The A's lead the season series 2-1 after taking two of three in Boston earlier this year...the two wins match the A's season total against the Red Sox from last year...are 29-29 against the Red Sox since 2006...that includes 18-10 in Oakland and 11-20 at Fenway...are 221-275 since moving to Oakland in 1968...that includes 129-114 in Oakland, 91-160 in Boston and 1-1 in Tokyo...all-time, the A's are 863-1056 against the Red Sox

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Ryan Cook ranks second among AL relievers in opponents batting average (.106) and opponents slugging percentage (.159) and is eighth in ERA (1.54).

Yoenis Céspedes has hit safely in each of his last six games, which is the longest hitting streak of his career (9 for 22, .409).

Brandon Moss has hit eight home runs in 21 games...that is tied with Jack Cust (2007) for second most in Oakland history by a player in his first 21 games with the A's (Dave Kingman, 10 in 1984).

Derek Norris went 0 for 3 in his Major League debut but has hit safely in each of his six games since then (9 for 24, .375).

Josh Reddick has 18 home runs and is the second Athletic since 2003 with at least 18 home runs by the end of June (Swisher, 19 in 2006)...has eight assists, which are the most by an A's right fielder since 1999 (Matt Stairs, 13).

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1969** Reggie Jackson hits three home runs in the A's 5-0 win against Seattle...the three-homer game is the first in Oakland history and it gives Reggie 33 round trippers in the A's first 72 games...in **1996** Mark McGwire hits his 303rd career home run to break Jimmie Foxx's all-time Athletics record of 302...also, Jason Giambi is a perfect 5 for 5 in the A's 11-6 victory at Seattle...he has three singles and a pair of doubles. ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Lost three of four at Texas after going 11-4 over the previous 15 games...are now 16-12 over the last 28 games after losing a season-high nine consecutive contests...are in third place in the American League West for the 20th consecutive day and trail Texas by 12 games...have spent one day tied for first this year, 30 days in second, eight days tied for second, 31 days in third, eight days tied for third and 11 days in fourth...have lost two of the last three series after winning three series in a row.

PITCHING: The A's have allowed two runs or fewer in 10 of the last 17 games...have a 2.60 ERA (43 er in 149.0 ip) and .195 (103 for 528) opponents batting average over that span...now have a 3.52 ERA for the season, which is the **lowest mark in the American League**...have the allowed the fewest home runs in the AL (64), have the second lowest opponents slugging percentage (.375), are tied for second in shutouts (8) and rank fourth in opponents batting (.243)...however, have the fourth most walks (261) and second fewest strikeouts (504).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 7-4 with a 1.97 ERA (23 er in 105.1 ip) and .183 (67 for 367) opponents batting average over the last 17 games...have allowed three hits or fewer in nine of those games and one earned run or fewer 11 times...now have a 3.78 ERA (201 er in 478.1 ip) for the season, which ranks third in the American League.

THE LONG BALL: Brandon Moss homered in the seventh inning yesterday to extend the A's streak of consecutive games with a home run to 12 (16 home runs total)...that is the longest such streak by an A's team since June 9-22, 2007 when they also homered in 12 straight games...have not had a longer streak since April 27-May 12, 2004 when they did it in 14 straight games...have hit 77 home runs for the season, which is their most before the All-Star Break since 2007 when they had 91...hit just 50 home runs before the break last year and 57 in 2010...35 of the A's 77 home runs have come with two outs, which is tied for third most in the American League.

OFFENSE: The A's rank last in the majors in batting (.224), have the third lowest on-base percentage (.302) and fourth lowest slugging percentage (.365)...lead the American League in fewest runs scored (300) and most strikeouts (640)...rank second in stolen bases (62) and tied for third in walks (277)...are batting .314 (66 for 210) with runners in scoring position over the last 26 games after hitting .209 over the first 54 contests...have been shut out a Major League leading 11 times...were shut out 15 times last year and those were the most times the A's were shutout in a season since 1979 (17)...lead the majors in pitches per plate appearance (4.00).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have committed at least one error in each of the five games (seven errors total), which is their longest streak of the season...have turned 83 double plays, which is tied for third in the American League...A's outfielders have 17 assists, which ranks second in the AL (Kansas City, 20).

