A's vs. INDIANS

The A's have lost the first two meetings of 2013 after winning the season series last year, 8-2...the loss on Monday snapped the A's eight-game winning streak against the Indians, which tied for second longest in Oakland history...went 4-2 in Oakland last year and swept a four-game series Cleveland...this is the third consecutive season the A's have made one trip to Cleveland and played a four-game series...the A's have won the season series in three of the previous four years and are 21-14 against the Indians since 2009...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 258-224 against the Indians...that breaks down to 136-98 in Oakland and 122-126 in Cleveland...including 37-57 Progressive Field...all-time, A's are 893-1017 against at the

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour has converted each of his last 23 save opportunities, which is the third longest streak in Oakland history...his last blown save came on April 29, 2012 at Baltimore.

Josh Donaldson is batting .377 (20 for 53) with eight doubles, a home run, 15 RBI and 12 walks over his last 15 games.

Brandon Moss ranks second in the American League with a .385 (20 for 52) batting average on the road.

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In 1906 pitcher Chief Bender is inserted into the game in left field in the sixth inning and hits two inside the park home runs in a game against the Boston Pilgrims...in 1968, the A's first year in Oakland, Catfish Hunter tosses a perfect game and almost single handedly defeats Minnesota 4-0...he strikes out 11 and also collects three hits while driving in three of the A's four runs...in 1992 Dennis Eckersley records his 200th career save in the A's 8-6 win over New York.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have lost two straight after winning five of the previous seven...are now 6-12 over the last 18 games after starting the season 12-4...have spent each of the last 17 days in second place in the American League West...trail Texas by 2½ games for the fourth consecutive day...the largest deficit of the season is 3½, last on April 27...for the season, have spent 13 days in sole possession of first, two days tied for first, 17 days in second, three days tied for second, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth.

OFFENSE: The A's were shutout for the fourth time this year last night, which is tied with Houston for the most in the American League...A's pitchers have allowed just seven runs in those four games, including two 1-0 losses...however, the A's have scored a Major League leading 174 runs for the season...also lead the majors in doubles (76) and walks (153), rank second in extra base hits (115), tied for third in hit by pitches (14), fourth in on-base percentage (.339) and tied for fourth in hits (294).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 12-16 with a 4.82 ERA (105 er in 196.0 ip), which is fourth highest in the American League...are also tied for second in most losses (16), tied for third in most home runs allowed (28) and have the fourth highest opponents batting average (.275)...have a .214 (60 for 281) opponents batting average the first time they face a batter in a game, which is fourth lowest in the majors...have a .316 (86 for 272) average the second time, which is the highest mark in the majors...starters are 7-14 with a 5.32 ERA (90 er in 152.1 ip) and .286 (175 for 611) opponents batting average over the last 27 games (since April 9)...that includes 2-1 with a 3.45 ERA (12 er in 31.1 ip) in five starts by Bartolo Colón and 5-13 with a 5.81 ERA (78 er in 121.0 ip) by everyone else.

MORE PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 4.85 ERA (112 er in 208.0 ip) over the last 23 games and now have a 4.18 ERA for the season, which ranks fifth highest in the American League...have allowed 158 runs this year, 57 of which have come in the fourth and fifth innings (36.1%)...have a 3.44 ERA (39 er in 102.0 ip) over the first three innings, a 7.28 ERA (55 er in 68.0 ip) in innings four and five, and a 3.28 ERA (51 er in 140.0 ip) from the sixth inning on...have surrendered 17 home runs in the last 10 games after allowing 20 over the first 24 contests

IN THE PINCH: Luke Montz grounded out as a pinch hitter last night and the A's are 2 for 32 (.063) with two walks in the pinch for the season...lead the American League in pinch plate appearances (34) but have the third lowest batting average (Cleveland 0 for 3, Baltimore 0 for 9)...however, have four pinch RBI, which is tied for third most

ON THE BASES: The A's are tied for second in the American League in stolen bases (25)...opponents have 22 stolen bases, which is tied for third most...with just four caught stealings, the opponents stolen base percentage of 84.6% is tied for third highest in the AL...A's pitchers have three pickoffs, which is tied for second.

THE WEST AND THE REST: The A's are 13-3 (.813) against American League West competition compared to 5-13 (.278) against everyone else...are batting .282 (165 for 585) with 112 runs and 21 home runs in 16 games against the AL West compared to .217 (130 for 598) with 62 runs and 12 home runs in 18 games against the rest of baseball...the pitching staff has a 3.33 ERA (57 er in 154.0 ip) against the West compared to 5.02 (87 er in 156.0 ip) against everyone else...the loss to Los Angeles a week ago today snapped the A's Oakland record tying 13-game intra-division winning streak...also won 13 straight against the West from June 12-August 11, 1994.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 2-3 on this 10-game road trip to New York (2-1), Cleveland (0-2) and Seattle (three games)...this is the A's only trip longer than seven games this year...went 1-5 on the last road trip to Tampa Bay (0-3) and Boston (1-2) and are 9-8 on the road...are one of five American League teams with a winning record on the road...went 3-4 on the last homestand against Baltimore (1-3) and Los Angeles (2-1) and are 9-8 at home...the A's have hit 22 home runs on the road compared to 11 in Oakland...however, the pitching staff has allowed 25 home runs at home compared to 12 on the road.

