A's vs. MARINERS

The A's trail in the season series, 4-6...are 3-3 in Seattle, 0-2 in Oakland and 1-1 Tokyo...have lost three of the previous five season series and are 46-59 (.438) against Seattle since 2007...that is the **lowest winning percentage** by any American League team against the Mariners over that span...all-time, the A's are 296-223 (.570) against Seattle, which is the second best mark by an AL team against the Mariners (Boston, .578)...are 163-94 in Oakland, 132-128 in Seattle and 1-1 in Tokyo.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Ryan Cook ranks second among AL relievers in opponents batting average (.103) and opponents slugging percentage (.155) and is seventh in ERA (1.50).

Brandon Moss has homered three times in his last four games and now has 10 home runs in his first 24 games with the A's...in Athletics history, the only player to reach 10 home runs in fewer than his first 24 games with the club is Dave Kingman, who did it in his 19th game...his 10 home runs are fourth most in the American League since June 6, the date he was called up by the A's.

Josh Reddick hit his 19th home run of the season Monday...the last Athletic to hit 20 home runs before the All-Star Break is Nick Swisher, who hit 20 in 2006.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In 1990 the A's hit seven home runs in the second game of a doubleheader to defeat the Cleveland Indians 12-1...Mark McGwire and Rickey Henderson hit two each and Carney Lansford, Jose Canseco and Jamie Quirk chip in one each...in 2001 Mark Mulder takes a perfect game into the eighth inning and finishes with a complete game one-hitter in the A's 3-0 win at Arizona...in 2009 Brett Anderson tosses a two-hit shutout at Fenway Park in a 6-0 A's win and Nomar Garciaparra drives in the go-ahead run in his return to Boston.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Swept a three-game series from Boston for their third series sweep of the season...that extended the A's winning streak to four games, which is one short of the season high of five from June 12 to 16...it also moved the A's to within one game of .500 for the first time since May 23 (22-23)...have not been .500 since May 22 (22-22)...are 19-12 over the last 31 games (since June 2) after losing a season-high nine consecutive contests...the mark since June 2 is tied for third best in the American League...are in third place in the AL West for the 24th consecutive day...have spent one day tied for first this year, 30 days in second, eight days tied for second, 35 days in third, eight days tied for third and 11 days in fourth.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers have allowed one earned run or fewer in each of the last six games, which matches the longest such streak in Oakland history (fourth time, last: May 19-24, 2011)...since 1921, the only time Athletics starting pitchers have allowed one earned run or fewer in more than six consecutive games was from September 9-18, 1966 when the Kansas City A's did it in eight straight games...starters have allowed two earned runs or fewer in 18 of the last 20 games and are 8-4 with a 1.89 ERA (26 er in 124.0 ip) and .186 (81 for 436) opponents batting average over that span...have allowed three hits or fewer in 10 of those games...have allowed just seven home runs in the 20 games...have a 3.69 ERA (204 er in 497.0 ip) for the season, which is the **lowest in the American League** and fifth lowest in the majors.

PITCHING: The A's have allowed two runs or fewer in 13 of the last 20 games...have a 2.35 ERA (46 er in 176.0 ip) and .191 (119 for 622) opponents batting average over that span...now have a 3.43 ERA for the season, which is the **lowest mark in the American League** and third lowest in the majors...have the lowest opponents batting average (.241) and slugging percentage (.371) in the AL and the fewest home runs (66)...are tied for second in shutouts (8) but have the fourth most walks (270) and second fewest strikeouts (520).

THE LONG BALL: Brandon Moss homered in the second inning Wednesday to extend the A's streak of consecutive games with a home run to 15 (20 home runs total)...that is the longest streak by an A's team since April 12-May 1, 2002 when they homered in 17 straight contests...have hit 81 home runs for the season, which is their most before the All-Star Break since 2007 when they had 91...hit just 50 home runs before the break last year and 57 in 2010.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's have won back-to-back one-run games and have now played nine one-run games in the last 13 contests...had just 13 one-run games over the first 70 contests...are 10-12 (.455) in one-run games for the season...have six "walk-off" wins, which doubles their season total from last year...are 14-10 in games decided in the seventh inning or later, including 10-9 in the last at bat...the 10 last at bat wins are third most in the American League...are 4-2 in extra inning games and rank third in the AL in extra inning wins

