### TODAY'S TIDBITS

A scoring change has been in the A's vs. Astros game last Sunday...in the fourth inning, credit Yoenis Céspedes with a hit and take away the error from Altuve.

**Yoenis Céspedes** has a career-high 12-game hitting streak (15 for 50, .300).

**Josh Donaldson** is batting .369 (48 for 130) over his last 36 games since April 22...has the fourth best batting average in the majors over that span.

### THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1987** rookie Mark McGwire homers twice in the A's 9-5 loss at New York...the two homers give McGwire 15 in May, an Oakland record for homers in one month...he would go on to hit what was then an Oakland record 49 home runs en route to Rookie of the Year honors...in **2006** Bobby Crosby hits a solo home run in the fourth inning of the A's 7-0 victory over Kansas City, the 6000<sup>th</sup> home run in Oakland history.

### ABOUT THE A's

**ABOUT THE A'S:** Had their six-game winning streak snapped yesterday...have won 11 of the last 13 games...went 12-4 over the first 16 games this year (second best record in the majors through April 18), 6-15 over the next 21 contests (tied for the worst in the majors from April 19 to May 10) and are 13-5 over the last 18 games (tied for second best in the majors since May 11)...are 4-0-1 over the last five series after losing each of the previous four series...are in second place in the American League West and trail Texas by three games...have spent 37 of the last 39 days in sole possession of second place in the West...for the season, have spent 13 days in sole possession of first, two days tied for first, 37 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth.

**MONTH BY MONTH:** The A's are 15-12 in May with two games remaining ...have clinched a winning record in May for just the second time in the last six years (16-12 in 2010)...went 16-12 in April and now have six consecutive months with a winning record dating back to last June...that is the A's longest such streak since a 10-month streak from June, 2002 to September, 2003...have scored 104 runs in May (3.85 per game) after tallying a Major League leading 158 in April (5.64 per game)...have been hit by a pitch an American League leading 15 times in May, which is the A's most in any month since they were hit 21 times in June, 2001...have an AL low seven stolen bases this month after stealing an AL leading 25 bases in April...the Oakland record for fewest stolen bases in May is seven in 2003 and 2007...the A's pitching staff has a 3.64 ERA (95 er in 235.0 ip) in May after posting a 4.31 mark in April...have the second lowest May ERA in the AL after posting the fourth highest April ERA...are batting .237 (213 for 899) in May, which is third lowest in the AL.

**NIGHT AND DAY:** The A's have a 23-12 (.657) record in night games compared to 8-12 (.400) during the day...have the second best night record in the American League and the second worst mark during the day...have a 3.43 ERA (122 er in 320.0 ip) at night compared to 5.02 (97 er in 174.0 ip) during the day...have the third lowest night ERA in the AL and the second highest day ERA.

**PITCHING:** The A's have compiled a 2.82 ERA (36 er in 115.0 ip) and .231 (99 for 429) opponents batting average over the last 13 games...that has lowered the season ERA to 3.99, which ranks seventh in the American League...have walked two batters or fewer in nine of the last 10 games...have a .304 opponents on-base percentage overall, which is second lowest in the AL...are tied for third in pickoffs (5).

**STARTING PITCHING:** A's starting pitchers are 8-2 with a 3.24 ERA (30 er in 83.1 ip) and .237 (74 for 312) opponents batting average over the last 13 games...however, are 22-23 with a 4.62 ERA (166 er in 323.2 ip) for the season...are tied for second in the American League in losses and rank 11<sup>th</sup> in ERA.

**OFFENSE:** The A's lead the majors in walks (231) and top the American League in hit by pitches (25)...rank third in the AL in doubles (117) and on-base percentage (.333) and fourth in extra base hits (178)...have the fourth lowest batting average (.245) and the fourth fewest home runs (53).

**DEFENSIVE DOINGS:** The A's have committed an error in each of the last three games...now have four errors in the last six games after a seven-game errorless streak from May 17-24...have turned just 40 double plays, which is tied for second fewest in the American League.

**CLOSE CALLS:** The A's have three wins this year when trailing after eight innings, which is the most in the American League and tied for second most in the majors...have won each of their last five one-run decisions and are 10-6 (.625) in one-run games...have the second best record in one-run games in the AL and are tied for second in wins...are 7-1 in games decided in the last at bat and are tied for third in the AL in last at bat wins...are 3-1 in extra inning games...are tied for the second best record in extra inning games in the AL and are tied for third in wins...have three "walk-off" wins.