PLAYERS USED: Chris Carter became the 43rd player to appear in a game for the A's this year on Friday, which is second most in the majors to San Diego (47)...last year, the A's used 48 players, which was their fewest since 2006 (40)...Carter is the 17th rookie, which is the most in the majors and three more than the A's season total from last year...currently have 10 rookies on the roster (Carter, Céspedes, Cook, Doolittle, Griffin, Miller, Milone, Norris, Parker, Scribner).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's begin a six-game homestand tonight against Boston (three games) and Seattle (three games) that leads into the All-Star Break...it begins a stretch where the A's will play 12 of the next 15 and 22 of the next 31 games at home...went 6-3 on the last homestand against San Diego (2-1), Los Angeles (3-0) and San Francisco (1-2) and have won eight of the last 11 home games...went 3-4 on the last road trip to Seattle (2-1) and Texas (1-3)...are 19-19 at home compared to 19-23 on the road...the pitching staff has a 2.99 ERA (117 er in 352.2 ip) at home compared to 4.04 (162 er in 360.2 ip) on the road...the home ERA is the lowest in the American League while the road ERA ranks seventh.

ALL-STAR: Ryan Cook was named as the A's lone representative to the American League All-Star team yesterday...it is his first career All-Star selection...he is the seventh Oakland rookie to be named to the American League All-Star team, along with Wayne Gross (1977), Matt Keough (1978), Jose Canseco (1986), Mark McGwire (1987), Ben Grieve (1998) and Andrew Bailey (2009)...this marks the ninth consecutive season the A's have not sent a position player to the All-Star Game.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's lost Saturday, 7-2, after each of their previous seven losses came by one run...that was the longest such streak in Oakland history (previous: 6, May 14-24, 1969)...are 8-12 (.400) in one-run games for the season, which is the second worst record in the American League...are 4-2 in extra inning games and rank third in the AL in extra inning wins...are 12-10 in games decided in the seventh inning or later, including 9-9 in the last at bat...have five "walk-off" wins this year, which is two more than last year...have four losses when leading after eight innings, which is tied with Miami for the most such losses in the majors.

A's IN JUNE: The A's went 15-13 (.536) in June, finishing with a winning record in the month for the first time since 2008 (16-10)...the 15 wins are their most in any month since going 16-12 in May, 2010...A's hitters ranked first in the American League in walks (103) and strikeouts (231), were second in triples (7) and tied for third in home runs (34)...the 231 strikeouts were the second highest single-month total in Oakland history (233 in August, 2008)...the 34 home runs were the A's most in a month since August, 2007 (36)...scored 133 runs, which were the A's most in one month since September, 2009 (167)...the pitching staff had the lowest opponents batting average (.229) and slugging percentage (.342) in the AL and had the third lowest ERA (3.32)...however, allowed 92 walks, which was second most.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list 14 times and currently have eight players on the DL (Anderson, Braden, Carignan, Colón, Cowgill, Devine, McCarthy, Sizemore)...the eight players matches the season high (also May 18-20)...three of those players will miss the remainder of the season (Carignan, Devine, Sizemore)...the A's used the DL 15 times last year, which was the fewest since 2006 when they also used it 15 times...used the DL a total of 87 times from 2007-10...have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had just one.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 13th start of the season, the 14th of his career...the A's are 6-6 (.500) in his starting assignments and his teams are 7-6 (.538) in his career...has tossed at least six innings in nine of his 12 starts, allowed two runs or fewer 10 times and walked two batters or fewer five times.

ONE RUN OR FEWER: Has allowed one run or fewer in six of his last seven starts and is 3-1 with a 1.76 ERA (9 er in 46.0 ip) and .181 (28 for 155) opponents batting average over that span...has allowed one run or fewer in nine of his 13 career starts...since 1918, the only other starting pitcher to allow one run or fewer in nine of their first 13 games is Dwight Gooden in 11

their first 13 games is Dwight Gooden in 1984 (Gooden allowed two runs in his 14th start)...has allowed no runs in four of his starts and has yielded more than two runs just twice.

QUALIFICATIONS: Has tossed 73.2 innings, which is 6.1 innings short of qualifying for the league leaders...based on a minimum of 60 innings pitched, he ranks fifth in the American League in ERA (2.57) and sixth in opponents batting average (.205)...has allowed just three home runs for an average of 0.37 per nine innings, which is the lowest in the AL...is third in opponents slugging (.298).

ROOKIE LEADERS: Ranks fifth among American League rookies in innings (73.2), sixth in starts (12) and strikeouts (58) and tied for seventh in wins (4)...his 2.57 ERA and .205 opponents batting average are the lowest among Major League rookies with 50 or more innings.

IN JUNE: Was 3-1 with a 2.18 ERA and .174 opponents batting average in five starts in the month of June...the batting average was second lowest in the American League, the ERA ranked seventh and the wins tied for seventh.

