ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: The A's open their 46th season in Oakland where they have won 15 American League West titles, one AL Wild Card, six AL pennants and four World Championships...only the New York Yankees (18) and Atlanta Braves (16) have more division titles than the A's...since the A's moved to Oakland in 1968, only the Yankees (11) and Cardinals (7) have more league championships and only the Yankees have more world championships (7)...have a 3723-3436 (.520) record over the previous 45 seasons in Oakland...only five teams have won more games over that span (New York Yankees, Boston, Los Angeles Dodgers, St. Louis, Cincinnati)...this is the Athletics franchise 113th season in the American League...since 1901, the A's have 15 AL West titles plus 15 AL pennants and nine World Championships...only the Yankees (27) and Cardinals (11) have won more World Championships...the A's are 8438-8908 (.486) in their previous 112 seasons...that includes a 3886-4248 record from 1901-54 in Philadelphia and 829-1224 from 1955-67 in Kansas City.

DURING THE SPRING: The went 8-1-1 over their final 10 games to finish the spring with a record of 17-13-3 (.561)...that was the third best record in the Cactus League behind Kansas City (25-7-2) and Seattle (22-11) and sixth best in the majors...went 15-7-2 last spring and posted a winning record in consecutive springs for the first time since 2007 (17-12-2) and 2008 (18-8)...A's pitchers walked just 84 batters, which was the fewest in the majors...however, yielded 355 hits, which was sixth most...had the third highest ERA (5.45)...the offense ranked second in the majors in on-base percentage (.367) and walks (134), fourth in runs (203) and seventh in batting (.287) and hit by pitches (15)...had three ties, which matched the most by an A's team since moving to Arizona in 1969 (also 2010)...all three ties lasted nine innings...went 10-4-2 at Phoenix Muni, 6-9-1 on the road and 1-0 in Oakland.

FOR OPENERS: The A's have lost each of their last eight openers, which is **tied for the longest Opening Day losing streak in American League history**...the Washington Senators also lost eight straight from 1963-70...the longest Opening Day losing streak in Major League history is nine by the Atlanta Braves (1972-80) and New York Giants (1893-1901)...the A's are batting .175 (46 for 263) and have scored just 13 runs during their current eight-game Opening Day losing streak...have not won on Opening Day since a 5-4 win over Texas April 5, 2004...have lost 15 of their last 19 openers...this marks the fourth consecutive season the A's have opened with Seattle, the 10th time overall...**the four consecutive openers against Seattle are the most consecutive openers against one team in Athletics history**...the 10 overall match the most in Oakland history against one team (Minnesota)...are 3-6 against the Mariners in openers, including 3-2 in Oakland, 0-3 at Seattle and 0-1 in Tokyo...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 20-25 on Opening Day, including 16-11 in Oakland, 4-11 on the road, 0-2 in Tokyo and 0-1 in Las Vegas...all-time, the Athletics are 52-60 in openers.

OPENING DAY STARTING LINEUPS: Five players return from last year's Opening Day starting lineup (Céspedes, Crisp, Reddick, Smith, Sogard)...of those five, only Crisp had more than one Opening Day start with the A's prior to this year (2011 and 2012)...Céspedes will be the A's 14th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 14 years and Anderson will be the A's eighth different starting pitcher in the last eight years.

ROSTER NOTES: The A's open the season with 12 pitchers and 13 position players for the sixth time in the last eight years...the exceptions were in 2008 and 2012 when they opened in Japan and carried just 10 pitchers...nine players return from last years Opening Day roster (Balfour, Blevins, Céspedes, Cook, Crisp, Donaldson, Reddick, Sogard, Smith)...10 other players on the roster played for the A's at some point last year (Anderson, Doolittle, Griffin, Milone, Moss, Neshek, Norris, Parker, Scribner, Straily) and one spent the entire season on the disabled list (Sizemore)...four were acquired in a trade (Jaso, Lowrie, Resop, Young) and one was claimed off waivers (Freiman).

ROOKIE AND VETERANS: The A's have two rookies on the Opening Day Roster (Freiman, Straily) after having seven last year...three players have six or more years of service: Coco Crisp (9 years, 158 days), Grant Balfour (8 years, 99 days) and Chris Young (6 years, 45 days)...that matches the A's fewest players with six or years more service since 1997 (1997, 2001, 2008).

TENURE: Of the 25 players on the A's Opening Day roster, only seven played for the A's prior to last season...Jerry Blevins made his A's debut in 2007 and Brett Anderson's came in 2009...three others were with the club in 2010 (Crisp, Donaldson, Sogard) and two more were with Oakland in 2011 (Balfour, Sizemore)...Sean Doolittle has been in the A's organization the longest...he was drafted as a compensation pick following the first round of the 2007 draft, a little over a month before the A's traded for Blevins.

