### A's vs. ORIOLAS

The A's lead the season series 4-3...win the first meeting in Oakland last night after splitting six games in Baltimore...need one more win to clinch the season series for the fifth consecutive season...have not lost a season series to Baltimore since 1998...have won 26 of their last 37 games against the Orioles, including 15 of the last 17 in Oakland...are 81-38 (.681) against Baltimore since the start of the 1999 season, which is the **best winning percentage against the Orioles by an American League team over that span**...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 248-244 against the Orioles...that breaks down to 123-125 in Oakland and 125-119 in Baltimore...all-time, the A's are 984-924 against the Orioles/Browns/Brewers...of the other seven original AL franchises, the Orioles are the only team the A's have a winning record against.

### TODAY'S TIDBITS

The A's currently have 14 rookies on the roster...have used 18 rookies overall, which is second most in the majors to the Cubs (20)...11 of the 18 have been pitchers and they have combined for an Oakland record 242 games pitched...have 41 wins, which is three short of the record of 44 set in 2009...have 514 strikeouts, which is second best to the record of 618 in 2009...have 626.2 innings, which is third best behind 780.2 innings in 2009 and 736.2 innings in 1983.

### THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In **1931** the A's clinch their third consecutive American League pennant as Eddie Rommel defeats Cleveland, 14-3...it is the ninth and final pennant for manager Connie Mack...in **1971** the A's score twice in the eighth inning to defeat Chicago 3-2 in the first game of a doubleheader, clinching their first AL West title...in **1990** Dennis Eckersley becomes Oakland's all-time saves leader when he saves his 137<sup>th</sup> game as an Athletic, breaking Rollie Fingers record of 136.

### ABOUT THE A'S

**ABOUT THE A'S:** Have won seven of the last eight games, 16 of the last 20 and 22 of the last 28...are a season-high tying 22 games over .500 at 83-61 (.576)...that is the second best record in the American League and fourth best in the majors...it is the A's best record after 144 games since 2004 when they were 84-60 (lost game 145)...have clinched a winning record for the first time since 2006 (93-69)...the 83 wins are nine more than last year, which is the A's biggest improvement since 2000-01 when they went from 91 wins to 102...are in second place in the AL West and trail Texas by three games for the fifth consecutive day...have not been closer to first place since April 13 when they were two out...are in first place in the AL Wild Card, two games ahead of second place Baltimore/New York and 4½ games ahead of third place Los Angeles...have held at least a share of a playoff spot each of the last 24 days (since August 22) and 44 of the last 56 (since July 21)...have the **best record in the majors** since the All-Star Break (40-18) and since the start of July (46-19)...also have the **best record in the majors** since June 2 (61-31), the date the A's snapped their season-high nine game losing streak...in the West, have spent one day tied for first this year, 75 days in second, 11 days tied for second, 54 days in third, eight days tied for third and 11 days in fourth.

**DON'T WALK:** A's starting pitchers have walked three batters or fewer in each of the last 43 games, which is the longest streak by an A's team since at least 1921...the previous high was 41 from July 16-August 28, 2001...have walked 46 batters in 260.1 innings during this stretch (1.59 per nine innings), which includes 12 games without a walk and 18 games with just one...have issued just 217 walks for the season, which is the fewest in the American League...are averaging 2.24 walks per nine innings (871.1 ip), which is the lowest mark by A's starters since at least 1921 (2.36 in 1974).

**THE LONG BALL:** Yoenis Céspedes hit his 19<sup>th</sup> home run of the season last night, which is second most on the A's to Josh Reddick (28)...the A's have not had two players hit 20 or more home runs since 2007 (Cust and Swisher)...have 85 home runs since the All-Star Break, which is second most in the majors (CWS, 86)...have 168 home runs overall, which ranks seventh in the American League but is ninth in the majors...it is a 47.4% increase over last years total of 114...the A's are 69-33 (.676) when they homer, including 36-10 (.783) with two or more homers.

**CLOSE CALLS:** The A's 3-2 win last night was their 14<sup>th</sup> win in their last 17 one-run games...are 22-15 (.595) in one-run decisions overall, which is the third best record in the American League...have a **Major League leading** 13 "walk-off" wins...are 20-11 in games decided in the last at bat...the 20 wins are second most in the American League to Baltimore (21)...are 26-23 in games decided in the seventh inning or later...are 9-3 (.750) in extra inning games...have the second most extra inning wins and second best record in the American League...11 of the A's 12 extra inning games have lasted more than 10 innings.

**PITCHING:** The A's have allowed two runs or fewer in six of the last eight games and have a 2.15 ERA (17 er in 71.0 ip) over that span...have a 3.39 ERA for the season, which ranks second in the American League...the last time the A's finished the season with an ERA under 3.56 was in 1990 (3.18)...have allowed the fewest home runs in the AL (123), rank second in opponents batting average (.243), on-base percentage (.303) and slugging percentage (.370) and third in shutouts (13)...are tied with Colorado and Kansas City for the Major League lead in pickoffs (20)...A's starting pitchers have recorded the decision in each of the last 19 games, which is the second longest streak by an A's team since 1993...had a 26-game streak from August 22-September 19, 2010...are 15-4 with a 2.80 ERA (36 er in 115.2 ip) over this current 19-game streak...have a 3.68 ERA (356 er in 871.1 ip) for the season, which is second lowest in the AL...starters have allowed the fewest home runs in the AL (86).

**STRIKEOUTS:** The A's struck out 11 times last night and now have 1211 for the season, which is second most in the majors (Houston, 1215)...it is 15 short of the Athletics franchise record of 1226 set in 2008...it is tied for the 12<sup>th</sup> highest single season total in American League history...the AL record is 1324 by Tampa Bay in 2007.

**OFFENSE:** The A's rank third in the American League with 291 runs scored since the All-Star Break (58 games, 5.02 per game)...were last in the AL in runs before the break (319, 3.71 per game)...have been shut out 16 times, which is the most in the majors...it is also the third highest total in Oakland history and is the most since 1979 (17)...the record is 19 in 1978...are batting .251 (507 for 2023) since the All-Star Break after hitting a Major League low .225 before the break...are batting .236 overall, which is second lowest in the AL...the lowest batting average in Oakland history is .236 in 1982...have the second lowest on-base percentage in the AL (.307) but are fourth in walks (477)...lead the majors in pitches per plate appearance (3.98)...A's pinch hitters are batting an AL leading .296 (21 for 71)...pinch hitters also lead the AL in doubles (7), walks (12), on-base percentage (.388) and slugging percentage (.479) and rank third in RBI (15).

**HOME AND AWAY:** The A's are 1-0 on this brief three-game homestand against Baltimore...went 3-3 on the last homestand against Boston (3-0) and Los Angeles (0-3) and are 43-30 (.589) at home...that is the third best home record in the American League...the 43 wins match the home win total from last year and the A's have clinched a winning record at home for the third consecutive season...went 6-1 on the last road trip to Seattle (3-0) and Los Angeles (3-1)...it marked the A's second consecutive 6-1 trip, which ties for the sixth best road trip in Oakland history...are 40-31 (.563) on the road, which is the best road record in the AL...need one more win on the road to clinch a winning record on the road for the first time since 2006 (44-37)...had their **Oakland-record tying** 12-game road winning streak snapped Thursday...begin the final road trip of the season next Tuesday, a 10-game trip to Detroit (three games), New York (three games) and Texas (four games).

**SIX SERIES IN SIX CITIES:** The A's are 7-1 during this 20-game stretch where they will play 17 of 20 games on the road...three of the six teams the A's will face over this stretch currently hold at least a share of first place in their division (Baltimore, New York, Texas), one is within 2½ games in the Wild Card race (Los Angeles) and another is one game out in its division (Detroit)...the stretch began with a seven-game trip to Seattle and Los Angeles, continues with this three-game series against Baltimore and concludes with a 10-game road trip to Detroit, New York and Texas.

## ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

**24-11, 2.80 ERA (433.2 ip, 321 h, 149 r, 135 er, 180 bb, 396 so, 37 hr) Save/Save Opportunities: 41/56 (73.2%)**

The A's bullpen is 2-0 with 13 saves, no blown saves, a 2.21 ERA (81.1 ip, 51 h, 26 r, 20 er, 29 bb, 73 so, 4 hr) and .178 (51 for 287) opponents batting average over its past 30 games (since August 14)...**leads the American League** and ranks second in the majors with a 2.80 ERA overall (Cincinnati, 2.63)...the last time the bullpen had an ERA under 3.00 was in 1990 (2.35)...has the lowest opponents batting average in the majors (.206) and second lowest on-base percentage (.292) and slugging percentage (.327)...ranks second in the AL in wins (24), has issued the second most walks (180) and allowed the third highest percentage of inherited runners to score (33.3%, 58 of 174).