**THIS AND THAT:** A's pinch hitters are 5 for 53 (.094) with two home runs, seven RBI and five walks...lead the American League in pinch plate appearances (58) but have the second lowest batting average (Baltimore, .063)...are tied for second in home runs and RBI and tied for third in walks...the A's lead the majors in plate appearances with the bases loaded (79)...are tied for the AL lead in bases load doubles (6), rank second in RBI (46) and tied for second in walks (6)...are tied for the lead in grounded into double plays (6)...are hitting .250 (17 for 68).

**AGAINST LEFT-HANDERS:** The A's have faced a left-handed starter in five of the previous seven games and are scheduled to face a lefty in the final two games of this series...are 4-1 in those five games against lefties and are 10-8 when the opponent starts a left-hander overall...the 18 games against lefties are tied for third most in the American League...are batting .261 (166 for 636) against left-handed pitching compared to .237 (296 for 1247) against right-handers...the mark against lefties ranks sixth in the American League while the mark against righties is second lowest.

**17 GAMES IN 17 DAYS:** The A's are 6-1 during this 17-day stretch without a day off that began a week ago today and runs through June 9...it matches their longest stretch without a day off for the season (Aug. 23-Sept. 8)...following this three-game series with the White Sox, the stretch concludes with a seven-game road trip to Milwaukee (three games) and Chicago (four games).

**THE WEST AND THE REST:** The A's are 20-8 (.714) against American League West competition compared to 11-16 (.407) against everyone else...have the best intra-division record in the AL and second best in the majors (Atlanta: 13-5, .722)...are batting .268 (269 for 1002) with 166 runs (5.93 per game) in 28 games against the AL West compared to .219 (193 for 881) with 96 runs (3.56 per game) in 27 games against the rest of baseball...the pitching staff has a 3.50 ERA (101 er in 260.0 ip) against the West compared to 4.54 (118 er in 234.0 ip) against everyone else.

**HOME AND AWAY:** The A's open a brief three-game homestand tonight against Chicago...split two games in San Francisco Wednesday and Thursday after sweeping a two-game series from the Giants in Oakland on Monday and Tuesday...have won each of the last five home games, which is the longest home winning streak of the season, and are 15-10 in Oakland...have won six of the last eight road games and are 16-14 on the road.

**FOR STARTERS:** Is scheduled to make his 11<sup>th</sup> start of the season...the A's are 7-3 (.700) in his starting assignments this year and 21-13 (.618) over the last two years...his teams are 218-167 (.566) in his career...has tossed six or more innings in eight of his 10 starts, allowed two runs or fewer four times and walked one batter or fewer nine times.

**BRIEFLY:** Went 3-0 with a 2.42 ERA, .235 opponents batting average and two home runs allowed in 26.0 innings over his first four starts...then went 0-2 with an 8.22 ERA, .354 opponents batting average and four home runs in 15.1 innings over his next three starts from April 28 to May 9...is 2-0 with a 2.25 ERA (5 er in 20.0 ip), .264 (19 for 72) opponents batting average and one home run allowed in 20.0 innings in three starts since then.

**DON'T WALK:** Did not walk a batter in his last start for the seventh time this year and has issued just four walks in 61.1 innings for the season...is averaging 0.59 walks per nine innings, which is the lowest mark in the majors...leads the American League and ranks second in the majors in strikeout to walk ratio (9.75)...is averaging the fewest pitches per game in the AL (85.8) and the second fewest pitches per inning (14.0).

**40 YEARS OLD:** Made his first start as a 40-year old last Sunday at Houston and tossed 7.0 shutout innings while striking out nine...the strikeouts were the most in Athletics history by a 40-year old, topping the previous high of seven by Tom Candiotti (July 31, 1998 vs. Cleveland) and Don Sutton (April 22, 1985 vs. California)...he is just the fourth pitcher in Oakland history to start a game at age 40...the other three are Tommy John (last start at 42 years, 126 days), Candiotti (last start at 41 years, 275 days) and Sutton (last start at 40 years, 155 days).

**NIGHT AND DAY:** Is 3-0 with a 3.00 ERA (11 er in 33.0 ip) and .240 (29 for 121) opponents batting average in five starts at night compared to 2-2 with a 4.76 ERA (15 er in 28.1 ip) and .316 (36 for 114) opponents average in five starts during the day...in two seasons with the A's, is 12-5 with a 2.90 ERA (44 er in 136.1 ip) in 21 starts at night compared to 3-6 with a 4.66 ERA (40 er in 77.1 ip) in 13 starts during the day.

