ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have won eight straight after losing the first two games of the season...the A's 8-2 record is the best in the American League, second best in the majors (Atlanta, 8-1) and tied for the second best mark in Oakland history after 10 games...the 1981 club was 10-0 and the 1990, 1991 and 1992 A's were all 8-2...the only times in Oakland history the A's started the year at least 9-2 were in 1981 (11-0) and 1990 (9-2)...are in sole possession of first place in the American League West for the second consecutive day and have held at least a share of first place in each of the last six days...spent just one day in first last year and that was the final day of the season...this is the A's 46th season in Oakland where they have won 15 American League West titles, one AL Wild Card, six AL pennants and four World Championships in Oakland...only the New York Yankees (18) and Atlanta Braves (16) have more division titles than the A's...since the A's moved to Oakland in 1968, only the Yankees (11) and Cardinals (7) have more league championships and only the Yankees have more world championships (7)...this is the Athletics franchise 113th season in the American League...since 1901, the A's have 15 AL West titles plus 15 AL pennants and nine World Championships...only the Yankees (27) and Cardinals (11) have won more World Championships.

EIGHT-GAME WINNING STREAK: The A's eight-game winning streak is the 24th of eight or more games in Oakland history (there have been 13 of nine or more)...it matches the second longest in Oakland history among streaks that took place entirely in the month of April (April 17-26, 1978)...the longest April winning streak in Oakland history is 11 in 1981 (April 9-19)...have outscored the opposition 65-24 during the current streak...have trailed at the end of an inning just five times...are batting .331 (97 for 293) with 24 doubles, one triple and 17 home runs (.594 slugging percentage)...the pitching staff has a 2.50 ERA (20 er in 72.0 ip).

A's OFFENSE: The A's lead the majors in runs (66), hits (103), doubles (26), home runs (18), walks (39), slugging (.524) and extra base hits (45), rank second in batting (.292) and on-base percentage (.368) and tied for second in stolen bases (8)...the 18 home runs **match the most over the first 10 games in Athletics history** (also 1957...most after 11 is 20 in 1994)...the A's 66 runs scored are two short of their total for the entire month of April last year...they are fifth most in Athletics history over the first 10 games of the season and the most since 1996 (67)...have collected 10 or more hits in each of the last eight games, which **matches the longest streak of consecutive games with at least 10 hits in Oakland history** (August 22-30, 2002)...have scored six or more runs in eight consecutive games, which is the fourth longest streak in Oakland history...it is the longest since the 2002 club did it in an Oakland record 12 straight games from August 17-28.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's went 6-0 on the last road trip to Houston (3-0) and Los Angeles (3-0)...it was the third undefeated road trip of six or more games in Oakland history...had a 10-0 trip August 19-28, 2002 (Cleveland 4, Detroit 3, Kansas City 3) and an 8-0 trip April 9-16, 1981 (Minnesota 4, California 4)...this marks the first time the A's have won their first six road games since 1990 when they won their first eight...scored 51 runs on the trip, which was second most in Oakland history for a six-game road trip...scored 52 runs against Minnesota and Kansas City, July 18-23, 2001...went 2-2 on the first homestand against Seattle...begin a six-game homestand tonight against Detroit (three games) and Houston (three games).

A's PITCHING: The A's lead the American League and rank third in the majors with a 2.90 ERA...have allowed just six home runs, which is tied for third fewest in the AL...A's starting pitchers lead the majors in wins (7)...rank third in the AL in ERA (3.30) and innings (60.0)...the A's Opening Day starting rotation of Brett Anderson, Jarrod Parker, Tommy Milone, A.J. Griffin and Dan Straily had an average age of 25.03 years...according to Stats, Inc., that was the youngest in the majors by over a year and a half (Miami, 26.62)...however, Bartolo Colón replaced Dan Straily in the rotation Saturday, increasing the average age of the rotation to over 28...Jarrod Parker had a no decision Tuesday night, ending the A's season-opening streak of seven consecutive games with a decision by the starting pitcher...that was the longest such streak by an A's team since the 1989 club had a decision in each of the first 12 games...the A's used six different starting pitchers over the first six games of the season for the third time in Oakland history (1977, 1983).

