ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Snapped their season-high tying four-game losing streak yesterday but have lost eight of the last 10 games...are now 5-10 since the nine-game winning streak...the four-game losing streak was just the A's third of more than three games over the last two years...have spent each of the last eight days in second place in the American League West, snapping a streak of 11 consecutive days in sole possession of first and 15 consecutive days with at least a share of first...for the season, have spent 13 days in sole possession of first, two days tied for first, eight days in second, three days tied for second, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth.

BASEBALL HAS THE SACRIFICE: Coco Crisp had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history yesterday when Eric Sogard scored on a Manny Machado error...the last was by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...the A's finished the game with back-to-back sacrifice hits after tallying just one sacrifice hit over the first 25 games...it marked the first time the A's had two consecutive sacrifice hits since August 2, 1998 against Cleveland (Christenson and Spiezio).

WALK-OFFS AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS: The A's had their second "walk-off" win of the season yesterday after logging a Major League leading 14 last year...both of those wins have come in the A's only two extra inning games of 2013...improved to 3-2 in one-run games with the win yesterday and the five one-run decisions are tied for third fewest in the AL...each of the A's one-run wins have come in the last at bat and the A's are 3-0 in games decided in the final at bat.

AGAINST THE WEST: The A's are 11-2 (.846) against American League West competition and 3-10 (.231) against everyone else (2-8 vs. East, 1-2 vs. Central)...lost the first two games of the season to Seattle but have won 11 straight against Western division foes since then...that is tied for the A's second longest winning streak against the West since divisional play began in 1969...it is the longest since 1994 when the record of 13 was set (June 12-August 11)...are batting .291 (131 for 450) with 19 home runs in 13 games against the AL West compared to .216 (93 for 431) with seven home runs in 13 games against the rest of baseball...the pitching staff has a 3.00 ERA (39 er in 117.0 ip) against the West compared to 5.68 (72 er in 114.0 ip) against everyone else.

OFFENSE: The A's scored nine runs yesterday after tallying 10 over the previous four games...have been shut out three times this year, which is tied for the American League lead...however, have scored 138 runs, which is the most in the majors...also top the majors in doubles (61), walks (117) and extra base hits (91), rank second in stolen bases (21) and third in on-base percentage (.345)...are tied for third in most grounded into double plays (24)...have hit just seven home runs over the last 15 games after clubbing 19 over the first 11 contests.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers have a .218 (46 for 211) opponents batting average the first time they face a batter in a game...have a .337 (70 for 208) average the second time, which is the highest mark in the majors...starters are 5-10 with a 5.74 ERA (67 er in 105.0 ip) and .299 (127 for 425) opponents batting average over the last 19 games (since April 9)...that includes 2-0 with a 3.12 ERA (9 er in 26.0 ip) and .247 (24 for 97) opponents average in four starts by Bartolo Colón and 3-10 with a 6.61 ERA (58 er in 79.0 ip) and .314 (103 for 328) opponents average by everyone else...are 10-12 with a 4.96 ERA (82 er in 148.2 ip) for the season...rank sixth in the American League in wins and fourth in most losses...are 11th in ERA.

MORE PITCHING: The A's have allowed 30 runs in the fourth inning for a 10.38 ERA (30 er in 26.0 ip)...that is nearly double any other inning (16 in the third and fifth)...have a 2.77 ERA (16 er in 52.0 ip) over the first two innings, a 6.92 ERA (60 er in 78.0 ip) in innings three through five and a 3.12 ERA (35 er in 101.0 ip) from the sixth inning on...the A's have compiled a 5.52 ERA (79 er in 129.0 ip) over the last 15 games after posting a 2.82 ERA over the first 11 contests...now have a 4.32 ERA for the season, which ranks 11th in the American League...have yielded 18 home runs in the last 16 games after surrendering just six over the first 10.

A's IN APRIL: The A's had four doubles yesterday and now have 61 for the season, which is an Athletics franchise record for the month of April (previous, 58 in 2003)...had six extra base hits and have 91 for the season, which is also an April record (89 in 2003)...the Oakland record for doubles in any month is 67 in September, 2004...have 138 runs, which is seven short of the April record (145 in 1996)...have 117 walks, which is nine short of the best April total (126 in 1996)...the last time the A's had more than 21 stolen bases in April was in 1990 (25)...the A's are 14-12 in April with two games remaining...need one more win to finish April with a winning record for just the second time over the last 10 years (16-11 in 2008)...however, are a combined 120-121 in April over that span.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 1-3 on this seven-game homestand against Baltimore (1-3) and Los Angeles (three games)...went 4-2 on the last homestand against Detroit (1-2) and Houston (3-0) and are 7-7 at home for the season, which is tied for the fourth worst home record in the American League...went 1-5 on the last road trip to Tampa Bay (0-3) and Boston (1-2) and are 7-5 (.583) on the road...that is the third best road record in the American League...leave following the game Wednesday for a 10-game road trip to New York (three games), Cleveland (four games) and Seattle (three games)...the A's are batting 282 (120 for 426) with 79 runs scored and 17 home runs in 12 games on the road compared to .229 (104 for 455) with 59 runs scored and nine home runs in 14 games in Oakland...have the second best road batting average in the AL and the third worst home average...A's pitchers have allowed six home runs in 12 games on the road compared to 18 in 14 games in Oakland.