OFFENSE: The A's rank last in the majors in batting (.225), have the third fewest runs scored (312) and the fourth lowest on-base percentage (.302) and slugging percentage (.368)...are tied for the second most strikeouts in the American League (658) but have the fourth most walks (284) and third fewest grounded into double plays (53)...are batting .313 (71 for 227) with runners in scoring position over the last 29 games after hitting .209 over the first 54 contests...have been shut out a Major League leading 11 times...were shut out 15 times last year and those were the most times the A's were shutout in a season since 1979 (17)...lead the majors in pitches per plate appearance (3.98).

PLAYERS AND ROOKIES USED: The A's have used 43 players, which is second most in the majors to San Diego (47)...17 of the 43 are rookies, which is the most in the majors and three more than the A's season total from last year...currently have 10 rookies on the roster (Carter, Céspedes, Cook, Doolittle, Griffin, Miller, Milone, Norris, Parker, Scribner)...the average age of the 25 players on the A's roster is 28.3 years, which is fourth lowest in the majors.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 3-0 on this six-game homestand against Boston (3-0) and Seattle (three games)...have won four straight and 11 of the last 14 home games...this homestand begins a stretch where the A's will play 12 of the next 15 and 22 of the next 31 games at home...travel to Minnesota for a three-game series after the All-Star Break but then return home for a six-game homestand with Texas and New York...went 3-4 on the last road trip to Seattle (2-1) and Texas (1-3)...are 22-19 at home compared to 19-23 on the road...the pitching staff has a 2.84 ERA (120 er in 379.2 ip) at home compared to 4.04 (162 er in 360.2 ip) on the road...the home ERA is the lowest in the American League while the road ERA ranks seventh.

THE ALL-STAR BREAK: The A's are 41-42 with three games remaining before the All-Star Break...have been under .500 at the break in each of the previous three seasons...last finished above .500 in 2008 when they were 51-44...currently trail Texas by nine games and will be at least six games out of first place at the break for the sixth consecutive season...are batting .225 and the lowest pre-break batting average in Athletics history is .228 in 1967.

ALL-STAR: Ryan Cook was named as the A's lone representative to the American League All-Star team last Sunday...it is his first career All-Star selection...he is the seventh Oakland rookie to be named to the American League All-Star team, along with Wayne Gross (1977), Matt Keough (1978), Jose Canseco (1986), Mark McGwire (1987), Ben Grieve (1998) and Andrew Bailey (2009)...this marks the ninth consecutive season the A's have not sent a position player to the All-Star Game.

A's IN JUNE: The A's went 15-13 (.536) in June, finishing with a winning record in the month for the first time since 2008 (16-10)...the 15 wins are their most in any month since going 16-12 in May, 2010...A's hitters ranked first in the American League in walks (103) and strikeouts (231)...the 231 strikeouts were the second highest single-month total in Oakland history (233 in August, 2008)...the pitching staff had the lowest opponents batting average (.229) and slugging percentage (.342) in the AL and the third lowest ERA (3.32).

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list 14 times and currently have seven players on the DL (Anderson, Braden, Carignan, Cowgill, Devine, McCarthy, Sizemore)...three of those players will miss the remainder of the season (Carignan, Devine, Sizemore)...the A's used the DL 15 times last year, which was the fewest since 2006 when they also used it 15 times...used the DL a total of 87 times from 2007-10...have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had just one.

MILONE'S CAREER HIGHS

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make start of the season...the A's are 9-7 (.563) in his starting assignments and his teams are 14-7 (.667) in his career...has tossed at least seven innings in eight of his 16 starts, allowed two runs or fewer nine times and walked two batters or fewer 13

AMONG THE LEADERS: Picked up his eighth win of the season June 25, which is second most among American League rookies...is the first rookie in Oakland history with eight wins before the All-Star Break (previous best: 7, Rick Langford in 1977)...is tied for the lead among Major League rookies in complete games (1)...is tied for the lead among AL rookies in games started (16), ranks second in innings pitched (101.1) and is fifth in strikeouts (63)...is tied for third

among all AL pitchers in pickoffs (3), tied for fifth in unearned runs (7) and tied for ninth in fewest walks per nine innings (2.13).

