ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Had their three-game winning streak snapped Wednesday...are now 4-9 over the last 13 games after starting the season 12-4...have spent each of the last 12 days in second place in the American League West, snapping a streak of 11 consecutive days in sole possession of first and 15 consecutive days with at least a share of first...for the season, have spent 13 days in sole possession of first, two days tied for first, 12 days in second, three days tied for second, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth.

OFFENSE: The A's drew 21 walks in the three-game series against Los Angeles and now have a Major League leading 138 for the season, which is 27 more than any other team...also lead the majors in runs (162) and doubles (70), are tied for the lead in extra base hits (104), ranks second in stolen bases (25), third in on-base percentage (.348), tied for third in hit by pitches (13), sixth in hits (258) and eighth in slugging (.417)...are tied for the fifth most grounded into double plays (27)...have been shut out three times, which is tied for the American League lead...have hit just nine home runs over the last 18 games after clubbing 19 over the first 11 contests.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers have a .219 (52 for 237) opponents batting average the first time they face a batter in a game, which is sixth lowest in the majors...have a .322 (75 for 233) average the second time, which is the highest...starters are 6-11 with a 5.87 ERA (80 er in 122.2 ip) and .296 (147 for 497) opponents batting average over the last 22 games (since April 9)...that includes 2-0 with a 3.12 ERA (9 er in 26.0 ip) and .247 (24 for 97) opponents average in four starts by Bartolo Colón and 4-11 with a 6.61 ERA (71 er in 96.2 ip) and .308 (123 for 400) opponents average by everyone else...are 11-13 with a 5.14 ERA (95 er in 166.1 ip) for the season...have the third highest ERA in the American League.

MORE PITCHING: The A's have allowed 103 runs this year, 53 of which have come in the fourth and fifth innings (50.5%)...have a 3.62 ERA (35 er in 87.0 ip) over the first three innings, a 7.91 ERA (51 er in 58.0 ip) in innings four and five, and a 3.15 ERA (43 er in 123.0 ip) from the sixth inning on...have compiled a 5.26 ERA (97 er in 166.0 ip) over the last 18 games after posting a 2.82 ERA over the first 11 contests...have a 4.33 ERA for the season, which is fourth highest in the American League...have allowed 11 home runs in the last five games after allowing four over the previous seven contests.

TIME OF GAME: The A's three-game series with the Angels earlier this week lasted 13 hours and 46 minutes, including an Oakland record 6 hours and 32 minute game Monday that lasted 19 innings...it was the longest three-game series in Oakland history by over an hour, topping the 12 hour and 30 minute series here at New York last year from September 21-23...20 of the A's 29 games this year have lasted at least three hours and the A's average time of game is 3 hours and 21 minutes...the highest single season average time of game in Oakland history is 3 hours and 8 minutes in 2000...A's hitters lead the majors in pitches per plate appearance (4.04) while the pitchers rank fourth in pitches per game (153.9).

THE WEST AND THE REST: The A's are 13-3 (.813) against American League West competition compared to 3-10 (.231) against everyone else...the loss to Los Angeles on Wednesday snapped the A's Oakland record tying 13-game intra-division winning streak...also won 13 straight against the West from June 12-August 11, 1994...are batting .282 (165 for 585) with 112 runs and 21 home runs in 16 games against the AL West compared to .216 (93 for 431) with 50 runs and seven home runs in 13 games against the rest of baseball...the pitching staff has a 3.33 ERA (57 er in 154.0 ip) against the West compared to 5.68 (72 er in 114.0 ip) against everyone else.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's begin a 10-game road trip tonight that features stops in New York (three games), Cleveland (four games) and Seattle (three games)...this is the A's only trip longer than seven games this year...went 1-5 on the last road trip to Tampa Bay (0-3) and Boston (1-2) and are 7-5 (.583) on the road...that is the third best road record in the American League...went 3-4 on the last homestand against Baltimore (1-3) and Los Angeles (2-1) and are 9-8 at home...the A's are batting .282 (120 for 426) with 79 runs scored and 17 home runs in 12 games on the road compared to .234 (138 for 590) with 83 runs scored and 11 home runs in 17 games in Oakland...have the second best road batting average in the AL and the fourth worst home average...A's pitchers have allowed six home runs in 12 games on the road compared to 25 in 17 games in Oakland.

IN THE PINCH: A's pinch hitters are 2 for 27 (.074) with two walks...lead the American League in pinch plate appearances (29) but have the third lowest batting average (Cleveland 0 for 1, Baltimore 0 for 7)...however, have four pinch RBI, which is third most.

