A's vs. MARINERS

The A's trail in the season series, 2-5...are 1-2 in Seattle, 0-2 in Oakland and 1-1 Tokyo...have lost three of the previous five season series and are 44-58 (.431) against Seattle since 2007...that is the **lowest winning percentage** by any American League team against the Mariners over that span...all-time, the A's are 294-222 (.570) against Seattle, which is the second best mark by an AL team against the Mariners (Boston, .579)...are 163-94 in Oakland, 130-127 in Seattle and 1-1 in Tokyo...are 54-63 (.462) at Safeco Field.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour has not allowed a run in his last eight games and has a 9.2-inning scoreless streak.

Coco Crisp has batted leadoff in each of the last 10 games and is 14 for 37 (.378) with seven walks, six stolen bases, seven runs and five multiple hit games over that span.

Jonny Gomes is batting .370 (10 for 27) in June after hitting .222 in May.

Jim Miller ranks fifth among American League relievers with a 1.14 ERA.

Derek Norris is the third player in Athletics history to hit a walk-off home run for his first Major League home run (Dee Miles, September 14, 1939; George Hendrick, May 28, 1972) (Credit: Elias).

Josh Reddick has 17 homers and is the second Athletic since 2003 with at least 17 homers by the end of June (Swisher, 19 in 2006).

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1950** Eddie Joost homers in both games of a doubleheader at Chicago and combines to drive in seven runs...in **1996** Mark McGwire hits his 300th career home run in the second inning of the A's 10-8 loss to Detroit...he would later add #301 for his 33rd career multi-homer game.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have won nine of the last 12 games since June 12 but have lost one game in the American League West standings over that span as Texas has gone 10-2...trail the Rangers by a season-high 10 games for the third consecutive day...are in third place for the 13th consecutive day...have spent one day tied for first this year, 30 days in second, eight days tied for second, 24 days in third, eight days tied for third and 11 days in fourth...are 13-8 over the last 21 games after losing a season-high nine consecutive contests...lost two of three to San Francisco over the weekend, snapping a three-series winning streak...it was the first time the A's won three straight series since September 3-12, 2010.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers have allowed four hits or fewer in each of the last eight games, which is the **longest such streak in Oakland history**...it also matches the longest streak by an A's team since at least 1921...the Kansas City's A's also had an eight-game streak from September 18-25, 1965...the final pitcher during that streak was Satchel Paige who allowed one hit in 3.0 shutout innings to become the oldest player in Major League history (59 years, 80 days)...opponents are batting .126 (21 for 167) over the last eight games...starters are now 4-2 with a 1.88 ERA (13 er in 62.1 ip) and .139 (29 for 209) opponents batting average over the last 10 games...have a 3.95 ERA (191 er in 435.1 ip) for the season, which ranks fourth in the American League...Tommy Milone tossed the A's first complete game of the season last Wednesday night against Los Angeles and it came in the A's 69th game...in Athletics history only the 2009 (game 81) and 1996 (game 78) teams went farther into the season without a complete game.

PITCHING: The A's have allowed 49 hits over the last 10 games, which is the **fewest by an A's team over a 10-game span since at least 1916**...the previous low was 50 from April 18-27, 1986...opponents are batting .160 (49 for 307) over the last 10 games...the A's posted a 2.67 ERA and .155 opponents batting average on the last homestand after compiling a 6.10 ERA and .305 opponents batting average on the last road trip...have a 3.60 ERA for the season, which ranks fourth in the American League...are tied for second in shutouts (7), have the third fewest home runs (61) and the third lowest opponents slugging percentage (.378)...however, have the fourth most walks (242) and second fewest strikeouts (459).

CLOSE CALLS: Derek Norris hit a "walk-off" three run home run yesterday after Yoenis Céspedes did the same on Thursday...Brandon Inge had a "walk-off" grand slam earlier this year, giving the A's three game-ending home runs with at least two runners on base...the only other time that happened in Oakland history was in 2007 (three three-run home runs)...the A's now have five "walk-off" wins this year, which is two more than last year...are now 11-8 in games decided in the seventh inning or later, including 9-7 in the last at bat...the nine last at bat wins are tied for second most in the American League (Baltimore, 13)...each of the A's last four losses have been by one run and the A's are now 6-9 (.400) in one-run decisions, which is the second worst record in the AL (Toronto, 5-12)...in the majors, only Cleveland has played fewer one-run games (14)...are 4-2 in extra inning games and are tied for second in the AL in extra inning wins...last Friday, the A's lost for the fourth time this year when leading after eight innings, which is the most such losses in the majors.

PLAYERS USED: Yesterday, A.J. Griffin became the 42nd player to appear in a game for the A's this year, which is second most in the majors to San Diego (45)...Griffin is the 16th rookie, which is the most in the majors and two more than the A's season total from last year...currently have 10 rookies on the roster (Céspedes, Cook, Cowgill, Doolittle, Griffin, Miller, Milone, Norris, Parker, Scribner).

