The A's trail in the season series, 3-4...are 2-2 in Oakland and 1-2 in Seattle...over the previous seven seasons, the A's have won the season series in even numbered seasons (2006, 2008, 2010, 2012) seasons (2006, 2008, 2010, 2012) and the Mariners have won in odd numbered years (2007, 2009, 2011)...the A's are 74-66 (.529) against Seattle since 2006...all-time, the A's are 307-228 (.574) against Seattle, which is the second best mark by any team against the Mariners to Roston's against the Mariners to Boston's .576 mark (min. 20 games)...are 170-97 in Oakland, 136-130 in Seattle and 1-1 in Tokyo.

allowed yesterday and now have a 17.0 inning scoreless streak...issued four intentional walks yesterday, which ties the Oakland record (11th time, last: Aug. 11, 2005).

Grant Balfour is a perfect 17 for 17 in save opportunities and is the only American League closer without a blown save...has converted each of his last 35 save chances, which is the second longest streak in Oakland history.

In 1964 Jim Gentile drives in four runs, including the game winning home run in the top of the 10th inning in a 6-5 win at inning in a 6-5 win at Cleveland...in 1969 the A's defeat the Boston Red Sox 21-7, setting what was then a club record for most runs in a game...Oakland scores five times in the fifth, seventh and eighth innings...Reggie Jackson is 5 for 6 with two doubles, two homers and a club record 10 RBI...in 1975 Campy Campaneris steals his 500th career base in the A's 3-2 loss at Detroit

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Swept a three-game series from New York to start the homestand and are now a seasonhigh 14 games over .500 at 41-27...that is tied with Boston for the best record in the American League and second best in the majors (St. Louis, 43-23)...the last time the A's had the best record in the AL outside the month of April was Sept. 24, 2002 when they were tied with New York at 99-58...the 41-27 record is the eighth best record in Oakland history after 68 games...it is the best since the 1990 club started the year 43-25...the A's are in sole possession of first place in the AL West for the second consecutive day and fourth time in the last seven days...have a two-game lead over Texas, which is the A's biggest lead since a season-high 2½ game lead on April 18...the last time the A's led the West by more than 21/2 games was on Oct. 1, 2006, when they finished the season with a four-game lead...for the season, have spent 17 days in sole possession of first, three days tied for first, 46 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth.

BEST IN THE MAJORS: The A's are 21-5 (.808) over the last 26 games, which is the best 26-game stretch in the majors this year...the pitching staff has a 2.53 ERA (68 er in 241.2 ip) and .219 (194 for 885) opponents batting average over that span...starters are 15-3 with a 2.52 ERA (49 er in 174.2 ip) and .215 (137 for 637) opponents average...are batting .254 with 117 runs scored (4.50 per game) and 28 home runs...the A's are now 23-8 (.742) since May 11, which is the best mark in the majors over that span (St. Louis, 21-11)...are 98-53 (.649) since July 1 of last year, which is also the best mark in the majors over that stretch (Cincinnati, 94-58)...are 103-59 over the last 162 games.

EXTRA INNINGS: The A's defeated the Yankees 3-2 in 18 innings yesterday...it was eighth game of 18 or more innings in Oakland history, the second this year...defeated the Angels 10-8 in 19 innings on April 29, also in the Coliseum...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, the A's are just the second team in Major League history to win two home games of 18 or more innings in one season (1967 Yankees)...the A's are now 7-1 in games of 18 or more innings since moving to Oakland in 1968...are the first American League team with two games of 18 or more innings in one season since 1971 (Washington and Oakland)...the A's are now 6-2 (.750) in extra inning games this year...lead the AL in extra inning wins and have the third best record.

OTHER CLOSE CALLS: The A's improved to 11-3 in games decided in the last at bat with the win yesterday and are tied for the American League lead in last at bat wins...it was the A's fifth "walk-off" win, which is also tied for the AL lead...have won nine of their last 10 one-run games and are 14-7 (.667) in those games for the season...lead the AL in one-run wins and have the second best record (Cleveland, 11-5)...have three wins when trailing after eight innings, which is tied for the most in the AL.

