CAREER: Dempster was acquired by Texas in a July 31 trade with the Chicago Cubs...has returned to the organization that originally drafted and signed him in 1995...is in his 15th major league season, spending eight-and-a-half years with the Cubs before the trade...over four years from 2008-11, ranked sixth in the National League in innings pitched...owns seven seasons of 10+ wins (2000-02; 2008-11) with seven seasons of 200.0-or-more innings...was one of 11 major league pitchers with at least 200.0 innings in each of prior four seasons (2008-11)...a two-time N.L. All-Star (2000 and 2008)...a closer from 2005-07, he joins Derek Lowe as the only active pitchers with at least 100 career victories and 85 saves, a feat accomplished by just 17 pitchers through 2011...when traded, ranked among Cubs all-time leaders in saves (5th, 87), appearances (7th, 374), and strikeouts (11th, 1070)...a native of British Columbia, he ranks second among Canadians in major league history (at time of trade) in wins (117), starts (310), and innings (2146.2), trailing only Rangers Hall of Famer Fergie Jenkins (284 / 594 / 4500.2) in all three categories...is one of three Canadian-born pitchers in major league history with three seasons of 15-or-more wins, joining Jenkins (10) and Russ Ford (3)...is the eighth Canadian pitcher in Rangers history, first since Rich Harden in 2010...has been an Opening Day starter four times: 2001, 2002, 2011, and 2012...went to Japan as part of the Major League All-Star tour following the 2000 campaign... when traded to Texas, had a career record of 117-121 with a 4.31 ERA over 535 games/310 starts with Florida (1998-2002), Cincinnati (2002-03), and Chicago-NL (2004-12)...extremely active in community work, he was thrice the Cubs' nominee for the Roberto Clemente Award (2006, 2008, 2011), which is given annually to the major league baseball player who combines outstanding skills on the field with devoted work in the community.

LONG-AWAITED DEBUT: Was part of a Rangers midseason trade for the 2nd time in his career, this time being acquired by Texas...in the other trade, Aug. 8, 1996, Texas acquired right-hander John Burkett from Florida, who helped lead the club to its first division title that year...Dempster went to the Marlins in that deal... Dempster made his Rangers debut on Aug. 2 vs. LA of Anaheim, over 17 years after being drafted and signed by Texas in 1995... research indicates it is the longest span in club history between the time a player was drafted by Texas until his first big league ap-

pearance with the Rangers...previous longest span was 15 years by Gene Nelson, who was selected by Texas in the 30th round of the 1978 June draft and did not pitch for the club until his final year in 1993.

2012 WITH CUBS: Went 5-5 with a 2.25 ERA (26 ER/104.0 IP) in 16 games/starts for the Cubs this season prior to the trade to Texas...opponents batted .210 (81-386) with 27 walks and 83 strikeouts...his 1.038 WHIP at the time of the trade ranked 6th in the majors and 3rd in the National League...went 5-2 with a 1.40 ERA (7 ER/45.0 IP) in his last 7 starts spanning a stint on the disabled list...averaged 3.89 runs of support per 9 innings, the 12th-lowest figure among National League qualifiers when he was traded...he saw two stints on the disabled list with the Cubs, April 18-May 3 with a right quadriceps strain and June 16-July 8 with a sore right lat muscle.

ALL-STAR: A two-time All-Star, his first selection came with Florida in his first full season in 2000, the first Canadian pitcher selected to the N.L. squad since Cubs' Fergie Jenkins in 1972... did not appear in that year's game in Atlanta, when he was youngest All-Star on N.L. roster...other selection came as Cubs closer in 2008, when he struck out the side in the 9th inning at Yankee Stadium, including his first batter faced: Ian Kinsler...became just the 2nd pitcher in major league history to strike out the side in the 9th-inning-or-later in an All-Star Game...the other: Milwaukee Braves' Gene Conley in 1955 (12th inning) K'd A.L.'s Al Kaline, Mickey Vernon and Al Rosen at his home park of County Stadium...Conley earned the win when Stan Musial homered to lead off the bottom of the 12th.

POSTSEASON: Is 0-1, 6.35 (4 ER/5.2 IP) in 2 games/one start in his postseason career, all with the Cubs in 2007-08...tossed scoreless 8th in 2007 NLDS Game 2 at Arizona in eventual 3-game sweep to the D-Backs...in only career postseason start, took 7-2 loss in 2008 NLDS Game 1 at Wrigley (4.2 IP, 4 H, 4 R-ER) in a 3-game sweep to the Dodgers...matched up with Derek Lowe in that start, permitting grand slam to James Loney...issued 7 walks, which remain tied for most in any postseason game by a pitcher since 2001.