DURING THE SPRING: The A's went 8-1-1 over their final 10 games to finish the spring with a record of 17-13-3 (.561)...that was the third best record in the Cactus League behind Kansas City (25-7-2) and Seattle (22-11) and sixth best in the majors...went 15-7-2 last spring and posted a winning record in consecutive springs for the first time since 2007 (17-12-2) and 2008 (18-8)...A's pitchers walked just 84 batters, which was the fewest in the majors...the offense ranked second in the majors in on-base percentage (.367) and walks (134), fourth in runs (203) and seventh in batting (.287) and hit by pitches (15)...had three ties, which matched the most by an A's team since moving to Arizona in 1969 (also 2010).

ROSTER NOTES: The A's had two rookies on the Opening Day Roster (Freiman, Straily) after having seven last year...now have just one after Straily was optioned Saturday...three players had six or more years of service: Coco Crisp (9 years, 158 days), Grant Balfour (8 years, 99 days) and Chris Young (6 years, 45 days)...that matched the A's fewest players with six or years more service since 1997 (1997, 2001, 2008)...now have four with the addition of Colón (14 years, 61 days)...of the 25 players on the A's Opening Day roster, only seven played for the A's prior to last season...only Jerry Blevins played for the A's prior to 2009 (2007)...the average age on the A's Opening Day roster was 28.03 years...according to Stats, Inc., that was the youngest roster in the American League and second youngest in the majors (Atlanta, 27.79).

LOCKED UP: The A's have two players under contract beyond the 2013 season...Hiroyuki Nakajima is signed through 2014 with a club option for 2015 and Yoenis Céspedes is signed through 2015...Brett Anderson has club options for 2014 and 2015 and Coco Crisp and Chris Young have club options for 2014.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have four players on the disabled list (Nakajima, Rodriguez, Rosales, Sizemore)...Rodriguez (sprained right elbow), Rosales (strained left intercostal) and Nakajima (strained left hamstring) began the season on the DL...Sizemore (torn left ACL) was added Wednesday...Rodriguez and Sizemore will both miss the remainder of the season...the A's have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one...used the DL 21 times last year, the fourth time in the last six years they used it at least 20 times.

A's vs. TIGERS

The A's lost the season series to Detroit last year, 3-4...met again in the ALDS, which the A's lost in five games...the Tigers were one of two American League teams the A's had a losing record against (Kansas City, 4-5)...lost two of three in Detroit and split four games in Oakland...over the previous six years, the A's have won two season series, lost two and split two...are 27-24 against Detroit since 2007...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 239-232 against the Tigers...that includes 134-103 in Oakland, 103-127 in Detroit and 2-2 in Las Vegas...all-time, the A's are 907-985 against the Tigers

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour has converted each of his last 19 save opportunities.

Coco Crisp leads the majors in runs (14) and is tied for the lead in extra base hits (9)...has hit safely and scored a run in each of the last eight games and is 14 for 37 (.378) with 14 runs scored over that span.

Jed Lowrie has reached base safely in all 10 games...is 16 for 39 (.410) to start the season and now has a .323 (71 for 220) career average in April, his best for any month of the season.

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1909** the A's play their first game at Shibe Park, defeating Boston, 8-1...a crowd of 31,160 watches Eddie Plank defeat the Red Sox and 18-year old John "Stuffy" McInnis make his major league debut...in **1955** the Athletics open their first season in Kansas City with a 6-2 win over the Detroit Tigers...in **1994** Oakland collects just two hits but defeats Toronto 8-4 as the Blue Jay pitchers walk 12 A's hitters...both hits come in the first inning as Oakland draws four consecutive walks in the third inning and two consecutive bases loaded walks in the fifth...Rickey Henderson walks in each of his first four at bats.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his second start of the season...the A's were 14-10 (.583) in his starting assignments last year and his teams are 212-164 (.564) in his career...tossed seven or more innings in 12 of his 24 starts last year, allowed two runs or fewer 15 times and walked two batters or fewer 22 times...including one batter or fewer 18 times.

ACTIVE LEADERS: Ranks fourth among active pitchers in complete games (32), seventh in wins (172) and strikeouts (1835), eighth in games started (376) and innings pitched (2399.1) and tied for eighth in shutouts (9).