THE YOUNG AND THE OLD: The average age on the A's Opening Day roster is 28.03 years...according to Stats, Inc., that is the youngest roster in the American League and second youngest in the majors (Atlanta, 27.79)...**the starting rotation has an average age of 25.03, which is the youngest in the majors by over a year and a half** (Miami, 26.62)...the A's roster features three players under the age of 25...Derek Norris is the youngest at the age of 24 years, 45 days...he is followed by Dan Straily (24 years, 120 days) and Jarrod Parker (24 years, 127 days)...there are five players that are at least 30 years old...Grant Balfour is the oldest at 35 years, 91 days...he is followed by Coco Crisp (33 years, 150 days) and Pat Neshek (32 years, 208 days).

NUMBER CHANGES: Chris Resop will wear number 44 for the regular season.

LOCKED UP: The A's have two players under contract beyond the 2013 season...Hiroyuki Nakajima is signed through 2014 with a club option for 2015 and Yoenis Céspedes is signed through 2015...Brett Anderson has club options for 2014 and 2015 and Coco Crisp and Chris Young have club options for 2014.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's begin the season with three players on the disabled list (Nakajima, Rodriguez, Rosales)...Rodriguez was placed on the 60-day DL March 23 (sprained right elbow), Rosales was added to the 15-day DL March 26 (strained left intercostal) and Nakajima was added March 30 retroactive to March 27 (strained left hamstring)...the A's used the DL 21 times last year, the fourth time in the last six years they used it at least 20 times...have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one.

A's vs. MARINERS

The A's won the season series last year, 12-7...went 5-3 in Oakland, 6-3 in Seattle and 1-1 in Tokyo...won each of the final seven games, which is the A's second longest winning streak against Seattle over the last 20 years (15, April 7-August 16, 2006)...over the previous seven seasons, the A's have won the season series in even numbered seasons (2006, 2008, 2010, 2012) and the Mariners have won in odd numbered years (2007, 2009, 2011)...the A's are 71-62 (.534) against Seattle since 2006...all-time, the A's are 304-224 (.5758) against Seattle, which is the second best mark by an AL team against the Mariners (Boston, .5759)...are 168-95 in Oakland, 135-128 in Seattle and 1-1 in Tokyo.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour finished the 2012 season with streaks of 18 consecutive saves, 11.0 innings scoreless innings and 26 consecutive batters retired...has 398 games pitched in his career and needs two more for 400.

Ryan Cook has not allowed a run in eight career appearances in April (9.0 ip) or 11 career outings against the Mariners (11.0 ip).

Coco Crisp is in his 12th Major League season and is on his ninth Opening Day roster...ranks eighth in Oakland history with 120 career steals, one behind Mike Davis.

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1996** the A's play on April 1 for the first time in Oakland history and lose to the Toronto Blue Jays, 9-6 in Las Vegas...the A's play their first home stand in Las Vegas as the Coliseum was not ready after renovations to the stadium...in **2003** Tim Hudson and Ricardo Rincon combine on a five-hit shutout in the A's 5-0 win over Seattle, the first Opening Day shutout in Oakland history...Erubiel Durazo sets an Oakland Opening Day record with five RBI.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his first start of the season...the A's were 4-2 (.667) in his starting assignments last year and are 31-37 (.456) in his career...tossed at least six innings in five of his six starts in 2012, allowed one run or fewer four times and walked two batters or fewer five times.

OPENING DAY STARTER: Is scheduled to make the first Opening Day start of his career...becomes the eighth different Opening Day starter for the A's in the last eight years (McCarthy, Cahill, Sheets, Braden, Blanton, Haren, Zito)...A's starting pitchers are 0-4 with a 4.44 ERA (23 er in 46.2 ip) over the last nine openers...the last Oakland starter to win on Opening Day was Tim Hudson on April 1, 2003 against Seattle.

ANDERSON vs. SEATTLE: Is 7-3 with a 1.76 ERA (81.2 ip, 76 h, 22 r, 16 er, 16 bb, 67 so, 5 hr) in 13 career starts...that includes 3-2 with a 1.00 ERA (5 er in 45.0 ip) in seven starts at Safeco Field and 4-1 with a 2.70 ERA (11 er in 36.2 ip) in six starts in Oakland...is 4-0 with a 1.07 ERA (4 er in 33.2 ip) over his last five starts...faced the Mariners once last year...was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-1 victory at Seattle September 8...the A's scored a run in the first and he allowed an unearned run in the second...Saunders doubled, went to third on a Drew error and scored on a Robinson fielders choice...the A's scored four times in the fourth inning and he blanked the Mariners on four hits over his final four innings.

THIS SPRING: Was 1-0 with a 6.75 ERA (12.0 ip, 16 h, 11 r, 9 er, 3 bb, 7 so, 3 hr) in four games, all starts...also pitched in a minor league game against the Cubs March 16 (5.0 ip, 5 h, 2 r, 2 er, 4 bb, 3 so) and started and won in the exhibition game against Italy's WBC team March 5 (3.0 ip, 1 h, 1 bb, 3 so)...faced just two batters March 10 against Arizona before leaving the game with a strained right trapezius...allowed a .314 (16 for 51) opponents batting average.

