A's vs. YANKEES

The A's lead the season series 2-1 after taking two of three games in New York May 3-5...have won seven of their last 10 games against the Yankees, including four straight in the Coliseum...however, have not won a season series from New York since 2007 as the A's have four losses and a split over the previous five seasons...are 14-33 (.298) against the Yankees since 2008...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 228-267 against the Yankees...that includes 124-121 in Oakland and 104-146 in New York...all-time, the A's are 769-1133 against the Yankees/Orioles.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour is a perfect 15 for 15 in save opportunities...has not blown a save since April 29, 2012 at Baltimore and has now converted each of his last 33 save chances, which is the second longest streak in Oakland history.

Josh Donaldson ranks second among American League third basemen in batting (.324), RBI (42) and walks (28), tied for second in doubles (18) and tied for fourth in home runs (9).

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1978**, at the age of 18 years, 246 days, Mike Morgan becomes the youngest pitcher to start a game for the Oakland A's...he goes the distance, allowing 10 hits against Baltimore but takes the loss as Scott McGregor shuts out the A's 3-0...Morgan's honor is short lived as Tim Conroy, at the age of 18 years, 81 days, gets a start 12 days later...in **1995** Mark McGwire hits three home runs in the A's 8-1 win at Boston after hitting two home runs the day before...his five home runs in consecutive games tied a major league record which he already shared...in **1999** Miguel Tejada hits three home runs in a game against Los Angeles to tie the Athletics record...he is the only Athletics shortstop to hit three home runs in a game.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have lost back-to-back games for the first time since May 14-15 against Texas...have not lost more than two straight since a season-high five-game losing streak from May 6-10...are 38-27 (.585) for the season, which is the fourth best record in the American League...it matches the A's best record after 65 games over the last 21 years (also 2004)...a win tonight would give the A's their best record after 66 games since 1992 when they were 39-27...are in second place in the AL West for the second consecutive day and trail Texas by one game...spent two days in first on Friday and Saturday...have won seven of the last 10 games, 13 of the last 17 and 18 of the last 23...are 20-8 over the last 28 games, which is the best record in the majors since May 11 (STL, 19-10)...went 12-4 over the first 16 games this year (second best record in the majors through April 18) and 6-15 over the next 21 contests (tied for the worst in the majors from April 19 to May 10)...are 95-53 (.642) since July 1 of last year, which is the best mark in the majors over that span (ATL & CIN, 92-57)...are 102-60 over the last 162 games...split a four-game series with Chicago over the weekend and are now 6-0-2 over the last eight series...the eight consecutive series without a loss is the A's longest streak since they went 5-0-4 over a nine-series stretch from Aug. 27-Sept. 27, 2009...have swept seven series this year...last year, the A's did not record their first sweep until June 12-14 at Colorado...for the season, have spent 15 days in sole possession of first, two days tied for first, 46 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers tossed at least seven inning in all seven games on the road trip...those are the A's most consecutive games with seven or more innings from their starting pitchers since June 22-29, 2005 when they also had a seven-game streak...since 1991, the only longer streak is a nine-game streak from July 24-Aug. 1, 2003...starters are 3-1 with a 2.55 ERA (14 er in 49.1 ip) and .215 (39 for 181) opponents batting average during this current seven-game stretch...have issued just nine walks in 49.1 innings (1.64 per nine innings)...are 13-3 with a 2.63 ERA (45 er in 154.0 ip) and .222 (126 for 570) opponents batting average over the last 23 games...are 27-24 with a 4.13 ERA (181 er in 394.1 ip) for the season...lead the American League in innings pitched, rank third in wins and on-base percentage (.301), have the fourth fewest walks (100) and are seventh in ERA.

