CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

Breslow joins the D-backs after spending 6 Major League seasons with the Padres (2005), Red Sox (2006), Indians (2008), Twins (2008-09) and A's (2009-11)...limited right-handed hitters to a .224 average (138-for-617) and lefties to a .224 clip (93-for-410) over his career...holds the A's franchise record for strikeouts by a left-handed reliever (71 in 2010)...graduated from Yale University in 2002 with degrees in molecular biophysics and biochemistry...was the 24th Bulldog to reach the Majors and first since pitcher Ron Darling in 1983...last name is pronounced: BREHZ-loh.

2011

- ◆ Was 0-2 with a 3.79 ERA (25 ER in 59.1 IP) in 67 appearances in his second full season with the A's...his .296 (69-for-233) opponents average and 3.79 ERA marked career highs.
- ◆ Led all relief pitchers with a career-high 5 pickoffs and topped American League relievers in caught stealing (7)...also ranked 11th in the AL in inherited runners scored percent (21.1, 8-of-38).
- ◆ Right-handers hit .261 (37-for-142) compared to .352 (32-for-91) vs. left-handers.
- ◆ Had a 3.06 ERA (11 ER in 32.1 IP) prior to the All-Star Break and a 4.67 ERA (14 E R in 27.0 IP) after.
- ◆ Compiled a pair of 11-game scoreless streaks (April 13-May 3 and June 11-July 15), tying his career high.

2010

- ◆ Established career highs in opponents average (.194), saves (5), strikeouts (71) and innings pitched (74.2), going 4-4 with a 3.01 ERA (25 ER) in 75 games.
- ◆ Set an Oakland record for strikeouts by a left-handed reliever and his 75 games tied for the fifth highest single-season total (also three others).
- ◆ Ranked among AL relievers in appearances (2nd), innings pitched (T4th), strikeouts (T6th) and opponents average (10th).
- ◆ Limited first batters faced to a .130 average (9-for-69), sixth-lowest in the AL...allowed 21.2 percent (7-of-33) of inherited runners to score, seventh-lowest in the AL.
- ◆ Opponents were 0-for-11 with 0 RBI with the bases loaded...the 11 at-bats were the most among all relief pitchers that did not allow a RBI with the bases loaded and the most by an AL pitcher since at least 1974.
- ◆ Struck out a career-high 4 batters on June 4 vs. Twins...retired 19 consecutive batters from June 13-27...made his 200th appearance on July 20 @ Red Sox.
- ◆ His save on July 28 @ Rangers was the first since Aug. 29, 2008 @ A's.

2009

- ◆ Combined to go 8-7 with a 3.36 ERA (26 ER in 69.2 IP) in 77 games with the Twins and A's...set career highs in wins, losses and appearances...was claimed by the A's off waivers from the Twins on May 20.
- ◆ Was 1-2 with a 6.28 ERA (10 ER in 14.1 IP) in 17 games with the Twins, and 7-5 with a 2.60 ERA (16 ER in 55.1 IP) in 60 games with the A's.
- ◆ Ranked among AL relievers in losses (T1st), wins (2nd), appearances (2nd) and opponents average (T10th, .197)...

- ◆ Allowed 24.0 percent (12-of-50) of inherited runners to score, 10th-best in the AL.
- ◆ Recorded his first Major League win on May 14 vs. Detroit (0 ER in 1.2 IP)...made his 100th career appearance on June 1 @ White Sox.
- ◆ Compiled a career-best 13.2 scoreless innings pitched streak from Aug. 31-Oct. 4.

2008

- ◆ Was 0-2 with a career-best 1.91 ERA (10 ER in 47.0 IP) and 1 save in 49 games with the Indians and Twins
- ◆ Began the season with the Red Sox but was claimed off waivers by the Indians on March 23...was designated for assignment by the Indians on May 23 and claimed off waivers by the Twins on May 29.
- ◆ Went 0-0 with a 3.24 ERA (3 ER in 8.1 IP) in 7 games with the Indians, and 0-2 with a 1.63 ERA (7 ER in 38.2 IP) and 1 save in 42 games with the Twins.
- ◆ Set a career-high with 11 straight scoreless outings (10.2 IP) from May 31-June 30...posted a 0.54 ERA (1 ER in 16.2 IP) in his final 18 games.
- ◆ Earned his first save with 3.0 scoreless innings pitched on Aug. 28 @ A's.