ONE EARNED RUN: Has allowed one earned run or fewer in each of his last three starts and is 2-1 with a 0.86 ERA (2 er in 21.0 ip) over that span...that includes a career-high 15.0 inning scoreless streak...however, has allowed seven runs over his last three games as he was charged with five unearned runs in his last start.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 5-1 with a 0.99 ERA (5 er in 45.2 ip) and .169 (27 for 160) opponents average in five starts at home compared to 3-5 with a 5.98 ERA (37 er in 55.2 ip) and .307 (70 for 228) opponents batting average in 10 starts on the road...has the lowest home ERA in the majors (Santana, NYM 1.16) and the fourth highest road ERA in the American League...is tied for fourth in the AL in home wins and is tied for the AL lead in road losses...has allowed 14 of his 15 home runs on the road and ranks second in the AL in road home runs allowed (Vargas, SEA 16).

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .280 (37 for 132) opponents batting average the first time through the lineup, .256 (34 for 133) the second time and .211 (26 for 123) after that...has issued 11 walks and allowed six home runs in 99 plate appearances against left-handed hitters compared to 13 walks and nine home runs in 317 plate appearances against right-handers.

INNING BY INNING: Has allowed 23 of his 49 runs in the first two innings...has a 6.30 ERA (22 er in 32.0 ip) and eight home runs over the first two innings of a game and a 2.60 ERA (20 er in 69.1) and seven home runs from the third inning on.

GO THE DISTANCE: Tossed the first complete game by a Major League rookie this year June 20 against Los Angeles (NL)...it was the first by an A's rookie since Brett Anderson on July 6, 2009 at Boston...it was the first by an A's rookie in the Coliseum since Barry Zito on September 10, 2000 against Tampa Bay

2012 HIGHLIGHTS: Combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit)...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-0 loss at Seattle *April 14*...Noesi and League combined to shutout the A's on five hits...combined with Grant Balfour on a four-hit, 2-0 shutout of Chicago April 24 in Oakland...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed three of the hits...did not allow a runner past first base...according to the Elias Sports Bureau he is just the second Oakland rookie over the last 75 years to have two wins while pitching at least eight scoreless innings and allowing three or fewer hits in a season (Vida Blue, 1970)...was the losing pitcher in the A's 11-6 loss at Boston April 30...allowed a career-high eight runs on eight hits, including a career-high three home runs...was the winning pitcher in the A's 9-5 win at Tampa Bay May 6...allowed five runs in five innings and walked a career-high four batters...won his second consecutive start in the A's 11-4 win over Detroit *May* 11 in Oakland...struck out a career-high six batters in 7.0 innings...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-1 loss at Texas May 16...surrendered a career-high nine hits...was the winning pitcher in the A's 2-1 win over Los Angeles May 21 in Oakland...became the first pitcher in Oakland history to win each of his first four starts at the Coliseum...the previous best was three by Tim Hudson in 1999...was the losing pitcher in the A's 2-0 loss to New York *May 27* in Oakland...Kuroda and Soriano combined to shutout the A's on five hits and a walk...lost his second consecutive start in the A's 2-0 loss at Kansas City June 3...matched his career-high with six strikeouts...Mazzaro, Herrera, Holland and Broxton combined to shutout the A's on seven hits...had his first no decision of the season in the A's 9-8 loss at Arizona June 8...allowed a career-high tying nine hits...left with an 8-4 lead but Fuentes allowed a three-run home run to Roberts in the bottom of the ninth for the blown save and loss...had a no decision in the A's 10-8 win at Colorado June 13...tossed a career-low 4.0 innings and matched his career highs in runs (8) and walks (4)...tossed a complete game three-hitter in the A's 4-1 win over Los Angeles (NL) in Oakland June 20...allowed just two base runners over the final seven innings...the win snapped a two-game losing streak, the first losing streak of his career...combined with Grant Balfour and Ryan Cook on a seven-hit shutout in the A's 1-0 win at Seattle June 25...tossed seven innings and allowed all seven of the hits.

