A's vs. GIANTS

The A's lost the season series to the Giants last year, 2-4...it marked just the third time in 16 years the A's lost the season series to the Giants (have won four and split nine)...lost two of three last year in both Oakland and San Francisco...have won seven of the last nine games in Oakland but have lost 10 of the last 12 in San Francisco...the A's are 47-45 all-time against the Giants during interleague play...that breaks down to 27-19 in Oakland and 20-26 in San Francisco.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 23-19 on Memorial Day...that includes 15-11 in Oakland and 8-8 on the road...this will be the A's first interleague Memorial Day game.

Grant Balfour has converted each of his last 28 save opportunities, which is the second longest streak in Oakland history.

Josh Donaldson is batting .374 (43 for 115) with 14 doubles, five home runs and 23 RBI over his last 32 games since April 22...has the third best batting average in the majors over that span.

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In 1956 Art Ditmar scatters 10-hits and shuts out the Tigers 5-0 in the second game of a doubleheader...in 1984 Rickey Henderson is 3 for 3 with three stolen bases in the A's 7-1 win over New York...in 1985 Dwayne Murphy leads off the bottom of the 10th inning with a home run to lift the A's to a 2-1 win over the New York Yankees.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Swept a three-game series from Houston over the weekend, their fifth sweep of the season, and have now won three straight and eight of the last nine games...went 12-4 over the first 16 games this year, 6-15 over the next 21 contests and are 10-4 over the last 14 games...are five games over .500 for the first time since April 23 (13-8)...have not been six over since April 20 (12-6)...have won three straight series after losing each of the previous four series...are in second place in the American League West and trail Texas by 4½ games...have spent 33 of the last 35 days in sole possession of second place in the West...for the season, have spent 13 days in sole possession of first, two days tied for first, 33 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth.

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: The A's play their first interleague game of the season today and are one of three teams that have yet to have an interleague game (Boston, St. Louis)...have home-and-home two-game series with San Francisco and Cincinnati, play three-game series at Milwaukee and Pittsburgh and host St. Louis and Chicago in three-game series...went 10-8 against the National League last year, snapping a streak of three consecutive seasons with a losing interleague record...it was the ninth time in 16 seasons the A's had a winning interleague record...the A's are now 154-130 (.542) all-time in interleague play, which is sixth best.

AGAINST LEFT-HANDERS: The A's faced two left-handed starters in the three-game series at Houston and will faced three in the next four games against San Francisco...are batting .268 (150 for 560) against left-handed pitching compared to .235 (281 for 1194) against right-handers...the mark against lefties ranks sixth in the American League while the mark against righties is the lowest in the AL.

MONTH BY MONTH: The A's are 12-11 in May and have posted a losing record in the month in four of the previous five seasons...went 16-12 in April, the A's fifth consecutive month with a winning record dating back to last June...that is the A's longest such streak since a 10-month streak from June, 2002 to September, 2003...rank last in the American League in runs scored in May (83) and are averaging 3.61 runs per game...led the majors with 158 runs in April, an average of 5.64 per game...have just five stolen bases this month after stealing 25 bases in April...the A's pitching staff has a 3.65 ERA (81 er in 200.0 ip) in May after posting a 4.31 mark in April...have the third lowest May ERA in the AL after posting the fourth highest April ERA.

OFFENSE: The A's are batting .281 (70 for 249) over their last seven games but are hitting .246 for the season, which is fourth lowest in the American League...homered five times in the three-game series at Houston but have 50 for the season, which is third fewest in the AL...lead the majors in walks (206) and top the AL in hit by pitches (23)...rank second in the AL in doubles (110) and fourth in extra base hits (167)...have been shut out four times, which is tied for third most.

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 2.48 ERA (22 er in 80.0 ip) and .224 (66 for 294) opponents batting average over the last nine games...that has lowered the season ERA to 4.02, which ranks seventh in the American League...are tied for second in the AL in pickoffs (5) and have the third lowest opponents on-base percentage (.304) ...have allowed 221 runs, more than half of which have come in the third through fifth innings (112)...have a 3.26 ERA (37 er in 102.0 ip) over the first two innings of a game, 6.24 (106 er in 153.0 ip) in innings three through five and 2.74 (62 er in 204.0) from the sixth inning on.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers tossed seven innings in five of the six games on the last road trip and are now 5-1 with a 2.87 ERA (19 er in 59.2 ip) and .236 (52 for 220) opponents batting average over the last nine games...however, are 19-22 with a 4.65 ERA (155 er in 300.0 ip) for the season...are tied for second in the American League in losses and rank 11th in ERA...have allowed seven home runs in the last four games after yielding none over the previous six contests...have surrendered 44 for the season, which is tied for third most in the AL...starters have a .226 (96 for 424) opponents batting average the first time they face a batter in a game, which is fourth lowest in the majors, compared to .291 (118 for 406) the second time, which is fourth highest.