DOMINICAN LEADERS: His 172 wins are third most among Dominican-born pitchers behind Juan Marichal (243) and Pedro Martínez (219)...also ranks third among Dominicans in games started (376), innings pitched (2399.1) and strikeouts (1835).

SUSPENDED: Was reinstated from the suspended list last Saturday...was suspended for 50 games Aug. 22, 2012 after testing positive for Testosterone, a performance-enhancing substance in violation of Major League Baseball's Joint Drug Prevention and Treatment Program...served the final 40 games of the 2012 season, five games in the playoffs and the first five games this year.

LAST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-3 win at Houston last Saturday...retired 11 of the first 12 batters...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a three-run home run to Castro in the fourth innings...those were the only runs he would allow in six innings and the A's scored four times in the sixth for the win.

COLÓN vs. DETROIT: Is 8-10 with a 5.60 ERA (144.2 ip, 185 h, 96 r, 90 er, 49 bb, 133 so, 21 hr) in 25 career appearances, including 24 starts...is 0-7 with a 7.67 ERA (54 er in 63.1 ip) over his last 12 games, 11 starts...has not defeated the Tigers since April 13, 2003...is 4-5 with a 5.66 ERA (43 er in 68.1 ip) in 12 games, 11 starts, in his home ballparks, 4-4 with a 5.76 ERA (45 er in 70.1 ip) in 12 starts at Comerica Park and 0-1 with a 3.00 ERA in one start at Tiger Stadium...was the losing pitcher in his only start last year, a 10-6 A's loss in Oakland May 10...allowed eight runs in 2.1 innings...did not strikeout a batter for just the seventh time in his career...allowed a solo home run to Dirks in the first inning and was charged with seven runs in the Tigers eight-run third inning...Cabrera had a RBI double, Young a RBI single, Avila a two-run double and Boesch a RBI double to highlight the scoring.

THIS SPRING: Was 1-2 with a 6.30 ERA (20.0 ip, 31 h, 17 r, 14 er, 1 bb, 22 so, 2 hr) in six games, including three starts, this spring...allowed a .344 (31 for 90) opponents batting average but issued just one walk in 20.0 innings...struck out a team leading 22, which tied for ninth in the Cactus League...also started in a minor league game against the Angels March 20 (5.0 ip, 10 h, 5 r, 2 bb, 3 so).

2012 RECAP: Was 10-9 with a 3.43 ERA in 24 starts when he was suspended for 50 games Aug. 22 after testing positive for Testosterone, a performance-enhancing substance in violation of Major League Baseball's Joint Drug Prevention and Treatment Program...won 10 games for the ninth time in his career, but it was his first 10-win season since 2005 when he posted a career-high 21 victories with Los Angeles (AL)...his 3.43 ERA was the second lowest of his career to a mark of 2.93 in 2002 with Cleveland and Montreal.

39-YEAR OLD: At the age of 39, he became just the third pitcher in Oakland history to win 10 games in a season at age 36 or older...the other two are Don Sutton (13 in 1985 at age 40) and Tom Candiotti (11 in 1998 at age 40)...is just the fifth pitcher in Oakland history to start a game at age 39 or older...the other four are Tommy John (age 42 in 1985), Candiotti (41 in 1999), Sutton (40 in 1985) and Jim Perry (39 in 1975).

DON'T WALK: Issued just 23 walks in 152.1 innings for an average of 1.36 per nine innings, which was the lowest mark of his career...struck out 91 for a strikeout to walk ratio of 3.96, which was also a career-best...had a .292 opponents on-base percentage, which was second only to his .291 mark in 2005 with the Angels...averaged 14.1 pitches per inning, which was the lowest figure of his career...did not have enough innings to qualify for the league leaders...based on a minimum of 150 innings pitched, he averaged the fewest walks per nine innings in the American League and the fewest pitches per inning in the majors...using the same minimum, he ranked fourth in the American League in fewest pitches per start (89.2), fifth in strikeout to walk ratio and seventh in opponents on-base percentage.

