A's vs. RANGERS

The season series is even at three games each...are 1-2 in Oakland and 2-1 in Texas...have lost the season series five times over the previous seven seasons and are 65-74 (.468) against the Rangers since 2006...are 306-318 all-time against the Texas Rangers...that breaks down to 165-148 in Oakland and 142-170 in Texas...including 75-82 at Rangers Ballpark...have an all-time record of 403-400 against the Rangers/Senators

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour is a perfect 17 for 17 in save opportunities...has converted each of his last 35 save chances, which is the second longest streak in Oakland history...has 43 saves with the A's and needs one more to tie Billy Koch and Keith Foulke for eighth place in Oakland history.

Coco Crisp is tied for the American League lead and tied for second in the majors in home runs batting leadoff (8).

John Jaso has reached base safely via hit or walk in a careerhigh 15 consecutive games...is 17 for 48 (.354) with 11 walks (1 sf, 467 on-base percentage) over that span.

Josh Reddick is batting .309 (17 for 55) in 14 games since he was reinstated from the disabled list May 31...hit .152 in 29 games before the injury.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In 1971 Vida Blue improves his record to 15-2 and strikes out 13 as the A's defeat the Twins at Minnesota, 3-2...in 2000 Eric Chavez becomes the first player to hit for the cycle in the Coliseum as the A's defeat Baltimore, 10-3...at the age of 22 years, 197 days, Chavez becomes the eighth youngest player in major league history to hit for the cycle...in 2002 Billy Koch records the save in the A's 5-3 win at Cincinnati, making him the first pitcher in Oakland history with five saves in five consecutive team games.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Are 4-4 over the last eight games but have gained 2½ games in the standings over that stretch as Texas has gone 2-7...lead the American League West by a season-high three games...that is the A's largest lead in the AL West since Oct. 1, 2006 when they finished the season with a four-game lead...it is the A's largest lead before the All-Star Break since April 10, 2003 when they also had a three-game lead...have not led the West by more than three games before the All-Star Break since June 19, 1992 when they had a four-game lead...are in sole possession of first place in the AL West for the fifth consecutive day and seventh time in the last 10 days...are 42-29, which is tied with Boston for the best record in the American League and tied for fifth best in the majors...it matches the best start by an A's team over the last 21 years (also 2000 and 2003)...for the season, have spent 20 days in sole possession of first, three days tied for first, 46 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth.

HOT STREAKS: The A's are 22-7 (.759) over the last 29 games, which is tied for the best 29-game stretch in the majors this year...the pitching staff has a 2.58 ERA (77 er in 268.2 ip) and .224 (221 for 990) opponents batting average over that span...starters are 16-5 with a 2.64 ERA (57 er in 194.1 ip) and .221 (158 for 715) opponents average...have tossed seven or more innings in 17 of the 29 games allowed two runs or fewer 19 times...are batting .258 (260 for 1006) with 129 runs scored (4.45 per game) and 33 home runs...the A's are now 24-10 (.706) since May 11, which is the best mark in the majors over that span (Cincinnati and Pittsburgh, 22-12)...are 99-55 (.642) since July 1 of last year, which is also the best mark in the majors over that stretch (Cincinnati, 96-59)...are 102-60 over the last 162 games.

AGAINST THE WEST: The A's are 21-10 (.677) against American League West competition compared to 21-19 (.525) against everyone else...have the second best intra-division record in the AL (Texas, 19-9)...are batting .271 (299 for 1102) with 178 runs (5.74 per game) in 31 games against the AL West compared to .230 (311 for 1353) with 150 runs (3.75 per game) in 40 games against the rest of baseball...are 1-2 in this 10-game stretch against divisional foes (1-2 vs. Seattle, 0-0 at Texas, 0-0 at Seattle).

NIGHT AND DAY: The A's have a 29-14 (.683) record in night games, which is the best record in the majors ahead of St. Louis (28-15)...are 13-15 (.464) during the day, which is the fourth worst mark in the American League...have a 3.27 ERA (143 er in 393.2 ip) at night compared to 4.15 (117 er in 254.0 ip) during the day...have the lowest night ERA in the AL and the fifth highest day ERA...are batting .255 (385 for 1508) with 221 runs scored in night games (5.14 per game) compared to .238 (225 for 947) with 107 runs during the day (3.82 per game).

