### ABOUT THE A's

**ABOUT THE A'S:** Have won two straight games to return to a season-high tying 10 games over .500 for the third time...have not been more than 10 games over .500 since finishing the 2006 season 93-69...are now a **Major League best 21-6 (.778)** since the start of July...trailed Texas by a season-high 13 games at the start of July but the Rangers have gone 12-14 since then and the A's have gained 8½ games in the standings...are in second place in the American League West for the fifth time in the last seven days and trail Texas by 4½ games...have the first Wild Card spot, 1½ games ahead of second place Los Angeles and two games ahead of this place Detroit and Tampa Bay...have held at least a share of a playoff spot each of the last 14 days...had a season-high nine-game losing streak from May 22-June 1 but have gone 36-18 (.667) since then, which is the **best mark in the majors** over that span...are 58-48 (.547) for the season, which is the fourth best record in the AL and the A's best record after 106 games since 2005 when they were 60-46 (lost game 107 in 2005)...in the West, have spent one day tied for first this year, 35 days in second, 10 days tied for second, 53 days in third, eight days tied for third and 11 days in fourth...dropped two of three to Tampa Bay to start the homestand after going 6-0-1 over the previous seven series...it was their first series loss since dropping three of four at Texas June 28-July 1.

**WALK-OFFS AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS:** The A's had their **Major League leading 13<sup>th</sup> "walk-off"** win of the season last night...that is the second best total in Oakland history and is two short of the record of 15 set in 2004...it was the third game-ending sacrifice fly, which is the most in Oakland history...have 10 "walk-off" wins in the last 21 home games, including two on this homestand and eight since July 3...five of the "walk-off" wins have been by home run, which is one short of the Oakland record of six (2004)...11 different players have delivered a game-ending RBI...are now 19-9 in games decided in the last at bat and **lead the majors in last at bat wins**...are 23-20 in games decided in the seventh inning or later.

**ONE-RUN GAMES AND EXTRA INNINGS:** With a 5-4, 15-inning win last night, the A's extended their winning streak in one-run games to 10 and extra inning games to five...the one-run game winning streak is one short of the Oakland record of 11 (twice, last: May 31-July 17, 2000)...the 15-inning win was the A's second of the homestand, making the A's the first team in American League history to win two games of 15 or more innings on the same homestand (source: Elias)...10 of the A's last 12 home wins have been by one run...are 18-12 (.600) in one-run games for the season, which is the third best record in the American League...also have the third most wins...are 9-2 (.818) in extra inning games, which are the A's most extra inning wins since they had 11 in 2007...have the second most extra inning wins in the AL and the second best record.

**LEFT-HANDED STARTERS:** Today marks the ninth time in the last 13 games the A's will face a left-handed starting pitcher...are 6-2 in the previous eight games against lefties but are 19-19 (.500) for the season...seven of the A's last 11 losses and nine of the last 14 have come in games started by left-handers...are 39-29 (.585) in games started by right-handers.

**SINCE THE ALL-STAR BREAK:** The A's are 15-5 since the All-Star Break, which is the **best record in the American League** and second best in the majors (Cincinnati, 18-3)...the pitching staff has issued the fewest walks in the majors (45) and has the second most strikeouts in the AL (172)...ranks third in the AL with a 3.50 ERA (75 er in 193.0 ip)...the offense ranks second in the AL in triples (7), tied for second in home runs (33) and third in runs (105) and slugging (.448)...has the most strikeouts (196).

**PITCHING:** The A's **lead the American League** and rank fourth in the majors with a 3.42 ERA...have allowed the fewest home runs in the AL (89), have the second lowest opponents batting average (.243) and slugging percentage (.372) and the third lowest on-base percentage (.307)...rank third in the AL in shutouts (9) but have the third fewest strikeouts (727)...A's starting pitchers have allowed the fewest home runs in the AL (62) and rank second with a 3.70 ERA (265 er in 644.0 ip).

**OFFENSE:** The A's hit two home runs last night and now have 116 overall, which is already their most in a season since 2009 (135)...have hit 67 home runs in 45 games since June 12, which is fourth most in the majors...have struck out 83 times in the last seven games, including an Athletics record 21 on Monday...lead the American League and rank second in the majors with 879 for the season...rank last in the majors with a .230 batting average and last in the AL with 424 runs scored...have been shutout a Major League leading 12 times, but just once over the last 51 games...have the second lowest on-base percentage in the AL (.304) and the third lowest slugging percentage (.382).

**HOME AND AWAY:** The A's are 3-2 on their longest homestand of the season, a 10-game stand against Tampa Bay (1-2), Toronto (2-0) and Los Angeles (three games)...following this homestand, the A's play 30 of their final 51 games on the road...had their season-high six-game home winning streak snapped Tuesday night...have won 14 of the last 18 home games, 22 of the last 30 and are 32-23 (.582) at home for the season, which is the third best home record in the American League...went 4-2 on the last road trip to Toronto (2-1) and Baltimore (2-1) and have won eight of the last 10 road games...are 26-25 (.510) on the road...the pitching staff has a 2.87 ERA (168 er in 526.2 ip) at home compared to 4.07 (199 er in 439.2 ip) on the road...the home ERA is the lowest in the AL while the road ERA ranks seventh.