NIGHT AND DAY: The A's have a 21-12 (.636) record in night games compared to 7-11 (.389) during the day...have the third best night record in the American League and the second worst mark during the day (Houston: 2-10, .167)...have a 3.37 ERA (113 er in 302.0 ip) at night compared to 5.27 (92 er in 157.0 ip) during the day...have the second lowest night ERA in the AL and the second highest day ERA (Houston, 5.71).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's had their errorless streak snapped at seven games Saturday night, which matches their longest errorless streak over the last five years (Sept. 12-18, 2009)...have committed just one error over the last nine games and four over the last 15 contests...turned a season-high three double plays a week ago today but have just 36 for the season, which is second fewest in the American League.

THE WEST AND THE REST: The A's are 20-8 (.714) against American League West competition compared to 8-15 (.348) against everyone else...have the best intra-division record in the AL and second best in the majors (Atlanta: 13-5, .722)...are batting .267 (268 for 1002) with 166 runs (5.93 per game) in 28 games against the AL West compared to .217 (163 for 752) with 75 runs (3.26 per game) in 23 games against the rest of baseball...the pitching staff has a 3.50 ERA (101 er in 260.0 ip) against the West compared to 4.70 (104 er in 199.0 ip) against everyone else.

CLOSE CALLS: Last Friday night, the A's won for the third time this year when trailing after eight innings, which is the most in the American League and tied for the most in the majors...are 7-1 in games decided in the last at bat and are tied for third in the AL in last at bat wins...have won each of their last five one-run decisions and are 10-6 (.625) in one-run games for the season...are tied for second in the AL in one-run wins...are 3-1 in extra inning games and are tied for third in the AL in extra inning wins...have three "walk-off" wins.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's begin a brief two-game homestand tonight against San Francisco, travel to San Francisco for a two-game series Wednesday and Thursday and return home for a three-game homestand against Chicago (AL)...went 4-2 on the last homestand against Texas (1-2) and Kansas City (3-0) and are 13-10 in Oakland...went 5-1 on the last road trip to Texas (2-1) and Houston (3-0), the A's fourth road trip of the season...went 6-0 on the first trip, 4-12 on the next two and are 15-13 on the road overall.

roster and started the fifth game of the season April 5 at Houston...was optioned to Sacramento the next day when Bartolo Colón was reinstated from the suspended list...went 3-0 with a 0.96 ERA in three starts with the River Cats before being recalled from Sacramento April 29 to start for Brett Anderson...started that night, was optioned to Sacramento April 30 and recalled May 1 when Anderson went on the DL...is 1-2 with a 5.40 ERA (13 er in 21.2 ip) in four starts since then.

ROOKIE LEADERS: Ranks third among American League rookies in strikeouts (32), tied for third in wins (2), fourth in innings pitched (33.0) and tied for fourth in games started (6).

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .196 (10 for 51) batting average the first time through the lineup, .213 (10 for 47) the second time and .320 (8 for 25) the third time...has issued nine of his 12 walks to left-handed hitters...has yielded a .412 (7 for 17) batting average to the opponents number three hitter, .198 (21 for 106) against everyone else...opponents are 10 for 23 (.435) with runners in scoring position after going 3 for 27 (.111) with RISP last year.

THE LONG BALL: Has allowed just one home run over his last four starts and has yielded three for the season...has surrendered 14 home runs in 13 career starts and 72.1 innings (1.62 per nine innings)...the 14 home runs are second most by an Oakland pitcher over the first 13 games of his career...Blake Stein had 15 in 1998...10 of the 14 home runs have been solo shots...has surrendered 10 home runs in 28.2 career innings in the Coliseum compared to four in 43.2 innings on the road.

