#### TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour has converted each of his last 28 save opportunities, which is the second longest streak in Oakland history.

Ryan Cook has not allowed a run in his last 19 games and 22.2 innings on the road...his 22.2inning road scoreless streak is third longest by a reliever in Oakland history.

Chris Young has a 16-game hitting streak against Houston (25 for 65, .385)...has a .429 (36 for 84) career average at Minute Maid Park with seven home runs and 29 RBI in 20 games...the average is the best all-time in this ballpark (min. 75 plate appearances)

#### THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In 1954 Gus Zernial hits the last grand slam in Philadelphia A's history in a 6-5 win over Boston...in **1975** Gene Tenace has five RBI including the game winning RBI single in the bottom of the 11th inning of the A's 6-5 win over Baltimore...in **1989** Todd Burns, Rick Honeycutt and Eric Plunk combine to shutout the Yankees on one hit in a 4-0 victory at New York.

#### ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Collected a season-high 18 hits last night and have now won two straight and seven of the last eight games...by taking the first two games of this series, the A's have now won three straight series after losing each of the previous four series...went 12-4 over the first 16 games this year, 6-15 over the next 21 contests and are 9-4 over the last 13 games...are in second place in the American League West and trail Texas by 51/2 games...have spent 32 of the last 34 days in sole possession of second place in the West...for the season, have spent 13 days in sole possession of first, two days tied for first, 32 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth...had their five-game winning streak snapped Wednesday at Texas.

THE WEST AND THE REST: The A's are 19-8 (.704) against American League West competition compared to 8-15 (.348) against everyone else...are tied with Texas for the best intra-division record in the AL...are batting .267 (258 for 965) with 160 runs (5.93 per game) in 27 games against the AL West compared to .217 (163 for 752) with 75 runs (3.26 per game) in 23 games against the rest of baseball...the pitching staff has a 3.55 ERA (99 er in 251.0 ip) against the West compared to 4.70 (104 er in 199.0 ip) against everyone else.

OFFENSE: The A's lead the majors in walks (204) and top the American League in hit by pitches (23)...are tied for the AL lead in doubles (107) and fourth in extra base hits (163)...have the third fewest home runs (49) and fourth lowest batting average (.245)...have been shut out four times, which is tied for third most.

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 2.54 ERA (20 er in 71.0 ip) and .209 (54 for 258) opponents batting average over the last eight games...that has lowered the season ERA to 4.06, which ranks seventh in the American League...have the lowest opponents on-base percentage in the AL (.304) and are tied for second in pickoffs (5)...have allowed 219 runs, more than half of which have come in the third through fifth innings (112)...have a 3.33 ERA (37 er in 100.0 ip) over the first two innings of a game, 6.36 (106 er in 150.0 ip) in innings three through five and 2.70 (60 er in 200.0) from the sixth inning on.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 4-1 with a 3.25 ERA (19 er in 52.2 ip) and .224 (43 for 192) opponents batting average over the last eight games...however, are 18-22 with a 4.76 ERA (155 er in 293.0 ip) for the season...are tied for second in the American League in losses and rank 11<sup>th</sup> in ERA...have allowed seven home runs in the last three games after yielding none over the previous six contests...have surrendered 44 for the season, which is tied for the most in the AL...starters have a .224 (93 for 415) opponents batting average the first time they face a batter in a game, which is fourth lowest in the majors, compared to .292 (116 for 397) the second time, which is fourth highest.

NIGHT AND DAY: The A's have a 21-12 (.636) record in night games compared to 6-11 (.353) during the day...have the third best night record in the American League and the second worst mark during the day (Houston: 2-9, .182)...have a 3.37 ERA (113 er in 302.0 ip) at night compared to 5.47 (90 er in 148.0 ip) during the day...have the second lowest night ERA in the AL and the second highest day ERA (Houston, 5.87)

APRIL AND MAY: The A's are batting .235 (172 for 733) with 77 runs scored in 22 games in May (3.50 runs per game) after hitting .253 with 158 runs scored in 28 games in April (5.64 per game)...have the fewest runs scored in the American League in May (Seattle, 81) and the third lowest batting average...led the majors in runs in April...have just three stolen bases this month after stealing 25 bases in April...the A's pitching staff has a 3.72 ERA (79 er in 191.0 ip) in May after posting a 4.31 mark in April...have the third lowest May ERA in the AL after posting the fourth highest April ERA...have an 11-11 record in May after going 16-12 in April...have posted a losing record in May in four of the previous five seasons...this April was the A's fifth consecutive month with a winning record dating back to last June...that is the A's longest such streak since a 10-month streak from June, 2002 to September, 2003.