AGAINST RIGHT-HANDERS: Has not allowed a hit to a right-handed batter in his last two starts (0 for 14) and they are batting .194 (24 for 124) for the season, which ranks third lowest in the American League...has not surrendered a home run to a right-hander in his career and his .250 opponents slugging percentage against righties this year is the lowest in the AL and second lowest in the majors (Cueto, CIN .241)...has issued just 12 of his 36 walks to right-handers.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Opponents are 12 for 71 (.169) with six walks (.234 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...the batting average and on-base percentage are second lowest in the American League...has held the opponents number four hitter to a .125 (4 for 32) batting average, which is the lowest mark in the AL and second lowest in the majors (Bass, SD .111)...has allowed a .184 (9 for 49) batting average with runners in scoring position...has yielded a .180 (33 for 183) batting average the first two times through the lineup and .267 (20 for 75) after that...has issued 36 walks, an average of 4.40 per nine innings.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 1-1 with a 1.58 ERA (7 er in 40.0 ip) and .196 (27 for 138) opponents batting average in six starts at home compared to 3-2 with a 3.74 ERA (14 er in 33.2 ip) and .217 (26 for 120) opponents batting average in six starts on the road...has the third lowest home ERA in the American League and the seventh lowest opponents batting average.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to start on four days rest today...is 2-3 with a 3.83 ERA (17 er in 40.0 ip) in seven starts on four days rest or fewer and 2-0 with a 1.07 ERA (4 er in 33.2 ip) in five starts on five days rest or more.

2012 HIGHLIGHTS: Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 25 and had a no decision in his A's debut, a 5-4, 14-inning win over Chicago April 25 in Oakland ... shutout the White Sox on five hits and a walks over the first six innings to extend his career-opening scoreless streak to 11.2 innings...had a 2-0 lead when he allowed a RBI double to Fukudome in the seventh inning...Balfour allowed a run in the ninth inning for the blown save...earned his first Major League win in the A's 5-3 victory at Boston **May 1**...had a 5-0 lead when he allowed his only run in the fourth inning...Norberto recorded the save, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas...is just the second pitcher since 1990 to begin his career with three consecutive outings of five or more innings and one run or fewer...the other is Rich Harden, who did it for the A's from July 21 to 31, 2003...had a no decision in the A's 7-3 win over Toronto May 8 in Oakland...issued a career-high five walks in seven innings...was charged with the first loss of his career in the A's 3-1 loss to Detroit **May 13** in Oakland...the score was tied at 1-1 when he loaded the bases in the sixth...was relieved by Balfour, who walked in the go-ahead run...was the losing pitcher in the A's 8-6 loss at San Francisco May 18 ... allowed a career-high six runs in a career-low 2.0 innings ... had a no decision in the A's 3-2 loss at Minnesota May 29...tossed 6.0 scoreless innings but Fuentes allowed a three-run "walkoff" home run to Willingham for the blown save and loss...was the winning pitcher in the A's 12-1 win over Texas June 4 in Oakland...tossed a career-high 8.0 shutout innings and yielded just one hit, a Young singled to lead off the eighth innings...was the losing pitcher in the A's 8-3 loss at Arizona June 9...allowed a career-high eight hits and matched his career highs with six runs and five walks...allowed a RBI single to Kubel in the first, snapping his career-high scoreless streak at 18.0 innings...had a no decision in the A's 5-4 loss to San Francisco **June 22** in Oakland...left with a 3-1 lead but Cook allowed four runs in the ninth inning for the blown save and loss.

LAST START: He extended his winning streak to two games in the A's 2-1 win at Seattle last Wednesday...it is the first winning streak of his career...struck out a career-high nine batters...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a solo home run to Jaso with one out in the bottom of the second inning...that was the only run he would allow in seven innings.

PARKER vs. BOSTON: Earned his first Major League win in his only start against the Red Sox, a 5-3 victory at Boston May 1...had a 5-0 lead when he allowed his only run in the fourth inning...Pedroia led off with single, went to second on wild pitch, third on a ground out and then scored on an Ortiz ground out...Norberto recorded the save, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.

WITH SACRAMENTO: Was 1-0 with a 2.18 ERA in four starts (20.2 ip, 22 h, 6 r, 5 er, 6 bb, 21 so, 2 hr)...struck out 21 batters in 20.2 innings...allowed a .275 opponents batting average, including .271 (13 for 48) against right-handed hitter and .281 (9 for 32) against left-handers...surrendered both of his home runs to lefties...opponents were 4 for 29 (.138) with runners in scoring position.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Bartolo Colón (4-3, 2.57 ERA): Is scheduled to be reinstated from the disabled list to make his 17th start of the season...was placed on the 15-day DL June 23 retroactive to June 18 with a strained right oblique...went 3-5 with a 5.74 ERA and .338 opponents batting average over his last nine starts before the injury after going 3-2 with a 2.53 ERA and .214 opponents batting average over his first six starts...has walked one batter or fewer in 10 of his 15 starts and his average of 1.61 walks per nine innings is second lowest in the American League...has received run support of two runs or fewer in nine of his 15 starts and his season run support average of 3.61 is fifth lowest in the AL...was the losing pitcher in his last start, a 2-1 loss to San Diego June 17 in Oakland (2.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 so)...is 8-11 with a 4.08 ERA in 25 career appearances against Boston, including 24 starts.