AGAINST LEFT-HANDERS: The A's are scheduled to face a left-handed starting pitcher for the fifth consecutive game and 11th time in the last 16 games tonight...are 7-3 in the previous 10 games against lefties and are 14-10 (.583) in games in which the opponent starts a left-hander for the season...the 24 games against lefties are tied with Boston for the most in the American League...are batting .254 (205 for 807) against left-handed pitchers compared to .243 (346 for 1424) against right-handers

PITCHING: The A's have a 2.63 ERA (60 er in 205.2 ip) and .224 (170 for 758) opponents batting average over the last 23 games (since May 17)...have a 3.74 ERA for the season, which ranks fifth in the American League...have the lowest opponents on-base percentage in the AL (.297), have issued the third fewest walks (161), rank fourth in opponents slugging (.393) and are tied for fourth in shutouts (5).

OFFENSE: The A's scored 10 runs on a season-high 19 hits in the first game of the last road trip June 3 at Milwaukee but are batting .210 (43 for 205) with 21 runs scored in six games since then...have just one double over that stretch but have belted nine home runs...the A's lead the American League in hit by pitches (27), rank second in walks (254), tied for second in intentional walks (15), third in doubles (129) and on-base percentage (.329) and fourth in extra base hits (202)...have hit 11 home runs in the last seven games but have just 64 for the season, which is fourth fewest in the AL.

NIGHT AND DAY: The A's have a 27-13 (.675) record in night games compared to 11-14 (.440) during the day...own the best night record in the American League and the third worst mark during the day...have a 3.29 ERA (134 er in 366.2 ip) at night compared to 4.50 (109 er in 218.0 ip) during the day...have the lowest night ERA in the AL and the third highest day ERA.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's begin a six-game homestand tonight against New York (three games) and Seattle (three games)...swept a three-game series from Chicago on the last homestand and have an eight-game home winning streak...that is the A's longest home winning streak since a 10-game streak from Aug. 11-Sept. 1, 2006...have not lost at home since May 15...are 18-10 (.643) at home for the season, which is the third best record in the American League...went 4-3 on the last road trip to Milwaukee (2-1) and Chicago (2-2) and have won 10 of the last 15 road games...are 20-17 (.541) on the road overall, which is fourth best in the AL.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's are 10-3 in games decided in the last at bat and are tied for the American League lead in last at bat wins...have won eight of their last nine one-run games and are 13-7 (.650) for the season...lead the AL in one-run wins and have the second best record (Cleveland, 11-5)...are 5-2 (.667) in extra inning games...are tied for the most wins in extra inning games in the AL and own the fourth best record...have three wins when trailing after eight innings, which is the most in the AL...have four "walk-off" wins, which is tied for third in the AL.

17 GAMES IN 17 DAYS: The A's had the day off yesterday, concluding a stretch of 17 consecutive days without a day off...that matches their longest stretch without a day off for the season (Aug. 23-Sept. 8)...went 13-4 in the 17 games from May 24 to June 9, which was the best record in the majors over that span by two games...compiled a 2.95 ERA and hit .263 with 84 runs scored (4.94 per games) and 19 home runs.

THIS AND THAT: A's pinch hitters are 6 for 62 (.097) and have the second lowest batting average in the American League (Baltimore, .095)...led the AL in pinch plate appearances (71), rank second in walks (8) and tied for second in home runs (2) and RBI (7)...the A's also lead the AL in plate appearances (89) and grounded into double plays (7) with the bases loaded...are tied for the lead in bases loaded doubles (6), rank second in RBI (56) and are third in walks (7).

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 13th start of the season...the A's are 9-3 (.750) in his starting assignments this year and 23-13 (.639) over the last two years...his teams are 220-167 (.568) in his career...has tossed six or more innings in 10 of his 12 starts, allowed two runs or fewer six times and walked one batter or fewer 10 times...including eight games with no walks.

FOUR-GAME WINNING STREAK: Is 4-0 with a 0.90 ERA (3 er in 30.0 ip), .259 (28 for 108) opponents batting average and no home runs allowed in 30.0 innings over his last four starts...went 3-0 with a 2.42 ERA, .235 opponents batting average and two home runs allowed in 26.0 innings over his first four starts...was 0-2 with a 7.17 ERA, .314 opponents batting average and five home runs in 21.1 innings in four starts in between (April 28 to May 14).

