A's vs. RAYS

The A's won the season series last year, 5-4...lost two of three in Oakland but went 4-2 in Tampa Bay...it was the A's second consecutive season series win...however, are 27-27 against the Rays since 2007...all-time, the A's are 86-52 (.623) against Tampa Bay, which is the best record against the Rays by any American League team...are 47-21 in Oakland and 39-31 at Tropicana Field.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour has converted each of his last 21 saves, which is tied for the third longest streak in A's history...his last blown save came on April 29, 2012.

Coco Crisp has an 11-game hitting streak (18 for 47, .383), which is tied for the longest active hitting streak in the majors...he leads the American League in extra base hits (11).

Seth Smith is 8 for 12 (.667) against left-handed pitching...had just 11 hits off southpaws all last year...has three three-hit games, which is tied for the most in the American League.

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1981** the A's defeat the Seattle Mariners 6-1 in the first game of a double header at the Coliseum to run their record to 11-0, a Major League record at the time...the Mariners won the second game of the twinbill to end the A's streak but Oakland won the next six to improve to 17-1...in **1986** Jose Rijo strikes out an Oakland record 16 batters in the A's 7-2 win at Seattle...Bill Mooneyham adds two in an inning of relief for a club record 18 for a nine inning game.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Swept a three-game series from Houston to start the week and the three-game winning streak improves the A's to a season-high eight games over .500...are 12-4, which is the best record in the American League, second best in the majors (Atlanta, 13-2) and tied for third best in Oakland history over the first 16 games of the season...it is the A's best start since the 1990 club also went 12-4...a win tonight would give the A's their best 17-game start since they went 16-1 in 1981...are in sole possession of first place in the American League West for the ninth consecutive day and have held at least a share of first place each of the last 13 days...spent just one day in sole possession of first last year and that was the final day of the season...have a season-high 2½ game lead in the West, which is the A's largest lead since April 18, 2010 when they also led by 2½ games...have not had a larger lead since they finished the 2006 season with a four game lead...have not had a lead of more than three games in the month of April since April 26, 1990 (3½)...for the season, have spent 11 days in sole possession of first, two days tied for first, three days tied for second, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's begin their second road trip of the season tonight, a six-game trek to Tampa Bay (three games) and Boston (three games)...went 6-0 on the first road trip to Houston (3-0) and Los Angeles (3-0)...it was the third undefeated road trip of six or more games in Oakland history...had a 10-0 trip August 19-28, 2002 (Cleveland 4, Detroit 3, Kansas City 3) and an 8-0 trip April 9-16, 1981 (Minnesota 4, California 4)...this is the third longest season-opening road winning streak in Oakland history...it is the longest since the 1990 club started the year 8-0 on the road...the record was set in 1981 when the A's won their first 11 road contests...are one of two teams that are undefeated on the road (Atlanta, 7-0)...went 4-2 on the last homestand against Detroit (1-2) and Houston (3-0) and are 6-4 at home for the season...the A's are batting 326 (76 for 233) with 51 runs scored and 13 home runs in six games on the road compared to .227 (73 for 321) with 45 runs scored and seven home runs in 10 games in Oakland...A's pitchers have allowed just one home run in six games on the road compared to 13 in 10 games in Oakland.

EARLY SEASON OFFENSE: The A's lead the majors in runs (96), doubles (40), walks (70) and extra base hits (64), are tied for the lead in stolen bases (15), rank second in on-base percentage (.354), third in slugging (.464), tied for third in hits (149) and triples (4), fourth in batting (.269) and tied for fourth in home runs (20)...the 40 doubles and 64 extra base hits are the **most by an Athletics team over the first 16 games of the season since at least 1916**...the 96 runs scored are third most in Oakland history over the first 16 games and the most since 1994 (109)...the 149 hits are fourth most in Oakland history.

PITCHING: The A's have allowed three runs or fewer in 10 of the first 16 games and have a 3.55 ERA for the season, which ranks sixth in the American League...A's starting pitchers have a 4.28 ERA (45 er in 94.2 ip), which ranks eighth...starters lead the AL in wins (9) and rank second in innings pitched (94.2)...are 5-0 with a 3.09 ERA (12 er in 35.0 ip) on the road compared to 4-4 with a 4.98 ERA (33 er in 59.2 ip) at home.