Save/Save Opportunities: 21/31 (67.7%) 10-9, 2.99 ERA (235.0 ip, 177 h, 85 r, 78 er, 114 bb, 199 so, 17 hr) The A's bullpen is 1-3 with three saves, two blown saves and a 5.26 ERA (15 er in 25.2 ip) over the past 10 games after going 3-0 with five saves, one blown save and a 1.48 ERA in its previous nine games...has a 2.99 ERA for the season, which ranks third in the American League...has the lowest opponents batting average (.211) and slugging percentage (.327)...has allowed the second most walks (114)...has 82 strikeouts in 81.2 innings over its last 30 games (9.3 per nine innings) after fanning 117 in 153.1 innings over the first 49 contests (6.9 per nine innings).

Is tied for the American League lead in games pitched (39) and tied for seventh among AL relievers in innings pitched (39.1)...is tied for fourth

- among AL relievers in walks (18) and tied for eighth in losses (2).
- Has a 0.95 ERA (2 er in 19.0 ip) in 18 appearances at home compared to a 5.75 ERA (13 er in 20.1 ip) in 21 outings on the road.
- First batters faced are 10 for 33 (.303) with six walks for a .410 on-base percentage...the six walks are tied for second most among AL relievers and the on-base percentage fourth seventh highest.
- Has faced Boston once this year, May 1 (0.1 ip, 3 h, 2 r, 2 er, 1 bb, 1 so)...is 2-0 with two saves but has a 5.79 ERA in 30 career games against the Red Sox (32.2 ip, 34 h, 21 r, 21 er, 21 bb, 30 so, 2 hr)...the ERA is his highest against any AL team. His last save was May 5 and it was the 17th of his career, tying Graeme Lloyd for the most in Major League history by an Australian-born pitcher.
- Was used mostly as a setup man with Oakland last year, posting a 5-2 record with two saves, a 2.47 ERA and .199 opponents average in 62 appearances...tied for eighth among AL relievers in grounded into double plays (8) and ranked 10th in opponents on-base percentage (.266).

DARIC BARTON

- Homered in the fifth inning April 17 at Los Angeles to snap a career-high 76-game homerless streak...it was his first home run since Oct. 1, 2010 against Seattle...the home run also snapped a 72-game homerless streak as a first baseman, which was second longest in Oakland history...the record is 75 by Mike Hegan from July 6, 1971 to Aug. 16, 1973.
- Was batting .198 with one home run and four RBI in 37 games when he was optioned to Sacramento June 2.

JERRY BLEVINS

• Had his career-high 10.1-inning scoreless streak dating back to last season snapped April 7 against Seattle when Saunders homered in the sixth inning.

DALLAS BRADEN

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 as he continues his recovery from left shoulder surgery.
- Was transferred to the 60-day disabled list April 22.

ANDREW CARIGNAN

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and posted a 6.23 ERA in five relief appearances before he was
 optioned to Sacramento April 17.
- Recalled for a second time May 11 and allowed two runs in 2.0 innings over two outings before he was sent back to Sacramento May 16.
- Joined the A's for a third time May 27 and did not allow a run in four games (3.1 ip, 2 h, 2 bb, 4 so) before he was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 6 with a sprained ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow...was transferred to the 60-day DL June 9.
- Had reconstructive surgery to the ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow June 19...the surgery
 was performed in New York City by Dr. David Altchek, medical director of the New York Mets.

YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Made his Major League debut March 28 against Seattle in Tokyo with a start in center field... doubled off Felix Hernandez to lead off the bottom of the seventh inning for his first ML hit.
- Hit his first ML home run in the seventh inning March 29 against Seattle in Tokyo, a two-run shot off Shawn Kelley.
- Homered in three consecutive games from March 29 to April 7...became the third player since 1918 to homer in three of his first four Major League games (Trent Oeltjen, ARI 2009 and Mike Jacobs, NYM 2005)...is the ninth player with at least three home runs in his first four games (Jacobs had 4)...the previous fastest an Oakland Athletic reached three career home runs was seven games by Kurt Abbott in 1993 and Mitchell Page in 1977.
- Had multiple RBI games in each of those contests...since 1918, he is the first Athletic and ninth Major Leaguer with three multiple RBI games over his first four career games (last: Wladimir Balentien, 2006-07).
- Struck out at least once in each of his first eight games, which is an Oakland record to start a career... the previous mark was six (Chris Carter, 2010; Brooks Conrad, 2008; Travis Buck, 2007)...matched the longest streak by an Athletic since 1918 (Troy Herriage, 1956; Norm Bass, 1961).