TIME OF GAME: The time of game yesterday was 5 hours and 35 minutes, which is the longest day game in Coliseum history...it is fourth longest in Oakland history, but the second longest this year to the 6 hours and 32 minute, 19 inning game against the Angels...the other two both came at New York: 6:00 in 16 innings on Aug. 9, 2002 and 5:43 in 14 innings on Sept. 22, 2012...the A's average time of game this year is 3 hours and 10 minutes...the highest single season average time of game in Oakland history is 3 hours and 8 minutes in 2000.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 3-0 on this six-game homestand against New York (3-0) and Seattle (three games) and now have an 11-game home winning streak...that is the third longest home winning streak in Oakland history and is the longest since Aug. 13-Sept. 14, 2002 when they won 12 straight...it is the longest home winning streak in the majors this year...have not lost at home since May 15...the pitching staff has a 1.65 ERA (20 er in 109.0 ip) and .188 (73 for 388) opponents batting average during the current home winning streak...are 21-10 (.677) at home for the season, which is the second best home record in the American League (Detroit, 22-10)...went 4-3 on the last road trip to Milwaukee (2-1) and Chicago (2-2) and have won 10 of the last 15 road games...are 20-17 (.541) on the road overall, which is third best in the AL...leave following the game Sunday for a seven-game road trip to Texas (four games) and Seattle (three games).

SERIES NOTES: The A's are 7-0-2 over the last nine series...the nine consecutive series without a loss is the A's longest streak since they went 5-0-4 over a nine-series stretch from Aug. 27-Sept. 27, 2009...have swept eight series this year...last year, the A's did not record their first sweep until June 12-14 at Colorado...have won the first game in each of the last 10 series, which is tied for the second longest such streak in Oakland history to a 12-game streak from July 2-Aug. 10, 2001...are 16-6 in game one of a series for the season.

AGAINST LEFT-HANDERS: The A's are scheduled to face a left-handed starting pitcher tonight for the sixth time in the last eight games and the 12th time in the last 19 contests...are 8-3 over the previous 11 games against lefties and are 15-10 (.600) in games in which the opponent starts a left-hander for the season...the 25 games against lefties are the most in the AL and tied for second most in the majors (Milwaukee, 26)...are batting .256 (214 for 836) against left-handed pitchers compared to .241 (366 for 1519) against right-handers.

AGAINST THE WEST: The A's are 20-8 (.714) against American League West competition compared to 21-19 (.525) against everyone else...are tied with Atlanta the best intra-division record in the majors...are batting .268 (269 for 1002) with 166 runs (5.93 per game) in 28 games against the AL West compared to .230 (311 for 1353) with 150 runs (3.75 per game) in 40 games against the rest of baseball.

NIGHT AND DAY: The A's have a 29-13 (.683) record in night games, which is the best record in the majors...are 12-14 (.462) during the day, which is the third worst mark in the American League...have a 3.28 ERA (140 er in 384.2 ip) at night compared to 4.23 (111 er in 236.0 ip) during the day...have the lowest night ERA in the AL

LEAGUE RANKS: The A's pitching staff has the lowest opponents on-base percentage in the American league (.295), ranks third in opponents batting (.242), fourth in opponents slugging (.385) and fifth in ERA (3.64)...A's starting pitchers lead the AL in innings pitched (415.0), rank third in wins (29), fourth in opponents on-base percentage (.298) and fewest walks (107) and eighth in ERA (4.01)...A's hitters lead the AL in walks (269) and hit by pitches (27), rank third in doubles (133), tied for third in intentional walks (16) and fourth in on-base percentage (.328).

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 14th start of the season...the A's are 7-6 (.538) in his starting assignments this year and 27-17 (.614) in his career...his teams are 32-17 (.653) in his 48 career starts...has tossed at least six innings in 10 of his 13 starts, allowed two runs or fewer seven times and walked two batters or fewer nine times.

