A's vs. RAYS

The A's lost the first meeting of 2013 last night after winning the season series last year, 5-4...lost two of three in Oakland but went 4-2 in Tampa Bay...it was the A's second consecutive season series win...however, are 27-28 against the Rays since 2007...all-time, the A's are 86-53 (.619) against Tampa Bay, which is the best record against the Rays by any American League team...are 47-21 in Oakland and 39-32 at Tropicana Field.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour has converted each of his last 21 saves, which is tied for the third longest streak in A's history...his last blown save came on April 29, 2012.

Coco Crisp has a 12-game hitting streak (20 for 51, .392), which is tied for the longest active hitting streak in the majors...is tied for the ML lead in extra base hits (13).

Jed Lowrie had his third career four-hit game last night and is now batting .413, which ranks second in the majors.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In 1969 Dick Green triples twice in the first game of a doubleheader at Kansas City...Green drives in three of the A's runs in a 5-1 victory in game one and combines for four hits in the doubleheader...in 1971 Jim Hunter tosses a three-hit shutout as the A's win at California, 4-0...Sal Bando homers twice and singles while driving in three runs...in 1982 Dan Meyer's two-out RBI single in the bottom of the 16th inning lifts the A's to a 4-3 victory over Minnesota.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Had their three-game winning streak snapped last night to fall to 12-5...that is the second best record in the American League (Boston, 11-4) and fourth best in the majors...it is also tied for the third best record in Oakland history after 17 games and is the best since the 1990 club also started the year 12-5 (won game 18)...are in sole possession of first place in the American League West for the 10th consecutive day and have held at least a share of first place each of the last 14 days...spent just one day in sole possession of first last year and that was the final day of the season...for the season, have spent 12 days in sole possession of first, two days tied for first, three days tied for second, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth.

EARLY SEASON OFFENSE: The A's lead the majors in runs (99), doubles (42), walks (73) and extra base hits (67), are tied for the lead in stolen bases (15), rank second in on-base percentage (.356) and hits (160), third in slugging (.463), fourth in batting (.272), tied for fourth in home runs (21) and tied for sixth in triples (4)...the 42 doubles are the **most by an Athletics team over the first 17 games of the season since at least 1916** while the 67 extra base hits equal the most (1928)...the 160 hits are tied for third most in Oakland history over the first 17 games...the 99 runs are tied for fourth most and are the most since 1996 (101).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's had their season-opening six-game road winning streak snapped last night...it was the third longest season-opening road winning streak in Oakland history and the longest since the 1990 club started the year 8-0 on the road...are 0-1 on the second road trip of the season, a six-game trek to Tampa Bay (0-1) and Boston (three games)...are now 6-1 on the road for the season, which is the second best road record in the majors (Atlanta, 7-1)...went 4-2 on the last homestand against Detroit (1-2) and Houston (3-0) and are 6-4 at home...the A's are batting 325 (87 for 268) with 54 runs scored and 14 home runs in seven games on the road compared to .227 (73 for 321) with 45 runs scored and seven home runs in 10 games in Oakland...have the best road batting average in the majors...A's pitchers have allowed just two home runs in seven games on the road compared to 13 in 10 games in Oakland.

THIS AND THAT: Each of the A's last 13 games have lasted at least two hours and 59 minutes...that is the longest streak of consecutive games of at least 2:59 in Oakland history, topping the previous high of 12 from August 15-28, 1992...have played just one game under 2:46 this year (2:32 on April 4)...the A's average time of game over the first 17 games is three hours and 16 minutes...the offense ranks second in the majors in pitches per plate appearance (4.02) and the pitching staff is fifth in most pitches per game (152.1)...the A's allowed three stolen bases last night for the second consecutive game...opponents have been successful in 11 of 12 (91.7%) stolen base attempts for the season, which is tied for the highest mark in the majors with Los Angeles (AL)...the A's are 4-0 in games in which the opponent starts a left-handed pitcher and are batting a Major League leading .311 (55 for 177) against south paws overall...are 12-0 when scoring four or more runs compared to 0-5 when scoring fewer than four...tied an Oakland record Tuesday night against Houston with three triples (seventh time, last: August 3, 2002 vs. Detroit).