**DAYS REST:** Is scheduled to pitch on four days rest today...is 1-1 with a 6.14 ERA (15 er in 22.0 ip) in four starts on four days rest compared to 4-1 with a 2.52 ERA (11 er in 39.1 ip) in six starts on five days rest or more.

**OPPONENTS BATTING:** Has allowed six of his seven home runs to left-handed hitters...has surrendered 58 home runs over his last four seasons, 45 of which have been hit by lefties...has a .200 (15 for 75) opponents batting average over his first 30 pitches in a game, .354 (45 for 127) with six of his seven home runs from pitches 31-75 and .152 (5 for 33) after that...has yielded a .336 (39 for 116) batting average to the first four hitters in the order, .218 (26 for 119) against the bottom five.

**NOT WILD:** Does not have a wild pitch in two seasons with the A's, a stretch of 34 starts and 213.2 innings pitched without a wild pitch...the 34 consecutive starts without a wild pitch is the second longest streak by an A's starting pitcher since 1993...Barry Zito had a 38-start streak from July 2, 2002-July 13, 2003...now has a streak of 66 games and 398.0 innings pitched since his last wild pitch on May 26, 2009 at Los Angeles (AL).

**ACTIVE LEADERS:** Is tied for third among active pitchers in complete games (33), tied for fifth in wins (176), ranks sixth in games started (385), tied for sixth in shutouts (10), seventh in strikeouts (1872) and eighth in innings pitched (2454.2).

**DOMINICAN LEADERS:** His 176 wins are third most among Dominican-born pitchers behind Juan Marichal (243) and Pedro Martinez (219)...also ranks third among Dominicans in games started (385), innings pitched (2454.2) and strikeouts (1872).

**2013 HIGHLIGHTS:** Tossed a three-hit shutout in the A's rain-shortened 13-0 seven-inning win at Boston **April 23**...it was his 10<sup>th</sup> career shutout, his first since May 30, 2011 at Oakland...at the age of 39 years, 334 days, he became the second oldest pitcher in Oakland history to pitch a shutout (Don Sutton is the oldest, as he was 40 years, 85 days on June 6, 1985 when he blanked Chicago 10-0)...the seven-inning shutout was third shortest in Oakland history and the shortest since Vida Blue fired 6.0 innings April 9, 1971 against Kansas City...the last complete game of fewer than eight innings by an A's pitcher was by Steve Ontiveros on May 16, 1995 against Chicago (5.0 ip)...walked Jacoby Ellsbury to lead off the sixth inning, snapping a streak of 32.0 innings and 121 batters faced without a walk dating back to his last walk on August 12, 2012 at Chicago (AL)...the 32.0-inning streak was the longest in Oakland history by a starter and second longest overall to Dennis Eckersley's streak of 50.1 innings from Aug. 17, 1989-June 12, 1990...had a no decision in the A's 9-8, 10-inning win against Baltimore **April 28** in Oakland...blanked the Orioles on one hit over the first three innings to extend his scoreless streak to 15.0 innings...had a no decision in the A's 6-5, 10-inning loss to Texas **May 14**...did not strike out a batter for the eighth time in his career...it was the first time in a game in which he pitched more than 4.0 innings...was the winning pitcher in the A's 9-2 win at Texas **May 20**...walked two batters to snap a season-opening streak of eight consecutive starts with one walk or fewer and two innings or more...that was the longest season-opening streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.

**LAST START:** He was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-2 win at Houston last Sunday...tossed 7.0 shutout inning and scattered nine hits...did not walk a batter and struck out nine...had runners on first and third with one out in the first inning but struck out the next two batters...allowed three hits in the sixth inning but was aided by a double play.