WALK-OFFS AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS: The A's recorded their second consecutive "walk-off" win Monday night and have three for the season...logged a Major League leading 14 walk-off wins last year...each of the A's three walk-off wins have come in extra innings, the A's only extra inning games of 2013...the three extra inning wins are tied with Los Angeles for the American League lead...are 3-3 in one-run games and the six one-run decisions are tied for third fewest in the AL...each of the A's one-run wins have come in the last at bat and the A's are 4-0 in games decided in the final at bat.

A's IN APRIL: The A's went 16-12 last month marking just the second time in the last 10 years the A's posted a winning record in April (16-11 in 2008)...now have five consecutive months with a winning record dating back to last June...that is the A's longest such streak since a 10-month streak from June, 2002 to September, 2003...set Athletics records for most runs (158), doubles (66), extra base hits (100) and walks (130) in April and had the second highest total in hits (250) and strikeouts (210)...the A's 25 stolen bases were their most in April since 1990 (also 25)...the 66 doubles were one short of the Oakland record for any month (67 in September, 2004)...the 130 walks were the most in any month since September, 2000 (148).

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list seven times this year...currently have five players on the DL (Anderson, Crisp, Nakajima, Rodriguez, Sizemore)...Rodriguez and Sizemore will miss the remainder of the season...the A's have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one...used the DL 21 times last year, the fourth time in the last six years they used it at least 20 times.

A's vs. YANKEES

The A's and Yankees split the season series last year, 5-5...went 4-3 in Oakland and 1-2 in New York...it marked the fifth consecutive year the A's have not won the season series with the Yankees...are 12-32 (.273) against New York since 2008, which is the worst mark by any team with 10 or more games against the Yankees over that span...are 5-14 (.263) at Yankee Stadium, which is tied with Texas for the worst record by a visiting team with at least 15 games at this park...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 226-266 against the Yankees...that includes 124-121 in Oakland and 102-145 in New York...all-time, the A's are 767-1132 against the Yankees/Orioles.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour has a streak of 21 consecutive saves, which is tied for the third longest streak in Oakland history.

The A's are 11-3 (.786) with **Yoenis Céspedes** in the starting lineup compared to 5-10 (.333) in games he doesn't start...over the last two years, the A's are 93-49 (.655) with him in the lineup compared to 17-32 (.347) when he doesn't start.

Josh Donaldson is batting .444 (16 for 36) with eight doubles, 13 RBI and 10 walks over his last 10 games...walked for the 15th time this year Wednesday, which is a new career high.

Brandon Moss is batting .425 (17 for 40) on the road, which is the highest road batting average in the American League.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In **1980** Wayne Gross and Dwayne Murphy both steal home in the A's 5-3 win against Detroit...Murphy's comes as part of a triple steal with Gross and Mitchell Page...in **2000** the A's set an Oakland record with 10 hits and 21 total bases in the seventh inning in a 14-5 win at Kansas City.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his sixth start of the season...the A's are 3-2 (.600) in his starting assignments this year and are 15-5 (.750) when he starts in his career...has tossed six or more innings in four of his five starts, allowed two runs or fewer three times and walked two batters or fewer four times.

FIRST THREE, LAST TWO: Went 2-0 with a 2.25 ERA and .222 opponents batting average over his first three starts...is 0-2 with a 9.00 ERA (11 er in 11.0 ip) and .277 (13 for 47) opponents batting average in two starts since then.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .146 (6 for 41) batting average the first time through the lineup, .425 (17 for 40) the second time and .157 (6 for 38) after that...the .425 average the second time through the lineup is second highest in the majors (Chatwood, COL .438)...has allowed a .217 (13 for 60) average and one home run against left-handed hitters compared to .271 (16 for 59) with four home runs against right-handers...opponents are 3 for 33 (.091) with two outs...including 0 for 9 with runners in scoring position and two outs...the opponents number three hitter is 1 for 15 (.067) but the clean-up batters is 7 for 12 (.583)...last year, he allowed a .359 batting average to the number three hitter, .218 against everyone else.

FIRST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 8-2 win over Seattle April 4 in Oakland...blanked the Mariners on two hits and a walk over the first four innings and had a 2-0 lead when he allowed a Saunders sacrifice fly in the fifth...the A's scored a run in the bottom of the fifth and he allowed a leadoff home run to Morse in the sixth.