TIME OF GAME: The A's played their fastest game of the season last night, a 2 hour and 28 minute contest...22 of the A's 34 games this year have lasted at least three hours and the A's average time of game is 3 hours and 17 minutes...the highest single season average time of game in Oakland history is 3 hours and 8 minutes in 2000...A's hitters rank second in the majors in pitches per plate appearance (4.04) while the pitchers rank fifth in pitches per game (151.1).

WALK-OFFS AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS: The A's have three "walk-off" wins this season after logging a Major League leading 14 last year...each of the A's three walk-off wins have come in extra innings, the A's only extra inning games of 2013...the three extra inning wins are tied with Kansas City and Los Angeles for the American League lead...are 4-4 in one-run games and the seven one-run decisions are tied for third fewest in the AL...three of the A's one-run wins have come in the last at bat and the A's are 4-0 in games decided in the final at bat

A's IN APRIL: The A's went 16-12 last month marking just the second time in the last 10 years the A's posted a winning record in April (16-11 in 2008)...now have five consecutive months with a winning record dating back to last June...that is the A's longest such streak since a 10-month streak from June, 2002 to September, 2003...set Athletics records for most runs (158), doubles (66), extra base hits (100) and walks (130) in April...the 66 doubles were one short of the Oakland record for any month (67 in September, 2004).

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list nine times this year...currently have seven players on the DL (Anderson, Crisp, Nakajima, Reddick, Rodriguez, Sizemore, Young)...Rodriguez and Sizemore will miss the remainder of the season...the A's have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one...used the DL 21 times last year, the fourth time in the last six years they used it at least 20 times.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his seventh start of the season...the A's are 4-2 (.667) in his starting assignments this year and are 16-5 (.762) when he starts in his career...has tossed six or more innings in five of his six starts, allowed two runs or fewer four times and walked two batters or fewer five times.

143 (7 for 49) batting average the first time through the lineup, .417 (20 for 48) the second time and .156 (7 for 45) after that...the .417 average the second time through the lineup is second highest in the American League (Beavan, SEA .419)...has surrendered four of his five home runs to right-handed hitters...opponents are 5 for 42 (.119) with two outs...including 0 for 13 with runners in scoring position and two outs...the opponents number three hitter is 1 for 18 (.056) but the clean-up batter is 7 for 15 (.467)...last year, he allowed a .359 batting average to the number three hitter, .218 against everyone else.

FIRST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 8-2 win over Seattle April 4 in Oakland...blanked the Mariners on two hits and a walk over the first four innings and had a 2-0 lead when he allowed a Saunders sacrifice fly in the fifth...the A's scored a run in the bottom of the fifth and he allowed a leadoff home run to Morse in the sixth.

SECOND START: He won his second consecutive start in the A's 8-1 win at Los Angeles April 11...matched his career-high by tossing 8.0 innings...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed his only run in the fourth inning on a Kendrick RBI double...blanked the Angels on one walk over his final four innings and the A's scored four times in the sixth for the win.

THIRD START: He had a no decision in the A's 4-3 win over Houston April 16 in Oakland...walked a career-high four batters in six innings but struck out eight...allowed two runs in the third inning on RBI singles by Maxwell and Carter...then walked Pena to load the bases with one out before retiring each of the final 11 batters that he faced...left after six innings with the A's leading 3-2 but Doolittle allowed a run in the eighth for the blown save before Donaldson had a RBI triple in the bottom of the eighth for the win.

FOURTH START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-6 loss at Boston last Monday...allowed a career-high nine runs on a career-high tying eight hits in 4.0 innings...allowed just one run over the first three innings on a Napoli RBI double in the second...had a 2-1 lead when he allowed a three-run home run to Middlebrooks in the fourth...also allowed a grand slam to Napoli in the Red Sox five run fifth inning.

FIFTH START: He lost his second consecutive start in the A's 7-3 loss to Baltimore April 27 in Oakland...the A's scored single runs in the second and third innings to take a 2-0 lead...he allowed four runs in the fourth inning on a two-run home run by Markakis, a solo home run by Jones and a RBI single by Harday...then retired 10 of the final 11 batters that he faced.

LAST START: He combined with Doolittle and Balfour on a six-hit 2-0 shutout at New York last Friday...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed all six of the hits...allowed just one base runner as far as third base and that was in the third inning when Stewart walked and went to third on a Cano double.

GRIFFIN vs. CLEVELAND: Is making his first career appearance.