**COLÓN vs. CHICAGO:** Is 10-8 with a 4.06 ERA (142.0 ip, 143 h, 72 r, 64 er, 50 bb, 98 so, 15 hr) in 22 career appearances, all starts...is 5-4 with a 2.77 ERA (26 er in 84.1 ip) in 12 starts in his home ballparks and 5-4 with a 5.93 ERA (38 er in 57.2 ip) in 10 starts at U.S. Cellular Field as a visiting pitcher...pitched for the White Sox in 2003 and 2009 and is 15-14 with a 4.43 ERA (101 er in 205.0 ip) in 32 career starts at U.S. Cellular Field...was 0-2 with a 4.97 ERA (12.2 ip, 16 h, 8 r, 7 er, 5 bb, 4 so, 3 hr) in two starts last year...the first loss came in a 4-0 A's loss in Oakland April 23...blanked the White Sox on three walks over the first three innings...then allowed back-to-back home runs to Dunn and Konerko to start the fourth inning, the only runs he would allow in 7.0 innings...also took the loss in a 7-3 decision at Chicago August 12...allowed just one run over the first five innings and it was unearned as a two-out sacrifice fly by Dunn in the third inning followed a Pennington error...the A's tied the game with a run in the sixth but he allowed five runs in the bottom of the sixth on a two-run home run by Pierzynski, a RBI single by Wise and a two-run single by Beckham.

## TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

**RHP Dan Straily (3-2, 5.08 ERA):** Is scheduled to make his eighth start of the season...is 2-0 with a 0.69 ERA, .136 opponents batting average and one walk in 13.0 innings over his last two starts...that matches the longest winning streak of his career (Aug. 16-Sept. 11, 2012)...went 1-2 with a 7.27 ERA, .257 opponents batting average and 12 walks in 26.0 innings over his first five starts...is tied for second among American League rookies in wins (3), tied for third in strikeouts (33) and ranks fourth in innings pitched (39.0) and games started (7)...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 4-1 A's win over San Francisco Monday in Oakland (6.0 ip, 4 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 1 so)...is making his first career appearance and start against Chicago.

## ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

**9-1, 2.80 ERA (170.1 ip, 144 h, 59 r, 53 er, 55 bb, 148 so, 16 hr)**

**Save/Save Opportunities: 13/17 (76.5%)**

The A's bullpen has allowed seven runs in the last six games (6 er in 16.2 ip, 3.24 ERA) after a 19.1-inning scoreless streak...now has an **American League leading 2.80 ERA** for the season...has the lowest opponents on-base percentage in the AL (.284) and the second lowest batting average (.223)...is tied for fourth in wins (9) and has the fewest losses (1)...is tied for the third fewest save opportunities (17) and has the fourth best save percentage (76.5%)...first batters faced are 26 for 146 (.178) with five walks and a hit by pitch (.206 on-base percentage)...the batting average and on-base percentage against first batters are the lowest in the majors.

**First Hitters: 4-20 (2 bb)**

- Is a perfect 12 for 12 in save opportunities and has now converted each of his last 30 save chances dating back to last season...that is the second longest streak in Oakland history...his last blown save came on April 29, 2012 at Baltimore...is tied for fifth in the American League in saves and is one of two AL closers without a blown save (Janssen, TOR).
- His save Wednesday night was the 38<sup>th</sup> of his career with the A's, which moves him past Bill Caudill for 10<sup>th</sup> place in Oakland history...Billy Koch and Keith Foulke are tied for eighth with 44.
- Had his 11-game, 11.1-inning scoreless streak snapped Tuesday night when he allowed a solo home run to Pence in the ninth inning.
- Has not allowed a run in nine appearances on the road (8.1 ip).
- Opponents are 1 for 18 (.056) with runners in scoring position, including 0 for 11 with RISP and two outs.
- Is 3-0 with three saves, two blown saves and a 4.15 ERA (12 er in 26.0 ip) in 28 games in his career against the White Sox.

## CAREER

**2011**—Had a career-high four triples in 88 games in a season that included a trip to the disabled list...saw action at all four infield positions with 49 games at shortstop, 33 at third base, four at first base and one at second base...hit .330 against left-handed pitching, the seventh-best mark in the American League among players with at least 115 plate appearances against lefties...hit an AL-best (min. 50 PA) .368 in April and led the Sox with a .574 slugging percentage, which was 10th-best in the AL during the month...placed on the 15-day DL with a left shoulder strain June 17...played in five rehab games with Triple-A Pawtucket, hitting .412 with four doubles and five RBI...activated from DL Aug. 8...hit .270 in 55 games before the trip to the DL and .221 after...began a 5-4-3 triple play in game two of a double-header Aug. 16 against Tampa Bay...it was just the second triple play turned by Boston since 1980 and the club's first since shortstop John Valentin's unassisted triple play July 8, 1994 against Seattle.