THREE-GAME WINNING STREAK: Is 3-0 with a 3.66 ERA (13 er in 32.0 ip) and .238 (30 for 126) opponents batting average over his last five starts...went 3-0 with a 3.86 ERA and .260 opponents average over his first three starts and 0-5 with a 3.62 ERA and .254 opponents average in five starts in between...the five-game

losing streak was the longest of his career...was the first pitcher on an A's Opening Day roster to win each of his first three starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990...that extended his winning streak to five games dating back to last year...had never won more than two consecutive games in

DON'T WALK: Walked one batter in his last start, the ninth time in his 13 starts he was walked one batter or fewer...is averaging 1.73 walks per nine innings, which ranks eighth in the American League...walked three batters in back-to-back starts for the first time in his career May 12-18...did not walk a batter and matched his career-high with 10 strikeouts May 1 against Los Angeles...has three career 10-strikeout games and has not walked a batter in any of those contests...is the third A's pitcher since 1916 with three career games of 10 or more strikeouts and no walks (Catfish Hunter, Vida Blue).

HOME AND AWAY: Is 3-2 with a 2.43 ERA (9 er in 33.1 ip) in five starts at home compared to 3-3 with a 4.53 ERA (25 er in 49.2 ip) in eight starts on the road...has the eighth lowest home ERA in the American League...has issued 11 of his 16 walks on the road...in two seasons with the A's, he is 10-6 with a 2.66 ERA (39 er in 132.0 ip) and .238 (119 for 499) opponents average in 20 starts in Oakland compared to 9-9 with a 4.72 ERA (74 er in 141.0 ip) and .296 (169 for 571) opponents average in 25 starts on the road...has allowed 26 of his 37 home runs with the A's on the road.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 6-2 with a 3.14 ERA (20 er in 57.1 ip) and seven home runs allowed in nine starts at night compared to 0-3 with a 4.91 ERA (14 er in 25.2 ip) and six home runs allowed in four starts during the day...is tied for second in the American League in wins at night...in two seasons with the A's, he is with a 3.14 ERA (66 in 189.1 ip) in 30 starts at night compared to 3-8 with a 5.06 ERA (47 er in 83.2 ip) in 14 starts during the day.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .174 (12 for 69) batting average with runners in scoring position, which is fourth lowest in the American League...opponents are 27 for 81 (.333) with eight doubles, five home runs (.617 slugging percentage) and five walks (.372 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...the batting average is tied for fourth highest in the AL and the on-base percentage and slugging percentage are sixth highest...allowed a .319 batting average, .555 slugging percentage and .358 on-base percentage to hitters leading off an inning last year.

THE LONG BALL: Allowed a home run to Dunn in his last start, his first home run surrendered to a lefthander since Sept. 14, 2012 (Chris Davis, BAL)...has yielded 13 home runs for the season, which is tied for eighth in the AL...10 of the home runs have been solo shots.

THE FIRST INNING: Has allowed 10 of his 38 runs this year in the first inning (26.3%)...has a 5.54 ERA (8 er 13.0 ip) in the first inning, a 1.62 ERA (7 er in 39.0 ip) in innings two through four and a 5.52 ERA (19 er in 31.0) from the fifth inning on.

RUN SUPPORT: Has received just four runs of support in his five losses this year (32.1 ip, 1.11 RSA)...has received just 16 runs of support in his 15 losses in two seasons with the A's (90.2 ip, 1.59 RSA)...has received no support eight times over the last two years and one run of support seven times...the A's have been shutout four times this year, twice in games started by Milone.

2013 HIGHLIGHTS: Won each of his first three starts: a 6-2 win over Seattle April 3 in Oakland, an 11-5 win at Los Angeles *April 10* and an 11-2 win over Houston *April 15* in Oakland...then lost each of his next five starts, beginning with an 8-1 loss at Tampa Bay *April 21*...was the losing pitcher in the A's 3-0 loss to Baltimore April 26 in Oakland...blanked the Orioles on four hits and a walk over the first six innings before allowing an unearned run in the seventh...lost his third consecutive start in the A's 5-4 loss to Los Angeles May 1 in Oakland...did not walk a batter and matched his career-high with 10 strikeouts...was the losing pitcher in the A's 1-0 loss at Cleveland **May 7...tossed seven innings and allowed just one unearned run in** the fifth inning...snapped his five-game losing streak in the A's 2-1 win over Kansas City **May 18** in Oakland...allowed his only run in the first inning when Gordon doubled with two outs and scored on a Butler single...had a no decision in the A's 6-5 win at Houston *May 24*...shutout the Astros on two hits over the first four innings before allowing five runs in the fifth...was the winning pitcher in the A's 9-6 win at San Francisco May 29...allowed solo home runs to Pence and Pill...left in the sixth inning with a 6-1 lead but the bullpen allowed two of his runners to score...was the winning pitcher in the A's 10-2 win at Milwaukee *June* 3...had an 8-0 lead entering the bottom of the fifth when he allowed his only two runs.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 4-1 loss at Chicago last Saturday...tossed a career-high 118 pitches, topping his previous high of 112 (June 20, 2012 vs. LAD)...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a leadoff home run to Dunn in the bottom of the second inning...that was the only run he would allow in seven innings but Danks held the A's to a run on three hits and a walk in eight innings...Doolittle allowed three runs in the bottom of the eighth for the loss.