- ◆ Spent the entire season with Triple-A Pawtucket, going 2-3 with a 4.06 ERA (31 ER in 68.2 IP), 1 save and 73 strikeouts in 49 games (one start).

- ◆ Went 7-1 with a 2.69 ERA (20 ER in 67.0 IP) and 7 saves in 39 games with Pawtucket...also made 13 relief appearances over three stints with the Red Sox, going 0-2 with a 3.75 ERA (5 ER in 12.0 IP).
- ◆ Named to the IL midseason All-Star Team and tabbed as Pawtucket's Most Valuable Pitcher.
- ◆ Signed by the Red Sox as a free agent on Jan. 4.

2005

- ◆ Combined to go 2-2 with a 2.93 ERA (20 ER in 61.1 IP) in 47 games between Double-A Mobile and Triple-A Portland...appeared in 13 games with the Padres and posted a 2.20 ERA (4 ER in 16.1 IP).
- ◆ His contract was purchased by the Padres on July 23 and made his Major League debut @ Phillies, striking out 3 in 1.2 scoreless IP...tossed a career-high 3.2 IP on Sept. 20 @ Rockies.

- ◆ Split the season between Single-A High Desert and New Jersey of the independent Northeast League...was 1-3 with a 7.19 ERA (33 ER in 41.1 IP) in 23 games with High Desert before his release on July 6.
- ◆ Was 3-1 with a 4.10 ERA (12 ER in 26.1 IP) and 1 save in 19 games with the Jackals.

2003

- ◆ Went 3-4 with a 5.12 ERA (37 ER in 65.0 IP), 2 saves and 80 strikeouts in 33 relief appearances with Single-A Beloit...averaged 11.1 strikeouts per 9.0 IP.

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CAREER SUMMARY

Veteran first baseman enters his fifth full big league season and 11th in professional baseball...is now the longest-tenured Dodger in the Major Leagues...has played in 638 games since the start of the 2008 season, which ties Nick Markakis for the fourth most in the Majors over that time, trailing just Prince Fielder (644), Adrian Gonzalez (641) and Robinson Cano (639)...has appeared in 158 or more games in each of the last four seasons...batted .314 (137-for-437) from April 26, 2011 through the end of the season, which was the fourth highest in the National League over that time...led the NL and ranked second in the Majors with a .357 average over the final two months of 2011...set a career high with five hits on Sept. 18, 2011, going 5-for-5 vs. Pittsburgh...his 400 RBI since 2007 rank second on the Dodgers over that time, trailing only Matt Kemp (434)...ranked fifth in the National League with a career-high 41 doubles and led the Dodgers with 157 hits in 2010...batted .327 (56-for-171) with runners in scoring position, the 10th-best mark in the NL in 2010...his .996 fielding percentage is tied with Todd Helton and Adam LaRoche for the best in the NL over the last three seasons...has made just 16 errors over 3,883.1 innings over that span...in 2009, joined Matt Kemp (101) and Andre Ethier (106) as the first Dodger trio to collect at least 90 RBI in a season since 2001, when Shawn Green (125), Gary Sheffield (100) and Paul Lo Duca (90) accomplished the feat...led the Dodgers with 90 RBI in 2008 ...in 2008, hit 38 doubles and joined Andre Ethier and Matt Kemp as the first Dodger trio to each collect at least 35 doubles in a season...opened the 2008 season with a 15-game hitting streak, which was the third longest streak to start a season in Los Angeles Dodger history, behind Steve Garvey (21 games) and Ron Cey (17 games)...thumped a grand slam off Ryan Dempster in Game 1 of the 2008 NLDS vs. Chicago, propelling the Dodgers to a three-game sweep and their first playoff series victory in 20 years...in eight playoff games in the 2008 NLDS and NLCS, hit .333 (10-for-30) with a homer, three doubles, and eight RBI...finished his rookie season with a .331 average, 15 homers and 67 RBI in just 96 games...finished seventh in NL Rookie of the Year Voting...the .331 average was the eighth highest in Los Angeles Dodger history among players with a minimum of 300 at-bats...reached base safely in 30 straight games from June 24-July 25, which was tied for the 15th-longest streak in the Majors in 2007...was the National League's 2007 Rookie of the Month after a torrid September that saw him hit .382 with nine homers and a Major League-leading 32 RBI...became the fourth Dodger in Los Angeles history with 32 or more RBI in a single month...tied a Dodger record by being a part of five double plays on Sept. 4, 2007 at Wrigley Field...rated by *Baseball America* as the team's fourth-best prospect entering 2007...the publication also tabbed him as the organization's best hitter for average...also rated as the 37th-best prospect in baseball by SI.com...had a day for the ages in Colorado on Sept. 28, 2006 going 4-for-5 with two homers and nine RBI, including his first career grand slam...the nine RBI tied Gil Hodges' Dodger franchise record and broke Ron Cey's Los Angeles Dodger record of eight...also became the first rookie to drive in nine runs since Boston's Fred Lynn accomplished the feat on June 18, 1975...after leading all of minor league baseball with a .380 average, was rewarded by being named the Dodger organization's Minor League Player of the Year in 2006...also won the organization's Player of the Month in June and July...made his big league debut on April 4, 2006 and singled off Atlanta right-hander John Smoltz in his second at-bat for his first Major League hit...cracked his first Major League homer on Sept. 2, 2006 against Colorado...added to the Dodgers' 40-man roster on Nov. 16, 2005...selected in the first round (19th overall) of the June 2002 First-Year Player Draft.

