A's vs. ANGELS

The A's won the season series last year, 10-9...it was their second consecutive season series victory...went 3-6 in Oakland but were 7-3 in Anaheim...the seven wins equal the A's most ever in Anaheim (1971, 1973, 2001)...the A's were shutout in five of the nine losses last year...since 2011, the A's are 17-0 against the Angels when scoring four or more runs...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 386-313 against the Angels...that includes 199-149 in Oakland and 187-164 in Anaheim...all-time, the A's are 435-390 against the Angels.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour has converted each of his last 19 save opportunities.

Coco Crisp is the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997)...leads the majors in doubles (5) and is tied for the lead in extra base hits (8)...ranks eighth in Oakland history with 120 career steals, one behind Mike Davis.

Jed Lowrie has back-to-back three-hit games for the first time in his career...has three for the season, which is tied for the Major League lead...is also tied for the ML lead in batting (.500)...now has a .329 (68 for 207) career average in April, his best for any month of the season...has reached base safely via hit or walk in all seven games.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In 1974 Joe Rudi ties an Oakland record with three doubles as the A's defeat Kansas City 6-4...in 2004 the A's tie an Oakland record with eight doubles in an 8-6 win over Seattle...in 2008 Fernando Hernandez becomes the first reliever in Oakland history to record a win in his Major League debut when he pitches a scoreless eighth inning in the A's 6-3 win at Toronto.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have won five straight after losing the first two games of the season...the A's 5-2 start matches their best start over the last 10 years (2004, 2006, 2010)...started the year 6-2 in 2004 and 2010...are tied for first in the American League West and have spent each of the last three days with at least a share of first place...spent just one day in first last year and that was the final day of the season...this is the A's 46th season in Oakland where they have won 15 American League West titles, one AL Wild Card, six AL pennants and four World Championships in Oakland...only the New York Yankees (18) and Atlanta Braves (16) have more division titles than the A's...since the A's moved to Oakland in 1968, only the Yankees (11) and Cardinals (7) have more league championships and only the Yankees have more world championships (7)...have a 3723-3436 (.520) record over the previous 45 seasons in Oakland...only five teams have won more games over that span (New York Yankees, Boston, Los Angeles Dodgers, St. Louis, Cincinnati)...this is the Athletics franchise 113th season in the American League...since 1901, the A's have 15 AL West titles plus 15 AL pennants and nine World Championships...only the Yankees (27) and Cardinals (11) have won more World Championships...the A's are 8438-8908 (.486) in their previous 112 seasons...that includes a 3886-4248 record from 1901-54 in Philadelphia and 829-1224 from 1955-67 in Kansas City.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 3-0 on this six-game, seven-day road trip to Houston (3-0) and Los Angeles (three games)...this marks just the second time in the last 22 years the A's have won their first three road games of the season...won each of their first five road games in 2008...went 2-2 on the first homestand against Seattle...return home following the game Thursday for a six-game homestand against Detroit (three games) and Houston (three games).

EXTRA BASES: The A's collected five extra base hits Sunday and 28 of their 59 hits (47.5%) are for extra bases...are tied for the Major League lead in extra base hits...lead the American League in home runs (12) and are tied for third in doubles (16)...the 28 extra base hits are second most in Oakland history over the first seven games of the season (29 in 1994)...the 12 home runs are tied with the 1996 club for second most (15 in 1994).

STARTING PITCHERS: A's starting pitchers have recorded the decision in each of the first seven games of the season...that is the longest season-opening streak by an A's team since the 1989 club had a decision in each of the first 12 games...starters lead the American League in wins (5), rank second in innings (43.2) and are third in ERA (3.09)...the A's Opening Day starting rotation of Brett Anderson, Jarrod Parker, Tommy Milone, A.J. Griffin and Dan Straily had an average age of 25.03 years...according to Stats, Inc., that was the youngest in the majors by over a year and a half (Miami, 26.62)...however, Bartolo Colón replaced Dan Straily in the rotation Saturday, increasing the average age of the rotation to over 28...the A's used six different starting pitchers over the first six games of the season for the third time in Oakland history (1977, 1983).

THIS AND THAT: The A's have collected 10 or more hits in each of the last five games (53 for 170, .312) after going 6 for 60 (.100) over the first two games...the streak of five consecutive games with 10 or more hits matches the longest such streak from last year (August 28-September 1)...have allowed three runs or fewer in six of the seven games and have a 2.86 ERA, which ranks second in the American League...have allowed nine hits or fewer in all seven games and also have the second lowest opponents batting average in the AL (.215).

