### A's vs. RANGERS

The season series is even at two games each...the A's won the first game in Texas last night after losing two of three in Oakland last week...won the season series last year, 11-8...it was just the A's second season series win over the previous seven years...are 64-73 (.468) against the Rangers since 2006...went 7-2 in Oakland last year and 4-6 in Texas...are 305-317 all-time against the Texas Rangers...that breaks down to 164-148 in Oakland and 141-169 in Texas...including 74-81 at Rangers Ballpark...have an all-time record of 402-399 against the Rangers/Senators.

### TODAY'S TIDBITS

**Grant Balfour** has converted each of his last 26 save opportunities, which is the third longest streak in Oakland history.

**Ryan Cook** has not allowed a run in his last 19 games and 22.2 innings on the road...his 22.2-inning road scoreless streak is third longest by a reliever in Oakland history.

**Josh Donaldson** is batting .371 (36 for 97) with 13 doubles, four home runs and 20 RBI over his last 27 games.

**Jed Lowrie** had his Major League leading eighth game of three or more hits last night...is now batting .333 (31 for 93) on the road, which is tied for eighth best in the American League.

### THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In 1930 Max Bishop walks five times in the first game of a doubleheader against New York and adds three more in the second game...in 1974 Reggie Jackson becomes the first Oakland Athletic to reach 200 homers when he hits a two-run homer in the seventh inning of the A's 8-1 win at Minnesota...in 1995 the A's tie a club record by turning six double plays, but still lose at Chicago, 6-4...in 1997 Jose Canseco doubles in the seventh inning of the A's 7-3 win at Texas to become the ninth player in Oakland history with 1000 hits.

### ABOUT THE A's

**ABOUT THE A'S:** Have a four-game winning streak, which is the second longest of the season (9, April 4-12)...have now won six of the last nine games after losing a season-high five consecutive contests...are 12-18 (.400) over the last 30 games (since April 19) after starting the season 12-4 (.750)...had the second best record in the majors through games of April 18 but have the seventh worst mark since April 19...are in second place in the American League West and trail Texas by 5½ games...have spent 28 of the last 30 days in sole possession of second place in the West...for the season, have spent 13 days in sole possession of first, two days tied for first, 28 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth...swept a three-game series from Kansas City to close out the last homestand...had lost four consecutive series prior to that.

**LAST NIGHT:** The A's scored nine runs last night, the first time they scored more than five runs in the month of May...the streak of 17 consecutive games with five runs or fewer was their longest since a 22-game streak from July 20-Aug. 13, 1997...also left a season-high 15 runners on base...it was the sixth time in Oakland history the A's stranded at least 15 base runners and scored at least nine runs (last: May 7, 2004), but just the third time in a nine-inning game (April 30, 1992 at Detroit; June 22, 1993 at Seattle)...the A's stole two bases last night after stealing just one over the previous 17 games.

**THE WEST AND THE REST:** The A's are 16-7 (.696) against American League West competition compared to 8-15 (.348) against everyone else...are tied with Texas for the best intra-division record in the AL...are batting .269 (222 for 826) with 141 runs (6.13 per game) in 23 games against the AL West compared to .217 (163 for 752) with 75 runs (3.26 per game) in 23 games against the rest of baseball...the pitching staff has a 3.58 ERA (86 er in 216.0 ip) against the West compared to 4.70 (104 er in 199.0 ip) against everyone else.

**THE LONG BALL:** Seth Smith hit a solo home run last night, the A's 13<sup>th</sup> consecutive home run with the bases empty...that equals the longest such streak in Oakland history (June 1-15, 2007)...the A's last home run with a runner on base was a two-run shot by Yoenis Céspedes on May 5 at New York.

**OFFENSE:** The A's walked a season-high tying eight times last night and now have a Major League leading 187 walks for the season...lead the American League in doubles (99) and hit by pitches (20) and rank fourth in extra base hits (150)...are tied for the third fewest home runs (44), have the fourth most strikeouts (362) and the fourth lowest batting average (.244)...have been shut out four times, which is tied for third most...A's pitchers have allowed just seven runs in those four shutouts, including two 1-0 losses.

