The A's lead the season series 2-0 after winning the first two games of this series...have not swept a series from the White Sox since Aug. 14-16, 2007...split the season series last year, 3-3...went 2-1 in Oakland and 1-2 in Chicago...the A's are 31-29 against the White Sox since 2006...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 292-270 against the White Sox...that breaks down to 155-130 in Oakland and 137-140 in Chicago...all-time, the A's are 969-1025 against Chicago

The A's left 18 runners on base yesterday, the eighth time in Oakland history the A's stranded at least 18 runners...are 6-2 in those games.

Josh Donaldson is batting .362 (50 for 138) over his last 38 games since April 22...has the fourth best batting average in the majors over that span.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In **1967**, reliever Lew Krausse has the game-winning two-run single and picks up the win in the A's 6-4, 13-inning win at Chicago...in **1977** Mike Norris tosses a four-hit shutout as the A's defeat the Mariners in Seattle, 1-0...Jim Tyrone's double in the fourth inning drives in the only run of the game...in **1982** Mike Norris tosses a four-hit shutout as the A's defeat Boston 5-0.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have won two straight, eight of the last 10 and 13 of the last 15 games to move to a season-high nine games over .500 at 33-24...that is the third best record in the American League and seventh best in the majors...it matches the A's best record after 57 games over the last 22 years (also 1992, 2003 and 2004)...won game 58 in 1992 and 2004)...are 15-5 over the last 20 games, which is tied with Cincinnati for the best record in the majors since May 11...went 12-4 over the first 16 games this year (second best record in the majors through April 18) and 6-15 over the next 21 contests (tied for the worst in the majors from April 19 to May 10)...are 90-50 (.643) since July 1 of last year, which is the best mark in the majors over that span (Cincinnati, 89-52)...by winning this series against the White Sox, the A's are now 5-0-1 over the last five series after losing each of the previous four series...are in second place in the AL West and trail Texas by two games...have spent 39 of the last 41 days in sole possession of second place in the West...for the season, have spent 13 days in sole possession of first, two days tied for first, 39 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's improved to 9-1 in games decided in the last at bat with the win yesterday...rank second in the American League in last at bats wins...have won each of their last six one-run decisions and are 11-6 (.647) in one-run games...are tied for the AL lead in one-run wins and have the second best record...are 4-1 (.800) in extra inning games...are tied for the second best record and second most wins in extra inning games in the AL...have four "walk-off" wins, which is tied for second in the AL...have three wins when trailing after eight innings, which is the most in the AL and tied for second most in the majors.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 2-0 on this brief three-game homestand against Chicago and now have a seven-game home winning streak...that is the A's longest home winning streak since a 10-game streak from Aug. 11-Sept. 1, 2006...are now 17-10 in Oakland for the season, which is tied for the third best home record in the American League...have won six of the last eight road games and are 16-14 on the road.

AGAINST LEFT-HANDERS: The A's are scheduled to face a left-handed starting pitcher for the seventh time in the last 10 games today...are 5-1 in the previous six games against lefties and are 11-8 when the opponent starts a left-hander for the season...the 19 games against lefties are third most in the American League...are batting .267 (178 for 667) against left-handed pitching compared to .237 (305 for 1287) against right-handers...the average against lefties ranks sixth in the AL while the mark against righties is second lowest.

OFFENSE: The A's are batting .272 (122 for 449) with 66 runs scored over the last 13 games (5.08 per game) after hitting .219 with 104 runs scored over the previous 27 contests (3.85 per game)...for the season, the A's lead the majors in walks (240) and top the American League in hit by pitches (25)...rank second in the AL in doubles (124) and intentional walks (14), third in on-base percentage (.335) and fourth in extra base hits (186)...have the fourth fewest home runs (53).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers have allowed one run or fewer in seven of the last 15 games and are 9-2 with a 2.84 ERA (31 er in 98.1 ip) and .232 (85 for 366) opponents batting average over that span...however, are 23-23 with a 4.44 ERA (167 er in 338.2 ip) for the season...are tied for second in the American League in losses and rank 10th in ERA...starters have issued one walk or fewer in 10 of the last 11 games (8 bb in 72.1 ip, 1.00 walks per nine innings)...Bartolo Colón tossed the A's second complete game shutout of the season Friday night...Cleveland is the only other AL team with two complete game shutouts...the two complete games are tied for second in the AL.