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's had their errorless streak snapped at seven games last night, which matches their longest errorless streak over the last five years (Sept. 12-18, 2009)...have committed just four errors over the last 14 games...turned a season-high three double plays Monday night but have just 34 for the season, which is the fewest in the majors.

CLOSE CALLS: Friday night, the A's won for the third time this year when trailing after eight innings, which is the most in the American League and tied for the most in the majors... are 7-1 in games decided in the last at bat and are tied for second in the AL in last at bat wins...have won each of their last five one-run decisions and are 10-6 (.625) in one-run games for the season...are tied for second in the AL in one-run wins...are 3-1 in extra inning games and are tied for third in the AL in extra inning wins...have three "walk-off" wins.

THE LONG BALL: The A's hit two more solo home runs last night after Chris Young's three-run home run in the ninth inning Friday snapped a streak of 15 consecutive solo home runs by the A's...that was an Oakland record (previous: 13, June 1-15, 2007) and tied the franchise record set by the 1947 Philadelphia A's...prior to Friday, the A's last home run with a runner on base was a two-run shot by Céspedes on May 5 at New York.

IN THE PINCH: Seth Smith hit the A's second pinch hit home run of the season Friday night, which is tied for the most in the American League...A's pinch hitters are now 4 for 45 (.089) with five RBI and four walks...lead the AL in pinch plate appearances (49) but have the third lowest batting average...are tied for fourth in RBI and walks

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 4-1 on this six-game road trip to Texas (2-1) and Houston (2-0), the A's fourth road trip of the season...went 6-0 on the first trip, 4-12 on the next two and are 14-13 on the road overall...return home following the game today for a two-game homestand against San Francisco...play two games at San Francisco Wednesday and Thursday before returning home for a three-game series against Chicago (AL) next weekend...went 4-2 on the last homestand against Texas (1-2) and Kansas City (3-0) and are 13-10 in Oakland.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 10<sup>th</sup> start of the season...the A's are 6-3 (.667) in his starting assignments this year and 20-13 (.606) over the last two years...his teams are 217-167 (.565) in his career...has tossed six or more innings in seven of his nine starts, allowed two runs or fewer three times and walked one batter or fewer eight times.

40 YEARS OLD: Turned 40 on Friday and

will become the fourth pitcher in Oakland

history to start a game at age 40...the other three are Tommy John (last start at 42 years, 126 days), Tom Candiotti (last start at 41 years, 275 days) and Don Sutton (last start at 40 years, 155 days).

DON'T WALK: Walked two batters in his last start after issuing just two walks over his first eight starts...his streak of eight consecutive starts with one walk or fewer and two innings or more to start the season was the longest by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916...has walked four batters in 54.1 innings, an average of 0.66 per nine innings...that is the lowest mark in the majors...leads the American League and ranks second in the majors in strikeout to walk ratio (7.50)... is averaging the fewest pitches per inning (14.0) and second fewest pitches per game (84.7) in the AL

AGAINST THE WEST: Is 3-0 with a 3.24 ERA (9 er in 25.0 ip) in five starts against American League West teams compared to 1-2 with a 5.22 ERA (17 er in 29.1 ip) in four starts against everyone else...in two seasons with the A's, he is 8-3 with a 2.61 ERA (26 er in 89.2 ip) in 13 starts against the AL West compared to 6-8 with a 4.46 ERA (58 er in 117.0 ip) in 20 starts against all other teams.

