A's vs. ASTROS

The A's lead the season series 5-0...have won the first two games in Oakland after sweeping a three-game series in Houston April 5-7...now have a seven-game winning streak against the Astros...the A's lead the all-time series, 10-1...swept a three-game interleague series in Oakland in 2002 and won two of three in Houston in 2007.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour has converted each of his last 20 saves, which is the sixth longest streak in Oakland history.

Coco Crisp extended his hitting streak to 11 games last night (18 for 47, .383), which is his longest hitting streak since joining the A's...he leads the American League in extra base hits (11) and total bases (38), ranks second in runs (16), tied for second in doubles (6), third in slugging (.704) and tied for third in stolen bases (4).

Jed Lowrie is tied for second in the American League in doubles (6) and is tied for third in runs (13), extra base hits (9) and total bases (35).

Derek Norris made his seventh start of the season Monday night and has hit safely in each of those seven games (10 for 21, .476).

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In 1968 the A's play their first game in Oakland but lose to Baltimore 4-1...Dave McNally limits the A's to two hits, including a pinch hit single by Tony La Russa in his first at bat a member of the Oakland A's.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have won two straight and are a season-high tying seven games over .500 at 11-4...that is the best record in the American League, second best in the majors (Atlanta, 12-1) and tied for fourth best in Oakland history over the first 15 games...it is the A's best start since the 1990 club went 12-3 (lost game 16)...are in sole possession of first place in the American League West for the seventh consecutive day and have held at least a share of first place each of the last 11 days...spent just one day in sole possession of first last year and that was the final day of the season...have a 1½ game lead for the second consecutive day and have not led the West by more than two games since April 18, 2010 (2½)...for the season, have spent nine days in sole possession of first, two days tied for first, three days tied for second, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth.

AGAINST THE WEST: The A's are 10-2 against the American League West and have won each of their last 10 games...the 10-game winning streak is the A's longest against division foes since they won 13 straight from June 12-August 11, 1994...have outscored the West 81-38...are batting .288 (120 for 417) with 19 home runs in the 12 games...the pitching staff has a 2.83 ERA (34 er in 108.0 ip)...following today's game, the A's are scheduled to play 10 straight games against AL East teams before facing the Angels, April 29-May 1.

EARLY SEASON OFFENSE: The A's tied an Oakland record last night with three triples (seventh time, last: August 3, 2002 vs. Detroit) and now have four for the season, which is tied for second in the majors...stole a season high four bases last night and lead the majors with 15 for the season...also lead the majors in runs (89), doubles (37), walks (64) and extra base hits (61), rank third in hits (138) and home runs (20), fourth in slugging (.466) and fifth in on-base percentage (.348)...the 37 doubles and 61 extra base hits are the **most by an Athletics team over the first 15 games of the season since at least 1916**...the 85 runs scored are fourth most in Oakland history over the first 15 games and the most since 1996 (92).

THIS AND THAT: The time of game last night was 3 hours and 8 minutes, which was the A's 11th consecutive game of at least 2 hours, 59 minutes...that is tied for the second longest such streak in Oakland history...the longest is 12 straight games from August 15-28, 1992...the average time of game over the first 15 games is 3 hours and 16 minutes...the A's are 11-0 when scoring four or more runs compared to 0-4 when scoring fewer than four...are 4-0 in games started by a left-handed pitcher and are batting a Major League leading .314 (50 for 159) against south paws overall...the A's pitching staff has held left-handed hitters to a .211 (40 for 190) batting average compared to .270 (92 for 341) by right-handers...have held the opposition to a .225 (29 for 129) average with runners in scoring position, including 0 for 12 with the bases loaded...have allowed a .194 (12 for 62) average against the opponents number three hitter.

ONE-RUN GAMES AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS: The A's improved to 2-0 in one-run games with the win last night and both of those wins have come in the last at bat...went 25-18 (.581) in one-run games last year, which was the third best record in the American League...ranked second in the AL in last at bat wins in 2012 (23)...had their first walk-off win of the season Friday night against Detroit after tallying a Major League leading 14 last year...that win came in 12 innings, the A's only extra inning game of 2013...went 11-5 (.688) in extra inning games last year, which was the second best record in the AL.