THIS AND THAT: Each of the A's last 12 games have lasted at least two hours and 59 minutes...that matches the longest streak of consecutive games of at least 2:59 in Oakland history (also August 15-28, 1992)...have played just one game this year under 2:46 (2:32 on April 4)...the A's average time of game over the first 16 games is three hours and 17 minutes...the offense leads the majors in pitches per plate appearance (4.06) and the pitching staff ranks seventh in most pitches per game (152.0)...the A's are 4-0 in games in which the opponent starts a left-handed pitcher and are batting a Major League leading .311 (55 for 177) against south paws overall...are batting .303 (46 for 152) with runners in scoring position, which ranks third in the American League...the A's are the only team in the majors that has not allowed a hit with the bases loaded (0 for 12, one walk)...are 12-0 when scoring four or more runs compared to 0-4 when scoring fewer than four...pitchers have held the opponents number three hitter to a .212 (14 for 66) batting average...tied an Oakland record Tuesday night against Houston with three triples (seventh time, last: August 3, 2002 vs. Detroit).

ONE-RUN GAMES AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS: The A's are 2-0 in one-run games and both of those wins have come in the last at bat...went 25-18 (.581) in one-run games last year, which was the third best record in the American League...ranked second in the AL in last at bat wins in 2012 (23)...had their first walk-off win of the season a week ago tonight against Detroit after tallying a Major League leading 14 last year...that win came in 12 innings, the A's only extra inning game of 2013...went 11-5 (.688) in extra inning games last year, which was the second best record in the AL.

AGAINST THE WEST: The A's are 11-2 against the American League West and have won each of their last 11 games...the 11-game winning streak is tied for the A's second longest streak against the West since divisional play began in 1969...it is the longest since 1994 when the record of 13 was set (June 12-August 11)...each of the A's next 10 games are against the AL East...that stretch ends April 29 when the A's host the Angels in a three-game series...the A's are batting .291 (131 for 450) with 19 home runs in 13 games against AL West competition compared to .173 (18 for 104) with one home run in three games against everyone else...the pitching staff has a 3.00 ERA (39 er in 117.0 ip) against the West compared to 5.70 (19 er in 30.0 ip) against everyone else.

NINE-GAME WINNING STREAK SNAPPED: The A's had their nine-game winning streak snapped last Saturday by Detroit...it matched their longest winning streak from last year (August 24-September 2) and was the 14th of nine or more games in Oakland history...it was the second longest in Oakland history among streaks that took place entirely in the month of April...the longest is 11 in 1981 (April 9-19).

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have five players on the disabled list (Céspedes, Nakajima, Rodriguez, Rosales, Sizemore)...Rodriguez (sprained right elbow), Rosales (strained left intercostal) and Nakajima (strained left hamstring) began the season on the DL...Sizemore (torn left ACL) was added April 10 and Céspedes (muscle strain in left hand) was added Saturday...Rodriguez and Sizemore will both miss the remainder of the season...the A's have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one...used the DL 21 times last year, the fourth time in the last six years they used it at least 20 times.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his fourth start of the season...the A's are 1-2 (.333) in his starting assignments this year and are 32-39 (.451) in his career...has tossed at least six innings in two of his three starts, allowed two runs or fewer twice and walked two batters or fewer once.

OPENING DAY STARTER: Made the first Opening Day start of his career April 1 against Seattle...became the eighth different Opening Day starter for the A's in the last eight years (McCarthy, Cahill, Sheets, Braden, Blanton, Haren, Zito).

FIRST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 2-0 loss to Seattle on Opening Day in Oakland April 1...issued a career-high tying four walks (sixth time, first since May 16, 2011 vs. Los Angeles-AL)...struck out the side in the first inning to become the first A's pitcher since at least 1947 to strike out the side in the first inning on Opening Day...blanked the Mariners on two hits and two walks over the first four innings...then allowed a two-run single to Gutierrez in the fifth...Hernandez, Furbush, Pryor and Wilhelmson combined to shutout the A's on three hits.

SECOND START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 9-3 win at Houston April 7...struck out a career-high tying 10 batters in 6.0 innings (also September 18, 2009 vs. Cleveland)...blanked the Astros on three hits and a walk over the first five innings...had an 8-0 lead when he allowed two unearned runs in the sixth...loaded the bases with no outs but then struck out each of the next two batters before a Lowrie error allowed two runs to score.

LAST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 7-3 loss to Detroit last Saturday in Oakland...allowed a career-high tying three home runs (third time)...Hunter had a solo home run in the third, Fielder a leadoff home run in the fourth and Peralta a three-run home run in the fourth...also allowed a RBI double to Pena in the sixth and was relieved by Neshek who allowed Pena to score on a Jackson double.