DURING THE SPRING: The A's went 8-1-1 over their final 10 games to finish the spring with a record of 17-13-3 (.561)...that was the third best record in the Cactus League behind Kansas City (25-7-2) and Seattle (22-11) and sixth best in the majors...went 15-7-2 last spring and posted a winning record in consecutive springs for the first time since 2007 (17-12-2) and 2008 (18-8)...A's pitchers walked just 84 batters, which was the fewest in the majors...however, yielded 355 hits, which was sixth most...had the third highest ERA (5.45)...the offense ranked second in the majors in on-base percentage (.367) and walks (134), fourth in runs (203) and seventh in batting (.287) and hit by pitches (15)...had three ties, which matched the most by an A's team since moving to Arizona in 1969 (also 2010)...all three ties lasted nine innings...went 10-4-2 at Phoenix Muni, 6-9-1 on the road and 1-0 in Oakland.

ROSTER NOTES: The A's opened the season with 12 pitchers and 13 position players for the sixth time in the last eight years...the exceptions were in 2008 and 2012 when they opened in Japan and carried just 10 pitchers...nine players returned from last year's Opening Day roster, 10 played for the A's at some point last year and one spent the entire season on the disabled list...four were acquired in a trade and one was claimed off waivers...the A's had two rookies on the Opening Day Roster (Freiman, Straily) after having seven last year...now have just one after Straily was optioned Saturday...three players had six or more years of service: Coco Crisp (9 years, 158 days), Grant Balfour (8 years, 99 days) and Chris Young (6 years, 45 days)...that matched the A's fewest players with six or years more service since 1997 (1997, 2001, 2008)...now have four with the addition of Colón (14 years, 61 days)...of the 25 players on the A's Opening Day roster, only seven played for the A's prior to last season...only Jerry Blevins played for the A's prior to 2009 (2007)...Sean Doolittle has been in the A's organization the longest...he was drafted as a compensation pick following the first round of the 2007 draft, a little over a month before the A's traded for Blevins...the average age on the A's Opening Day roster was 28.03 years...according to Stats, Inc., that was the youngest roster in the American League and second youngest in the majors (Atlanta, 27.79).

LOCKED UP: The A's have two players under contract beyond the 2013 season...Hiroyuki Nakajima is signed through 2014 with a club option for 2015 and Yoenis Céspedes is signed through 2015...Brett Anderson has club options for 2014 and 2015 and Coco Crisp and Chris Young have club options for 2014.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's began the season with three players on the disabled list (Nakajima, Rodriguez, Rosales)...Rodriguez was placed on the 60-day DL March 23 (sprained right elbow), Rosales was added to the 15-day DL March 26 (strained left intercostal) and Nakajima was added March 30 retroactive to March 27 (strained left hamstring)...the A's used the DL 21 times last year, the fourth time in the last six years they used it at least 20 times...have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one.

6.0 innings in 22 of his 29 starts in 2012, allowed two runs or fewer 17 times and walked two batters or fewer 18 times.

LAST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 7-1 loss to Seattle a week ago today in Oakland...Céspedes homered in the first inning to give the A's a 1-0 lead but he allowed a three-run home run to Morse in the third inning...also allowed a RBI single to Morales in the fifth.

PARKER vs. LOS ANGELES: Is 1-2 with a 2.60 ERA (27.2 ip, 26 h, 8 r, 8 er, 4 bb, 21 so, 0 hr) in four career starts, all last year...went 0-2 with a 3.05 ERA (7 er in 20.2 ip) in three starts in Oakland and 1-0 with a 1.29 ERA (1 er in 7.0 ip) in one start in Anaheim...the no decision came in a 3-1 A's loss in 11-innings in Oakland May 23...struck out eight batters in 7.0 innings...allowed a RBI single to Izturis in the third then blanked the Angels on three hits over his final four innings...his first loss came in a 4-0 decision in Oakland August 6...allowed a career-high tying nine hits...allowed two runs in the second inning on RBI singles by Aybar and Trout and two more in the seventh on a two-run single by Hunter...Weaver shutout the A's on four hits and no walks...also took the loss in a 6-1 decision in Oakland Sept. 4...yielded a RBI single to Trout in the fifth and a sacrifice fly to Callaspo in the sixth but those were the only runs he allowed in seven innings...Greinke limited the A's two a run on four hits in seven innings...the win came in a 3-1 decision at Los Angeles Sept. 10...allowed his only run in the third inning when Trout walked with two outs, stole second, went to third on a Kottaras throwing error and scored on a Hunter double...allowed two more hits in the fourth inning but did not allow a hit over his final three innings.