**ROOKIES AND PLAYERS USED:** Dan Straily became the 18<sup>th</sup> rookie to appear in a game for the A's this year last night, which is the most in the majors and tied with the 1983 club for second most in Oakland history...the record is 21 in 2008...he is the 11<sup>th</sup> rookie pitcher, which is one short of the Oakland record (12 in 2009)...currently have 10 rookies on the roster (Carter, Céspedes, Cook, Doolittle, Griffin, Milone, Norris, Parker, Straily, Taylor)...the average age of the A's 25 players is 28.4, which is seventh youngest in the majors.

**IN JULY:** The A's finished July with a 19-5 (.792) record to set a **franchise record for winning percentage in July**...it was the fourth best record in any month in Oakland history and the eighth best in franchise history...it was the best record in July by an AL team since New York went 23-6 (.793) in 1956...the pitching staff issued the fewest walks in the AL in July (50)...averaged 1.97 walks per nine innings, marking the **first time since at least 1916** that the A's issued fewer than two walks per nine innings in a month of at least 15 games.

### A's vs. BLUE JAYS

The A's have clinched the season series as they lead 5-2 with two games remaining...have won three of four in Oakland and two of three in Toronto...it marks the first time the A's have won the season series since 2007 (5-4)...the A's are 203-174 against the Blue Jays all time...that includes 99-89 in Oakland, 104-83 in Toronto and 0-2 in Las Vegas.

### TODAY'S TIDBITS

The A's are 11-4 during this stretch of 17 consecutive games against American League East teams that began July 19 and concludes with this four-game series against Toronto...are 20-12 against the East this year, which is the second best record by any AL team (Texas, 14-7)

**Grant Balfour** has not allowed a run in his last 12 games and 12.1 innings pitched.

**Yoenis Céspedes** is batting .430 (34 for 79) since the All-Star Break, which is second best in the majors (Posey, SF .464).

**Brandon Inge** has matched his career high with a 13-game hitting streak (15 for 57, .263).

### THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In **1910** Jack Coombs and Ed Walsh of the Chicago White Sox duel 16 innings to a scoreless tie...Coombs allows just three hits...in **1992** Jose Canseco ties an Oakland record when he walks five times in the A's 9-0 win at Texas...in **2002** Miguel Tejada hits a three-run home run in the A's 4-0 win over Detroit to extend his hitting streak to 24 games...he falls one short of Jason Giambi's Oakland record of 25.

**FOR STARTERS:** Is scheduled to make his eighth start of the season and his career...was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 24...the A's are 6-1 (.857) in his starting assignments...has tossed at least six innings in each of his seven starts, allowed two runs or fewer five times and walked two batters or fewer all seven times.

**SIX INNINGS OR MORE, THREE RUNS OR FEWER:** Has tossed at least 6.0

innings in each of his seven starts and allowed three runs or fewer in each outing...is the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1918 to begin his career with seven consecutive games of six or more innings and three runs or fewer...the previous high was five by John Henry Johnson (1978) and Dave Hamilton (1972)...is the second Major Leaguer to do it over the last 18 years...the other is Jered Weaver, who had nine straight with Los Angeles (AL) in 2006.

**3-0:** Is 3-0 in four starts since the All-Star Break, the first three wins of his Major League career...is tied for fourth in the American League in wins since the break...is the first A's starting pitcher to begin his career 3-0 since Rich Harden in 2003...no pitcher in Oakland history has started his career 4-0 with all of his *outings* coming as a starter...the last A's pitcher to begin his career 4-0 with all his *wins* coming as a starter is Erik Hiljus in 2001...began his career with three no decisions...since 1918, the only other pitcher in Athletics history to begin his career with three consecutive no decisions, all as a starting pitcher, is Willie Adams (June 11-July 31, 1996).

**OPPONENTS BATTING:** Opponents are 8 for 43 (.186) with one walk (.205 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...has allowed a .161 (19 for 118) opponents batting average the first two times through the lineup and .333 (13 for 39) after that.

**INNING BY INNING:** Has a 1.29 ERA (3 er in 21.0 ip) and .162 (12 for 74) opponents batting average over the first three innings of a game and a 3.68 ERA (9 er in 22.0 ip) and .241 (20 for 83) opponents average after that.

**FOUR HITS OR FEWER:** Allowed eight hits in his fourth start after allowing four hits or fewer in each of his first three starts...is just the sixth player since 1918 to begin his career with three consecutive outings of six or more innings and four hits or fewer (last: Jeremy Hellickson, TB, August 2-15, 2010).

**ROOKIE STARTERS:** Is one of four rookies currently in the A's starting rotation (Milone, Parker, Straily)...the last time the A's had at least four rookies in the rotation was in 2009 when they did it from June 2 through the end of the season...is scheduled to make the 52<sup>nd</sup> start by a rookie this year, but the A's will fall short of the Oakland record of 116 starts by a rookie set in 2009...rookies have 27 of the A's wins...the only times in Oakland history rookies have combined for more wins is in 2009 (44) and 1983 (38).