YEAR-BY-YEAR

2011

- Rebounded with a strong second half to rank among the team leaders in runs (56, 3rd), hits (153, 2nd), doubles (30, T-2nd), home runs (12, 3rd) and RBI (65, 2nd)
- Batted just .170 (16-for-94) in his first 24 games through April 25 before hitting .314 (137-for-437) over his final 134 games...his batting average from April 26 through the end of the season was the fourth highest in the National League
- Hit .290 or better in four months, doing so in May (.293), June (.337), August (.367) and September (.348)

- Batted .312 against right-handed pitchers (126-for-404), which was the seventh-highest mark in the NL...slugged 10 of his 12 home runs against righties...hit just .213 against left-handers (27-for-127)
- Hit .373 (22-for-59) in 15 Interleague games, which was the sixth-best mark by a National Leaguer
- Batted .318 (27-for-85) in close-and-late situations, which was the 14th-best mark in the NL...came through in the clutch, hitting .306 with runners in scoring position and two outs (19-for-62)
- Batted .324 (12-for-37) during his season-long 10-game hitting streak from May 14-24
- Drove in at least one run in six straight games (eight RBI) from Aug. 23-29, which was a season-long RBI streak for a Dodger
- Set a career high with five hits against Pittsburgh on Sept. 18, going 5-for-5 with two runs scored, a double and three RBI
- Posted a .996 fielding percentage and committed only five errors in 1,203.2 innings in the field over 151 games (134 starts) at first base
- Led the NL and ranked second in the Majors with a .357 batting average (61-for-171) in 52 games from Aug. 1 through the end of the season...also ranked among the NL leaders in hits (61, T-10th), extra-base hits (26, T-4th), doubles (17, T-3rd), RBI (32, T-16th), on-base percentage (.416, 4th) and slugging percentage (.608, 3rd) in that span
- Hit safely in 29 of his last 37 games from Aug. 19 through the conclusion of the season with 16 multi-hit games...batted .455 (15-for-33) with runners in scoring position in that span

2010

- Consistent first baseman led the club with 157 hits in his fifth Major League season
- Ranked fifth in the National League with a career-high 41 doubles...became the fifth Dodger since 1990 to reach 40 doubles in a season along with Shawn Green (2002, 2003), Raul Mondesi (1996, 1997), Eric Karros (1999) and Andre Ethier (2009)...set a career high with three doubles on June 15 and had five multi-double games
- Had a great first half of the season, ranking among the NL leaders in batting average (.309, 14th), hits (104, 4th), doubles (25, 4th) and RBI (63, 5th) through 88 games...batted just .211 in 73 games in the second half
- Ranked second on the club with 88 RBI and had an RBI in six consecutive games from April 30-May 6, a career-long streak which is the longest for a Dodger since Ramon Martinez's six-game streak from Aug. 19-27, 2007
- Hit .327 (56-for-171) with runners in scoring position, the 10th-best mark in the NL, and batted .316 (89-for-282) with runners on base...went 7-for-16 (.438) with the bases loaded, the 10th-highest average in the NL
- Ranked second on the club with 41 multi-hit games, tied for 12th in the National League with 14 games with three or more hits and tied for eighth on the circuit with three four-hit games
- Hit his first-career walk-off home run on July 24 to give the Dodgers a 3-2, 13-inning win over the Mets...also delivered a game-winning, walk-off single in the 10th inning on Aug. 7 against Washington
- Ranked fourth on the club with a career-high 10 steals
- His 53 extra-base hits were the third-most on the club...went 2-for-3 (.667) with a walk and an RBI in four pinch-hitting appearances
- Appeared in 161 games this season and has played in 480 contests since the start of the 2008 season, which ties for the third most among Major Leaguers in that span
- Was ejected in the second game of the April 27 doubleheader at New York for arguing balls and strikes for his first career ejection...also ejected on June 25 for arguing balls and strikes after striking out to end the game against the Yankees
- Posted career-low marks in batting average (.267), on-base percentage (.329) and slugging percentage (.395), while striking out a career-high 95 times
- Committed just four errors in 1,411 innings, tying for second among NL first basemen with a .997 fielding percentage