**50 RHP GRANT BALFOUR Save/Opportunities: 18-20 Last Outing: 9/14 vs. Baltimore (ND, 1.0 ip, 1 h, 0 r, 0 er, 0 bb, 1 so) Inherited Runners/Scored: 21/10 First Hitters: 16-56 (9 bb, 1 hbp)**

- Is a perfect 11 for 11 in save opportunities in 14 games since returning to the closer role August 11 (11.2 ip, 7 h, 5 r, 5 er, 5 bb, 14 so, 3.86 ERA).
- Has an 8.31 ERA (4 er in 4.1 ip) and .353 (6 for 17) opponents batting average in five outings in September...logged a 4.50 ERA and .233 opponents average over his first 21 appearances and then had a 1.56 ERA and .119 opponents average over a 39-game stretch from May 20 to August 27.
- Ranks sixth among American League relievers in opponents batting average (.173), is tied for sixth in games (66), is eighth in slugging percentage (.280), tied for eighth in innings pitched (64.2) and is 10<sup>th</sup> in on-base percentage (.262)...the innings pitched are 2.2 innings short of his career high of 67.1 in 2009.
- Has a 1.24 ERA (5 er in 36.1 ip) in 35 appearances at home compared to a 5.27 ERA (14 er in 27.1 ip) in 31 outings on the road.
- Has a loss, two saves and blown save in four games against the Orioles this season (2.2 ip, 3 h, 3 r, 3 er, 5 bb, 3 so, 1 hr)...is 2-1 with four saves, two blown saves and a 3.19 ERA in 30 appearances in his career against Baltimore (31.0 ip, 17 h, 11 r, 11 er, 14 bb, 31 so, 1 hr).
- Has 28 career saves, which is the most in Major League history by an Australian-born pitcher.
- Was used mostly as a setup man with Oakland last year, posting a 5-2 record with two saves, a 2.47 ERA and .199 opponents average in 62 appearances...tied for eighth among AL relievers in grounded into double plays (8) and ranked 10<sup>th</sup> in opponents on-base percentage (.266).

**54 LHP TRAVIS BLACKLEY Save/Opportunities: 0-0 Last Outing: 9/5 vs. Los Angeles (ND, 3.0 ip, 1 h, 0 r, 0 er, 2 bb, 2 so) Inherited Runners/Scored: 4/1 First Hitters: 2-11 (0 bb)**

- Has made four relief appearances and two starts since the beginning of August and is 2-0 with a 4.07 ERA (11 er in 24.1 ip) and .213 (19 for 89) opponents batting average over that span.
- Overall, is 1-0 with a 2.93 ERA (9 er in 27.2 ip) in 12 relief appearances and 4-3 with a 3.97 ERA in 12 starts.
- Ranks second in the American League in pickoffs (7) and is tied for second balks (2).
- Has allowed six home runs in his last eight games (36.1 ip) after surrendering just one home run over his first 16 contests (61.2 ip).
- Has issued 23 of his 26 walks to right-handed hitters...including each of his first 20 before walking Adam Dunn August 11 at Chicago.
- Was charged with the loss in his only career appearance against Baltimore, a start on July 29 of this year (5.0 ip, 6 h, 5 r, 5 er, 4 bb, 1 so, 1 hr).
- Began the season at Triple-A Fresno before he was selected by San Francisco May 1...posted a 9.00 ERA in four relief appearances with the Giants before he was designated for assignment May 13...was claimed off waivers by the A's May 15.
- Pitched for the KIA Tigers of the Korean Baseball Organization last year...appeared in 25 games with the Tigers, including 22 starts, and posted a 7-5 record with a 3.48 ERA.

**13 LHP JERRY BLEVINS Save/Opportunities: 1-1 Last Outing: 9/11 at Los Angeles (S, 1.0 ip, 0 h, 0 r, 0 er, 0 bb, 1 so) Inherited Runners/Scored: 39/12 First Hitters: 13-50 (2 bb, 1 sf, 1 hbp)**

- Recorded his first save of the season Tuesday night, escaping a first and third, no-out situation with a one-run lead...it was his second career save (August 19, 2010 vs. Tampa Bay).
- Has not allowed a run in four appearances in September (3.1 ip, 1 h, 1 bb, 2 so) after posting a 5.00 ERA in 11 games in August.
- Has allowed 6 of 25 (24.0%) inherited runners to score over his last 27 games after allowing 6 of 14 (42.9%) to score over his first 27 contests.
- Is tied for the second most first batter home runs in the American League (5)...has the fourth highest first batter slugging percentage (.600).
- Has recorded four wins, 50 strikeouts and has tossed 57.1 innings, each of which is an on-going career-high.
- Has a win in two games against the Orioles this year (2.0 ip, 3 h, 3 so)...is 2-0 with a 1.00 ERA in eight career outings (9.0 ip, 8 h, 1 r, 1 er, 12 so)...the ERA is his third lowest against any AL team.
- Was on the A's Opening Day roster last year but had six stints with Oakland...had a 2.86 ERA and .235 opponents average in 26 games...the ERA was the lowest of his career but he allowed 8 of 14 (57.1%) inherited runners to score, which was the highest percentage of his career.

**60 RHP JESSE CHAVEZ Save/Opportunities: 0-0 Last Outing: 9/13 at Los Angeles (ND, 0.1 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 0 so) Inherited Runners/Scored: 8/7 First Hitters: 7-7 (1 bb)**

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento Monday for his first stint with the A's this year and has appeared in one game since then (0.1 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb).
- Was acquired from the Toronto Blue Jays August 24 for cash considerations and optioned to Sacramento August 26.
- Is 1-0 with a 7.62 ERA (11 er in 13.0 ip) in eight relief appearances overall and 0-1 with a 10.38 ERA in two starts, the first starts of his career.
- Has allowed a .293 batting average, including .250 (14 for 56) against right-handed hitters compared to .361 (13 for 36) against left-handers.
- Has faced Baltimore once in his career, a relief appearance on August 1, 2010 (1.0 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 so, 1 hr).
- Combined for a .242 opponents batting average with Las Vegas and Sacramento...including .220 against right-handed hitters and .265 against left-handers...started Game 2 of the first round of the Pacific Coast League playoffs September 6 against Reno and was the winning pitcher in Sacramento's 1-0 victory (8.0 ip, 4 h, 1 bb, 10 so)...his complete 2012 statistics:

- Appeared in four games with Kansas City in 2011 and posted a 10.57 ERA...spent most of the season at Triple-A Omaha where he was 2-4 with 16 saves and a 3.75 ERA in 45 relief appearances...combined for eight saves and a 0.92 ERA in June and July.

**48 RHP RYAN COOK Save/Opportunities: 14-21 Last Outing: 9/14 vs. Baltimore (ND, 1.0 ip, 0 h, 0 r, 0 er, 0 bb, 2 so) Inherited Runners/Scored: 20/8 First Hitters: 9-56 (6 bb)**

- Recorded his 14<sup>th</sup> save of the season Wednesday night, which ranks second among American League rookies and third in Oakland history by a rookie (Bailey, 26 in 2009; Street, 23 in 2005).
- Also ranks second among AL rookies in games pitched (62)...is the sixth rookie in Oakland history to pitch in 60 or more games.
- Has not allowed a run in 13 of his last 14 outings (since August 11) and has two wins and two saves over that span (14.1 ip, 9 h, 3 r, 2 er, 4 bb, 18 so, 1.26 ERA).
- Is tied for third among AL relievers in opponents batting average (.167), tied for fourth in wins (6) and is sixth in slugging percentage (.269)...however, has the second most blown saves (7) and his save percentage of 66.7% is the lowest in the majors.
- Has a 0.85 ERA (3 er in 31.2 ip) in 31 outings on the road compared to a 4.06 ERA (14 er in 31.0 ip) in 31 appearances in Oakland.
- Has allowed six runs, five earned, in 52.1 innings (0.86 ERA) in 50 appearances on one or more days rest...has allowed 12 runs in 10.1 innings (10.45 ERA) in 12 games with no rest.
- Has a blown save in three games against the Orioles (2.1 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 6 so).
- Was the A's representative to the AL All-Star team and pitched a perfect seventh inning, striking out Harper and Wright.
- Made his Major League debut with Arizona in 2011, posting a 7.04 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in 12 relief appearances over three stints...led the Diamondbacks farm system with 19 saves after being used exclusively as a starter over his first three professional seasons.