LEAGUE RANKS: The A's pitching staff has the second lowest opponents on-base percentage in the American League (.295) and ranks third in ERA (3.61), opponents batting average (.242) and opponents slugging percentage (.384)...A's starting pitchers lead the AL in innings pitched (434.2), rank third in wins (30) and eighth in ERA (4.00)...A's hitters lead the majors in walks (277)...are tied for the AL lead in hit by pitches (27), rank third in doubles (141), on-base percentage (.329) and extra base hits (224) and tied for third in intentional walks (17).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's begin a seven-game road trip tonight that features stops in Texas (four games) and Seattle (three games)...went 4-3 on the last road trip to Milwaukee (2-1) and Chicago-AL (2-2) and have won 10 of the last 15 road games...are 20-17 (.541) on the road overall, which is the third best road record in the American League...went 4-2 on the last homestand against New York (3-0) and Seattle (1-2) and are 22-12 (.647) at home for the season, which is the second best home record in the AL...had their 11-game home winning streak snapped by Seattle last Friday night...it was the third longest home winning streak in Oakland history and was the longest since a 12-game streak from Aug. 13-Sept. 14, 2002.

SERIES NOTES: The A's lost two of three to Seattle over the weekend, snapping a nine series unbeaten streak (7-0-2)...it was the A's first series loss since May 13-15 against Texas...lost the first game of a series last Friday for the first time since May 10, also against Seattle...had won 10 consecutive series openers, which tied for the second longest such streak in Oakland history to a 12-game streak from July 2-Aug. 10, 2001...are 16-7 in game one of a series for the season...that includes 0-3 against Seattle and 16-4 against everyone else...swept a three-game series from New York to start the last homestand and have now swept eight series this year...last year, the A's did not record their first sweep until June 12-14 at Colorado.

CLOSE CALLS: Lost for just the second time in their last 11 one-run games last Friday night and are now 14-8 (.636) in one-run games for the season...lead the American League in one-run wins, have the second best record (Cleveland, 12-6) and are tied for third in most games...are 6-2 (.750) in extra inning games...lead the AL in extra inning wins and have the third best record...are 11-3 in games decided in the last at bat and are tied with Baltimore and Kansas City for the AL lead in last at bat wins...have three wins when trailing after eight innings, which is tied with Kansas City and Toronto for the most in the AL...have five "walk-off" wins.

THIS AND THAT: The A's hit four home runs yesterday against Seattle, matching the season high (June 6 at Chicago)...now have 20 home runs over the last 13 games...the A's had a walk and a sacrifice fly with the bases loaded yesterday...lead the majors in plate appearances with the bases loaded (92) and are tied for the lead in doubles (6) and grounded into double plays (7)...rank second in the American League in RBI (59) and third in walks (8)...A's pinch hitters are 7 for 65 (.108) and have the second lowest batting average in the AL (Chicago, .105)...lead the AL in pinch plate appearances (75), rank second in walks (9) and tied for second in home runs (2) and RBI (7)...are 28-9 (.757) with both Céspedes and Crisp in the lineup...are 34-0 when leading after eight innings and are one of three AL teams that has not lost in that situation (Texas and Toronto).

AGAINST LEFT-HANDERS: The A's completed a stretch last Friday where they faced a left-handed starting pitcher 12 times in 19 games...went 8-4 in those 12 games and are 15-11 (.576) in games in which the opponent starts a left-hander for the season...the 26 games against lefties are tied with the Dodgers and Brewers for the most in the majors...have faced righties in each of the last two games and are 27-18 (.600) when the opponent starts a right-hander.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 11th start of the season...the A's are 8-2 (.800) in his starting assignment this year and are 13-4 (.765) in his career...has tossed six or more innings in six of his 10 starts, allowed two runs or fewer five times and walked two batters or fewer seven times.

THREE-GAME WINNING STREAK: Is 3-0 with a 2.21 ERA (8 er in 32.2 ip), .179 (21 for 117) opponents batting average and four walks in 32.2 innings over his last five starts...the winning streak is a career high...went 1-2 with a 7.27 ERA, .257 opponents batting average and 12 walks in 26.0 innings over his first five starts.

ROOKIE LEADERS: Is tied for second among American League rookies in wins (4), ranks third in strikeouts (47) and innings pitched (58.2) and tied for third in games started (10).

THE LONG BALL: Has not allowed a home run in his last six starts (37.0 ip) after allowing 14 home runs over the first 11 starts of his career (61.0 ip)...has surrendered just three home runs in 58.2 innings for the season, an average of 0.46 per nine innings...that is the fourth best mark in the American League among pitchers with 50 or more innings pitched...using the same minimum, he has the third lowest slugging percentage (.298).

