEMILE WEEKS

- Played in the 100th game of his career April 6 against Seattle and collected 126 hits over that span... since 1918, the only player in Athletics history with more hits over the first 100 games of his career is Wally Moses, who had 134 hits in his first 100 games with the Philadelphia A's in 1935-36...the previous Oakland record was 122 by Ben Grieve.