**2012 START-BY-START:** Had a no decision in the A's 4-2 win over San Francisco **June 24** in Oakland...allowed a two-run home run to Posey in the first inning, but those were the only runs he would allow in six innings...left trailing 2-1 but Derek Norris hit a three-run home run in the bottom of the ninth to get him off the hook...became the 43<sup>rd</sup> pitcher in Oakland history to start in his Major League debut...had a no decision in the A's 4-3 loss at Texas **June 29**...tossed 6.0 shutout innings and allowed just two hits...was relieved by Blevins with the A's leading 2-0 entering the bottom of the seventh...Balfour allowed four runs in the eighth for the loss and Cook was charged with the blown save...had a no decision in the A's 3-2 win over Boston **July 4** in Oakland...did not allow a run over the first three innings to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high 14.0 innings...the streak ended when Ortiz hit his 400<sup>th</sup> career home run to lead off the fourth inning...earned his first Major League win in the A's 6-3 victory at Minnesota **July 13**...Willingham hit a solo home run in the second inning and a two-run home run in the fourth but a Gomes grand slam in the fourth gave him a 4-3 lead when he left after six innings...won his second consecutive start in the A's 4-3 win over New York **July 19** in Oakland...shutout the Yankees on three hits over the first five innings and retired 11 straight through the end of the fifth inning...had a 4-0 lead when he allowed two runs in the sixth inning on a Teixeira sacrifice fly and a Swisher RBI single...combined with Blevins and Miller on a five-hit shutout in the A's 16-0 win at Toronto **July 25**...tossed 6.0 innings and allowed three of the hits...retired 10 of the first 11 batters before Encarnacion doubled with two outs in the fourth...allowed just one other base runner to advance into scoring position.

**LAST START:** He had a no decision in the A's 4-3 win in 15 innings over Tampa Bay last Monday...tossed 7.0 innings after pitching 6.0 innings in each of his first six starts...had a 2-0 lead when he allowed a two-run double to Pena in the fourth inning...also allowed a solo home run to Joyce in the sixth inning but the A's tied the game with a run in the seventh...was relieved by Doolittle to start the eighth.

**GRIFFIN vs. TORONTO:** Was the winning pitcher in his only career start, a 16-0 A's win at Toronto July 25 (see start-by-start above).

**MINORS:** Combined for a 6-3 record and a 2.66 ERA in 15 games, all starts, with Double-A Midland and Triple-A Sacramento...ranked third in the A's farm system in ERA and strikeouts (84) and tied for fourth in wins at the time of his promotion...began the year at Midland and was 3-1 with a 2.49 ERA in seven starts before he was promoted to Triple-A Sacramento May 11...then went 3-2 with a 2.81 ERA in eight starts with the River Cats...issued seven walks at each minor league stop for a total of 14 walks in 94.2 innings (1.33 per nine innings)...struck out 84 for a strikeout to walk ratio of 6.0...allowed a .208 opponents batting average, including .180 (30 for 167) against left-handed hitters compared to .235 (42 for 179) against right-handers...surrendered just six home runs in 94.2 innings, an average of 0.57 per nine innings...went 3-0 with a 1.31 ERA (34.1 ip, 22 h, 9 r, 5 er, 3 bb, 27 so, 1 hr) over his final five starts with Sacramento...allowed a .177 (22 for 124) opponents batting average over that stretch and walked just three batters in 34.1 innings.

## TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

**LHP Tommy Milone (9-8, 3.68 ERA):** Is scheduled to make his 22<sup>nd</sup> start of the season...is tied for second among American League rookies with nine wins...needs one more to become the ninth rookie in Oakland history to win 10 games...ranks third among all AL pitchers in fewest walks per nine innings (1.81) and ninth in strikeout to walk ratio (3.59)...is 5-2 with a 1.51 ERA and .196 opponents average in nine starts at home compared to 4-6 with a 5.77 ERA and .313 opponents batting average in 12 starts on the road...has the second lowest home ERA in the AL and the eighth highest road ERA...was the losing pitcher in his last start, an 8-0 loss to Tampa Bay last Tuesday (6.0 ip, 7 h, 5 r, 5 er, 1 bb, 4 so)...was the losing pitcher in his only career start against the Blue Jays, a 10-4 A's loss at Toronto July 26 (7.0 ip, 8 h, 6 r, 5 er, 0 bb, 7 so).

## BRANDON ALLEN

- Was the A's Opening Day starter at first base March 28 but went for 7 with five strikeouts in three games before he was designated for assignment April 9...was claimed off waivers by the Tampa Bay Rays April 19.

## BRETT ANDERSON

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 13 as he continues his recovery from July 14, 2011 "Tommy John" surgery.

## DARIC BARTON

- Homered in the fifth inning April 17 at Los Angeles to snap a career-high 76-game homerless streak...it was his first home run since Oct. 1, 2010 against Seattle...the home run also snapped a 72-game homerless streak as a first baseman, which was second longest in Oakland history...the record is 75 by Mike Hegan from July 6, 1971 to Aug. 16, 1973.
- Was batting .198 with one home run and four RBI in 37 games when he was optioned to Sacramento June 2.

## JERRY BLEVINS

- Had his career-high 10.1-inning scoreless streak dating back to last season snapped April 7 against Seattle when Saunders homered in the sixth inning.

## DALLAS BRADEN

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 as he continues his recovery from left shoulder surgery.
- Was transferred to the 60-day disabled list April 22.