THIS SPRING: Was 0-2 with a 7.45 ERA (19.1 ip, 25 h, 18 r, 16 er, 5 bb, 13 so, 5 hr) in five games, all starts...also pitched in the A's minor league camp on the A's off day March 6...allowed a .309 (25 for 81) opponents batting average.

trade during the offseason and went 13-8 with a 3.47 ERA in 29 starts...tied with fellow rookie Tommy Milone for the team lead in wins as they both set an Oakland record for wins by a rookie...the previous mark of 12 was held by Chris Codiroli (1983) and Joe Blanton (2005)...had the most wins by an Athletics rookie since Harry Byrd won 15 games for the 1952 Philadelphia A's en route to Rookie of the Year honors...the A's became the first team since the 1952 Brooklyn Dodgers to have two rookies win 13 or more games (Joe Black 15, Billy Loes 13)...it was the second time in Oakland history the A's had two rookie 10-game winners...the other time was in 2009 (Anderson 11, Cahill 10)...with Milone making 31 starts, this was the third time in Oakland history the A's had two rookies with 20 or more starts (Keough and Johnson in 1978; Anderson and Cahill in 2009)...led the A's with 140 strikeouts, which was the third best mark by a rookie in Oakland history and the fourth best in Athletics history...his 29 starts were 10th most by an Oakland rookie.

ROOKIE LEADERS: Tied for second among American League rookies in wins, ranked fourth in strikeouts and innings pitched (181.1) and tied for fourth in starts...his ERA was the lowest among AL rookies with 130 or more innings, his .619 winning percentage was second best and his .248 opponents batting average was third best...received one third place vote in the BBWAA AL Rookie of the Year balloting and finished fifth

AMONG THE LEADERS: His winning percentage was 10th best among all AL pitchers...allowed just 11 home runs in 181.1 innings, an average of 0.55 per nine innings...that was the second lowest mark in the AL and third lowest in the majors...had a .358 opponents slugging percentage, which was sixth lowest in the AL...tied for first in the AL in sacrifice hits allowed (7), tied for third in sacrifice flies (8), ranked fifth in stolen bases against (21) and tied for sixth in wild pitches (10).

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .248 opponents batting average, including .247 (86-for-348) against left-handed hitters and .248 (80-for-322) against right-handers...opponents hit .215 with runners in scoring position, which ranked fourth lowest in the AL...yielded a .173 batting average to the number three hitter in the order, which was fourth lowest in the AL...eight of the 11 home runs he allowed were solo shots

BASES ON BALLS: Issued a team-leading 63 walks, which were the fewest by a team-leader in a non-strike season in Oakland history...the previous low was 69 by Doug Johns in 1996...walked four batters or more in six of his first 12 starts (36 bb in 73.2 ip, 4.40 per nine innings)...then walked three batters or fewer in each of his final 17 starts (27 bb in 107.2 ip, 2.26 per nine innings).

THIS AND THAT: Went 5-3 with a 2.46 ERA and .209 opponents batting average over his first 13 starts, 2-4 with a 6.15 ERA and .309 opponents average over a seven-start stretch from July 7 to Aug. 14 and 6-1 with a 3.00 ERA and .252 opponents average over his final nine starts...had eight wins after the All-Star Break, which tied for third in the AL.

SPLITS: Was 6-5 at home compared to 7-3 on the road...however, had a 2.61 ERA at home compared to 4.54 on the road...had the fifth lowest home ERA in the AL...compiled a 5-2 record and 2.64 ERA in nine starts during the day compared to 8-6 with a 3.87 ERA in 20 starts at night...had the fourth lowest day ERA in the AL...posted a mark of 6-1 with a 3.03 ERA in 12 starts on five days rest or more...was 7-7 with a 3.81 ERA in 17 starts on four days rest or fewer...received one run of support or fewer in 11 of his 29 starts and was 0-8 with a 5.03 ERA in those starts...went 13-0 with a 2.65 ERA in 18 starts with support of two runs or more...allowed 20 of his 71 runs in the fifth inning for a 6.26 ERA...had a 2.98 ERA in all other innings.

SACRAMENTO: Went 1-0 with a 2.18 ERA in four starts with Sacramento...struck out 21 batters in 20.2 innings...allowed a .275 opponents batting average, including .271 (13-for-48) against right-handed hitters compared to .281 (9-for-32) against left-handers...surrendered both of his home runs to lefties...opponents were 4-for-29 (.138) with runners in scoring position.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