2012 RECAP: Completed his rehab from "Tommy John" surgery in late August and made six starts before his regular season ended when he strained his right oblique Sept. 19...went 4-2 with a 2.57 ERA and .225 opponents batting average...allowed just one home run in 35.0 innings.

OPPONENTS BATTING: His opponents batting average included a .219 (7-for-32) mark against left-handed hitters compared to .227 (22-for-97) against right-handers...had 22 of his 25 strikeouts against righties...allowed a .148 average with runners in scoring position...opponents were 0-for-10 with RISP and two outs...has held the opposition to a .214 (44-for-206) batting average with runners in scoring position over his last three seasons after allowing a .314 mark in his rookie campaign of 2009...had a .194 opponents batting average the first two times through the lineup, .323 with his only home run after that...walked just one batter to lead off an inning.

SPLITS: Was 2-0 with a 1.38 ERA in his two starts in Oakland compared to 2-2 with a 3.27 ERA in four starts on the road...logged a 3-1 record, a 1.61 ERA and .188 opponents batting average in four starts at night compared to 1-1 with a 4.26 ERA and .286 opponents average in two starts during the day.

ON THE BASES: Had one pickoff and now has 14 in his 68 career starts...opponents were 1-for-2 in stolen bases attempts...they are now 14-for-27 (51.9%) over the last three years after going 14-for-18 (77.8%) during his rookie campaign.

RUN SUPPORT: Received no run support in each of his two losses...is now 2-21 in 34 career starts with run support of fewer than three runs, 23-4 in 34 starts with support of three runs or more.

MORE 2012: Was reinstated from the disabled list Aug. 20 and started the next day against Minnesota...allowed just one run in 7.0 innings for the win...it was his first start since June 5, 2011 at Boston and his first win since May 26, 2011 at Los Angeles (AL)...combined with Cook and Balfour on a two-hit shutout in his second start, a 3-0 win at Cleveland Aug. 27...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed both of the hits...allowed one run in each of his next two starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1918 to begin his season with four consecutive starts of one run or fewer...won each of his first four starts to become the first Oakland pitcher to start the season by winning at least his first four starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990...the four-game winning streak matched the longest of his career (third time, last: Sept. 6 to Oct. 2, 2010)...had a 0.69 ERA, a .185 opponents batting average and three walks in 26.0 innings over his first four starts...then lost each of his final two starts, logging an 8.00 ERA, a .324 opponents batting average and four walks in 9.0 innings...left his final start Sept. 19 at Detroit after just 2.1 innings with the oblique injury...returned to start and win Game 3 of the ALDS against Detroit in Oakland...combined with Cook, Doolittle and Balfour on a four-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win...tossed 6.0 innings and allowed two of the hits (2 bb, 6 so).

REHAB ASSIGNMENT: Combined for a 1-1 record and a 4.62 ERA during a six-start rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton and Triple-A Sacramento...walked just five batters in 25.1 innings (1.78 per nine innings)...allowed a .301 opponents batting average, including .294 (20-for-68) by right-handed hitters and .314 (11-for-35) by left-handers...issued all five of his walks to righties...began his rehab assignment July 21 with Stockton, one year and seven days after having reconstructive surgery to the ulnar collateral ligament in his left elbow...tossed 2.0 innings against High Desert (4 h, 2 r, 2 er, 0 bb, 0 so)...was transferred to Sacramento July 26 and went 1-1 with a 4.24 ERA in five starts with the River Cats...tossed a minor league season-high 6.0 shutout innings (3 h, 1 bb, 4 so) for his only win Aug. 10 at Oklahoma City...struck out a minor league season-high seven in 5.0 innings for the loss in his final rehab start Aug. 15 at New Orleans.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Jarrod Parker (13-8, 3.47 ERA in 2012): Is scheduled to make his first start of the season...finished the 2012 season with a four-game winning streak, which is the longest of his career...is 1-1 with a 5.40 ERA in two career starts against Seattle, both last year...was 0-2 with a 7.45 ERA in five starts during Spring Training...allowed a .309 opponents batting average...walked five, struck out 13 and surrendered five home runs in 19.1 innings...went 13-8 with a 3.47 ERA in 29 starts last year...tied with fellow rookie Tommy Milone for the team lead in wins as they both set an Oakland record for wins by a rookie...the previous mark of 12 was held by Chris Codiroli (1983) and Joe Blanton (2005)...tied for second among American League rookies in wins, ranked fourth in strikeouts and innings pitched (181.1) and tied for fourth in starts...his ERA was the lowest among AL rookies with 130 or more innings, his .619 winning percentage was second best and his .248 opponents batting average was third best.

The A's bullpen compiled a 2.90 ERA last year, which was second lowest in the American League and ninth lowest in Oakland history...it was the lowest since the 1990 club had an Oakland record 2.35 ERA...also had the second lowest opponents batting average (.209), on-base percentage (.293) and slugging percentage (.334) in the AL...the opponents batting average was second lowest in Oakland history (.203 in 1989), the on-base percentage was fifth best and the slugging percentage ranked sixth...ranked fourth in the AL in saves (47)...had 17 blown saves for a save percentage of 73.4, which ranked sixth...ranked second in the AL in wins (30) and winning percentage (.682)...the winning percentage was second best in Oakland history (.738 in 1975)...had 469 strikeouts, which was the second best total in Oakland history (514 in 2009).