**2010**—Appeared in 56 games, his fourth consecutive season with 50 or more games...joins Dick Radatz (1962-65) as the only members of the Red Sox to pitch in at least 50 games in each of their first four Big League campaigns...became the 13th American League player overall to do it, the fifth lefty...is just the second Japanese-born pitcher to accomplish the feat (Shigetoshi Hasegawa, 1997-2000)...missed time due to his first career stint on the disabled list...tallied a career-high four losses and 4.50 ERA...also set career highs with 59 hits and 24 runs allowed...earned the Opening Day victory April 4 against New York (AL), becoming the first Red Sox pitcher ever to win two Opening Day games in relief (also 2008 against the A's in Tokyo)...allowed an unearned run to take the loss in the team's next game April 6 against New York (AL), becoming the first Red Sox pitcher to earn a decision in each of Boston's first two games of the season since Bill Campbell lost each of the club's first two games in 1977...held opponents to a .240 batting average and a 2.77 ERA in 29 appearances at Fenway Park compared to a .398 clip and a 6.75 ERA in 27 games on the road...was placed on the 15-day disabled list Aug. 6 with a right hamstring strain...made three rehab appearances with Triple-A Pawtucket before being activated Aug. 28...allowed runs in just 2 of his final 16 outings after coming off the DL...posted a 1.32 ERA in that time, including a season-high 12-game (10.0 ip) scoreless stretch from Aug. 29 to Sept. 21...finished second among Red Sox relievers with a 2.37 ERA after the All-Star break, including a club-best 1.38 mark in Sept./Oct...retired 11 straight batters over three tilts from Sept. 18-21...made his 250th career relief appearance Sept. 21 against Baltimore, becoming the 11th player to reach that mark with Boston.

**2009**—Made a career-high 68 appearances for the Red Sox, which ranked eighth among American League left-handers...held opponents scoreless in 52 of 68 games...finished tied for fifth in the AL with 24 holds, his third straight season to reach 20 in that category...doubled his previous career high in wins and equaled total from his first two seasons combined with six victories, which tied for eighth among AL relievers...Tom Burgmeier was Boston's last lefty to post more relief victories in a season, going 7-0 in 1982...that was also the last time a Sox hurler had more relief wins in a single season without a loss...held left-handed hitters to a .167 clip, which was eighth in the AL among pitchers with at least 60 appearances...allowed just 16.2% (6 of 37) of inherited runners to score, which was third among qualifying AL pitchers...went 27 games without allowing an inherited runner to score from May 16 to July 24, stranding a total of 16 over that span...posted a 1.04 ERA over a stretch of 25 games from April 28 to June 29...logged a 2.87 mark over his final 58 games beginning April 28...gave up two runs on four hits and did not retire a batter April 24 against New York (AL), the first time in his Major League career that he failed to record an out...had 16.1 scoreless innings from April 28 to June 4, which was the longest streak by a Boston reliever in 2009...joined Junichi Tazawa and Takashi Saito as the first trio of Japanese hurlers ever to appear for a ML team in a single game, Aug. 7 at New York (AL)...made one postseason appearance, tossing 0.1 inning in Game 3 of the ALDS against Los Angeles (AL).

**2008**—Notched his second straight season of at least 60 games, the second Red Sox ever to reach that mark in each of his first two Major League campaigns, joining Dick Radatz (1962-63)...tallied 23 holds, which ranked sixth in the American League...held lefties to a .184 average, including a .125 clip in his final 27 games...went more than 1.0 inning 10 times with a high of 2.0 innings on three occasions...let 52.0% (13-of-25) of his inherited runners score, which was the second highest mark in the AL among relievers with at least 50 appearances...gave up runs in 11 of his 64 games...allowed just one run over his first 17 games through May 10, posting a 0.50 ERA in that span...surrendered 11 runs over his next