WINS: Picked up his seventh win of the season in his last start, which is tied for sixth in the American League...those are his most wins before the All-Star Break since 2005 when he was 11-5 at the break in his Cy Young season with Los Angeles (AL)...the last A's pitcher to win his seventh game on or before June 5 was Mark Mulder in 2003 (May 23)...Mulder is the last A's pitcher with eight wins on or before June 11 (May 29).

AMONG THE LEADERS: Leads the American League in fewest walks per nine innings (0.70) and highest strikeout to walk ratio (7.67), is tied for the lead in complete games (2) and shutouts (2), tied for fifth in winning percentage (.778) and tied for seventh in grounded into double plays (10)...is averaging the fewest pitches per inning (13.7) and second fewest pitches per game (88.1)...is one of three qualifying pitchers in the AL that has not allowed a stolen base...has the third highest run support (6.87).

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 4-0 with a 2.36 ERA (11 er in 42.0 ip) and .225 (34 for 151) opponents batting average in six starts at night compared to 3-2 with a 4.08 ERA (16 er in 35.1 ip) and .312 (44 for 141) opponents average in six starts during the day...ranks fifth in the American League in night ERA...in two seasons with the A's, is 13-5 with a 2.72 ERA (44 er in 145.1 ip) in 22 starts at night compared to 4-6 with a 4.38 ERA (41 er in 84.1 ip) in 14 starts during the day.

NOT WILD: Does not have a wild pitch in two seasons with the A's, a stretch of 36 starts and 229.2 innings pitched without a wild pitch...the 36 consecutive starts without a wild pitch is third longest in Oakland history...Bary Zito had a 38-start streak (July 2, 2002-July 13, 2003) and Catfish Hunter holds the record with 42 (June 25, 1972-June 27, 1973)...now has a streak of 414.0 innings pitched since his last wild pitch on May 26, 2009 at Los Angeles (AL), which is the longest active streak in the majors.

40 YEARS OLD: Tossed a five-hit shutout May 31 against Chicago (AL) to become the second 40-year old in Oakland history with a shutout (Don Sutton: 40 years, 85 days on June 26, 1985 against Chicago)...became the first American League pitcher to toss a shutout at age 40 or older since Curt Schilling on June 7, 2007 for Boston at Oakland...struck out nine batters May 26 at Houston in his first start after turning 40 to set an Athletics record for strikeouts by a 40-year old...the previous high was seven by Tom Candiotti (July 31, 1998 vs. Cleveland) and Don Sutton (April 22, 1985 vs. California)...is just the fourth pitcher in Oakland history to start a game at age 40...the other three are Tommy John (last start at 42 years, 126 days), Candiotti (last start at 41 years, 275 days) and Sutton (last start at 40 years, 155 days).

40-YEAR OLD SEASON: Has two shutouts, which are the most in a season by an Athletics 40-year old since Jack Quinn had four for the Philadelphia A's in 1928...the last American League pitcher with two shutouts as a 40-year old is Dennis Martinez, who had two in 1995 for Cleveland at age 41...the last A's 40-year old with two complete games is Tom Candiotti in 1998 (3)...ages are based on a players age as of June 30th.

ACTIVE LEADERS: Tossed the 34th complete game of his career May 31...among active pitchers, only Roy Halladay (67) and CC Sabathia (36) have more...also ranks fifth among active pitchers in wins (178), sixth in games started (387) and shutouts (11), seventh in strikeouts (1879) and eighth in innings pitched (2470.2).

DOMINICAN LEADERS: His 178 wins are third most among Dominican-born pitchers behind Juan Marichal (243) and Pedro Martinez (219)...also ranks third among Dominicans in games started (387), innings pitched (2470.2) and strikeouts (1879).