A's IN JUNE: The A's lead the majors in runs (117) and walks (89) in the month of June...lead the American League in extra base hits (74), rank second in on-base percentage (.345), doubles (43) and triples (6) and tied for third in home runs (25)...are 13-9 (.591), which is the fourth best mark in the AL...the 13 wins are the A's most in June since going 13-15 in 2009...went 10-12 in April and 11-16 in May and have finished the first two months of the season with a losing record for the second consecutive year and third time in the last four years.

OFFENSE: The A's rank last in the majors in batting (.227), have the second lowest slugging percentage (.365) and sixth lowest on-base percentage (.306)...have the second fewest runs scored in the American League (281) and have been shutout a Major League leading 11 times...were shut out 15 times last year and those were the most times the A's were shutout in a season since 1979 (17)...lead the AL in stolen bases (60) and have the fewest grounded into double plays (44)...are batting .337 (58 for 172) with runners in scoring position over the last 19 games after hitting .209 over the first 54 contests...have hit 67 home runs after tallying just 50 home runs before the All-Star Break last year...33 of the A's 67 home runs have come with two outs, which is third most in the AL...lead the majors in pitches per plate appearance (3.99).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's begin a seven-game road trip tonight to Seattle (three games) and Texas (four games)...went 3-3 on the last road trip to Arizona (0-3) and Colorado (3-0)...went 6-3 on the last homestand against San Diego (2-1), Los Angeles (3-0) and San Francisco (1-2)...are 19-19 at home compared to 16-19 on the road...the A's pitching staff has a 2.99 ERA (117 er in 352.2 ip) at home compared to 4.33 (145 er in 301.2 ip) on the road...the home ERA is second lowest in the American League.

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: The A's finished interleague play with a 10-8 record, snapping a streak of three consecutive seasons with a losing record against the National League...it was the ninth time in 16 seasons the A's had a winning interleague record, the first time since 2008 when they also went 10-8...ranked second in runs (96) and walks (71), tied for third in extra base hits (58), tied for fourth in doubles (34) and fifth in on-base percentage (.339)...also struck out 159 times, which was the most ever by a team in interleague play...the pitching staff led the majors in walks (73)...the A's are now 154-130 (.542) all-time in interleague play, which is sixth best.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list 14 times and currently have eight players on the DL (Anderson, Braden, Carignan, Colón, Cowgill, Devine, McCarthy, Sizemore)...the eight players matches the season high (also May 18-20)...three of those players will miss the remainder of the season (Carignan, Devine, Sizemore)...the A's used the DL 15 times last year, which was the fewest since 2006 when they also used it 15 times...used the DL a total of 87 times from 2007-10...have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had just one.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 15th start of the season...the A's are 8-6 (.571) in his starting assignments and his teams are 13-6 (.684) in his career...has tossed at least seven innings in seven of his 14 starts, allowed two runs or fewer eight times and walked two batters or fewer 11 times.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 2-4 with a 7.42 ERA (36 er in 43.2 ip) and .317 (57 for 180) opponents batting average in eight starts on the road compared to 5-1 with a 0.99 ERA (5 er in 45.2 ip) and .169 (27 for 160) opponents average in five starts at home...has the second highest road ERA in the majors (Lincecum, SF 7.59) and the lowest home ERA (Greinke, MIL 1.08)...has allowed 12 of his 13 home runs

on the road...ranks second in the American League in road home runs allowed (Vargas, SEA 16)...won each of his first four career starts at the Coliseum before taking the loss May 27...is the first pitcher in Oakland history to win each of his first four starts at the Coliseum...the previous best was three by Tim Hudson in 1999.

GO THE DISTANCE: Tossed the first complete game by a Major League rookie this year in his last start last Wednesday against the Dodgers...it was the first by an A's rookie since Brett Anderson on July 6, 2009 at Boston...it was the first by an A's rookie in the Coliseum since Barry Zito on September 10, 2000 against Tampa Bay.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Is tied for the lead among Major League rookies in complete games (1)...leads American League rookies in innings pitched (89.1), is tied for the lead in games started (14), tied for second in wins (7) and ranks fifth in strikeouts (52)...is the second rookie in Oakland history to have seven wins before the All-Star Break (Rick Langford, 1977)...is tied for second among all AL pitchers in pickoffs (3).

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .289 (33 for 114) opponents batting average the first time through the lineup, .243 (28 for 115) the second time and .207 (23 for 111) after that...has issued 11 walks and allowed five home runs in 84 plate appearances against left-handed hitters compared to 13 walks and eight home runs in 284 plate appearances against right-handers.