- Hit his fourth home run April 18 at Los Angeles in his 12th game...since 1918, that is the fastest a player has reached four career home runs in Athletics history...the previous best was by Brian Lesher, who did it in 14 games in 1996.
- Did not have a putout a April 25 against Chicago, becoming the first A's outfielder without a putout in a game of 14 or more innings since Stan Javier on May 30, 1988 against New York.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 12 retroactive to May 7 with a muscle strain in his left hand...went 3 for 9 (.333) on a three-game rehab assignment with Triple-A Sacramento from May 28 to 30 and was reinstated from the DL June 1.
- Had his first career game-ending hit June 21 against Los Angeles (NL), a three-run "walk-off" home run.

BARTOLO COLÓN

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and is in his 15th season in the majors.
- Made each of his first three starts against Seattle to become the first pitcher in Oakland history to
 make three consecutive starts against one team in the same season without missing a turn in the
 rotation.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 23 retroactive to June 18 with a strained right oblique.

RYAN COOK

- Became the third pitcher in Athletics franchise history to record four strikeouts in an inning April 27 at Baltimore (Blake Stein, 1998; Erik Hiljus, 2001).
- Did not allow a run over his first 21 games and 23.0 innings...that was the longest season-opening scoreless streak by a player on the Athletics Opening Day roster since at least 1918...the previous high was 21.0 innings by Ale Kellner in 1953...had a career-high 24.0 inning scoreless streak dating back to September 28, 2011.

COLLIN COWGILL

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and went 0 for 4 with three wakls in three games before he was
 optioned to Sacramento April 17.
- · Was recalled by Oakland May 11
- Had a career-high eight-game hitting streak from May 26 to June 5 (13 for 31, .419).
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 23 with a sprained left ankle.

COCO CRISP

- Was the A's 13th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 13 years...had 203 career starts in left entering the season, but none since October 2, 2005.
- Committed his first error since April 25, 2011 on April 7 against Seattle, snapping a 116-game errorless streak...that streak was seventh longest by an outfielder in Oakland history.
- Stole three bases June 19 against Los Angeles (NL)...it was his fifth career game of three or more steals, his fourth with the A's...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (45) and Bert Campaneris (10) have more three-steal games.
- Was caught stealing after being picked off in the first inning June 21 against Los Angeles (NL), his first caught stealing since July 10, 2011 at Texas...that ended his Athletics record streak of 36 consecutive stolen bases without a caught stealing (caught stealing became an official stat in 1920)... broke the previous mark of 28 set by Stan Javier (May 31-October 1, 1995).

FAUTINO DE LOS SANTOS

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and compiled a 3.00 ERA in six relief appearances before he was
 optioned to Sacramento, April 25.
- Did not retire a batter over his final three outings before his option (5 h, 2 r, 1 er, 2 bb).

JOEY DEVINE

Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 retroactive to March 24...underwent "Tommy John" surgery on his right elbow April 10... Dr. James Andrews performed the surgery in Pensacola, Fla., which included an ulnar collateral ligament reconstruction, an ulnar nerve transposition and a debridement of the flexor tendon...also had "Tommy John" surgery on the same elbow April 21, 2009.

• Was transferred to the 60-day DL May 15.

JOSH DONALDSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster but hit just .094 in nine games before he was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento April 23.
- Made nine starts, all at third base, during his first stint...his Major League experience prior to this season included seven games at catcher and two at first base.
- Was recalled May 12 and snapped a career-high tying 0 for 17 streak with his eighth inning double May 14 at Los Angeles (also May 1-13, 2010).
- Went 3 for 4 with two doubles, a home run and five RBI May 18 at San Francisco...the hits, doubles and RBI were all career highs.
- Drew his first walk of the season June 13 at Colorado, snapping a streak of 30 consecutive games without a walk dating back to September 22, 2010...that was the longest streak by an Athletic since Scott Hemond had a 31-game streak from May 3 to July 2, 1994...it was his first walk since September 19, 2010 at Minnesota.
- Was batting .182 in 19 games during his second stint with the A's when he was optioned to Sacramento June 21.