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 2.62 ERA (39 er in 134.0 ip) and .229 (114 for 498) opponents batting average over the last 15 games...that has lowered the season ERA to 3.89, which ranks seventh in the American League...have walked two batters or fewer in 11 of the last 12 games (18 bb in 107.0 ip, 1.51 walks per nine innings)...have a .301 opponents on-base percentage overall, which is the lowest mark in the AL.

NIGHT AND DAY: The A's have a 24-12 (.667) record in night games compared to 9-12 (.429) during the day...have the second best night record in the American League and the second worst mark during the day...have a 3.34 ERA (122 er in 329.0 ip) at night compared to 4.89 (100 er in 184.0 ip) during the day...have the second lowest night ERA in the AL and the second highest day ERA.

THIS AND THAT: A's pinch hitters are 5 for 54 (.093) with two home runs, seven RBI, seven walks and a sacrifice hit...the 62 plate appearances are the most in the American League and are tied with the lowest ranking National League team (St. Louis)...have the second lowest batting average in the AL but rank second in walks and tied for second in home runs and RBI...the A's also lead the AL in plate appearances (83) and grounded into double plays (7) with the bases loaded...are tied for the lead in bases load doubles (6), rank second in walks (7) and third in RBI (47)...are hitting .239 (17 for 71) with the bases full.

17 GAMES IN 17 DAYS: The A's are 8-1 during this 17-day stretch without a day off that began May 24 at Houston and runs through next Sunday at Chicago...it matches their longest stretch without a day off for the season (Aug. 23-Sept. 8)...following this three-game series with the White Sox, the stretch concludes with a seven-game road trip to Milwaukee (three games) and Chicago (four games).

MONTH BY MONTH: The A's went 16-12 in May, marking just the second time in the last six years the A's finished with a winning record in the month (16-12 in 2010)...also went 16-12 in April and now have six consecutive months with a winning record dating back to last June...that is the A's longest such streak since a 10-month streak from June, 2002 to September, 2003...scored 107 runs in May (3.82 per game) after tallying a Major League leading 158 in April (5.64 per game)...were hit by a pitch an American League leading 15 times in May, which is the A's most in any month since they were hit 21 times in June, 2001...stole an AL low seven stolen bases in May after stealing an AL leading 25 bases in April...matched the Oakland record for fewest stolen bases in May (2003 and 2007)...batted .235 in May, which was third lowest in the AL...the A's pitching staff compiled a 3.50 ERA in May after posting a 4.31 mark in April...had the second lowest May ERA in the AL after posting the fourth highest April ERA.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his team leading 12th start of the season...the A's are 5-6 (.455) in his starting assignments this year and 22-18 (.550) in his career...has tossed six or more innings in six of his 10 starts, allowed two runs or fewer four times and walked two batters or fewer six times.