INNING BY INNING: Has allowed 22 of his 43 runs in the first two innings...has a 6.75 ERA (21 er in 28.0 ip) and seven home runs over the first two innings of a game and a 2.93 ERA (20 er in 61.1) and six home runs from the third inning on.

FIRST FOUR, LAST 10: Went 3-1 with a 2.00 ERA and .185 opponents batting average over his first four starts and yielded just one home run in 27.0 innings...is 4-4 with a 5.05 ERA (35 er in 62.1 ip) and .270 (67 for 248) opponents average over his last 10 starts and has allowed 12 home runs in 62.1 innings.

LOSING STREAK SNAPPED: Picked up the win in his last start to snap a two-game losing streak, the first losing streak of his career...the A's were shutout in each of his two losses during the streak and have been blanked in three of his 14 starts this year.

2012 START-BY-START: He combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City **April 9** in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit)...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-0 loss at Seattle **April 14**...faced just one batter over the minimum over the first five innings but that was a solo home run by Montero in the second inning...then allowed three runs in the sixth...Noesi and League combined to shutout the A's on five hits...was the winning pitcher in the A's 4-2 win at Los Angeles **April 19**...blanked the Angels on two hits over the first three innings before allowing his only two runs in the fourth...left after five innings with a 4-2 lead...combined with Grant Balfour on a four-hit, 2-0 shutout of Chicago **April 24** in Oakland...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed three of the hits...did not allow a runner past first base...according to the Elias Sports Bureau he is just the second Oakland rookie over the last 75 years to have two wins while pitching at least eight scoreless innings and allowing three or fewer hits in a season (Vida Blue, 1970)...was the losing pitcher in the A's 11-6 loss at Boston **April 30**...allowed a career-high eight runs on eight hits, including a career-high three home runs...was the winning pitcher in the A's 9-5 win at Tampa Bay **May 6**...allowed five runs in five innings and walked a career-high four batters...won his second consecutive start in the A's 11-4 win over Detroit **May 11** in Oakland...struck out a career-high six batters in 7.0 innings...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-1 loss at Texas **May 16**...surrendered a career-high nine hits...was the winning pitcher in the A's 2-1 win over Los Angeles **May 21** in Oakland...shutout the Angels on two hits over the first four innings before allowing his only run on a Trout RBI double in the fifth inning...was the losing pitcher in the A's 2-0 loss to New York **May 27** in Oakland...Kuroda and Soriano combined to shutout the A's on five hits and a walk...lost his second consecutive start in the A's 2-0 loss at Kansas City **June 3**...matched his career-high with six strikeouts...Mazzaro, Herrera, Holland and Broxton combined to shutout the A's on seven hits...had his first no decision of the season in the A's 9-8 loss at Arizona **June 8**...allowed a career-high tying nine hits...left with an 8-4 lead but Fuentes allowed a three-run home run to Roberts in the bottom of the ninth for the blown save and loss...had a no decision in the A's 10-8 win at Colorado **June 13**...tossed a career-low 4.0 innings and matched his career highs in runs (8) and walks (4)...left trailing 8-5 but the A's scored single runs in the sixth and seventh and three times in the ninth for the win.

LAST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 4-1 victory over Los Angeles (NL) in Oakland last Wednesday...tossed his first career complete game, a three-hitter...allowed his only run in the second inning on a RBI double by Uribe...retired 14 in a row at one point and allowed just two base runners over the final seven innings.

MILONE vs. SEATTLE: Was the losing pitcher in his only career start, a 4-0 A's loss at Seattle April 14...faced just one batter over the minimum over the first five innings but that was a solo home run by Montero in the second inning...then allowed three runs in the sixth on a bases loaded walk by Smoak and a two-run double by Montero...Noesi and League combined to shutout the A's on five hits.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

LHP Travis Blackley (1-2, 3.15 ERA): Is scheduled to make his ninth appearance and sixth start since he was claimed off waivers from San Francisco May 15...also made four relief appearances with the Giants and is 1-2 with a 3.81 ERA in five starts compared to 0-0 with a 4.09 ERA in seven relief appearances...has allowed just one home run in 39.1 innings...has retired the leadoff hitter in each of his 14 innings over his last two starts and they are 4 for 37 (.108) with two walks (.154 on-base percentage) for the season...had a no decision in his last start, a 4-1 A's win over Los Angeles last Thursday in Oakland (8.0 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 0 bb, 6 so)...is making his first career appearance against Seattle...pitched for the Mariners in 2004 and is 1-1 with a 9.95 ERA in three career appearances at Safeco Field, all starts.