**STARTING PITCHING:** A's starting pitchers are 3-1 with a 3.11 ERA (15 er in 43.1 ip) and .232 (36 for 155) opponents batting average over the last seven games...however, are 16-21 with a 4.83 ERA (143 er in 266.1 ip) for the season...rank second in the American League in losses, tied for third in most home runs (37) and 10<sup>th</sup> in ERA...starters have a .227 (86 for 379) opponents batting average the first time they face a batter in a game, which is sixth lowest in the majors, compared to .301 (109 for 362) the second time, which is third highest.

**MORE PITCHING:** The A's have compiled a 2.67 ERA (19 er in 64.0 ip) and .220 (51 for 232) opponents batting average over the last seven games after posting a 5.11 ERA over the previous nine contests...have a 4.12 ERA overall, which ranks ninth in the American League...have allowed 206 runs, 105 of which have come in the third through fifth innings (51.0%)...have a 3.23 ERA (33 er in 92.0 ip) over the first two innings of a game, 6.46 (99 er in 138.0 ip) in innings three through five and 2.82 (58 er in 185.0) from the sixth inning on...are tied for third in the AL in pickoffs (4).

**APRIL AND MAY:** The A's are batting .229 (136 for 594) with 58 runs scored in 18 games in May (3.22 runs per game) after hitting .253 with 158 runs scored in 28 games in April (5.64 per game)...have the second lowest batting average in the American League in May (Houston, .226) and the fewest runs scored (Houston, 68)...led the majors in runs in April...have just three stolen bases this month after stealing 25 bases in April...the A's are 8-10 in May after going 16-12 in April...have posted a losing record in May in four of the previous five seasons...this April was the A's fifth consecutive month with a winning record dating back to last June...that is the A's longest such streak since a 10-month streak from June, 2002 to September, 2003.

**HOME AND AWAY:** The A's are 1-0 on this six-game road trip to Texas (1-0) and Houston (three games)...went 3-7 on the last road trip to New York (2-1), Cleveland (0-4) and Seattle (1-2) and have now lost 12 of the last 17 road games after going 6-0 on the first trip...are 11-12 on the road overall...went 4-2 on the last homestand against Texas (1-2) and Kansas City (3-0) and are 13-10 in Oakland...the A's have hit 28 home runs in 23 games on the road compared to 16 in 23 games in Oakland...however, the pitching staff has allowed 30 home runs at home compared to 21 on the road.

**THIS AND THAT:** The A's turned a season-high three double plays last night and now have 32 for the season, which is tied for second fewest in the majors...Josh Donaldson's bases loaded RBI single in the ninth inning last night snapped a 0 for 18 streak by A's batters with the bases loaded...the A's lead the American League in plate appearances with the bases loaded (63) as well as grounded into double plays (6)...are tied for the lead in doubles (5) and rank third in RBI (37)...are batting .241 (13 for 54) with the bases full...Nate Freiman struck out as a pinch hitter last night and A's pinch hitters are now 0 for their last 16...are 2 for 41 (.049) with three walks for the season...lead the AL in pinch plate appearances (44) but have the lowest pinch batting average...A's number three hitters are batting a combined .203 (38 for 187), which is the lowest mark in the majors...the A's are 18-12 (.600) in night games compared to 6-10 (.375) during the day.

**ONE-RUN GAMES AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS:** Of the A's last 21 games, 10 have been decided by one run...are 8-6 in one-run games for the season...are 6-1 in games decided in the last at bat and are tied for third in the American League in last at bat wins...are 3-1 in extra inning games and are tied for second in the AL in extra inning wins...have three "walk-off" wins.

