A's vs. ASTROS

The A's lead the season series 7-0...are 4-0 in Houston and 3-0 in Oakland...now have a nine-game winning streak against the Astros...the A's lead the all-time series, 12-1...the only loss was a 5-4 decision on June 12, 2007...are 6-0 in Oakland and 6-1 in Houston.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour has converted each of his last 28 save opportunities, which is the second longest streak in Oakland history...the record is 40 by Dennis Eckersley...has 36 career saves with the A's and needs one more to tie Bill Caudill for 10th in Oakland history.

Ryan Cook has not allowed a run in his last 19 games and 22.2 innings on the road...his 22.2inning road scoreless streak is third longest by a reliever in Oakland history...the record is 25.0 by Dennis Eckersley and Gene Nelson.

Seth Smith hit his sixth career pinch hit home run last night...has the best batting average (.323) and slugging percentage (.576) among pinch hitters since 2007.

Chris Young has a 15-game hitting streak against Houston dating back to Aug. 8, 2011 (22 for 60, .367)...has a .418 (33 for 79) career average at Minute Maid Park with seven home runs and 27 RBI in 19 games...the average is second best all-time among players with 75 or more plate appearances.

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1931** the A's win their 17th consecutive game in a 4-2 win over the Yankees at Philadelphia...the winning streak remained a franchise record until 2002 when the A's won an American League record 20 consecutive games...in **1975** Gene Tenace connects for the 6000th home run in the history of the Athletics franchise in the A's 6-3 win in the first game of a oubleheader at Cleveland.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have won six of the last seven games and eight of the last 12...have won back-to-back series after losing each of the previous four series...are 14-19 (.424) over the last 33 games (since April 19) after starting the season 12-4 (.750)...are in second place in the American League West and trail Texas by 5½ games...have spent 31 of the last 33 days in sole possession of second place in the West...for the season, have spent 13 days in sole possession of first, two days tied for first, 31 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth...had their five-game winning streak snapped Wednesday at Texas.

CLOSE CALLS: Last night, the A's won for the third time this year when trailing after eight innings, which is the most in the American League and tied for the most in the majors...improved to 7-1 in games decided in the last at bat and are tied for second in the AL in last at bat wins...have won each of their last five one-run decisions and are 10-6 (.625) in one-run games for the season...rank second in the AL in one-run wins...are 3-1 in extra inning games and are tied for third in the AL in extra inning wins...have three "walk-off" wins.

THE LONG BALL: The three-run home run by Chris Young in the ninth inning last night snapped a streak of 15 consecutive solo home runs by the A's...that was an Oakland record (previous: 13, June 1-15, 2007) and tied the franchise record set by the 1947 Philadelphia A's...prior to last night, the A's last home run with a runner on base was a two-run shot by Céspedes on May 5 at New York.

NIGHT AND DAY: The A's have a 20-12 (.625) record in night games compared to 6-11 (.353) during the day...have the fourth best night record in the American League and the second worst mark during the day (Houston: 2-9, .182)...have a 3.32 ERA (108 er in 293.0 ip) at night compared to 5.47 (90 er in 148.0 ip) during the day...have the lowest night ERA in the AL and the second highest day ERA (Houston, 5.87).

IN THE PINCH: Seth Smith hit the A's second pinch hit home run of the season last night, which is tied for the most in the American League...A's pinch hitters are now 4 for 45 (.089) with five RBI and four walks...lead the AL in pinch plate appearances (49) but have the third lowest batting average...are tied for third in RBI and tied for fourth in walks.