2011: Went 10-14 with a 4.80 ERA (108 ER/202.1 IP), tying for the major league lead with 34 starts and pacing the club with 202.1 innings...it marked his 4th straight 10-win campaign...joined Roy Halladay as the only pitchers to reach 200.0 innings pitched in each of the last four seasons while in their 30's...marked the 3rd time he reached a career-best 34 starts, also done with Florida in 2001 and Cubs in 2010...his 14 losses were a career high, surpassing 13 in 2002...led the club with 21 quality starts, including 6 straight July 26-Aug. 22...received an average of 3.90 runs of support, the lowest on the staff...Matt Garza's mark of 4.45 was 2nd-lowest...was 4-8 with a 4.55 ERA (46 ER/91.0 IP) in 15 starts after the All-Star break...surrendered a homer in 15 of 34 starts,

including 2-or-more 7 times...finished April with a 1-3 mark and a 9.58 ERA (33 ER/31.0 IP) in 6 starts...from June 8-July 15, went 3-1 with a 1.99 ERA (10 ER/45.1 IP) in 7 starts...finished the season riding a six-game skid, beginning Aug. 22, at 0-6 with a 5.44 ERA (29 ER/48.0 IP) in his final 8 starts...made the Opening Day start, April 1 vs. Pittsburgh.

2010: Dempster was 15-12 with a 3.85 ERA (92 ER/215.1 IP) and led the Cubs in victories...his 34 starts, 215.1 innings pitched and 208 strikeouts also led Chicago in his 3rd season back in the starting rotation...the 34 starts tied his career high...went over the 200-strikeout mark for the 2nd time in his career, and was one shy of his career-best 209 strikeouts with Florida in 2000...the 10 seasons between 200-strikeout campaigns are the longest in major league history...the previous mark was 9 seasons, held by Bert Blyleven (1976-85) and John Smoltz (1997-2006)-credit Elias...received 2-or-fewer runs of support in 14 of his 34 outings...was 2-10 in those starts...went 10-5 with a 3.09 ERA (40 ER/116.2 IP) in 18 road starts compared to a 5-7 mark with a 4.74 ERA (52 ER/98.2 IP) in 16 home starts...the 10 road wins tied for the N.L. lead...went 4-0 with a 2.23 ERA (8 ER/32.1 IP) and 25 strikeouts in 5 starts against Milwaukee...went 2-for-2 at the dish, May 4 vs. Pirates, his 4th career multi-hit affair...tossed 7.0-or-more frames in a career-high 6 straight starts, April 18-May 15...tossed his 11th career complete game, June 22 in Seattle, a 2-0 loss...recorded his 1,500th career strikeout, July 25 vs. St. Louis, whiffing John Jay in the 6th...won a career-high 6 consecutive road starts, Aug. 10-Sept. 28, including 26.2 consecutive scoreless away innings, Aug. 15-Sept. 28...earned his 100th career victory, 50th as a Cub, in a 1-0 win Sept. 11 vs. Brewers...**2009:** In his second season back in the rotation, reached the 200.0-inning mark for the 5th time in his career...did not allow an earned run in 26.0 innings at Wrigley Field, Sept. 3-Oct. 4...received 2-or-fewer runs of support in 15 of his 31 outings...was 1-8 in those starts...struck out Philadelphia's Cliff Lee August 13 to pick up the 1,300th K of his career...made his 200th career start April 29 at Arizona...on the disabled list July 7-27 with a great right toe fracture...tossed 6.0-or-more innings in 12 straight starts, Aug. 2-Sept. 29...on Sept. 14, he joined John Smoltz as the only pitchers to record at least 3 straight 20-save seasons followed by consecutive 10-win campaigns as a starter...earned the 87th victory of his career with 5-hit shutout Sept. 29 over the Pirates, first complete game since June 11, 2008 vs. Atlanta...**2008:** Set a career high with 17 victories and was named to the N.L. All-Star Team in his return to the starting rotation after 3 seasons as Chicago's closer from 2005-07...the 17 victories ranked T3rd in the N.L. and tied for team lead with Ted Lilly...went 14-3 at home, most victories at Wrigley Field for a Cubs pitcher since Fergie Jenkins won a franchise-record 15 in 1967...began the season 10-0 at home, the first Cub to accomplish the feat since Rick Reuschel in 1977...became just the second pitcher since 1969 to record 25-or-more saves in a season then win at least 17 the following year...former Tiger John Hiller had 38 saves in 1973 before going 17-14 in 1974...his .227 opponent batting average was 3rd-best in the N.L....his 2.96 ERA ranked 4th, as did his .739 winning percentage (17-6)...pair of 4-game win streaks...went 69.2-consecutive homerless innings at Wrigley Field, June 11-Sept. 3...his 19 sac bunts led the majors and set a franchise mark for a pitcher...went the distance for his only complete game of the season, June 11 against Atlanta...was his first complete game since Sept. 25, 2002 at Wrigley with Cincinnati...lost NLDS Game 1 vs. Los Angeles...**2007:** Went 28-for-31 in save situations in his 4th season as a Cub, a 90.3% success rate that ranked 3rd in N.L. and 5th in majors...on the disabled list with a strained right oblique June 23-July 19...recorded his 1,000th career strikeout in the 9th inning, Sept. 5 vs. the Dodgers, fanning Shea Hillenbrand...converted a season-high 13 consecutive save opportunities, June 11-Sept. 2...pitched a perfect 8th in NLDS Game 2 at Arizona...**2006:** Finished the season with 67 strikeouts and 24 saves in 33 chances...ranked 1st in N.L. with 64 games finished...converted a club-record 26 consecutive