- Allowed his first career home run in his last appearance Wednesday night after starting his career with a 33-game, 36.0-inning, 149-batter homerless streak.
- Has not allowed an earned run in 13 of his 15 appearances since August 3 (3 er in 14.1 ip, 1.88 ERA)...posted a 1.86 ERA over his first 15 games and then allowed seven runs over a four-game stretch from July 26 to August 2 (21.00 ERA).
- Has struck out 50 in 36.2 innings, an average of 12.27 per nine innings...has walked eight for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 6.25
- Has stranded 13 of his last 14 inherited runners.
- Has allowed a .248 opponents batting average...right-handed hitters are batting .213 (19 for 89) and lefties are hitting .308 (16 for 52).
- Made his only appearance against Baltimore this year on July 27 (1.0 ip, 1 h, 2 r, 2 er, 1 bb, 2 so).
- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento June 4 after combining to post a 0.72 ERA in 16 relief appearances with Single-A Stockton, Double-A Midland and Triple-A Sacramento...allowed a .091 opponents batting average...struck out 48 in 25.0 innings (17.3 per nine innings).
- Missed nearly the entire 2011 season as he continued to recover from surgery on a torn left patella...while on the DL, he began to work out as a pitcher...made his professional debut as a pitcher for the A's affiliate in the Arizona Rookie League on Aug. 29 (1.0 ip, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 2 so).

**Inherited Runners/Scored:** 7/2 **First Hitters:** 2-12 (1 bb)

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento August 31 for his fifth stint with the A's this season and has appeared in two games since his return (2.1 ip, 2 h, 3 r, 2 er, 3 bb, 1 hr).
- Has allowed a .182 opponents batting average...left-handed hitters are 2 for 19 (.105) and right-handers are 8 for 36 (.222).
- Appeared in his only game against the Orioles on April 28 (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 bb).
- Posted a 2.00 ERA in eight appearances during his first stint from April 21 to May 21 but walked nine batters in 9.0 innings in his Major League debut...did not pitch during his third stint (July 13-15), pitched once during his second stint (June 17-20) and twice in his fourth stay (August 5-7).
- Logged a 2.45 ERA in seven relief appearances with Sacramento following his August 7 option...opponents batted .212 against him at Triple-A, including .190 by left-handed hitters...surrendered just one home run in 44.2 innings...his complete 2012 statistics:

- Missed nearly the entire 2011 season as he continued his recovery from June 2010 "Tommy John" surgery on his left elbow...made two starts with the A's affiliate in the Arizona Rookie League in August, posting a 4.50 ERA...struck out six batters in 2.0 innings.

**FOR STARTERS:** Is scheduled to make his fifth start of the season and his career, his second since being recalled September 7...the A's have won all four of his starting assignments...has tossed six or more innings in three of this starts, allowed one run or fewer twice and walked two batters or fewer in all four starts.

**BRIEFLY:** Was originally selected from Triple-A Sacramento August 3 and went 1-0 with a 3.18 ERA in three starts before he was optioned back to Sacramento August 20 when Brett Anderson was reinstated from the DL...returned September 7 and is 1-0 with a 4.05 ERA (3 er in 6.2 ip) in one start since his return.

**ROOKIE STARTERS:** Is one of four rookies currently in the starting rotation (Griffin, Milone, Parker)...this is the second time this year the A's have four rookies in the rotation (August 3-6)...prior to that, the last time the A's had at least four rookies in the rotation was in 2009 when they did it from June 2 through the end of the season...is scheduled to make the 74<sup>th</sup> start by a rookie this year, which is the fourth most games started by rookie pitchers in Oakland history (116 in 2009, 93 in 1983, 82 in 1978)...rookies have 39 of the A's wins, which is second most in Oakland history...the record is 44 by the 2009 club.

**OPPONENTS BATTING:** Has a .283 (17 for 60) average with the bases empty compared to .188 (6 for 32) with runners on...including .063 (1 for 16) with runners in scoring position...has not allowed a hit to the opponents number three hitter (0 for 12)...opponents are 5 for 24 (.208) with one walk (.240 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...has issued all five of his walks to left-handed hitters...has allowed six home runs in his first four starts, all in his two starts against Los Angeles.

**FIRST START:** He had a no decision in his Major League debut, a 5-4 A's win in 15 innings over Toronto August 3 in Oakland...became the 44<sup>th</sup> pitcher in Oakland history to start in his debut, the second this year (Griffin, June 24 vs. San Francisco)...tossed 6.0 innings and allowed just one run on a Davis sacrifice fly in the fourth inning...left with a 4-1 lead but Cook allowed a three-run home run to Mathis in the ninth inning for the blown save...Crisp had a walk-off sacrifice fly in the 15<sup>th</sup> inning for the win.

**SECOND START:** Had his second consecutive no decision in an A's win, a 9-8 A's victory over Los Angeles August 8 in Oakland...surrendered four home runs...allowed a solo home run to Morales in the second inning but the A's came back with four runs in the bottom of the second...allowed a leadoff home run to Aybar in the third and then yielded two more runs in the fifth inning on a solo home run by Hunter and a two-run home run by Morales...left after 4.2 innings trailing 5-4 but the A's scored five times in the sixth for the win.

**THIRD START:** He combined with Doolittle, Blevins, Cook and Balfour on a six-hit, 3-0 shutout at Kansas City August 16 for his first Major League win...tossed 6.1 innings and allowed three of the hits...loaded the bases on a hit and two walks in the second inning but got Getz to ground out to end the threat...faced the minimum over the next four innings...was relieved by Doolittle with one out and a runner on first in the seventh inning with the A's leading 2-0.

**LAST START:** He was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-5 win at Los Angeles last Tuesday...the A's scored a run in the second but he allowed a two-run home run to Wells in the bottom of the second...blanked the Angels on one hit and one walk over the next four innings and had retired nine consecutive batters when he allowed a two-out home run to Hunter in the seventh...was relieved by Neshek with a 4-3 lead...Blevins recorded the save, escaping a no-out, first and third situation with a one run lead..

**STRAILY vs. BALTIMORE:** Is making his first career appearance and start.

**FOR STARTERS:** Is scheduled to make his 12<sup>th</sup> start of the season and his career, his fourth since being reinstated from the disabled list September 1...the A's are 9-2 (.818) in his starting assignments...has tossed at least six innings in nine of his 11 starts, allowed two runs or fewer nine times and walked two batters or fewer all 11 times.

**6-0:** Is 6-0 with a 1.94 ERA over his first 11 starts...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, since earned runs became an official stat (1912 in NL, 1913 in AL), he is just the second pitcher to be undefeated in at least his first 11 Major League appearances, all starts, while maintaining an ERA under 2.00...the other is Jered Weaver, who went 9-0 with a 1.95 ERA over his first 12 starts with the Angels in 2006...Griffin is the first pitcher in Oakland history to start his career 6-0...since 1927, the only other Athletics pitcher to begin his career at least 6-0 is Jim Nash, who went 7-0 over his first nine career starts in 1966...since 1918, no Athletics starter has began his career better than 7-0...the six-game winning streak matches the longest by an Athletic this year (McCarthy, April 27-June 19) and is  **tied for the second**  longest active streak in the American League (**Nate Jones, CWS 7**)...the last A's pitcher with a seven-game winning streak is Trevor Cahill (October 1, 2010-May 9, 2011)...Griffin began his career with three no decisions...since 1918, the only other pitcher in Athletics history to begin his career with three consecutive no decisions, all as a starting pitcher, is Willie Adams (June 11-July 31, 1996).

**THREE RUNS AND TWO WALKS OR FEWER:** Is the only Major League pitcher since at least 1918 to allow three runs or fewer and walk two batters or fewer in each of his first 11 career starts...the previous best was eight by Brian Holton, who did it from September 7, 1986-June 9, 1989 (had 112 relief appearances during that stretch).

**IN SEPTEMBER:** Is 3-0 with a 0.89 ERA (2 er in 20.1 ip) in three starts in September...has walked just one batter in 20.1 innings while striking out 18...is  **tied for the American League lead**  in wins in September and ranks  **third**  in ERA.

**SINCE THE BREAK:** Is 6-0 with a 1.91 ERA (10 er in 47.0 ip) and .223 (39 for 175) opponents batting average in eight starts since the All-Star Break...the six wins are  **tied for fifth**  in the American League...the ERA is the  **lowest**  in the AL since the break among pitchers with 40 or more innings.

**OPPONENTS BATTING:** Opponents are 12 for 66 (.182) with one walk (.194 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...has allowed a .181 (32 for 177) opponents batting average the first two times through the lineup and .262 (16 for 61) after that...has yielded a .182 (30 for 165) batting average with the bases empty compared to .247 (18 for 73) with runners in scoring position.