PITCHING: The A's have allowed three runs or fewer in 10 of the first 15 games and have a 3.46 ERA for the season, which ranks third in the American League...A's starting pitchers have a 4.47 ERA (44 er in 88.2 ip), which ranks ninth...starters have logged a 5.80 ERA (29 er in 45.0 ip) and .315 (58 for 184) opponents batting average over the last eight games after compiling a 3.09 ERA and .233 opponents average over the first seven games...lead the AL in innings pitched (88.2) and are tied for the lead in wins (8).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 3-2 on this six-game homestand against Detroit (1-2) and Houston (2-0) after going 2-2 on the first homestand against Seattle...begin their second road trip of the season Friday, a six-game trip to Tampa Bay (three games) and Boston (three games)...went 6-0 on the first road trip to Houston (3-0) and Los Angeles (3-0)...it was the third undefeated road trip of six or more games in Oakland history...had a 10-0 trip August 19-28, 2002 (Cleveland 4, Detroit 3, Kansas City 3) and an 8-0 trip April 9-16, 1981 (Minnesota 4, California 4)...this marks the first time the A's have won their first six road games since 1990 when they won their first eight...scored 51 runs on the trip, which was second most in Oakland history for a six-game road trip...scored 52 runs against Minnesota and Kansas City, July 18-23, 2001...the A's are batting .215 (62 for 288) with 38 runs scored and seven home runs in nine games in Oakland compared to .326 (76 for 233) with 51 runs scored and 13 home run in six games on the road.

NINE-GAME WINNING STREAK SNAPPED: The A's had their nine-game winning streak snapped Saturday...it matched their longest winning streak from last year (August 24-September 2) and was the 14th of nine or more games in Oakland history...it was the second longest in Oakland history among streaks that took place entirely in the month of April...the longest is 11 in 1981 (April 9-19)...outscored the opposition 69-27 during the streak...trailed at the end of an inning just nine times...batted .314 with 27 doubles, one triple and 18 home runs (.563 slugging percentage)...the pitching staff had a 2.46 ERA.

LOCKED UP: The A's have two players under contract beyond the 2013 season...Hiroyuki Nakajima is signed through 2014 with a club option for 2015 and Yoenis Céspedes is signed through 2015...Brett Anderson has club options for 2014 and 2015 and Coco Crisp and Chris Young have club options for 2014.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have five players on the disabled list (Céspedes, Nakajima, Rodriguez, Rosales, Sizemore)...Rodriguez (sprained right elbow), Rosales (strained left intercostal) and Nakajima (strained left hamstring) began the season on the DL...Sizemore (torn left ACL) was added last Wednesday and Céspedes (muscle strain in left hand) was added Saturday...Rodriguez and Sizemore will both miss the remainder of the season...the A's have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one...used the DL 21 times last year, the fourth time in the last six years they used it at least 20 times.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his third start of the season...the A's were 14-10 (.583) in his starting assignments last year and his teams are 213-164 (.565) in his career...tossed seven or more innings in 12 of his 24 starts last year, allowed two runs or fewer 15 times and walked two batters or fewer 22 times...including one batter or fewer 18 times.

THE LONG BALL: Has allowed one home run in each of his first two starts, both three-run shots by left-handed hitters...surrendered 14 of his 17 home runs last year and 41 of his 53 over his last four years to lefties...however, 16 of his 17 home runs last year and 43 of his 51 over his previous three seasons were solo shots.

ACTIVE LEADERS: Ranks fourth among active pitchers in complete games (32), seventh in wins (172) and strikeouts (1840), tied for seventh in games started (377), eighth in innings pitched (2406.1) and tied for eighth in shutouts (9).

DOMINICAN LEADERS: His 172 wins are third most among Dominican-born pitchers behind Juan Marichal (243) and Pedro Martínez (219)...also ranks third among Dominicans in games started (377), innings pitched (2406.1) and strikeouts (1840).