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 2.18 ERA (15 er in 62.0 ip) and .204 (45 for 221) opponents batting average over the last seven games...that has lowered the season ERA .31 runs to 4.04, which ranks seventh in the American League...have the lowest opponents on-base percentage in the AL (.305) and are tied for second in pickoffs (5)...have allowed 214 runs, more than half of which have come in the third through fifth innings (110)...have a 3.31 ERA (36 er in 98.0 ip) over the first two innings of a game, 6.37 (104 er in 147.0 ip) in innings three through five and 2.66 (58 er in 196.0) from the sixth inning on.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers have tossed seven innings in all four games on the road trip, marking the first time this year starters have gone seven or more innings in more than two consecutive games...have lasted at least six innings in each of the last seven games and are 3-1 with a 2.87 ERA (15 er in 47.0 ip) and .224 (38 for 170) opponents batting average over that span...however, are 17-22 with a 4.73 ERA (151 er in 287.1 ip) for the season...are tied with Houston for the American League lead in losses and rank 11th in ERA...starters have a .224 (91 for 406) opponents batting average the first time they face a batter in a game, which is fourth lowest in the majors, compared to .296 (115 for 388) the second time, which is fourth highest.

OFFENSE: The A's lead the majors in walks (200) and top the American League in hit by pitches (23)...also rank second in the AL in doubles (103) and fourth in extra base hits (157)...have the second lowest batting average (.241) and the third fewest home runs (47)...have been shut out four times, which is tied for third most.

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have not committed an error in their last seven games, which matches their longest errorless streak over the last five years (Sept. 12-18, 2009)...have not had a longer errorless streak since an eight-game streak from June 15-24, 2008...have committed just three errors over the last 13 games...turned a season-high three double plays Monday night but have just 34 for the season, which is tied for the fewest in the majors.

THE WEST AND THE REST: The A's are 18-8 (.692) against American League West competition compared to 8-15 (.348) against everyone else...are tied with Texas for the best intra-division record in the AL...are batting .260 (240 for 922) with 149 runs (5.73 per game) in 26 games against the AL West compared to .217 (163 for 752) with 75 runs (3.26 per game) in 23 games against the rest of baseball...the pitching staff has a 3.50 ERA (94 er in 242.0 ip) against the West compared to 4.70 (104 er in 199.0 ip) against everyone else.

APRIL AND MAY: The A's are batting .223 (154 for 690) with 66 runs scored in 21 games in May (3.14 runs per game) after hitting .253 with 158 runs scored in 28 games in April (5.64 per game)...have the lowest batting average in the American League in May (Houston, .232) and the fewest runs scored (Houston and Seattle, 79)...led the majors in runs in April...have just three stolen bases this month after stealing 25 bases in April...the A's pitching staff has a 3.66 ERA (74 er in 182.0 ip) in May after posting a 4.31 mark in April...have the third lowest May ERA in the AL after posting the fourth highest April ERA...have a 10-11 record in May after going 16-12 in April...have posted a losing record in May in four of the previous five seasons...this April was the A's fifth consecutive month with a winning record dating back to last June...that is the A's longest such streak since a 10-month streak from June, 2002 to September, 2003.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 3-1 on this six-game road trip to Texas (2-1) and Houston (1-0)...went 3-7 on the last road trip to New York (2-1), Cleveland (0-4) and Seattle (1-2) and are 13-13 on the road overall...return home following the game tomorrow for a two-game homestand against San Francisco (followed by two games at San Francisco and a three-game series at home against the White Sox)...went 4-2 on the last homestand against Texas (1-2) and Kansas City (3-0) and are 13-10 in Oakland.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 10th start of the season...the A's are 6-3 (.667) in his starting assignments this year and are 18-6 (.750) when he starts in his career...has tossed six or more innings in eight of his nine starts, allowed two runs or fewer five times and walked two batters or fewer seven times.

APRIL AND MAY: Is 2-1 with a 2.36 ERA (7 er in 26.2 ip) in four starts in May after going 2-2 with a 4.65 ERA in five starts in April.

11-4: Is 11-4 over the first 24 starts of his career...is the third pitcher in Oakland history to have at least 11 wins in his first 24 career games...Tim Hudson was 12-3 and Bill Krueger was 11-8...with a win today, he would join Hudson (12-4) and Krueger (12-8) as the only pitchers in Oakland history with 12 wins over their first 25 career games.