**FOR STARTERS:** Is scheduled to make his sixth start of the season...the A's are 3-2 (.600) in his starting assignment this year and are 8-4 (.667) in his starting assignments in his career...has tossed six or more innings in just one of his starts this year, allowed two runs or fewer once and walked two batters or fewer twice.

**BRIEFLY:** Was on the A's Opening Day roster and started the fifth game of the season April 5 at Houston...was optioned to Sacramento the next day when Bartolo Colón was reinstated from the suspended list...went 3-0 with a 0.96 ERA in three starts with the River Cats before being recalled from Sacramento April 29 to start for Brett Anderson...started that night, was optioned to Sacramento April 30 and recalled May 1 when Anderson went on the DL...is 0-2 with a 7.98 ERA (13 er in 14.2 ip) in three starts since then and has issued 11 walks while striking out 10 in 14.2 innings...has a 7.27 ERA for the season, which is the second highest mark in the American League among pitchers with 25 or more innings (Humber, HOU 9.59).

**ROOKIE LEADERS:** Ranks fifth among American League rookies in strikeouts (27), tied for fifth in games started (5) and sixth in innings pitched (26.0).

**OPPONENTS BATTING:** Has allowed a .214 (9 for 42) batting average the first time through the lineup, .237 (9 for 38) the second time and .381 (8 for 21) the third time...has issued nine of his 12 walks to left-handed hitters...opponents are 10 for 23 (.435) with runners in scoring position after going 3 for 27 (.111) with RISP last year.

**THE LONG BALL:** Has allowed three home runs in five starts this year and has surrendered 14 home runs in 12 career starts and 65.1 innings (1.93 per nine innings)...the 14 home runs are the most by an Athletics pitcher over the first 12 games of his career since at least 1916 (previous, 13 by Vida Blue, Miguel Jimenez, Blake Stein and Brett Anderson)...the most over the first 13 games is 15 by Stein...10 of the 14 home runs have been solo shots...has surrendered 10 home runs in 28.2 career innings in the Coliseum compared to four in 36.2 innings on the road.

**FIRST START:** He was the winning pitcher in the A's 8-3 victory at Houston April 5...struck out a career-high 11 batters in a career-high tying 6.2 innings...is the ninth pitcher in Oakland history to strikeout 11 or more in fewer than seven innings, the first since Kirk Saarloos on September 19, 2006 (11 so in 5.0 ip)...did not issue a walk and is the 12<sup>th</sup> pitcher in Oakland to strikeout 11 or more without walking a batter...shutout the Astros on two hits over the first five innings and had an 8-0 lead when he allowed a RBI single to Altuve in the sixth...allowed a leadoff double to Maxwell in the seventh and retired the next two batters before he was relieved by Neshek, who allowed Maxwell to score.

**SECOND START:** He had a no decision in the A's 10-8, 19-inning win over Los Angeles April 29 in Oakland...allowed a career-high six runs in 4.2 innings...allowed solo home runs to Pujols in the first and Trumbo in the second...was trailing 2-1 when he allowed four more runs in the fifth on a Pujols RBI single, a Hamilton sacrifice fly and a Trumbo two-run double...left trailing 6-1 but the A's eventually tied the game before winning in the 19<sup>th</sup> in a 6 hour and 32 minute game, the longest by time in Oakland history.

**THIRD START:** He had a no decision in the A's 5-4 win at New York May 5...the A's scored a run in the third, but he allowed a run in the bottom of the third on a Cano RBI single...Oakland then built a 4-1 lead before he was charged with two of the Yankees runs in a three-run sixth inning...was relieved by Blevins with one out and runners on first and second and he allowed both runs to score plus one of his own for the blown save.

**FOURTH START:** He was the losing pitcher in the A's 6-3 loss at Seattle May 10...allowed a career-high tying six runs in 5.0 innings...allowed a RBI single to Morse and a RBI double to Smoak in the first inning...then allowed a three-run home run to Ibanez in the third and a RBI double to Morales in the fifth.