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed six of his seven home runs to left-handed hitters...has surrendered 58 home runs over his last four seasons, 45 of which have been hit by lefties...has a .209 (19 for 91) opponents batting average over his first 30 pitches in a game, .336 (51 for 152) with six of his seven home runs from pitches 31-75 and .163 (8 for 49) after that...has yielded a .322 (47 for 146) batting average to the first four hitters in the order, .212 (31 for 146) against the bottom five.

LAST START: He won his fourth consecutive start in the A's 6-1 win at Milwaukee last Wednesday...allowed a Gomez RBI triple in the first inning to snap his scoreless streak at 18.0 innings...that would be the only run he would allow in seven innings...blanked the Indians on six hits and two walks over his final four innings.

COLÓN vs. NEW YORK: Is 4-7 with a 6.16 ERA (87.2 ip, 96 h, 66 r, 60 er, 35 bb, 75 so, 23 hr) in 16 career appearances, 15 starts...the ERA is his highest against any American League team...is 2-4 with a 6.84 ERA (37 er in 48.2 ip) in nine games, eight starts, in his home ballparks, 0-1 with a 5.06 ERA (3 er in 5.1 ip) in one start in Yankee Stadium and was 2-2 with a 5.35 ERA (20 er in 33.2 ip) in six starts in Old Yankee Stadium...pitched for New York in 2011 and is 4-6 with a 4.71 ERA (41 er in 78.1 ip) in 14 games, 12 starts, overall at Yankee Stadium...was the losing pitcher in his only start this year, a 4-2 A's loss at New York May 4...allowed lead-off home runs to Stewart in the third and Overbay in the fifth...also allowed a RBI single by Hafner with one out in the sixth and was relieved by Blevins...Hughes shutout the A's on four hits over the first eight innings before Oakland scored twice off the Yankees bullpen in the ninth.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Dan Straily (3-2, 4.67 ERA): Is scheduled to make his 10th start of the season...is 2-0 with a 2.08 ERA, .191 opponents batting average and three walks in 26.0 innings over his last four starts...that matches the longest winning streak of his career (Aug. 16-Sept. 11, 2012)...went 1-2 with a 7.27 ERA, .257 opponents batting average and 12 walks in 26.0 innings over his first five starts...is tied for second among American League rookies in wins (3), ranks third in strikeouts (44) and innings pitched (52.0) and fourth in games started (9)...has not allowed a home run in his last five starts (30.1 ip) after allowing 14 home runs over the first 11 starts of his career (61.0 ip)...had a no decision in his last start, a 5-4 A's win in 10 innings at Chicago last Thursday (7.0 ip, 6 h, 4 r, 4 er, 2 bb, 3 so)...had a no decision in his only career start against the Yankees, a 5-4 A's win at New York earlier this year on May 5 (5.1 ip, 4 h, 3 r, 3 er, 3 bb, 4 so).

ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

11-3, 2.93 ERA (190.1 ip, 163 h, 68 r, 62 er, 61 bb, 163 so, 17 hr)

Save/Save Opportunities: 16/22 (72.7%)

The A's bullpen has allowed 16 runs in its last 15 games (15 er in 36.2 ip, 3.68 ERA) after a 19.1-inning scoreless streak...now has a 2.93 ERA for the season, which is tied for second in the American League...also ranks second in the AL in opponents on-base percentage (.288) and is fourth in opponents batting average (.227)...is tied for sixth in wins (11) and has the fewest losses (3)...is tied for fourth in save percentage (72.7%)...first batters faced are 32 for 168 (.190) with seven walks and a hit by pitch (.223 on-base percentage)...the batting average and on-base percentage against first batters are the lowest in the American League.

- Is a perfect 15 for 15 in save opportunities and is the only American League closer without a blown save...that is the longest season-opening streak without a blown save by an A's pitcher since Dennis Eckersley set the record by converting each of his first 36 saves in 1992...has not blown a save since April 29, 2012 at Baltimore and has now converted each of his last 33 save chances...ranks sixth in the AL in saves.