AGAINST THE WEST: Is 3-0 with a 2.00 ERA (6 er in 27.0 ip) in four starts against American League West competition compared to 1-3 with a 4.99 ERA (17 er in 30.2 ip) in five starts against everyone else...is now 6-0 with a 1.98 ERA (12 er in 54.2 ip) in nine career starts against intra-division foes and 5-4 with a 4.11 ERA (39 er in 85.1 ip) in 15 starts against everyone else.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 3-2 with a 3.26 ERA (14 er in 38.2 ip) in six starts at night compared to 1-1 with a 4.26 ERA (9 er in 19.0 ip) in three starts during the day...he is now 10-3 with a 2.69 ERA (30 er in 100.1 ip) in 16 career starts at night compared to 1-1 with a 4.76 ERA (21 er in 39.2 ip) in eight starts during the day.

BY INNING: Has not allowed a run in the first inning this year (9.0 ip) and has a 1.13 ERA (3 er in 24.0 ip) in the first inning in his career...has allowed 18 of his 26 runs this year (69.2%) in the fourth and fifth innings (15 er in 17.0 ip, 7.94 ERA).

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .173 (13 for 75) batting average the first time through the lineup, .366 (26 for 71) the second time and .203 (15 for 74) after that...the .366 average the second time through the lineup is third highest in the American League...the opponents number three hitter is 4 for 27 (.148), which is the sixth lowest mark in the American League...last year, he allowed a .359 batting average to the number three hitter, .218 against everyone else...has surrendered seven of his eight home runs after his 50th pitch in a game...opponents are 13 for 69 (.188) with two outs...including 2 for 20 (.100) with runners in scoring position and two outs.

FIRST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 8-2 win over Seattle April 4 in Oakland...blanked the Mariners on two hits and a walk over the first four innings and had a 2-0 lead when he allowed a Saunders sacrifice fly in the fifth...the A's scored a run in the bottom of the fifth and he allowed a leadoff home run to Morse in the sixth.

SECOND START: He won his second consecutive start in the A's 8-1 win at Los Angeles April 11...matched his career-high by tossing 8.0 innings...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed his only run in the fourth inning on a Kendrick RBI double...blanked the Angels on one walk over his final four innings and the A's scored four times in the sixth for the win.

THIRD START: He had a no decision in the A's 4-3 win over Houston April 16 in Oakland...walked a career-high four batters in six innings but struck out eight...allowed two runs in the third inning on RBI singles by Maxwell and Carter...then walked Pena to load the bases with one out before retiring each of the final 11 batters that he faced...left after six innings with the A's leading 3-2 but Doolittle allowed a run in the eighth for the blown save before Donaldson had a RBI triple in the bottom of the eighth for the win.

FOURTH START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-6 loss at Boston April 22...allowed a career-high nine runs on a career-high tying eight hits in 4.0 innings...allowed just one run over the first three innings on a Napoli RBI double in the second...had a 2-1 lead when he allowed a three-run home run to Middlebrooks in the fourth...also allowed a grand slam to Napoli in the Red Sox five run fifth inning.

FIFTH START: He lost his second consecutive start in the A's 7-3 loss to Baltimore April 27 in Oakland...the A's scored single runs in the second and third innings to take a 2-0 lead...he allowed four runs in the fourth inning on a two-run home run by Markakis, a solo home run by Jones and a RBI single by Harday...then retired 10 of the final 11 batters that he faced.

SIXTH START: He combined with Doolittle and Balfour on a six-hit 2-0 shutout at New York May 3...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed all six of the hits...allowed just one base runner as far as third base and that was in the third inning when Stewart walked and went to third on a Cano double.

SEVENTH START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-3 loss at Cleveland May 8...blanked the Indians on two hits over the first four innings to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high tying 14.0 innings...had a 3-0 lead entering the bottom of the fifth when he loaded the bases with no outs...allowed two runs to score on a fielders choice/error...then allowed solo home runs to Swisher and Santana in the sixth inning for the loss.

EIGHTH START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 5-1 win over Texas May 13...allowed a two-out solo home run to Moreland in the second inning but that was the only run he would allowed in seven innings...blanked the Rangers on four hits over his final five innings.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 4-3 win over Kansas City last Sunday in Oakland...allowed single runs in the third and fourth innings on RBI singles by Gordon and Getz...the A's scored a run in the bottom of the fourth but he allowed another run in the fifth inning on a Hosmer RBI double...retired the side in order in the sixth and was relieved by Okajima to start the seventh with the A's trailing 3-2.