**LAST START:** He lost his second consecutive start in the A's 6-2 loss to Texas last Wednesday in Oakland...tossed just 4.1 innings, matching his career low...faced the minimum over the first two innings but then allowed a bases loaded two-run single to Berkman in the third inning...was charged with three of the Rangers runs in a four-run fifth inning...allowed a RBI single to Beltre and was relieved by Chavez with runners on first and third...Chavez allowed a three-run home run to Cruz.

**STRAILY vs. TEXAS:** Is 0-1 with a 4.09 ERA (11.0 ip, 9 h, 7 r, 5 er, 6 bb, 10 so, 1 hr) in two career starts...including a loss in his only start this year (see last start above)...his other start was a no decision in a 5-4 A's loss at Texas last year on September 24...had a 2-0 lead when he allowed a Moreland RBI single in the bottom of the second...was leading 3-1 when he allowed a solo home run to Hamilton in the fifth...left with a 4-2 lead, two outs and the bases empty in the seventh innings...Blevins walked Hamilton and Neshek allowed a two-run home run to Beltre for the blown save.

**WITH SACRAMENTO:** Went 3-0 with a 0.96 ERA in three starts with Sacramento...was tied for the Pacific Coast League lead in wins at the time of his April 29 promotion...has a .159 opponents batting average, including .111 (3 for 27) by left-handed hitters compared to .190 (8 for 42) by right-handers...did not allow a home run in 18.2 innings.

**THIS SPRING:** Was 2-2 with a 5.82 ERA (21.2 ip, 31 h, 17 r, 14 er, 7 bb, 20 so, 2 hr) in seven games, including six starts, this spring...tied for the team lead in starts...allowed a .333 (31 for 93) opponents batting average...walked one batter or fewer in six of his seven outings...his one relief appearance came on March 25 against Milwaukee.

## TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

**RHP Jarrod Parker (2-5, 6.04 ERA):** Is scheduled to make his 10<sup>th</sup> start of the season...went 0-4 with an 8.10 ERA and .374 opponents batting average over his first five starts...the four-game losing streak was the longest of his career...is 2-1 with a 4.07 ERA and .222 opponents batting average over his last four starts...has a 6.04 ERA, which is fourth highest in the American League...has the third highest opponents on-base percentage (.390) and slugging percentage (.508) and the fourth highest batting average (.302)...had a no decision in his last start, a 2-1 A's win over Kansas City last Friday in Oakland (7.0 ip, 4 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 5 so)...is 3-0 with a 2.70 ERA (20.0 ip, 12 h, 6 r, 6 er, 8 bb, 20 so, 2 hr) in three career starts against Texas, all last year...the three wins are his most against any team

**8-1, 2.85 ERA (148.2 ip, 124 h, 52 r, 47 er, 48 bb, 131 so, 14 hr)**

**Save/Save Opportunities: 9/13 (69.2%)**

The A's bullpen has a 1.53 ERA (5 er in 29.1 ip) and .202 (22 for 109) opponents batting average over the past 10 games (since May 10) after posting a 4.22 ERA and .249 opponents average in its previous 14 games...now has an **American League leading 2.85 ERA** for the season...also has the lowest opponents on-base percentage (.282) in the AL, ranks second in opponents batting average (.221) and fourth in opponents slugging percentage (.365)...has the fewest save opportunities (13)...first batters faced are 23 for 127 (.181) with five walks and a hit by pitch (.215 on-base percentage)...the batting average and on-base percentage against first batters are the lowest in the majors...was charged with the loss a week ago tonight against Texas, its first of the season.

**FOR STARTERS:** Is scheduled to make his team leading 10<sup>th</sup> start of the season...the A's are 4-5 (.444) in his starting assignments this year and 21-17 (.553) in his career...has tossed six or more innings in four of his eight starts, allowed two runs or fewer three times and walked two batters or fewer four times.