- Posted a 2.25 ERA in four spring training appearances...opponents were 2 for 14 (.143) with no walks in 4.0 ip)...had arthroscopic surgery February 14 to perform a lateral meniscectomy of his right knee and did not pitch in a Cactus League game until March 21.
- Has 398 career games pitched and needs two more for 400 in his career.
- Had a win, converted each of his three save opportunities and did not allow a run in 11 appearances against Seattle last year (11.0 ip, 4 h, 8 so).
- Finished the 2012 season with streaks of 18 consecutive saves, 11.0 scoreless innings and 26 consecutive batters retired...the saves streak is tied for seventh longest in Oakland history...his last blown save came on April 29, 2012 at Baltimore...the longest single-season streak of consecutive batters retired by an Oakland reliever is 27 by Mike Mohler (April 15-28, 1996)...the longest streak by an Oakland pitcher is 30 by Guillermo Moscoso (Sept. 2-7, 2011).
- Had two stints as the A's closer in 2012 and saved a team-leading 24 games in a team-high 75 appearances while posting a 2.53 ERA...was charged with just two blown saves and his save percentage of 92.3 ranked fourth in the American League...was 10th in saves.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his first start of the season...the A's were 17-12 (.587) in his starting assignments last year and his teams are 18-12 (.600) in his career...tossed at least 6.0 innings in 22 of his 29 starts in 2013, allowed two runs or fewer 17 times and walked two batters or fewer 18 times.

FOUR-GAME WINNING STREAK: Finished the 2012 season by going 4-0 with a 2.65 ERA (10 er in 34.0 ip) and .228 (28-for-123) opponents batting average over his final five regular season starts beginning Sept. 10...the four-game winning streak is the longest of his career.

PARKER vs. SEATTLE: Is 1-1 with a 5.40 ERA (11.2 ip, 9 h, 7 r, 6 er, 6 bb, 15 so, 2 hr) in two career starts, both last year...the win came in his first start, a 2-1 A's victory at Seattle June 27...struck out a career-high nine batters...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a solo home run to Jaso with one out in the bottom of the second inning...that was the only run he would allow in seven innings...then took the loss in a 7-1 decision in Oakland July 7...allowed a career-high tying six runs in 4.2 innings...allowed an unearned run in the first and the A's tied the game in the bottom of the first...then allowed a two-run double to Ryan in the second and a solo home run to Wells in the fourth...was also charged with two of the Mariners runs in a three-run fifth inning.

THIS SPRING: Was 0-2 with a 7.45 ERA (19.1 ip, 25 h, 18 r, 16 er, 5 bb, 13 so, 5 hr) in five games, all starts...also pitched in the A's minor league camp on the A's off day March 6...allowed a .309 (25 for 81) opponents batting average.

2012 RECAP: Was one of three players acquired from Arizona in the Trevor Cahill trade during the offseason and went 13-8 with a 3.47 ERA in 29 starts...tied with fellow rookie Tommy Milone for the team lead in wins as they both set an Oakland record for wins by a rookie...the previous mark of 12 was held by Chris Codiroli (1983) and Joe Blanton (2005)...had the most wins by an Athletics rookie since Harry Byrd won 15 games for the 1952 Philadelphia A's en route to Rookie of the Year honors...the A's became the first team since the 1952 Brooklyn Dodgers to have two rookies win 13 or more games (Joe Black 15, Billy Loes 13)...it was the second time in Oakland history the A's had two rookie 10-game winners...the other time was in 2009 (Anderson 11, Cahill 10)...with Milone making 31 starts, this was the third time in Oakland history the A's had two rookies with 20 or more starts (Keough and Johnson in 1978; Anderson and Cahill in 2009)...led the A's with 140 strikeouts, which was the third best mark by a rookie in Oakland history and the fourth best in Athletics history...his 29 starts were 10th most by an Oakland rookie.

ROOKIE LEADERS: Tied for second among American League rookies in wins, ranked fourth in strikeouts and innings pitched (181.1) and tied for fourth in starts...his ERA was the lowest among AL rookies with 130 or more innings, his .619 winning percentage was second best and his .248 opponents batting average was third best...received one third place vote in the BBWAA AL Rookie of the Year balloting and finished fifth

AMONG THE LEADERS: His winning percentage was 10th best among all AL pitchers...allowed just 11 home runs in 181.1 innings, an average of 0.55 per nine innings...that was the second lowest mark in the AL and third lowest in the majors...had a .358 opponents slugging percentage, which was sixth lowest in the AL...tied for first in the AL in sacrifice hits allowed (7), tied for third in sacrifice flies (8), ranked fifth in stolen bases against (21) and tied for sixth in wild pitches (10).