LAST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 7-2 loss at Texas last Saturday...matched his careerhigh with six strikeouts...faced just one batter over the minimum over the first three innings, allowing a leadoff home run to Beltre in the second...was charged with five unearned runs in the fifth inning because of errors by Inge and Hicks...allowed a two-run single to Kinsler and a three-run home run to Hamilton.

MILONE vs. SEATTLE: Is 1-1 with a 2.77 ERA (13.0 ip, 11 h, 4 r, 4 er, 2 bb, 10 so, 1 hr) in two career starts, both this year...the loss came in a 4-0 decision at Seattle April 14...faced just one batter over the minimum over the first five innings but that was a solo home run by Montero in the second inning...then allowed three runs in the sixth on a bases loaded walk by Smoak and a two-run double by Montero... Noesi and League combined to shutout the A's on five hits...then combined with Grant Balfour and Ryan Cook on a seven-hit shutout in the A's 1-0 win at Seattle June 25...tossed seven innings and allowed all seven of the hits...allowed only two base runners to advance into scoring position...retired 10 of the final 11 batters he faced...Seth Smith homered in the second inning for the only run of the game.

OMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Jarrod Parker (5-3, 2.46 ERA): Is scheduled to make his 14th start of the season...has allowed one run or fewer in each of his last four starts (1.01 ERA), seven of his last eight (1.71 ERA) and 10 of 14 in his career...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is just the second pitcher since 1900 to allow one run or fewer in 10 of his first 14 starts...the other is Ferdie Schupp, who did it for the New York Giants from 1913-17 (Schupp had relief appearances over that span)...his 2.46 ERA and .209 opponents batting average are the lowest among Major League rookies with 60 or more innings...was the winning pitcher in his last start, 6-1 A's win over Boston on Monday (6.2 ip, 6 h, 1 r, 1 er, 3 bb, 3 so)...was the winning pitcher in his only career start against the Mariners, a 2-1 A's win at Seattle June 27 (7.0 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 4 bb, 9 so).

The A's bullpen has not allowed a run over the past four games and 10.1 innings...is 2-0 with two saves, no blown saves and a .091 (3 for 33) opponents batting average over that span...now has a 2.88 ERA for the season, which ranks second in the American League...has the lowest opponents batting average (.208) and slugging percentage (.320) and has allowed the fewest home runs (17)...has allowed the second most walks (117)...has 89 strikeouts in 90.0 innings over its last 33 games (8.9 per nine innings) after fanning 117 in 153.1 innings over the first 49 contests (6.9 per nine innings).

- Has not allowed a run in 12 of his past 13 appearances (4 er in 14.2 ip, 2.45 ERA)...now has a 2.14 ERA (5 er in 21.0 ip) over his past 19 appearances after posting a 4.50 ERA in his first 21 games.
- Is tied for second in the American League in games pitched (40) and tied for seventh among AL relievers in innings pitched (41.0)...is tied for fifth among AL relievers in walks (18) and is tied for 10th in losses (2).
- Has a 0.87 ERA (2 er in 20.2 ip) in 19 appearances at home compared to a 5.75 ERA (13 er in 20.1 ip) in 21 outings on the road.
- First batters faced are 10 for 34 (.294) with six walks for a .400 on-base percentage...the six walks are tied for second most among AL relievers and the on-base percentage is tied for sixth highest.
- Has not allowed a run in six games against Seattle this year (6.0 ip, 2 h, 3 so)...has a 3.98 ERA in 21 appearances in his career against the Mariners (20.1 ip, 18 h, 10 r, 9 er, 9 bb, 16 so, 2 hr).
 His last save was May 5 and it was the 17th of his career, tying Graeme Lloyd for the most in Major League history by an Australian-born pitcher.

THREE-GAME WINNING STREAK: Is 3-0 with a 1.01 ERA (3 er in 26.2 ip) and .180 (16 for 89) opponents batting average over his last four starts...it is the first winning streak of his career.

QUALIFICATIONS: Has tossed 80.1 innings, which is 3.2 innings short of qualifying for the league leaders...based on a minimum of 50 innings pitched, he ranks fourth in the American League in ERA (2.46) and sixth in opponents batting average (.209)...has allowed just three home runs for an average of 0.34 per nine innings, which is the lowest in the AL...is fourth in opponents slugging (.298).