The A's bullpen is 1-1 with one blown save and a 7.45 ERA (8 er in 9.2 ip) over the past three games after going 3-0 with five saves, one blown save and a 1.48 ERA in its previous nine games...has a 2.92 ERA for the season, which ranks third in the American League...has the lowest opponents batting average (.208) and slugging percentage (.327)...has allowed the second most walks (103)...has 70 strikeouts in 65.2 innings over its last 23 games (9.6 per nine innings) after fanning 117 in 153.1 innings over the first 49 contests (6.9 per nine innings).

- Has not allowed a run over his past eight games and has a 9.2-inning scoreless streak over that span...now has a 0.84 ERA (1 er in 10.2 ip) in nine games in June after posting a 3.65 ERA in 13 games in May and 4.09 ERA in 11 appearances in April.
- Is tied for fifth in the American League in games pitched (35) and tied for seventh among AL relievers in innings pitched (35.2) and walks (15).
- Has a 0.95 ERA (2 er in 19.0 ip) in 18 appearances at home compared to a 4.76 ERA (9 er in 17.0 ip) in 17 outings on the road.
- First batters faced are 9 for 29 (.310) with six walks for a .429 on-base percentage...the six walks are tied for second most among AL relievers and the on-base percentage ranks fourth highest.
- Has not allowed a run in four games against the Mariners this year (4.0 ip, 1 h, 2 so)...however, has a 4.42 ERA (9 er in 18.1 ip) in 19 career appearances, including a 5.59 ERA (6 er in 9.2 ip) in 11 games in Seattle.
- His last save was May 5 and it was the 17th of his career, tying Graeme Lloyd for the most in Major League history by an Australian-born pitcher.
- Was used mostly as a setup man with Oakland last year, posting a 5-2 record with two saves, a 2.47 ERA and .199 opponents average in 62 appearances...tied for eighth among AL relievers in grounded into double plays (8) and ranked 10th in opponents on-base percentage (.266).

- First batters faced are 9 for 24 (.375), which is the fourth highest mark among American League relievers.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his ninth appearance and sixth start since he was claimed off waivers from San Francisco May 15...it is his 13th appearance overall this year...the A's are 2-3 (.400) in his five starting assignments and his teams are 5-8 (.385) in his career...has tossed six or more innings in two of his five starts, allowed two runs or fewer three times and walked two batters or fewer four times.

BRIEFLY: Began the season at Triple-A Fresno and was 3-0 with a save and a 0.39 ERA in four games, three starts, before he was selected by San Francisco May 1...posted a 9.00 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in four relief appearances with San Francisco before he was designated for assignment May 13...was claimed off waivers by the A's May 15 and did not allow an earned run in three relief appearances (6.0 ip) before making his first start May 28...is 1-2 with a 3.15 ERA (12 er in 34.1 ip) in eight games, five starts, with the A's.

STARTING AND RELIEVING: Is 1-2 with a 3.81 ERA (12 er in 28.1 ip) in five starts this year and 0-0 with a 4.09 ERA (5 er in 11.0 ip) in seven relief appearances...first batters faced were 0 for 6 with a sacrifice hit in his relief appearances and he allowed 1 of 2 inherited runners to score...had eight career appearances entering this season and all were starts...is 2-5 with a 6.86 ERA (48 er in 63.0 ip) in 13 career starts...made six starts with Seattle in 2004 and two with San Francisco in 2007.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed just one home run in 39.1 innings, a solo shot in his first start on May 28 at Minnesota (Plouffe)...has retired the leadoff hitter in each of his 14 innings over his last two starts and they are 4 for 37 (.108) with two walks (.154 on-base percentage) for the season...has issued all 10 of his walks to right-handed hitters...has allowed a .333 (12 for 36) average with runners in scoring position...has yielded a .529 (9 for 17) batting average to the opponents number four hitter and .198 (26 for 131) against everyone else.

ALMOST EIGHT YEARS: Was the winning pitcher June 15 against San Diego, his first Major League win since he defeated Seattle in his Major League debut July 1, 2004...the span of seven years, 350 days between wins is the longest since Vicente Romo went 8 years and 3 days between victories from July 16, 1974 to July 19, 1982...it is the fourth longest streak by a pitcher in the expansion era (since 1961) behind Jim Bouton (8 years, 65 days), Romo and Joe Grzenda (7 years, 362 days)...the win snapped a career-high five-game losing streak dating back to July 7, 2004.

FIRST START: He had a no decision in the A's 5-4 loss at Minnesota May 28...blanked the Twins on two hits over the first four innings and had a 2-0 lead when he allowed a solo home run to Plouffe in the fifth inning...the A's scored a run in the sixth to increase the lead to 3-1 but Norberto allowed two runs in the sixth inning for the blown save...it was his first Major League start since September 29, 2007.

SECOND START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 6-3 loss to Texas last Tuesday in Oakland...allowed a career-high tying seven hits...retired the first six batters before the Rangers scored three times in the third inning on a two-run double by Kinsler and a RBI double by Hamilton...also allowed a sacrifice fly to Torrealba in the fourth and a RBI triple to Young in the fifth.