SEAN DOOLITTLE

 Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento June 4 and made his major League debut June 5 against Texas (1.1 ip, 3 so)...struck out the first three batters he faced...the last A's pitcher to strike out the first three batters he faced in his career was Blake Stein on May 10, 1998 against Chicago.

PEDRO FIGUEROA

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 21 and made his Major League debut that night against Cleveland...tossed a scoreless ninth and his only base runner (Cunningham walk) was erased on a double play.
- Was optioned to Sacramento May 22 after posting a 2.00 ERA with nine walks in 9.0 innings in eight games.
- Returned to Oakland June 17 and tossed 3.0 scoreless innings that day against San Diego before he was optioned back to Sacramento June 21.

BRIAN FUENTES

 Recorded his 200th career save May 2 at Boston to become the sixth left-handed reliever in Major League history to reach the 200 plateau (Franco, Wagner, Myers, Righetti, Lyle).

GRAHAM GODFREY

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and went 0-3 with a 5.06 ERA in three starts before he was
 optioned to Sacramento April 21.
- Recalled May 22 and went 0-1 with a 10.80 ERA in two games, one start, before he was sent back to Sacramento May 27.

JONNY GOMES

- Was hit by a Jonathan Braxton pitch with the bases loaded in the bottom of the 12th inning April 11 against Kansas City to force in the winning run in the A's 5-4 victory...it was his second career walk-off hit by pitch (August 21, 2011 vs. Philadelphia)...it was his fifth career walk-off RBI (two home runs, one walk)...it was the third walk-off hit by pitch in Oakland history (Mike Bordick, August 4, 1993 vs. Seattle and Olmedo Saenz, July 20, 2002 vs. Texas).
- Singled in the eighth inning April 19 at Los Angeles after homering for each of his first three hits for the season...is the first player in Oakland history whose first three hits in a season were all home runs.
- Hit the game-winning pinch-hit two-run home run in the seventh inning June 16 against San Diego, his third career pinch hit home run (last: June 28, 2008 at Pittsburgh)...it snapped a 0 for 34 streak as a pinch hitter and was his first pinch hit since August 29, 2010 against Chicago (NL).

A.J. GRIFFIN

• Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 24 and made his Major League debut that day with a start against San Francisco.

BRANDON HICKS

- Was claimed off waivers from Atlanta March 13 and was optioned to Sacramento March 15.
- Recalled by Oakland June 23 after batting .272 with 13 home runs and 48 RBI in 65 games with the River Cats... was tied for the Pacific Coast League lead in hit by pitches (7) at the time of his promotion...also ranked second in strikeouts (76), fifth in extra base hits (37), tied for sixth in doubles (21), eighth in home runs (13), ninth in runs (49) and 10th in RBI (48) and slugging (.548).

LUKE HUGHES

• Was claimed off waivers from Minnesota April 22 and went 1 for 13 (.077) in four games with the A's before he was designated for assignment April 30...cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento May 2.

BRANDON INGE

- Agreed to terms with the A's on a one-year contract April 30 after he was released by Detroit April 26.
- Had four four-RBI game over a five-game span from May 6 to 11...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the second player in Major League history with four games of four or more RBI over a five-game stretch...the other is Lou Gehrig in 1931...now has 14 career games with four or more RBI...drove in 16 runs over that five-game stretch...since 1970, the only other Athletic to drive in 16 runs over a five-game span is Damian Miller (June 6-11, 2004).
- Had the game-ending grand slam in the bottom of the ninth inning May 8 against Toronto...it was his seventh career "walk-off" home run and his 10th "walk-off plate appearance (two singles, one sacrifice fly)...it was the sixth "walk-off" grand slam in Oakland history (Tenace, 1973; Armas, 1980; McGwire, 1990 and 1995; Ellis, 2008).
- Added another grand slam May 10 against Detroit...is just the second player in Athletics history to hit two grand slams over a three-game span...the other is Jimmie Foxx (September 22 and 24, 1932)...now has seven career grand slams.
- Had 17 RBI in his first 10 games with the A's...those are the most in Oakland history by a player in his first 10 games with the A's...the previous best was 15 by Mitchell Page (1977) and Jack Cust (2007).
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 17 retroactive to May 13 with a strained right groin... it is his second stint on the disabled list this year as he began the season on Detroit's DL with a strained left groin.
- Went 5 for 5 with three runs, two doubles, two home runs (including a grand slam) and seven RBI in a start at third base for Triple-A Sacramento May 26 against Reno in the second game of his twogame rehab assignment.
- Was reinstated from the DL May 29.