GRIFFIN vs. HOUSTON: Had a no decision in his only career start, a 4-3 A's win in Oakland this year on April 16 (see third start above).

THIS SPRING: Was 2-2 with a 5.40 ERA (20.0 ip, 20 h, 12 r, 12 er, 4 bb, 21 so, 4 hr) in five starts this spring...walked just four batters in 20.0 innings (1.80 per nine innings)...struck out 21 for a strikeout to walk ratio of 5.25...allowed a .263 (20 for 76) opponents batting average...also pitched in a minor league game March 13 (4.0 ip, 6 h, 2 r, 2 er, 1 bb, 4 so) and started at Seattle March 8 in the game that was cancelled in the top of the fourth because of rain (3.0 ip, 4 h, 1 r, 1 er, 0 bb, 4 so).

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Bartolo Colón (4-2, 4.31 ERA): Is scheduled to make his 10th start of the season...turned 40 yesterday and will become the fourth pitcher in Oakland history to start a game at age 40 (Tommy John, Tom Candiotti and Don Sutton)...walked two batters in his last start after issuing just two walks over his first eight starts...has walked four batters in 54.1 innings, an average of 0.66 per nine innings...that is the lowest mark in the majors...leads the American League and ranks second in the majors in strikeout to walk ratio (7.50)...is 3-0 with a 3.24 ERA in five starts against AL West teams...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 9-2 A's win at Texas on Monday (7.0 ip, 6 h, 2 r, 2 er, 2 bb, 3 so)...is 5-2 with a 3.42 ERA in eight career appearances, all starts, against Houston...is 2-0 with a 3.00 ERA (12.0 ip, 12 h, 4 r, 4 er, 0 bb, 5 so) in two starts this year.

40 YEARS OLD: Turned 40 on Friday and will become the fourth pitcher in Oakland history to start a game at age 40...the

other three are Tommy John (last start at 42 years, 126 days), Tom Candiotti (last start at 41 years, 275 days) and Don Sutton (last start at 40 years, 155 days)

DON'T WALK: Walked two batters in his last start after issuing just two walks over his first eight starts...his streak of eight consecutive starts with one walk or fewer and two innings or more to start the season was the longest by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916...has walked four batters in 54.1 innings, an average of 0.66 per nine innings...that is the lowest mark in the majors...leads the American League and ranks second in the majors in strikeout to walk ratio (7.50)...is averaging the fewest pitches per game (84.7) and pitchers per inning (14.0) in the American League.

AGAINST THE WEST: Is 3-0 with a 3.24 ERA (9 er in 25.0 ip) in five starts against American League West teams compared to 1-2 with a 5.22 ERA (17 er in 29.1 ip) in four starts against everyone else...in two seasons with the A's, he is 8-3 with a 2.61 ERA (26 er in 89.2 ip) in 13 starts against the AL West compared to 6-8 with a 4.46 ERA (58 er in 117.0 ip) in 20 starts against all other teams.

FIRST FOUR, LAST FIVE: Went 3-0 with a 2.42 ERA, .235 opponents batting average and two home runs allowed in 26.0 innings over his first four starts...is 1-2 with an 6.03 ERA (19 er in 28.1 ip), .303 (33 for 109) opponents batting average and five home runs allowed in 28.1 innings over his last five starts.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 3-0 with a 3.00 ERA (11 er in 33.0 ip) and .240 (29 for 121) opponents batting average in five starts at night compared to 1-2 with a 6.33 ERA (15 er in 21.1 ip) and .314 (27 for 86) opponents average in four starts during the day...in two seasons with the A's, is 12-5 with a 2.90 ERA (44 er in 136.1 ip) in 21 starts at night compared to 2-6 with a 5.12 ERA (40 er in 70.1 ip) in 12 starts during the day.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed six of his seven home runs to left-handed hitters...has surrendered 58 home runs over his last four seasons, 45 of which have been hit by lefties...has yielded a .228 (18 for 79) average the first time through the lineup, .329 (25 for 76) the second time and .250 (13 for 52) after that.