THIRD START: He lost his second consecutive start in the A's 4-3 loss at Arizona June 10...allowed three runs, two earned, in the first inning on a fielders choice and a two-run single by Hill...the A's scored twice in the fourth to make the score 3-2 but he allowed a RBI single to Kubel in the fifth.

FOURTH START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 10-2 win over San Diego June 15 in Oakland...allowed a RBI single to Quentin in the first inning but the A's came back with five runs in the bottom of the first...also allowed a RBI single to Denorfia in the second but retired 12 of the final 14 batters he faced.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 4-1 win over Los Angeles (NL) last Thursday in Oakland...struck out a career-high six batters in a career-high 8.0 innings...retired each of the first two batters before Herrera doubled with one out in the fourth...one out later, Rivera had a RBI single, but he was picked off, Blackley's third pickoff of the season, which is **red** for second in the American League...retired 12 of the final 13 hitters he faced...Kershaw limited the A's to a run over eighth innings and Blackley was relieved by Cook to start the ninth with the score tied at 1-1...Céspedes hit a three-run home run in the bottom of the ninth for the win.

BLACKLEY vs. SEATTLE: Is making his first career appearance...pitched for the Mariners in 2004 and is 1-1 with a 9.95 ERA (14 er in 12.2 ip) in three career appearances at Safeco Field, all starts.

WITH FRESNO: Was 3-0 with a save and a 0.39 ERA in four games, three starts, with Triple-A Fresno in the San Francisco organization...walked just three batters in 23.1 innings (1.16 per nine innings) and allowed one home run...allowed a .163 opponents batting average, including .153 (9 for 59) against right-handed hitters and .190 (4 for 21) against left-handed hitters...opponents were 1 for 27 (.037) with runners on base, including 0 for 11 with runners in scoring position...tossed at least 4.0 innings in each of his four outings...did not allow a run over his final two starts and finished the Triple-A portion of his campaign with a 15.1-inning scoreless streak.

2011 HIGHLIGHTS: Pitched for the KIA Tigers of the Korean Baseball Organization...appeared in 25 games, including 22 starts, and posted a 7-5 record with a 3.48 ERA...struck out 115 and walked 62 in 126.2 innings.

BRETT ANDERSON

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 13 as he continues his recovery from July 14, 2011 "Tommy John" surgery.

DARIC BARTON

- Homered in the fifth inning April 17 at Los Angeles to snap a career-high 76-game homerless streak...it was his first home run since Oct. 1, 2010 against Seattle...the home run also snapped a 72-game homerless streak as a first baseman, which was second longest in Oakland history...the record is 75 by Mike Hegan from July 6, 1971 to Aug. 16, 1973.
- Was batting .198 with one home run and four RBI in 37 games when he was optioned to Sacramento June 2.

JERRY BLEVINS

- Had his career-high 10.1-inning scoreless streak dating back to last season snapped April 7 against Seattle when Saunders homered in the sixth inning.

DALLAS BRADEN

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 as he continues his recovery from left shoulder surgery.
- Was transferred to the 60-day disabled list April 22.

ANDREW CARIGNAN

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and posted a 6.23 ERA in five relief appearances before he was optioned to Sacramento April 17.
- Recalled for a second time May 11 and allowed two runs in 2.0 innings over two outings before he was sent back to Sacramento May 16.
- Joined the A's for a third time May 27 and did not allow a run in four games (3.1 ip, 2 h, 2 bb, 4 so) before he was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 6 with a sprained ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow...was transferred to the 60-day DL June 9.
- Had reconstructive surgery to the ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow June 19...the surgery was performed in New York City by Dr. David Altchek, medical director of the New York Mets.

YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Made his Major League debut March 28 against Seattle in Tokyo with a start in center field...doubled off Felix Hernandez to lead off the bottom of the seventh inning for his first ML hit.
- Hit his first ML home run in the seventh inning March 29 against Seattle in Tokyo, a two-run shot off Shawn Kelley.
- Homered in three consecutive games from March 29 to April 7...became the third player since 1918 to homer in three of his first four Major League games (Trent Oeltjen, ARI 2009 and Mike Jacobs, NYM 2005)...is the ninth player with at least three home runs in his first four games (Jacobs had 4)...the previous fastest an Oakland Athletic reached three career home runs was seven games by Kurt Abbott in 1993 and Mitchell Page in 1977.
- Had multiple RBI games in each of those contests...since 1918, he is the first Athletic and ninth Major Leaguer with three multiple RBI games over his first four career games (last: Wladimir Balentien, 2006-07).
- Struck out at least once in each of his first eight games, which is an Oakland record to start a career...the previous mark was six (Chris Carter, 2010; Brooks Conrad, 2008; Travis Buck, 2007)...matched the longest streak by an Athletic since 1918 (Troy Herriage, 1956; Norm Bass, 1961).