KILA KA'AIHUE

- Matched his career high with three hits April 15 at Seattle (third time, last: Sept. 28, 2010 vs. Minnesota).
- Had the game-winning RBI single in the 14th inning April 25 against Chicago, his second career walk-off hit (home run, April 1, 2011 vs. Los Angeles-AL).
- Was batting .234 with four home runs and 14 RBI in 39 games when he was designated for assignment June 6...cleared waivers and was outrighted to Triple-A Sacramento June 16.

BRANDON MCCARTHY

- Made his first career Opening Day start March 28 against Seattle and had a no decision in the A's 3-1, 11-inning loss...allowed just one run on six hits and no walks in 7.0 innings.
- Also started the third game of the season, April 6 against Seattle, to become the second pitcher in Oakland history to start two of the A's first three games...the other is Joe Blanton who did it in 2008, the other time the A's opened the season in Japan...also started three of the first seven games, joining Blaton as the only Oakland pitchers to do that since 1977.

JIM MILLER

- Picked up his first Major League win April 25 against Chicago...allowed two inherited runners to score in the top of the 14th inning but the A's came back with three in the bottom of the inning.
- Was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento May 11 afte posting a 1.93 ERA in six relief appearances with the A's.
- Returned to Oakland May 20.

TOMMY MILONE

 Combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit).

BRANDON MOSS

- Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 6 after batting .286 with 15 home runs and 33 RBI in 51 games with the River Cats...the home runs were tied for second in the Pacific Coast League and tied for sixth in all of minor league baseball at the time of his promotion.
- Homered June 7 against Texas, his first since September 2, 2009 at Cincinnati...it snapped a careerhigh 49-game homerless streak.
- · Had his first career two-homer game June 12 at Colorado.
- Homered in all three games of the Colorado series June 12-14 and had four home runs total...is the first Athletic to hit four home runs in a three-game series since Geronimo Berroa against Minnesota, August 12-14, 1996.
- Matched his career-high with three hits (fifth time, first since June 20, 2009 at Colorado) and three RBI (fourth time, second time this year: June 12 at Colorado) June 14 at Colorado.
- Homered in four consecutive games June 12-15...it was the 20th time in Oakland history a player homered in at least four straight games...hit five home runs during the stretch to become the second Athletic since 2000 to hit five home runs over a four-game span (Jack Cust, May 10-13, 2007).
- Became the second player in Athletics history to hit six home runs in his first nine games with the club (Jack Cust, 2007).
- Hit six home runs in interleague play, which tied for fifth in the majors and matched the Oakland interleague record set by Miguel Tejada in 2000.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of June 11-17...batted .348 with three doubles, five home runs, 10 RBI and seven runs scored in six games...it was his first Player of the Week award.
- Committed three errors in the sixth inning June 23 against San Francisco, tying the Major League
 record for most errors by a first baseman in an inning...it was the seventh time, the first since Jack
 Clark did it for St. Louis on May 25, 1987...since 1984, the only other Athletic to commit three errors in an inning is Kurt Abbott on May 10, 1998 vs. Chicago at shortstop.
- The three errors set an Oakland record for errors in a game by a first baseman...is the first Athletics first baseman to commit three errors in a game since Lou Limmer on August 19, 1954 vs. New York.

JORDAN NORBERTO

- Retired the final two batters May 1 at Boston for his first Major League save...he saved Jarrod Parker's first ML win, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.
- Was placed on thw 15-day disabled list June 4 retroactive to May 31 with a strained left shoulder... made one rehab appearance with Triple-A Sacramento June 19 and was reinstated June 21.

DEREK NORRIS

Was recalled from Sacramento June 21 after batting .273 with eight home runs and 36 RBI in 55 games in his Triple-A debut...made his Major League debut with a start at catcher that day against Los Angeles (NL) and went 0 for 3.

- Singled off Madison Bumgarner in the fifth inning June 23 against San Francisco for his first Major League hit...added a RBI single in the ninth inning for his first RBI and first multiple hit game.
- Hit his first Major League home run June 25 against San Francisco, a three-run "walk-off" shot in the bottom of the ninth off Santiago Casilla...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the third player in Athletics history to hit a game-ending home run for his first ML home run...the other two are Dee Miles (September 14, 1939) and George Hendrick (May 28, 1972).

CLIFF PENNINGTON

- Doubled in the second inning June 4 against Texas to snap a career-high 0 for 29 streak (previous: 0 for 27, May 22-June 1, 2010).
- Went 3 for 3 June 15, his 28th birthday... is 6 for 12 (.500) with one double, one triple, four RBI and four runs scored in three career games on his birthday.

ANTHONY RECKER

Was on the A's Opening Day roster and hit .129 in 13 games as the back-up to Kurt Suzuki before he
was optioned to Sacramento May 28.