save opportunities, Aug. 2, 2005-May 1, 2006...the previous record was 22 by Joe Borowski, Aug. 5, 2003-May 23, 2004...allowed 2 runs April 23 at St. Louis to end a 30.1-inning scoreless streak dating to Aug. 16, 2005...picked up 50th career save July 18 against Houston...**2005:** Converted 33 of 35 save opportunities in his first turn as a closer...also made 6 starts early in the season, becoming the first Cub in franchise history to record at least 20 saves in the same season while making at least one start...was 4-0 with a 1.85 ERA (12 ER/58.1 IP) in his 57 relief outings, holding opponents to a .218 average...became the 8th Cub in club annals to record 30-or-more saves in a single season...his 94.3-save percentage was tops in club history...ranked 8th in the N.L. in saves and 9th in games finished (53)...converted a season-high 19 straight saves, Aug. 2-end of season...worked a personal and club-high 21.1-scoreless innings over his final 22 games...it was the longest such stretch by a Cub reliever since Les Lancaster hurled 30.2-scoreless innings in 1989...was named the MLB DHL Delivery Man of the Month for September, going 13-for-13 in save chances with 19 K's in 15.2 innings...**2004:** Pitched in 23 late-season games with Chicago despite having undergone "Tommy John" surgery on his right elbow just one year earlier...limited opponents to a .208 average...allowed just one of 11 inherited runners to score...opened the year on the 60-day disabled list, continuing rehabilitation from his August 4, 2003 operation...reinstated from DL Aug. 1 and made his Cub debut that same day, pitching 0.2 scoreless innings against Philadelphia in his first major league appearance since July 28, 2003, first M.L. relief appearance since June 25, 2003...earned his first big league save Sept. 15 vs. Pittsburgh, pitching 2.0 scoreless innings...**2003:** Struggled through an injury-plagued campaign before undergoing "Tommy John" surgery on his right elbow on Aug. 4, 2003...the surgery to remove a bone chip behind his right elbow and repair a complete tear of the ulnar collateral ligament were performed by Dr. Timothy Kremchek...was the victim of 4 blown saves by the Reds bullpen - including 3 in his last 8 starts...on the 15-day DL May 23-June 6 with an inflamed nerve in his neck...due to the neck injury, he missed his scheduled start May 9 - the first time he had been scratched during his major league career...his relief appearance the following day vs. Milwaukee snapped a string of 133-consecutive starting assignments...placed on DL July 31 (retro to July 29) with inflammation in his right elbow...**2002:** Combined to go 10-13 with a 5.38 ERA in 33 starts for Florida and Cincinnati...surpassed the 200.0-inning mark for the 3rd straight season and tossed 4 complete games: April 19 at Atlanta; May 12 vs. Los Angeles; June 28 at Tampa Bay, and Sept. 25 at Chicago-NL...when he was traded to Cincinnati in July, he joined fellow Canadian Chris Reitsma on the Reds pitching staff...his 10 K's Sept. 14 against the Cubs were the most by a Reds pitcher all season...**2001:** Won 15 games for first time in his career, as he became only the 2nd Marlins pitcher to win 10 decisions prior to the All-Star break, joining Chris Hammond (1993)...was named the N.L. Pitcher of the Week for July 2-8 after allowing one unearned run and 8 hits in 2 starts...went 4-1, 1.61 ERA in July - becoming just the 2nd Florida pitcher to record 4 wins in a month...his 16 sac bunts set a club record for Fish pitchers, including team-record 3 sacrifices on July 19 vs. Mets...**2000:** Was selected to the N.L. All-Star team in his first full big league season...went 14-10 with a 3.66 ERA in 33 starts...fanned 209 batters in 226.1 innings of work...the strikeout total ranked 4th in the league and set a club record...became only the 2nd Canadian pitcher to record 200 strikeouts in a season (Fergie Jenkins, 1967-1971; 1974)...tossed 5th one-hitter in Marlins history in a 3-0 victory May 7 against the Mets...allowed only a 6th-inning double to Mike Piazza in his first career complete game...went to the All-Star Game in Atlanta, although he did not pitch...**1999:** Opened the year at Triple-A Calgary and joined Florida May 7...went 7-8 with a team-high 126 strikeouts in 25 starts...on September 7 vs. Los Angeles, he threw 7.0 shutout innings in a 2-1 win...in that start, he opposed fellow Canadian Eric Gagne - who threw 6.0 scoreless frames...it was the first N.L. game featuring a pair of Canadian-born starting