SECOND START: He won his second consecutive start in the A's 8-1 win at Los Angeles April 11...matched his career-high by tossing 8.0 innings...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed his only run in the fourth inning on a Kendrick RBI double...blanked the Angels on one walk over his final four innings and the A's scored four times in the sixth for the win.

THIRD START: He had a no decision in the A's 4-3 win over Houston April 16 in Oakland...walked a career-high four batters in six innings but struck out eight...allowed two runs in the third inning on RBI singles by Maxwell and Carter...then walked Pena to load the bases with one out before retiring each of the final 11 batters that he faced...left after six innings with the A's leading 3-2 but Doolittle allowed a run in the eighth for the blown save before Donaldson had a RBI triple in the bottom of the eighth for the win.

FOURTH START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-6 loss at Boston last Monday...allowed a career-high nine runs on a career-high tying eight hits in 4.0 innings...allowed just one run over the first three innings on a Napoli RBI double in the second...had a 2-1 lead when he allowed a three-run home run to Middlebrooks in the fourth...also allowed a grand slam to Napoli in the Red Sox five run fifth inning.

LAST START: He lost his second consecutive start in the A's 7-3 loss to Baltimore last Saturday in Oakland...the A's scored single runs in the second and third innings to take a 2-0 lead...he allowed four runs in the fourth inning on a two-run home run by Markakis, a solo home run by Jones and a RBI single by Harday...then retired 10 of the final 11 batters that he faced.

GRIFFIN vs. NEW YORK: Is 1-0 with a 5.23 ERA (10.1 ip, 14 h, 6 r, 6 er, 3 bb, 8 so, 1 hr) in two career starts, both last year...the win came in a 4-3 victory in Oakland July 19...shutout the Yankees on three hits over the first five innings and retired 11 straight through the end of the fifth inning...had a 4-0 lead when he allowed two runs in the sixth inning on a Teixeira sacrifice fly and a Swisher RBI single...was relieved by Doolittle to start the seventh...had a no decision in the A's 5-4 win at New York September 23...the A's scored a run in the first and two in the second and he blanked the Yankees on a hit and two walks over the first three innings...then allowed four runs in the fourth on a two-run home run by Swisher, an RBI double by Ibanez and a RBI ground out by Nunez...the A's tied the game with a run in the fifth and he was relieved by Blevins with one out and runners on first and second in the fifth...the A's scored a run in the sixth for the win.

THIS SPRING: Was 2-2 with a 5.40 ERA (20.0 ip, 20 h, 12 r, 12 er, 4 bb, 21 so, 4 hr) in five starts this spring...walked just four batters in 20.0 innings (1.80 per nine innings)...struck out 21 for a strikeout to walk ratio of 5.25...allowed a .263 (20 for 76) opponents batting average...also pitched in a minor league game March 13 (4.0 ip, 6 h, 2 r, 2 er, 1 bb, 4 so) and started at Seattle March 8 in the game that was cancelled in the top of the fourth because of rain (3.0 ip, 4 h, 1 r, 1 er, 0 bb, 4 so).

2012 RECAP: Began the year at Double-A Midland but finished the season in the starting rotation for Oakland...went 7-1 with a 3.06 ERA in 15 starts in his Major League debut with the A's...his .875 winning percentage was the best in Oakland history and third best in Athletics history among pitchers with 15 or more starts...it topped the previous Oakland high by Tim Hudson, who went 11-2 (.846) in 1999...it was the best by an Athletic since Jim Nash went 12-1 (.923) in 1966...it was the second best mark by any ML pitcher over the last 17 years to Cliff Lee, who went 22-3 (.880) for Cleveland in 2008...it was second best by a rookie in ML history (since 1900) among pitchers with 15 or more starts to Nash in 1966...had the eighth lowest ERA in the American League among pitchers with 81 or more innings pitched...using the same minimum, it was the sixth best mark by a rookie in Oakland history...ranked 10th among AL rookies in wins...walked just 19 batters in 82.1 innings, an average of 2.08 per nine innings...struck out 64 for a strikeout to walk ratio of 3.37.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .236 opponents batting average, which included a .225 (34-for-151) mark against right-handed hitters compared to .245 (40-for-163) against left-handers...opponents were 16-for-83 (.193) with three walks (.221 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...yielded a .218 average with the bases empty but that rose to .341 with runners in scoring position.