## ANDREW CARIGNAN

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and posted a 6.23 ERA in five relief appearances before he was optioned to Sacramento April 17.
- Recalled for a second time May 11 and allowed two runs in 2.0 innings over two outings before he was sent back to Sacramento May 16.
- Joined the A's for a third time May 27 and did not allow a run in four games (3.1 ip, 2 h, 2 bb, 4 so) before he was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 6 with a sprained ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow...was transferred to the 60-day DL June 9.
- Had reconstructive surgery to the ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow June 19...the surgery was performed in New York City by Dr. David Altchek, medical director of the New York Mets.

## CHRIS CARTER

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento June 29 after batting .279 with 12 home runs and 53 RBI in 72 games with the River Cats.
- Homered in each of his first two games with the A's and three of his first four...including July 6 against Seattle when he hit the pinch-hit game-ending home run in the 11th inning...is the first rookie in Athletics history with a pinch-hit "walk-off" home run and the 10th player in Oakland history with a pinch-hit game-ending home run...he is the first Athletic with a pinch-hit "walk-off" home run in extra innings since Paul Lehner on April 22, 1950 against Boston.

## YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Made his Major League debut March 28 against Seattle in Tokyo with a start in center field...doubled off Felix Hernandez to lead off the bottom of the seventh inning for his first ML hit.
- Hit his first ML home run in the seventh inning March 29 against Seattle in Tokyo, a two-run shot off Shawn Kelley.
- Homered in three consecutive games from March 29 to April 7...became the third player since 1918 to homer in three of his first four Major League games (Trent Oeltjen, ARI 2009 and Mike Jacobs,

NYM 2005)...is the ninth player with at least three home runs in his first four games (Jacobs had 4)...the previous fastest an Oakland Athletic reached three career home runs was seven games by Kurt Abbott in 1993 and Mitchell Page in 1977.

- Had multiple RBI games in each of those contests...since 1918, he is the first Athletic and ninth Major Leaguer with three multiple RBI games over his first four career games (last: Wladimir Balentien, 2006-07).
- Struck out at least once in each of his first eight games, which is an Oakland record to start a career...the previous mark was six (Chris Carter, 2010; Brooks Conrad, 2008; Travis Buck, 2007)...matched the longest streak by an Athletic since 1918 (Troy Herriage, 1956; Norm Bass, 1961).
- Hit his fourth home run April 18 at Los Angeles in his 12th game...since 1918, that is the fastest a player has reached four career home runs in Athletics history...the previous best was by Brian Leshner, who did it in 14 games in 1996.
- Did not have a putout April 25 against Chicago, becoming the first A's outfielder without a putout in a game of 14 or more innings since Stan Javier on May 30, 1988 against New York.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 12 retroactive to May 7 with a muscle strain in his left hand...went 3 for 9 (.333) on a three-game rehab assignment with Triple-A Sacramento from May 28 to 30 and was reinstated from the DL June 1.
- Had his first career game-ending hit June 21 against Los Angeles (NL), a three-run "walk-off" home run.
- Had the first two four-hit games of his career July 15 at Minnesota and July 20 against New York.
- Was named American League Player of the Week July 16 for the week ending July 15 after going 8 for 14 (.571) with five runs, a double, two home runs and six RBI in the three-game series at Minnesota.
- Had a career-high nine-game hitting streak from July 8 to 21...was 19 for 33 (.576) with two doubles, four home runs, 10 RBI, eight runs scored, six multiple hit games and a 1.000 slugging percentage during the streak.

## BARTOLO COLÓN

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and is in his 15th season in the majors.
- Made each of his first three starts against Seattle to become the first pitcher in Oakland history to make three consecutive starts against one team in the same season without missing a turn in the rotation.
- Threw 38 consecutive strikes at one point during the A's 6-0 win at Los Angeles April 18...that was the longest such streak since pitch count data is first available in 1988...the previous best was 30 by Tim Wakefield in 1998.
- Was 1-3 with a 7.92 ERA and .386 opponents batting average in five starts in May...based on a minimum of 25.0 innings, he had the highest opponents batting average in the majors in May and the third highest ERA...the opponents average was the highest single-month mark of his career and the ERA was third highest (7.99 in June, 2004; 7.94 in September, 1998).
- Left his start June 17 against San Diego with no outs in the third inning with a strained right oblique...was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 23 retroactive to June 18 with the injury...was reinstated July 3.

## RYAN COOK

- Became the third pitcher in Athletics franchise history to record four strikeouts in an inning April 27 at Baltimore (Blake Stein, 1998; Erik Hiljus, 2001).
- Did not allow a run over his first 21 games and 23.0 innings...that was the longest season-opening scoreless streak by a player on the Athletics Opening Day roster since at least 1918...the previous high was 21.0 innings by Ale Kellner in 1953...had a career-high 24.0 inning scoreless streak dating back to September 28, 2011.
- Was the only A's player named to the American League All-Star team and pitched a perfect seventh inning, striking out Harper and Wright...it was his first career All-Star selection...he is the seventh Oakland rookie to be named to the AL All-Star team, along with Wayne Gross (1977), Matt Keough (1978), Jose Canseco (1986), Mark McGwire (1987), Ben Grieve (1998) and Andrew Bailey (2009).