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 5.77 ERA (34 er in 53.0 ip) over the last six games after posting a 2.82 ERA over the first 11 contests...now have a 3.83 ERA for the season, which ranks sixth in the American League...A's starting pitchers have tossed fewer than four innings in three of the last 10 games and have a 5.88 ERA (34 er in 52.0 ip) and .311 (66 for 212) opponents batting average over that span...have a 4.61 ERA for the season, which ranks ninth in the AL...starters are tied for the AL lead in wins (9) and rank fourth in innings nitched (95.2)

DATING BACK TO LAST YEAR: The A's are 84-43 (.661) dating back to June 2 of last year, which is the best record in the majors by 4½ games (Atlanta, 79-47) and the best in the American League by 7½ games (New York, 76-50)...have hit 167 home runs 118 games since June 12 of last year, which is second most in the majors to the Yankees (177)...are 22-8 (.733) on the road since August 24 of last year.

BY DIVISION: The A's are 11-2 against American League West competition and 1-3 against everyone else....are batting .291 (131 for 450) with 19 home runs in 13 games against the AL West compared to .209 (29 for 139) with two home runs in four games against everyone else....the pitching staff has a 3.00 ERA (39 er in 117.0 ip) against the West compared to 6.39 (27 er in 38.0 ip) against everyone else....are 0-1 in this 10-game stretch against the AL East (0-1 vs. Tampa Bay, three games at Boston, four games vs. Baltimore)...this stretch ends April 29 when the A's host the Angels in a three-game series...currently have an 11-game winning streak against AL West foes, which is tied for the A's second longest streak against the West since divisional play began in 1969...it is the longest since 1994 when the record of 13 was set (June 12-August 11).

ONE-RUN GAMES AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS: The A's are 2-0 in one-run games and both of those wins have come in the last at bat...went 25-18 (.581) in one-run games last year, which was the third best record in the American League...ranked second in the AL in last at bat wins in 2012 (23)...have one walk-off win after tallying a Major League leading 14 last year...that win came in 12 innings, the A's only extra inning game of 2013...went 11-5 (.688) in extra inning games last year, which was the second best record in the AL.

NINE-GAME WININNG STREAK SNAPPED: The A's had their nine-game winning streak snapped a week ago today by Detroit...it matched their longest winning streak from last year (August 24-September 2) and was the 14th of nine or more games in Oakland history...it was the second longest in Oakland history among streaks that took place entirely in the month of April...the longest is 11 in 1981 (April 9-19).

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have five players on the disabled list (Céspedes, Nakajima, Rodriguez, Rosales, Sizemore)...Rodriguez (sprained right elbow), Rosales (strained left intercostal) and Nakajima (strained left hamstring) began the season on the DL...Sizemore (torn left ACL) was added April 10 and Céspedes (muscle strain in left hand) was added a week ago today...Rodriguez and Sizemore will both miss the remainder of the season...the A's have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one...used the DL 21 times last year, the fourth time in the last six years they used it at least 20 times.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his fourth start of the season...the A's are 1-2 (.333) in his starting assignments this year and 18-14 (.563) in his career...his teams are 19-14 (.576)...has tossed five innings or fewer in each of his three starts, allowed two runs or fewer once and walked two batters or fewer once.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .426 (23 for 54) opponents batting average over his first three starts and has issued eight walks in 11.2 innings...has yielded a .700 (14 for 20) average to the first three batters in the order, .265 (9 for 34) against everyone else.

FIRST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 7-1 loss to Seattle April 2 in Oakland...Céspedes homered in the first inning to give the A's a 1-0 lead but he allowed a three-run home run to Morse in the third inning...also allowed a RBI single to Morales in the fifth.

SECOND START: He had a no decision in the A's 9-5 win at Los Angeles April 9...surrendered a career-high tying nine hits in just 3.1 innings...also walked three batters but yielded just two runs...had a 4-0 lead when he allowed RBI singles to Trumbo and Callaspo in the third...was relieved by Resop after loading the bases with one out in the fourth...Resop escaped the jam and the A's scored five times in the seventh for the win

LAST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 10-1 loss to Detroit last Sunday in Oakland...allowed a career-high eight runs on a career-high tying nine hits in just 3.1 innings...allowed a Hunter RBI double and a Martinez RBI single in the first and a Jackson two-run home run in the second...then allowed a two-run single to Cabrera and a RBI double to Fielder in the fourth before he was relieved by Scribner, who allowed Fielder to score on a Dirks RBI single.

PARKER vs. TAMPA BAY: Is 0-1 with a 4.50 ERA (12.0 ip, 15 h, 6 r, 6 er, 5 bb, 9 so, 1 hr) in two career starts, both last year...the loss came in a 4-1 decision in Oakland on August 1...allowed a RBI single to Joyce in the first, a RBI single to Roberts in the fourth and a RBI double to Pena in the sixth...the A's were limited to a run on five hits by Cobb, Peralta and Rodney...then had a no decision in the A's 5-4 win at Tampa Bay August 24...allowed a leadoff home run to Zobrist in the second but the A's came back with two runs in the fourth...allowed a Keppinger sacrifice fly in the bottom of the fourth and an Updton RBI double in the fifth...left with the scored tied 3-3.