SUSPENDED: Was reinstated from the suspended list April 6...was suspended for 50 games Aug. 22, 2012 after testing positive for Testosterone, a performance-enhancing substance in violation of Major League Baseball's Joint Drug Prevention and Treatment Program...served the final 40 games of the 2012 season, five games in the playoffs and the first five games this year.

FIRST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-3 win at Houston April 6...retired 11 of the first 12 batters...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a three-run home run to Castro in the fourth innings...those were the only runs he would allow in six innings and the A's scored four times in the sixth for the win.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 4-3, 12-inning win over Detroit last Friday...allowed all three of his runs in the third inning on a three-run home run by Fielder...the A's came back with single runs in the third, sixth and seventh to get him off the hook...allowed eight hits, all to the top four hitters in the order...the bottom five were 0 for 15.

COLÓN vs. HOUSTON: Is 4-2 with a 3.66 ERA (46.2 ip, 43 h, 21 r, 19 er, 12 bb, 28 so, 7 hr) in seven career appearances, all starts...is 2-0 with a 2.45 ERA (3 er in 11.0 ip) in two starts at Minute Maid Park, 1-0 with a 1.13 ERA (1 er in 8.0 ip) in one start in the Astrodome and 1-2 with a 4.88 ERA (15 er in 27.2 ip) in four starts in his home ballparks...was the winning pitcher in his only start this year, a 6-3 A's win at Houston April (see first start above)...prior to that, had not faced the Astros since June 19, 2007 while pitching for the Angels...was the losing pitcher in a 9-5 loss.

THIS SPRING: Was 1-2 with a 6.30 ERA (20.0 ip, 31 h, 17 r, 14 er, 1 bb, 22 so, 2 hr) in six games, including three starts, this spring...allowed a .344 (31 for 90) opponents batting average but issued just one walk in 20.0 innings...struck out a team leading 22, which tied for ninth in the Cactus League...also started in a minor league game against the Angels March 20 (5.0 ip, 10 h, 5 r, 2 bb, 3 so).

2012 RECAP: Was 10-9 with a 3.43 ERA in 24 starts when he was suspended for 50 games Aug. 22 after testing positive for Testosterone, a performance-enhancing substance in violation of Major League Baseball's Joint Drug Prevention and Treatment Program...won 10 games for the ninth time in his career, but it was his first 10-win season since 2005 when he posted a career-high 21 victories with Los Angeles (AL)...his 3.43 ERA was the second lowest of his career to a mark of 2.93 in 2002 with Cleveland and Montreal.

39-YEAR OLD: At the age of 39, he became just the third pitcher in Oakland history to win 10 games in a season at age 36 or older...the other two are Don Sutton (13 in 1985 at age 40) and Tom Candiotti (11 in 1998 at age 40)...is just the fifth pitcher in Oakland history to start a game at age 39 or older...the other four are Tommy John (age 42 in 1985), Candiotti (41 in 1999), Sutton (40 in 1985) and Jim Perry (39 in 1975).

DON'T WALK: Issued just 23 walks in 152.1 innings for an average of 1.36 per nine innings, which was the lowest mark of his career...struck out 91 for a strikeout to walk ratio of 3.96, which was also a career-best...had a .292 opponents on-base percentage, which was second only to his .291 mark in 2005 with the Angels...averaged 14.1 pitches per inning, which was the lowest figure of his career...did not have enough innings to qualify for the league leaders...based on a minimum of 150 innings pitched, he averaged the fewest walks per nine innings in the American League and the fewest pitches per inning in the majors...using the same minimum, he ranked fourth in the American League in fewest pitches per start (89.2), fifth in strikeout to walk ratio and seventh in opponents on-base percentage.

THE DISABLED LIST: Was 6-7 with a 4.22 ERA in 15 starts when he was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 23 retroactive to June 18 with a strained right oblique...it was his ninth career stint on the DL...was reinstated July 3 and went 4-2 with a 2.30 ERA over his final nine starts.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .266 opponents batting average, including .257 (72-for-280) against right-handed hitters compared to .274 (89-for-325) against left-handers...walked the leadoff batter in an inning just four times in 2012 and seven times over the last three years...opponents batted .216 with a .236 on-base percentage when leading off an inning in 2012...surrendered nine of his 17 home runs to batters leading off an inning...yielded a .215 batting average the first time through the lineup, .293 after that...allowed a .337 average with runners in scoring position.