## COLLIN COWGILL

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and went 0 for 4 with three walks in three games before he was optioned to Sacramento April 17.
- Was recalled by Oakland May 11
- Had a career-high eight-game hitting streak from May 26 to June 5 (13 for 31, .419).
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 23 with a sprained left ankle...began a rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton July 9 and went 1 for 8 (.125) in two games before he was transferred to Sacramento July 12...went 3 for 18 (.167) with a RBI in four games with the River Cats before he was reinstated from the DL and optioned to Sacramento July 17.

## COCO CRISP

- Was the A's 13th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 13 years...had 203 career starts in left entering the season, but none since October 2, 2005.
- Committed his first error since April 25, 2011 on April 7 against Seattle, snapping a 116-game error-less streak...that streak was seventh longest by an outfielder in Oakland history.
- Stole three bases June 19 against Los Angeles (NL)...it was his fifth career game of three or more steals, his fourth with the A's...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (45) and Bert Campaneris (10) have more three-steal games.
- Was caught stealing after being picked off in the first inning June 21 against Los Angeles (NL), his first caught stealing since July 10, 2011 at Texas...that ended his Athletics record streak of 36 consecutive stolen bases without a caught stealing (caught stealing became an official stat in 1920)...broke the previous mark of 28 set by Stan Javier (May 31-October 1, 1995).
- Led off the game with a home run June 27 at Seattle and July 3 against Boston...now has four lead-off home runs as an Athletic and six in his career...the four with the A's are tied for fourth most in Oakland history.
- Finished the game July 3 with a "walk-off" sacrifice fly, his third career game-ending RBI (last: August 14, 2007 against Tampa Bay)...it was the 21st game-ending sacrifice fly in Oakland history, the first since Dan Johnson on May 15, 2007 against Kansas City...is the first Athletic with a leadoff home run and walk-off RBI in the same game since Rickey Henderson on August 12, 1992 against Chicago.
- Had his third career two-homer game July 25 at Toronto.

## FAUTINO DE LOS SANTOS

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and compiled a 3.00 ERA in six relief appearances before he was optioned to Sacramento, April 25.
- Did not retire a batter over his final three outings before his option (5 h, 2 r, 1 er, 2 bb).
- Was traded to Milwaukee July 29 for George Kottaras.

## JOEY DEVINE

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 retroactive to March 24...underwent "Tommy John" surgery on his right elbow April 10... Dr. James Andrews performed the surgery in Pensacola, Fla., which included an ulnar collateral ligament reconstruction, an ulnar nerve transposition and a debridement of the flexor tendon...also had "Tommy John" surgery on the same elbow April 21, 2009.
- Was transferred to the 60-day DL May 15.

## JOSH DONALDSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster but hit just .094 in nine games before he was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento April 23.
- Made nine starts, all at third base, during his first stint...his Major League experience prior to this season included seven games at catcher and two at first base.
- Was recalled May 12 and snapped a career-high tying 0 for 17 streak with his eighth inning double May 14 at Los Angeles (also May 1-13, 2010).
- Went 3 for 4 with two doubles, a home run and five RBI May 18 at San Francisco...the hits, doubles and RBI were all career highs.
- Drew his first walk of the season June 13 at Colorado, snapping a streak of 30 consecutive games without a walk dating back to September 22, 2010...that was the longest streak by an Athletic since

Scott Hemond had a 31-game streak from May 3 to July 2, 1994...it was his first walk since September 19, 2010 at Minnesota.

- Was batting .182 in 19 games during his second stint with the A's when he was optioned to Sacramento June 21.

### SEAN DOOLITTLE

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento June 4 and made his major League debut June 5 against Texas (1.1 ip, 3 so)...struck out the first three batters he faced...the last A's pitcher to strike out the first three batters he faced in his career was Blake Stein on May 10, 1998 against Chicago.

### PEDRO FIGUEROA

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 21 and made his Major League debut that night against Cleveland...tossed a scoreless ninth and his only base runner (Cunningham walk) was erased on a double play.
- Was optioned to Sacramento May 22 after posting a 2.00 ERA with nine walks in 9.0 innings in eight games.
- Returned to Oakland June 17 and tossed 3.0 scoreless innings that day against San Diego before he was optioned back to Sacramento June 21.
- Was recalled a third time July 13 when Jim Miller went on the paternity list but was optioned back to Sacramento July 16 without appearing in a game.

### BRIAN FUENTES

- Recorded his 200th career save May 2 at Boston to become the sixth left-handed reliever in Major League history to reach the 200 plateau (Franco, Wagner, Myers, Righetti, Lyle).
- Had a 2.84 ERA and .222 opponents batting average over his first 19 appearances through May 27... then went 0-2 with a save, two blown saves, a 19.50 ERA and .452 opponents batting average over his final seven outings.
- Was designated for assignment on July 3 and released July 11.

### GRAHAM GODFREY

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and went 0-3 with a 5.06 ERA in three starts before he was optioned to Sacramento April 21.
- Recalled May 22 and went 0-1 with a 10.80 ERA in two games, one start, before he was sent back to Sacramento May 27.