**INNING BY INNING:** Has a 1.14 ERA (4 er in 31.2 ip) and .170 (19 for 112) opponents batting average over the first three innings of a game and a 2.70 ERA (10 er in 33.1 ip) and .230 (29 for 126) opponents average after that.

**BRIEFLY:** Is 3-0 with a 0.89 ERA (2 er in 20.1 ip) in three starts since he was reinstated from the disabled list September 1...was placed on the 15-day DL August 5 with right shoulder tightness...went 1-0 with a 4.90 ERA (7.1 ip, 7 h, 4 r, 4 er, 4 bb, 7 so) in two rehab starts with Sacramento on August 22 against Salt Lake and August 27 at Colorado Springs...was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 24 after combining for a 6-3 record and a 2.66 ERA in 15 games, all starts, with Double-A Midland and Triple-A Sacramento...made his Major League debut and went 3-0 with a 2.42 ERA in eight starts before going on the DL.

**SIX INNINGS OR MORE, THREE RUNS OR FEWER:** Tossed at least 6.0 innings and allowed three runs or fewer in each of his first seven starts before leaving his start on August 4 after 1.2 scoreless innings with shoulder tightness...is the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1918 to begin his career with seven consecutive games of six or more innings and three runs or fewer...the previous high was five by John Henry Johnson (1978) and Dave Hamilton (1972)...is the second Major Leaguer to do it over the last 18 years...the other is Jered Weaver, who had nine straight with Los Angeles (AL) in 2006.

**FOUR HITS OR FEWER:** Allowed eight hits in his fourth start after allowing four hits or fewer in each of his first three starts...is just the sixth pitcher since 1918 to begin his career with three consecutive outings of six or more innings and four hits or fewer (last: Jeremy Hellickson, TB, August 2-15, 2010).

**ROOKIE STARTERS:** Is one of four rookies currently in the A's starting rotation (Milone, Parker, Straily)...this is the second time this year the A's have four rookies in the rotation (August 3-6)...prior to that, the last time the A's had at least four rookies in the rotation was in 2009 when they did it from June 2 through the end of the season...is scheduled to make the 75<sup>th</sup> start by a rookie this year, which is the fourth most games started by rookie pitchers in Oakland history (116 in 2009, 93 in 1983, 82 in 1978)...rookies have  **40**  of the A's wins, which is second most in Oakland history...the record is 44 in 2009.

**LAST START:** He was the win pitcher in the A's 4-1 win at Los Angeles last Wednesday...tossed a career-high 8.0 innings and did not allow a run...scattered six hits and did not walk a batter...allowed just one base runner past second base and that came in the fourth inning when he put runners on first and third with one out...got Aybar to foul out and Wells to fly out to end the threat...now has an 11.1 inning scoreless streak.

**GRIFFIN vs. DETROIT:** Is making his first career appearance.

**MINORS:** Combined for a 7-3 record and a 2.82 ERA (102.0 ip, 79 h, 39 r, 32 er, 18 bb, 91 so, 7 hr) in 17 games, all starts, with Double-A Midland and Triple-A Sacramento...began the year at Midland and was 3-1 with a 2.49 ERA in seven starts before he was promoted to Triple-A Sacramento May 11...went 3-2 with a 2.81 ERA in eight starts with the River Cats before he was promoted to Oakland June 24...was 4-2 with a 3.07 ERA in 10 starts overall with Sacramento...issued 18 walks in 102.0 innings, an average of 1.59 per nine innings...struck out 91 for a strikeout to walk ratio of 5.06...allowed a .211 opponents batting average, including .181 (33 for 182) against left-handed hitters compared to .238 (46 for 193) against right-handers...surrendered just seven home runs in 102.0 innings, an average of 0.62 per nine innings.

**FOR STARTERS:** Is scheduled to make his sixth start of the season...was reinstated from the disabled list August 21 after beginning the season on the 60-day DL as he continued his recovery from July 14, 2011 "Tommy John" surgery on his left elbow...the A's are 4-1 (.800) in his starting assignments and are 32-35 (.478) in his career...has tossed six or more innings in each of his five starts, allowed one run or fewer all five times and walked two batters or fewer all five times.

**OPPONENTS BATTING:** Opponents are 3 for 25 (.120) with runners in scoring position, including 0 for 10 with RISP and two outs...has allowed a .211 (43 for 204) average with runners in scoring position over the last three years after yielding a .314 mark in his rookie season of 2009...the seven, eight and nine hitters in the batting order are a combined 4 for 34 (.118) off him.

**TO START A SEASON:** Allowed one run or fewer in each of his first four starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1918 to begin his season with four consecutive starts of one run or fewer...was the first Oakland pitcher to start the season by winning his first four starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990 (April 9-May 4)...the four-game winning streak matched the longest of his career (third time, last: September 6 to October 2, 2010).

**FIRST START:** He was the winning pitcher in the A's 4-1 win over Minnesota August 21 in Oakland...it was his first start since June 5, 2011 at Boston and his first win since May 26, 2011 at Los Angeles (AL)...allowed his only run in the first inning when Revere singled, stole second, went to third on a ground out and scored on a wild pitch...faced the minimum the rest of the way as he was aided by a triple play in the fifth inning.

**SECOND START:** He combined with Cook and Balfour on a two-hit shutout in the A's 3-0 win at Cleveland August 27...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed both of the hits...retired each of the first 13 batters before Brantley singled in the fifth...that gave him a streak of 20 consecutive batters retired dating back to his last start...also allowed a leadoff double to Lillibridge in the sixth...allowed just two runners into scoring position.

**THIRD START:** He won his third consecutive start in the A's 6-2 win over Boston September 2 in Oakland...shutout the Red Sox on two hits over the first five innings...had a 6-0 lead when he allowed his only run in the fifth inning on a Ross RBI single.

**FOURTH START:** He was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-1 victory at Seattle September 8...the A's scored a run in the first and he allowed an unearned run in the second...Saunders doubled, went to third on a Drew error and scored on a Robinson fielders choice...the A's scored four times in the fourth inning and he blanked the Mariners on four hits over his final four innings.

**LAST START:** He was the losing pitcher in the A's 6-0 loss at Los Angeles last Thursday...shutout the Angels on five hits over the first six innings...then allowed five runs in the seventh inning...Hunter led off the inning with a home run and Trumbo had a RBI double...was relieved by Chavez with the bases loaded and two outs and he allowed all three runs to score plus one of his own...Weaver, Jepsen and Maronde combined to shutout the A's on four hits.

**ANDERSON vs. DETROIT:** Is 2-1 with a 2.51 ERA (14.1 ip, 13 h, 10 r, 4 er, 6 bb, 12 so, 1 hr) in three career appearances, all starts...has not faced the Tigers since May 29, 2010 at Detroit when he combined with Ziegler and Breslow on a five-hit shutout in a 6-0 win...tossed 5.2 innings and left after 70 pitches in his first start after his rehab assignment...yielded three of the hits and did not walk a batter...his other two starts came in 2009...the loss was on May 15 at Detroit, in a 14-1 decision...allowed nine runs in 3.1 innings but only three of the runs were earned...was charged with five unearned runs in the first inning after errors by Giambi and Crosby...picked up the win in a 7-1 victory on June 29 in Oakland...blanked the Tigers on four hits and two walks over the first five innings and had a 5-0 lead entering the sixth...was relieved by Wuertz with one out in the sixth and runners on first and second and he allowed one of those runs to score.

Myers and was optioned to Triple-A Rochester...appeared in 30 games for the Red Wings, all in relief...posted a four-game win-streak, June 29-Aug. 3...recorded his only save of the season, August 7 at Syracuse...did not allow a run in nine consecutive appearances (11.1 ip), July 27-August 20...went 2-0 with a 5.21 ERA in 13 games before the All-Star Break and 3-1 with a save and a 2.66 ERA in 17 games after the break with Rochester...was recalled by the Twins, Sept. 6...set a career-high with three walks in a scoreless inning, Sept. 19 vs. Oakland...had a season-high with three strikeouts, Sept. 25 at Detroit.

**2009**—Missed the entire season recovering from "Tommy John" surgery on his right elbow.

**2008**—Had a season-high three strikeouts, March 31 vs. Los Angeles (AL)...did not allow a run in seven appearances (5.1 ip), April 17-30...placed on 15-day DL with an acute partial tear of the ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow, May 9.

**2007**—Made the Twins Opening Day roster for the first time in career...had a 17.0-inning scoreless streak, April 21-May 26...did not allow a run in 11 consecutive appearances (10.1 ip) from May 29-June 22...was one of five players on the Final Vote Ballot for the 2007 All-Star Game...did not allow a run in nine appearances (7.1 ip) from July 7-21...tied his season-high with a three-game winning streak from July 15-28...matched a season-high with three strikeouts, July 18 vs. Detroit...fired a season-high tying 2.0 innings, Sept. 4 against Cleveland...had a .183 opponents batting average against, including .181 (17-for-94) with three home runs against left-handers and .185 (27-for-146) with four home runs against right-handers...stranded 45 of 59 (76%) inherited runners and first batters faced were 8-for-62 (.129) with 22 strikeouts...tied for fifth in American League in games.