FIRST FOUR, LAST FIVE: Went 3-0 with a 2.42 ERA, .235 opponents batting average and two home runs allowed in 26.0 innings over his first four starts...is 1-2 with an 6.03 ERA (19 er in 28.1 ip), .303 (33 for 109) opponents batting average and five home runs allowed in 28.1 innings over his last five starts.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 3-0 with a 3.00 ERA (11 er in 33.0 ip) and .240 (29 for 121) opponents batting average in five starts at night compared to 1-2 with a 6.33 ERA (15 er in 21.1 ip) and .314 (27 for 86) opponents average in four starts during the day...in two seasons with the A's, is 12-5 with a 2.90 ERA (44 er in 136.1 ip) in 21 starts at night compared to 2-6 with a 5.12 ERA (40 er in 70.1 ip) in 12 starts during the day.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed six of his seven home runs to left-handed hitters...has surrendered 58 home runs over his last four seasons, 45 of which have been hit by lefties...has yielded a .228 (18 for 79) average the first time through the lineup, .329 (25 for 76) the second time and .250 (13 for 52) after that.

NOT WILD: Does not have a wild pitch in two seasons with the A's, a stretch of 33 starts and 206.2 innings pitched without a wild pitch...the 33 consecutive starts without a wild pitch is the second longest streak by an A's starting pitcher since 1993...Barry Zito had a 38-start streak from July 2, 2002-July 13, 2003...now has a streak of 65 games and 391.0 innings pitched since his last wild pitch on May 26, 2009 at Los Angeles (AL).

ACTIVE LEADERS: Is tied for third among active pitchers in complete games (33), tied for sixth in wins (175), games started (384) and shutouts (10), ranks seventh in strikeouts (1863) and eighth in innings pitched (2447.2).

DOMINICAN LEADERS: His 175 wins are third most among Dominican-born pitchers behind Juan Marichal (243) and Pedro Martinez (219)...also ranks third among Dominicans in games started (384), innings pitched (2447.2) and strikeouts (1863).

2013 START-BY-START: He was the winning pitcher in his first start, a 6-3 A's win at Houston April 6...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a three-run home run to Castro in the fourth inning...had a no decision in the A's 4-3, 12-inning win over Detroit April 12 ... allowed all three of his runs in the third inning on a three-run home run by Fielder ... was the winning pitcher in the A's 7-5 win over Houston April 17 in Oakland...allowed a run in the first inning but the A's came back with six runs in the bottom of the first and he retired 15 of the 17 hitters he faced over his final five innings...tossed a three-hit shutout in the A's rainshortened 13-0 seven-inning win at Boston April 23...it was his 10th career shutout, his first since May 30, 2011 at Oakland...at the age of 39 years, 334 days, he became the second oldest pitcher in Oakland history to pitch a shutout (Don Sutton is the oldest, as he was 40 years, 85 days on June 6, 1985 when he blanked Chicago 10-0)...the seven-inning shutout was third shortest in Oakland history and the shortest since Vida Blue fired 6.0 innings April 9, 1971 against Kansas City...the last complete game of fewer than eight innings by an A's pitcher was by Steve Ontiveros on May 16, 1995 against Chicago (5.0 ip)...walked Jacoby Ellsbury to lead off the sixth inning, snapping a streak of 32.0 innings and 121 batters faced without a walk dating back to his last walk on August 12, 2012 at Chicago (AL)...the 32.0-inning streak was the longest in Oakland history by a starter and second longest overall to Dennis Eckersley's streak of 50.1 innings from Aug. 17, 1989-June 12, 1990...had a no decision in the A's 9-8, 10-inning win against Baltimore **April 28** in Oakland...blanked the Orioles on one hit over the first three innings to extend his scoreless streak to 15.0 innings...was charged with his first loss of the season in the A's 4-2 loss at New York May 4...Hughes shutout the A's on four hits over the first eight innings...lost his second consecutive start in the A's 9-2 decision at Cleveland May 9 ... allowed a two-run home run to Kipnis in the first, three runs in the second and a leadoff home run to Swisher in the third...had a no decision in the A's 6-5. 10inning loss to Texas May 14...did not strike out a batter for the eighth time in his career...it was the first time in a game in which he pitched more than 4.0 innings.

LAST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 9-2 win at Texas on Monday...was aided by three double plays over the first four innings...had a 1-0 lead when Soto scored on a Profar ground out in the third...had a 5-1 lead when he allowed a sacrifice fly to Profar in the fifth...retired each of the final six batters he faced.