LAST SIX, FIRST FIVE: Is 3-2 with a 3.76 ERA (16 er in 38.1 ip) and .221 (31 for 140) opponents batting average over his last six starts after going 0-4 with an 8.10 ERA and .374 opponents batting average over his first five starts...the four-game losing streak was the longest of his career.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Is tied for the third lowest strikeout to walk ratio in the American League (1.69), ranks fourth in fewest pitches per game (90.5), has the fourth highest opponents on-base percentage (.363), is tied for fifth in losses (6) and wild pitches (5), tied for eighth in hit batters (4) and tied for ninth in home runs (11)...the hit batters are a career high as he hit just three batters in 181.1 innings last year...the home runs match his high as he yielded allowed just 11 home runs in 181.1 innings in 2012, an average of 0.55 per nine innings...that was the second lowest mark in the AL and third lowest in the majors.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 2-3 with a 6.42 ERA (24 er in 33.2 ip) in six starts in Oakland compared to 1-3 with a 4.18 ERA (13 er in 28.0 ip) in five starts on the road...has the fifth highest home ERA in the American League...has allowed eight of his 11 home runs on the road...last year, he was 6-5 with a 2.61 ERA at home compared to 7-3 with a 4.54 ERA on the road...had the fifth lowest home ERA in the AL.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has a .258 (45 for 174) opponents batting average the first two times through the lineup, .354 (23 for 65) after that...seven of the 11 home runs he has allowed this year have been solo shots as were eight of the 11 home runs he allowed last year...the opponents number one hitter is 12 for 28 (.429) with six walks (.529 on-base percentage)...the batting average and on-base percentage vs. the first batting slot are the highest highest marks in the American League...the two hitter is 11 for 26 (.423) with five walks (.516 on-base percentage)...the three through nine hitters are batting a combined .241 (45 for 187).

IN APRIL: Was 1-4 with a 7.36 ERA and .350 opponents batting average in the month of April...the losses matched the most in Oakland history by a pitcher in the month of April (12th time)...the ERA was the fifth highest April ERA in Oakland history among pitchers with 25 or more innings pitched...it was the highest since Gil Heredia had a 9.24 ERA in 2001...the opponents batting average was fourth highest in Oakland history in April among pitchers with 100 or more batters faced...it was the highest since Heredia had a .360 mark in 2001.

2013 START-BY-START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 7-1 loss to Seattle **April 2** in Oakland...allowed a three-run home run to Morse in the third inning and a RBI single to Morales in the fifth...had a no decision in the A's 9-5 win at Los Angeles **April 9**...surrendered a career-high tying nine hits in just 3.1 innings...also walked three batters but yielded just two runs...was the losing pitcher in the A's 10-1 loss to Detroit **April 14** in Oakland...allowed a career-high eight runs on a career-high tying nine hits in just 3.1 innings...lost his third consecutive decision in the A's 1-0 loss at Tampa Bay **April 20**...allowed a leadoff home run to Joyce in the second inning, but that was the only run he would allow in 6.1 innings...blanked the Rays on four hits and two walks over his final 4.1 innings...Hellekson, Peralta and Rodney combined to shutout the A's on three hits and a walk...extended his losing streak to four games in the A's 10-2 loss to Baltimore **April 25**...the A's scored twice in the second inning to take a 2-0 lead but he allowed three runs in the third inning on RBI singles by McLouth and Markakis and a RBI double by Jones...also allowed a sacrifice fly to Markakis in the fifth and a leadoff home run to Davis in the sixth...left with runners on first and second and one out in the sixth and Resop allowed one of those runs to score...picked up his first win of the season in the A's 10-6 win over Los Angeles **April 30** in Oakland...allowed an unearned run in the third inning on errors by Rosales and Donaldson...the A's scored two times in the fourth to take a 2-1 lead but he allowed a two-run double to Trout in the fifth...the A's then scored three times in the bottom of the fifth and four more in the sixth to take the lead for good...walked Aybar to start the seventh and was relieved by Scribner, who allowed the run to score...was the losing pitcher in the A's 7-3 loss at Cleveland **May 6**...surrendered a career-high four home runs...had allowed more than one home run in a start just twice in his career and never more than two...all four home runs were solo shots...Kipnis and Cabrera had back-to-back home runs in the first and Cabrera and Reynolds went deep in the fifth...was the winning pitcher in the A's 4-3 win at Seattle **May 11**...shutout the Mariners on three walks over the first four innings and had a 3-0 lead when he allowed a two-run home run to Shoppach in the fifth inning...the A's increased the lead to 4-2 before he put runners on first and second with one out in the seventh...was relieved by Doolittle who allowed one of the runs to score...had a no decision in the A's 2-1 win over Kansas City **May 17** in Oakland...allowed just one run in 7.0 innings...Perez double with one out in the third inning and scored one out later on a Lough RBI double...Shields shutout the A's on four hits over the first six innings before Donaldson tied the game with a solo home run in the seventh...was relieved by Doolittle to start the eighth and Rosales homered in the bottom of the inning for the win...was the losing pitcher in the A's 3-1 loss at Texas **May 22**...allowed three runs in the first inning on a two-run home run by Murphy and a solo home run by Beltre...then shutout the Rangers on three hits and a walk over his final six innings...the A's were held to a run on four hits by Wolf and the Rangers bullpen.