pitchers since the Cubs' Fergie Jenkins and St. Louis' Reggie Cleveland opposed each other on July 28, 1973... **1998:** Saw his first big league action, appearing in 14 games/11 starts for the Marlins...also made 7 starts for Double-A Portland and 5 starts for Triple-A Charlotte...made his major league debut May 23 – a relief appearance against Pittsburgh...retired the first 3 batters he faced, including his first career strikeout (Kevin Polcovich)...on June 1 at Wrigley Field, he suffered the loss (10-2) in his first big league start...earned his first major league victory June 28 vs. Boston, allowing one run in 7.0 innings in a 5-1 contest... **1997:** Led Single-A Brevard County with 10 victories, 165.1 innings pitched and 131 strikeouts in 26 starts... **1996:** Began the year with Texas' Single-A Charleston club before being traded late in the season to the Florida organization...finished the campaign at Single-A Kane County... **1995:** Saw action with the Gulf Coast Rangers and Single-A Hudson Valley during his first professional season, going 4-1 in nine games for the two Texas affiliates.

OFF THE FIELD: Was named one of the 99 "Good Guys" in professional sports by The Sporting News in 2001...received the 2000 James "Tip" O'Neill Award, presented annually by the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum to the Canadian baseball player judged to have excelled in individual achievement and team contribution while adhering to the highest ideals of baseball...was the Chicago Cubs nominee for the Roberto Clemente award in

2006, 2008, and 2011...in 2006, Ryan and his wife, Jenny, established a charitable ticket program called "Dempster's Dugout" that donated 500 tickets to local social service agencies that assist low-income children...the program continued throughout his time in Chicago...in 2009, created the Dempster Family Foundation, dedicated to raising awareness of DiGeorge Syndrome and reaching out to families with children with DiGeorge Syndrome...his charitable endeavors in 2003 included assisting the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation and Garth Brooks' Teammates for Kids... following the 2001 season, he was presented with the All Heart Award by the Florida chapter of the Baseball Writers' Association of America – given to the Marlins player who best exemplifies the team's commitment to the South Florida community by making a positive impact and by serving as a role model for others...in 2000, he hosted children from the S.O.S. Children's Village at each of his home starts and he donated \$10 for every strikeout to the KIDS THAT CARE Pediatric and Cancer Fund, created to help build a pediatric bone marrow transplant unit in Miami...participated in the 2007 and 2010 Cubs Caravan.

PERSONAL: Ryan and his wife, Jenny, have three children: Brady, Riley, and Finley...graduated from Elphinstone Secondary School in Gibsons, British Columbia, in 1995 – he played baseball, basketball and soccer.

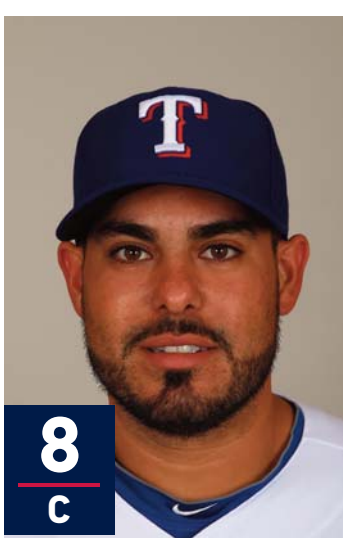

2008 ROOKIE OF THE YEAR: He was a near-unanimous selection as the National League Rookie of the Year in 2008, receiving 31 of 32 first-place votes for 158 points (one second-place vote), well ahead of second-place Joey Votto with 76 points...Soto was the only player named on all 32 ballots...he was the fifth catcher to win the N.L. award (now one of 6), joining Johnny Bench (1968), Earl Williams (1971), Benito Santiago (1987), and Mike Piazza (1993), a list that now includes Buster Posey (2010) as well...three catchers have earned the A.L. award: Thurmon Munson (1970), Carlton Fisk (1972), and Sandy Alomar Jr. (1990)...

he was the fifth Cubs winner, joining Billy Williams (1961), Ken Hubbs (1962), Jerome Walton (1989), and Kerry Wood (1998).