BARTOLO COLÓN

- Did not walk a batter over his first three starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1916 to start the season with three consecutive games of five or more innings and no walks...had a four-game streak with no walks and at least five innings pitched dating back to 2012, which was the longest streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.

YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Became the A's 14th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 14 years April 1 against Seattle.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list April 13 with a strained muscle in his left hand...it was his second career stint on the DL as he was out from May 7-31 last year with a muscle strain in his left hand...went 3 for 9 (.333) with a home run and four RBI on a three-game rehab assignment with Sacramento...was reinstated April 28.
- Had his first career four-strikeout game April 29 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Had his first career four-RBI game April 30 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 1 against Los Angeles (AL), tying the Oakland record (32nd time, last: Josh Willingham at Seattle, April 24, 2011).
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 16 streak with his third inning single May 12 at Seattle.
- Had a career-high 12-game hitting streak from May 18 to 30...went 15 for 50 (.300) with five doubles, a triple, two home runs and nine RBI during the hitting streak.

BARTOLO COLÓN

- Tossed a three-hit shutout in the A's rain-shortened 13-0 seven-inning win at Boston April 23...it was his 10th career shutout, his first since May 30, 2011 at Oakland...the seven-inning shutout was third shortest in Oakland history and the shortest since Vida Blue fired 6.0 innings April 9, 1971 against Kansas City...the last complete game of fewer than eight innings by an A's pitcher was by Steve Ontiveros on May 16, 1995 against Chicago (5.0 ip).
- Walked Jacoby Ellsbury to lead off the sixth inning April 23 at Boston, snapping a streak of 32.0 innings and 121 batters faced without a walk dating back to his last walk on August 12, 2012 at Chicago (AL)...the 32.0-inning streak was the longest in Oakland history by a starter and second longest overall to Dennis Eckersley's streak of 50.1 innings from Aug. 17, 1989-June 12, 1990.
- Did not strike out a batter May 14 against Texas, his eighth career start without a strikeout...it was the first time in a game in which he pitched more than 4.0 innings.
- Walked two batters May 20 at Texas, snapping a season-opening streak of eight consecutive starts with one walk or fewer and two innings or more...that was the longest season-opening streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916

RYAN COOK

- Allowed his first run of the season on the road May 26 at Houston, snapping a 22.2-inning scoreless streak on the road dating back to Aug. 11, 2012...the road scoreless streak is third longest in Oakland history by a reliever.

COCO CRISP

- Was on his ninth Opening Day Roster (2004-09, 11-13), his third straight with the A's...made his eighth career Opening Start April 1 against Seattle, including three straight with the A's.
- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more.
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19... went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.
- Had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history April 28 against Baltimore...the last was by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...had two walk-off sacrifice flies last year, in addition to a single.

- Went 4 for 4 April 19 at Tampa, the third four-hit game of his career...added his fourth June 1 against Chicago (AL).
- Went 2 for 9 in the 19-inning game April 29 against Los Angeles to tie the Oakland record for at bats in a game (11th time, last: Mike Heath at Texas, July 1, 1979).
- Set an Oakland record for hits in the month of April with 34...broke the previous mark of 33 held by Stan Javier (1994) and Ben Grieve (1998)...had 11 doubles, which tied the Oakland April record (Mark Ellis, 2003).