JOSH REDDICK

- Was the A's fifth different Opening Day starter in right field in the last five years.
- Had career highs May 11 against Detroit with four runs, four hits (tied), two home runs and five RBI...is the eighth player in Oakland history with at least four runs, four hits, two home runs and five RBI in a game...the last was Matt Holliday (July 20, 2009 vs. Minnesota).
- Hit 10 home runs in May, which tied for third in the AL...is the first Athletic to hit 10 home runs in a month since Frank Thomas had 10 in September, 2006...also tied for fourth in the AL in runs in May (20) and tied for fifth in walks (17).
- Matched his career-high with four strikeouts June 29 against the Dodgers (August 4, 2009 at Tampa Bay).

ADAM ROSALES

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and appeared in one game against Seattle in Japan before he was optioned to Sacramento April 2.
- Returned to Oakland May 17 but was optioned ba;ck to Sacramento June 16..

TYSON ROSS

- Began the season at Triple-A Sacramento and was 0-1 with a 4.00 ERA in two starts with the River Cats before he was recalled by Oakland April 17.
- Went 2-6 with a 6.51 ERA in nine starts with the A's before he was optioned back to Sacramento May 31.
- Returned on June 16 to start against San Diego and allowed two runs on one hit and four walks in 6.0 innings in a no decision...was optioned back to Sacramento the next day.
- Returned to Oakland for a third stint June 23.

EVAN SCRIBNER

- Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 6 after posting a 3.31 ERA and six saves in 23 relief appearances with the River Cats.
- Tossed 3.0 scoreless innings June 15 against San Diego and recorded his first Major League save in the A's 10-2 win.
- · Was optioned to Sacramento June 16 but returned to Oakland June 24.

SCOTT SIZEMORE

• Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 3 after tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee in the team's first full-squad workout Feb. 27 in Phoenix...underwent successful reconstructive surgery March 21...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg of the Arizona Sports Medicine Center of Scottsdale...will miss the entire 2012 season.

SETH SMITH

- Was the A's eight different Opening Day starter at designated hitter in the last eight years.
- Hit his first home run of the season April 22 against Cleveland, a two-run shot off Masterson in the fourth inning, to snap a career-high 45-game homerless streak...his previous high was 35 (June 22-July 31, 2011)...it was his first home run since Aug. 23, 2011 against Houston.
- Went 0 for 4 with four strikeouts April 30 at Boston, the first four-strikeout game of his career.
- Went 4 for 5 on June 4 against Texas, his second career four-hit game (also September 4, 2009 vs. Arizona).

ERIC SOGARD

- Had a career-high three RBI, April 15 at Seattle.
- Was optioned to Sacramento May 21 but returned to Oakland June 16...appeared iin just one game before he was optioned back to Sacramento June 24.

KURT SUZUKI

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at catcher...the five starts are second most by a catcher in Oakland history...only Terry Steinbach, with nine, has more.
- Made his 598th career appearance at catcher April 7 against Seattle, which moves him past Ossee Schreckengost for fifth most in Athletics history.
- Had five assists April 25 against Chicago, the third time in Oakland history a catcher had five or more assists in a game (6, Jim Essian vs. Texas on Sept. 19, 1979; 5, Jeff Newman vs. Toronto on Aug. 13, 1979).

RICH THOMPSON

- Was claimed off waivers from the Los Angeles Angels April 20 and appeared in one game for the A's before he was designated for assignment April 25...faced Chicago on April 23 (0.2 ip, 1 h).
- · Cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento April 27.

NEIL WAGNER

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 17 but did not appear in a game before he was optioned back to Sacramento April 20.
- Was claimed off waivers by San Diego May 28.

JEMILE WEEKS

- Played in the 100th game of his career April 6 against Seattle and collected 126 hits over that span... since 1918, the only player in Athletics history with more hits over the first 100 games of his career is Wally Moses, who had 134 hits in his first 100 games with the Philadelphia A's in 1935-36...the previous Oakland record was 122 by Ben Grieve.
- Went 0 for 3 April 14 at Seattle, snapping a 20-game road hitting streak dating back to August 24 of last year...hit .349 (30 for 86) during the streak, which tied for second longest in Oakland history and fell two short of the record of 22 set by Mike Davis from April 22 to June 17, 1987.
- Stole his 10th base of the season May 15 at Los Angeles (AL)...is the fifth player in Oakland history
 to steal at least 10 bases in each of his first two seasons, the first since Jason McDonald in 1997.
- Had two RBI June 4 against Texas, snapping a career-high 25-game streak without an RBI.
- Had the first three-walk game of his career June 19 against Los Angeles (NL).