### JONNY GOMES

- Was hit by a Jonathan Braxton pitch with the bases loaded in the bottom of the 12th inning April 11 against Kansas City to force in the winning run in the A's 5-4 victory...it was his second career walk-off hit by pitch (August 21, 2011 vs. Philadelphia)...it was his fifth career walk-off RBI (two home runs, one walk)...it was the third walk-off hit by pitch in Oakland history (Mike Bordick, August 4, 1993 vs. Seattle and Olmedo Saenz, July 20, 2002 vs. Texas).
- Singled in the eighth inning April 19 at Los Angeles after homering for each of his first three hits for the season...is the first player in Oakland history whose first three hits in a season were all home runs.
- Hit the game-winning pinch-hit two-run home run in the seventh inning June 16 against San Diego, his third career pinch hit home run (last: June 28, 2008 at Pittsburgh)...it snapped a 0 for 34 streak as a pinch hitter and was his first pinch hit since August 29, 2010 against Chicago (NL).
- Hit his third career grand slam July 13 at Minnesota, his first since August 7, 2007 at Detroit...added a RBI single in the ninth inning to finish with five RBI...it was his third career game of five or more RBI, his first since June 12, 2010 against Kansas City when he had a career-high six.
- Hit his 10th home run of the season July 15 at Minnesota, the seventh time he has reached the 10-home run plateau in his career.

### A.J. GRIFFIN

- Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 24 and made his Major League debut that day with a start against San Francisco.

## BRANDON HICKS

- Was claimed off waivers from Atlanta March 13 and was optioned to Sacramento March 15.
- Recalled by Oakland June 23 after batting .272 with 13 home runs and 48 RBI in 65 games with the River Cats... was tied for the Pacific Coast League lead in hit by pitches (7) at the time of his promotion... also ranked second in strikeouts (76), fifth in extra base hits (37), tied for sixth in doubles (21), eighth in home runs (13), ninth in runs (49) and 10th in RBI (48) and slugging (.548).
- Went 0 for 4 with four strikeouts July 13 at Minnesota ...it was the first four strikeout game of his career.
- Hit his first Major League home run July 18 against Texas, a “walk-off” shot off Michael Kirkman in the bottom of the ninth inning... became the fourth player in Athletics history to hit a game-ending home run for his first ML home run, the second this year (Derek Norris, June 24)... the other two are Dee Miles (September 14, 1939) and George Hendrick (May 28, 1972).
- Was optioned to Sacramento Aug. 2.

## LUKE HUGHES

- Was claimed off waivers from Minnesota April 22 and went 1 for 13 (.077) in four games with the A’s before he was designated for assignment April 30...cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento May 2.

## BRANDON INGE

- Agreed to terms with the A’s on a one-year contract April 30 after he was released by Detroit April 26.
- Had four four-RBI game over a five-game span from May 6 to 11...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the second player in Major League history with four games of four or more RBI over a five-game stretch...the other is Lou Gehrig in 1931...now has 14 career games with four or more RBI...drove in 16 runs over that five-game stretch...since 1970, the only other Athletic to drive in 16 runs over a five-game span is Damian Miller (June 6-11, 2004).
- Had the game-ending grand slam in the bottom of the ninth inning May 8 against Toronto...it was his seventh career “walk-off” home run and his 10th “walk-off plate appearance (two singles, one sacrifice fly)...it was the sixth “walk-off” grand slam in Oakland history (Tenace, 1973; Armas, 1980; McGwire, 1990 and 1995; Ellis, 2008).
- Added another grand slam May 10 against Detroit...is just the second player in Athletics history to hit two grand slams over a three-game span...the other is Jimmie Foxx (September 22 and 24, 1932)...now has seven career grand slams.
- Had 17 RBI in his first 10 games with the A’s...those are the most in Oakland history by a player in his first 10 games with the A’s...the previous best was 15 by Mitchell Page (1977) and Jack Cust (2007).
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 17 retroactive to May 13 with a strained right groin... it is his second stint on the disabled list this year as he began the season on Detroit’s DL with a strained left groin.
- Went 5 for 5 with three runs, two doubles, two home runs (including a grand slam) and seven RBI in a start at third base for Triple-A Sacramento May 26 against Reno in the second game of his two-game rehab assignment.
- Was reinstated from the DL May 29.

## KILA KA’AIHUE

- Matched his career high with three hits April 15 at Seattle (third time, last: Sept. 28, 2010 vs. Minnesota).
- Had the game-winning RBI single in the 14th inning April 25 against Chicago, his second career walk-off hit (home run, April 1, 2011 vs. Los Angeles-AL).
- Was batting .234 with four home runs and 14 RBI in 39 games when he was designated for assignment June 6...cleared waivers and was outrighted to Triple-A Sacramento June 16.

## BRANDON MCCARTHY

- Made his first career Opening Day start March 28 against Seattle and had a no decision in the A’s 3-1, 11-inning loss...allowed just one run on six hits and no walks in 7.0 innings.

- Also started the third game of the season, April 6 against Seattle, to become the second pitcher in Oakland history to start two of the A's first three games...the other is Joe Blanton who did it in 2008, the other time the A's opened the season in Japan...also started three of the first seven games, joining Blanton as the only Oakland pitchers to do that since 1977.

#### JIM MILLER

- Picked up his first Major League win April 25 against Chicago...allowed two inherited runners to score in the top of the 14th inning but the A's came back with three in the bottom of the inning.
- Was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento May 11 after posting a 1.93 ERA in six relief appearances with the A's.
- Returned to Oakland May 20.
- Was placed on the paternity list July 13 and reinstated July 16.
- Was optioned to Sacramento Aug. 3.