THIS SPRING: Was 0-2 with a 7.45 ERA (19.1 ip, 25 h, 18 r, 16 er, 5 bb, 13 so, 5 hr) in five games, all starts...also pitched in the A's minor league camp on the A's off day March 6...allowed a .309 (25 for 81) opponents batting average.

trade during the offseason and went 13-8 with a 3.47 ERA in 29 starts...tied with fellow rookie Tommy Milone for the team lead in wins as they both set an Oakland record for wins by a rookie...the previous mark of 12 was held by Chris Codiroli (1983) and Joe Blanton (2005)...had the most wins by an Athletics rookie since Harry Byrd won 15 games for the 1952 Philadelphia A's en route to Rookie of the Year honors...the A's became the first team since the 1952 Brooklyn Dodgers to have two rookies win 13 or more games (Joe Black 15, Billy Loes 13)...it was the second time in Oakland history the A's had two rookie 10-game winners...the other time was in 2009 (Anderson 11, Cahill 10)...with Milone making 31 starts, this was the third time in Oakland history the A's had two rookies with 20 or more starts (Keough and Johnson in 1978; Anderson and Cahill in 2009)...led the A's with 140 strikeouts, which was the third best mark by a rookie in Oakland history and the fourth best in Athletics history...his 29 starts were 10th most by an Oakland rookie.

ROOKIE LEADERS: Tied for second among American League rookies in wins, ranked fourth in strikeouts and innings pitched (181.1) and tied for fourth in starts...his ERA was the lowest among AL rookies with 130 or more innings, his .619 winning percentage was second best and his .248 opponents batting average was third best...received one third place vote in the BBWAA AL Rookie of the Year balloting and finished fifth

AMONG THE LEADERS: His winning percentage was 10th best among all AL pitchers...allowed just 11 home runs in 181.1 innings, an average of 0.55 per nine innings...that was the second lowest mark in the AL and third lowest in the majors...had a .358 opponents slugging percentage, which was sixth lowest in the AL...tied for first in the AL in sacrifice hits allowed (7), tied for third in sacrifice flies (8), ranked fifth in stolen bases against (21) and tied for sixth in wild pitches (10).

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .248 opponents batting average, including .247 (86-for-348) against left-handed hitters and .248 (80-for-322) against right-handers...opponents hit .215 with runners in scoring position, which ranked fourth lowest in the AL...yielded a .173 batting average to the number three hitter in the order, which was fourth lowest in the AL...eight of the 11 home runs he allowed were solo shots.

BASES ON BALLS: Issued a team-leading 63 walks, which were the fewest by a team-leader in a non-strike season in Oakland history...the previous low was 69 by Doug Johns in 1996...walked four batters or more in six of his first 12 starts (36 bb in 73.2 ip, 4.40 per nine innings)...then walked three batters or fewer in each of his final 17 starts (27 bb in 107.2 ip, 2.26 per nine innings).

THIS AND THAT: Went 5-3 with a 2.46 ERA and .209 opponents batting average over his first 13 starts, 2-4 with a 6.15 ERA and .309 opponents average over a seven-start stretch from July 7 to Aug. 14 and 6-1 with a 3.00 ERA and .252 opponents average over his final nine starts...had eight wins after the All-Star Break, which tied for third in the AL.

SPLITS: Was 6-5 at home compared to 7-3 on the road...however, had a 2.61 ERA at home compared to 4.54 on the road...had the fifth lowest home ERA in the AL...compiled a 5-2 record and 2.64 ERA in nine starts during the day compared to 8-6 with a 3.87 ERA in 20 starts at night...had the fourth lowest day ERA in the AL...posted a mark of 6-1 with a 3.03 ERA in 12 starts on five days rest or more...was 7-7 with a 3.81 ERA in 17 starts on four days rest or fewer...received one run of support or fewer in 11 of his 29 starts and was 0-8 with a 5.03 ERA in those starts...went 13-0 with a 2.65 ERA in 18 starts with support of two runs or more...allowed 20 of his 71 runs in the fifth inning for a 6.26 ERA...had a 2.98 ERA in all other innings.