NOT WILD: Does not have a wild pitch in two seasons with the A's, a stretch of 33 starts and 206.2 innings pitched without a wild pitch...the 33 consecutive starts without a wild pitch is the second longest streak by an A's starting pitcher since 1993...Barry Zito had a 38-start streak from July 2, 2002-July 13, 2003...now has a streak of 65 games and 391.0 innings pitched since his last wild pitch on May 26, 2009 at Los Angeles (AL).

ACTIVE LEADERS: Is tied for third among active pitchers in complete games (33), tied for sixth in shutouts (10), ranks seventh in wins (175), strikeouts (1863) and games started (384) and eighth in innings pitched (2447.2).

DOMINICAN LEADERS: His 175 wins are third most among Dominican-born pitchers behind Juan Marichal (243) and Pedro Martinez (219)...also ranks third among Dominicans in games started (384), innings pitched (2447.2) and strikeouts (1863).

2013 START-BY-START: He was the winning pitcher in his first start, a 6-3 A's win at Houston April 6...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a three-run home run to Castro in the fourth inning...had a no decision in the A's 4-3, 12-inning win over Detroit April 12 ... allowed all three of his runs in the third inning on a three-run home run by Fielder...was the winning pitcher in the A's 7-5 win over Houston *April* 17 in Oakland...allowed a run in the first inning but the A's came back with six runs in the bottom of the first and he retired 15 of the 17 hitters he faced over his final five innings...tossed a three-hit shutout in the A's rain-shortened 13-0 seven-inning win at Boston *April 23*...it was his 10th career shutout, his first since May 30, 2011 at Oakland...at the age of 39 years, 334 days, he became the second oldest pitcher in Oakland history to pitch a shutout (Don Sutton is the oldest, as he was 40 years, 85 days on June 6, 1985 when he blanked Chicago 10-0)...the seven-inning shutout was third shortest in Oakland history and the shortest since Vida Blue fired 6.0 innings April 9, 1971 against Kansas City...the last complete game of fewer than eight innings by an A's pitcher was by Steve Ontiveros on May 16, 1995 against Chicago (5.0 ip)...walked Jacoby Ellsbury to lead off the sixth inning, snapping a streak of 32.0 innings and 121 batters faced without a walk dating back to his last walk on August 12, 2012 at Chicago (AL)...the 32.0-inning streak was the longest in Oakland history by a starter and second longest overall to Dennis Eckersley's streak of 50.1 innings from Aug. 17, 1989-June 12, 1990...had a no decision in the A's 9-8, 10-inning win against Baltimore April 28 in Oakland...blanked the Orioles on one hit over the first three innings to extend his scoreless streak to 15.0 innings...was charged with his first loss of the season in the A's 4-2 loss at New York **May 4**...Hughes shutout the A's on four hits over the first eight innings...lost his second consecutive start in the A's 9-2 decision at Cleveland May 9 ... allowed a two-run home run to Kipnis in the first, three runs in the second and a leadoff home run to Swisher in the third...had a no decision in the A's 6-5, 10inning loss to Texas May 14...did not strike out a batter for the eighth time in his career...it was the first time in a game in which he pitched more than 4.0 innings.



BRIEFLY: Was on the A's Opening Day roster and started the fifth game of the season April 5 at Houston...was optioned to Sacramento the next day when Bartolo Colón was reinstated from the suspended list...went 3-0 with a 0.96 ERA in three starts with the River Cats before being recalled from Sacramento April 29 to start for Brett Anderson...started that night, was optioned to Sacramento April 30 and recalled May 1 when Anderson went on the DL...is 1-2 with a 5.40 ERA (13 er in 21.2 ip) in four starts since then.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