Myers July 15...did not allow a run in 10 of 12 appearances, going 0-0 with a 1.32 ERA and nine saves from July 17-Aug. 20...led the club in saves.

**2003**—Began the season at Quad Cities...did not allow an earned run in his first 13 appearances (14.1 ip), going 2-1 with five saves from April 5-May 4...was the Twins' Minor League Player of the Week, April 12-18...was also the Twins' Minor League Pitcher of the Month for April...did not allow a run in 13 of 14 appearances, going 1-0 with a 0.50 ERA and nine saves, May 12-June 21...had a season-high five strikeouts, June 12 at Peoria...named to the Midwest League All-Star team, June 17 at West Michigan...promoted to Ft. ## BRANDON ALLEN

- Was the A's Opening Day starter at first base March 28 but went for 7 with five strikeouts in three games before he was designated for assignment April 9...was claimed off waivers by the Tampa Bay Rays April 19.

## BRETT ANDERSON

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 13 as he continues his recovery from July 14, 2011 "Tommy John" surgery.

## DARIC BARTON

- Homered in the fifth inning April 17 at Los Angeles to snap a career-high 76-game homerless streak...it was his first home run since Oct. 1, 2010 against Seattle...the home run also snapped a 72-game homerless streak as a first baseman, which was second longest in Oakland history...the record is 75 by Mike Hegan from July 6, 1971 to Aug. 16, 1973.
- Was batting .198 with one home run and four RBI in 37 games when he was optioned to Sacramento June 2.

## JERRY BLEVINS

- Had his career-high 10.1-inning scoreless streak dating back to last season snapped April 7 against Seattle when Saunders homered in the sixth inning.
- Made his 200th career appearance Aug. 29 at Cleveland.

## DALLAS BRADEN

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 as he continues his recovery from left shoulder surgery.
- Was transferred to the 60-day disabled list April 22.

## ANDREW CARIGAN

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and posted a 6.23 ERA in five relief appearances before he was optioned to Sacramento April 17.
- Recalled for a second time May 11 and allowed two runs in 2.0 innings over two outings before he was sent back to Sacramento May 16.
- Joined the A's for a third time May 27 and did not allow a run in four games (3.1 ip, 2 h, 2 bb, 4 so) before he was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 6 with a sprained ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow...was transferred to the 60-day DL June 9.
- Had reconstructive surgery to the ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow June 19...the surgery was performed in New York City by Dr. David Altchek, medical director of the New York Mets.

## CHRIS CARTER

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento June 29 after batting .279 with 12 home runs and 53 RBI in 72 games with the River Cats.
- Homered in each of his first two games with the A's and three of his first four...including July 6 against Seattle when he hit the pinch-hit game-ending home run in the 11th inning...is the first rookie in Athletics history with a pinch-hit "walk-off" home run and the 10th player in Oakland history with a pinch-hit game-ending home run...he is the first Athletic with a pinch-hit "walk-off" home run in extra innings since Paul Lehner on April 22, 1950 against Boston.
- Had his career-high tying six-game hitting streak snapped August 2 against Toronto (7 for 22, .318).
- Had his first career three hit game August 11 at Chicago and matched that August 28 at Cleveland.

## YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Made his Major League debut March 28 against Seattle in Tokyo with a start in center field...doubled off Felix Hernandez to lead off the bottom of the seventh inning for his first ML hit.

- Hit his first ML home run in the seventh inning March 29 against Seattle in Tokyo, a two-run shot off Shawn Kelley.
- Homered in three consecutive games from March 29 to April 7...became the third player since 1918 to homer in three of his first four Major League games (Trent Oeltjen, ARI 2009 and Mike Jacobs, NYM 2005)...is the ninth player with at least three home runs in his first four games (Jacobs had 4)...the previous fastest an Oakland Athletic reached three career home runs was seven games by Kurt Abbott in 1993 and Mitchell Page in 1977.
- Had multiple RBI games in each of those contests...since 1918, he is the first Athletic and ninth Major Leaguer with three multiple RBI games over his first four career games (last: Wladimir Balentien, 2006-07).
- Struck out at least once in each of his first eight games, which is an Oakland record to start a career...the previous mark was six (Chris Carter, 2010; Brooks Conrad, 2008; Travis Buck, 2007)...matched the longest streak by an Athletic since 1918 (Troy Herriage, 1956; Norm Bass, 1961).
- Hit his fourth home run April 18 at Los Angeles in his 12th game...since 1918, that is the fastest a player has reached four career home runs in Athletics history...the previous best was by Brian Leshar, who did it in 14 games in 1996.
- Did not have a putout April 25 against Chicago, becoming the first A's outfielder without a putout in a game of 14 or more innings since Stan Javier on May 30, 1988 against New York.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 12 retroactive to May 7 with a muscle strain in his left hand...went 3 for 9 (.333) on a three-game rehab assignment with Triple-A Sacramento from May 28 to 30 and was reinstated from the DL June 1.
- Had his first career game-ending hit June 21 against Los Angeles (NL), a three-run "walk-off" home run.
- Had the first two four-hit games of his career July 15 at Minnesota and July 20 against New York.
- Was named American League Player of the Week July 16 for the week ending July 15 after going 8 for 14 (.571) with five runs, a double, two home runs and six RBI in the three-game series at Minnesota.
- Had a career-high nine-game hitting streak from July 8 to 21...was 19 for 33 (.576) with two doubles, four home runs, 10 RBI, eight runs scored, six multiple hit games and a 1.000 slugging percentage during the streak.
- Batted .344 in July after hitting .343 in June...tied for sixth in the AL in batting and hits (33) in July, ranked eighth in slugging (.573) and tied for eighth in RBI (19).
- Walked three times August 2 against Toronto, the first multi-walk game of his career.
- His home run August 16 at Kansas City snapped a career-high streak of 14 consecutive games without an extra base hit and a career-high 14-game homerless streak.
- Stole two bases September 1 against Boston, the first multi-steal game of his career.

## BARTOLO COLÓN

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and is in his 15th season in the majors.
- Made each of his first three starts against Seattle to become the first pitcher in Oakland history to make three consecutive starts against one team in the same season without missing a turn in the rotation.
- Threw 38 consecutive strikes at one point during the A's 6-0 win at Los Angeles April 18...that was the longest such streak since pitch count data is first available in 1988...the previous best was 30 by Tim Wakefield in 1998.
- Was 1-3 with a 7.92 ERA and .386 opponents batting average in five starts in May...based on a minimum of 25.0 innings, he had the highest opponents batting average in the majors in May and the third highest ERA...the opponents average was the highest single-month mark of his career and the ERA was third highest (7.99 in June, 2004; 7.94 in September, 1998).
- Left his start June 17 against San Diego with no outs in the third inning with a strained right oblique...was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 23 retroactive to June 18 with the injury...was reinstated July 3.

## RYAN COOK

- Became the third pitcher in Athletics franchise history to record four strikeouts in an inning April 27 at Baltimore (Blake Stein, 1998; Erik Hiljus, 2001).
- Did not allow a run over his first 21 games and 23.0 innings...that was the longest season-opening scoreless streak by a player on the Athletics Opening Day roster since at least 1918...the previous

high was 21.0 innings by Alex Kellner in 1953...had a career-high 24.0 inning scoreless streak dating back to September 28, 2011.

- Was the only A's player named to the American League All-Star team and pitched a perfect seventh inning, striking out Harper and Wright...it was his first career All-Star selection...he is the seventh Oakland rookie to be named to the AL All-Star team, along with Wayne Gross (1977), Matt Keough (1978), Jose Canseco (1986), Mark McGwire (1987), Ben Grieve (1998) and Andrew Bailey (2009).

### **COLLIN COWGILL**

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and went 0 for 4 with three walks in three games before he was optioned to Sacramento April 17.
- Was recalled by Oakland May 11
- Had a career-high eight-game hitting streak from May 26 to June 5 (13 for 31, .419).
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 23 with a sprained left ankle...began a rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton July 9 and went 1 for 8 (.125) in two games before he was transferred to Sacramento July 12...went 3 for 18 (.167) with a RBI in four games with the River Cats before he was reinstated from the DL and optioned to Sacramento July 17.