#### TOMMY MILONE

- Combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit).
- Combined with Balfour on a four-hit, 2-0 shutout of Chicago April 24 in Oakland...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed three of the hits...according to the Elias Sports Bureau he is just the second Oakland rookie over the last 75 years to have two wins while pitching at least eight scoreless innings and allowing three or fewer hits in a season (Vida Blue, 1970).
- Was the winning pitcher in the A's 2-1 win over Los Angeles May 21 in Oakland...became the first pitcher in Oakland history to win each of his first four starts at the Coliseum.

#### BRANDON MOSS

- Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 6 after batting .286 with 15 home runs and 33 RBI in 51 games with the River Cats...the home runs were tied for second in the Pacific Coast League and tied for sixth in all of minor league baseball at the time of his promotion.
- Homered June 7 against Texas, his first since September 2, 2009 at Cincinnati...it snapped a career-high 49-game homerless streak.
- Had his first career two-homer game June 12 at Colorado.
- Homered in all three games of the Colorado series June 12-14 and had four home runs total...is the first Athletic to hit four home runs in a three-game series since Geronimo Berroa against Minnesota, August 12-14, 1996.
- Matched his career-high with three hits (fifth time, first since June 20, 2009 at Colorado) and three RBI (fourth time, second time this year: June 12 at Colorado) June 14 at Colorado.
- Homered in four consecutive games June 12-15...it was the 20th time in Oakland history a player homered in at least four straight games...hit five home runs during the stretch to become the second Athletic since 2000 to hit five home runs over a four-game span (Jack Cust, May 10-13, 2007).
- Became the second player in Athletics history to hit six home runs in his first nine games with the club (Jack Cust, 2007).
- Hit six home runs in interleague play, which tied for fifth in the majors and matched the Oakland interleague record set by Miguel Tejada in 2000.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of June 11-17...batted .348 with three doubles, five home runs, 10 RBI and seven runs scored in six games...it was his first Player of the Week award.
- Committed three errors in the sixth inning June 23 against San Francisco, tying the Major League record for most errors by a first baseman in an inning...it was the seventh time, the first since Jack Clark did it for St. Louis on May 25, 1987...since 1984, the only other Athletic to commit three errors in an inning is Kurt Abbott on May 10, 1998 vs. Chicago at shortstop.
- The three errors set an Oakland record for errors in a game by a first baseman...is the first Athletic first baseman to commit three errors in a game since Lou Limmer on August 19, 1954 vs. New York.
- Tied for eighth in the AL with seven home runs in June.

- Hit his 10th home run in his 24th game on July 4 at Boston...in Athletics history, only Dave Kingman reached 10 home runs in fewer than his first 24 games with the club (19 in 1984).
- Had the game-ending single in the bottom of the ninth inning July 20 against New York, his third career walk-off hit (last: July 22, 2009 vs. Milwaukee).

### JORDAN NORBERTO

- Retired the final two batters May 1 at Boston for his first Major League save...he saved Jarrod Parker's first ML win, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 4 retroactive to May 31 with a strained left shoulder...made one rehab appearance with Triple-A Sacramento June 19 and was reinstated June 21.
- Recorded his first Major League win July 6 against Seattle when he struck out the side in the 11th inning of the A's 4-1 win.

### DEREK NORRIS

- Was recalled from Sacramento June 21 after batting .273 with eight home runs and 36 RBI in 55 games in his Triple-A debut...made his Major League debut with a start at catcher that day against Los Angeles (NL) and went 0 for 3.
- Singled off Madison Bumgarner in the fifth inning June 23 against San Francisco for his first Major League hit...added a RBI single in the ninth inning for his first RBI and first multiple hit game.
- Hit his first Major League home run June 24 against San Francisco, a three-run "walk-off" shot in the bottom of the ninth off Santiago Casilla...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the third player in Athletics history to hit a game-ending home run for his first ML home run...the other two are Dee Miles (September 14, 1939) and George Hendrick (May 28, 1972).
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 30 streak July 22 against New York (AL).
- Was optioned to Sacramento July 30 when George Kottaras reported to Oakland but returned Aug. 3 when Kurt Suzuki was traded to Washington.

### JARROD PARKER

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 25 and had a no decision in his A's debut, a 5-4, 14-inning win over Chicago April 25 in Oakland...shutout the White Sox on five hits and a walks over the first six innings to extend his career-opening scoreless streak to 11.2 innings...Balfour allowed a run in the ninth inning for the blown save.
- Earned his first Major League win in the A's 5-3 victory at Boston May 1...Norberto recorded the save, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.

### CLIFF PENNINGTON

- Doubled in the second inning June 4 against Texas to snap a career-high 0 for 29 streak (previous: 0 for 27, May 22-June 1, 2010).
- Went 3 for 3 June 15, his 28th birthday...is 6 for 12 (.500) with one double, one triple, four RBI and four runs scored in three career games on his birthday.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list July 20 with left elbow tendinitis...had the lowest slugging percentage in the majors (.282) and the second lowest batting average (.197) and on-base percentage (.259) when he went on the DL.

### ANTHONY RECKER

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and hit .129 in 13 games as the back-up to Kurt Suzuki before he was optioned to Sacramento May 28.