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .248 opponents batting average, including .247 (86-for-348) against left-handed hitters and .248 (80-for-322) against right-handers...opponents hit .215 with runners in scoring position, which ranked fourth lowest in the AL...yielded a .173 batting average to the number three hitter in the order, which was fourth lowest in the AL...eight of the 11 home runs he allowed were solo shots

THIS AND THAT: Went 5-3 with a 2.46 ERA and .209 opponents batting average over his first 13 starts, 2-4 with a 6.15 ERA and .309 opponents average over a seven-start stretch from July 7 to Aug. 14 and 6-1 with a 3.00 ERA and .252 opponents average over his final nine starts...had eight wins after the All-Star Break, which tied for third in the AL.

SPLITS: Was 6-5 at home compared to 7-3 on the road...however, had a 2.61 ERA at home compared to 4.54 on the road...had the fifth lowest home ERA in the AL...compiled a 5-2 record and 2.64 ERA in nine starts during the day compared to 8-6 with a 3.87 ERA in 20 starts at night...had the fourth lowest day ERA in the AL...posted a mark of 6-1 with a 3.03 ERA in 12 starts on five days rest or more...was 7-7 with a 3.81 ERA in 17 starts on four days rest or fewer...received one run of support or fewer in 11 of his 29 starts and was 0-8 with a 5.03 ERA in those starts...went 13-0 with a 2.65 ERA in 18 starts with support of two runs or more...allowed 20 of his 71 runs in the fifth inning for a 6.26 ERA...had a 2.98 ERA in all other innings.

MORE 2012: Was recalled from Sacramento April 25 and had a no decision in his A's debut that day, a 5-4, 14-inning win over Chicago in Oakland...shut out the White Sox over the first six innings to extend his career-opening scoreless streak to 11.2 innings...earned his first Major League win in his next start at Boston May 1, allowing one run in 6.2 innings...had a career-high 18.0 inning scoreless streak from May 23 to June 4...tossed 7.0 shutout innings for the win at Colorado June 14 to start a three-game winning streak that spanned four starts through July 2...allowed just three runs during the streak for a 1.01 ERA...struck out a career-high nine batters June 27 at Seattle...was 3-1 with a 2.18 ERA and .174 opponents batting average in five starts in June...allowed one run July 2 at Boston, the 10th time in his first 14 career starts he allowed one run or fewer...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is just the second pitcher since 1900 to allow one run or fewer in 10 of his first 14 starts...the other is Ferdie Schupp, who did it for the New York Giants from 1913-17 (Schupp had relief appearances over that span)...went 3-1 despite a 5.34 ERA and .286 opponents batting average in five starts in July...tied the Oakland rookie record for wins by winning his final start, the A's playoff-clinching 4-3 win over Texas Oct. 1...went 0-2 with a 4.26 ERA in two ALDS starts against the Tigers, both against Justin Verlander...started Game 1 in Detroit, a 3-1 loss...at the age of 23 years, 317 days, he became the fifth youngest pitcher in Oakland history to start a postseason game...also started Game 5, a 6-0 loss.

SACRAMENTO: Went 1-0 with a 2.18 ERA in four starts with Sacramento...struck out 21 batters in 20.2 innings...allowed a .275 opponents batting average, including .271 (13-for-48) against right-handed hitters compared to .281 (9-for-32) against left-handers...surrendered both of his home runs to lefties...opponents were 4-for-29 (.138) with runners in scoring position.

2012 RECAP: Was one of four players acquired from Washington in the Gio Gonzalez trade during the offseason and went 13-10 with a 3.74 ERA in a team-leading 31 starts...also led the A's in innings pitched (190.0), had the only complete game and tied for the team-lead in wins...fellow rookie Jarrod Parker also won 13 games, both setting an Oakland record for wins by a rookie...the previous mark of 12 was held by Chris Codiroli (1983) and Joe Blanton (2005)...had the most wins by an Athletics rookie since Harry Byrd won 15 games for the 1952 Philadelphia A's en route to Rookie of the Year honors...the A's became the first team since the 1952 Brooklyn Dodgers to have two rookies win 13 or more games (Joe Black 15, Billy Loes 13)...it was the second time in Oakland history the A's had two rookie 10-game winners...the other time was in 2009 (Anderson 11, Cahill 10)...with Parker making 29 starts, this was the third time in Oakland history the A's had two rookies with 20 or more starts (Keough and Johnson in 1978; Anderson and Cahill in 2009)...struck out 137, which was the fourth best rookie total in Oakland history and the sixth best in Athletics history...also tied for the fifth most games started by an Oakland rookie (31) and was sixth in innings pitched (190.0)...surrendered 24 home runs, which tied for second most.