THIS SPRING: Was 2-2 with a 5.40 ERA (20.0 ip, 20 h, 12 r, 12 er, 4 bb, 21 so, 4 hr) in five starts this spring...walked just four batters in 20.0 innings (1.80 per nine innings)...struck out 21 for a strikeout to walk ratio of 5.25...allowed a .263 (20 for 76) opponents batting average...also pitched in a minor league game March 13 (4.0 ip, 6 h, 2 r, 2 er, 1 bb, 4 so) and started at Seattle March 8 in the

game that was cancelled in the top of the fourth because of rain (3.0 ip, 4 h, 1 r, 1 er, 0 bb, 4 so).

2012 RECAP: Began the year at Double-A Midland but finished the season in the starting rotation for Oakland...went 7-1 with a 3.06 ERA in 15 starts in his Major League debut with the A's...his .875 winning percentage was the best in Oakland history and third best in Athletics history among pitchers with 15 or more starts...it topped the previous Oakland high by Tim Hudson, who went 11-2 (.846) in 1999...it was the best by an Athletic since Jim Nash went 12-1 (.923) in 1966...it was the second best mark by any ML pitcher over the last 17 years to Cliff Lee, who went 22-3 (.880) for Cleveland in 2008...it was second best by a rookie in ML history (since 1900) among pitchers with 15 or more starts to Nash in 1966...had the eighth lowest ERA in the American League among pitchers with 81 or more innings pitched...using the same minimum, it was the sixth best mark by a rookie in Oakland history...ranked 10th among AL rookies in wins...walked just 19 batters in 82.1 innings, an average of 2.08 per nine innings...struck out 64 for a strikeout to walk ratio of 3.37.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .236 opponents batting average, which included a .225 (34-for-151) mark against right-handed hitters compared to .245 (40-for-163) against left-handers...opponents were 16-for-83 (.193) with three walks (.221 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...yielded a .218 average with the bases empty but that rose to .341 with runners in scoring position.

SPLITS: Was 7-1 with a 2.34 ERA in 10 starts at night, 0-0 with a 5.23 ERA in five starts during the day...was 3-0 with a 1.95 ERA in five starts against AL West competition.

MINORS: Was named the A's Minor League Co-Pitcher of the Year with Dan Straily after combining for a 7-3 record and a 2.82 ERA in 17 games, all starts, with Double-A Midland and Triple-A Sacramento...struck out 91 and walked just 18 in 102.0 innings...averaged 1.59 walks per nine innings with a strikeout to walk ratio of 5.06...yielded just seven home runs, an average of 0.62 per nine innings...allowed a .211 opponents batting average, including .181 (33-for-182) against left-handed hitters compared to .238 (46-for-193) against right-handers.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Bartolo Colón (3-1, 3.62 ERA): Is scheduled to make his seventh start of the season...has walked just one batter over his first six starts, tossing at least 5.0 innings in each start...that is tied for the longest season-opening streak of consecutive starts of five or more innings and one walk or fewer by an A's pitcher since at least 1916 (Dan Haren, April 5-May 3, 2006)...leads the majors in fewest walks per nine innings (0.24) and highest strikeout-to-walk ratio (23.0)...is averaging the second fewest pitches per inning in the majors (13.6)...has not had a wild pitch in each of his last 62 games and 374.0 innings...his last wild pitch was May 26, 2009 at Los Angeles (AL)...was the losing pitcher in his last start, a 4-2 decision at New York last Saturday (5.1 ip, 6 h, 3 r, 3 er, 0 bb, 3 so)...is 6-3 with a 3.28 ERA (68.2 ip, 60 h, 26 r, 25 er, 18 bb, 41 so, 7 hr) in 10 career appearances against Cleveland, all starts...spent the first five and one-half seasons of his big league career with the Indians and is 37-22 with a 3.94 ERA (240 er in 547.2 ip) in 85 career appearances, including 83 starts, at Progressive Field...last pitched at Progressive Field May 18, 2005, a 2-1 win for Los Angeles...was the winning pitcher in his only start last year, an 8-5 victory August 18 in Oakland (8.0 ip, 5 h, 1 r, 1 er, 3 so).

The A's bullpen has allowed at least one run in 10 of the past 12 games (20 er in 43.2 ip, 4.12 ERA)...has yielded at least two runs seven times over that span...now has a 3.08 ERA for the season, which ranks sixth in the American League...ranks second in the AL in opponents on-base percentage (.293), third in innings pitched (114.0), tied for third in wins (5) and is fourth in opponents batting average (.227)...is one of two AL bullpens without a loss (Cleveland)...first batters faced are 17 for 97 (.175) with four walks and a hit by pitch...the .212 on-base percentage against first batters is the lowest in the majors and the batting average ranks fourth.

- His five saves are tied for ninth in the American League.
- Has not allowed a run in his past four games and 4.1 innings and has two saves over that span.
- Has not allowed a run in five appearances on the road (4.1 ip)...has a 3.00 ERA (3 er in 9.0 ip) in eight outings at home.
- Has 0.96 ERA (1 er in 9.1 ip) in nine appearances with two days rest or fewer compared to 4.50 (2 er in 4.0 ip) in four games on three days rest or more.

- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more.
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19... went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.
- Had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history April 28 against Baltimore...the last was
 by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...had two walk-off sacrifice flies last year, in