- Hit his fourth home run April 18 at Los Angeles in his 12th game...since 1918, that is the fastest a player has reached four career home runs in Athletics history...the previous best was by Brian Leshar, who did it in 14 games in 1996.
- Did not have a putout a April 25 against Chicago, becoming the first A's outfielder without a putout in a game of 14 or more innings since Stan Javier on May 30, 1988 against New York.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 12 retroactive to May 7 with a muscle strain in his left hand...went 3 for 9 (.333) on a three-game rehab assignment with Triple-A Sacramento from May 28 to 30 and was reinstated from the DL June 1.

BARTOLO COLÓN

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and is in his 15th season in the majors.
- Made each of his first three starts against Seattle to become the first pitcher in Oakland history to make three consecutive starts against one team in the same season without missing a turn in the rotation.

RYAN COOK

- Became the third pitcher in Athletics franchise history to record four strikeouts in an inning April 27 at Baltimore (Blake Stein, 1998; Erik Hiljus, 2001).
- Did not allow a run over his first 21 games and 23.0 innings...that was the longest season-opening scoreless streak by a player on the Athletics Opening Day roster since at least 1918...the previous high was 21.0 innings by Ale Kellner in 1953...had a career-high 24.0 inning scoreless streak dating back to September 28, 2011.

COLLIN COWGILL

- Had a career-high eight-game hitting streak from May 26 to June 5 (13 for 31, .419)

COCO CRISP

- Was the A's 13th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 13 years...had 203 career starts in left entering the season, but none since October 2, 2005.
- Committed his first error since April 25, 2011 on April 7 against Seattle, snapping a 116-game errorless streak...that streak was seventh longest by an outfielder in Oakland history.

FAUTINO DE LOS SANTOS

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and compiled a 3.00 ERA in six relief appearances before he was optioned to Sacramento, April 25.
- Did not retire a batter over his final three outings before his option (5 h, 2 r, 1 er, 2 bb).

JOEY DEVINE

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 retroactive to March 24...underwent "Tommy John" surgery on his right elbow April 10... Dr. James Andrews performed the surgery in Pensacola, Fla., which included an ulnar collateral ligament reconstruction, an ulnar nerve transposition and a debridement of the flexor tendon...also had "Tommy John" surgery on the same elbow April 21, 2009.
- Was transferred to the 60-day DL May 15.

JOSH DONALDSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster but hit just .094 in nine games before he was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento April 23.
- Made nine starts, all at third base, during his first stint...his Major League experience prior to this season included seven games at catcher and two at first base.
- Was recalled May 12 and snapped a career-high tying 0 for 17 streak with his eighth inning double May 14 at Los Angeles (also May 1-13, 2010).
- Went 3 for 4 with two doubles, a home run and five RBI May 18 at San Francisco...the hits, doubles and RBI were all career highs.
- Drew his first walk of the season June 13 at Colorado, snapping a streak of 30 consecutive games without a walk dating back to September 22, 2010...that was the longest streak by an Athletic since

Scott Hemond had a 31-game streak from May 3 to July 2, 1994...it was his first walk since September 19, 2010 at Minnesota.

- Was batting .182 in 19 games during his second stint with the A's when he was optioned to Sacramento June 21.

SEAN DOOLITTLE

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento June 4 and made his major League debut June 5 against Texas (1.1 ip, 3 so)...struck out the first three batters he faced...the last A's pitcher to strike out the first three batters he faced in his career was Blake Stein on May 10, 1998 against Chicago.

PEDRO FIGUEROA

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 21 and made his Major League debut that night against Cleveland...tossed a scoreless ninth and his only base runner (Cunningham walk) was erased on a double play.
- Was optioned to Sacramento May 22 after posting a 2.00 ERA with nine walks in 9.0 innings in eight games.
- Returned to Oakland June 17 and tossed 3.0 scoreless innings that day against San Diego before he was optioned back to Sacramento June 21.

BRIAN FUENTES

- Recorded his 200th career save May 2 at Boston to become the sixth left-handed reliever in Major League history to reach the 200 plateau (Franco, Wagner, Myers, Righetti, Lyle).

GRAHAM GODFREY

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and went 0-3 with a 5.06 ERA in three starts before he was optioned to Sacramento April 21.
- Recalled May 22 and went 0-1 with a 10.80 ERA in two games, one start, before he was sent back to Sacramento May 27.