THE DISABLED LIST: Was 6-7 with a 4.22 ERA in 15 starts when he was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 23 retroactive to June 18 with a strained right oblique...it was his ninth career stint on the DL...was reinstated July 3 and went 4-2 with a 2.30 ERA over his final nine starts.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .266 opponents batting average, including .257 (72-for-280) against right-handed hitters compared to .274 (89-for-325) against left-handers)...surrendered 14 of his 17 home runs and issued 21 of his 23 walks to lefties...has allowed 40 of his 52 home runs over his last four seasons to lefties...16 of the 17 home runs he allowed in 2012 and 43 of his 52 over his last four seasons have been solo shots...walked the leadoff batter in an inning just four times in 2012 and seven times over the last three years...opponents batted .216 with a .236 on-base percentage when leading off an inning in 2012...surrendered nine of his 17 home runs to batters leading off an inning...yielded a .215 batting average the first time through the lineup, .293 after that...allowed a .337 average with runners in scoring position.

THIS AND THAT: Went 9-5 with a 2.87 ERA in 16 starts at night compared to 1-4 with a 4.59 ERA in eight starts during the day...did not have a wild pitch and his 152.1 innings were fourth most in Oakland history among pitchers with no wild pitches...has not had a wild pitch in each of his last 57 games and 342.2 innings...his last wild pitch was May 26, 2009 at Los Angeles (AL)...committed four errors, which tied for fourth most among AL pitchers...received two runs of support or fewer in all nine of his losses and had seven runs of support total in those games (48.0 ip, 1.31 RSA)...went 9-0 in 11 starts with support of three runs or more.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

LHP Brett Anderson (1-1, 1.38 ERA): The A's Opening Day starting pitcher is scheduled to make his third start of the season...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 9-3 win at Houston last Sunday (6.0 ip, 5 h, 2 r, 2 bb, 10 so)...the 10 strikeouts matched his career high and gives him 16 for the season, which is tied for second in the American League...Is 2-2 with a 3.78 ERA (16.2 ip, 16 h, 13 r, 7 er, 9 bb, 13 so, 1 hr) in four career regular season appearances, all starts, against Detroit...also made one postseason start in the 2012 ALDS and was the winning pitcher in Game 3 in Oakland on October 9 (6.0 ip, 2 h, 2 bb, 6 so)...was 1-0 with a 6.75 ERA (12.0 ip, 16 h, 11 r, 9 er, 3 bb, 7 so, 3 hr) in four games, all starts, this spring...completed his rehab from "Tommy John" surgery in late August of last year and made six starts before his regular season ended when he strained his right oblique Sept. 19...went 4-2 with a 2.57 ERA and .225 opponents batting average...allowed just one home run in 35.0 innings.

ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

1-0, 2.10 ERA (30.0 ip, 23 h, 9 r, 7 er, 10 bb, 28 so, 1 hr)

Save/Save Opportunities: 1/2 (50.0%)

The A's bullpen has allowed one earned run or fewer in nine of the first 10 games...has a 2.10 ERA, which is the second lowest in the American League, and has a .204 (23 for 113) opponents batting average, which is fourth lowest...has allowed just one home run, which is tied for the fewest...compiled a 2.90 ERA last year, which was second lowest in the AL and ninth lowest in Oakland history...it was the lowest since the 1990 club had an Oakland record 2.35 ERA...also had the second lowest opponents batting average (.209), on-base percentage (.293) and slugging percentage (.334) in the AL...the opponents batting average was second lowest in Oakland history (.203 in 1989), the on-base percentage was fifth best and the slugging percentage ranked sixth.

- Made the 400th appearance of his career last Saturday night (now has 401).
- Recorded his first save of the season last Saturday night...has converted each of his last 19 save opportunities dating back to last season, which is tied for the sixth longest streak in Oakland history...his last blown save came on April 29, 2012 at Baltimore.
- Is in his 10th season in the majors...is on his fifth consecutive Opening Day roster (2011-13 with Oakland, 2009-10 with Tampa Bay).

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his third start of the season...the A's were 4-2 (.667) in his starting assignments last year and are 32-38 (.457) in his career...tossed at least six innings in five of his six starts in 2012, allowed one run or fewer four times and walked two batters or fewer five times.

OPENING DAY STARTER: Made the first Opening Day start of his career April 1 against Seattle...became the eighth different Opening Day starter for the A's in the last eight years (McCarthy, Cahill, Sheets, Braden, Blanton, Haren, Zito).