**FIRST FIVE, LAST FOUR:** Went 0-4 with an 8.10 ERA and .374 opponents batting average over his first five starts...the four-game losing streak was the longest of his career...is 2-1 with a 4.07 ERA (11 er in 24.1 ip) and .222 (20 for 90) opponents batting average over his last four starts.

**AMONG THE LEADERS:** Has a 6.04 ERA, which is **fifth** highest in the American League...has the **fourth** highest opponents on-base percentage (.390), the **fifth** highest slugging percentage (.508) and the **sixth** highest batting average (.302)...is also **tied for second** in wild pitches (5), **tied for third** in losses (5) and **tied for fourth** in walks (24) and hit batters (4)...the hit batters are a career high as he hit just three batters in 181.1 innings last year.

**THE LONG BALL:** Has allowed nine home runs over his first nine starts, which is **tied for fifth** most in the American League...that is two short of his career high from last year...allowed just 11 home runs in 181.1 innings in 2012, an average of 0.55 per nine innings...that was the second lowest mark in the AL and third lowest in the majors...six of the nine home runs he has allowed this year have been solo shots as were eight of the 11 home runs he allowed last year.

**OPPONENTS BATTING:** His .302 opponents batting average includes a .258 (23 for 89) mark against right-handed hitters compared to .340 (34 for 100) against left-handers...has allowed a .264 (32 for 121) opponents batting average over his first 60 pitches in a game compared to .368 (25 for 68) from the 61<sup>st</sup> pitch on...has a .478 (11 for 23) opponents batting average against the opponents number one hitter, which is the **highest** mark in the American League.

**HOME AND AWAY:** Is 1-3 with a 7.43 ERA (22 er in 26.2 ip) in five starts in Oakland compared to 1-2 with a 4.29 ERA (10 er in 21.0 ip) in four starts on the road...last year, he was 6-5 with a 2.61 ERA at home compared to 7-3 with a 4.54 ERA on the road...had the fifth lowest home ERA in the American League.

**IN APRIL:** Was 1-4 with a 7.36 ERA and .350 opponents batting average in the month of April...the losses matched the most in Oakland history by a pitcher in the month of April (12<sup>th</sup> time)...the ERA was the fifth highest April ERA in Oakland history among pitchers with 25 or more innings pitched...it was the highest since Gil Heredia had a 9.24 ERA in 2001...the opponents batting average was fourth highest in Oakland history in April among pitchers with 100 or more batters faced...it was the highest since Heredia had a .360 mark in 2001.

**FOR STARTERS:** Is scheduled to make his 10<sup>th</sup> start of the season...the A's are 4-5 (.444) in his starting assignments this year and 24-16 (.600) in his career...his teams are 29-16 (.644) in his 45 career starts...has tossed at least six innings in seven of his nine starts, allowed two runs or fewer five times and walked two batters or fewer six times.

**RUN SUPPORT:** Has received two runs of support or fewer in each of his last six starts...is 1-5 despite a 3.29 ERA (14 er in 38.1 ip) over that span...his run support average over his last six starts is 1.41 (6 rs in 38.1 ip)...has four runs of support in his five losses and has received just 16 runs of support in his 15 losses in two seasons with the A's (90.2 ip, 1.59 RSA)...has received no support eight times over the last two years and one run of support six times...the A's have been shutout **four** times this year, twice in games started by Milone.

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster for the fifth consecutive season.

## BARTOLO COLÓN

- Did not walk a batter over his first three starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1916 to start the season with three consecutive games of five or more innings and no walks...had a four-game streak with no walks and at least five innings pitched dating back to 2012, which was the longest streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.

## YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Became the A's 14th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 14 years April 1 against Seattle.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list April 13 with a strained muscle in his left hand...it was his second career stint on the DL as he was out from May 7-31 last year with a muscle strain in his left hand...went 3 for 9 (.333) with a home run and four RBI on a three-game rehab assignment with Sacramento...was reinstated April 28.
- Had his first career four-strikeout game April 29 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Had his first career four-RBI game April 30 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 1 against Los Angeles (AL), tying the Oakland record (32nd time, last: Josh Willingham at Seattle, April 24, 2011).
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 16 streak with his third inning single May 12 at Seattle.