LAST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-3 victory over San Francisco on Tuesday in Oakland...tossed 7.0 innings for the third consecutive start...allowed a RBI single to Pence in the first inning but retired 12 of the next 14 batters after that...had a 5-1 lead when Scutaro doubled to lead off the sixth inning and scored after back-to-back ground outs...retired each of the final six batters.

PARKER vs. CHICAGO: Had a no decision in his only career start, a 5-4 A's win in 14 innings on April 25 of last year, his A's debut...shutout the White Sox on five hits and a walks over the first six innings to extend his career-opening scoreless streak to 11.2 innings...had a 2-0 lead when he allowed a RBI double to Fukudome in the seventh inning...Balfour allowed a run in the ninth inning for the blown save.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

LHP Tommy Milone (5-5, 4.04 ERA): Is scheduled to make his 12th start of the season...is 2-1 despite a 5.87 ERA and .287 opponents batting average over his last four starts...went 3-4 with a 3.13 ERA and .251 opponents average over his first seven starts...has allowed a .188 batting average with runners in scoring position, which is third lowest in the American League...is 5-2 with a 3.22 ERA and six home runs allowed in eight starts at night compared to 0-3 with a 6.27 ERA and five home runs allowed in three starts during the day...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 6-4 A's win at San Francisco last Wednesday (5.0 ip, 8 h, 4 r, 4 er, 3 bb, 3 so)...has never faced Milwaukee in his career...picked up the win in his only interleague start this year, his last start at San Francisco...is now 2-0 despite a 6.65 ERA in four career interleague starts.

The A's bullpen has allowed nine runs in its last seven games (8 er in 20.2 ip, 3.48 ERA) after a 19.1-inning scoreless streak...now has an **American League leading 2.84 ERA** for the season...has the lowest opponents on-base percentage in the AL (.284) and the third lowest batting average (.224)...is tied for third in wins (10) and has the fewest losses (1)...is tied for the fourth fewest save opportunities (18) and has the fourth best save percentage (72.2%)...first batters faced are 27 for 151 (.179) with five walks and a hit by pitch (.206 on-base percentage)...the batting average and on-base percentage against first batters are the lowest in the majors.

- Is a perfect 12 for 12 in save opportunities and has now converted each of his last 30 save chances dating back to last season...that is the second longest streak in Oakland history...his last blown save came on April 29, 2012 at Baltimore...is tied for fifth in the American League in saves and is one of two AL closers without a blown save (Janssen, TOR).
- His save Wednesday night was the 38th of his career with the A's, which moves him past Bill Caudill for 10th place in Oakland history...Billy Koch and Keith Foulke are tied for eighth with 44.
- Had his 11-game, 11.1-inning scoreless streak snapped Tuesday night when he allowed a solo home run to Pence in the ninth inning.
- Has not allowed a run in 19 of 23 games overall and has a 1.54 ERA, which ranks eighth among AL relievers.
- Has not yielded a run in nine appearances on the road (8.1 ip).
- Opponents are 1 for 18 (.056) with runners in scoring position, including 0 for 11 with RISP and two outs.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 3-2 with a 2.43 ERA (9 er in 33.1 ip) and .234 (30 for 128) opponents batting average in five starts at home compared to 2-3 with a 5.55 ERA (22 er in 35.2 ip) and .290 (42 for 125) opponents average in six starts on the road...has the sixth highest road ERA in the American League...has issued 10 of his 15 walks on the road...in two seasons with the A's, he is 10-6 with a 2.66 ERA (39 er in 132.0 ip) and .238 (119 for 499) opponents average in 20 starts in Oakland compared to 8-9 with a 5.03 ERA (71 er in 127.0 ip) and .308 (160 for 519) opponents average in 22 starts on the road...has allowed 24 of his 35 home runs with the A's on the road.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 12th start of the season...the A's are 8-3 (.727) in his starting assignments this year and 22-13 (.629) over the last two years...his teams are 219-167 (.568) in his career...has tossed six or more innings in nine of his 11 starts, allowed two runs or fewer five times and walked one batter or fewer 10 times...including eight games with no walks.