BRANDON MOSS

- Matched his career high with five RBI April 10 at Los Angeles (also September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) after driving in four runs the night before.
- Had a career-high four strikeouts April 12 against Detroit...matched that figure April 29 against Los Angeles and May 12 at Seattle.
- Was on the paternity list from April 16 to 18 for the birth of his second son, Brody. (April 16).
- Went 0 for 4 April 21 at Tampa Bay to snap a 15-game road hitting streak dating back to Sept. 20, 2012...hit .463 (25 for 54) during the streak.
- Hit the game-ending home run in the bottom of the 19th inning April 29 against Los Angeles, his third career walk-off home run (last: September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) and fifth career game-ending hit (also a double and single)...also homered in the sixth inning, his second career multi-homer game (June 12, 2012 at Colorado)...had 12 innings between home runs to become the 17th player in Major League history to go at least 12 innings between home runs in one game...is the second Athletic to do it...Reggie Jackson also went 12 innings between home runs June 11, 1969...had four strikeouts to become the second Major Leaguer since 1916 to have at least two home runs and four strikeouts in one game...Evan Longoria did it August 4, 2009 for Tampa Bay against Boston.
- Made his first career appearance in center field May 9 (also May 13).
- Hit the 7000th home run in Oakland history May 13 against Texas off Justin Grimm in the third inning.
- Played third base for the second time as a professional May 24 at Houston in the ninth inning...the other time was in 2002 with the Red Sox affiliate in the Gulf Coast League.

PAT NESHEK

- Did not allow a run in nine spring training appearances (8.1 ip) and has not allowed a run in 19 games (17.1 ip) over the last two springs.
- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2007-08 and 2010 with Minnesota, 2011 with San Diego).

DEREK NORRIS

- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles and ended up going 0 for 5 with a walk...he and Rosales had six plate appearances, which match the most in Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12, 1992 vs. Texas).

SHANE PETERSON

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 16 against Houston and went 0 for 4.
- Singled off Xavier Cedeno in the fourth inning April 17 against Houston for his first Major League hit.

JOSH REDDICK

- Hit .139 in April, which was the third lowest April batting average in Oakland history (min. 75 PA)...Don Baylor hit .129 in 1976 and Ben Grieve hit .132 in 1999.
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from May 7 to 30 with a sprained right wrist...it was his first career stint on the DL...went 3 for 14 (.214) with five runs, three walks, one strikeout and two stolen bases during a four-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (May 27) and Triple-A Sacramento (May 28-30)...appeared in two games in right field and two at designated hitter.
- Walked with the bases loaded in the 10th inning June 1 against Chicago to force in the winning run...it was the 25th "walk-off" walk in Oakland history, the first since Bobby Crosby did it in the 17th inning against Los Angeles (NL) June 17, 2006...it was his third career walk-off RBI (single, double).

CHRIS RESOP

- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2006 with Florida, 2008 with Atlanta and 2011-12 with Pittsburgh).

FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 23 with a sprained right elbow.

- Had successful UCL reconstruction surgery March 27...the procedure was performed by Dr. Thomas Mehlhoff at the Texas Orthopedic Hospital in Houston, Texas.

ADAM ROSALES

- Began the season on the disabled list as he was added to the 15-day DL March 26 with a strained left intercostal...hit .320 (8 for 25) with one home run and one RBI during a six-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (April 17-19) and Triple-A Sacramento (April 21-24)...was reinstated April 25.

- Hit his sixth career pinch hit home run May 24 at Houston, his first since May 27, 2010 against Arizona.

ERIC SOGARD

- Had a career-high five-game hitting streak from April 14 to 20 (7 for 16, .438)

CHRIS YOUNG

- Is in his eighth season in the majors...the first seven came with Arizona...is on his seventh Opening Day roster.
- Made his A's debut April 3 against Seattle and homered in the seventh inning...became the 20th player in Oakland history to homer in his first game with the A's (last: Jonny Gomes, March 29, 2012 vs. Seattle at Tokyo).
- His sixth inning double April 11 at Los Angeles was the 200th of his career.
- Had his 11th career regular season multi-homer game April 24 at Boston (also has one in the post-season).
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from April 30 to May 17 with a strained left quad...it was his second career stint on the DL...made one rehab appearance with Triple-A Sacramento May 16 and went 1 for 1 with two walks, a run and a stolen base in a start in center field against Oklahoma City.
- Had back-to-back three-hit games for the second time in his career May 24 and 25 at Houston (Aug. 16-17, 2007).