## COCO CRISP

- Was on his ninth Opening Day Roster (2004-09, 11-13), his third straight with the A's...made his eighth career Opening Start April 1 against Seattle, including three straight with the A's.
- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more.
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19... went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.
- Had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history April 28 against Baltimore...the last was by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...had two walk-off sacrifice flies last year, in addition to a single.
- Finished April with 24 runs scored to set an Oakland record for runs in April...broke the previous mark of 23 by Jose Canseco in 1988.

## JOSH DONALDSON

- Had his first career game-ending RBI April 12 against Detroit, a home run in the bottom of the 12th inning.

- Was a perfect 4 for 4 April 27 against Baltimore, matching his career high in hits (August 17, 2012 vs. Cleveland).
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of April 22-28...it was his first career weekly honor...went 12 for 22 (.545) with four runs, seven doubles (.864 slugging percentage), 10 RBI and seven walks (1 sf, .633 on-base percentage) in seven games.

### NATE FREIMAN

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 3 against Seattle and had a RBI single off Joe Saunders in the second inning for his first ML hit...added another single in the fourth inning for his first multiple hit game.
- Hit his first Major League home run April 22 against Houston, a three-run shot off Erik Bedard in the first inning...it snapped a 0 for 11 streak.

### JOHN JASO

- Is on his third consecutive Opening Day roster with his third team (Tampa Bay, 2011; Seattle, 2012).
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 9 at Los Angeles, a three-run shot off Jepsen in the seventh to give the A's a 7-5 lead.

- Went 2 for 9 in the 19-inning game April 29 against Los Angeles to tie the Oakland record for at bats in a game (11th time, last: Mike Heath at Texas, July 1, 1979).
- Set an Oakland record for hits in the month of April with 34...broke the previous mark of 33 held by Stan Javier (1994) and Ben Grieve (1998)...had 11 doubles, which tied the Oakland April record (Mark Ellis, 2003).

### BRANDON MOSS

- Matched his career high with five RBI April 10 at Los Angeles (also September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) after driving in four runs the night before.
- Had a career-high four strikeouts April 12 against Detroit...matched that figure April 29 against Los Angeles and May 12 at Seattle.
- Was on the paternity list from April 16 to 18 for the birth of his second son, Brody. (April 16).

### PAT NESHEK

- Did not allow a run in nine spring training appearances (8.1 ip) and has not allowed a run in 19 games (17.1 ip) over the last two springs.
- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2007-08 and 2010 with Minnesota, 2011 with San Diego).

### DEREK NORRIS

- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles and ended up going 0 for 5 with a walk...he and Rosales had six plate appearances, which match the most in

Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12, 1992 vs. Texas).

#### SHANE PETERSON

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 16 against Houston and went 0 for 4.
- Singled off Xavier Cedeno in the fourth inning April 17 against Houston for his first Major League hit.

#### JOSH REDDICK

- Hit .139 in April, which was the third lowest April batting average in Oakland history (min. 75 PA)...Don Baylor hit .129 in 1976 and Ben Grieve hit .132 in 1999.

#### CHRIS RESOP

- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2006 with Florida, 2008 with Atlanta and 2011-12 with Pittsburgh).

#### FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 23 with a sprained right elbow.
- Had successful UCL reconstruction surgery March 27...the procedure was performed by Dr. Thomas Mehlhoff at the Texas Orthopedic Hospital in Houston, Texas.

#### ADAM ROSALES

- Began the season on the disabled list as he was added to the 15-day DL March 26 with a strained left intercostal...hit .320 (8 for 25) with one home run and one RBI during a six-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (April 17-19) and Triple-A Sacramento (April 21-24)...was reinstated April 25.