ANDERSON vs. TAMPA BAY: Is 1-0 with a 2.12 ERA (17.0 ip, 15 h, 6 r, 4 er, 3 bb, 16 so, 3 hr) in three career starts...the win came in a 7-6 A's victory on May 20, 2009 at Tampa Bay...had a 4-0 lead when he allowed two unearned runs on a two-run home run by Pena in the fourth...also allowed a solo home run to Aybar in the fifth and the bullpen allowed an inherited runner to score in the seventh...had a no decision in the A's 7-3 win on July 12, 2009 at Tampa Bay...tossed 4.0 shutout innings and left early after entering the game with lower back stiffness...allowed just three hits and walked one...his last start was a no decision in the A's 5-4 loss to Tampa Bay August 21, 2010 in Oakland...had a 2-0 lead when he allowed a leadoff home run to Longoria in the second inning...allowed the game tying sacrifice fly to Crawford in the sixth but the A's came back with two in the bottom of the sixth...left after seven innings with a 4-2 lead but Breslow allowed a three-run home run to Rodriguez in the eighth for the blown save and loss.

THIS SPRING: Was 1-0 with a 6.75 ERA (12.0 ip, 16 h, 11 r, 9 er, 3 bb, 7 so, 3 hr) in four games, all starts...also pitched in a minor league game against the Cubs March 16 (5.0 ip, 5 h, 2 r, 2 er, 4 bb, 3 so) and started and won in the exhibition game against Italy's WBC team March 5 (3.0 ip, 1 h, 1 bb, 3 so)...faced just two batters March 10 against Arizona before leaving the game with a strained right trapezius...allowed a .314 (16 for 51) opponents batting average.

2012 RECAP: Completed his rehab from "Tommy John" surgery in late August and made six starts before his regular season ended when he strained his right oblique Sept. 19...went 4-2 with a 2.57 ERA and .225 opponents batting average...allowed just one home run in 35.0 innings.

OPPONENTS BATTING: His opponents batting average included a .219 (7-for-32) mark against left-handed hitters compared to .227 (22-for-97) against right-handers...had 22 of his 25 strikeouts against righties...allowed a .148 average with runners in scoring position...opponents were 0-for-10 with RISP and two outs...has held the opposition to a .212 (47-for-222) batting average with runners in scoring position over his last four seasons after allowing a .314 mark in his rookie campaign of 2009...had a .194 opponents batting average the first two times through the lineup, .323 with his only home run after that...walked just one batter to lead off an inning.

SPLITS: Was 2-0 with a 1.38 ERA in his two starts in Oakland compared to 2-2 with a 3.27 ERA in four starts on the road...logged a 3-1 record, a 1.61 ERA and .188 opponents batting average in four starts at night compared to 1-1 with a 4.26 ERA and .286 opponents average in two starts during the day.

ON THE BASES: Had one pickoff and now has 14 in his 71 career starts...opponents were 1-for-2 in stolen bases attempts...they are now 15-for-28 (53.6%) over the last four years after going 14-for-18 (77.8%) during his rookie campaign.

RUN SUPPORT: Received no run support in each of his two losses...is now 2-23 in 36 career starts with run support of fewer than three runs, 24-4 in 35 starts with support of three runs or more.

MORE 2012: Was reinstated from the disabled list Aug. 20 and started the next day against Minnesota...allowed just one run in 7.0 innings for the win...it was his first start since June 5, 2011 at Boston and his first win since May 26, 2011 at Los Angeles (AL)...combined with Cook and Balfour on a two-hit shutout in his second start, a 3-0 win at Cleveland Aug. 27...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed both of the hits...allowed one run in each of his next two starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1918 to begin his season with four consecutive starts of one run or fewer...won each of his first four starts to become the first Oakland pitcher to start the season by winning at least his first four starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990...the four-game winning streak matched the longest of his career (third time, last: Sept. 6 to Oct. 2, 2010)...had a 0.69 ERA, a .185 opponents batting average and three walks in 26.0 innings over his first four starts...then lost each of his final two starts, logging an 8.00 ERA, a .324 opponents batting average and four walks in 9.0 innings...left his final start Sept. 19 at Detroit after just 2.1 innings with the oblique injury...returned to start and win Game 3 of the ALDS against Detroit in Oakland...combined with Cook, Doolittle and Balfour on a four-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win...tossed 6.0 innings and allowed two of the hits (2 bb, 6 so).