### **COCO CRISP**

- Was the A's 13th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 13 years...had 203 career starts in left entering the season, but none since October 2, 2005.
- Committed his first error since April 25, 2011 on April 7 against Seattle, snapping a 116-game errorless streak...that streak was seventh longest by an outfielder in Oakland history.
- Stole three bases June 19 against Los Angeles (NL)...it was his fifth career game of three or more steals, his fourth with the A's...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (45) and Bert Campaneris (10) have more three-steal games.
- Was caught stealing after being picked off in the first inning June 21 against Los Angeles (NL), his first caught stealing since July 10, 2011 at Texas...that ended his Athletics record streak of 36 consecutive stolen bases without a caught stealing (caught stealing became an official stat in 1920)...broke the previous mark of 28 set by Stan Javier (May 31-October 1, 1995).
- Finished the game July 3 with a "walk-off" sacrifice fly...it was the 21st game-ending sacrifice fly in Oakland history, the first since Dan Johnson on May 15, 2007 against Kansas City...is the first Athletic with a leadoff home run and walk-off RBI in the same game since Rickey Henderson on August 12, 1992 against Chicago.
- Had the game-ending RBI single July 22 against New York.
- Had his third career two-homer game July 25 at Toronto.
- Batted .342 in July, which is his best single-month batting average since hitting .375 in September, 2008...it ranked eighth in the AL.
- Had his second game-ending sacrifice fly of the season August 3 against Toronto (July 3 vs. Boston)...is the second player in Oakland history with two "walk-off" sacrifice flies in one season (Rickey Henderson, 1992)...it was his third game-ending RBI of the season and the fifth of his career.
- Had a career-high tying five RBI August 19 against Cleveland...it was his fifth career five RBI game.
- Tied for second in the AL in doubles in August (11), ranked fourth in stolen bases (9) and tied for sixth in runs (21)...the 11 doubles tied for the second best August total in Oakland history and fell one short of the record of 12 set by Jason Giambi in 1999.
- Led off the game with a home run September 1 against Boston...it was his third leadoff home run this year (June 27 at Seattle and July 3 against Boston) and the seventh of his career...it was his fifth leadoff home run as an Athletic, which is tied with Mark Kotsay for third most in Oakland history...only Rickey Henderson (43) and Bert Campaneris (10) have more.

### **FAUTINO DE LOS SANTOS**

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and compiled a 3.00 ERA in six relief appearances before he was optioned to Sacramento, April 25.
- Did not retire a batter over his final three outings before his option (5 h, 2 r, 1 er, 2 bb).
- Was traded to Milwaukee July 29 for George Kottaras.

## JOEY DEVINE

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 retroactive to March 24...underwent “Tommy John” surgery on his right elbow April 10... Dr. James Andrews performed the surgery in Pensacola, Fla., which included an ulnar collateral ligament reconstruction, an ulnar nerve transposition and a debridement of the flexor tendon...also had “Tommy John” surgery on the same elbow April 21, 2009.
- Was transferred to the 60-day DL May 15.

## JOSH DONALDSON

- Was on the A’s Opening Day roster but hit just .094 in nine games before he was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento April 23.
- Made nine starts, all at third base, during his first stint...his Major League experience prior to this season included seven games at catcher and two at first base.
- Was recalled May 12 and snapped a career-high tying 0 for 17 streak with his eighth inning double May 14 at Los Angeles (also May 1-13, 2010).
- Went 3 for 4 with two doubles, a home run and five RBI May 18 at San Francisco...the hits, doubles and RBI were all career highs.
- Drew his first walk of the season June 13 at Colorado, snapping a streak of 30 consecutive games without a walk dating back to September 22, 2010...that was the longest streak by an Athletic since Scott Hemond had a 31-game streak from May 3 to July 2, 1994...it was his first walk since September 19, 2010 at Minnesota.
- Was batting .182 in 19 games during his second stint with the A’s when he was optioned to Sacramento June 21.
- Recalled Aug. 14.
- Went 4-for-4 August 17 against Cleveland, his first career four-hit game.
- Homered in three straight games from August 29-31, the first time he has homered in consecutive games in his career

## SEAN DOOLITTLE

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento June 4 and made his major League debut June 5 against Texas (1.1 ip, 3 so)...struck out the first three batters he faced...the last A’s pitcher to strike out the first three batters he faced in his career was Blake Stein on May 10, 1998 against Chicago.

## STEPHEN DREW

- Was acquired from Arizona Aug. 20 for minor league infielder Sean Jamieson.
- Singled in the fourth inning Aug. 23 at Tampa Bay for his first hit as an Athletic...that snapped a career-high 0-for-22 streak (previous: 20, twice, last: May 27-June 2, 2010).

## PEDRO FIGUEROA

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 21 and made his Major League debut that night against Cleveland...tossed a scoreless ninth and his only base runner (Cunningham walk) was erased on a double play.
- Was optioned to Sacramento May 22 after posting a 2.00 ERA with nine walks in 9.0 innings in eight games.
- Returned to Oakland June 17 and tossed 3.0 scoreless innings that day against San Diego before he was optioned back to Sacramento June 21.
- Was recalled a third time July 13 when Jim Miller went on the paternity list but was optioned back to Sacramento July 16 without appearing in a game.
- Returned to Oakland for his fourth stint Aug. 5 and did not allow a run over two appearances (3.0 ip, 1 h, 2 bb, 3 so) before he was sent back to Sacramento Aug. 7.

## BRIAN FUENTES

- Recorded his 200th career save May 2 at Boston to become the sixth left-handed reliever in Major League history to reach the 200 plateau (Franco, Wagner, Myers, Righetti, Lyle).
- Had a 2.84 ERA and .222 opponents batting average over his first 19 appearances through May 27... then went 0-2 with a save, two blown saves, a 19.50 ERA and .452 opponents batting average over his final seven outings.

- Was designated for assignment on July 3 and released July 11.

### GRAHAM GODFREY

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and went 0-3 with a 5.06 ERA in three starts before he was optioned to Sacramento April 21.
- Recalled May 22 and went 0-1 with a 10.80 ERA in two games, one start, before he was sent back to Sacramento May 27.

### JONNY GOMES

- Was hit by a Jonathan Braxton pitch with the bases loaded in the bottom of the 12th inning April 11 against Kansas City to force in the winning run in the A's 5-4 victory...it was his second career walk-off hit by pitch (August 21, 2011 vs. Philadelphia)...it was his fifth career walk-off RBI (two home runs, one walk)...it was the third walk-off hit by pitch in Oakland history (Mike Bordick, August 4, 1993 vs. Seattle and Olmedo Saenz, July 20, 2002 vs. Texas).
- Singled in the eighth inning April 19 at Los Angeles after homering for each of his first three hits for the season...is the first player in Oakland history whose first three hits in a season were all home runs.
- Hit the game-winning pinch-hit two-run home run in the seventh inning June 16 against San Diego, his third career pinch hit home run (last: June 28, 2008 at Pittsburgh)...it snapped a 0 for 34 streak as a pinch hitter and was his first pinch hit since August 29, 2010 against Chicago (NL).
- Hit his third career grand slam July 13 at Minnesota, his first since August 7, 2007 at Detroit...added a RBI single in the ninth inning to finish with five RBI...it was his third career game of five or more RBI, his first since June 12, 2010 against Kansas City when he had a career-high six.
- Hit his 10th home run of the season July 15 at Minnesota, the seventh time he has reached the 10-home run plateau in his career.
- Homered in three consecutive games from August 7-12, the second time he has done that in his career (April 22-25, 2006).
- Struck out in a career-high 16 consecutive games from July 28 to September 1.

### A.J. GRIFFIN

- Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 24 and made his Major League debut that day with a start against San Francisco.

### BRANDON HICKS

- Was claimed off waivers from Atlanta March 13 and was optioned to Sacramento March 15.
- Recalled by Oakland June 23 after batting .272 with 13 home runs and 48 RBI in 65 games with the River Cats... was tied for the Pacific Coast League lead in hit by pitches (7) at the time of his promotion...also ranked second in strikeouts (76), fifth in extra base hits (37), tied for sixth in doubles (21), eighth in home runs (13), ninth in runs (49) and 10th in RBI (48) and slugging (.548).
- Went 0 for 4 with four strikeouts July 13 at Minnesota...it was the first four strikeout game of his career.
- Hit his first Major League home run July 18 against Texas, a "walk-off" shot off Michael Kirkman in the bottom of the ninth inning...became the fourth player in Athletics history to hit a game-ending home run for his first ML home run, the second this year (Derek Norris, June 24)...the other two are Dee Miles (September 14, 1939) and George Hendrick (May 28, 1972).
- Was optioned to Sacramento Aug. 2.

### LUKE HUGHES

- Was claimed off waivers from Minnesota April 22 and went 1 for 13 (.077) in four games with the A's before he was designated for assignment April 30...cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento May 2.