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: Is making his first career interleague appearance

FIRST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 8-3 victory at Houston April 5...struck out a careerhigh 11 batters in 6.2 innings...is the ninth pitcher in Oakland history to strikeout 11 or more in fewer than seven innings, the first since Kirk Saarloos on September 19, 2006 (11 so in 5.0 ip)...did not issue a walk and is the 12th pitcher in Oakland to strikeout 11 or more without walking a batter...shutout the Astros on two hits over the first five innings and had an 8-0 lead when he allowed a RBI single to Altuve in the sixth...allowed a leadoff double to Maxwell in the seventh and retired the next two batters before he was relieved by Neshek, who allowed Maxwell to score.

SECOND START: He had a no decision in the A's 10-8, 19-inning win over Los Angeles April 29 in Oakland...allowed a career-high six runs in 4.2 innings...allowed solo home runs to Pujols in the first and Trumbo in the second...was trailing 2-1 when he allowed four more runs in the fifth on a Pujols RBI single, a Hamilton sacrifice fly and a Trumbo two-run double...left trailing 6-1 but the A's eventually tied the game before winning in the 19th in a 6 hour and 32 minute game, the longest by time in Oakland history.

THIRD START: He had a no decision in the A's 5-4 win at New York May 5...the A's scored a run in the third, but he allowed a run in the bottom of the third on a Cano RBI single...Oakland then built a 4-1 lead before he was charged with two of the Yankees runs in a three-run sixth inning...was relieved by Blevins with one out and runners on first and second and he allowed both runs to score plus one of his own for the blown save.

FOURTH START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 6-3 loss at Seattle May 10...allowed a career-high tying six runs in 5.0 innings...allowed a RBI single to Morse and a RBI double to Smoak in the first inning...then allowed a three-run home run to Ibanez in the third and a RBI double to Morales in the fifth.

FIFTH START: He lost his second consecutive start in the A's 6-2 loss to Texas May 15 in Oakland...tossed just 4.1 innings, matching his career low...faced the minimum over the first two innings but then allowed a bases loaded two-run single to Berkman in the third inning...was charged with three of the Rangers runs in a four-run fifth inning...allowed a RBI single to Beltre and was relieved by Chavez with runners on first and third...Chavez allowed a three-run home run to Cruz.

LAST START: He combined with Doolittle and Balfour on a three-hit shutout in the A's 1-0 win at Texas last Tuesday...tossed a career-high 7.0 innings and allowed two of the hits...did not walk a batter to become just the second visiting pitcher at Rangers Ballpark to toss seven or more innings and allow two or fewer baserunners (Erik Bedard, July 7, 2007)...retired the first seven batters before Pierzynski singled with one out in the third...then set down nine straight before Profar singled with one out in the sixth.

STRAILY vs. SAN FRANCISCO: Is scheduled to make his first career appearance and start.

WITH SACRAMENTO: Went 3-0 with a 0.96 ERA in three starts with Sacramento...was tied for the Pacific Coast League lead in wins at the time of his April 29 promotion...has a .159 opponents batting average, including .111 (3 for 27) by left-handed hitters compared to .100 (8 for 42) by right handers, did not

THIS SPRING: Was 2-2 with a 5.82 ERA (21.2 ip, 31 h, 17 r, 14 er, 7 bb, 20 so, 2 hr) in seven games, including six starts, this spring...tied for the team lead in starts...allowed a .333 (31 for 93) opponents batting average...walked one batter or fewer in six of his seven outings...his one relief appearance came on March 25 against Milwaukee.

RHP Jarrod Parker (2-6, 5.76 ERA): Is scheduled to make his 11th start of the season...is 2-2 with a 4.02 ERA and .226 opponents batting average over his last five starts after going 0-4 with an 8.10 ERA and .374 opponents batting average over his first five starts...has allowed 11 home runs, which is tied for second most in the American League...has matched his career high for home runs as he yielded allowed just 11 home runs in 181.1 innings in 2012...is tied for third in the AL in losses (6)...was the losing pitcher in his last start, a 3-1 A's loss at Texas last Wednesday (7.0 ip, 6 h, 3 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 5 so)...is 0-1 with a 7.88 ERA (8.0 ip, 8 h, 7 r, 7 er, 6 bb, 4 so, 0 hr) in two career starts against San Francisco, both last year...is 1-2 with a 5.85 ERA in four career interleague starts, all last year.