 Had his career-high 10.1-inning scoreless streak dating back to last season snapped April 7 against Seattle when Saunders homered in the sixth inning.

- Was transferred to the 60-day disabled list April 22.

- Homered in three consecutive games from March 29 to April 7...became the third player since 1918 to homer in three of his first four Major League games (Trent Oeltjen, ARI 2009 and Mike Jacobs, NYM 2005)...is the ninth player with at least three home runs in his first four games (Jacobs had 4)...the previous fastest an Oakland Athletic reached three career home runs was seven games by Kurt Abbott in 1993 and Mitchell Page in 1977.
- Had multiple RBI games in each of those contests...since 1918, he is the first Athletic and ninth Major Leaguer with three multiple RBI games over his first four career games (last: Wladimir Balentien, 2006-07).
- Struck out at least once in each of his first eight games, which is an Oakland record to start a career...
 the previous mark was six (Chris Carter, 2010; Brooks Conrad, 2008; Travis Buck, 2007)...matched
 the longest streak by an Athletic since 1918 (Troy Herriage, 1956; Norm Bass, 1961).

- Hit his fourth home run April 18 at Los Angeles in his 12th game...since 1918, that is the fastest a player has reached four career home runs in Athletics history...the previous best was by Brian Lesher, who did it in 14 games in 1996.
- Did not have a putout a April 25 against Chicago, becoming the first A's outfielder without a putout in a game of 14 or more innings since Stan Javier on May 30, 1988 against New York.

- Became the third pitcher in Athletics franchise history to record four strikeouts in an inning April 27 at Baltimore (Blake Stein, 1998; Erik Hiljus, 2001).
- Did not allow a run over his first 21 games and 23.0 innings...that was the longest season-opening scoreless streak by a player on the Athletics Opening Day roster since at least 1918...the previous high was 21.0 innings by Ale Kellner in 1953...had a career-high 24.0 inning scoreless streak dating back to September 28, 2011.

COLLIN COWGILL

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and went 0 for 4 with three wakls in three games before he was
 optioned to Sacramento April 17.
- Was recalled by Oakland May 11
- Had a career-high eight-game hitting streak from May 26 to June 5 (13 for 31, .419).
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 23 with a sprained left ankle.

COCO CRISP

- Was the A's 13th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 13 years...had 203 career starts in left entering the season, but none since October 2, 2005.
- Committed his first error since April 25, 2011 on April 7 against Seattle, snapping a 116-game errorless streak...that streak was seventh longest by an outfielder in Oakland history.
- Stole three bases June 19 against Los Angeles (NL)...it was his fifth career game of three or more steals, his fourth with the A's...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (45) and Bert Campaneris (10) have more three-steal games.
- Was caught stealing after being picked off in the first inning June 21 against Los Angeles (NL), his
 first caught stealing since July 10, 2011 at Texas...that ended his Athletics record streak of 36 consecutive stolen bases without a caught stealing (caught stealing became an official stat in 1920)...
 broke the previous mark of 28 set by Stan Javier (May 31-October 1, 1995).

FAUTINO DE LOS SANTOS

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and compiled a 3.00 ERA in six relief appearances before he was
 optioned to Sacramento, April 25.
- Did not retire a batter over his final three outings before his option (5 h, 2 r, 1 er, 2 bb).

JOEY DEVINE

Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 retroactive to March 24...underwent "Tommy John" surgery on his right elbow April 10... Dr. James Andrews performed the surgery in Pensacola, Fla., which included an ulnar collateral ligament reconstruction, an ulnar nerve transposition and a debridement of the flexor tendon...also had "Tommy John" surgery on the same elbow April 21, 2009.

• Was transferred to the 60-day DL May 15.

JOSH DONALDSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster but hit just .094 in nine games before he was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento April 23.
- Made nine starts, all at third base, during his first stint...his Major League experience prior to this season included seven games at catcher and two at first base.
- Was recalled May 12 and snapped a career-high tying 0 for 17 streak with his eighth inning double May 14 at Los Angeles (also May 1-13, 2010).