MINORS: Was named the A's Minor League Co-Pitcher of the Year with Dan Straily after combining for a 7-3 record and a 2.82 ERA in 17 games, all starts, with Double-A Midland and Triple-A Sacramento...struck out 91 and walked just 18 in 102.0 innings...averaged 1.59 walks per nine innings with a strikeout to walk ratio of 5.06...yielded just seven home runs, an average of 0.62 per nine innings...allowed a .211 opponents batting average, including .181 (33-for-182) against left-handed hitters compared to .238 (46-for-193) against right-handers.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Bartolo Colón (3-0, 3.38 ERA): Is scheduled to make his sixth start of the season...has walked just one batter over his first five starts and 32.0 innings...leads the majors in fewest walks per nine innings (0.28) and highest strikeout-to-walk ratio (20.0)...ranks eighth in the American League in opponents on-base percentage (.266)...is 7-1 with a 2.44 ERA and .248 opponents batting average over his last 10 starts dating back to July 28, 2012...has issued just five walks in 66.1 innings over that stretch (0.68 per nine innings)...had a no decision in his last start, a 9-8 A's win in 10 innings against Baltimore last Sunday in Oakland (6.0 ip, 9 h, 5 r, 5 er, 3 so)...is 4-6 with a 6.23 ERA in 15 career appearances, 14 starts, against New York...the ERA is his highest against any AL team...went 0-1 with a 7.11 ERA (12.2 ip, 17 h, 10 r, 10 er, 1 bb, 8 so, 3 hr) in two starts last year, both in Oakland.

Save/Save Opportunities: 3/5 (60.0%)

The A's bullpen allowed at least one run in each game on the last homestand for a 4.31 ERA (15 er in 31.1 ip)...the pen now has a 3.34 ERA (24 er in 64.2 ip) at home compared to 2.43 (10 er in 37.0 ip) on the road...has a 3.01 ERA for the season, which ranks sixth in the American League...the pen is tied for second in the AL in innings pitched (101.2) and wins (5)...is one of two AL bullpens without a loss (Cleveland)...is tied for the fewest saves (3) and the fewest save opportunities (5)...first batters faced are 14 for 84 (.167) with four walks and a hit by pitch...the .209 on-base percentage against first batters is the lowest in the majors and the batting average ranks fourth...the pen tossed 14.1 innings Monday night...that was the most by A's relievers since 1969 when an Oakland record 15.1 innings were tossed by relievers September 6 against Minnesota.

- Tossed the 10th and 11th innings Monday night against Los Angeles, his first appearance of two or more innings this season.
- Is 3 for 3 in save opportunities and has now converted each of his last 21 save chances dating back to last season...that is tied for the third longest streak in Oakland history...his last blown save came on April 29, 2012 at Baltimore.
- Has a .227 opponents batting average, including .176 (3 for 17) against left-handed hitters compared to .259 (7 for 27) against right-handers.
- Converted his only save opportunity and did not allow a run in five games against New York last year (6.0 ip, 3 h, 7 so).
- Had arthroscopic surgery Feb. 14 to perform a lateral meniscectomy of his right knee and did not pitch in a Cactus League game until March 21.
- Had two stints as the A's closer in 2012 and saved a team-leading 24 games in a team-high 75 appearances while posting a 2.53 ERA...was charged with just two blown saves and his save percentage of 92.3 ranked fourth in the American League...was 10th in saves.

- Recorded the win Monday night against Los Angeles after entering the game in the 18th inning...has now been the winning pitcher in each of his past two appearances, the first time in his career he has earned the win in consecutive outings.
- Had his first Major League at bat Monday night in the 18th inning and struck out swinging...was the first A's reliever to record an at bat since Grant Balfour June 12, 2012 at Colorado.
- Has not allowed a run in 12 of his first 14 outings, including a season-opening seven-game, 6.1-inning scoreless streak.
- Ranks fourth among American League relievers in opponents on-base percentage (.183), tied for fourth in appearances (14) and is sixth in innings pitched (16.1).
- Had two wins in five appearances against New York last year (7.2 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 3 bb, 7 so, 1.17 ERA)...has a 1.15 ERA (2 er in 15.2 ip) in 12 career games against the Yankees.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his sixth start of the season...the A's are 5-0 in his starting assignments...since 1997, the only Oakland pitcher to start the season with a streak of five consecutive starts in team wins is Rich Harden, who had a nine-game streak in 2006...the A's are 19-10 (.655) in his career starts and his teams are 216-164 (.568)...has tossed six or more innings in each of his five starts this year, allowed two runs or fewer twice and walked two batters or fewer all five times.