40 YEARS OLD: Tossed a five-hit shutout in his last start to become the second 40-year old in Oakland history with a shutout (Don Sutton: 40 years, 85 days on June 26, 1985 against Chicago)...became the first American League pitcher to toss a shutout at age 40 or older since Curt Schilling on June 7, 2007 for Boston at Oakland...struck out nine batters May 26 at Houston in his first start after turning 40 to set an Athletics record for strikeouts by a 40-year old...the previous high was seven by Tom Candiotti (July 31, 1998 vs. Cleveland) and Don Sutton (April 22, 1985 vs. California)...is just the fourth pitcher in Oakland history to start a game at age 40...the other three are Tommy John (last start at 42 years, 126 days), Candiotti (last start at 41 years, 275 days) and Sutton (last start at 40 years, 155 days).

40-YEAR OLD SEASON: Has two shutouts, which are the most in a season by an Athletics 40-year old since Jack Quinn had four for the Philadelphia A's in 1928...the last American League pitcher with two shutouts as a 40-year old is Dennis Martinez, who had two in 1995 for Cleveland at age 41...the last A's 40-year old with two complete games is Tom Candiotti in 1998 (3)...ages are based on a players age as of June 30th.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Has walked just four batters this year, an average of 0.51 per nine innings, which is the **lowest** mark in the majors...**leads** the American League in strikeout to walk ratio (10.50), is **tied for the lead** in complete games (2) and shutouts (2), ranks **seventh** in opponents on-base percentage (.271), **tied for seventh** in wins (6) and **tied for ninth** in grounded into double plays (9)...is averaging the **fewest** pitches per game (87.6) and per inning (13.7) in the AL...is one of **four** qualifying pitchers in the AL that has not allowed a stolen base...has the **sixth** highest run support (6.78).

ACTIVE LEADERS: Tossed the 34th complete game of his career in his last start...among active pitchers, only Roy Halladay (67) and CC Sabathia (35) have more...also ranks **fifth** among active pitchers in wins (177), **sixth** in games started (386) and shutouts (11), **seventh** in strikeouts (1875) and **eighth** in innings pitched (2463.2).

SCORELESS STREAK: Has not allowed a run in his last two starts and now has an 18.0 inning scoreless streak dating back to May 20...that is 4.1 innings short of his career high of 22.1 from last year (July 22-Aug. 7).

THREE-GAME WINNING STREAK: Is 3-0 with a 0.78 ERA (2 er in 23.0 ip), .247 (20 for 81) opponents batting average and no home runs allowed in 23.0 innings over his last three starts...went 3-0 with a 2.42 ERA, .235 opponents batting average and two home runs allowed in 26.0 innings over his first four starts...was 0-2 with a 7.17 ERA, .314 opponents batting average and five home runs in 21.1 innings in four starts in between (April 28 to May 14).

NOT WILD: Does not have a wild pitch in two seasons with the A's, a stretch of 35 starts and 222.2 innings pitched without a wild pitch...the 35 consecutive starts without a wild pitch is tied for third longest by a starting pitcher in Oakland history...Barry Zito had a 38-start streak (July 2, 2002-July 13, 2003) and Catfish Hunter holds the record with 42 (June 25, 1972-June 27, 1973)...now has a streak of 67 games and 407.0 innings pitched since his last wild pitch on May 26, 2009 at Los Angeles (AL).

DOMINICAN LEADERS: His 177 wins are third most among Dominican-born pitchers behind Juan Marichal (243) and Pedro Martinez (219)...also ranks third among Dominicans in games started (386), innings pitched (2463.2) and strikeouts (1875).