THIS AND THAT: Went 9-5 with a 2.87 ERA in 16 starts at night compared to 1-4 with a 4.59 ERA in eight starts during the day...did not have a wild pitch and his 152.1 innings were fourth most in Oakland history among pitchers with no wild pitches...has not had a wild pitch in each of his last 58 games and 349.2 innings...his last wild pitch was May 26, 2009 at Los Angeles (AL)...committed four errors, which tied for fourth most among AL pitchers...received two runs of support or fewer in all nine of his losses and had seven runs of support total in those games (48.0 ip, 1.31 RSA)...went 9-0 in 11 starts with support of three runs or more

FRIDAY'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

LHP Brett Anderson (1-2, 4.34 ERA): Is scheduled to make his fourth start of the season...was the losing pitcher in his last start, a 7-3 loss to Detroit last Saturday in Oakland (5.2 ip, 8 h, 7 r, 7 er, 3 bb, 2 so)...is 1-0 with a 2.12 ERA in three career starts against Tampa Bay...has not faced the Rays since August 21, 2010, a no decision in a 5-4 loss in Oakland (7.0 ip, 8 h, 2 r, 2 er, 2 bb, 8 so)...was 1-0 with a 6.75 ERA (12.0 ip, 16 h, 11 r, 9 er, 3 bb, 7 so, 3 hr) in four games, all starts, this spring...went 4-2 with a 2.57 ERA and .225 opponents batting average in six starts last year after coming back from "Tommy John" surgery...allowed just one home run in 35.0 innings.

The A's bullpen has allowed one earned run or fewer in 14 of the first 15 games...including each of the past 13 contests (6 er in 43.1 ip, 1.25 ERA)...has a 1.64 ERA, which is the lowest in the American League and second lowest in the majors (Atlanta, 1.47)...has the second lowest opponents batting average (.196), on-base percentage (.257) and slugging percentage (.326) in the AL...has held first batters faced to a .170 (8 for 47) average, which is the lowest in the AL...is tied for the lead in wins (3) and is third in innings pitched (49.1)...is tied for the third fewest saves (2).

- Is 2 for 2 in save opportunities and has now converted each of his last 20 save chances dating back to last season...that is the sixth longest streak in Oakland history...his last blown save came on April 29, 2012 at Baltimore.
- Is in his 10th season in the majors...is on his fifth consecutive Opening Day roster (2011-13 with Oakland, 2009-10 with Tampa Bay).
- Posted a 2.25 ERA in four spring training appearances...opponents were 2 for 14 (.143) with no walks in 4.0 innings...had arthroscopic surgery February 14 to perform a lateral meniscectomy of his right knee and did not pitch in a Cactus League game until March 21.
- Has two saves in three games against Houston this year (3.0 ip, 4 so).
- Had two stints as the A's closer in 2012 and saved a team-leading 24 games in a team-high 75 appearances while posting a 2.53 ERA...was charged with just two blown saves and his save percentage of 92.3 ranked fourth in the American League...was 10th in saves.

- Has appeared in eight of the A's 15 games...is tied for second among American League relievers in appearances and tied for third in strikeouts (10).
- Is in his seventh Major League season, all with Oakland, and is on his fifth consecutive Opening Day roster.
- Compiled a 2.45 ERA and .250 opponents batting average in seven spring games...did not allow an earned run over his final six outings (6.2 ip).
- Faced Houston for the only time this season April 7 (1.0 ip, 1 so)...it was his first career appearance against the Astros.
- Completed his sixth season in an Oakland uniform last year, but it was just his second full season (2010)...was 5-1 with a save, a 2.48 ERA and a .201 opponents batting average in 63 relief appearances...the ERA and opponents batting average were the lowest marks of his career.