### BRANDON INGE

- Agreed to terms with the A's on a one-year contract April 30 after he was released by Detroit April 26.
- Had four four-RBI game over a five-game span from May 6 to 11...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the second player in Major League history with four games of four or more RBI over

a five-game stretch...the other is Lou Gehrig in 1931...now has 14 career games with four or more RBI...drove in 16 runs over that five-game stretch...since 1970, the only other Athletic to drive in 16 runs over a five-game span is Damian Miller (June 6-11, 2004).

- Had the game-ending grand slam in the bottom of the ninth inning May 8 against Toronto...it was his seventh career "walk-off" home run and his 10th "walk-off plate appearance (two singles, one sacrifice fly)...it was the sixth "walk-off" grand slam in Oakland history (Tenace, 1973; Armas, 1980; McGwire, 1990 and 1995; Ellis, 2008).
- Added another grand slam May 10 against Detroit...is just the second player in Athletics history to hit two grand slams over a three-game span...the other is Jimmie Foxx (September 22 and 24, 1932)...now has seven career grand slams.
- Had 17 RBI in his first 10 games with the A's...those are the most in Oakland history by a player in his first 10 games with the A's...the previous best was 15 by Mitchell Page (1977) and Jack Cust (2007).
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 17 retroactive to May 13 with a strained right groin...it is his second stint on the disabled list this year as he began the season on Detroit's DL with a strained left groin.
- Went 5 for 5 with three runs, two doubles, two home runs (including a grand slam) and seven RBI in a start at third base for Triple-A Sacramento May 26 against Reno in the second game of his two-game rehab assignment.
- Was reinstated from the DL May 29.
- Struck out four times July 30 against Tampa Bay, matching his career high (June 21, 2006 at Milwaukee and August 14, 2007 at Cleveland).
- Had a career-high tying 13-game hitting streak from July 20 to August 3...hit .263 (15 for 57), which was the lowest batting average during a hitting streak of 12 or more games in Oakland history.

#### **KILA KA'AIHUE**

- Matched his career high with three hits April 15 at Seattle (third time, last: Sept. 28, 2010 vs. Minnesota).
- Had the game-winning RBI single in the 14th inning April 25 against Chicago, his second career walk-off hit (home run, April 1, 2011 vs. Los Angeles-AL).
- Was batting .234 with four home runs and 14 RBI in 39 games when he was designated for assignment June 6...cleared waivers and was outrighted to Triple-A Sacramento June 16.

#### **GEORGE KOTARAS**

- Was acquired from Milwaukee July 29 for right-handed pitcher Fautino De Los Santos.
- Was tied for the National League lead with five pinch walks at the time of the trade.
- Hit his first home run as an Athletic August 8 against Los Angeles, snapping a career-high 46-game homerless streak dating back to his last home run on April 13 at Atlanta.
- Had career highs August 31 against Boston with two home runs, five RBI and three runs scored.

#### **BRANDON MCCARTHY**

- Made his first career Opening Day start March 28 against Seattle and had a no decision in the A's 3-1, 11-inning loss...allowed just one run on six hits and no walks in 7.0 innings.
- Also started the third game of the season, April 6 against Seattle, to become the second pitcher in Oakland history to start two of the A's first three games...the other is Joe Blanton who did it in 2008, the other time the A's opened the season in Japan...also started three of the first seven games, joining Blanton as the only Oakland pitchers to do that since 1977.

#### **JIM MILLER**

- Picked up his first Major League win April 25 against Chicago...allowed two inherited runners to score in the top of the 14th inning but the A's came back with three in the bottom of the inning.
- Was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento May 11 after posting a 1.93 ERA in six relief appearances with the A's.
- Returned to Oakland May 20.
- Was placed on the paternity list July 13 and reinstated July 16.
- Was optioned to Sacramento Aug. 3.

## TOMMY MILONE

- Combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit).
- Combined with Balfour on a four-hit, 2-0 shutout of Chicago April 24 in Oakland...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed three of the hits...according to the Elias Sports Bureau he is just the second Oakland rookie over the last 75 years to have two wins while pitching at least eight scoreless innings and allowing three or fewer hits in a season (Vida Blue, 1970).
- Was the winning pitcher in the A's 2-1 win over Los Angeles May 21 in Oakland...became the first pitcher in Oakland history to win each of his first four starts at the Coliseum.

## BRANDON MOSS

- Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 6 after batting .286 with 15 home runs and 33 RBI in 51 games with the River Cats...the home runs were tied for second in the Pacific Coast League and tied for sixth in all of minor league baseball at the time of his promotion.
- Started at first base June 6 against Texas...prior to that he had not started at first base since June 24, 2008 and had just two career appearances at first.
- Homered June 7 against Texas, his first since September 2, 2009 at Cincinnati...it snapped a career-high 49-game homerless streak.
- Had his first career two-homer game June 12 at Colorado.
- Homered in all three games of the Colorado series June 12-14 and had four home runs total...is the first Athletic to hit four home runs in a three-game series since Geronimo Berroa against Minnesota, August 12-14, 1996.
- Matched his career-high with three hits (fifth time, first since June 20, 2009 at Colorado) and three RBI (fourth time, second time this year: June 12 at Colorado) June 14 at Colorado.
- Homered in four consecutive games June 12-15...it was the 20th time in Oakland history a player homered in at least four straight games...hit five home runs during the stretch to become the second Athletic since 2000 to hit five home runs over a four-game span (Jack Cust, May 10-13, 2007).
- Became the second player in Athletics history to hit six home runs in his first nine games with the club (Jack Cust, 2007).
- Hit six home runs in interleague play, which tied for fifth in the majors and matched the Oakland interleague record set by Miguel Tejada in 2000.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of June 11-17...batted .348 with three doubles, five home runs, 10 RBI and seven runs scored in six games...it was his first Player of the Week award.
- Committed three errors in the sixth inning June 23 against San Francisco, tying the Major League record for most errors by a first baseman in an inning...it was the seventh time, the first since Jack Clark did it for St. Louis on May 25, 1987...since 1984, the only other Athletic to commit three errors in an inning is Kurt Abbott on May 10, 1998 vs. Chicago at shortstop.
- The three errors set an Oakland record for errors in a game by a first baseman...is the first Athletics first baseman to commit three errors in a game since Lou Limmer on August 19, 1954 vs. New York.
- Tied for eighth in the AL with seven home runs in June.
- Hit his 10th home run in his 24th game on July 4 at Boston...in Athletics history, only Dave Kingman reached 10 home runs in fewer than his first 24 games with the club (19 in 1984).
- Had the game-ending single in the bottom of the ninth inning July 20 against New York, his third career walk-off hit (last: July 22, 2009 vs. Milwaukee).
- Had a career-high tying seven-game hitting streak from Aug. 15 to 28 (9 for 28, .321).
- Had career highs August 31 against Boston with four hits, four RBI and four runs scored and matched his career high with two doubles...became the 12th player in Oakland history with at least four hits, four RBI and four runs scored in a game.

## JORDAN NORBERTO

- Retired the final two batters May 1 at Boston for his first Major League save...he saved Jarrod Parker's first ML win, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 4 retroactive to May 31 with a strained left shoulder...made one rehab appearance with Triple-A Sacramento June 19 and was reinstated June 21.
- Recorded his first Major League win July 6 against Seattle when he struck out the side in the 11th inning of the A's 4-1 win.

## DEREK NORRIS

- Was recalled from Sacramento June 21 after batting .273 with eight home runs and 36 RBI in 55 games in his Triple-A debut...made his Major League debut with a start at catcher that day against Los Angeles (NL) and went 0 for 3.
- Singled off Madison Bumgarner in the fifth inning June 23 against San Francisco for his first Major League hit...added a RBI single in the ninth inning for his first RBI and first multiple hit game.
- Hit his first Major League home run June 24 against San Francisco, a three-run "walk-off" shot in the bottom of the ninth off Santiago Casilla...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the third player in Athletics history to hit a game-ending home run for his first ML home run...the other two are Dee Miles (September 14, 1939) and George Hendrick (May 28, 1972).
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 30 streak July 22 against New York (AL).
- Was optioned to Sacramento July 30 when George Kottaras reported to Oakland but returned Aug. 3 when Kurt Suzuki was traded to Washington.
- Hit safely in each of his first eight games following his return (8 for 32, .250), which was the longest hitting streak of his career.

## JARROD PARKER

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 25 and had a no decision in his A's debut, a 5-4, 14-inning win over Chicago April 25 in Oakland...shutout the White Sox on five hits and a walks over the first six innings to extend his career-opening scoreless streak to 11.2 innings...Balfour allowed a run in the ninth inning for the blown save.
- Earned his first Major League win in the A's 5-3 victory at Boston May 1...Norberto recorded the save, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.