LAST START: He tossed a five-hit 3-0 shutout against Chicago last Friday in Oakland...did not walk a batter and struck out three...did not allow a runner past first base and did not allow more than one base runner in any inning.

- Did not walk a batter over his first three starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1916 to start the season with three consecutive games of five or more innings and no walks...had a four-game streak with no walks and at least five innings pitched dating back to 2012, which was the longest streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.

YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Became the A's 14th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 14 years April 1 against Seattle.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list April 13 with a strained muscle in his left hand...it was his second career stint on the DL as he was out from May 7-31 last year with a muscle strain in his left hand...went 3 for 9 (.333) with a home run and four RBI on a three-game rehab assignment with Sacramento...was reinstated April 28.
- Had his first career four-strikeout game April 29 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Had his first career four-RBI game April 30 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 1 against Los Angeles (AL), tying the Oakland record (32nd time, last: Josh Willingham at Seattle, April 24, 2011).
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 16 streak with his third inning single May 12 at Seattle.

BARTOLO COLÓN

- Tossed a three-hit shutout in the A's rain-shortened 13-0 seven-inning win at Boston April 23...it was his 10th career shutout, his first since May 30, 2011 at Oakland...the seven-inning shutout was third shortest in Oakland history and the shortest since Vida Blue fired 6.0 innings April 9, 1971 against Kansas City...the last complete game of fewer than eight innings by an A's pitcher was by Steve Ontiveros on May 16, 1995 against Chicago (5.0 ip).
- Walked Jacoby Ellsbury to lead off the sixth inning April 23 at Boston, snapping a streak of 32.0 innings and 121 batters faced without a walk dating back to his last walk on August 12, 2012 at Chicago (AL)...the 32.0-inning streak was the longest in Oakland history by a starter and second longest overall to Dennis Eckersley's streak of 50.1 innings from Aug. 17, 1989-June 12, 1990.
- Did not strike out a batter May 14 against Texas, his eighth career start without a strikeout...it was the first time in a game in which he pitched more than 4.0 innings.
- Walked two batters May 20 at Texas, snapping a season-opening streak of eight consecutive starts with one walk or fewer and two innings or more...that was the longest season-opening streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916

RYAN COOK

- Allowed his first run of the season on the road May 26 at Houston, snapping a 22.2-inning scoreless streak on the road dating back to Aug. 11, 2012...the road scoreless streak is third longest in Oakland history by a reliever.

COCO CRISP

- Was on his ninth Opening Day Roster (2004-09, 11-13), his third straight with the A's...made his eighth career Opening Start April 1 against Seattle, including three straight with the A's.

- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more.
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19... went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.
- Had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history April 28 against Baltimore...the last was by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...had two walk-off sacrifice flies last year, in addition to a single.

- Went 2 for 9 in the 19-inning game April 29 against Los Angeles to tie the Oakland record for at bats in a game (11th time, last: Mike Heath at Texas, July 1, 1979).
- Set an Oakland record for hits in the month of April with 34...broke the previous mark of 33 held by Stan Javier (1994) and Ben Grieve (1998)...had 11 doubles, which tied the Oakland April record (Mark Ellis, 2003).

BRANDON MOSS

- Matched his career high with five RBI April 10 at Los Angeles (also September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) after driving in four runs the night before.

- Had a career-high four strikeouts April 12 against Detroit...matched that figure April 29 against Los Angeles and May 12 at Seattle.
- Was on the paternity list from April 16 to 18 for the birth of his second son, Brody. (April 16).
- Went 0 for 4 April 21 at Tampa Bay to snap a 15-game road hitting streak dating back to Sept. 20, 2012...hit .463 (25 for 54) during the streak.

FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 23 with a sprained right elbow.
- Had successful UCL reconstruction surgery March 27...the procedure was performed by Dr. Thomas Mehlhoff at the Texas Orthopedic Hospital in Houston, Texas.

ADAM ROSALES