DON'T WALK: Has walked just one batter over his first five starts, tossing at least 6.0 innings in each start...that is tied for the longest season-opening streak of consecutive starts of six or more innings and one walk or fewer by an A's pitcher since at least 1916 (Dan Haren, April 5-28, 2006)...leads the majors in fewest walks per nine innings (0.28) and highest strikeout-to-walk ratio (20.0)...is averaging the **second** fewest pitches per inning in the American League (13.6)...walked Jacoby Ellsbury to lead off the sixth inning April 23 at Boston, his first walk of the season...that snapped a streak of 32.0 innings and 121 batters faced without a walk dating back to his last walk on August 12, 2012 at Chicago (AL)...the 32.0-inning streak was the longest in Oakland history by a starter and second longest overall to Dennis Eckersley's streak of 50.1 innings from Aug. 17, 1989-June 12, 1990...did not walk a batter over his first three starts this year to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1916 to start the season with three consecutive games of five or more innings and no walks...had a four-game streak with no walks and at least five innings pitched dating back to last year, which was the longest streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.

RUN SUPPORT: Has received at least three runs of support in each start this year and has a run support average of 9.00 (32 rs in 32.0 ip)...that is the **highest** mark in the majors.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Ranks **eighth** in the American League in opponents on-base percentage (.266)...opponents are 5 for 31 (.161) with one walk (.188 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...the on-base percentage is **sixth** lowest in the AL...has allowed a .213 (17 for 80) batting average with the bases empty compared to .357 (15 for 42) with both of his home runs with runners on base...16 of his 17 home runs last year and 43 of his 51 over his previous three seasons were solo shots...has allowed a .156 (7 for 45) average the first time through the lineup, .325 (25 for 77) after that.

NOT WILD: Does not have a wild pitch over his first five starts...did not issue a wild pitch last year and his 152.1 innings were fourth most in Oakland history among pitchers with no wild pitches...has not had a wild pitch in each of his last 61 games and 368.2 innings...his last wild pitch was May 26, 2009 at Los Angeles (AL).

LAST 10 STARTS: Is 7-1 with a 2.44 ERA (18 er in 66.1 ip) and .248 (64 for 258) opponents batting average over his last 10 starts dating back to July 28, 2012...has issued just five walks in 66.1 innings over that stretch (0.6 per nine innings).

ACTIVE LEADERS: Is **tied for third** among active pitchers in complete games (33), **tied for sixth** in shutouts (10), ranks **seventh** in wins (174), strikeouts (1853) and games started (380) and **eighth** in innings pitched (2425.1).

DOMINICAN LEADERS: His 174 wins are third most among Dominican-born pitchers behind Juan Marichal (243) and Pedro Martinez (219)...also ranks third among Dominicans in games started (380), innings pitched (2425.1) and strikeouts (1853).

SHUTOUT: Tossed a three-hit shutout April 23 at Boston in a rain-shortened seven inning game...it was his 10th career shutout, his first since May 30, 2011 at Oakland...at the age of 39 years, 334 days, he became the second oldest pitcher in Oakland history to pitch a shutout...Don Sutton is the oldest, as he was 40 years, 85 days on June 6, 1985 when he blanked Chicago 10-0...the seven-inning shutout was third shortest in Oakland history...Chuck Dobson pitched 5.1 innings June 11, 1968 at Cleveland and Vida Blue fired 6.0 innings April 9, 1971 against Kansas City...the last complete game of fewer than eight innings by an A's pitcher was by Steve Ontiveros on May 16, 1995 against Chicago (5.0 ip).

FIRST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-3 win at Houston April 6...retired 11 of the first 12 batters...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a three-run home run to Castro in the fourth innings...those were the only runs he would allow in six innings and the A's scored four times in the sixth for the win.

SECOND START: He had a no decision in the A's 4-3, 12-inning win over Detroit April 12...allowed all three of his runs in the third inning on a three-run home run by Fielder...the A's came back with single runs in the third, sixth and seventh to get him off the hook...allowed eight hits, all to the top four hitters in the order...the bottom five were 0 for 15.

THIRD START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 7-5 win over Houston April 17 in Oakland...he allowed a run in the first inning when Altuve singled, went to third on a Castro single, and scored on a Carter fielders choice...the A's came back with six runs in the bottom of the first and he retired 15 of the 17 hitters he faced over his final five innings.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 9-8, 10-inning win against Baltimore last Sunday in Oakland...blanked the Orioles on one hit over the first three innings to extend his scoreless streak to 15.0 innings...then allowed four runs in the fourth inning on a Jones RBI single, a Davis two-run double and a Wieters sacrifice fly...also allowed a RBI double to Jones in the fifth and left after six innings trailing 5-4.