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .216 opponents batting average, which is sixth lowest in the American League among pitchers with 50 or more innings pitched...has yielded a .184 (16 for 87) batting average the first time through the lineup, .220 (18 for 82) the second time and .265 (13 for 49) after that...the mark the first time through the lineup is fourth lowest among AL pitchers with 50 or more innings...has allowed a .196 (11 for 56) batting average to hitters leading off an inning, which is ninth lowest among AL pitchers with 50 or more innings...opponents are batting .174 (24 for 138) with the bases empty compared to .288 (23 for 80) with runners on base...including .366 (15 for 41) with runners in scoring position, which is fourth highest in the AL among pitchers with 50 or more innings...has issued 11 of his 16 walks to left-handed hitters...has allowed a .370 (10 for 27) batting average to the opponents number three hitter but the cleanup hitter is batting just .111 (3 for 27).

THE WEST AND THE REST: Is 2-2 with a 5.86 ERA (18 er in 27.2 ip) in five starts against American League West competition compared to 2-0 with a 3.19 ERA (11 er in 31.0 ip) in five starts against all other teams...his career numbers are 3-2 with a 5.40 ERA (30 er in 50.0 ip) in nine starts against the West, 3-1 with a 3.00 ERA (16 er in 48.0 ip) in eight starts against everyone else.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to start on four days rest today...is 0-2 with a 6.04 ERA (15 er in 22.1 ip) in four starts on four days rest compared to 4-0 with a 3.47 ERA (14 er in 36.1 ip) in six starts on five days rest or

BRIEFLY: Was on the A's Opening Day roster and started the fifth game of the season April 5 at Houston...was optioned to Sacramento the next day when Bartolo Colón was reinstated from the suspended list...went 3-0 with a 0.96 ERA in three starts with the River Cats before being recalled from Sacramento April 29 to start for Brett Anderson...started that night, was optioned to Sacramento April 30 and recalled May 1 when Anderson went on the DL...is 3-2 with a 3.99 ERA (21 er in 47.2 ip) in eight starts

2013 START-BY-START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 8-3 victory at Houston April 5...struck out a career-high and Oakland rookie record tying 11 batters in 6.2 innings (sixth time, last: Tim Hudson, Sept. 10, 1999 at Tampa Bay)...is the ninth pitcher in Oakland history to strikeout 11 or more in fewer than seven innings, the first since Kirk Saarloos on September 19, 2006 (11 so in 5.0 ip)...did not issue a walk and is the 12th pitcher in Oakland to strikeout 11 or more without walking a batter...had a no decision in the A's 10-8, 19-inning win over Los Angeles *April* 29 in Oakland...allowed a career-high six runs in 4.2 innings...left trailing 6-1...had a no decision in the A's 5-4 win at New York *May* 5...had a 4-1 lead before he was charged with two of the Yankees runs in a three-run sixth inning...was relieved by Blevins with one out and runners on first and second and he allowed both runs to score plus one of his own for the blown save...was the losing pitcher in the A's 6-3 loss at Seattle **May 10...**allowed a career-high tying six runs in 5.0 innings...lost his second consecutive start in the A's 6-2 loss to Texas **May 15** in Oakland...tossed just 4.1 innings, matching his career low...combined with Doolittle and Balfour on a three-hit shutout in the A's 1-0 win at Texas May 21...tossed a career-high 7.0 innings and allowed two of the hits...did not walk a batter to become just the second visiting pitcher at Rangers Ballpark to toss seven or more innings and allow two or fewer baserunners (Erik Bedard, July 7, 2007)...won his second consecutive start in the A's 4-1 win over San Francisco May 27...blanked the Giants on three hits over the first five innings to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high 12.0 innings...had a no decision in the A's 4-3, 10 inning win over Chicago June 1 in Oakland...was relieved by Doolittle to start the seventh inning with the A's leading 3-1...Doolittle allowed two runs for the blown save...had a no decision in the A's 5-4, 10-inning win at Chicago *June* 6...matched his career-high by tossing 7.0 innings...allowed three runs in the third inning on a two-run single by Ramirez and a RBI single by Rios, and another run in the fifth on a De Aza RBI single...left trailing 4-2.

LAST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 5-2 win over New York last Wednesday in Oakland...shutout the Yankees on one hit over the first five innings...retired 11 straight following the hit before walking Gardner with one out in the sixth...Cano singled him to third and he scored on a Teixeira sacrifice fly...also allowed a RBI single to Nix in the seventh.