FIRST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 2-0 loss to Seattle on Opening Day in Oakland April 1...issued a career-high tying four walks (sixth time, first since May 16, 2011 vs. Los Angeles-AL)...struck out the side in the first inning to become the first A's pitcher since at least 1947 to strike out the side in the first inning on Opening Day...blanked the Mariners on two hits and two walks over the first four innings...then allowed a two-run single to Gutierrez in the fifth...Hernandez, Furbush, Pryor and Wilhelmsen combined to shutout the A's on three hits.

LAST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 9-3 win at Houston last Sunday...struck out a career-high tying 10 batters in 6.0 innings (also September 18, 2009 vs. Cleveland)...now has 16 strikeouts for the season, which ranks **second** in the American League...blanked the Astros on three hits and a walk over the first five innings...had an 8-0 lead when he allowed two unearned runs in the sixth...loaded the bases with no outs but then struck out each of the next two batters before a Lowrie error allowed two runs to score.

ANDERSON vs. DETROIT: Is 2-2 with a 3.78 ERA (16.2 ip, 16 h, 13 r, 7 er, 9 bb, 13 so, 1 hr) in four career regular season appearances, all starts...is 1-2 with a 4.76 ERA (6 er in 11.1 ip) in three starts at Comerica Park and 1-0 with a 1.69 ERA (1 er in 5.1 ip) in one start in Oakland...was the losing pitcher in his only start last year, a 6-2 A's loss at Detroit September 19...retired six of the first seven batters he faced...then allowed a two-run double to Infante in the third inning...intentionally walked Cabrera and then walked Fielder to load the bases with one out...left the game after 2.1 innings with a strained right oblique...also made one postseason start in the 2012 ALDS and was the winning pitcher in Game 3 in Oakland on October 9 (6.0 ip, 2 h, 2 bb, 6 so)...combined with Cook, Doolittle and Balfour on a four-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win...at the age of 24 years and 251 days, he became the fifth youngest pitcher in Oakland history and the seventh youngest in Athletics history to win a postseason game...both of the hits he allowed came in the second inning on back-to-back singles by Young and Peralta...did not allow any other runners into scoring position.

THIS SPRING: Was 1-0 with a 6.75 ERA (12.0 ip, 16 h, 11 r, 9 er, 3 bb, 7 so, 3 hr) in four games, all starts...also pitched in a minor league game against the Cubs March 16 (5.0 ip, 5 h, 2 r, 2 er, 4 bb, 3 so) and started and won in the exhibition game against Italy's WBC team March 5 (3.0 ip, 1 h, 1 bb, 3 so)...faced just two batters March 10 against Arizona before leaving the game with a strained right trapezius...allowed a .314 (16 for 51) opponents batting average.

2012 RECAP: Completed his rehab from "Tommy John" surgery in late August and made six starts before his regular season ended when he strained his right oblique Sept. 19...went 4-2 with a 2.57 ERA and .225 opponents batting average...allowed just one home run in 35.0 innings.

RUN SUPPORT: Received no run support in each of his two losses...is now 2-22 in 35 career starts with run support of fewer than three runs, 24-4 in 35 starts with support of three runs or more.

MORE 2012: Was reinstated from the disabled list Aug. 20 and started the next day against Minnesota...allowed just one run in 7.0 innings for the win...it was his first start since June 5, 2011 at Boston and his first win since May 26, 2011 at Los Angeles (AL)...combined with Cook and Balfour on a two-hit shutout in his second start, a 3-0 win at Cleveland Aug. 27...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed both of the hits...allowed one run in each of his next two starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1918 to begin his season with four consecutive starts of one run or fewer...won each of his first four starts to become the first Oakland pitcher to start the season by winning at least his first four starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990...the four-game winning streak matched the longest of his career (third time, last: Sept. 6 to Oct. 2, 2010)...had a 0.69 ERA, a .185 opponents batting average and three walks in 26.0 innings over his first four starts...then lost each of his final two starts, logging an 8.00 ERA, a .324 opponents batting average and four walks in 9.0 innings...left his final start Sept. 19 at Detroit after just 2.1 innings with the oblique injury...returned to start and win Game 3 of the ALDS against Detroit in Oakland...combined with Cook, Doolittle and Balfour on a four-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win...tossed 6.0 innings and allowed two of the hits (2 bb, 6 so).