COLÓN vs. NEW YORK: Is 4-6 with a 6.23 ERA (82.1 ip, 90 h, 63 r, 57 er, 35 bb, 72 so, 21 hr) in 15 career appearances, 14 starts...the ERA is his highest against any American League team...is 2-4 with a 6.84 ERA (37 er in 48.2 ip) in nine games, eight starts, in his home ballparks and was 2-2 with a 5.35 ERA (20 er in 33.2 ip) in six starts in Old Yankee Stadium...pitched for New York in 2011 and went 4-5 with a 4.68 ERA (38 er in 73.0 ip) in 13 games, 11 starts, at Yankee Stadium...went 0-1 with a 7.11 ERA (12.2 ip, 17 h, 10 r, 10 er, 1 bb, 8 so, 3 hr) in two starts last year, both in Oakland...the loss came in a 9-2 decision May 26...allowed a solo home run to Cano in the second, a RBI single to Jeter in the third and a solo home run to Teixeira in the fourth...then allowed three runs in the fifth inning on a Rodriguez sacrifice fly and a two-run single by Teixeira...had a no decision in the A's 5-4 win July 22...allowed three runs in the third inning on a Teixeira RBI single and a Rodriguez two-run double...also surrendered a solo home run to Granderson in the fourth to make the score 4-0...the A's eventually won the game in 12 innings on a Crisp RBI single.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his third start of the season...the A's have won both of his starting assignment this year and are 7-2 (.778) in his starting assignments in his career...tossed six or more innings in four of his seven starts last year, allowed two runs or fewer three times and walked two batters or fewer five times.

BRIEFLY: Was on the A's Opening Day roster and started the fifth game of the season April 5 at Houston...was optioned to Sacramento the next day when Bartolo Colón was reinstated from the suspended list...went 3-0 with a 0.96 ERA in three starts with the River Cats before being recalled from Sacramento last Monday to start for Brett Anderson...started that night, was optioned to Sacramento Tuesday and recalled Wednesday when Anderson went on the DL.

THE LONG BALL: Allowed two home runs in his last start and has now surrendered 13 home runs in nine career starts and 50.2 innings (2.31 per nine innings)...the 13 home runs are the most by an Athletics pitcher over the first nine games of his career since at least 1916...10 of the 13 have been solo shots...has surrendered 10 home runs in 24.1 career innings in the Coliseum compared to three in 26.1 innings on the road.

FIRST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 8-3 victory at Houston April 5...struck out a career-high 11 batters in a career-high tying 6.2 innings...is the ninth pitcher in Oakland history to strikeout 11 or more in fewer than seven innings, the first since Kirk Saarloos on September 19, 2006 (11 so in 5.0 ip)...did not issue a walk and is the 12th pitcher in Oakland to strikeout 11 or more without walking a batter...shutout the Astros on two hits over the first five innings and had an 8-0 lead when he allowed a RBI single to Altuve in the sixth...allowed a leadoff double to Maxwell in the seventh and retired the next two batters before he was relieved by Neshek, who allowed Maxwell to score.

THIS SPRING: Was 2-2 with a 5.82 ERA (21.2 ip, 31 h, 17 r, 14 er, 7 bb, 20 so, 2 hr) in seven games, including six starts, this spring...tied for the team lead in starts...allowed a .333 (31 for 93) opponents batting average...walked one batter or fewer in six of his seven outings...his one relief appearance came on March 25 against Milwaukee.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his seventh start of the season...the A's are 2-4 (.333) in his starting assignments this year and 19-16 (.543) in his career...has tossed six or more innings in just two of his six starts, allowed two runs or fewer twice and walked two batters or fewer twice.

FIRST WIN: Picked up his first win of the season in his last start to snap his season-opening and career-high four-game losing streak...posted a 8.10 ERA and .374 opponents batting average during the streak.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 1-3 with a 9.61 ERA (21 er in 19.2 ip) in four starts in Oakland compared to 0-1 with a 2.79 ERA (3 er in 9.2 ip) in two starts on the road...last year, he was 6-5 with a 2.61 ERA at home compared to 7-3 with a 4.54 ERA on the road...had the fifth lowest home ERA in the American League.