Has pitched for 13 seasons in Japan with Yomiuri (1995-2005), Nippon-Ham (2006) and Soft Bank (2012), in addition to five seasons in the Major Leagues with Boston (2007-11)...was 34-34 with 50 saves and a 3.20 ERA in 495 games in Nippon Professional Baseball and is 17-8 with six saves and a 3.11 ERA in 261 games in Major League Baseball...saw action as a starter in his first five years with Yomiuri but has pitched exclusively in relief since 2000...was selected to pitch in the NPB All-Star Game in 2002...after 11 seasons with Yomiuri, he pitched for Nippon-Ham in his final season in Japan before signing with Boston Nov. 30, 2006...appeared in four of five games in the 2006 Japan Series against the Chunichi Dragons, helping Nippon-Ham to the franchise's first championship since 1962...earned a spot as the left-handed pitcher on the Topps Major League Rookie All-Star Team in 2007...was also named to the American League All-Star team that year after winning the online All-Star Final Vote... made 17 postseason appearances with Boston from 2007-09, posting a 2.11 ERA (5 er in 21.1 innings) without a decision...the games pitched are the most ever by a Major Leaguer born in Japan in 2012, logging a career-best 0.94 ERA in 56 games with Soft Bank.

- Snapped a career-high 0 for 16 streak with his third inning single May 12 at Seattle.

COCO CRISP

- Was on his ninth Opening Day Roster (2004-09, 11-13), his third straight with the A's...made his eighth career Opening Start April 1 against Seattle, including three straight with the A's.
- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more.
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19... went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.
- Had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history April 28 against Baltimore...the last was by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...had two walk-off sacrifice flies last year, in addition to a single.
- Finished April with 24 runs scored to set an Oakland record for runs in April...broke the previous mark of 23 by Jose Canseco in 1988.

JOSH DONALDSON

 Had his first career game-ending RBI April 12 against Detroit, a home run in the bottom of the 12th inning.

- Was a perfect 4 for 4 April 27 against Baltimore, matching his career high in hits (August 17, 2012 vs. Cleveland)...had another four-hit game May 14 against Texas.

JOHN JASO

- Is on his third consecutive Opening Day roster with his third team (Tampa Bay, 2011; Seattle, 2012).
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 9 at Los Angeles, a three-run shot off Jepsen in the seventh to give the A's a 7-5 lead.

JED LOWRIE

- Had a career-high tying four RBI April 15 against Houston (fourth time, last: September 19, 2011 vs. Baltimore).
- Went 4 for 4 April 19 at Tampa, the third four-hit game of his career.
- Went 2 for 9 in the 19-inning game April 29 against Los Angeles to tie the Oakland record for at bats in a game (11th time, last: Mike Heath at Texas, July 1, 1979).
- Set an Oakland record for hits in the month of April with 34...broke the previous mark of 33 held by Stan Javier (1994) and Ben Grieve (1998)...had 11 doubles, which tied the Oakland April record (Mark Ellis, 2003).

BRANDON MOSS

- Matched his career high with five RBI April 10 at Los Angeles (also September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) after driving in four runs the night before.
- Had a career-high four strikeouts April 12 against Detroit...matched that figure April 29 against Los Angeles and May 12 at Seattle.
- Was on the paternity list from April 16 to 18 for the birth of his second son, Brody. (April 16).

- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2007-08 and 2010 with Minnesota, 2011 with San Diego).

DEREK NORRIS

 Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles and ended up going 0 for 5 with a walk...he and Rosales had six plate appearances, which match the most in Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12, 1992 vs. Texas).

SHANE PETERSON

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 16 against Houston and went 0 for 4.
- Singled off Xavier Cedeno in the fourth inning April 17 against Houston for his first Major League hit.

JOSH REDDICK

• Hit .139 in April, which was the third lowest April batting average in Oakland history (min. 75 PA)...Don Baylor hit .129 in 1976 and Ben Grieve hit .132 in 1999.

CHRIS RESOP

• Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2006 with Florida, 2008 with Atlanta and 2011-12 with Pittsburgh).

FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 23 with a sprained right elbow.
- Had successful UCL reconstruction surgery March 27...the procedure was performed by Dr. Thomas Mehlhoff at the Texas Orthopedic Hospital in Houston, Texas.

ADAM ROSALES