MILONE vs. SEATTLE: Is 3-2 with a 3.38 ERA (42.2 ip. 44 h. 16 r. 16 er. 7 bb. 40 so. 5 hr) in seven career starts...that includes 2-2 with a 4.13 ERA (11 er in 24.0 ip) in four starts at Safeco Field and 1-0 with a 2.41 ERA (5 er in 18.2 ip) in three starts in Oakland...is 1-1 with a 5.25 ERA (12.0 ip, 10 h, 7 r, 7 er, 4 bb, 8 so, 3 hr) in two starts this year...the win came in the A's 6-2 victory in Oakland April 3...allowed a home run to Gutierrez to start the game and Morse added a solo home run two outs later...did not allow a run over his final six innings...retired each of the final 10 batters he faced and 17 of the final 18...took the loss in a 6-1 decision at Seattle May 12...allowed three runs in the first inning on a three-run home run by Morales...also allowed a RBI single to Montero in the fourth and a Seager sacrifice fly in the fifth...the A's were held to a run on six hits by Saunders and the Mariners bullpen.

Griffin (5-5, 3.78 ERA): Is scheduled to make his 14th start of the season...is 0-2 with a 3.60 ERA and .213 opponents batting average over his last three starts...the losing streak matches the longest of his career (April 22-27, 2013)...is 4-0 with a 2.76 ERA in five starts against American League West competition compared to 1-5 with a 4.44 ERA in eight starts against everyone else...is now 7-0 with a 2.39 ERA in 10 career starts against intra-division foes and 5-6 with a 4.02 ERA in 18 starts against everyone else...was the losing pitcher in his last start, a 4-2 decision at Chicago last Sunday (7.1 ip, 7 h, 4 r, 4 er, 1 bb, 5 so)...is 3-0 with a 2.12 ERA in three career starts against Seattle...including one this year, an 8-2 A's win in Oakland April 4 (6.0 ip, 7 h, 2 r, 2 er, 2 bb, 3 so).

- Is a perfect 17 for 17 in save opportunities and is the only American League closer without a blown save...that is the longest season-opening streak without a blown save by an A's pitcher since Dennis Eckersley set the record by converting each of his first 36 saves in 1992...has not blown a save since April 29, 2012 at Baltimore and has now converted each of his last 35 save chances...ranks fifth in the AL in saves.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Leads the American League in fewest walks per nine innings (1.08), is tied for the lead in complete games (2) and shutouts (2), tied for fourth in winning percentage (.800), ranks sixth in strikeout to walk ratio (4.90), tied for sixth in grounded into double plays (11), ninth in ERA (2.92) and 10th in opponents on-base percentage (.279)...is averaging the second fewest pitches per inning (13.9) and third fewest pitches per game (89.2)...is one of three qualifying pitchers in the AL that has not allowed a stolen base...has the second highest run support (7.02).

AT HOME: Is 3-0 with a 2.70 ERA (12 er in 40.0 ip) in six starts at home this year...now has a six-game winning streak in the Coliseum dating back to Aug. 2 of last year...has a 1.86 ERA (13 er in 63.0 ip) and .213 (49 for 230) opponents batting average over that nine-start stretch, during which he has walked just six batters (0.86 per nine innings)...has not lost in Oakland since July 17, 2012 against Texas.