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Jarrod Parker (0-2, 10.80 ERA): Is scheduled to make his fourth start of the season...has yielded a .700 batting average to the first three batters in the order, .265 against everyone else...was the losing pitcher in his last start, a 10-1 A's loss to Detroit last Sunday in Oakland (3.1 ip, 9 h, 8 r, 8 er, 2 bb, 2 so)...is 0-1 with a 4.50 ERA (12.0 ip, 15 h, 6 r, 6 er, 5 bb, 9 so, 1 hr) in two career starts against Tampa Bay, both last year...was 0-2 with a 7.45 ERA (19.1 ip, 25 h, 18 r, 16 er, 5 bb, 13 so, 5 hr) in five games, all starts, this spring...went 13-8 with a 3.47 ERA in 29 starts last year...tied with fellow rookie Tommy Milone for the team lead in wins as they both set an Oakland record for wins by a rookie.

ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

3-0, 2.24 ERA (52.1 ip, 43 h, 16 r, 13 er, 16 bb, 43 so, 4 hr)

Save/Save Opportunities: 3/5 (60.0%)

The A's bullpen allowed four runs on Wednesday after allowing one earned run or fewer in each of the previous 13 games (6 er in 43.1 ip, 1.25 ERA)...now has a 2.24 ERA for the season, which ranks third in the American League...is tied for second in the AL in wins (3), ranks third in opponents on-base percentage (.275) and fourth in innings pitched (52.1)...first batters faced are 9 for 50 (.180) with a walk...the .192 on-base percentage against first batters faced is the lowest in the majors...A's relievers have allowed three home runs in the last two games (6.0 ip) after allowing just one over the first 14 contests (46.1 ip).

- Is 3 for 3 in save opportunities and has now converted each of his last 21 save chances dating back to last season...that is tied for the third longest streak in Oakland history...his last blown save came on April 29, 2012 at Baltimore.
- Has a .231 opponents batting average, including .091 (1 for 11) against left-handed hitters compared to .333 (5 for 15) against right-handers.
- Converted all three of his save opportunities in five games against Tampa Bay last year (5.1 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 4 so, 1.69 ERA).
- Posted a 2.25 ERA in four spring training appearances...opponents were 2 for 14 (.143) with no walks in 4.0 innings...had arthroscopic surgery February 14 to perform a lateral meniscectomy of his right knee and did not pitch in a Cactus League game until March 21.
- Had two stints as the A's closer in 2012 and saved a team-leading 24 games in a team-high 75 appearances while posting a 2.53 ERA...was charged with just two blown saves and his save percentage of 92.3 ranked fourth in the American League...was 10th in saves.

- Allowed his first run of the season in his last appearance last Sunday against Detroit after starting the season with a six-game, 6.1-inning scoreless streak.
- Is tied for second among American League relievers in appearances (8) and tied for ninth in strikeouts (10).
- His .222 opponents batting average includes a .111 (1 for 9) mark against left-handed hitters compared to .278 (5 for 18) against right-handers.
- Did not allow a run in four appearances against Tampa Bay last year (7.0 ip, 2 h, 3 bb, 10 so) and opponents were 2 for 23 (.087)...has a save and a 0.61 ERA (1 er in 14.2 ip) in 12 career outings against the Rays.
- Completed his sixth season in an Oakland uniform last year, but it was just his second full season (2010)...was 5-1 with a save, a 2.48 ERA and a .201 opponents batting average in 63 relief appearances...the ERA and opponents batting average were the lowest marks of his career.

AMONG THE LEADERS: His winning percentage was 10th best among all AL pitchers...allowed just 11 home runs in 181.1 innings, an average of 0.55 per nine innings...that was the second lowest mark in the AL and third lowest in the majors...had a .358 opponents slugging percentage, which was sixth lowest in the AL...tied for first in the AL in sacrifice hits allowed (7), tied for third in sacrifice flies (8), ranked fifth in stolen bases against (21) and tied for sixth in wild pitches (10).

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his fourth start of the season...the A's are 3-0 in his starting assignments this year and 23-11 (.676) in his career...his teams are 28-11 (.718) in his 39 career starts...has tossed at least six innings in two of his three starts, allowed two runs or fewer twice and walked two batters or fewer twice.

3-0: Has won each of his first three starts and is one of **three** three-game winners in the American League...is the first pitcher on an A's Opening Day roster to win each of his first three starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990...won his final two decisions last year and now has a career-high five-game winning streak dating back to September 9 of last year...has a 3.11 ERA (16 er in 46.1 ip) and .308 (57 for 185) over that eight-start stretch...had never won more than two consecutive games in his career.