ROOKIE LEADERS: Tied for the lead among Major League rookies in complete games...tied for second among American League rookies in wins and games started, ranked third in innings pitched and was fifth in strikeouts...his ERA ranked third among AL rookies with 130 or more innings.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Walked just 36 batters in 190.0 innings, an average of 1.71 per nine innings...that was the second lowest mark in the AL and sixth lowest in the majors...it was the fifth lowest mark in Oakland history...had a strikeout to walk ratio of 3.81, which ranked seventh in the AL...it was the fourth best mark in Athletics history...tied for third in the AL with six pickoffs...opponents were 8-for-18 (44.4%) in stolen base attempts, which was the second lowest mark in the AL...allowed a team-leading 207 hits, which were ninth most in the AL...his 31 games started were the fewest by an A's team leader since Steve Karsay led Oakland with 24 starts in 1997.

HOME AND AWAY: Went 7-4 with a 2.74 ERA and .240 opponents batting average in 15 starts at home compared to 6-6 with a 4.83 ERA and .316 opponents batting average in 16 starts on the road...had the eighth lowest home ERA in the AL and the ninth highest road ERA...allowed 18 of his 24 home runs on the road, which was fourth most in the AL.

RUN SUPPORT: Received just 12 runs of support in his 10 losses (58.1 ip, 1.85 RSA)...received no run support six times and one run four times...had two wins where he received just one run of support.

OPPONENTS BATTING: His opponents batting average included a .263 (51-for-194) mark against left-handed hitters compared to .283 (156-for-551) against right-handers...walked 15 of the 214 lefties he faced (one per 14.2 plate appearances) compared to 21 of the 577 right-handers (one per 27.5 plate appearances)...allowed a .319 batting average to hitters leading off an inning...yielded 10 of his 24 home run in that situation...opponents are batting .327 (68-for-208) against him to lead off an inning in his career...yielded a .462 (6-for-13) batting average and two home runs with the bases loaded...the two grand slams tied for second most in the AL and the batting average was fourth highest.

MORE SPLITS: His lowest ERA in a month was 3.55 in July, his highest was 3.96 in August...was 6-1 with a 1.96 ERA in nine starts against AL Central teams, 7-9 with a 4.56 ERA in 22 starts against everyone else...was 10-5 with a 3.14 ERA and .257 opponents batting average in 21 starts at night, 3-5 with a 5.12 ERA and .322 opponents batting average in 10 starts during the day...ranked eighth in the AL in night ERA and tied for 10th in wins...issued 12 of his 36 walks in the first inning of a game

MORE 2012: Was one of three inactive players for the season opener in Japan...made his Oakland debut in the fifth game of the season, combining with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout against Kansas City (8.0 ip, 3 h, 3 bb)...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut...combined with Balfour on a four-hit, 2-0 shutout against Chicago April 24 (8.0 ip, 3 h, 5 so)...that improved his record to 3-1 with a 2.00 ERA over his first four starts...then went 3-4 with a 5.74 ERA over his next nine starts from April 30 to June 13...walked one batter or fewer in 14 consecutive starts from June 20 through Sept. 9...walked just eight batters in 88.0 innings (0.82 per nine innings) during the streak, which tied for the longest such streak in Oakland history...went 3-1 with a 1.10 ERA over a six-start stretch from June 20 to July 20...began that streak by tossing a complete game three-hitter in a 4-1 win over Los Angeles (NL) June 20 (1 bb, 2 so)...had a career-high 15.0-inning scoreless streak from June 20 to 30...struck out a career-high 10 batters July 20 against New York (AL) and Sept. 9 at Seattle...finished the season by going 2-0 with a 2.60 ERA, despite a .339 opponents batting average, over his final five starts...won his 13th game of the season Sept. 14 against Baltimore to set an Oakland rookie record for wins...that was matched by Parker Oct. 1...made one start against the Tigers in the ALDS...had a no decision in the A's 5-4 loss in Game 2 at Detroit...allowed just one run on five hits in 6.0 innings.

2012 RECAP: Began the year at Double-A Midland but finished the season in the starting rotation for Oakland...went 7-1 with a 3.06 ERA in 15 starts in his Major League debut with the A's...his .875 winning percentage was the best in Oakland history and third best in Athletics history among pitchers with 15 or more starts...it topped the previous Oakland high by Tim Hudson, who went 11-2 (.846) in 1999...it was the best by an Athletic since Jim Nash went 12-1 (.923) in 1966...it was the second best mark by any ML pitcher over the last 17 years to Cliff Lee, who went 22-3 (.880) for Cleveland in 2008...it was second best by a rookie in ML history (since 1900) among pitchers with 15 or more starts to Nash in 1966...had the eighth lowest ERA in the American League among pitchers with 81 or more innings pitched...using the same minimum, it was the sixth best mark by a rookie in Oakland history...ranked 10th among AL rookies in wins...walked just 19 batters in 82.1 innings, an average of 2.08 per nine innings...struck out 64 for a strikeout to walk ratio of 3.37.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .236 opponents batting average, which included a .225 (34-for-151) mark against right-handed hitters compared to .245 (40-for-163) against left-handers...opponents were 16-for-83 (.193) with three walks (.221 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...yielded a .218 average with the bases empty but that rose to .341 with runners in scoring position...allowed a .359 batting average to the number three hitter, .218 against everyone else.

