A's vs. RANGERS

This is the first meeting of 2013 between the A's and Rangers...Oakland won the season series last year, 11-8...it was just the A's second season series win over the previous seven years...are 62-71 (.466) against the Rangers since 2006...went 7-2 in Oakland last year and 4-6 in Texas...have a four-game winning streak against the Rangers in Oakland...are 303-315 all-time against the Texas Rangers...that breaks down to 163-146 in Oakland and 140-169 in Texas...have an all-time record of 400-397 against the Rangers/Senators.

Grant Balfour has converted each of his last 24 save opportunities, which is the third longest streak in Oakland history.

Josh Donaldson is batting .352 (25 for 71) with nine doubles, three home runs, 17 RBI and 13 walks over his last 20 games.

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1981** Matt Keough improves to 6-0 as the A's defeat the Yankees at New York, 5-4...in **1986** Dave Kingman hits a three-run homer in the bottom of the 10th after the A's score single runs in the seventh, eighth and ninth innings, in the A's 6-3 win over Toronto...in **2007** the A's score five times in the bottom of the ninth to defeat Cleveland, 10-7...Milton Bradley hits a two-run home run to tie the game and Jack Cust hits a three-run homer for the win as he homers in his fourth consecutive game.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have lost six of the last seven games and are one game under .500 for the second time in the last three days...the season low is two games under on April 2 (0-2)...are now 7-16 (.304) over the last 23 games after starting the season 12-4 (.750)...are in second place in the American League West for the 22nd consecutive day...trail Texas by a season-high six games...since 2006, the only other time the A's have been more than four games out in the West after 39 games was in 2009 when they were eight games back of Texas...for the season, have spent 13 days in sole possession of first, two days tied for first, 22 days in second, three days tied for second, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth...halted a season-high five-game losing streak with a 4-3 win Saturday in Seattle.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's went 3-7 on the last road trip to New York (2-1), Cleveland (0-4) and Seattle (1-2)...hit .208 (69 for 332) with 25 runs scored in the 10 games...were 11 for 60 (.183) with runners in scoring position...the trip was the A's only one longer than seven games this year...have now lost 12 of the last 16 road games after going 6-0 on the first trip...are 10-12 on the road compared to 9-8 in Oakland...begin a six-game homestand tonight against Texas (three games) and Kansas City (three games)...went 3-4 on the last homestand against Baltimore (1-3) and Los Angeles (2-1)...the A's have hit 27 home runs in 22 games on the road compared to 11 in 17 games in Oakland...however, the pitching staff has allowed 25 home runs at home compared to 21 on the road.

THE WEST AND THE REST: The A's are 14-5 (.737) against American League West competition compared to 5-15 (.250) against the Central and East...are batting .268 (183 for 683) with 120 runs and 25 home runs in 19 games against the AL West compared to .215 (143 for 665) with 67 runs and 13 home runs in 20 games against the rest of baseball...the pitching staff has a 3.62 ERA (72 er in 179.0 ip) against the West compared to 5.18 (99 er in 172.0 ip) against everyone else.

OFFENSE: The A's are batting .212 (77 for 364) with 29 runs scored in 11 games in May (2.64 runs per game) after hitting .253 with 158 runs scored in 28 games in April (5.64 per game)...lead the majors in walks (165) and top the American League in hit by pitches (16)...also rank second in the AL in doubles (82), third in runs (187) and strikeouts (313) and tied for third in extra base hits (126)...have been shut out four times, which is tied with Houston and Toronto for the most in the AL...A's pitchers have allowed just seven runs in those four games, including two 1-0 losses.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 13-20 with a 5.17 ERA (128 er in 223 ip), which is fourth highest in the American League...have the most losses (20), allowed the second most home runs (35) and have the fourth highest opponents batting average (.275)...have a .224 (72 for 322) opponents batting average the first time they face a batter in a game, which is fifth lowest in the majors, compared to .306 (95 for 310), which is third highest...are 1-6 with a 6.23 ERA (27 er in 39.0 ip) and 11 home runs allowed over the last seven games and 4-16 with a 5.82 ERA (83 er in 128.1 ip) over the last 23 contests.