**2007**—In his first Major League season, led the Red Sox and all American League rookies with 66 appearances, a club record for a first-year player...was selected as the Major League Setup Man of the Year in fan voting in MLB.com's This Year in Baseball Awards...also named Red Sox Unsung Hero by Boston BBWAA Chapter...earned a spot as the left-handed pitcher on the Topps Major League Rookie All-Star Team...had the eighth-best ERA among AL qualifying relievers at 2.22...opponents hit just .130 with runners in scoring position and .168 with runners on base, both the second-lowest marks among AL relievers with 50.0 or more innings...held opponents to a .255 on-base percentage, which was eighth lowest in AL among relief pitchers...permitted just 4 of 28 (14.3%) inherited runners to score...surrendered a home run to John Buck on the first pitch he threw in the Major Leagues, a sixth inning blast on Opening Day, April 2 at Kansas City...was the third pitcher in Red Sox history to do that along with Charlie Mitchell (Aug. 9, 1984 at Texas) and Jeff Suppan (July 17, 1995 against Kansas City)...tossed 20.2 scoreless innings over his next 20 games after Opening Day through May 20, the longest scoreless streak by a Red Sox lefty since Bruce Hurst's 21.2 innings from May 5-15, 1987...posted a 0.71 ERA in 12 April appearances to earn AL Rookie of the Month honors...was just the second AL middle/setup reliever to ever receive that award, joining Texas' Frank Francisco in August 2004...ended a span of 17.0 scoreless innings by allowing a home run to Paul Konerko July 9 against Chicago (AL)...earned a spot on the AL All-Star team by virtue of winning online All-Star Final Vote...received over 4.3 million votes...became the seventh native of Japan ever selected as an All-Star and the ninth Red Sox rookie...did not pitch in the July 10 game at San Francisco...beginning Aug. 10, compiled a 7.24 ERA over his final 15 games...did not pitch from Sept. 15-26 due to left shoulder fatigue...had a 2.45 ERA in a team-best eight appearances during the playoffs...worked 9.2 scoreless frames in his first six postseason outings before issuing three runs, including two homers, over 1.1 innings in Games 3 and 4 of the World Series at Colorado...pitched 2.1 shutout frames in two ALDS outings against the Angels and 5.0 scoreless innings in three ALCS games versus Cleveland...was the first native of Japan to ever pitch in a World Series game with 2.1 scoreless innings in Game 2 at Fenway Park.

**2006**—After 11 seasons with Yomiuri, he pitched for Nippon-Ham in his final season in Japan before signing with Boston...tied for seventh in the Pacific League in saves (4) and ranked 10th in appearances (55)...was 2-2 with a 2.14 ERA...held opposition to a .230 batting average and had 22 holds...appeared in four of five games in the Japan Series against the Chunichi Dragons...Nippon-Ham won the series, 4-1, for the franchise's first championship since 1962.

- Was hit by a pitch twice May 1 against Los Angeles (AL), tying the Oakland record (32nd time, last: Josh Willingham at Seattle, April 24, 2011).
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 16 streak with his third inning single May 12 at Seattle.

## RYAN COOK

- Allowed his first run of the season on the road May 26 at Houston, snapping a 22.2-inning scoreless streak on the road dating back to Aug. 11, 2012...the road scoreless streak is third longest in Oakland history by a reliever.

## COCO CRISP

- Was on his ninth Opening Day Roster (2004-09, 11-13), his third straight with the A's...made his eighth career Opening Start April 1 against Seattle, including three straight with the A's.
- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more.
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19... went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.
- Had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history April 28 against Baltimore...the last was by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...had two walk-off sacrifice flies last year, in addition to a single.
- Finished April with 24 runs scored to set an Oakland record for runs in April...broke the previous mark of 23 by Jose Canseco in 1988.

## JOSH DONALDSON

- Had his first career game-ending RBI April 12 against Detroit, a home run in the bottom of the 12th inning.
- Was a perfect 4 for 4 April 27 against Baltimore, matching his career high in hits (August 17, 2012 vs. Cleveland)...had another four-hit game May 14 against Texas.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of April 22-28...it was his first career weekly honor...went 12 for 22 (.545) with four runs, seven doubles (.864 slugging percentage), 10 RBI and seven walks (1 sf, .633 on-base percentage) in seven games.
- Had a career-high seven-game hitting streak from May 11-18 (12 for 26, .462).

## NATE FREIMAN

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 3 against Seattle and had a RBI single off Joe Saunders in the second inning for his first ML hit...added another single in the fourth inning for his first multiple hit game.
- Hit his first Major League home run April 22 against Houston, a three-run shot off Erik Bedard in the first inning...it snapped a 0 for 11 streak.

## JOHN JASO

- Is on his third consecutive Opening Day roster with his third team (Tampa Bay, 2011; Seattle, 2012).
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 9 at Los Angeles, a three-run shot off Jepsen in the seventh to give the A's a 7-5 lead.