STRAILY vs. TEXAS: Is 1-1 with a 2.50 ERA (18.0 ip, 11 h, 7 r, 5 er, 6 bb, 15 so, 1 hr) in three career starts...including 1-1 with a 3.18 ERA (11.1 ip, 6 h, 5 r, 4 er, 4 bb, 2 so) in two starts this year...the loss came in a 6-2 decision in Oakland May 15...tossed just 4.1 innings, matching his career low...allowed a bases loaded two-run single to Berkman in the third inning...was charged with three of the Rangers runs in a four-run fifth inning...allowed a RBI single to Beltre and was relieved by Chavez with runners on first and third...Chavez allowed a three-run home run to Cruz...then combined with Doolittle and Balfour on a threehit shutout in the A's 1-0 win at Texas May 21...tossed a career-high 7.0 innings and allowed two of the hits...did not walk a batter to become just the second visiting pitcher at Rangers Ballpark to toss seven or more innings and allow two or fewer baserunners (Erik Bedard, July 7, 2007.

WITH SACRAMENTO: Went 3-0 with a 0.96 ERA (18.2 ip, 11 h, 5 r, 2 er, 6 bb, 20 so) in three starts with Sacramento...was tied for the Pacific Coast League lead in wins at the time of his April 29 promotion...has a .159 opponents batting average, including .111 (3 for 27) by left-handed hitters compared to .190 (8 for 42) by right-handers...did not allow a home run in 18.2 innings

The A's bullpen has allowed just one run in 19.2 innings (0.46 ERA) over its past five games...now has a 2.83 ERA for the season, which ranks second in the American League...is also second in the AL in opponents on-base percentage (.288) and fourth in opponents batting average (.227)...is fourth in save percentage (75.0%)...has the fewest losses (3) and the second fewest walks (68)...first batters faced are 37 for 186 (.199) with eight walks and a hit by pitch (.232 on-base percentage)...the on-base percentage against first batters is the lowest in the majors and the batting average is second lowest...the bullpen tossed 10.0 innings last Thursday against New York and did not allow a run...it was only the third time in Oakland history that A's relievers tossed 10 or more innings without allowing a run (also Sept. 20, 1997 vs. Seattle, 10.0 ip; June 12, 1992 vs. Texas, 12.0 ip).

- Has now recorded 43 career saves with the A's, which is 10th most in Oakland history...is one save away from tying Billy Koch and Keith Foulke for eighth place.

YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Became the A's 14th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 14 years April 1 against Seattle.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list April 13 with a strained muscle in his left hand...it was his
 second career stint on the DL as he was out from May 7-31 last year with a muscle strain in his left
 hand...went 3 for 9 (.333) with a home run and four RBI on a three-game rehab assignment with
 Sacramento...was reinstated April 28.
- Had his first career four-strikeout game April 29 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Had his first career four-RBI game April 30 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 1 against Los Angeles (AL), tying the Oakland record (32nd time, last: Josh Willingham at Seattle, April 24, 2011).
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 16 streak with his third inning single May 12 at Seattle.
- Had a career-high 12-game hitting streak from May 18 to 30...went 15 for 50 (.300) with five doubles, a triple, two home runs and nine RBI during the hitting streak.
- Had the first two two-homer games of his career June 4 at Milwaukee and June 6 at Chicago...
 became the first Athletic with two multi-homer games over a three-game stretch since John Jaha did
 it in back-to-back games June 19-20, 1999 at Detroit.

BARTOLO COLÓN

- Did not walk a batter over his first three starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1916 to start the season with three consecutive games of five or more innings and no walks...had a four-game streak with no walks and at least five innings pitched dating back to 2012, which was the longest streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.
- Tossed a three-hit shutout in the A's rain-shortened 13-0 seven-inning win at Boston April 23...it
 was his 10th career shutout, his first since May 30, 2011 at Oakland...the seven-inning shutout was
 third shortest in Oakland history and the shortest since Vida Blue fired 6.0 innings April 9, 1971
 against Kansas City...the last complete game of fewer than eight innings by an A's pitcher was by
 Steve Ontiveros on May 16, 1995 against Chicago (5.0 ip).
- Walked Jacoby Ellsbury to lead off the sixth inning April 23 at Boston, snapping a streak of 32.0 innings and 121 batters faced without a walk dating back to his last walk on August 12, 2012 at Chicago (AL)...the 32.0-inning streak was the longest in Oakland history by a starter and second longest overall to Dennis Eckersley's streak of 50.1 innings from Aug. 17, 1989-June 12, 1990.
- Did not strike out a batter May 14 against Texas, his eighth career start without a strikeout...it was
 the first time in a game in which he pitched more than 4.0 innings.
- Walked two batters May 20 at Texas, snapping a season-opening streak of eight consecutive starts
 with one walk or fewer and two innings or more...that was the longest season-opening streak by an
 Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.
- Had an 18.0-inning scoreless streak from May 20 to 31.
- Struck out nine batters May 26 at Houston in his first start after turning 40 to set an Athletics record for strikeouts by a 40-year old...the previous high was seven by Tom Candiotti (July 31, 1998 vs. Cleveland) and Don Sutton (April 22, 1985 vs. California)...is just the fourth pitcher in Oakland history to start a game at age 40...the other three are Tommy John (last start at 42 years, 126 days), Candiotti (last start at 41 years, 275 days) and Sutton (last start at 40 years, 155 days)