MORE PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 5.02 ERA (139 er in 249.0 ip) over the last 28 games (since April 13) and now have a 4.38 ERA for the season, which ranks fourth highest in the American League...have allowed 186 runs this year, 67 of which have come in the fourth and fifth innings (36.0%)...have a 4.07 ERA (53 er in 117.0 ip) over the first three innings, a 7.27 ERA (63 er in 78.0 ip) in innings four and five, and a 3.17 ERA (55 er in 156.0 ip) from the sixth inning on...have surrendered 26 home runs in the last 15 games after allowing 20 over the first 24 contests.

ON THE BASES: The stolen base by Derek Norris yesterday snapped the A's 10-game streak without a stolen base...now have 26 stolen bases for the season, which ranks fourth in the American League...opponents have 24 stolen bases, which is fourth most...with just four caught stealings, the opponents stolen base percentage of 85.7% ranks second highest in the AL...A's pitchers have three pickoffs, which is tied for third.

IN THE PINCH: A's pinch hitters are 2 for 36 (.056) with two walks...lead the American League in pinch plate appearances (38) but have the second lowest batting average (Baltimore, 0 for 10)...however, have four pinch RBI, which is tied for fourth most.

TIME OF GAME: The A's played their fastest game of the season Wednesday night in Cleveland, a 2 hour and 26 minute contest, after playing 2 hours and 28 minutes the previous night...however, 24 of the A's 39 games this year have lasted at least three hours and the A's average time of game is 3 hours and 13 minutes...the highest single season average time of game in Oakland history is 3 hours and 8 minutes in 2000...A's hitters rank second in the American League in pitches per plate appearance (4.03) while the pitchers rank seventh in pitches per game (149.1).

WALK-OFFS AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS: The A's have three "walk-off" wins this season, which is tied with for the American League lead...logged a Major League leading 14 last year...each of the A's three walk-off wins have come in extra innings, the A's only extra inning games of 2013...the three extra inning wins are tied for the AL lead...are 5-5 in one-run games and the 10 one-run decisions are tied for the fourth fewest in the AL...three of the A's one-run wins have come in the last at bat and the A's are 4-0 in games decided in the final at bat.

A's IN APRIL: The A's went 16-12 last month marking just the second time in the last 10 years the A's posted a winning record in April (16-11 in 2008)...now have five consecutive months with a winning record dating back to last June...that is the A's longest such streak since a 10-month streak from June, 2002 to September, 2003...set Athletics records for most runs (158), doubles (66), extra base hits (100) and walks (130) in April...the 66 doubles were one short of the Oakland record for any month (67 in September, 2004).

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list nine times this year...currently have seven players on the DL (Anderson, Crisp, Nakajima, Reddick, Rodriguez, Sizemore, Young)...Rodriguez and Sizemore will miss the remainder of the season...the A's have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one...used the DL 21 times last year, the fourth time in the last six years they used it at least 20 times.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his eighth start of the season...the A's are 4-3 (.571) in his starting assignments this year and are 16-6 (.727) when he starts in his career...has tossed six or more innings in six of his seven starts, allowed two runs or fewer four times and walked two batters or fewer six times.

FIRST THREE, LAST FOUR: Went 2-0 with a 2.25 ERA, .222 opponents batting average and one home run allowed in 22.0 innings over his first three starts...is 1-3 with a 5.11 ERA (14 er in 24.2 ip), .253 (25 for 99) opponents batting average and six home runs in 24.2 innings over his last four starts.

AGAINST THE WEST: is 2-0 with a 2.25 ERA (5 er in 20.0 ip) in three starts against American League West competition compared to 1-3 with a 5.11 ERA (14 er in 24.2 ip) in four starts against everyone else...is now 5-0 with a 2.08 ERA (11 er in 47.2 ip) in eight career starts against intra-division foes and 5-4 with a 4.08 ERA (36 er in 79.1 ip) in 14 starts against everyone else.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .155 (9 for 58) batting average the first time through the lineup, .382 (21 for 55) the second time and .190 (11 for 58) after that...the .382 average the second time through the lineup is fourth highest in the American League...has allowed 15 of his 22 runs (68.2%) in the fourth and fifth innings (13 er in 13.0 ip, 9.00 ERA)...has surrendered all seven of his home runs after his 50th pitch in a game...the opponents number three hitter is 1 for 21 (.048), which is the second lowest mark in the AL...last year, he allowed a .359 batting average to the number three hitter, .218 against everyone else...opponents are 7 for 50 (.140) with two outs...including 0 for 14 with runners in scoring position and two outs.