## JED LOWRIE

- Had a career-high tying four RBI April 15 against Houston (fourth time, last: September 19, 2011 vs. Baltimore).
- Went 4 for 4 April 19 at Tampa, the third four-hit game of his career.
- Went 2 for 9 in the 19-inning game April 29 against Los Angeles to tie the Oakland record for at bats in a game (11th time, last: Mike Heath at Texas, July 1, 1979).
- Set an Oakland record for hits in the month of April with 34...broke the previous mark of 33 held by Stan Javier (1994) and Ben Grieve (1998)...had 11 doubles, which tied the Oakland April record (Mark Ellis, 2003).

## BRANDON MOSS

- Matched his career high with five RBI April 10 at Los Angeles (also September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) after driving in four runs the night before.
- Had a career-high four strikeouts April 12 against Detroit...matched that figure April 29 against Los Angeles and May 12 at Seattle.
- Was on the paternity list from April 16 to 18 for the birth of his second son, Brody. (April 16).
- Went 0 for 4 April 21 at Tampa Bay to snap a 15-game road hitting streak dating back to Sept. 20, 2012...hit .463 (25 for 54) during the streak.
- Hit the game-ending home run in the bottom of the 19th inning April 29 against Los Angeles, his third career walk-off home run (last: September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) and fifth career game-ending hit (also a double and single)...also homered in the sixth inning, his second career multi-homer game (June 12, 2012 at Colorado)...had 12 innings between home runs to become the 17th player in Major League history to go at least 12 innings between home runs in one game...is the second Athletic to do it...Reggie Jackson also went 12 innings between home runs June 11, 1969...had four strikeouts to become the second Major Leaguer since 1916 to have at least two home runs and four strikeouts in one game...Evan Longoria did it August 4, 2009 for Tampa Bay against Boston.
- Made his first career appearance in center field May 9 (also May 13).
- Hit the 7000th home run in Oakland history May 13 against Texas off Justin Grimm in the third inning.

## PAT NESHEK

- Did not allow a run in nine spring training appearances (8.1 ip) and has not allowed a run in 19 games (17.1 ip) over the last two springs.
- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2007-08 and 2010 with Minnesota, 2011 with San Diego).

### **DEREK NORRIS**

- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles and ended up going 0 for 5 with a walk...he and Rosales had six plate appearances, which match the most in Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12, 1992 vs. Texas).

### **SHANE PETERSON**

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 16 against Houston and went 0 for 4.
- Singled off Xavier Cedeno in the fourth inning April 17 against Houston for his first Major League hit.

### **JOSH REDDICK**

- Hit .139 in April, which was the third lowest April batting average in Oakland history (min. 75 PA)...Don Baylor hit .129 in 1976 and Ben Grieve hit .132 in 1999.

### **CHRIS RESOP**

- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2006 with Florida, 2008 with Atlanta and 2011-12 with Pittsburgh).

### **FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ**

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 23 with a sprained right elbow.
- Had successful UCL reconstruction surgery March 27...the procedure was performed by Dr. Thomas Mehlhoff at the Texas Orthopedic Hospital in Houston, Texas.

### **ADAM ROSALES**

- Began the season on the disabled list as he was added to the 15-day DL March 26 with a strained left intercostal...hit .320 (8 for 25) with one home run and one RBI during a six-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (April 17-19) and Triple-A Sacramento (April 21-24)...was reinstated April 25.
- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles (AL) and ended up going 1 for 6...he and Norris had six plate appearances, which match the most in Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12, 1992 vs. Texas).

- Matched his career-high with four hits April 11 at Los Angeles (third time, last: June 4, 2012 vs. Texas) after collecting three hits the night before.

### **ERIC SOGARD**

- Had a career-high five-game hitting streak from April 14 to 20 (7 for 16, .438)

## CHRIS YOUNG

- Is in his eighth season in the majors...the first seven came with Arizona...is on his seventh Opening Day roster.
- Made his A's debut April 3 against Seattle and homered in the seventh inning...became the 20th player in Oakland history to homer in his first game with the A's (last: Jonny Gomes, March 29, 2012 vs. Seattle at Tokyo).
- His sixth inning double April 11 at Los Angeles was the 200th of his career.
- Had his 11th career regular season multi-homer game April 24 at Boston (also has one in the post-season).
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from April 30 to May 17 with a strained left quad...it was his second career stint on the DL...made one rehab appearance with Triple-A Sacramento May 16 and went 1 for 1 with two walks, a run and a stolen base in a start in center field against Oklahoma City.