SACRAMENTO: Went 1-0 with a 2.18 ERA in four starts with Sacramento...struck out 21 batters in 20.2 innings...allowed a .275 opponents batting average, including .271 (13-for-48) against right-handed hitters compared to .281 (9-for-32) against left-handers...surrendered both of his home runs to lefties...opponents were 4-for-29 (.138) with runners in scoring position.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

LHP Tommy Milone (3-0, 3.86 ERA): Is scheduled to make his fourth start of the season...has won each of his first three starts and is one of nine three-game winners in the American League...is the first pitcher on an A's Opening Day roster to win each of his first three starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990...was the winning pitcher in his last start, an 11-2 A's win over Houston last Monday in Oakland (6.2 ip, 8 h, 2 r, 2 er, 6 so)...is 1-1 with a 8.18 ERA (11.0 ip, 12 h, 10 r, 10 er, 5 bb, 5 so) in two career starts against Tampa Bay, both last year...was 3-0 with a 4.63 ERA (23.1 ip, 28 h, 12 r, 12 er, 5 bb, 17 so, 3 hr) in six games, all starts, this spring.

The A's bullpen has allowed four runs in each of the last two games (8 er in 10.0 ip, 7.20 ERA) after allowing one earned run or fewer in each of the previous 13 games (6 er in 43.1 ip, 1.25 ERA)...now has a 2.58 ERA for the season, which ranks fourth in the American League...is tied for second in the AL in wins (3) and ranks third in opponents on-base percentage (.275) and innings pitched (59.1)...first batters faced are 10 for 54 (.185) with a walk...the .196 on-base percentage against first batters faced is the lowest in the majors...A's relievers have allowed four home runs in the last three games (13.0 ip) after allowing just one over the first 14 contests (46.1 ip).

DOMINICAN LEADERS: His 173 wins are third most among Dominican-born pitchers behind Juan Marichal (243) and Pedro Martinez (219)...also ranks third among Dominicans in games started (378), innings pitched (2412.1) and strikeouts (1843).

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

The switch-hitting infielder owns a .250 career Major League average with 35 home runs and 159 RBI... his career splits are .292 (107-for-366) with 14 home runs against left-handed pitching, compared to his .230 (180-for-782) average with 21 homers against righties...made eight starts at shortstop for Boston in the 2008 postseason...hit safely in each of his three ALDS games, including a walk-off RBI single in the ninth inning of Game 4 to give the Sox a 3-2 win and clinch the series, 3-1...became just the fourth rookie ever to end a postseason series with a walk-off hit...had three RBI in his Major League debut April 15, 2008 at Cleveland, which was the most by a Boston player in his first big league game since Merrill Combs also had three on Sept. 12, 1947...named the 2007 Red Sox Minor League offensive Player of the Year, hitting a combined .298 with 47 doubles, 13 homers and 70 RBI in 133 games between Double-A Portland and Triple-A Pawtucket...named both a Minor League All-Star and Double A All-Star by Baseball America...entered that season rated the No. 5 prospect in the Red Sox organization according to Baseball America...was number 2009 in 2006...was a New York-Penn League All-Star in his first season in 2005 and led the league with a .429 on-base percentage.

career before a miscue at third base in the second game of a doubleheader Aug. 26 at New York (AL)... was a non-roster invitee to Spring Training and accompanied the team to Japan before opening the year at Triple-A Pawtucket...selected to the ML roster when Mike Lowell went on the DL April 10...started at third base in his Big League debut April 15 at Cleveland...knocked a two-run single off Rafael Perez in the seventh inning for first hit...finished the game with three RBI, which was the most by a Red Sox in his first ML game since Merrill Combs also had three Sept. 12, 1947...hit safely in his first eight tilts with an at-bat, tallying a .357 clip through April 26...that matched the third longest by a Sox player to begin his Major League career since at least 1920 behind only nine-game runs by Ted Williams (April 20-May 4, 1939) and Shea Hillenbrand (April 2-12, 2001)...connected for his first Major League homer off Glen Perkins May 10 at Minnesota...optioned to Pawtucket May 11 and rejoined Boston July 12 after an injury to Julio Lugo...started 57 of the club's final 64 games...led all rookies with 21 doubles after All-Star break...knocked a game-winning solo homer in the 11th inning Aug. 24 at Toronto to give Boston a 6-5 victory...made eight starts at shortstop in the postseason and played in nine of Boston's 11 games overall...hit .207 with two RBI...was second on the club with a .364 average in the ALDS against Los Angeles...hit safely in each of his three ALDS games, including a walk-off RBI single in the ninth inning of Game 4 to give the Sox a 3-2 win and clinch the series, 3-1...lined a two-out pitch from Scot Shields into right field to score Jason Bay from second base...became just the fourth rookie ever to end a postseason series with a walk-off hit...was 2-for-18 (.111) with a RBI in six ALCS games against the Rays.