MORE WITH THE A's: Was selected from Sacramento June 24, making his Major League debut that day against San Francisco...became the 43rd pitcher in Oakland history to start in his debut and had a no decision in the A's 4-2 win...allowed a two-run home run to Posey in the first inning but those were the only runs he would yield in six innings...left trailing 2-1 but Norris hit a three-run "walk-off" home run for the win...tossed 6.0 shutout innings in his second start at Texas June 29 as part of a career-high 14.0 inning scoreless streak from June 24 to July 4...the streak ended on the 4th when he surrendered David Ortiz' 400th career home run...earned his first Major League win in his fourth start, a 6-3 win at Minnesota July 13...allowed three runs in six innings but a Gomes grand slam in the fourth gave him a 4-3 lead...struck out a career-high nine batters July 25 at Toronto...tossed six or more innings and allowed three runs or fewer in each of his first seven starts, which was the longest such streak to start a career in Athletics history...left after 1.2 innings in his eighth start Aug. 4 against Toronto...was placed on the 15-day disabled list the next day with right shoulder tightness...was 3-0 with a 2.42 ERA at the time...went 1-0 with a 4.91 ERA (7.1 ip, 7 h, 4 r, 4 er, 4 bb, 7 so) in two rehab starts with Sacramento before he was reinstated from the DL Sept. 1...won each of his first three starts following his return, allowing just two runs in 20.1 innings (0.89 ERA), including Sept. 12 at Los Angeles (AL) when he tossed a career-high 8.0 shutout innings...that improved his career record to 6-0 with a 1.94 ERA over his first 11 starts...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, since earned runs became an official stat (1912 in NL, 1913 in AL), he is just the second pitcher to go undefeated in at least his first 11 Major League appearances, all starts, while maintaining an ERA under 2.00...the other is Jered Weaver, who went 9-0 with a 1.95 ERA over his first 12 starts with the Angels in 2006...is the first pitcher in Oakland history to start his career 6-0 and just the second Athletic since 1927 (Jim Nash, 7-0 in 1966)...allowed three runs or fewer and walked two batters or fewer in each of his first 11 starts, which is the longest such career-opening streak by a ML pitcher since at least 1916...was charged with his first loss Sept. 18 at Detroit when he allowed a career-high five runs on a career-high tying eight hits in 4.2 innings...the six-game winning streak matched the longest by an Athletic in 2012 (McCarthy)...walked a career-high three batters Sept. 23 at New York, snapping a career-opening streak of 12 consecutive starts with two walks or fewer...that is the longest streak to start a career by an Athletics starting pitcher since at least 1916...finished September with a 4-1 record and a 3.09 ERA in six starts...tied for second in the AL in wins in September...was the only A's pitcher to win four games in a month in 2012...started Game 4 of the ALDS against Detroit and had a no decision in the A's 4-3 win...allowed two runs on seven hits in 5.0 innings.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

The switch-hitting infielder owns a .250 career Major League average with 35 home runs and 159 RBI...his career splits are .292 (107-for-366) with 14 home runs against left-handed pitching, compared to his .230 (180-for-782) average with 21 homers against righties...made eight starts at shortstop for Boston in the 2008 postseason...hit safely in each of his three ALDS games, including a walk-off RBI single in the ninth inning of Game 4 to give the Sox a 3-2 win and clinch the series, 3-1...became just the fourth rookie ever to end a postseason series with a walk-off hit...had three RBI in his Major League debut April 15, 2008 at Cleveland, which was the most by a Boston player in his first big league game since Merrill Combs also had three on Sept. 12, 1947...named the 2007 Red Sox Minor League Offensive Player of the Year, hitting a combined .298 with 47 doubles, 13 homers and 70 RBI in 133 games between Double-A Portland and Triple-A Pawtucket...named both a Minor League All-Star and Double A All-Star by *Baseball America*...entered that season rated the No. 5 prospect in the Red Sox organization according to *Baseball America*...was number 2009 in 2006...was a New York-Penn League All-Star in his first season in 2005 and led the league with a .429 on-base percentage.

2012 HIGHLIGHTS

Set career highs in games (97), at-bats (340), runs (43), hits (83), home runs (16) and walks (43) in his first season with the Astros...led the club in walks...posted 16 home runs as the Astros shortstop, which ranked second on the club and third among all National League shortstops...also ranked second among NL shortstops with his .436 slugging percentage...his 16 home runs rank second in franchise history among shortstops in a single season, trailing only Dickie Thon's 20 homers in 1983...traditionally a stronger performer while batting right-handed, reversed that trend in 2012, posting a .265 (67-for-253) average while batting left-handed and a .184 (16-for-84) mark against lefties...played 93 games, including 90 starts at shortstop, posting a .980 fielding percentage at the position...had the best fielding percentage among NL shortstops with 90 or more games and ranked seventh in the Majors...finished his season by not committing an error in his final 31 games (116 total chances)...also began his season with a 23-game errorless streak before committing his first error May 9 against Miami...began the season on the disabled list and missed the first six games of the season with a sprained right thumb...

activated April 13...sustained a sprained right ankle, which placed him on the DL for a second time from July 15 to Aug. 11...missed 52 team games in that stretch...tied his career high with a nine-game hitting streak from April 27 to May 6, during which he hit .469 with three home runs and nine RBI...hit home runs in three consecutive games from June 7-9, becoming the first Astros shortstop to do so since Andujar Cedenro from April 9-12, 1994...prior to Lowrie, the last Astro at any position to homer in three straight games was Lance Berkman (four games) from July 4-8, 2010...combined to play in six minor league games while on injury rehab assignments, including four playoff games...appeared in games for Double-A Corpus Christi and Single-A Lancaster during their playoff runs in September.