THIS AND THAT: A's pinch hitters were 0 for 2 yesterday and are 1 for 22 (.045) for the season...that is the third lowest mark in the American League...however, have three RBI, which is tied for second most...pinch hitter are now 0 for their last 19 since the only pinch hit, a Jaso home run on April 9...that is the longest hitless streak by A's pinch hitters since a 0 for 23 streak from May 13-July 6, 2008...17 of the A's 26 games have last at least three hours...have not played a game under 2:32 and have an average time of game of 3 hours and 12 minutes...the offense leads the majors in pitches per plate appearance (4.05) and the pitching staff ranks seventh in most pitches per game (148.8)...opponents have been successful in 18 of 20 (90.0%) stolen base attempts, which is tied with Toronto for the highest mark in the majors...the offense has been successful in 21 of 25 (84.0%) attempts, which is third best in the AL.

A's vs. ANGELS

The A's swept a three-game series at Los Angeles April 9-11 to open the season series...scored at least four runs in all three games and are now 20-0 against the Angels over the last three years when scoring four or more runs...have been shutout in five of their last nine losses to the Angels and have scored just one run in three of those games...have won the season series from Los Angeles in each of the previous two seasons and are 24-17 against the Angels over the last three years...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 389-313 against the Angels...that includes 199-149 in Oakland and 190-164 in Anaheim...all-time, the A's are 438-390 against the Angels.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

There have been six times in Oakland history that a player has collected at least 10 doubles in the month of April...three of those instances have been this year as Coco Crisp, Josh Donaldson and Jed Lowrie each have 10...the Oakland record for doubles in the month of April is 11 by Mark Ellis in 2003.

Grant Balfour has converted each of his last 21 save opportunities, which is tied for the third longest streak in Oakland history...his last blown save was a year ago today at Baltimore.

Josh Donaldson was named American League Player of the Week today after going 12 for 22 (.545) with seven doubles, 10 RBI and seven walks in seven games.

Jed Lowrie has 32 hits, which is one short of the Oakland record for the month of April held by Stan Javier (1994) and Ben Grieve (1998).

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1998** Ben Grieve ties an Oakland record by going a perfect 5 for 5 with four runs scored in the A's 11-4 win at Cleveland...in **2000** Grieve hits his first career grand slam in the 10th inning of a 6-2 A's win at Minnesota.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his second start of the season...the A's won his only starting assignment this year and are now 6-2 (.750) in his starting assignments in his career...tossed six or more innings in four of his seven starts last year, allowed two runs or fewer three times and walked two batters or fewer five times.

BRIEFLY: Was on the A's Opening Day roster and started the fifth game of the season April 5 at Houston...was optioned to Sacramento the next day when Bartolo Colón was reinstated from the suspended list...was recalled from Sacramento today.

THE LONG BALL: Did not allow a home run in his first start after surrendering 11 home runs in 39.1 innings last year, an average of 2.52 per nine innings...the 11 home runs match the most by an Athletics pitcher over the first eight games of his career since at least 1916 (Willie Adams, 1996; Blake Stein, 1998)...eight of the 11 career home runs he has allowed are solo shots.

LAST MAJOR LEAGUE START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 8-3 victory at Houston April 5...struck out a career-high 11 batters in a career-high tying 6.2 innings...is the ninth pitcher in Oakland history to strikeout 11 or more in fewer than seven innings, the first since Kirk Saarloos on September 19, 2006 (11 so in 5.0 ip)...did not issue a walk and is the 12th pitcher in Oakland to strikeout 11 or more without walking a batter...shutout the Astros on two hits over the first five innings and had an 8-0 lead when he allowed a RBI single to Altuve in the sixth...allowed a leadoff double to Maxwell in the seventh and retired the next two batters before he was relieved by Neshek, who allowed Maxwell to score.