JONNY GOMES

- Was hit by a Jonathan Braxton pitch with the bases loaded in the bottom of the 12th inning April 11 against Kansas City to force in the winning run in the A's 5-4 victory...it was his second career walk-off hit by pitch (August 21, 2011 vs. Philadelphia)...it was his fifth career walk-off RBI (two home runs, one walk)...it was the third walk-off hit by pitch in Oakland history (Mike Bordick, August 4, 1993 vs. Seattle and Olmedo Saenz, July 20, 2002 vs. Texas).
- Singled in the eighth inning April 19 at Los Angeles after homering for each of his first three hits for the season...is the first player in Oakland history whose first three hits in a season were all home runs.
- Hit the game-winning pinch-hit two-run home run in the seventh inning June 16 against San Diego, his third career pinch hit home run (last: June 28, 2008 at Pittsburgh)...it snapped a 0 for 34 streak as a pinch hitter and was his first pinch hit since August 29, 2010 against Chicago (NL).

A.J. GRIFFIN

 Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 24 and made his Major League debut that day with a start against San Francisco.

BRANDON HICKS

- Was claimed off waivers from Atlanta March 13 and was optioned to Sacramento March 15.
- Recalled by Oakland June 23 after batting .272 with 13 home runs and 48 RBI in 65 games with the
 River Cats... was tied for the Pacific Coast League lead in hit by pitches (7) at the time of his promotion...also ranked second in strikeouts (76), fifth in extra base hits (37), tied for sixth in doubles (21),
 eighth in home runs (13), ninth in runs (49) and 10th in RBI (48) and slugging (.548).

LUKE HUGHES

 Was claimed off waivers from Minnesota April 22 and went 1 for 13 (.077) in four games with the A's before he was designated for assignment April 30...cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento May 2.

- Agreed to terms with the A's on a one-year contract April 30 after he was released by Detroit April 26

 Bureau, he is the second player in Major League history with four games of four or more RBI over
 a five-game stretch...the other is Lou Gehrig in 1931...now has 14 career games with four or more
 RBI...drove in 16 runs over that five-game stretch...since 1970, the only other Athletic to drive in 16

- Had the game-ending grand slam in the bottom of the ninth inning May 8 against Toronto...it was
 his seventh career "walk-off" home run and his 10th "walk-off plate appearance (two singles, one
 sacrifice fly)...it was the sixth "walk-off" grand slam in Oakland history (Tenace, 1973; Armas,
 1980; McGwire, 1990 and 1995; Ellis, 2008).
- Added another grand slam May 10 against Detroit...is just the second player in Athletics history
 to hit two grand slams over a three-game span...the other is Jimmie Foxx (September 22 and 24,
 1932)...now has seven career grand slams.
- Had 17 RBI in his first 10 games with the A's...those are the most in Oakland history by a player
 in his first 10 games with the A's...the previous best was 15 by Mitchell Page (1977) and Jack Cust
 (2007)
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 17 retroactive to May 13 with a strained right groin...
 it is his second stint on the disabled list this year as he began the season on Detroit's DL with a
 strained left groin.
- Went 5 for 5 with three runs, two doubles, two home runs (including a grand slam) and seven RBI
 in a start at third base for Triple-A Sacramento May 26 against Reno in the second game of his twogame rehab assignment.
- Was reinstated from the DL May 29.

TOMMY MILONE

• Combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit).

BRANDON MOSS

- Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 6 after batting .286 with 15 home runs and 33 RBI in 51 games with the River Cats...the home runs were tied for second in the Pacific Coast League and tied for sixth in all of minor league baseball at the time of his promotion.
- Homered June 7 against Texas, his first since September 2, 2009 at Cincinnati...it snapped a career-high 49-game homerless streak.
- Had his first career two-homer game June 12 at Colorado.
- Homered in all three games of the Colorado series June 12-14 and had four home runs total...is the
 first Athletic to hit four home runs in a three-game series since Geronimo Berroa against Minnesota,
 August 12-14, 1996.
- Matched his career-high with three hits (fifth time, first since June 20, 2009 at Colorado) and three RBI (fourth time, second time this year: June 12 at Colorado) June 14 at Colorado.