### JOSH REDDICK

- Was the A's fifth different Opening Day starter in right field in the last five years.
- Had career highs May 11 against Detroit with four runs, four hits (tied), two home runs and five RBI...is the eighth player in Oakland history with at least four runs, four hits, two home runs and five RBI in a game...the last was Matt Holliday (July 20, 2009 vs. Minnesota).



- Hit 10 home runs in May, which tied for third in the AL...is the first Athletic to hit 10 home runs in a month since Frank Thomas had 10 in September, 2006...also tied for fourth in the AL in runs in May (20) and tied for fifth in walks (17).
- Matched his career-high with four strikeouts June 29 against the Dodgers (August 4, 2009 at Tampa Bay).
- Had the game-ending RBI double July 8 against Seattle, his second career "walk-off" hit...the other was a single on August 7, 2011 against New York.

#### ADAM ROSALES

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and appeared in one game against Seattle in Japan before he was optioned to Sacramento April 2.
- Returned to Oakland May 17 but was optioned back to Sacramento June 16.
- Returned to Oakland for a third stint Aug. 2.

#### TYSON ROSS

- Began the season at Triple-A Sacramento and was 0-1 with a 4.00 ERA in two starts with the River Cats before he was recalled by Oakland April 17.
- Went 2-6 with a 6.51 ERA in nine starts with the A's before he was optioned back to Sacramento May 31.
- Returned on June 16 to start against San Diego and allowed two runs on one hit and four walks in 6.0 innings in a no decision...was optioned back to Sacramento the next day.
- Returned to Oakland for a third stint June 23 and went 0-2 with a 7.71 ERA in two starts before he was optioned back to Sacramento June 29.

#### EVAN SCRIBNER

- Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 6 after posting a 3.31 ERA and six saves in 23 relief appearances with the River Cats.
- Tossed 3.0 scoreless innings June 15 against San Diego and recorded his first Major League save in the A's 10-2 win.
- Was optioned to Sacramento June 16 but returned to Oakland June 24.
- Was optioned to Sacramento Aug. 3.

#### SCOTT SIZEMORE

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 3 after tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee in the team's first full-squad workout Feb. 27 in Phoenix...underwent successful reconstructive surgery March 21...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg of the Arizona Sports Medicine Center of Scottsdale...will miss the entire 2012 season.

#### SETH SMITH

- Was the A's eight different Opening Day starter at designated hitter in the last eight years.
- Hit his first home run of the season April 22 against Cleveland, a two-run shot off Masterson in the fourth inning, to snap a career-high 45-game homerless streak...his previous high was 35 (June 22-July 31, 2011)...it was his first home run since Aug. 23, 2011 against Houston.
- Went 0 for 4 with four strikeouts April 30 at Boston, the first four-strikeout game of his career.
- Went 4 for 5 on June 4 against Texas, his second career four-hit game (also September 4, 2009 vs. Arizona).
- Hit his 10th home run of the season July 15 at Minnesota, his fourth consecutive season with double figures in home runs.
- Matched his career-high with five RBI July 27 at Baltimore, despite not entering the game until the sixth inning.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list Aug. 3 with a strained left hamstring.

#### ERIC SOGARD

- Had a career-high three RBI, April 15 at Seattle.
- Was optioned to Sacramento May 21 but returned to Oakland June 16...appeared in just one game before he was optioned back to Sacramento June 24.
- Recalled a third time July 20 when Pennington went on the disabled list.

## KURT SUZUKI

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at catcher...the five starts are second most by a catcher in Oakland history...only Terry Steinbach, with nine, has more.
- Made his 598th career appearance at catcher April 7 against Seattle, which moves him past Ossee Schreckengost for fifth most in Athletics history.
- Had five assists April 25 against Chicago, the third time in Oakland history a catcher had five or more assists in a game (6, Jim Essian vs. Texas on Sept. 19, 1979; 5, Jeff Newman vs. Toronto on Aug. 13, 1979).
- Snapped a career-high 78-game homerless streak July 22 against New York...his previous high was 56 games from July 29-October 2, 2010...it was his first homer since September 15, 2011 against Detroit...the home run also snapped a career-high streak of 17 consecutive games without a RBI (previous: 16, July 28-August 14, 2008).
- Was traded to the Washington Nationals with cash for minor league catcher George Freitas, Aug. 3.

## RICH THOMPSON

- Was claimed off waivers from the Los Angeles Angels April 20 and appeared in one game for the A's before he was designated for assignment April 25...faced Chicago on April 23 (0.2 ip, 1 h).
- Cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento April 27.

## NEIL WAGNER

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 17 but did not appear in a game before he was optioned back to Sacramento April 20.
- Was claimed off waivers by San Diego May 28.

## JEMILE WEEKS

- Played in the 100th game of his career April 6 against Seattle and collected 126 hits over that span... since 1918, the only player in Athletics history with more hits over the first 100 games of his career is Wally Moses, who had 134 hits in his first 100 games with the Philadelphia A's in 1935-36...the previous Oakland record was 122 by Ben Grieve.

- Stole his 10th base of the season May 15 at Los Angeles (AL)...is the fifth player in Oakland history to steal at least 10 bases in each of his first two seasons, the first since Jason McDonald in 1997.
- Had two RBI June 4 against Texas, snapping a career-high 25-game streak without an RBI.
- Had the first three-walk game of his career June 19 against Los Angeles (NL).
- Went a career-high 35 consecutive games without a stolen base from May 16 to June 25.