2010—Appeared in 56 games, his fourth consecutive season with 50 or more games...joins Dick Radatz (1962-65) as the only members of the Red Sox to pitch in at least 50 games in each of their first four Big League campaigns...became the 13th American League player overall to do it, the fifth lefty...is just the second Japanese-born pitcher to accomplish the feat (Shigetoshi Hasegawa, 1997-2000)...missed time due to his first career stint on the disabled list...tallied a career-high four losses and 4.50 ERA... also set career highs with 59 hits and 24 runs allowed...earned the Opening Day victory April 4 against New York (AL), becoming the first Red Sox pitcher ever to win two Opening Day games in relief (also 2008 against the A's in Tokyo)...allowed an unearned run to take the loss in the team's next game April 6 against New York (AL), becoming the first Red Sox pitcher to earn a decision in each of Boston's first two games of the season since Bill Campbell lost each of the club's first two games in 1977...held opponents to a .240 batting average and a 2.77 ERA in 29 appearances at Fenway Park compared to a .398 clip and a 6.75 ERA in 27 games on the road...was placed on the 15-day disabled list Aug. 6 with a right hamstring strain...made three rehab appearances with Triple-A Pawtucket before being activated Aug. 28...allowed runs in just 2 of his final 16 outings after coming off the DL...posted a 1.32 ERA in that time, including a season-high 12-game (10.0 ip) scoreless stretch from Aug. 29 to Sept. 21...finished second among Red Sox relievers with a 2.37 ERA after the All-Star break, including a club-best 1.38 mark in Sept./Oct...retired 11 straight batters over three tilts from Sept. 18-21...made his 250th career relief appearance Sept. 21 against Baltimore, becoming the 11th player to reach that mark with Boston.

2009—Made a career-high 68 appearances for the Red Sox, which ranked eighth among American League left-handers...held opponents scoreless in 52 of 68 games...finished tied for fifth in the AL with 24 holds, his third straight season to reach 20 in that category...doubled his previous career high in wins and equaled total from his first two seasons combined with six victories, which tied for eighth among AL relievers...Tom Burgmeier was Boston's last lefty to post more relief victories in a season, going 7-0 in 1982...that was also the last time a Sox hurler had more relief wins in a single season without a loss...held left-handed hitters to a .167 clip, which was eighth in the AL among pitchers with at least 60 appearances...allowed just 16.2% (6 of 37) of inherited runners to score, which was third among qualifying AL pitchers...went 27 games without allowing an inherited runner to score from May 16 to July 24, stranding a total of 16 over that span...posted a 1.04 ERA over a stretch of 25 games from April 28 to June 29...logged a 2.87 mark over his final 58 games beginning April 28...gave up two runs on four hits and did not retire a batter April 24 against New York (AL), the first time in his Major League career that he failed to record an out...had 16.1 scoreless innings from April 28 to June 4, which was the longest streak by a Boston reliever in 2009...joined Junichi Tazawa and Takashi Saito as the first trio of Japanese hurlers ever to appear for a ML team in a single game, Aug. 7 at New York (AL)...made one postseason appearance, tossing 0.1 inning in Game 3 of the ALDS against Los Angeles (AL).

2008—Notched his second straight season of at least 60 games, the second Red Sox ever to reach that mark in each of his first two Major League campaigns, joining Dick Radatz (1962-63)...tallied 23 holds, which ranked sixth in the American League...held lefties to a .184 average, including a .125 clip in his final 27 games...went more than 1.0 inning 10 times with a high of 2.0 innings on three occasions...let 52.0% (13-of-25) of his inherited runners score, which was the second highest mark in the AL among relievers with at least 50 appearances...gave up runs in 11 of his 64 games...allowed just one run over his first 17 games through May 10, posting a 0.50 ERA in that span...surrendered 11 runs over his next

16 outings from May 14to June 27, with a 6.32 ERA during that stretch...permitted runs in six of his final 31 appearances for a 1.91 ERA from June 29 onward...tossed 1.0 scoreless inning to earn the win in Boston's 6-5, 10-inning victory over Oakland on Opening Day, March 25 in Tokyo, Japan...posted a 1.80 ERA over eight appearances in Boston's playoff run...pitched in each of the final three games of the ALDS against the Angels, allowing two earned runs in 2.2 innings (6.75 ERA)...surrendered just one hit in 7.1 scoreless frames over five ALCS contests, with 2.0 innings of work in Games 2, 5 and 6.