The A's bullpen has allowed three runs in 5.1 innings over its past two games to snap a 19.1-inning scoreless streak...now has a 1.82 ERA (8 er in 39.2 ip) over the past 15 games (since May 10) and an American League leading 2.83 ERA for the season...also has the lowest opponents onbase percentage (.282) in the AL and the second lowest batting average (.221)...is tied for fourth in wins (9) but is tied for the fewest save opportunities (15)...first batters faced are 23 for 136 (.169) with five walks and a hit by pitch (.201 on-base percentage)...the batting average and on-base percentage against first batters are the lowest in the majors

- Is a perfect 10 for 10 in save opportunities and has now converted each of his last 28 save chances dating back to last season...that is the second longest streak in Oakland history...his last blown save came on April 29, 2012 at Baltimore...is tied for sixth in the American League in saves and is one of three AL closers without a blown save.
- Now has 36 saves with the A's and needs one more to tie Bill Caudill for 10th place in Oakland history.
- Has not allowed a run in his past 10 games and 10.1 innings and has a 1.40 ERA overall, which is tied for ninth among AL relievers...opponents are 5 for 36 (.139) during his current scoreless streak but he has issued seven walks.
- Has not allowed a run in eight appearances on the road (7.1 ip).
- Opponents are 1 for 17 (.059) with runners in scoring position, including 0 for 10 with RISP and two outs.
- Has a 7.04 ERA (7.2 ip, 8 h, 6 r, 6 er, 2 bb, 9 so, 1 hr) in eight appearances in his career against the Giants, which is his highest against any Major League team.
- Had two stints as the A's closer in 2012 and saved a team-leading 24 games in a team-high 75 appearances while posting a 2.53 ERA...was charged with just two blown saves and his save percentage of 92.3 ranked fourth in the American League...was 10th in saves.

- Has a 2.84 ERA (2 er in 6.1 ip) in eight games in the month of May after posting a 1.65 ERA in 14 outings in April.
- Has not walked a batter in his last 20 games and 21.1 innings and has issued just one walk in 22.2 innings for the season...is averaging 0.40 walks per nine innings, which is the second lowest mark among American League relievers.
- Ranks third among AL relievers in opponents on-base percentage (.181) and is tied for third in wins (3).
- Has not allowed a run in 11 games at night (10.2 ip).
- Has faced the Giants seven times in his career (6.0 ip. 5 h, 3 r, 3 er, 3 bb, 6 so, 1 hr, 4.50 ERA).
- Completed his sixth season in an Oakland uniform last year, but it was just his second full season (2010)...was 5-1 with a save, a 2.48 ERA and a .201 opponents batting average in 63 relief appearances...the ERA and opponents batting average were the lowest marks of his career.

YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Became the A's 14th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 14 years April 1 against Seattle.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list April 13 with a strained muscle in his left hand...it was his
 second career stint on the DL as he was out from May 7-31 last year with a muscle strain in his left
 hand...went 3 for 9 (.333) with a home run and four RBI on a three-game rehab assignment with
 Sacramento...was reinstated April 28.
- Had his first career four-strikeout game April 29 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Had his first career four-RBI game April 30 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 1 against Los Angeles (AL), tying the Oakland record (32nd time, last: Josh Willingham at Seattle, April 24, 2011).
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 16 streak with his third inning single May 12 at Seattle.

RYAN COOK

 Allowed his first run of the season on the road May 26 at Houston, snapping a 22.2-inning scoreless streak on the road dating back to Aug. 11, 2012...the road scoreless streak is third longest in Oakland history by a reliever.

COCO CRISP

- Was on his ninth Opening Day Roster (2004-09, 11-13), his third straight with the A's...made his
 eighth career Opening Start April 1 against Seattle, including three straight with the A's.
- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more.
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19... went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.
- Had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history April 28 against Baltimore...the last was by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...had two walk-off sacrifice flies last year, in addition to a single.

SHANE PETERSON

- · Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 16 against Houston and went 0 for 4.
- Singled off Xavier Cedeno in the fourth inning April 17 against Houston for his first Major League hit

JOSH REDDICK

Hit .139 in April, which was the third lowest April batting average in Oakland history (min. 75 PA)...Don Baylor hit .129 in 1976 and Ben Grieve hit .132 in 1999.

CHRIS RESOP

 Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2006 with Florida, 2008 with Atlanta and 2011-12 with Pittsburgh).

FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 23 with a sprained right elbow.
- Had successful UCL reconstruction surgery March 27...the procedure was performed by Dr. Thomas Mehlhoff at the Texas Orthopedic Hospital in Houston, Texas.

ADAM ROSALES