2009

- Finished his second full season with the Dodgers hitting .281 with 13 homers, 90 RBI, 25 doubles, 73 runs scored, 162 hits and a .357 on-base percentage...walked more times (70, a career high) than he struck out (68)
- Matched his career high from 2008 with 90 RBI...ranked third on the team and joined Matt Kemp (101) and Andre Ethier (106) as the first Dodger trio to collect at least 90 RBI in a season since 2001, when Shawn Green (125), Gary Sheffield (100) and Paul Lo Duca (90) accomplished the feat
- Was steady against left-handers, hitting .274 (34-for-124) as opposed to .283 (128-for-452) vs. right-handers

- Batted .281 prior to the All-Star break and .282 after the Midsummer Classic
- Hit .294 (50-for-170) with runners in scoring position...hit .291 from the seventh inning on
- Excelled away from Dodger Stadium, batting .309 and hitting 12 of his 13 homers on the road..belted his first home run at Dodger Stadium on Sept. 19 vs. SF...nearly became the first Major League player since Jose Cruz in 1984 to finish a season in double digits in homers, all of which came on the road
- Did not homer in the season's opening month, but had 16 RBI, hit .313 and walked 16 times as opposed to just four strikeouts in 23 games
- Had a season-high 12-game hitting streak from June 29-July 16, when he batted .304 (14-for-46) with eight walks and a .408 on-base percentage
- Scored a season-best three runs on two separate occasions (July 21 vs. CIN and Sept. 19 vs. SF)...in both contests he went 3-for-4
- Drove in a season-high four runs twice...May 13 at PHI and May 27 at COL
- Collected a season-high four hits on July 29 at St.Louis...went 4-for-7 in the 15-inning contest
- Appeared in 158 of the team's 162 games, including 147 starts, all at first base...made just seven errors in 1,361 total chances, good for a .995 fielding percentage which tied him for fourth in the NL

2008

- Was voted the Roy Campanella Award as the "Most Inspirational Dodger," by his teammates and coaches
- In his 150 starts at first, made 13 errors in 1,498 chances, good for a .991 fielding percentage
- Established career highs in every offensive category except home runs and finished up the year hitting .289 with 35 doubles, 13 homers, 90 RBI and a .338 on-base percentage...Loney, Andre Ethier and Matt Kemp became the first trio of Dodgers in franchise history to all hit at least 35 doubles in a season
- Ranked first on the club in RBI, third in average and third with 44 multi-hit games
- Batted .305 against right-handers as opposed to .249 vs. lefties...hit .301 at Dodger Stadium and just .272 on the road
- Did a lot of damage inside the division, hitting .305 with seven homers and 44 RBI against the National League West
- Was the Dodgers' Player of the Month in June, hitting .362 (34-for-94) with 12 runs scored and an on-base percentage of .425 in 27 games...batted .330 in August, his second-highest average in any month
- Finished out the first half batting .291 with seven homers and a team-best 50 RBI
- Stole a career-high seven bases in 11 attempts on the season

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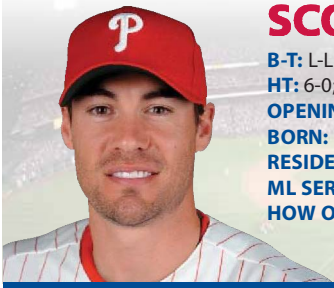