2007—In his first Major League season, led the Red Sox and all American League rookies with 66 appearances, a club record for a first-year player...was selected as the Major League Setup Man of the Year in fan voting in MLB.com's This Year in Baseball Awards...also named Red Sox Unsung Hero by Boston BBWAA Chapter...earned a spot as the left-handed pitcher on the Topps Major League Rookie All-Star Team...had the eighth-best ERA among AL qualifying relievers at 2.22...opponents hit just .130 with runners in scoring position and .168 with runners on base, both the second-lowest marks among AL relievers with 50.0 or more innings...held opponents to a .255 on-base percentage, which was eighth lowest in AL among relief pitchers...permitted just 4 of 28 (14.3%) inherited runners to score...surrendered a home run to John Buck on the first pitch he threw in the Major Leagues, a sixth inning blast on Opening Day, April 2 at Kansas City...was the third pitcher in Red Sox history to do that along with Charlie Mitchell (Aug. 9, 1984 at Texas) and Jeff Suppan (July 17, 1995 against Kansas City)...tossed 20.2 scoreless innings over his next 20 games after Opening Day through May 20, the longest scoreless streak by a Red Sox lefty since Bruce Hurst's 21.2 innings from May 5-15, 1987... posted a 0.71 ERA in 12 April appearances to earn AL Rookie of the Month honors...was just the second AL middle/setup reliever to ever receive that award, joining Texas' Frank Francisco in August 2004... ended a span of 17.0 scoreless innings by allowing a home run to Paul Konerko July 9 against Chicago (AL)...earned a spot on the AL All-Star team by virtue of winning online All-Star Final Vote...received over 4.3 million votes...became the seventh native of Japan ever selected as an All-Star and the ninth Red Sox rookie...did not pitch in the July 10 game at San Francisco...beginning Aug. 10, compiled a 7.24 ERA over his final 15 games...did not pitch from Sept. 15-26 due to left shoulder fatigue...had a 2.45 ERA in a team-best eight appearances during the playoffs...worked 9.2 scoreless frames in his first six postseason outings before issuing three runs, including two homers, over 1.1 innings in Games 3 and 4 of the World Series at Colorado...pitched 2.1 shutout frames in two ALDS outings against the Angels and 5.0 scoreless innings in three ALCS games versus Cleveland...was the first native of Japan to ever pitch in a World Series game with 2.1 scoreless innings in Game 2 at Fenway Park.

2006—After 11 seasons with Yomiuri, he pitched for Nippon-Ham in his final season in Japan before signing with Boston...tied for seventh in the Pacific League in saves (4) and ranked 10th in appearances (55)...was 2-2 with a 2.14 ERA...held opposition to a .230 batting average and had 22 holds...appeared in four of five games in the Japan Series against the Chunichi Dragons...Nippon-Ham won the series, 4-1, for the franchise's first championship since 1962.

2005—Appeared in 42 games in his final season with the Giants...was 1-0 with a 4.75 ERA...struck out 56 and walked 19 in 53.0 innings.

2004—Was eighth in the Central League and second on the Yomiuri staff in appearances (53)...added five saves and a 3.09 ERA while compiling a 4-3 record...struck out 53 batters in 46.2 innings.

2003—Pitched in just 41 games, his lowest work load since 1999 (37)...his 38.2 innings were his lowest since tossing only 12.2 in 1996...was 2-3 with a 4.89 ERA for Yomiuri.

2002—Tied for sixth in the Central League and was second on the Giants pitching staff in appearances (52)...won a career-best 6 games...selected to pitch in NPB All-Star Game...was 6-3 with a 3.40 ERA in 52 relief appearances.

2001—Ranked fourth in Central League in saves (25) and seventh in games (58)...the saves were a career-high and the games pitched were his most in Japan...had a 2-1 record and a 2.76 ERA in 58 relief appearances.

2000—Tallied the first seven saves of his career in 56 relief appearances with Yomiuri...was 5-4 with a 3.11 ERA...matched his career-high with 102 strikeouts in just 72.1 innings...averaged 12.69 strikeouts per nine innings.

1999—Pitched mostly in relief for the first time in his career...was 4-1 with a 2.97 ERA in 37 games, including three starts, with Yomiuri...the three starts were the final starts of his career.