## CLIFF PENNINGTON

- Doubled in the second inning June 4 against Texas to snap a career-high 0 for 29 streak (previous: 0 for 27, May 22-June 1, 2010).
- Went 3 for 3 June 15, his 28th birthday...is 6 for 12 (.500) with one double, one triple, four RBI and four runs scored in three career games on his birthday.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list July 20 with left elbow tendinitis...had the lowest slugging percentage in the majors (.282) and the second lowest batting average (.197) and on-base percentage (.259) when he went on the DL.
- Went 5 for 11 (.455) on a three-game rehab assignment with Sacramento from Aug. 4-6 and was reinstated from the DL Aug. 7.
- Played in the 500th game of his career September 1 against Boston.
- Went 4 for 4 September 7 at Seattle, his fourth career four-hit game (last: September 1, 2011 at Cleveland)...all four have come on the road.

## ANTHONY RECKER

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and hit .129 in 13 games as the back-up to Kurt Suzuki before he was optioned to Sacramento May 28.

## JOSH REDDICK

- Was the A's fifth different Opening Day starter in right field in the last five years.
- Had career highs May 11 against Detroit with four runs, four hits (tied), two home runs and five RBI...is the eighth player in Oakland history with at least four runs, four hits, two home runs and five RBI in a game...the last was Matt Holliday (July 20, 2009 vs. Minnesota).



- Hit 10 home runs in May, which tied for third in the AL...is the first Athletic to hit 10 home runs in a month since Frank Thomas had 10 in September, 2006...also tied for fourth in the AL in runs in May (20) and tied for fifth in walks (17).
- Matched his career-high with four strikeouts June 29 against the Dodgers.
- Had the game-ending RBI double July 8 against Seattle, his second career "walk-off" hit...the other was a single on August 7, 2011 against New York.
- Went 0 for 7 with four strikeouts July 30 against Tampa Bay...is one of 15 players in Oakland history to go hitless in a game with at least seven at bats (last: Matt Holliday, May 3, 2009)...it was his second four-strikeout game of the season (June 19 vs. LAD) and third of his career (August 4, 2009 at Tampa Bay).
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 21 streak with a first inning single August 2 against Toronto (previous: 20, September 19, 2009-April 20, 2010).
- Hit his first career grand slam August 31 against Boston.
- Ranked fifth in the AL with 23 RBI in August...the RBI are his most in a month (previous: 18 in May, 2012).
- Was named AL Player of the Week for the week ending September 2, his first career weekly honor...went 12 for 31 (.387) with six runs, two doubles, three home runs and 10 RBI in seven games last week.

### ADAM ROSALES

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and appeared in one game against Seattle in Japan before he was optioned to Sacramento April 2.
- Returned to Oakland May 17 but was optioned back to Sacramento June 16.
- Returned to Oakland for a third stint Aug. 2.
- His double in the seventh inning Aug. 5 against Toronto was his first since July 10, 2010, snapping a 48-game streak without a double...that was the second longest streak by an Athletic since 1993 (58, Frank Menechino from April 30, 2003 to May 9, 2004).

### TYSON ROSS

- Began the season at Triple-A Sacramento and was 0-1 with a 4.00 ERA in two starts with the River Cats before he was recalled by Oakland April 17.
- Went 2-6 with a 6.51 ERA in nine starts with the A's before he was optioned back to Sacramento May 31.
- Returned on June 16 to start against San Diego and allowed two runs on one hit and four walks in 6.0 innings in a no decision...was optioned back to Sacramento the next day.
- Returned to Oakland for a third stint June 23 and went 0-2 with a 7.71 ERA in two starts before he was optioned back to Sacramento June 29.

### EVAN SCRIBNER

- Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 6 after posting a 3.31 ERA and six saves in 23 relief appearances with the River Cats.
- Tossed 3.0 scoreless innings June 15 against San Diego and recorded his first Major League save in the A's 10-2 win.
- Was optioned to Sacramento June 16 but returned to Oakland June 24.
- Was optioned to Sacramento Aug. 3 but returned again Aug. 5.

### SCOTT SIZEMORE

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 3 after tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee in the team's first full-squad workout Feb. 27 in Phoenix...underwent successful reconstructive surgery March 21...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg of the Arizona Sports Medicine Center of Scottsdale...will miss the entire 2012 season.

### SETH SMITH

- Was the A's eight different Opening Day starter at designated hitter in the last eight years.
- Hit his first home run of the season April 22 against Cleveland, a two-run shot off Masterson in the fourth inning, to snap a career-high 45-game homerless streak...his previous high was 35 (June 22-July 31, 2011)...it was his first home run since Aug. 23, 2011 against Houston.

- Went 0 for 4 with four strikeouts April 30 at Boston, the first four-strikeout game of his career.
- Went 4 for 5 on June 4 against Texas, his second career four-hit game (also September 4, 2009 vs. Arizona).
- Hit his 10th home run of the season July 15 at Minnesota, his fourth consecutive season with double figures in home runs.
- Matched his career-high with five RBI July 27 at Baltimore, despite not entering the game until the sixth inning...became the third player in Oakland history to drive in five runs off the bench (Mickey Tettleton, August 24, 1986 and Erubiel Durazo, July 10, 2004).
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list Aug. 3 with a strained left hamstring.

### ERIC SOGARD

- Had a career-high three RBI, April 15 at Seattle.
- Was optioned to Sacramento May 21 but returned to Oakland June 16...appeared in just one game before he was optioned back to Sacramento June 24.
- Recalled a third time July 20 when Pennington went on the disabled list.

### KURT SUZUKI

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at catcher...the five starts are second most by a catcher in Oakland history...only Terry Steinbach, with nine, has more.
- Made his 598th career appearance at catcher April 7 against Seattle, which moves him past Ossee Schreckengost for fifth most in Athletics history.
- Had five assists April 25 against Chicago, the third time in Oakland history a catcher had five or more assists in a game (6, Jim Essian vs. Texas on Sept. 19, 1979; 5, Jeff Newman vs. Toronto on Aug. 13, 1979).
- Snapped a career-high 78-game homerless streak July 22 against New York...his previous high was 56 games from July 29-October 2, 2010...it was his first homer since September 15, 2011 against Detroit...the home run also snapped a career-high streak of 17 consecutive games without a RBI (previous: 16, July 28-August 14, 2008).
- Was traded to the Washington Nationals with cash for minor league catcher George Freitas, Aug. 3.

### MICHAEL TAYLOR

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento May 4 and went 3 for 16 (.188) in four games before he was optioned to Sacramento May 11.
- Returned Aug. 3 and went 0 for 5 in two games before he was sent back to Sacramento Aug. 5.

### RICH THOMPSON

- Was claimed off waivers from the Los Angeles Angels April 20 and appeared in one game for the A's before he was designated for assignment April 25...faced Chicago on April 23 (0.2 ip, 1 h).
- Cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento April 27.

### NEIL WAGNER

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 17 but did not appear in a game before he was optioned back to Sacramento April 20.
- Was claimed off waivers by San Diego May 28.

### JEMILE WEEKS

- Played in the 100th game of his career April 6 against Seattle and collected 126 hits over that span...since 1918, the only player in Athletics history with more hits over the first 100 games of his career is Wally Moses, who had 134 hits in his first 100 games with the Philadelphia A's in 1935-36...the previous Oakland record was 122 by Ben Grieve.
- Went 0 for 3 April 14 at Seattle, snapping a 20-game road hitting streak dating back to August 24 of last year...hit .349 (30 for 86) during the streak, which tied for second longest in Oakland history and fell two short of the record of 22 set by Mike Davis from April 22 to June 17, 1987.
- Stole his 10th base of the season May 15 at Los Angeles (AL)...is the fifth player in Oakland history to steal at least 10 bases in each of his first two seasons, the first since Jason McDonald in 1997.
- Had two RBI June 4 against Texas, snapping a career-high 25-game streak without an RBI.
- Had the first three-walk game of his career June 19 against Los Angeles (NL).

- Went a career-high 35 consecutive games without a stolen base from May 16 to June 25.
- Went 0 for 7 July 30 against Tampa Bay but had the “walk-off” sacrifice fly in the bottom of the 15th inning...it was his first career game-ending RBI and the 22nd game-ending sacrifice fly in Oakland history (last: Crisp, July 3, 2012 vs. Boston)...is the second player in Oakland history to go hitless in at least seven at bats but still drive in a run (Matt Holliday, May 3, 2009 at Seattle).
- Had a career-high 31-game errorless streak from June 23 to July 31.