• Tossed a five-hit shutout May 31 against Chicago (AL) to become the second 40-year old in Oakland history with a shutout (Don Sutton: 40 years, 85 days on June 26, 1985 against Chicago).

RYAN COOK

 Allowed his first run of the season on the road May 26 at Houston, snapping a 22.2-inning scoreless streak on the road dating back to Aug. 11, 2012...the road scoreless streak is third longest in Oakland history by a reliever.

COCO CRISP

- Was on his ninth Opening Day Roster (2004-09, 11-13), his third straight with the A's...made his
 eighth career Opening Start April 1 against Seattle, including three straight with the A's.
- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more.
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19... went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.
- Had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history April 28 against Baltimore...the last was by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...had two walk-off sacrifice flies last year, in addition to a single.

- Is on his third consecutive Opening Day roster with his third team (Tampa Bay, 2011; Seattle, 2012).
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 9 at Los Angeles, a three-run shot off Jepsen in the seventh to give the A's a 7-5 lead.
- Played first base May 24 at Houston, his second career appearance at first base (Aug. 25, 2010 at Los Angeles-AL).

JED LOWRIE

- Had a career-high tying four RBI April 15 against Houston (fourth time, last: September 19, 2011 vs. Baltimore).
- Went 4 for 4 April 19 at Tampa, the third four-hit game of his career...added his fourth June 1 agaisnt Chicago (AL).
- Went 2 for 9 in the 19-inning game April 29 against Los Angeles to tie the Oakland record for at bats in a game (11th time, last: Mike Heath at Texas, July 1, 1979).
- Set an Oakland record for hits in the month of April with 34...broke the previous mark of 33 held by Stan Javier (1994) and Ben Grieve (1998)...had 11 doubles, which tied the Oakland April record (Mark Ellis, 2003).

BRANDON MOSS

- Matched his career high with five RBI April 10 at Los Angeles (also September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) after driving in four runs the night before.
- Had a career-high four strikeouts April 12 against Detroit...matched that figure April 29 against Los Angeles and May 12 at Seattle.
- Was on the paternity list from April 16 to 18 for the birth of his second son, Brody. (April 16).
- Went 0 for 4 April 21 at Tampa Bay to snap a 15-game road hitting streak dating back to Sept. 20, 2012...hit .463 (25 for 54) during the streak.

PAT NESHEK

- Did not allow a run in nine spring training appearances (8.1 ip) and has not allowed a run in 19 games (17.1 ip) over the last two springs.
- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2007-08 and 2010 with Minnesota, 2011 with San Diego).

DEREK NORRIS

Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles and ended up
going 0 for 5 with a walk...he and Rosales had six plate appearances, which match the most in
Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12,
1992 vs. Texas).

SHANE PETERSON

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 16 against Houston and went 0 for 4.
- Singled off Xavier Cedeno in the fourth inning April 17 against Houston for his first Major League hit.

JOSH REDDICK

- Hit .139 in April, which was the third lowest April batting average in Oakland history (min. 75 PA)...Don Baylor hit .129 in 1976 and Ben Grieve hit .132 in 1999.
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from May 7 to 30 with a sprained right wrist...it was his first career
 stint on the DL...went 3 for 14 (.214) with five runs, three walks, one strikeout and two stolen bases
 during a four-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (May 27) and Triple-A Sacramento
 (May 28-30)...appeared in two games in right field and two at designated hitter.

- Matched his career-high with four hits April 11 at Los Angeles (third time, last: June 4, 2012 vs. Texas) after collecting three hits the night before.
- Hit his sixth career pinch hit home run May 24 at Houston, his first since May 27, 2010 against Arizona.

ERIC SOGARD

• Had a career-high five-game hitting streak from April 14 to 20 (7 for 16, .438)

CHRIS YOUNG

• Is in his eighth season in the majors...the first seven came with Arizona...is on his seventh Opening Day roster.

- Made his A's debut April 3 against Seattle and homered in the seventh inning...became the 20th player in Oakland history to homer in his first game with the A's (last: Jonny Gomes, March 29, 2012 vs. Seattle at Tokyo).