JONNY GOMES

- Was hit by a Jonathan Braxton pitch with the bases loaded in the bottom of the 12th inning April 11 against Kansas City to force in the winning run in the A's 5-4 victory...it was his second career walk-off hit by pitch (August 21, 2011 vs. Philadelphia)...it was his fifth career walk-off RBI (two home runs, one walk)...it was the third walk-off hit by pitch in Oakland history (Mike Bordick, August 4, 1993 vs. Seattle and Olmedo Saenz, July 20, 2002 vs. Texas).
- Singled in the eighth inning April 19 at Los Angeles after homering for each of his first three hits for the season...is the first player in Oakland history whose first three hits in a season were all home runs.
- Hit the game-winning pinch-hit two-run home run in the seventh inning June 16 against San Diego, his third career pinch hit home run (last: June 28, 2008 at Pittsburgh)...it snapped a 0 for 34 streak as a pinch hitter and was his first pinch hit since August 29, 2010 against Chicago (NL).

LUKE HUGHES

- Was claimed off waivers from Minnesota April 22 and went 1 for 13 (.077) in four games with the A's before he was designated for assignment April 30...cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento May 2.

BRANDON INGE

- Agreed to terms with the A's on a one-year contract April 30 after he was released by Detroit April 26.
- Had four four-RBI game over a five-game span from May 6 to 11...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the second player in Major League history with four games of four or more RBI over a five-game stretch...the other is Lou Gehrig in 1931...now has 14 career games with four or more RBI...drove in 16 runs over that five-game stretch...since 1970, the only other Athletic to drive in 16 runs over a five-game span is Damian Miller (June 6-11, 2004).

- Had the game-ending grand slam in the bottom of the ninth inning May 8 against Toronto...it was his seventh career "walk-off" home run and his 10th "walk-off plate appearance (two singles, one sacrifice fly)...it was the sixth "walk-off" grand slam in Oakland history (Tenace, 1973; Armas, 1980; McGwire, 1990 and 1995; Ellis, 2008).
- Added another grand slam May 10 against Detroit...is just the second player in Athletics history to hit two grand slams over a three-game span...the other is Jimmie Foxx (September 22 and 24, 1932)...now has seven career grand slams.
- Had 17 RBI in his first 10 games with the A's...those are the most in Oakland history by a player in his first 10 games with the A's...the previous best was 15 by Mitchell Page (1977) and Jack Cust (2007).
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 17 retroactive to May 13 with a strained right groin... it is his second stint on the disabled list this year as he began the season on Detroit's DL with a strained left groin.
- Went 5 for 5 with three runs, two doubles, two home runs (including a grand slam) and seven RBI in a start at third base for Triple-A Sacramento May 26 against Reno in the second game of his two-game rehab assignment.
- Was reinstated from the DL May 29.

KILA KA'AIHUE

- Matched his career high with three hits April 15 at Seattle (third time, last: Sept. 28, 2010 vs. Minnesota).
- Had the game-winning RBI single in the 14th inning April 25 against Chicago, his second career walk-off hit (home run, April 1, 2011 vs. Los Angeles-AL).
- Was batting .234 with four home runs and 14 RBI in 39 games when he was designated for assignment June 6...cleared waivers and was outrighted to Triple-A Sacramento June 16.

BRANDON MCCARTHY

- Made his first career Opening Day start March 28 against Seattle and had a no decision in the A's 3-1, 11-inning loss...allowed just one run on six hits and no walks in 7.0 innings.
- Also started the third game of the season, April 6 against Seattle, to become the second pitcher in Oakland history to start two of the A's first three games...the other is Joe Blanton who did it in 2008, the other time the A's opened the season in Japan...also started three of the first seven games, joining Blanton as the only Oakland pitchers to do that since 1977.

JIM MILLER

- Picked up his first Major League win April 25 against Chicago...allowed two inherited runners to score in the top of the 14th inning but the A's came back with three in the bottom of the inning.
- Was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento May 11 after posting a 1.93 ERA in six relief appearances with the A's.
- Returned to Oakland May 20.

TOMMY MILONE

- Combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit).

BRANDON MOSS

- Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 6 after batting .286 with 15 home runs and 33 RBI in 51 games with the River Cats...the home runs were tied for second in the Pacific Coast League and tied for sixth in all of minor league baseball at the time of his promotion.
- Homered June 7 against Texas, his first since September 2, 2009 at Cincinnati...it snapped a career-high 49-game homerless streak.
- Had his first career two-homer game June 12 at Colorado.

- Homered in all three games of the Colorado series June 12-14 and had four home runs total...is the first Athletic to hit four home runs in a three-game series since Geronimo Berroa against Minnesota, August 12-14, 1996.
- Matched his career-high with three hits (fifth time, first since June 20, 2009 at Colorado) and three RBI (fourth time, second time this year: June 12 at Colorado) June 14 at Colorado.
- Homered in four consecutive games June 12-15...it was the 20th time in Oakland history a player homered in at least four straight games...hit five home runs during the stretch to become the second Athletic since 2000 to hit five home runs over a four-game span (Jack Cust, May 10-13, 2007).
- Became the second player in Athletics history to hit six home runs in his first nine games with the club (Jack Cust, 2007).