STRAILY vs. LOS ANGELES: Is 1-0 with a 6.35 ERA (11.1 ip, 15 h, 8 r, 8 er, 2 bb, 13 so, 6 hr) in two career starts, both last year...the no decisions came in the A's 9-8 victory in Oakland August 8...surrendered four home runs...allowed a solo home run to Morales in the second, a leadoff home run to Aybar in the third and then yielded three more runs in the fifth inning on a solo home run by Hunter and a two-run home run by Morales...left after 4.2 innings trailing 5-4 but the A's scored five times in the sixth for the win...picked up the win a 6-5 victory at Los Angeles September 11...the A's scored a run in the second but he allowed a two-run home run to Wells in the bottom of the second...blanked the Angels on one hit and one walk over the next four innings and had retired nine consecutive batters when he allowed a two-out home run to Hunter in the seventh...was relieved by Neshek with a 4-3 lead...Blevins recorded the save, escaping a no-out, first and third situation with a one run lead.

WITH SACRAMENTO: Went 3-0 with a 0.96 ERA in three starts with Sacramento...is tied for the Pacific Coast League lead in wins...has a .159 opponents batting average, including .111 (3 for 27) by left-handed hitters compared to .190 (8 for 42) by right-handers...did not allow a home run in 18.2 innings.

THIS SPRING: Was 2-2 with a 5.82 ERA (21.2 ip, 31 h, 17 r, 14 er, 7 bb, 20 so, 2 hr) in seven games, including six starts, this spring...tied for the team lead in starts...allowed a .333 (31 for 93) opponents batting average...walked one batter or fewer in six of his seven outings...his one relief appearance came on March 25 against Milwaukee.

2012 RECAP: Began the year having never pitched above Single-A but finished the season in the starting rotation in Oakland...led all of Minor League Baseball with a career-high 190 strikeouts...also went 2-1 with a 3.89 ERA in seven starts over two stints with the A's...struck out 32 batters in 39.1 innings, giving him a combined 222 strikeouts in 191.1 innings in the majors and minors (10.44 per nine innings)...was tabbed by *Baseball America* as the A's sixth best prospect following the season...was also listed as having the best slider and changeup in the magazine's Best Tools survey

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .237 opponents batting average, including .215 (20-for-93) against right-handed hitters compared to .271 (16-for-59) against left-handers...surrendered seven of his 11 home runs and issued 13 of his 16 walks to lefties...had a .253 on-base percentage and .387 slugging percentage against right-handers compared to .403 and .644 against lefties...opponents hit .265 with the bases empty compared to .185 with runners on, including .111 with runners in scoring position...held the opponents number three hitter to a .111 (2-for-18) batting average, although both of the hits were home runs.

SPLITS: Went 2-0 with a 1.83 ERA in three starts on the road, 0-1 with a 5.95 ERA at home...allowed eight home runs in 19.2 innings at home...was 2-0 with a 1.75 ERA in four starts at night compared to 0-1 with a 7.90 ERA in three starts during the day...allowed eight home runs in 13.2 innings during the day...was 2-0 with a 1.75 ERA in four starts on five days rest or more compared to 0-1 with a 7.90 ERA in three starts on four days rest...allowed eight home runs in 13.2 innings when pitching on four days rest

MORE 2012 WITH OAKLAND: Was selected from Sacramento Aug. 3 and made his Major League debut that day against Toronto...allowed just one run on five hits and a walk in 6.0 innings but had a no decision in the A's 5-4, 15-inning win...left with a 4-1 lead but Cook allowed a three-run home run in the ninth for the blown save...combined with Doolittle, Blevins, Cook and Balfour on a six-hit, 3-0 shutout at Kansas City Aug. 16 for his first ML win...tossed 6.1 innings and allowed three of the hits...was 1-0 with a 3.18 ERA over his first three starts but was optioned to Sacramento Aug. 20 when Brett Anderson was reinstated from the DL...returned Sept. 7 after the injury to McCarthy and went 1-1 with a 4.43 ERA in four starts in September.

MINORS: Was named A's Minor League Co-Pitcher of the Year along with A.J. Griffin after combining for a 9-7 record and a 2.78 ERA in 25 starts with Double-A Midland and Triple-A Sacramento...his 190 strikeouts are fourth most by a minor leaguer in Oakland history...it was the most since 1971 when Chris Floethe had 225 for Double-A Birmingham and Glenn Abbott had 195 for Single-A Burlington...the record is 231 by Vida Blue at Burlington in 1968...averaged 11.25 strikeouts per nine innings...walked 42 batters for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 4.52...was named to the *Baseball America* Minor League All-Star team...allowed a .202 opponents batting average, which ranked 11th among full season minor leaguers...that included a .189 (59-for-312) mark against right-handed hitters compared to .219 (51-for-233) against left-handers...opponents hit .202 with runners in scoring position, including .143 with RISP and two outs...went 6-2 with a 1.22 ERA and .151 opponents batting average in 11 starts in June and July.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Jarrod Parker (0-4, 8.10 ERA): Is scheduled to make his sixth start of the season...his four losses match the most in Oakland history by a pitcher in the month of April (12th time)...the four-game losing streak is the longest of his career...his 8.10 ERA and .374 opponents batting average both second highest in the majors among pitchers with 20 or more innings pitched...was the losing pitcher in his last start, a 10-2 loss to Baltimore last Thursday (5.1 ip, 8 h, 6 r, 6 er, 3 bb, 5 so)...is 1-2 with a 2.90 ERA (31.0 ip, 35 h, 10 r, 10 er, 7 bb, 22 so, 0 hr) in five career starts against Los Angeles...including a no decision in his only start this year, a 9-5 A's win at Los Angeles April 9 (3.1 ip, 9 h, 2 r, 2 er, 3 bb, 1 so).

ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

Save/Save Opportunities: 3/5 (60.0%)

The A's bullpen has allowed at least two runs in seven of its last 10 games (20 er in 33.0 ip, 5.45 ERA) after allowing one earned run or fewer in each of the previous 13 contests (1.25 ERA)...now has a 3.17 ERA for the season, which ranks seventh in the American League...is tied for third in the AL in wins (4) and ranks fourth in innings pitched (82.1)...is tied for the fewest saves (3)...is one of two AL bullpens without a loss (Cleveland)...first batters faced are 12 for 73 (.164) with three walks and a hit by pitch...the .203 on-base percentage against first batters is the lowest in the majors and the batting average ranks third...has allowed 12 of 43 (27.9%) of inherited runners to score, which ranks fifth in the AL.

- Is 3 for 3 in save opportunities and has now converted each of his last 21 save chances dating back to last season...that is tied for the third longest streak in Oakland history...his last blown save came on April 29, 2012 at Baltimore.
- His three saves are tied for 10th among American League relievers.
- Has a .235 opponents batting average, including .143 (2 for 14) against left-handed hitters compared to .300 (6 for 20) against right-handers.
- Has not allowed a run in three games on the road (3.0 ip)...has a 4.50 ERA (3 er in 6.0 ip) in six outings in Oakland.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his sixth start of the season...the A's are 1-4 (.200) in his starting assignments this year and 18-16 (.529) in his career...has tossed six or more innings in just one of his five starts, allowed two runs or fewer twice and walked two batters or fewer twice.

0-4: Has started the season 0-4 and is tied for second in the American League in losses...the four losses match the most in Oakland history by a pitcher in the month of April (12th time)...the four-game losing streak is the longest of his career...the last Oakland pitcher to begin the season by going 0-5 is Joe Blanton in 2005...the last Oakland pitcher to lose five games in a month is Brian Fuentes (May, 2011)...the last starter to lose five games in a month is Dallas Braden (September, 2010)...went 13-8 last year and his .619 winning percentage ranked 10th in the AL.

ERA: Has compiled an 8.10 ERA over his first five starts, which is the highest ERA in the majors among pitchers with 20 or more innings pitched...the last A's pitcher to post an ERA above 7.23 in the month of April with a minimum of 20 innings is Gil Heredia, who had a 9.24 ERA in 25.1 innings 2001...is tied for second in the American League in runs allowed (21).

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .374 opponents batting average, which is second highest in the majors among pitchers with 20 or more innings pitched (Blanton, LAA .392)...the highest April opponents batting average in Oakland history among pitchers with 20 or more innings is .370 by Matt Keough in 1979...is tied for second in the American League in hits allowed (37)...has allowed a .318 (21 for 66) opponents batting average over his first 60 pitches in a game compared to .485 (16 for 33) from the 61st pitch on...opponents are 9 for 24 (.375) with runners in scoring position... allowed a .215 average with RISP last year, which ranked fourth lowest in the AL...the leadoff hitter is 8 for 12 (.667) off him and the second hitter in the order is 6 for 10 (.600).

PARKER vs. LOS ANGELES: Is 1-2 with a 2.90 ERA (31.0 ip, 35 h, 10 r, 10 er, 7 bb, 22 so, 0 hr) in five career starts...is 0-2 with a 3.05 ERA (7 er in 20.2 ip) in three starts in Oakland and 1-0 with a 2.61 ERA (3 er in 10.1 ip) in two starts in Anaheim...had a no decision in his only start this year, a 9-5 A's win at Los Angeles April 9 (see second start above)...was 1-2 with a 2.60 ERA in four starts year...the no decision came in a 3-1 A's loss in 11-innings in Oakland May 23...struck out eight batters in 7.0 innings...his first loss came in a 4-0 decision in Oakland August 6...allowed a career-high tying nine hits...Weaver shutout the A's on four hits and no walks...also took the loss in a 6-1 decision in Oakland Sept. 4...yielded a RBI single to Trout in the fifth and a sacrifice fly to Callaspo in the sixth but those were the only runs he allowed in seven innings...the win came in a 3-1 decision at Los Angeles Sept. 10...allowed his only run in the third inning when Trout walked with two outs, stole second, went to third on a Kottaras throwing error and scored on a Hunter double.