LHP Tommy Milone (1-0, 2.57 ERA): Is scheduled to make his second start of the season...was the winning pitcher in his first start, a 6-2 A's win over Seattle last Wednesday in Oakland (7.0 ip, 4 h, 2 r, 2 er, 1 bb, 4 so)...the win gives him a three-game winning streak dating back to last year, which is a new career-high...is 2-1 with a 4.80 ERA (15.0 ip, 22 h, 8 r, 8 er, 2 bb, 7 so, 2 hr) in three career starts against Los Angeles, all last year...was 3-0 with a 4.63 ERA (23.1 ip, 28 h, 12 r, 12 er, 5 bb, 17 so, 3 hr) in six games, all starts, this spring...the three wins tied for third in the Cactus League...was 13-10 with a 3.74 ERA in a team-leading 31 starts last year...also led the A's in innings pitched (190.0), had the only complete game and tied for the team-lead in wins...fellow rookie Jarrod Parker also won 13 games, both setting an Oakland record for wins by a rookie...the previous mark of 12 was held by Chris Codiroli (1983) and Joe Blanton (2005)...tied for the lead among Major League rookies in complete games...tied for second among AL rookies in wins and games started, ranked third in innings pitched and was fifth in strikeouts (137)...his ERA ranked third among AL rookies with 130 or more innings

The A's bullpen has a 2.33 ERA (5 er in 19.1 ip), which is the second lowest in the American League...ranks third with a .171 (12 for 70) opponents batting average and has allowed just one home run, which is tied for second fewest...compiled a 2.90 ERA last year, which was second lowest in the American League and ninth lowest in Oakland history...it was the lowest since the 1990 club had an Oakland record 2.35 ERA...also had the second lowest opponents batting average (.209), on-base percentage (.293) and slugging percentage (.334) in the AL...the opponents batting average was second lowest in Oakland history (.203 in 1989), the on-base percentage was fifth best and the slugging percentage ranked ranked fourth in the AL in saves (47)...had 17 blown saves for a save percentage of 73.4,which ranked sixth

Made the 400th appearance of his career Saturday night.

- Recorded his first save of the season Saturday night...has converted each of his last 19 save opportunities dating back to last season, which is tied for the sixth longest streak in Oakland history...his last blown save came on April 29, 2012 at Baltimore.
- Is in his 10th season in the majors...is on his fifth consecutive Opening Day roster (2011-13 with Oakland, 2009-10 with Tampa Bay).
- Posted a 2.25 ERA in four spring training appearances...opponents were 2 for 14 (.143) with no walks in 4.0 innings...had arthroscopic surgery February 14 to perform a lateral meniscectomy of his right knee and did not pitch in a Cactus League game until March 21.
- Was 3 for 3 in save opportunities against Los Angeles last season but had a 7.11 ERA in eight games (5 er in 6.1 ip)...has a 6.35 ERA in 30 appearances in his career (28.1 ip, 24 h, 20 r, 20 er, 16 bb, 34 so, 6 hr), his highest ERA against any AL team.
- Had two stints as the A's closer in 2012 and saved a team-leading 24 games in a team-high 75 appearances while posting a 2.53 ERA...was charged with just two blown saves and his save percentage of 92.3 ranked fourth in the American League...was 10th in saves.

- Has appeared in four of the A's seven games and has not allowed a run or hit (3.1 ip, 1 bb, 5 so)...is tied for fourth among American League relievers in appearances and tied for eighth in strikeouts
- Is in his seventh Major League season, all with Oakland, and is on his fifth consecutive Opening Day roster.
- Compiled a 2.45 ERA and .250 opponents batting average in seven spring games...did not allow an earned run over his final six outings (6.2 ip).
- Had a save in four appearances against the Angels last year (2.2 ip, 1 h, 2 so)...has a 3.20 ERA in 22 career outings (19.2 ip, 17 h, 8 r, 7 er, 6

2012 RECAP: Was one of four players acquired from Washington in the Gio Gonzalez trade during the offseason and went 13-10 with a 3.74 ERA in a team-leading 31 starts...also led the A's in innings pitched (190.0), had the only complete game and tied for the team-lead in wins...fellow rookie Jarrod Parker also won 13 games, both setting an Oakland record for wins by a rookie...the previous mark of 12 was held by Chris Codiroli (1983) and Joe Blanton (2005)...had the most wins by an Athletics rookie since Harry Byrd won 15 games for the 1952 Philadelphia A's en route to Rookie of the Year honors...the A's became the first team since the 1952 Brooklyn Dodgers to have two rookies win 13 or more games (Joe Black 15, Billy Loes 13)...it was the second time in Oakland history the A's had two rookie 10-game winners...the other time was in 2009 (Anderson 11, Cahill 10)...with Parker making 29 starts, this was the third time in Oakland history the A's had two rookies with 20 or more starts (Keough and Johnson in 1978; Anderson and Cahill in 2009)...struck out 137, which was the fourth best rookie total in Oakland history and the sixth best in Athletics history...also tied for the fifth most games started by an Oakland rookie (31) and was sixth in innings pitched (190.0)...surrendered 24 home runs, which tied for second most.