- Became the second player in Athletics history to hit six home runs in his first nine games with the club (Jack Cust, 2007).
- Hit six home runs in interleague play, which tied for fifth in the majors and matched the Oakland interleague record set by Miguel Tejada in 2000.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of June 11-17...batted .348 with
 three doubles, five home runs, 10 RBI and seven runs scored in six games...it was his first Player
 of the Week award.
- Committed three errors in the sixth inning June 23 against San Francisco, tying the Major League
 record for most errors by a first baseman in an inning...it was the seventh time, the first since Jack
 Clark did it for St. Louis on May 25, 1987...since 1984, the only other Athletic to commit three errors in an inning is Kurt Abbott on May 10, 1998 vs. Chicago at shortstop.
- The three errors set an Oakland record for errors in a game by a first baseman...is the first Athletics first baseman to commit three errors in a game since Lou Limmer on August 19, 1954 vs. New York.

JORDAN NORBERTO

- Retired the final two batters May 1 at Boston for his first Major League save...he saved Jarrod
 Parker's first ML win, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same
 game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.
- Was placed on thw 15-day disabled list June 4 retroactive to May 31 with a strained left shoulder...
 made one rehab appearance with Triple-A Sacramento June 19 and was reinstated June 21.

DEREK NORRIS

Was recalled from Sacramento June 21 after batting .273 with eight home runs and 36 RBI in 55 games in his Triple-A debut...made his Major League debut with a start at catcher that day against Los Angeles (NL) and went 0 for 3.

- Singled off Madison Bumgarner in the fifth inning June 23 against San Francisco for his first Major League hit...added a RBI single in the ninth inning for his first RBI and first multiple hit game.
- Hit his first Major League home run June 25 against San Francisco, a three-run "walk-off" shot in
 the bottom of the ninth off Santiago Casilla...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the third
 player in Athletics history to hit a game-ending home run for his first ML home run...the other two
 are Dee Miles (September 14, 1939) and George Hendrick (May 28, 1972).

CLIFF PENNINGTON

- Doubled in the second inning June 4 against Texas to snap a career-high 0 for 29 streak (previous: 0 for 27, May 22-June 1, 2010).
- Went 3 for 3 June 15, his 28th birthday... is 6 for 12 (.500) with one double, one triple, four RBI and four runs scored in three career games on his birthday.

ANTHONY RECKER

Was on the A's Opening Day roster and hit .129 in 13 games as the back-up to Kurt Suzuki before he
was optioned to Sacramento May 28.

JOSH REDDICK

- Was the A's fifth different Opening Day starter in right field in the last five years.
- Had career highs May 11 against Detroit with four runs, four hits (tied), two home runs and five RBI...is the eighth player in Oakland history with at least four runs, four hits, two home runs and five RBI in a game...the last was Matt Holliday (July 20, 2009 vs. Minnesota).
- Hit 10 home runs in May, which tied for third in the AL...is the first Athletic to hit 10 home runs in a month since Frank Thomas had 10 in September, 2006...also tied for fourth in the AL in runs in May (20) and tied for fifth in walks (17).
- Matched his career-high with four strikeouts June 29 against the Dodgers (August 4, 2009 at Tampa Bay).

ADAM ROSALES

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and appeared in one game against Seattle in Japan before he was
 optioned to Sacramento April 2.
- Returned to Oakland May 17 but was optioned ba;ck to Sacramento June 16...

TYSON ROSS

- Began the season at Triple-A Sacramento and was 0-1 with a 4.00 ERA in two starts with the River Cats before he was recalled by Oakland April 17.
- Went 2-6 with a 6.51 ERA in nine starts with the A's before he was optioned back to Sacramento May 31.

- Went 0 for 4 with four strikeouts April 30 at Boston, the first four-strikeout game of his career.
- Went 4 for 5 on June 4 against Texas, his second career four-hit game (also September 4, 2009 vs. Arizona).

ERIC SOGARD

- · Had a career-high three RBI, April 15 at Seattle.
- Was optioned to Sacramento May 21 but returned to Oakland June 16...appeared iin just one game before he was optioned back to Sacramento June 24.

KURT SUZUKI

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at catcher...the five starts are second most by a catcher in Oakland history...only Terry Steinbach, with nine, has more.