FIRST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 8-2 win over Seattle April 4 in Oakland...blanked the Mariners on two hits and a walk over the first four innings and had a 2-0 lead when he allowed a Saunders sacrifice fly in the fifth...the A's scored a run in the bottom of the fifth and he allowed a leadoff home run to Morse in the sixth.

SECOND START: He won his second consecutive start in the A's 8-1 win at Los Angeles April 11...matched his career-high by tossing 8.0 innings...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed his only run in the fourth inning on a Kendrick RBI double...blanked the Angels on one walk over his final four innings and the A's scored four times in the sixth for the win.

THIRD START: He had a no decision in the A's 4-3 win over Houston April 16 in Oakland...walked a career-high four batters in six innings but struck out eight...allowed two runs in the third inning on RBI singles by Maxwell and Carter...then walked Pena to load the bases with one out before retiring each of the final 11 batters that he faced...left after six innings with the A's leading 3-2 but Doolittle allowed a run in the eighth for the blown save before Donaldson had a RBI triple in the bottom of the eighth for the win.

FOURTH START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-6 loss at Boston last Monday...allowed a career-high nine runs on a career-high tying eight hits in 4.0 innings...allowed just one run over the first three innings on a Napoli RBI double in the second...had a 2-1 lead when he allowed a three-run home run to Middlebrooks in the fourth...also allowed a grand slam to Napoli in the Red Sox five run fifth inning.

FIFTH START: He lost his second consecutive start in the A's 7-3 loss to Baltimore April 27 in Oakland...the A's scored single runs in the second and third innings to take a 2-0 lead...he allowed four runs in the fourth inning on a two-run home run by Markakis, a solo home run by Jones and a RBI single by Harday...then retired 10 of the final 11 batters that he faced.

SIXTH START: He combined with Doolittle and Balfour on a six-hit 2-0 shutout at New York May 3...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed all six of the hits...allowed just one base runner as far as third base and that was in the third inning when Stewart walked and went to third on a Cano double.

LAST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-3 loss at Cleveland last Wednesday...blanked the Indians on two hits over the first four innings to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high tying 14.0 innings...had a 3-0 lead entering the bottom of the fifth when he loaded the bases with no outs...allowed two runs to score on a fielders choice/error...then allowed solo home runs to Swisher and Santana in the sixth inning for the loss.

GRIFFIN vs. TEXAS: Is 0-0 with a 4.15 ERA (8.2 ip, 9 h, 5 r, 4 er, 4 bb, 4 so) in two career starts, both last year...the first no decision came in the A's 4-3 loss at Texas June 29...tossed 6.0 shutout innings and allowed just two hits...loaded the bases on two walks and a hit with one out in the second but retired each of the next 13 hitters before Hamilton singled with two outs in the sixth...was relieved by Blevins with the A's leading 2-0 entering the bottom of the seventh...Balfour allowed four runs in the eighth for the loss and Cook was charged with the blown save...also had a no decision in the A's 12-5, American League West clinching win in the final game of the regular season October 3 in Oakland...the A's scored a run in the first but he allowed five runs, four earned, in the third inning...Beltre had a RBI single, Young a RBI double, Murphy a two-run single and Soto a RBI single...left after 2.2 innings but the A's scored six times in the fourth.

THIS SPRING: Was 2-2 with a 5.40 ERA (20.0 ip, 20 h, 12 r, 12 er, 4 bb, 21 so, 4 hr) in five starts this spring...walked just four batters in 20.0 innings (1.80 per nine innings)...struck out 21 for a strikeout to walk ratio of 5.25...allowed a .263 (20 for 76) opponents batting average...also pitched in a minor league game March 13 (4.0 ip, 6 h, 2 r, 2 er, 1 bb, 4 so) and started at Seattle March 8 in the game that was cancelled in the top of the fourth because of rain (3.0 ip, 4 h, 1 r, 1 er, 0 bb, 4 so).