- Has held opponents to a .120 batting average, which is tied for eighth lowest in the American League...left-handed hitters are 0 for 8 and right-handers are 3 for 17 (.176).
- Is tied for fifth among AL relievers in appearances (7).
- Has allowed one run in 16.1 innings (0.55 ERA) in 15 career games in the month of April...the ERA is his best for any month of the season.
- Was 1-1 with a 6.14 ERA in nine spring training appearances...did not allow a run over his final six outings (4.2 ip).
- Has faced Houston twice in his career (2.0 ip, 2 so).

ROOKIE LEADERS: Tied for second among American League rookies in wins, ranked fourth in strikeouts and innings pitched (181.1) and tied for fourth in starts...his ERA was the lowest among AL rookies with 130 or more innings, his .619 winning percentage was second best and his .248 opponents batting average was third best...received one third place vote in the BBWAA AL Rookie of the Year balloting and finished fifth

AMONG THE LEADERS: His winning percentage was 10th best among all AL pitchers...allowed just 11 home runs in 181.1 innings, an average of 0.55 per nine innings...that was the second lowest mark in the AL and third lowest in the majors...had a .358 opponents slugging percentage, which was sixth lowest in the AL...tied for first in the AL in sacrifice hits allowed (7), tied for third in sacrifice flies (8), ranked fifth in stolen bases against (21) and tied for sixth in wild pitches (10).

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his fourth start of the season...the A's are 3-0 in his starting assignments this year and 23-11 (.676) in his career...his teams are 28-11 (.718) in his 39 career starts...has tossed at least six innings in two of his three starts, allowed two runs or fewer twice and walked two batters or fewer twice.

3-0: Has won each of his first three starts and is one of **three** three-game winners in the American League...is the first pitcher on an A's Opening Day roster to win each of his first three starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990...won his final two decisions last year and now has a career-high five-game winning streak dating back to September 9 of last year...has a 3.11 ERA (16 er in 46.1 ip) and .308 (57 for 185) over that eight-start stretch...had never won more than two consecutive games in his career.

FIRST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-2 win over Seattle April 3 in Oakland...allowed a home run to Gutierrez to start the game and Morse added a solo home run two outs later...did not allow a run over his final six innings...retired each of the final 10 batters he faced and 17 of the final 18.

SECOND START: He won his second consecutive start in the A's 11-5 win at Los Angeles April 10...the A's scored a run in the first but he allowed a Hamilton sacrifice fly in the bottom of the first...the A's added three more in the third before he allowed another run in the third...had a 5-2 lead when he allowed a two-run single to Callaspo in the fifth.

LAST START: He won his third consecutive start in the A's 11-2 win over Houston last Monday in Oakland...the A's scored six times in the first inning and he retired 10 of the first 11 batters he faced before allowing a RBI single to Pena in the fourth...also allowed a RBI single to Altuve in the seventh.

MILONE vs. TAMPA BAY: Is 1-1 with a 8.18 ERA (11.0 ip, 12 h, 10 r, 10 er, 5 bb, 5 so) in two career starts, both last year...the win came in the A's 9-5 victory at Tampa Bay May 6...allowed five runs in five innings and walked a career-high four batters...allowed four runs in the first inning...walked the first three batters he faced...Keppinger followed with a sacrifice fly and after hitting Scott to reload the bases, he allowed a RBI single to Rodriguez and a two-run single to Joyce...the A's then scored five times in the third and three more times in the fifth to take an 8-4 lead...also allowed an Upton solo home run in the fifth...took the loss in a 8-0 decision in Oakland July 31...allowed two runs in the second inning, highlighted by an Upton RBI single...was charged with three more runs in the sixth on a Keppinger RBI single, a Pena sacrifice fly and a Rodriguez RBI single...Shields tossed a three-hit shutout and did not walk a batter while striking out 11 for the Rays.

THIS SPRING: Was 3-0 with a 4.63 ERA (23.1 ip, 28 h, 12 r, 12 er, 5 bb, 17 so, 3 hr) in six games, all starts...the three wins tied for third in the Cactus League...led the A's in wins and innings and tied for the lead in starts...walked one batter or fewer in each of his first five starts before issuing two in his final start...had five walks in 23.1 innings (1.93 per nine innings) for the spring...allowed a .304 (28 for 92) opponents batting average.