JORDAN NORBERTO

- Retired the final two batters May 1 at Boston for his first Major League save...he saved Jarrod Parker's first ML win, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 4 retroactive to May 31 with a strained left shoulder...made one rehab appearance with Triple-A Sacramento June 19 and was reinstated June 21.

DEREK NORRIS

- Was recalled from Sacramento June 21 after batting .273 with eight home runs and 36 RBI in 55 games in his Triple-A debut...made his Major League debut with a start at catcher that day against Los Angeles (NL) and went 0 for 3.

CLIFF PENNINGTON

- Doubled in the second inning June 4 against Texas to snap a career-high 0 for 29 streak (previous: 0 for 27, May 22-June 1, 2010).
- Went 3 for 3 June 15, his 28th birthday...is 6 for 12 (.500) with one double, one triple, four RBI and four runs scored in three career games on his birthday.

ANTHONY RECKER

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and hit .129 in 13 games as the back-up to Kurt Suzuki before he was optioned to Sacramento May 28.

JOSH REDDICK

- Was the A's fifth different Opening Day starter in right field in the last five years.
- Had career highs May 11 against Detroit with four runs, four hits (tied), two home runs and five RBI...is the eighth player in Oakland history with at least four runs, four hits, two home runs and five RBI in a game...the last was Matt Holliday (July 20, 2009 vs. Minnesota).
- Hit 10 home runs in May, which tied for third in the AL...is the first Athletic to hit 10 home runs in a month since Frank Thomas had 10 in September, 2006...also tied for fourth in the AL in runs in May (20) and tied for fifth in walks (17).

ADAM ROSALES

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and appeared in one game against Seattle in Japan before he was optioned to Sacramento April 2.
- Returned to Oakland May 17 but was optioned back to Sacramento June 16..

TYSON ROSS

- Began the season at Triple-A Sacramento and was 0-1 with a 4.00 ERA in two starts with the River Cats before he was recalled by Oakland April 17.
- Went 2-6 with a 6.51 ERA in nine starts with the A's before he was optioned back to Sacramento May 31.
- Returned on June 16 to start against San Diego and allowed two runs on one hit and four walks in 6.0 innings in a no decision...was optioned back to Sacramento the next day.

EVAN SCRIBNER

- Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 6 after posting a 3.31 ERA and six saves in 23 relief appearances with the River Cats.
- Tossed 3.0 scoreless innings June 15 against San Diego and recorded his first Major League save in the A's 10-2 win.
- Was optioned to Sacramento, June 16.

SCOTT SIZEMORE

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 3 after tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee in the team's first full-squad workout Feb. 27 in Phoenix...underwent successful reconstructive surgery March 21...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg of the Arizona Sports Medicine Center of Scottsdale...will miss the entire 2012 season.

SETH SMITH

- Was the A's eight different Opening Day starter at designated hitter in the last eight years.
- Hit his first home run of the season April 22 against Cleveland, a two-run shot off Masterson in the fourth inning, to snap a career-high 45-game homerless streak...his previous high was 35 (June 22-July 31, 2011)...it was his first home run since Aug. 23, 2011 against Houston.
- Went 0 for 4 with four strikeouts April 30 at Boston, the first four-strikeout game of his career.
- Went 4 for 5 on June 4 against Texas, his second career four-hit game (also September 4, 2009 vs. Arizona).

ERIC SOGARD

KURT SUZUKI

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at catcher...the five starts are second most by a catcher in Oakland history...only Terry Steinbach, with nine, has more.
- Made his 598th career appearance at catcher April 7 against Seattle, which moves him past Ossee Schreckengost for fifth most in Athletics history.
- Had five assists April 25 against Chicago, the third time in Oakland history a catcher had five or more assists in a game (6, Jim Essian vs. Texas on Sept. 19, 1979; 5, Jeff Newman vs. Toronto on Aug. 13, 1979).

RICH THOMPSON

- Was claimed off waivers from the Los Angeles Angels April 20 and appeared in one game for the A's before he was designated for assignment April 25...faced Chicago on April 23 (0.2 ip, 1 h).
- Cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento April 27.

NEIL WAGNER

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 17 but did not appear in a game before he was optioned back to Sacramento April 20.
- Was claimed off waivers by San Diego May 28.

JEMILE WEEKS

- Played in the 100th game of his career April 6 against Seattle and collected 126 hits over that span...since 1918, the only player in Athletics history with more hits over the first 100 games of his career is Wally Moses, who had 134 hits in his first 100 games with the Philadelphia A's in 1935-36...the previous Oakland record was 122 by Ben Grieve.