2012 RECAP: Began the year at Double-A Midland but finished the season in the starting rotation for Oakland...went 7-1 with a 3.06 ERA in 15 starts in his Major League debut with the A's...his .875 winning percentage was the best in Oakland history and third best in Athletics history among pitchers with 15 or more starts...it topped the previous Oakland high by Tim Hudson, who went 11-2 (.846) in 1999...it was the best by an Athletic since Jim Nash went 12-1 (.923) in 1966...had the eighth lowest ERA in the American League among pitchers with 81 or more innings pitched...using the same minimum, it was the sixth best mark by a rookie in Oakland history...ranked 10th among AL rookies in wins...walked just 19 batters in 82.1 innings, an average of 2.08 per nine innings...struck out 64 for a strikeout to walk ratio of 3.37.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Bartolo Colón (3-2, 4.57 ERA): Is scheduled to make his eighth start of the season...is 0-2 with an 8.22 ERA over his last three starts after going 3-0 with a 2.42 ERA over his first four starts...has walked just one batter over his first seven starts and 41.1 innings...leads the majors in fewest walks per nine innings (0.22) and highest strikeout-to-walk ratio (27.00)...is averaging the third fewest pitches per inning in the American League (14.3)...was the losing pitcher in his last start, a 9-2 loss at Cleveland last Thursday (4.0 ip, 8 h, 6 r, 6 er, 4 so)...is 18-7 with a 3.66 ERA in 29 career appearances, all starts, against Texas...the 18 wins are his most against any team...the only pitchers with more wins against the Texas Rangers are Bert Blyleven, Dennis Leonard and Jack Morris, all with 19...was 1-1 with a 2.40 ERA in two starts last year, both in Oakland.

The A's bullpen has a 3.75 ERA (24 er in 57.2 ip) and .244 (54 for 221) opponents batting average over the past 17 games (since April 25)...posted a 2.43 ERA and .208 opponents average in its first 21 games...now has a 3.02 ERA for the season, which ranks fourth in the American League...is tied for the lowest opponents on-base percentage in the AL (.291), ranks third in innings pitched (128.0) and is tied for fifth in wins (5)...is one of two AL bullpens without a loss (Cleveland)...first batters faced are 21 for 109 (.175) with four walks and a hit by pitch...the .224 on-base percentage against first batters is the lowest in the majors.

- Is a perfect 6 for 6 in save opportunities and has now converted each of his last 24 save chances dating back to last season...that is the third longest streak in Oakland history...his last blown save came on April 29, 2012 at Baltimore.
- Has not allowed a run in his past five games and 5.1 innings and has three saves over that span.
- Has not allowed a run in six appearances on the road (5.1 ip)...has a 3.00 ERA (3 er in 9.0 ip) in eight outings at home.
- Has allowed just one run in nine appearances (9.1 ip, 0.96 ERA) with two days rest or fewer...has a 3.60 ERA (2 er in 5.0 ip) in five games on three days rest or more.
- Was 3 for 3 in save opportunities in 10 games against the Rangers last year (4 er in 9.1 ip, 3.86 ERA)...is 4-2 with three saves and a 2.66 ERA in 36 appearances in his career against Texas (40.2 ip, 23 h, 12 r, 12 er, 23 bb, 45 so, 4 hr)...the appearances, innings pitched and strikeouts are all his most against any team.

GRANT BALFOUR

- Did not pitch in a Spring Training game until March 21.
- Is on his fifth consecutive Opening Day roster (2011-13 with Oakland, 2009-10 with Tampa Bay)

- Was hit by a pitch twice May 1 against Los Angeles (AL), tying the Oakland record (32nd time, last: Josh Willingham at Seattle, April 24, 2011).

COCO CRISP

- Was on his ninth Opening Day Roster (2004-09, 11-13), his third straight with the A's...made his eighth career Opening Start April 1 against Seattle, including three straight with the A's.
- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more.
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19... went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.
- Had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history April 28 against Baltimore...the last was by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...had two walk-off sacrifice flies last year, in addition to a single.
- Finished April with 24 runs scored to set an Oakland record for runs in April...broke the previous mark of 23 by Jose Canseco in 1988.

JOSH DONALDSON

- Had his first career game-ending RBI April 12 against Detroit, a home run in the bottom of the 12th inning.
- Was a perfect 4 for 4 April 27 against Baltimore, matching his career high in hits (August 17, 2012 vs. Cleveland).

FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 23 with a sprained right elbow.
- Had successful UCL reconstruction surgery March 27...the procedure was performed by Dr. Thomas Mehlhoff at the Texas Orthopedic Hospital in Houston, Texas.

ADAM ROSALES

- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles (AL) and ended up going 1 for 6...he and Norris had six plate appearances, which match the most in Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12, 1992 vs. Texas).