2012 RECAP: Was one of four players acquired from Washington in the Gio Gonzalez trade during the offseason and went 13-10 with a 3.74 ERA in a team-leading 31 starts...also led the A's in innings pitched (190.0), had the only complete game and tied for the team-lead in wins...fellow rookie Jarrod Parker also won 13 games, both setting an Oakland record for wins by a rookie...the previous mark of 12 was held by Chris Codiroli (1983) and Joe Blanton (2005)...had the most wins by an Athletics rookie since Harry Byrd won 15 games for the 1952 Philadelphia A's en route to Rookie of the Year honors...the A's became the first team since the 1952 Brooklyn Dodgers to have two rookies win 13 or more games (Joe Black 15, Billy Loes 13)...it was the second time in Oakland history the A's had two rookie 10-game winners...the other time was in 2009 (Anderson 11, Cahill 10)...with Parker making 29 starts, this was the third time in Oakland history the A's had two rookies with 20 or more starts (Keough and Johnson in 1978; Anderson and Cahill in 2009)...struck out 137, which was the fourth best rookie total in Oakland history and the sixth best in Athletics history...also tied for the fifth most games started by an Oakland rookie (31) and was sixth in innings pitched (190.0)...surrendered 24 home runs, which tied for second most.

ROOKIE LEADERS: Tied for the lead among Major League rookies in complete games...tied for second among American League rookies in wins and games started, ranked third in innings pitched and was fifth in strikeouts...his ERA ranked third among AL rookies with 130 or more innings.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Walked just 36 batters in 190.0 innings, an average of 1.71 per nine innings...that was the second lowest mark in the AL and sixth lowest in the majors...it was the fifth lowest mark in Oakland history...had a strikeout to walk ratio of 3.81, which ranked seventh in the AL...it was the fourth best mark in Athletics history...tied for third in the AL with six pickoffs...opponents were 8-for-18 (44.4%) in stolen base attempts, which was the second lowest mark in the AL...allowed a team-leading 207 hits, which were ninth most in the AL...his 31 games started were the fewest by an A's team leader since Steve Karsay led Oakland with 24 starts in 1997.

HOME AND AWAY: Went 7-4 with a 2.74 ERA and .240 opponents batting average in 15 starts at home compared to 6-6 with a 4.83 ERA and .316 opponents batting average in 16 starts on the road...had the eighth lowest home ERA in the AL and the ninth highest road ERA...allowed 18 of his 24 home runs on the road, which was fourth most in the AL.

RUN SUPPORT: Received just 12 runs of support in his 10 losses (58.1 ip, 1.85 RSA)...received no run support six times and one run four times...had two wins where he received just one run of support.

OPPONENTS BATTING: His opponents batting average included a .263 (51-for-194) mark against left-handed hitters compared to .283 (156-for-551) against right-handers...walked 15 of the 214 lefties he faced (one per 14.2 plate appearances) compared to 21 of the 577 right-handers (one per 27.5 plate appearances...allowed a .319 batting average to hitters leading off an inning...yielded 10 of his 24 home runs in that situation...opponents are batting .324 (73-for-225) against him to lead off an inning in his career...yielded a .462 (6-for-13) batting average and two home runs with the bases loaded...the two grand slams tied for second most in the AL and the batting average was fourth highest.

activated April 13...sustained a sprained right ankle, which placed him on the DL for a second time from July 15 to Aug. 11...missed 52 team games in that stretch...tied his career high with a nine-game hitting streak from April 27 to May 6, during which he hit .469 with three home runs and nine RBI...hit home runs in three consecutive games from June 7-9, becoming the first Astros shortstop to do so since Andujar Cedenro from April 9-12, 1994...prior to Lowrie, the last Astro at any position to homer in three straight games was Lance Berkman (four games) from July 4-8, 2010...combined to play in six minor league games while on injury rehab assignments, including four playoff games...appeared in games for Double-A Corpus Christi and Single-A Lancaster during their playoff runs in September.

CAREER