2011—Had a career-high four triples in 88 games in a season that included a trip to the disabled list...saw action at all four infield positions with 49 games at shortstop, 33 at third base, four at first base and one at second base...hit .330 against left-handed pitching, the seventh-best mark in the American League among players with at least 115 plate appearances against lefties...hit an AL-best (min. 50 PA) .368 in April and led the Sox with a .574 slugging percentage, which was 10th-best in the AL during the month...placed on the 15-day DL with a left shoulder strain June 17...played in five rehab games with Triple-A Pawtucket, hitting .412 with four doubles and five RBI...activated from DL Aug. 8...hit .270 in 55 games before the trip to the DL and .221 after...began a 5-4-3 triple play in game two of a double-header Aug. 16 against Tampa Bay...it was just the second triple play turned by Boston since 1980 and the club's first since shortstop John Valentin's unassisted triple play July 8, 1994 against Seattle.

2009—Limited to 32 games with the Big League club due to two trips to the disabled list...made an Opening Day roster for the first time in his career...appeared at second base (2 games), third base (4 games) and shortstop (26 games) for the second straight season...made his first career Opening Day start April 7 against Tampa Bay, going 1-for-4...was placed on the 15-day DL April 12 with a left wrist sprain...underwent an ulnar styloid excision and arthroscopic ligament repair on that wrist April 21...reinstated from the DL July 8 and optioned to Short-Season Single-A Lowell...recalled by the Sox from Triple-A Pawtucket July 18 but appeared in only 14 games before returning to the DL Aug. 7 with ulnar neuritis in his left wrist...reinstated Sept. 8...belted his first career grand slam off Chris Perez on the final day of the regular season, Oct. 4 against Cleveland...combined to hit .202 with three homers and 11 RBI in 26 minor league games between Pawtucket, Portland and Lowell, including 18 rehab outings...played in all three of Boston's ALDS games against Los Angeles but made no starts.

2008—Saw his first Major League action, playing most of the year with the Red Sox...finished among American League rookie leaders in sacrifice flies (t-1st in Majors, 8), doubles (5th, 25), triples (t-6th, 3), walks (8th, 35) and extra-base hits (10th, 30)...collected 46 RBI, second most ever for a Red Sox rookie switch-hitter behind Reggie Smith's 61 in 1967...hit .338 right-handed...played with a non-displaced fracture in his left wrist for much of the season...appeared in 49 games at shortstop, 45 at third base and three at second base...became just the second switch-hitter ever to play at least 30 games at both shortstop and third base in his first Major League season, joining Carlos Baerga (1990)...set a ML record for rookie shortstops by handling 155 chances without an error...tallied 154 errorless chances to start his

career before a miscue at third base in the second game of a doubleheader Aug. 26 at New York (AL)...was a non-roster invitee to Spring Training and accompanied the team to Japan before opening the year at Triple-A Pawtucket...selected to the ML roster when Mike Lowell went on the DL April 10...started at third base in his Big League debut April 15 at Cleveland...knocked a two-run single off Rafael Perez in the seventh inning for first hit...finished the game with three RBI, which was the most by a Red Sox in his first ML game since Merrill Combs also had three Sept. 12, 1947...hit safely in his first eight tilts with an at-bat, tallying a .357 clip through April 26...that matched the third longest by a Sox player to begin his Major League career since at least 1920 behind only nine-game runs by Ted Williams (April 20-May 4, 1939) and Shea Hillenbrand (April 2-12, 2001)...connected for his first Major League homer off Glen Perkins May 10 at Minnesota...optioned to Pawtucket May 11 and rejoined Boston July 12 after an injury to Julio Lugo...started 57 of the club's final 64 games...led all rookies with 21 doubles after All-Star break...knocked a game-winning solo homer in the 11th inning Aug. 24 at Toronto to give Boston a 6-5 victory...made eight starts at shortstop in the postseason and played in nine of Boston's 11 games overall...hit .207 with two RBI...was second on the club with a .364 average in the ALDS against Los Angeles...hit safely in each of his three ALDS games, including a walk-off RBI single in the ninth inning of Game 4 to give the Sox a 3-2 win and clinch the series, 3-1...lined a two-out pitch from Scot Shields into right field to score Jason Bay from second base...became just the fourth rookie ever to end a postseason series with a walk-off hit...was 2-for-18 (.111) with a RBI in six ALCS games against the Rays.