COLÓN vs. HOUSTON: Is 5-2 with a 3.42 ERA (52.2 ip, 47 h, 22 r, 20 er, 12 bb, 31 so, 7 hr) in eight career appearances, all starts...is 2-0 with a 2.45 ERA (3 er in 11.0 ip) in two starts at Minute Maid Park, 1-0 with a 1.13 ERA (1 er in 8.0 ip) in one start in the Astrodome and 2-2 with a 4.28 ERA (16 er in 33.2 ip) in five starts in his home ballparks...is 2-0 with a 3.00 ERA (12.0 ip, 12 h, 4 r, 4 er, 0 bb, 5 so) in two starts this year...the first win came in a 6-3 decision at Houston April 6...retired 11 of the first 12 batters...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a three-run home run to Castro in the fourth innings...those were the only runs he would allow in six innings and the A's scored four times in the sixth for the win...then picked up the win in a 7-5 victory in Oakland April 17...allowed a run in the first inning when Altuve singled, went to third on a Castro single, and scored on a Carter fielders choice...the A's came back with six runs in the bottom of the first and he retired 15 of the 17 hitters he faced over his final five innings.

#### TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Dan Straily (2-2, 5.73 ERA): Is scheduled to make his seventh start of the season...was recalled from Sacramento May 1 for his third stint with the A's this year and is 1-2 with a 5.40 ERA in four starts since his return...has allowed a .196 batting average the first time through the lineup, 213 the second time and .320 the third time ... ranks second among American League rookies in strikeouts (32), tied for third in wins (2), fourth in innings pitched (33.0) and tied for fourth in games started (6)...combined with Doolittle and Balfour on a three-hit shutout in his last start, a 1-0 A's win at Texas last Tuesday (7.0 ip, 2 h, 5 so)...has never faced San Francisco in his career...is also making his first career interleague start.

## ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

#### 2.75 ERA (157.0 ip, 130 h, 53 r, 48 er, 50 bb, 139 so, 15 hr)

The A's bullpen allowed a run in the seventh inning last night, snapping a 19.1-inning scoreless streak...the pen now has a 1.43 ERA (6 er in 37.2 ip) over the past 14 games and an American League leading 2.75 ERA for the season...also has the lowest opponents batting average (.219) and on-base percentage (.280) in the AL...is tied for third in wins (9) but is tied for the fewest save opportunities (15)...first batters faced are 23 for 134 (.172) with five walks and a hit by pitch (.204 on-base percentage)...the batting average and on-base percentage against first batters are the lowest in the majors



 Did not walk a batter over his first three starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1916 to start the season with three consecutive games of five or more innings and no walks...had a four-game streak with no walks and at least five innings pitched dating back to 2012, which was the longest streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.

#### YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Became the A's 14th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 14 years April 1 against Seattle.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list April 13 with a strained muscle in his left hand...it was his
  second career stint on the DL as he was out from May 7-31 last year with a muscle strain in his left
  hand...went 3 for 9 (.333) with a home run and four RBI on a three-game rehab assignment with
  Sacramento...was reinstated April 28.
- Had his first career four-strikeout game April 29 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Had his first career four-RBI game April 30 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 1 against Los Angeles (AL), tying the Oakland record (32nd time, last: Josh Willingham at Seattle, April 24, 2011).
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 16 streak with his third inning single May 12 at Seattle.

#### COCO CRISP

- Was on his ninth Opening Day Roster (2004-09, 11-13), his third straight with the A's...made his eighth career Opening Start April 1 against Seattle, including three straight with the A's.
- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more.
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19... went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.
- Had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history April 28 against Baltimore...the last was by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...had two walk-off sacrifice flies last year, in addition to a single.
- Finished April with 24 runs scored to set an Oakland record for runs in April...broke the previous mark of 23 by Jose Canseco in 1988.

#### JOSH DONALDSON

 Had his first career game-ending RBI April 12 against Detroit, a home run in the bottom of the 12th inning.

- Was a perfect 4 for 4 April 27 against Baltimore, matching his career high in hits (August 17, 2012 vs. Cleveland)...had another four-hit game May 14 against Texas.

• Hit .139 in April, which was the third lowest April batting average in Oakland history (min. 75 PA)...Don Baylor hit .129 in 1976 and Ben Grieve hit .132 in 1999.