1998—Was 3-6 with a 4.33 ERA in 14 games, 12 starts, with Yomiuri in his final season in which he was primarily a starter.

1997—Logged a 4-9 record and a 3.46 ERA in 25 games, 19 starts, in his first extensive action with Yomiuri...struck out a career-high 102 batters in a career-high 109.1 innings.

1996—Went 1-0 with a 0.71 ERA in five games, one start, with Yomiuri.

1995—Made one start in his NPB debut with Yomiuri...allowed a run on five hits and two walks in 5.0 innings while striking out nine in a no decision.

 second career stint on the DL as he was out from May 7-31 last year with a muscle strain in his left
 hand...went 3 for 9 (.333) with a home run and four RBI on a three-game rehab assignment with
 Sacramento...was reinstated April 28.
- Had his first career four-strikeout game April 29 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Had his first career four-RBI game April 30 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 1 against Los Angeles (AL), tying the Oakland record (32nd time, last: Josh Willingham at Seattle, April 24, 2011).
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 16 streak with his third inning single May 12 at Seattle.

- Tossed a three-hit shutout in the A's rain-shortened 13-0 seven-inning win at Boston April 23...it was his 10th career shutout, his first since May 30, 2011 at Oakland...the seven-inning shutout was third shortest in Oakland history and the shortest since Vida Blue fired 6.0 innings April 9, 1971 against Kansas City...the last complete game of fewer than eight innings by an A's pitcher was by Steve Ontiveros on May 16, 1995 against Chicago (5.0 ip).
- Walked Jacoby Ellsbury to lead off the sixth inning April 23 at Boston, snapping a streak of 32.0 innings and 121 batters faced without a walk dating back to his last walk on August 12, 2012 at Chicago (AL)...the 32.0-inning streak was the longest in Oakland history by a starter and second longest overall to Dennis Eckersley's streak of 50.1 innings from Aug. 17, 1989-June 12, 1990.
- Did not strike out a batter May 14 against Texas, his eighth career start without a strikeout...it was
 the first time in a game in which he pitched more than 4.0 innings.
- Walked two batters May 20 at Texas, snapping a season-opening streak of eight consecutive starts
 with one walk or fewer and two innings or more...that was the longest season-opening streak by an
 Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.
- Had an 18.0-inning scoreless streak from May 20 to 31.

RYAN COOK

 Allowed his first run of the season on the road May 26 at Houston, snapping a 22.2-inning scoreless streak on the road dating back to Aug. 11, 2012...the road scoreless streak is third longest in Oakland history by a reliever.

COCO CRISP

- Was on his ninth Opening Day Roster (2004-09, 11-13), his third straight with the A's...made his
 eighth career Opening Start April 1 against Seattle, including three straight with the A's.
- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more.
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19... went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.

- Went 2 for 9 in the 19-inning game April 29 against Los Angeles to tie the Oakland record for at bats in a game (11th time, last: Mike Heath at Texas, July 1, 1979).
- Set an Oakland record for hits in the month of April with 34...broke the previous mark of 33 held by Stan Javier (1994) and Ben Grieve (1998)...had 11 doubles, which tied the Oakland April record (Mark Ellis, 2003).

BRANDON MOSS

- Matched his career high with five RBI April 10 at Los Angeles (also September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) after driving in four runs the night before.
- Had a career-high four strikeouts April 12 against Detroit...matched that figure April 29 against Los Angeles and May 12 at Seattle.
- Was on the paternity list from April 16 to 18 for the birth of his second son, Brody. (April 16).
- Went 0 for 4 April 21 at Tampa Bay to snap a 15-game road hitting streak dating back to Sept. 20, 2012...hit .463 (25 for 54) during the streak.

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 16 against Houston and went 0 for 4.
- Singled off Xavier Cedeno in the fourth inning April 17 against Houston for his first Major League hit.

JOSH REDDICK

- Hit .139 in April, which was the third lowest April batting average in Oakland history (min. 75 PA)...Don Baylor hit .129 in 1976 and Ben Grieve hit .132 in 1999.
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from May 7 to 30 with a sprained right wrist...it was his first career
 stint on the DL...went 3 for 14 (.214) with five runs, three walks, one strikeout and two stolen bases
